Flying Wheels Enjoy Holiday in Hawaii

(ED. NOTE: It's January. The weather is seasonal, and we slush, mush and shiver, always in the back of our minds if the thought of warmer climes, with gentle breezes and bright sun. One of our favorite people here tells us about a recent trip to Hawaii. We thought we all needed this glimpse of comfort during this time.

Since 1981 was the International Year of Disabled Persons, it seemed like an appropriate time for a Cisco paraplegic to fulfill a lifelong dream of taking a trip to

Hawaii

After several months of correspondence telephone calls to Flying Wheels Travel, a Minnesota tour group for the physically handicapped, those of limited mobility and their friends and families, Patsy Nance finalized plans for such a trip in November. Accompanied by Lavena Nance, Nan Sauls and Kathy Kroener of Abilene, Patsy left DFW on a Braniff 747 for a 712 hour flight to Honolulu, where they met the rest of the tour group for a flight to the island of Kauai.

The group consisted of twenty-one people, including two escorts, a young couple, she being a physical therapist. They were to provide whatever assistance was required for personal or medical care for the group, and to assist airline employees with transferring the members of the group who needed assistance. Others in the group were from all over the country and had various handicaps. There were eight who walked without assistance, twelve wheelchairs and one on crutches. It was very interesting to board and deplane that many wheelchairs, and the airlines and escorts handled it very well. Several new ways of

transportation were learned, such as being moved from the ground to the door of a DC 9 or 737 by a lift. The Grayline drivers, who provided transportation on Kauai and Maui, also assisted with bags, wheelchairs and people and were very helpful. All Hawaiians had the Aloha Spirit and helped make the tirp enjoyable.

Because of accessible

hotels, transportation, and helpful people, Hawaii is a good place for the handicapped to visit. Flying Wheels alone has three trips there each year. The island of Kauai is called the Garden island because of the 490 inches of annual rainfall. It is very green, there are many varieties of flowers, flowering shrubs, and trees. It has several beautiful beaches, where movies like "South Pacific" were filmed. Taro and rice paddies are seen in Hanalei Valley, along with other food products and cattle. Sugar cane is also grown on Kauai.

On all the islands habiscus, oleander, ginger, bougainvillea and plumeria were blooming. Philodendren is considered a weed, it grows in such profusion.

A highlight of the visit to Kauai was a helicopter trip over the Hanalei Valley, into the crater of Mt. Waialeale, an extinct volcano, through and over Waimea Canyon (called the Grand Canyon of the Pacific) and over the Na Pali coast, NASA's Kokee Tracking Station and the beaches of the islands. A helicopter is a great way to see the beautiful scenery, especially areas inaccessible except by hiking or boat.

Finally, the Flying Wheels group flew to Oahu and their Waikiki beachfront hotel. The 23rd floor view of Diamond Head and the ocean was spectacular. A trip around Honolulu in wheelchair vans was the most convenient way of sightseeing on the trip. Included were the National Cemetery and Memorial, the University of Hawaii, residential areas, downtown Honolulu, Iolani Palace, the statue of King Kamehameha and the modern new Capitol building

A boat trip to Pearl Harbor just three weeks before the 40th anniversary of the Japanese attack was a moving experience. The remains of the USS Arizona and memorials to the USS Utah and the USS Nevada were grim reminders for those who remembered December 7, 1941. The USS Kitty Hawk, a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, was in port at Pearl Harbor, along with some other naval craft. The cruise back to Honolulu harbor and seeing the city from the ocean was interesting, also.

Another highlight was the Polynesian Cultural Center at Laie, Oahu. On the way there, the group traveled through fields where pineapple was in varying stages of being planted, grown and harvested, as well as sugar cane, past the North Shore surfing area, past Aloha Stadium and Schofield Barracks. The Mormon Temple at Laie is near the Polynesian Cultural Cneter, where Brigham Young University has built replicas of seven Polynesian island villages. Their way of life, including many crafts, are shown by BYU students from these

islands. In the afternoon a long-canoe pageant is held in a lagoon area with brief histories of the cultures, music and dancing in native costumes. At night a very beautiful and professional show is staged in an outdoor

theatre by 175 students. On a free day many of the group went to the Ala Moana Shopping Center, one of the largest in the world. On free nights some of the group attended shows such as the Jim Nabors Show, which was very enjoyable, a mixture of popular and Hawaiin

After eleven days in Hawaii the Flying Wheels members said goodbye to new friends who had shared a wonderful experience together. Everyone agreed that is was a great trip for anyone, physicially handicapped or not.

