

# There Is A Rock

"Rock Of Ages", with words by Augustus M. Toplady and music by Thomas Hastings, is one of the most beloved Christian hymns. Its words form a prayer, beginning:

"Rock of Ages, cleft for me

Let me hide myself in Thee."

The actual rock which inspired this symbolic text is found in Cheddar Gorge in southwest England, an area which is still wild and beautiful.

One day about 1762 a minister, Augustus M. Toplady, was traveling through the Gorge. A terrific storm broke, and he looked about for shelter. Then he saw a huge rock with a cleft - a place where he would be safe. While waiting there, stirring words and phrases seemed to form in his mind.

Many years later, about 1830, Thomas Hastings composed music for the poem.

The Rock, symbolizing Christ the Rock of Ages, is still found in Cheddar Gorge. A marker denotes the spot where Rev. Toplady hid from

### 173 Fire Alarms Recorded In 1981

A total of 173 alarms, including 32 in December. were answered by the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department during 1981, records at the Cisco Fire Station showed.

For comparison, records showed that there were 173 alarms in 1980 - the same number as in 1981; 180 in 1979; 151 in 1978; 158 in 1977 and 102 in 1976.

Mrs. Umana died and her 23-year old husband, Miguel, a Tulsa pilot, was injured in the one-car accident near Cisco. Mr. Umana was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital and released after a checkup revealed no serious injuries.

Mrs. Umana was pronounced dead at the scene by Gorman Justice of the Peace Pat Ingram. The couple was traveling from Los Angeles to Tulsa, and Mrs. Umana was driving the car. The

# 1982 Tax Exemption **Applications Mailed**

Eastland County property owners will be receiving 1982 tax exemption applications in the mail within the next few days. These exemption applications will cover many of the exemptions granted to property owners by the tax units of the County.

Employees of the Eastland County Appraisal District have placed over 6,600 exemption applications into the mail. The new State Property Tax Code which becomes effective as of January 1, 1982, makes the County-wide Appraisal District responsible for the administration of all exemptions granted by taxing bodies of the County.

The applications mailed were sent to all Eastland County property owners who had been granted an exemption of any kind for the 1981 year. If your name was left off the mailing list or you just do not receive an application in the next few days, please check with the Appraisal District office for the property application.

All applications must be returned by May 1, 1982 and must be completely filled out. The law provides that any application submitted after that date or incompletely filled out cannot be granted.

The completed applications may be returned by mail or dropped off at either

the Appraisal District office in Eastland or one of the local school tax offices.

If you have any questions concerning the exemptions or your possible eligibility for one, you are urged to contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597.

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


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

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## **Doris Chamness Is Following Her Dreams**

One of these is Doris Chamness of Cisco, who is adding academic credits to

"One can still find time," Doris says, "To grow in knowledge and develop the talents each of us have.

Doris Modean (Harvison) Chamness was born to textile mill workers during the depression years, and spent most of her early school years in Waco. She attended Gurley Elementary, a small rural school just outside the city limits. She always enjoyed school, and recalls the name of each of her teachers with affection.

The family moved to Louisiana in the late 1930's, finally settling in Houma. Here Doris attended all four years in the Terrebonne Parish High School, graduting in 1942 at the age of seventeen in the upper quarter of her class.

World War II found Doris, with her family, moving to California. She had decided on a career in nursing, but postponed that for awhile. She attended a small community College where she studied pre-med courses, and at the same time worked full time for Pacific Telephone and Telegraph

In 1943 Doris met Archie Ray Chamness, and they were married in December, 1945. At this time Doris decided against going on to Nursing School. Her husband was employed by a Chemical Co. in the Railroad Division - a job which kept them traveling back and forth across the country on the railroads

They later settled in California, then in Kansas City, Mo. and then to

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Doris's delight - they arrived back in her home state of Texas

First they lived in Odessa then by 1954 in Midland. They established their own business, for by this time her husband was a mechanical contractor and involved in construction. Later he also became a Realtor

In 1958, after a rapidly growing business, Doris saw her husband selected as one of those named in the Texas Edition of "Men of Achievement - 1958'

Their first child, a daughter, was born in March of '48. While living in Odessa a son and two daughters were added. Then, in Midland, three sons and three daughters were born to the family, making ten children in all. At one time Doris found herself driving children to four different schools, with the older

daughter already in College. "You can bet that a lot of P.T.A. and Band programs were attended," Doris

In 1972 it was decided to cut back on the size of the family business and move to a smaller town. After investigating possibilities, the family moved to Cisco. Six children were still in school. Now, in 1981, two daughters are still attending Cisco Public Schools.

With the family growing smaller, Doris began to think about going back to school. In the fall of 1978 she enrolled as a full time student at C.J.C. The courses she took in business and selected floral studies enabl-

ed her to be certified in floristry. While attending she was named to the President's List - a special honor for someone who had been out of High Schgool for 36 vears

After these courses were completed, Doris followed through with another dream. She had never sketched or painted, but had thought a lot about it. With her husband's encouragement she enrolled in Art Classes at C.J.C. with Instructor George Holland

Doris found him to be an excellent teacher, and very patient with a beginner. The more she learned the more she wanted to paint. Soon many hours of the day and night were spent practicing her painting.

"I had the feeling that I wanted to paint everything I saw!" Doris says.

When Mr. Holland left C.J.C. in 1980 he suggested that Doris continue to study with Sue Mullinax, the current C.J.C. Instructor in painting, drawing, and sculpting. By now Doris has spent 3 Semesters with Mrs. Mullinax, and states that an even further desire to paint has been instilled in her.

"It takes time for one to develop in art," Doris says, But I find it really thrilling to now be able to transfer some beautiful thought or picture to canvas - to know that the urge no longer has to be surpressed.'

### Industry Top Taxpayer At State, Local Levels

By Avery Rush, Jr., Chairman Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association

The severance tax paid on crude oil and natural gas by producers long has been recognized as the cornerstone of support for Texas state government Last year this support reached a record high level

A total of \$2.2-billion was paid on Fiscal Year 1981 production at the rate of 4.6-percent on the wellhead value of crude oil and 7.5-percent on the wellhead value of natural gas. This tax bill accounted for 28.3-percent of total state collections and made the petroleum industry the largest single tampayer to state government.

Now, a survey by the Association shows that the Texas pstroleum industry was the largest taxpayer at the local level, as well. In Calendar Year 1980, the last year for which data are available, this industry paid approximately 8938.6-million in ad valorem (property) taxes to all local jurisdictions - counties, school districts, and cities. This accounts for slightly more than 22-percent of that year's total property tax collections throughout the

In addition to these large categories, in Fiscal Year 1981 the industry paid 877.7-million in corporate franchise tax. That accounts for approximatily 18.6-percent of total state collections on

Also, in 1981, the industry paid \$11.7-million in a well servicing tax and an additional \$2.3-million in an oil and gas regulatory tax.

These state and local tax payments have provided various governments in Texas with a substantial amount of the money needed to meet many of their social and educational commitments. Texas' oil and gas dollars paid 64.7-percent of state costs of aid to dependent children, medical assistance, and teachers' retirement matching. Moreover, money from this same source accounted for approximately 30-percent of state funds spent on public education.

Due in large measure to these direct tax payments by the petroleum industry. Texans enjoy a number of advantages. These include the following:


