The report said that Mrs. Garcia, 29, who disappeared from Quickway Grocery at about 5:45 a.m. last Sunday, died from a gunshot wound in the head. A small caliber bullet

Police Chief Larry Jernigan of Cisco said his department was investigating all leads coming in here. Texas Ranger Gene Kea and Sheriff Morren were checking reports from elsewhere in the area. Several people have been questioned and several polygraph tests have been given in clearing suspects, the sheriff said.

A reward for anyone providing information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the murder of Mrs. Garcia had increased to \$3,600. Those offering rewards were Quickway Grocery, \$2,500; Mayor Eris Ritchie, \$500; Taylor Center, \$500; Linton Batteas, local contractor and member of the city council, \$500; and Country Real Estate

It was reported that Ranger Kea and city and county police authorities were to meet Friday after-

noon to study the case. Mrs. Garcia apparently surprised someone robbing a cash register at the We Street store and was taken captive. Left behind were her car, purse and a sweater.

District Attorney Emory Walton, who has spent considerable time in Cisco helping with the investigation, reported that it was believed that Mrs. Garcia died sometime Monday and that her body was taken to the site west of Cisco and placed in the roadside ditch after she died. The bullet wound was covered by the woman's hair and not easily noticed.

Mr. Walton said that clues were coming in to authorities and that all help was appreciated.

"The incident is certainly reasonable cause for concern among our citizens," Mr. Walton said. "It is natural for our people to take

Each Chrismon is a design of a Biblical or scriptural symbol; for example a cross, fish, lamp, star, etc.

Firemen Helped Locate **Body Of Store Victim** Locating the body of Mrs.

Debra Garcia, 29, victim of a Cisco convenience store robbery-kidnapping, resulted last Tuesday from an organized search of area roads, authorities reported Friday.

Police Chief Larry Jernigan, Policeman Raymond Blevins and Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie planned the search, recruited volunteer firemen who manned four vehicles and located the body after about one and a half hours.

Mr. Guthrie, who headed the search party, located the body in the mouth of a cement culvert over a shallow creek on the old Abilene Highway about three and a half miles west of Cisco. He said that he and Joe Jarvis, an employee of Burgess Industries, were in the Fire Department's emergency vehicle. They walked on

each side of the highway from time to time. When he first saw the body, Mr. Guthrie said she reminded him of someone sunbathing. She was fully dressed, wearing a blouse and bluejeans, and shoes. Her glasses were in place. She appeared to have been carefully placed on the ground about seven feet

from the culvert, he said. First, Mr. Guthrie said he checked for a pulse. Finding none, he went to the emergency vehicle and call-

Mrs. Garcia was born September 30, 1952, in Colorado City. She lived at Snyder most of her life and married Willie Garcia there August 29, 1970. She had lived here for some two years and was an active member of the Church of Christ.

Surviving Mrs. Garcia are one son, Issac, 3; her father, Allie E. Ivison of Fairfield; her mother, Mrs. L.E. Booth of Cisco: two brothers, Allie E. Ivison, Jr., and Barry Wood Ivison, both of Fairfield; and four sisters, Carolyn Tuttle of Sanger, Susan White of Fort Worth, Sharon Cunningham and Sheila Ivison, both of San An-

Serving as pallbearers were Kim Squires, Benton Lacy, Roy Dennis, Bobby Fink, David Roberson and Rayburn White.

A number of family friends were contributing money to establish a savings account for Mrs. Garcia's little son, Issac. The contributions were being sent to her mother, Mrs. Booth.

Mrs. Garcia worked for about a year at Quickway Grocery where fellow workers described her as 'friendly and very dependable." She resigned from the store after nearly a year to seek daytime work and spent several months as a machine operator at the Russell Newman Company. Supervisors there described her as "a real good Christian girl." She returned to work at Quickway recently while waiting for another job to

An hour after she was abducted at about 5:45 a.m. Sunday, Mrs. Garcia was to quit working at the convenience store as she has been hired to begin working for Thrift Mart in a daytime job.

Texas Farm Bureau Gives Service Award To Omar Burleson of Anson

Former Congressman Omar Burleston of Anson is the 1981 recipient of the Texas Farm Bureau 'Meritorious Service Award," it was announced Monday, Nov. 30, at the 48th annual meeting of the farm organization here

TFB honored Burleson for his "outstanding service to agriculture" during the 32 years he served as a U.S. Representative from the 17th District of Texas. The announcement was made by TFB President Carrol' Chaloupka.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress, taking his seat in the House in January, 1947. He was re-elected to succeeding Congresses, through the 95th Congress.

The former Congressman worked closely with agriculture during his 16 terms, and was instrumental in the creation of legislation to increase the estate tax exemption, an act which allows a large number of farmers and ranchers to pass down their estates tax free.

In 1968, Burleson was elected to the House Ways and Means Committee. Other committees he served on were the Budget, Foreign Affairs, and Home Administration Committees, chaired.