The Texans returned to 38° weather after leaving Honolulu in 83°, wishing they could have stayed in

Paradise longer, and with the knowledge that things are improving for the physically handicapped where travel is considered.

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
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



Extension Agent FIRE BLIGHT ON PEARS

Pears do well in the Cross Timbers area, but there is one problem - a bacterial disease known as Fire Blight. It is the major limiting factor in the production of quality pears in Texas. Fire Blight also attacks apples, quince, crab apples, hawthorn, and pyracantha. Pyracantha (Fire Thorn) and pears are

Excess levels of nitrogen or excessive pruning will cause an over abundance of tender succulent growth which is extremly susceptible to Fire Blight. When fertilizing pear trees, apply a balanced fertilizer. Avoid getting the foliage wet during watering, since the bacteria can move in a film from diseased tissue to previously unaf-

fected plant parts. Wheny buying trees, select varieties which are resitant to Fire Blight. Kieffer and Orient are most often recommended. Magness and Moonglow were developed for their resitance to Fire Blight but have not proven resistant under Texas conditions. French type pears susceptible to Fire Blight





Russia is the single largest debtor, owing us about 667 million. England owes over 440 million, with France owing even more. The rest is scattered all around the world.

Some of the countries which owe us, such as Russia, have large gold reserves. Others are very poor. One country which managed to pay its World War II debt to the U.S. was Finland.

It appears that the desire to pay a debt can go a long way toward bringing this to pass.

Qualified Royalty Owner's Exemption Certificates Available

The I.R.S. has published Form No. 6783, called 'Qualified Royalty Owner's Exemption Certificate" as the first step for small Royalty Owners to secure exemptions under the 2 Barrel per Day Rule for 1982. Individuals, farm corporations

and estates must use this form in order to receive any exemption. This form must be sent to purchasers (or other withholding agents) so they can adjust the withholding. Properties which provide a qualified Royalty Owner more than 2 royalty barrels per day cannot be adjusted. But an owner can apply for a refund at the end of the year if an inability to certify such properties causes him to over-

pay the tax.

Individuals may also apply for a 1981 exemption up to \$2500 on the Windfall Profit Tax. In this situation, a form must be secured from the purchasing agent, stating

how much tax was withheld during 1981. This is applied to the Income Tax, and any

All this relaxation of taxes was due to legislation passed by the recent (91st) Congress in Washington. Oil Companies and Royalty owners were strongly in favor of the measure, with their only complaint being that the matter did not go far enough - that the whole tax measure should have been done away with. But even the 2 barrel per day lifting of the Windfall Tax after Jan. 1st is expected to lead to an upsurge of drilling activity.

Changes In Underground Injection Regulations

On Dec. 21st the Texas Railroad Commission approved changes in the regulations governing underground injection of fluids. There are changes in

Rules 9 (disposal wells) and 46 (injection wells) and new Rule 71 (underground storage).

The new rules establish permit requirements and standards for enhanced recovery, disposal wells and hydrocarbon storage facilities. They also provide for increased notice of injection well permit applications to local governments and

other interested persons. The technical standards include requirements for casing and cementing, tubing, and valves as well as for

testing, monitoring, and plugging. Review provisions for unplugged wells were also set up.

These new rules will become effective on April 1,

Charles L. Dickson of Abilene, Director of the Ranger Project of Sun Production Co., stated that water injection of the old Ranger Boom Field began

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

drilling the middle of December with 4 injection wells and 5 producing wells. At this time the Company is meeting with the Texas Railroad Commission, seeking approval for the first Ranger Production Unit. Approval is anticipated by March 1st.

It is too early in the project, Mr. Dickson says, to tell the results of the water flooding in the producing wells. By late summer there should be positive results. The Company plans to analyze results of the pilot

area, then move into other units and duplicate what has already been done. It is planned to eventually have 400 producing wells in the old Ranger field.

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

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

That recent article by Doug Harlan in the Dallas Morning News titled "Feudal County Government" began with this state-

"County Government is the dark continent of the American political system, especially in Texas.

