

# Chief & Mendez Resign Police

Cisco Chief of Police Larry Jernigan and police officer Rebecca Mendez submitted their resignations here Wednesday morning to City Manager Michael Moore.

Mr. Moore said the Chief's resignation was effective immediately while Officer Mendez's will be effective on Sunday, January 17th.

Raymond Blevins, a member of the Cisco Police Department for four months, has been named as the acting Chief. Mr. Moore said the city will not be rushed to hire a new chief, but time will be spent to hire the best man possible.

In the meantime the city will bring more officers onto the force to fill the

vacancies created by the resignations.

The city manager said Mendez's resignation was expected by him, but Jernigan's was a surprise and was solely initiated by Jernigan.

Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie stated here Friday that he is in full support of the City Manager. He also said he believes he can speak as well for the members of Cisco's City Council. He said the full council is unified and stands behind the city manager and his decisions.

Mayor Ritchie said Mr. Moore is a capable city manager and is "looking out for the best interests of the City of Cisco."

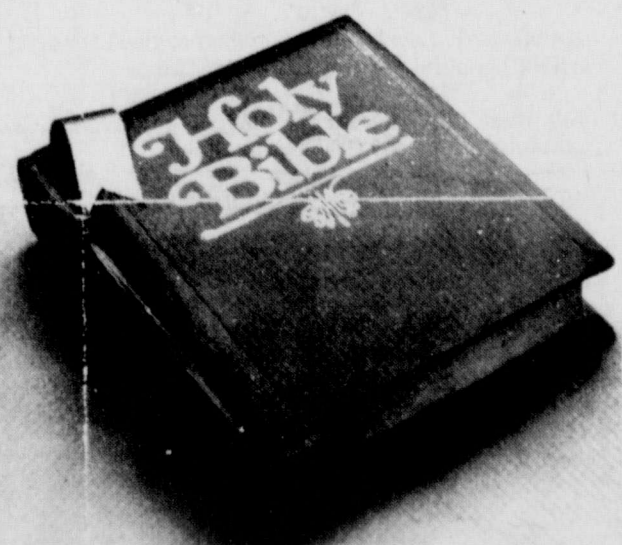

# City Council Extends Parking Meter Moratorium 180 Days

A parking meter moratorium was extended for an additional 180 days in Cisco, following the regular Tuesday night meeting of the Cisco City Council, according to City Manager Michael Moore.

The council heard a report from Mr. Moore concerning a poll he made of about 30 businesses along Avenue D. He said 70% of those businesses favored the removal of Cisco's parking meters in form or fashion.

The city manager said he will be in contact with more

of the citizens in Cisco during the next 180 days. He also said city crews will try to keep the parking meters taped up as best they can.

In other council matters, a condemnation resolution was approved whereby the owners of abandoned or burned-out buildings in the city limits will be given 60 days to clean up the property. If they fail to do so, the clean up of the property will be put out to a contractor or city crews will do the work. In either case, the owner will be charged.

In the opening of bids for

grass leases, two bids were received for the Canyon Tract, one for the disposal plant tract and none for the Lake Cisco tract.

B.D. Green submitted a bid of \$150 for the Canyon tract and Kenneth Boggs submitted a \$250 bid. Since Mr. Green is the present lessee of that tract, the council agreed to give him five working days to match the bid by Mr. Boggs.

Joe Flores submitted a \$300 a year bid on the disposal plant tract which was presently leased to S.G. Whitehead. Mr. Flores had

been sub-leasing the area from Mrs. Whitehead following her husband's death.

The council agreed to send Mrs. Whitehead a letter giving her the opportunity of meeting Mr. Flores bid within five working days, since she is the present lessee. If she does not meet the bid, Mr. Flores will be awarded the lease.

Both leases will be awarded for five years.