CORPUS CHRISTI-Although the nation has made a dramatic turn-around in the past year, more economic reforms are needed, Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka told delegates to the 48th annual meeting of the TFB here Monday, Nov.

Among the delegates were Earnest Reich of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, and directors Luther Fambro of Strawn and John Kidd of Eastland.

"We are not half way home, but we have made a beginning," the Dalhart grain and cattle producer said.

"The revolution at the ballot box left no doubt that the American people were fed up with the direction we were headed," Chaloupka said in his annual address to delegates. He cautioned against expecting too much

"We did not get into our present situation overnight, and we will not get out of it in a day, or a week, or even a year," he said.

"We have been heading toward today's welfare state for almost 50 years. In those dark days of the Great Depression, fearful people permitted social and economic experiments that have weakened our free enterprise system and enslaved generations with handouts," he said.

Chaloupka said the federal government caused the current inflation, using "printing press" money to pay for social programs.

"The social programs those that transfer wealth from some people to other people - have put us so heavily in debt that our federal government has been operating with deficits most of the time since World War II," the farm leader said.

The TFB leader said the most spectacular growth in federal spending occured in the 1970s when the so-called entitlements - welfare, food stamps, school lunches, unemployment compensation, Social Security, among others - were tied to the consumer price index.

In the past ten years, the cost of living increased about 140 percent; yet, in that same period spending on entitlement programs increased more than 400 percent, he said.

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
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Union Oil Expands Injection Over Water Association Protests

AUSTIN, Tex .-- Railroad Commission has approved the application of Union Oil Company to expand a fluid injection program begun in 1975 in the Riley North Field in Gaines County.

In testimony at a hearing conducted by the Commission's Oil and Gas Division on August 18, Union requested approval for 23 injection wells in addition to the 16 it presently operates in the field. The company said the additional injection wells are part of a 21 year

gram expected to deliver 16 million barrels of oil. Union said the total program is expected to cost \$20 million.

The Southwest Soil and

Water Protection Association opposed Union's application because fresh water is being used for the waterflood project. Union owns approximatey 1,680 acres of fresh water rights in the project area. The company expects to use 107 million barrels of the estimated 166 million barrels in place under their acreage. secondary recovery pro- Union said available salt

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jection program to prevent future depletion of the Ogallala aquifer. Union argued that the Commission does not have statutory authority to deny company use of fresh water in the project, noting their ownership of the water rights.

The Commission order found the Union application to be in compliance with all statutory requirements. The order states the Commission does not have statutory or implied authority to require Union to use salt water instead of fresh water.

The order goes on to state that although Chapter 27 of the Water Code requires a

permit from the Railroad Commission whenever an injection well is to be used to dispose of oil and gas waste, fresh water from the Ogallala aquifer is not oil and gas waste within the meaning of the statute. The order also says the Commission has the implied authority to examine all aspects of a secondary recovery program before approving it, but that can't be construed as statutory to deny Union's request because salt water could be used instead of fresh water

Union Oil Company , estimates there were 138 million barrels of oil originally in place in the

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Riley North Field. Primary recovery (without injection) is expected to recover 20.6 million barrels and secon-

dary recovery (with injec-

tion) is expected to recover an additional 16 million barrels.

Commission records show the Riley North Field was million barrels.

Last Chance For Comments On Brucellosis Program

AUSTIN -- Dec. 8 is deadline for submitting comments on proposed federal regulations to brucellosis, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission,

"These changes will have an impact on Texas, and producers need to be aware of them," Dr. Holcomb said. If approved, the changes will become a part of the Uniform Methods and Rules, which are minimum federal standards for states to follow.

Dr. Holcomb noted the major change in the proposals is one which will provide for a four classification system for states or areas within a

The classification designation is: Free, A, B, and C.

Free means no herd infection. A means herd infection; B will be from .25 percent to 1.5 percent herd infection; C will be 1.5 percent

Agriculture Dept. Proposes Conservation Program

(Editor's note: The U. S. Department of Agriculuture has identified the critical soil and water resource problems of the nation, analyzed them, and proposed a national conservation program to address them. This is the first in a series of three articles that outlines the conservation problems, trends and analyses, and the proposed national program.)

America will face reduced agricultural productive capacity and increased production costs unless the critical soil and water resource conservation problems of the nation are addressed. This is the conclusion of a three-year study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The study was required by Congress in the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), according to Ron Baily, Soil Conservation Service (SCS) district conservationist in Eastland. Specifically, the RCA study

showed that: -One-third of America's

cropland is eroding faster than the soil can rebuild itself through natural processes. Unless corrective actions are taken, the acreage of this excessively eroding land will increase further.

-Floods threaten human life, cropland and other property, livestock and crops in upstream watersheds. Greater damage is likely in the future.

-Depletion of groundwater threatens the continuation of irrigated agriculture in extensive areas of the West.

-Deterioration of water quality may limit the use of water for irrigation, municipal and industrial supply, fish and wildlife habitat, and other purposes.

