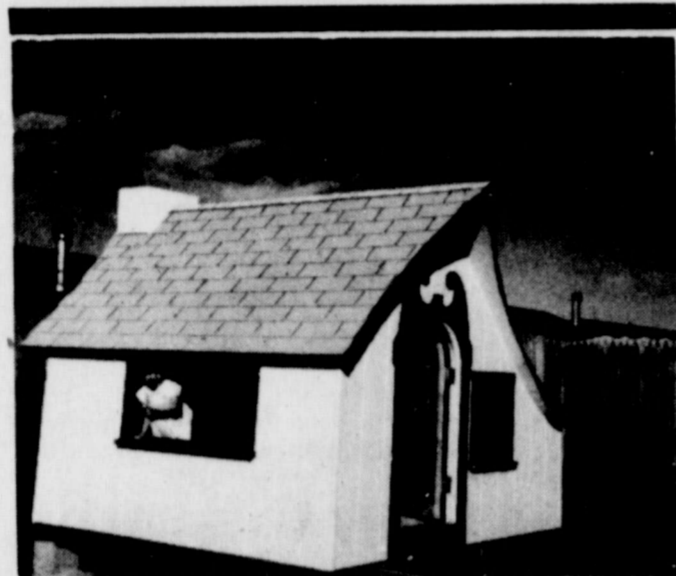

Council Discusses Plans For Water Filter Plant At Lake

Plans for a filtration plant at Lake Cisco to enable the City to meet minimum standards for water treatment facilities were discussed at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

Engineer Ken Martin of Yeats & Decker, Abilene, outlined the city's needs to upgrade the water system to the point where it will take care of projected population growth as well as meet standards laid down by the Texas

Department of Health. The Council ordered a special work session for Tuesday, Jan. 19, 1982, to begin work on the proposition. The public will be encouraged to attend the 6 p.m. meeting of the Council at Ci-

ty Hall. At the same time, the Council authorized City Manager Mike Moore to file an application with the Farm Home Administration for a loan and grant to help with financing the project.

A letter from the state health department was distributed to Council members. It reads as follows:

"We are very pleased that the City of Cisco has decided to actively seek funds for upgrading its water supply facilities. Please be assured of our support in this endeavor.

"In response to your questions, the City of Cisco's water treatment facilities are grossly inadequate. As you are aware, at the present time the Cisco Water Treatment Plant consists only of a sedimentation basin with per and post chlorination. This makes the City of Cisco the only municipal supply in the state which provides unfiltered surface water to its customers.

"This is, as you know, a direct violation of Article 4477-1 of the Texas Civil Statutes. This has also resulted in the City consistently violating the turbidity standard established by the Department's Drinking Water Standards. While there are other systems of comparable size in your immediate area which have major problems with their water treatment facilities, they are all capable of filtering their surface water supplies.

"The City of Cisco has been fortunate that no incidence of water borne disease has been noted in the City, because while chlorination is most effective in reducing bacteriological contamination, it is ineffective for cyst removal.

"Were it not for the limited financial ability of the City of Cisco, this Department would have instituted legal action to force the City of Cisco to comply with the law."

The letter was signed by Ruben A. Alvarado of the department.

Engineer Martin's figures showed that a filtration plant plus other needed equipment at Lake Cisco will cost in the neighborhood of \$900,000. Upgrading water mains and facilities in town would cost another \$600,000. The in-town project, however, could wait for a time.

Financing, Mr. Martin said, could be provided by increased water and sewer rates or by voting tax bonds.

Mayor Eris Ritchie and members of the Council agreed that the city must begin work on the problem. In setting the public work meeting for next month, engineers and city officials will have time to assemble cost data and financial information, it was pointed out.

Mr. Martin noted that recent projects handled by his company had attracted a large number of bidders and that, in some cases, bids had been as much as 20% below their estimates due to "slack times" in the construction industry.

Carmello Barrentos Built Local Shrine To Lady Guadalupe

People all over the world have their shrines, a place in which devotion is paid to a saint or deity; a place or object hallowed by its association. Eastland is no exception.

