

Dear Editor

Once again Christmas Greetings come to you from south of the equator. Swimming and ice cream is the vision we get on Christmas Eve rather than "sugar plums" and stockings hung by a roaring fire. No, we don't have a swimming pool at our station, but occasionally some of the missionaries mix business with pleasure and visit the Til Corp Estate where a nice pool is available. (I've been swimming once this year.) It helps to think briefly of diving into a cool pool..(snow and cold wintry winds are too remote to even be considered.) on a very HOT day.

We came back to our Mis-

sion to work because we know how badly we are needed. During the war about two thirds of our missionary staff left the country most of whom were re-assigned to other countries. But the needs are just as great here now as before...in fact greater. Since the war there is so much reconstruction to be done both spiritually and in buildings. Sanyati Mission Station was not destroyed. This includes the 85 bed hospital, 1000 student school, boarding facilities for some 400 of those students and homes to accomodate workers for these 2 big institutions. These buildings were built because of sacrificial giving through the years to Lottie Moon Offering. God protected these facilities in a miraculous way due to a few heroic African Medical Assistants and their Aids. But the hospital especially is in sad need of repairs and refurbishings. Little by little progress is being made in this direction. But the mission station at Sessami where we used to work was razed to the ground with only a pile of rubble as mute testimony to the long hard years we spent trying to make the love of Christ known. 5 other clinics where Rob used to be flown are also a pile of rubble. So with Sanyati as our headquarters and administrative duties as well as medical duties here, Rob is going back to try and reconstruct those 6 clinics. It reminds me of a quote from Rudyard

high quality pecans representing over 40 different varieties. It will also include a bake show featuring delicious pecan pies, cakes, candy, nut bread and cookies. There will also be a

pecan centerpiece class. The show is being sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. James Wright, Chamber of Commerce manager, says visitors will see some of the best quality pecans in Texas, as well as prize baked goods.

Plaques will be given for the Champion In-shell pecans, Champion Shelling pecans, and the Champion natives. Ribbons will be awarded to the first three place entries of each variety. In addition, ribbons will be given for the largest pecan and the smallest pecan.

Dan Childress, President of the County Pecan Growers Assoc., says this should be one of the better pecan shows ever held in Eastland County. This year's crop is much larger than last year's crop.

Show pecans not going to the regional show will be sold after the county show closes at noon Saturday. Shelled pecan kernels will also be sold at the close of the show.

Anyone producing pecans may enter the Pecan Show. Each entry consist of 43 pecans. All entries must be entered at the Extension Service office by 4:00 p.m. Thursday.

On Friday morning, the pecans from each entry will be weighed, shelled and kernels weighed to determine the number of pecans in 1 pound and the percent kernel.

Chamber of Commerce members and pecan growers will shell and weigh the

The weight of the pecans and the percent kernels are two important factors in determining winners, along with appearance, color, uniformity, and texture. Judges will be Horticulturists and Extension Specialists from Texas A&M University.

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Some income received by a self-employed person after retirement may not affect benefit checks, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

The general rule is all selfemployment income received by a person in a year can affect his or her right to benefits. An important exception to this rule applies to income received after retirement which was earned before retirement.

Under this rule, income received in a year after the year of retirement which is not attributable to services performed after the month benefits start does not count for the annual earnings test, the measure used to decide if benefits should be paid.

Those affected by this exception include:

· Farmers who sell carryover crops in a year after the year of retirement but were raised, harvested, and stored before then.

 Self-employed life insurance agents who receive renewal commissions after retirement from policies sold before then.

· Retired partners who receive a share of the partnership income after retire-

ment. · Silent partners who may never have worked in the partnership but who receive a share of the income based on their investment.

 Other retired selfemployed people who receive self-employment income solely from the ownership of an income producing enterprise.

The exception does not apply to any tax liability including Social Security selfemployment tax. The exception does apply to all tax years after 1977.

More information about the annual earnings test, including this exception, can be obtained at the Abilene Social Security office. The people there will be glad to answer any questions. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and the telephone FOR SALE T-103.

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USDA Charts **Conservation Course**

Part 2: Resource Trends (Editor's note: The U.S. Department of Agriculture has identified the critical soil and water resource problems of the nation, analyzed them, and proposed a national conservation program to address them. This is the second in a series of three articles that outlines the conservation problems, trends and analyses, and the proposed national program.)

Continuing present nationwide soil and water conservation trends would mean serious future conservation and farm production problems, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) report.

The finding is based on an analysis of the condition and trends of the soil, water and related resources of the United States. The analysis was part of a report required

by Congress in the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), explains Ron Bailey, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) at Eastland.

The analysis shows that the demand for food and fiber produced in the United States would increase while technological advances in agricultural production would decrease.

Without better technology to boost production, the demand to produce more food and fiber will mean that more acres of marginal land will be farmed. The result will be increased soil erosion rates and other resource problems.

If this happens, the productive capacity of American agriculture would decrease and production costs would increase.

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deteriorated water quality. To project future condi-

tions, the USDA analysts used a computer model to simulate the nation's agricultural productivity related to erosion. Although the model's results can't be taken as absolute indicators of what will happen, they do show the relative direction of American agriculutre and the possible magnitude of future resource conditions and problems.

The report says that these

resource problems need to

be addressed most quickly:

Excessive erosion rates,

upstream flood damages,

groundwater depletion, and

RCA Appraisal Part II, the second of three major RCA documents, contains the detailed analysis of the trends in the use and condition of America's oil and water resource base. A copy of this and other RCA documents is available for reference use at SCS and Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state.