These RCA findings are based on the most intensive and accurate appraisal of the country's nonfederal natural resources ever conducted, Baily reports. "Much of the data came from on-site examinations at about 200,000 sample points across the United States. In Texas, some 14,550 sample points provided information for the national summary.' The information gathered included data on land uses, soils, erosion, prime farmland, cropping sequences, and crop residue

treatment. Beside the SCS inventories and other USDA studies and evaluations, the RCA process drew on studies made by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Fish and Wildlife Service, Environmental Protection Agency, Water Resources Council, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and

RCA Appraisal Part 1, the first of three major documents, contains detailed information of the resource base - status, conditions and trends. A reference copy of all three major RCA documents is available for use at SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state.

Copies of a short leaflet summarizing the RCA findings and proposed conservation program are also available at the two USDA offices. It contains a preaddressed, postage-paid response form that people may use to comment on the program.



A Quick Vacation-The Texas Safari


By Viola Payne Are you tired of the holiday rush? Would you like to escape somewhere with your children for an afternoon - say drive to place where you can relax, yet keep them gloriously happy and entertained? There is probably no better place than on outing

at Texas Safari at Clifton, southeast of Hico.

Billed as the World's Largest Animal Drive-Thru, this wildlife park was established only last May. Yet 40 different species of exotic animals from all over the earth are already established on its rolling acres. And the best part they are not the listless, undersized droopy, creatures often seen in zoos, but happy, alert animals free to roam over a wide

There are only a few animals in cages at Safari headquarters The most dangerous ones such as as lions, cougars, panthers, bobcats and black bears. The little animals of the 'petting zoo" are loosely confined, as well as some baby animals in the nursery. But others follow cars around the drive with friendly curiousity, often poking heads into windows.

To find the place you drive from Hico to Clifton, then follow the signs about 3 mi. southwest into the hills near the Bosque River Valley. The Safari area has been developed from a scenic old ranch, and you enter at a large headquarters gate. Admission is \$3.50 per adult, children 6 to 12 \$2.50, and children under 6 free. The Safari is open 7 days per week from 10:00 a.m. until one hour before sundown. Bags of food the animals (.25 each) are available around the Safari Camp area, as well as gifts, food, camera supplies and rental binoculars. An attractive area is arranged for family picnics.

In order to actually see the main groups of animals you must be prepared to drive your car slowly over winding, paved roads. The Park is divided into 4 main sections besides the Safari Camp - International Plains, Kilimanjaro Mount Preserve, Texas Plains, and the Ponds and African Compound. The same safety rules apply to all, including STAY IN YOUR CAR AT ALL TIMES!

As you turn to the left from Safari Park into the International Plains, you are met by a conglomeration of curious, good-natured animals, each hoping to get a treat from food bags. Huge ostrichs and camels jog beside your vehicle, delighting all visitors. Along the way there are ducks, wild turkeys, emus, rheas and other birds. And everyone wants to linger near the pretty lake and look for the resident of Monkey's Island.

The roads on the place pull out into the open and to high points above rugged, wooded canyons. The amount of animals you will see depends on the seasons and time of day. Visitors to the Park report that they see something new everytime they go. The latest star attraction is a 50 lb. baby hippo, born recently to a 5,000 lb. mother. The ranch seems to be a good breeding ground for other rare species, such as the Ibex, Sika and Fallow Deer, and Indian Black Buck

Other exotic deer, some with huge racks of horns, graze about. There are giraffe, and many elk and American buffalo. Strangely enough, these animals seem to be compatible with each other. Or at least these specimans are. The zebras are along, grazing in a large fenced-in area. Nearby are ponds with rare blacknecked swans and other

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Area Band Featured In Hollywood Christmas Parade

A crowd estimated at 750,000 and a national cable television audience of millions watched the "World Famous" Cowboy Band and the Six White Horses from Hardin-Simmons University parade down Sunset Boulevard and Hollywood Boulevard in Hollywood, California Nov. 29.

The two HSU groups were the only non-California units invited to the 50th annual Hollywood Christmas parade and were introduced as "the 1981 feature band" throughout the three-mile

Gene Autry, who wrote the Christmas standard "Here Comes Santa Claus" years ago after participating in the parade when it was still called the "Santa Claus Lane Parade", rode in a float in front of the White Horses and the band. He appeared with the Cowboy Band in 1935 at the Texas Centennial celebration.

Other old friends of the band were also on Hand, including Roy Rogers who appeared on the HSU campus in the 1920's when he was still relatively unknown. He and Dale Evans served as parade marshals for the

Bleacher seats for the parade sold for \$12-\$20 each and thousands of viewers arrived by 1 p.m. to camp out on sidewalks along the parade route so they would be assured of good vantage points. The parade did not begin until 6 p.m. and lasted approximately three hours. KTLA, a microwave "super station" in Los Angeles televised the parade live and then re-broadcast tapes of the parade three times over the next two days.