A shrine to the Lady of Guadalupe was built by Carmello Barrentos a man employed by Judge and Mrs. Grissom, and a native of Mexico, the shrine now stands in the back of the Grissom home and in front of where Mr. Barrentos lives.

Our Lady Guadalupe is the patron saint of Mexico. It is recorded that on December 9, 1531, Juan Diego, a poor Indian was hurrying across Tepoyac Hill, near Mexico

City when he had a vision of the Virgin Mary. A lady told Juan to go to the bishop and request that a shrine be built where Virgin Mary had stood. It was not until the vision appeared a second time, on December 12th and produced a sign that the bishop believed. During the second appearance, the lady called herself Holy Mary of Guadalupe.

The local shrine was built last year when Judge Grissom and a neighbor of his became ill. Carmello, a Catholic prayed for them and promised to build a shrine to Lady Guadalupe when they got better. Later, when they were well,

Carmello began on the shrine and finished it last spring.

Recently description Christmas lights were put around the shrine. It is very important to Carmello and he invites the community view the shrine any time by driving down Lamar street behind the 1100 block of Seaman.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — There is no right more basic to Americans or to any citizen of any democracy than the right to vote.

The distribution of eligible voters within a society defines, to a considerable extent, the degree of democracy in that society. In recognition of this, the Framers of the American Constitution gave considerable attention to the question.

While they were clear that voting was of importance, just who was to have the right to cast a vote for a federal official was less obvious. Basically, the states were recognized as having the primary responsibility for determining voting qualifications subject to specific limitations set forth in the Constitution.

There can be no doubt, we admit sadly, that many states abdicated their responsibility in this regard, using a variety of qualifications, including race, sex and residence requirements, to disenfranchise many who would otherwise be qualified to vote.

The errors of those dark days in our country's history were corrected by the passage of numerous Civil Rights Laws during the late 50s and early 60s. Specifically, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 brought into the mainstream of the

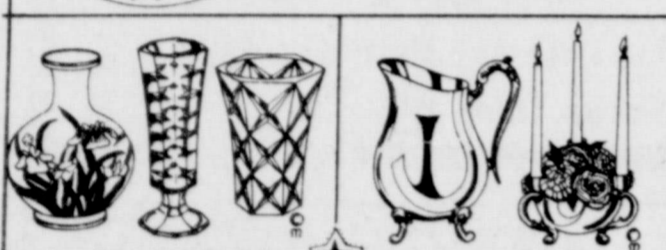

MISTLETOE-FRIEND OR FOE
 The word Mistletoe usually brings to mind kissing and Christmas festivities. But did you know that Mistletoe is actually a parasite on many of our landscape plants? Hackberry, Live Oak and Mesquite are more frequently attacked.
 The Mistletoe found in Texas produces clusters of perennial, green jointed stems on the branches and trunks of the host tree. The stems bear green, leathery leaves which persist for several seasons. Nutrients and water are supplied from an absorbing system which develops in the bark and wood of the host plant. However, Mistletoe is a chlorophyll-containing plant, meaning it has green matter in its leaves which manufactures sugars and starches needed in its growth and development.
 Mistletoe is a flowering plant. The flowers are born in the leaf axil and produce the familiar white berries in late fall and early winter. An important fact to remember, especially when Mistletoe is being used for its decorative purposes during the holiday season, is that the berries are very poisonous.
 Within the tough outer coat of the berry is a single seed which is embedded in a sticky pulp. Birds feed on this sticky pulp which results in the seeds sticking to their beaks, feet and other body parts. In this way the seeds are carried to other branches of the tree or trees and deposited. When conditions are favorable, the seed germinates and sends its root-like structures into the host plant.
 Mistletoe frequently becomes so abundant in trees that control measures become necessary. Mistletoe can be easily broken off. However, this will result in only temporary control because it will eventually grow back. More lasting control can be obtained by removing the limbs on which the parasite is growing. No chemical is presently available to successfully control Mistletoe without doing excessive harm to the host plant.
 Cut all the Mistletoe you want for the holiday season to reduce the amount in the landscape plants. Remember to keep the berries out of reach of children. Most of all, remember that those caught under the Mistletoe stand a better chance of catching a winter cold than of catching a mate, so be careful. Merry Christmas from your County Extension Office!