Mr. Harlan goes on to say that nobody is in charge of County Government - that the authority is not centralized. He remarked: "County officials will howl like coyotes on a moonlit night at any suggestion of such changes.

Well, I am neither a coyote nor a County official, just a citizen who likes responsive government. But I have noticed one interesting phenomena - the further the seat of government is from seems to me that our government was not founded with the ultimate goal of perfect efficiency. The most efficient governments in the world - if you count those who can equip a military machine the quickest, pass laws and stamp out crime (and criminals) with less fuss and bother, and control most aspects of life - are not representative governments at all, but totalitarian regimes.

But the trouble with total efficiency is that it means total control - and it breeds out interaction and creative thought. The system, instead of people, becomes all important. I prefer a government which extends justice and even mercy - to the weakest of the weak, even it takes more time and money.

I believe our nation had other goals than control and efficiency: freedom, within the bounds of responsibility, for an enlightened, honest, unselfish people, with equal justice and opportunity for all. With less than these virtues, we have an imperfect condition-even on a County level. But should we throw out the system, when people

fail to measure up? So - inefficient or not - I like having the powers of government fragmented, and each office accessable to the public. There are more checks and balances in the present system than meets the casual eye - even if the

office-holders can't control each other! Any office holder is subject to public recall if his conduct become intolerable. County Commissioners can withhold funds from an office. And Judicial and Law Enforcement officers are subject to state auction in case of misconduct. All these office holders are directly responsible to the voters who put them there in the first place. And they certainaly can be turned out office!

I fail to see where it is so bad, as Harlan suggests, for an office holder to be responsible only to the voters! Who is going to look out for the voters more capably than

Yet numerous people do not actually trust government in the hands of the people. Nor do most legislators even trust people - as we can assume from the complex laws placed upon us, regulating many aspects of our lives. (And pocketbooks, of course, since more laws always bring more charges).

The authors of the Texas State Constitution, which was adopted in 1873, did trust government in the hands of local people - and they didn't trust it much anywhere else! And they, we might remember, had more experience with tyranny than we have even dreamed of. Within a span of 40 years they can come through the Medevial regin-of-butchery by Santa Anna, into a

I would like to reply that City Government has not been notorisously better than County Government anywhere - not even in Eastland County! Nor have the District of Federal Courts been more efficient than County Courts - and certainly not more just or even more sensible! So actually Texas, rather than having one of the worst system of County Governments around, actually has one of the best. Ask someone from Louisiana, Alaska, New Mexico, or even South Carolina how things operate in their locality!

Since nothing in this world is perfect, undoubtedly some changes could be made within the system to tighten up County government. There is some duplication of effort, with other gaps in coverage of services. There is some weakness in purchasing power. There are times when more cooperation is needed between the various offices. And perhaps a two-party system would make the elections more viable - although I have found plenty of differences between a lot of Democrats! But, everything considered, I still have a feeling of pride when I walk into the Courthouse. It is still alive, well, and operating - not just a monument to freedoms that we once had.

Clover, chickweek, henbit and dandelions are common weed problems in Eastland County in lawns during winter and early spring mon-

Homeowners can take several steps to control winter weeds in lawns.

Application of preemergence herbicide such as Dacthal or Balan in October will prevent many winter weed problems. However, if you missed that opportunity, there are other methods to keep winter weeds in check.


Close mowing following of periods temperatures in February and March will greatly improve the appearance of a weedy lawn and will promote early recovery of turfgrasses.


However, mowing will not eliminate the weeds. Systemic herbicides (chemical weed killers) such as Wipeout (Greenlight), Weed-B-Gon (Ortho) and Systemic Weed Control (Ferti-lome) will successfully control most broadleaf weed problems if used according to label instructions. Two applications of these material about 14 days apart may be required for complete control of broadleaf weeds.

These chemicals will not control grassy weeds such as annual bluegrass and rescuegrass. preemerge herbicide treatments in the fall are required to control those grasses.

Systemic herbicides can be applied with an air pressure sprayer or a hoseend sprayer. Use care to apply materials uniformly at the recommended dosage when temperatures are above 60 degrees F.

If herbicides are applied properly, broadleaf weeds will begin to shrivel a few days after the first treatment and will turn brown after the second treatment. Close mowing several weeks after the second treatment should remove all traces of the broadleaf weeds and should promote recovery of