A short leaflet summarizing the RCA finding and proposed conservation program is also available at these USDA offices. The leaflet contains a pre-addressed. postage-paid response form that may be used to send comments to USDA. Responses should be mailed by January 15, 1982.

Jail Escapee Gets 5-Year Sentence

Timothy Rainwater, 19, of DeQuincy, La., received a five-year prison sentence Monday after pleading guilty to escape charges before 91st District Judge Jim Wright.

Rainwater was indicted last week by an Eastland County grand jury after escaping from the grounds of the Eastland County jail Oct. 25. He had been working outside the jail and walked away from it before being apprehended in Eastland about an hour later by Department of Public Safety officer Steve Foster, testimony showed.

Rainwater was convicted of burglary of a habitation Nov. 16 in connection with the Sept. 30 burglary of a house between Eastland and Ranger. Wright sentenced Rainwater to 10 years in prison on that conviction.

Jim Farrar was Rainwater's court appointed attorney.



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

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

Watching Washington

Drug Smuggling into the United States continues on the upswing, with vast quantities coming in from South America through the high seas along the Texas Gulf Coast. Earlier this year I had the General Accounting Office look into

this problem and the results were disturbing. The GAO found that in 1979 the Coast Guard seized 208,000 pounds of marijuana in Texas coastal waters. But in 1980, when Castro flooded us with refugees, the Coast Guard diverted boats and manpower to Florida and they seized only 68,000 pounds of drugs along our coast.

This year Texas again has Coast Guard resources and we're intercepting more drugs than ever; twice as much as in 1978, before the Cuban sealift.

What disturbs me, though, is that the number of Coast Guard cutters has dropped by 27 percent over the past decade. They're intercepting only 15 percent of the narcotics destined for our coast. So, we've got smuggling on the increase and the ability of the Coast Guard to combat it on the decline.

Coast Guard officials have told me that they need 400 more ships and 350 more aircraft to fight these illegal smugglers, but at a time when we're cutting government spending, there isn't enough money for all this.

Many of the Coast Guard cutters are engaged in search and rescue, boating safety and oil spill prevention. If we want to control the flow of drugs into this country we must either provide the Coast Guard with more resources or reduce their responsibilities

in other areas. But there is an even better, more effective way to intercept drug traffic on the high seas and it can be done within existing laws and existing funding levels.

Most of the marijuana entering this country comes from Colombia and other South American countries. It is loaded aboard large mother ships and then-when they are near the U.S. coast—the cargo is divided between smaller boats.

All of that traffic must approach our coast through four "choke points" in the Caribbean-four narrow channels. With current resources, the Coast Guard can only cover those choke points about 18 percent of the time.

But, by drawing on the resources of the U.S. Navy to monitor these sea lanes, we can provide full coverage. We can spot, identify and trail the mother ships before they divide their crim-

Earlier this year I wrote the U.S. Attorney General and urged that the United States use our Navy in the fight against these illegal drug smugglers on the high seas. Recently Attorney General William French Smith responded

to my idea with whole-hearted approval. He added that the Secretary of Defense is eager to cooperate.

Using the Navy to intercept drug smugglers on the high seas, the Attorney General reports, is going to be part of the drugfighting policy of this Administration.

This can dramatically boost our ability to control drug smuggling. The U.S. Navy will make it harder for smugglers to con tinue their vicious trade.

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Insulating Your Garden

by Ted Brice, The Garden Editor

We hear so very much today about the "R" factor and insulating homes to retain heat in the winter and the coolness in the summer in order to conserve energy.

We have the same problems in our gardens and flower beds. But here the insulation is called mulch.

Mulch performs many functions, it helps to retain moisture year round. In the heat of summer it helps to keep the plants cool and in the winter it helps to keep the plants warm and offers protection from freezing. There are many different products offered for sale for mulching your beds. We

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must look for the best product to perform the above described functions and then we must consider the appearance of that particular mulch in our beds. There is one additional consideration and that is will the mulch we use counter-act any of the elements (acidity) that is in the beds or will the mulch elements these elements.

ehance these elements.

Lets look at the most popular mulches in this area. They are pine, bark, cedar bark, rice hulls - sugar cane, red wood, corn cobs and leaves/grass clippings.

The pine bark mulch is by far the most popular due to the abundance of the product and the lower price. Pine bark mulch will protect the plants and will offer a good appearance in the beds. But we do have a problem with pine bark mulch it will leach the nitrogene out of the soil.

The cedar bark mulch is becoming a very popular mulch. It performs well in the protection of your plants and offers a good appearance and smell to your beds. Cedar bark mulch is 5.2 acid and will enhance the soil from this acidity stand point. There is also one unproven advantage to cedar mulch. It seems to retard insects in the beds. You must remember Grandmother's cedar lined closets to keep out moths, some of this insect retarding qualities seems to have carried over to the cedar mulch.

Let's examine the rice hulls and the sugar cane together. These two mulches are quite popular along the coastal areas. The sugar cane may attract ants to your beds and the appearance is not as pleasing as other mulches. The rice hulls have a pleasing appearance but the water retention is not as good as the other mulches and there is a blowing problem with rice hulls.

The red wood bark mulch is the most pleasing of all the mulches to the eye but it is the most expensive of all the mulches. Over all the red wood bark mulch is an excellent mulch.

Ground corn cobs make an excellent inexpensive mulch but the appearance is not pleasing until the corn cobs have aged by the weather

while in the bed.
Grass clippings and or leaves have one very serious problem. They need to be ground up to very small particles where they will decompose rapidly. This mulch will build up heat during decomposing and can create very serious problems.

Your Garden Editor has attempted to present both the advantages and disadvantages to the most popular mulches that are available in this area.

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
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