U. S. Energy 'Crisis' Remains Big Problem

The United States of America continues in the throes of an energy "crisis."

True, there is in the world today an overabundance of crude oil, a so-called "glut." This overabundance is the result of the combination of full production schedules in most producing countries and conservation in the larger consuming nations. The result has been more than adequate supplies generally and a decrease in prices of some oil.

But, this situation almost surely will be short-lived. Saudi Arabia has decided to institute a one-million barrel per day reduction in production. Although oil decontrol has spurred U.S. drilling, we are not finding as much crude oil as we are producing; certainly not nearly as much as we are consuming.

So, if you are an American homeowner or apartment dweller, motorist, clerk, businessman, farmer, student or housewife your standard of living, even your way of life, continues to be affected. This is because our nation's appetite for oil, as already indicated, far outdistances our ability to produce under present economic, technical, and political conditions.

The extent of the problem can be understood as it is reflected in our import figures: Even after the acceleration of oil price decontrol by President Reagan and the aforementioned return of strength and vigor to domestic drilling, this country must import six-million barrels of oil daily.

To be sure, this six-million barrel level is a significant improvement over the days when we were bringing in eight- to 10-million barrels. But, six-million barrels at \$35.00 per barrel costs \$210-million each day. That amounts to \$76-billion annually. This is not a sum that even the wealthiest nation on Earth can continue to pay indefinitely.

But, there is more than just economics to consider. There is another development — a cutoff of supplies — that could be of even greater concern to a nation that must import such a large amount of its energy, the national lifeblood of any industrialized nation.

To be denied access to that oil, with no other sources available, could wreak havoc with a country's economy. In an extreme case, a national economy virtually could cease to function.

It is for these reasons that the foremost problem facing this country today remains the displacement of this amount of imported oil with safe, secure, domestically produced oil. Only then will the energy "crisis" be a thing of the past.

