



This makes the City of Cisco the only municipal supply in the state which provides unfiltered surface water to its customers.

"This is, as you know, a direct violation of Article 4477-1 of the Texas Civil Statutes. This has also resulted in the City consistently violating the turbidity standard established by the Department's Drinking Water Standards. While there are other systems of comparable size in your immediate area which have major problems with their water treatment facilities, they are all capable of filtering their surface water sup-

WASHINGTON, D.C. -There is no right more basic to Americans or to any citizen of any democracy than the right

The distribution of eligible voters within a society defines, to a considerable extent, the degree of democracy in that society. In recognition of this, the Framers of the American Constitution gave considerable attention to the question.

While they were clear that voting was of importance, just who was to have the right to cast a vote for a federal official was less obvious. Basically, the states were recognized as having the primary responsibility for determining voting qualifications subject to specific limitions set forth in

the Constitution. There can be no doubt, we admit sadly, that many states abdicated their responsibility in this regard, using a variety of qualifications, including race, sex and residence requirements, to disenfranchise many who would otherwise be qualified to vote.

The errors of those dark days in our country's history were corrected by the passage of numerous Civil Rights Laws during the late 50s and early 60s. Specifically, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 brought

political selection process vast numbers of minority voters. This legislation put teeth into existing laws in order to enforce this precious privilege. The results of the Act have shown a dramatic and equal incréase of minority involvement in voter registration, participation and elections to public office.

The extention of the Voting Rights Act, which was due to run out in 1982, was overwhelmingly passed by the House of Representatives recently and has now been sent to the Senate for action.

I supported the extension of this legislation for another 10 years, even though I still remain concerned that it singles out one region of the country - the South and

There are, I believe, Northern states with large minority populations, that could benefit as well as Texas by automatic inclusion under this Act.

During House debate, there were several amendments proposed that would have significantly weakened the intent of the Voting Rights Act, and I opposed each of these moves. I did support, however, an amendment that I felt would simplify procedures that state and other political localities must go through to prove that their past history has been cleared (bailout provi-

This amendment would have allowed such cases to be brought before the appropriate three-judge U.S. District Court where the petitioner was located, rather than bear the expense and inconvenience of being forced to appear before the U.S. District Court in the District of Columbia.

This amendment was defeated, however.

There are other provisions included in the Act that are considered burdensome, expensive and controversial by some. I believe, however, that it remains the duty of the majority to protect the rights of the minority. And certainly the first right of both majority and minority citizen is the right to vote for those representatives they would entrust with that duty in Congress.

MISTLETOE-FRIEND OR FOE

The word Mistletoe usually brings to mind kissing and Christmas festivities. But did you know that Mistleton is actually a parasite on many of our landscape plants? Hackberry, Live Oak and Mesquite are more frequently attacked.

The Mistletoe found in Texas produces clusters of perennial, green jointed stems on the branches and trunks of the host tree. The stems bear green, leathery leaves which persist for several season. Nutrients and water are supplied from an absorbing system which develops in the bark and wood of the host plant.

chlorophyll-containing plant, meaning it has green matter in its leaves which manufactures sugars and starches needed in its growth and development.

Mistletoe is a flowering plant. The flowers are born in the leaf axil and produce the familiar white berries in late fall and early winter. An important fact to remember, especially when Mistletoe is being used for its decorative purposes during the holiday season, is that the berries are very poisonous.

No chemical is presently available to successfully control Mistletoe without doing excessive harm to the host plant.

Cut all the Mistletoe you

want for the holiday season to reduce the amount in the plants. landscape Remember to keep the berries out of reach of children. Most of all, remember that those caught under the Mistletoe stand a better chance of catching a winter cold than of catching a mate, so be careful. 

## U. S. Energy 'Crisis' Remains Big Problem

The United States of America continues in the throes of an energy "crisis.

True, there is in the world today an overabundance of crude oil, a so-called "glut." This overabundance is the result of the combination of full production schedules in most producing countries and conservation in the larger consuming nations. The result has been more than adequate supplies generally and a decrease in prices of some oil.

But, this situation almost surely will be shortlived. Saudi Arabia has decided to institute a onemillion barrel per day reduction in production. Although oil decontrol has spurred U.S. drilling, we are not finding as much crude oil as we are producing; certainly not nearly as much as we are

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To be sure, this six-million barrel lovel is a significant improvement over the days when we were bringing in eight- to 10-million barrels. But, sixmillion barrels at \$35.00 per barrel costs \$210million each day. That amounts to \$76-billion annually. This is not a sum that even the wealthiest nation on Earth can continue to pay indefinitely.

But, there is more than just economics to consider. There is another development - a cutoff of supplies - that could be of even greater concern to a nation that must import such a large amount of its energy, the national lifeblood of any industrialized nation

To be denied access to that oil, with no other sources available, could wreak havoc with a country's economy. In an extreme case, a national economy virtually could cease to function.

It is for these reasons that the foremost problem facing this country today remains the displacement of this amount of imported oil with safe. secure, domestically produced oil. Only then will the energy "crisis" be a thing of the past.

supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria (1) the monthly average exceeded one (1) turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness or disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection; (2) prevent maintenance of an

And what does a stay in 'Paradise'' cost? It can be expensive enough for the very wealthy, or one can enjoy a moderately priced hotel apartment and travel by ferry, shuttle boat, bicycle, or foot. Either way, it makes an unforgettable vacation, according to Mrs. Terrell.