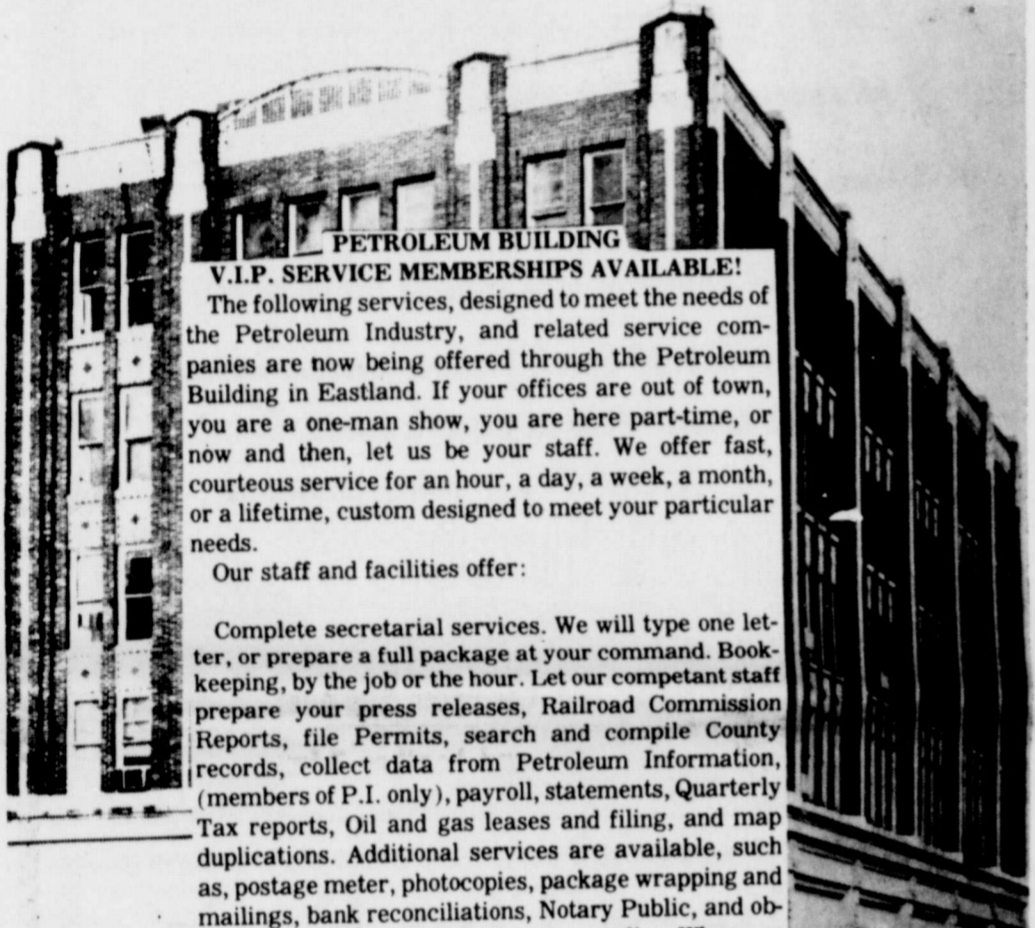

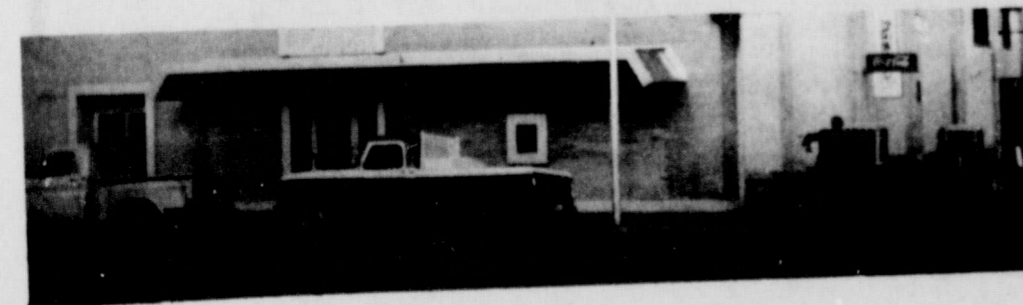

The City of Cisco during the month of October, 1981, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. 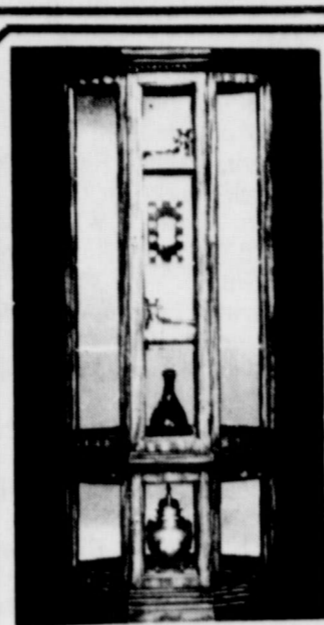

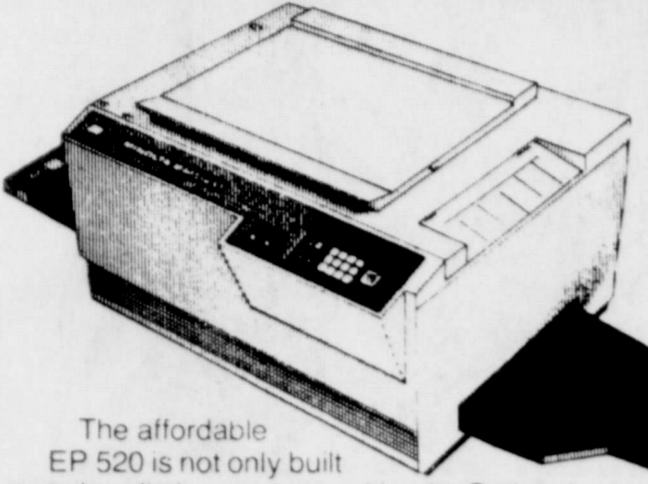

"There were so many attractions in the Bahamas that it was difficult to condense them in one article," Mrs. Terrell stated. "It is truly a land at a crossroads, where British Colonial influence blends with modern ideas."

The Bahamas, she explains, are actually a string of 700 islands just north of the Caribbean, but only about 20 are populated.

And what does a stay in "Paradise" cost? It can be expensive enough for the very wealthy, or one can enjoy a moderately priced hotel apartment and travel by ferry, shuttle boat, bicycle, or foot. Either way, it makes an unforgettable vacation, according to Mrs. Terrell. And the sale of this article to the Morning News, like accounts of all her other major travels lately, makes a very pleasant bonus.

GORDON SPOT

There have been twelve confirmed calf deaths due to Blackleg in Eastland County during the last few weeks according to local veterinarians. Dr. Kevan Blasor of Ranger and Dr. Vergil Patrick of Cisco said they know of this number of cases and other cattlemen have called to report cattle deaths probably caused by Blackleg disease. This is the time of year this disease most often occurs. Vaccination is the only method to prevent this disease. We recommend that all calves be vaccinated at four months of age. Booster shots should be given in one year to replacement animals. Vaccinate for Blackleg and malignant edema for minimum protection. Most producers will want to use a more complete vaccine with redwater novvii and sordellii (4-way) protective antigens. If the first injection is prior to three months of age, a second shot at 7-8 months is stimulate immunity is recommended. Several changes which will affect Texas in 1982 have been recommended in the Uniform Methods and Rules

animals will be able to move more freely than non-vaccinated animals. A major thrust of the Texas brucellosis plan is vaccination with reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine. The classification system is a division to indicate how much infection is in an area, and is not an indication that the state is not making progress. The Texas Animal health Commission, the animal health governing body for the state, follows the minimum standards of the UM&R as part of the Texas brucellosis program. Changes recommended regard the state's classification status. Classifications to be effective January 1 include free A, B, and C. All are based on the number or percentage of infected herds in the county. In 1982 Eastland County will be in the B area. Class B status means one negative test within 30 days and one negative test 45-120 days after movement are required for interstate movement of test eligible cattle in the B area. Animals that are exempt (non-test eligible) from testing requirements in all classification are steers and heifers or official calfhood vaccinates if dairy breed under 20 months of age; beef cattle under 24 months, and non-vaccinated cattle under 18 months, unless pregnant. Vaccination also is strongly encouraged since these

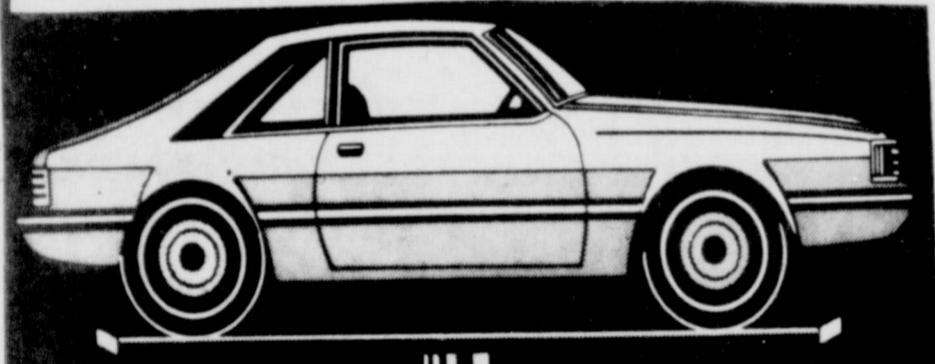

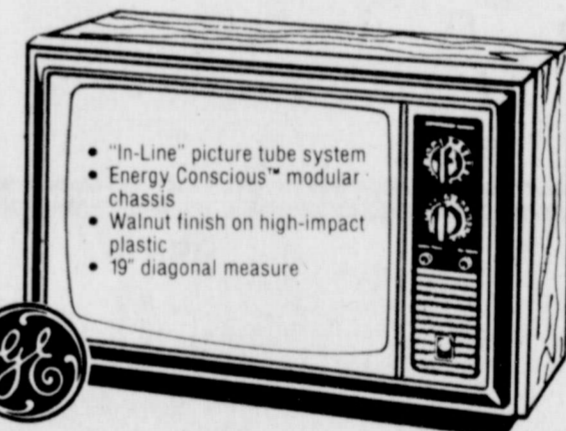