The council approved a proposed budget of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for a Hotel Occupancy Tax as submitted by Gene Abbott, Chamber manager. Mr. Abbott explained the moneys from such a tax would be used to promote and advertise Cisco. Council member Loyal Lundstrom abstained from the vote since he owns the Cisco Motel and council member Ivan Webb was absent from the meeting. All other members voted in favor of the tax.

The approval of revised city employee personnel rules and procedures was tabled until the next meeting.

City Manager Moore was given approval by the council to over-expend in three budget line items. Those items were (1) administration-C-8 office equipment--\$1,100 (two hand-held radios); (2) Police-E-5 Automotive--\$3,000 (additional police cruiser); (3) Street-E-6 Machinery and equipment--\$9,000 (pay off street roller).

A roll call vote was held on the budget matter and council members Linton Batteas, Brad Kimbrough, Lundstrom and Bobby Rains voted in favor of the motion to approve the over-expending of the budget items. Council member Bobby Ingram and Mayor Eris Ritchie abstained from the vote.

Cisco's public schools resumed classes at their regular time Friday following an unexpected four-day vacation. The schools were closed here Monday morning shortly after the day's first classes began due to a curtailment of natural gas supply by Lone Star Gas Company.

Lone Star was forced to curtail its supply of gas to industrial rate customers when local temperatures dipped below ten degrees here Sunday night and early Monday morning. The cold temperatures and freezing rain and snow helped to close down the schools four days this week.

Cisco received about three inches of snow Wednesday

and most citizens stayed at home on that day.

On Thursday, the temperatures warmed up into the 50s under clear blue skies and most of the snow and ice in the area was melted by Friday morning.

Weather predictions forecast another cold front for the Cisco area this weekend; however, no mention has been made of snow or freezing rain.

# Flying Wheels Enjoy Holiday in Hawaii

(ED. NOTE: It's January. The weather is seasonal, and we slush, mush and shiver, always in the back of our minds in the thought of warmer climes, with gentle breezes and bright sun. One of our favorite people here tells us about a recent trip to Hawaii. We thought we all needed this glimpse of comfort during this time.

## HAWAII TRIP By Patsy Nance

Since 1981 was the International Year of Disabled Persons, it seemed like an appropriate time for a Cisco paraplegic to fulfill a life-long dream of taking a trip to Hawaii.

After several months of correspondence and telephone calls to Flying Wheels Travel, a Minnesota tour group for the physically handicapped, those of limited mobility and their friends and families, Patsy Nance finalized plans for such a trip in November. Accompanied by Lavena Nance, Nan Sauls and Kathy Kroener of Abilene, Patsy left DFW on a Braniff 747 for a 7½ hour flight to Honolulu, where they met the rest of the tour group for a flight to the island of Kauai.

The group consisted of twenty-one people, including two escorts, a young couple, she being a physical therapist. They were to provide whatever assistance was required for personal or medical care for the group, and to assist airline employees with transferring the members of the group who needed assistance. Others in the group were from all over the country and had various handicaps. There were eight who walked without assistance, twelve wheelchairs and one on crutches. It was very interesting to board and deplane that many wheelchairs, and the airlines and escorts handled it very well. Several new ways of

transportation were learned, such as being moved from the ground to the door of a DC 9 or 737 by a lift. The Grayline drivers, who provided transportation on Kauai and Maui, also assisted with bags, wheelchairs and people and were very helpful. All Hawaiians had the Aloha Spirit and helped make the trip enjoyable.

Because of accessible hotels, transportation, and helpful people, Hawaii is a good place for the handicapped to visit. Flying Wheels alone has three trips there each year. The island of Kauai is called the Garden island because of the 490 inches of annual rainfall. It is very green, there are many varieties of flowers, flowering shrubs, and trees. It has several beautiful beaches, where movies like "South Pacific" were filmed. Taro and rice paddies are seen in Hanalei Valley, along with other food products and cattle. Sugar cane is also grown on Kauai.

On all the islands hibiscus, oleander, ginger, bougainvillea and plumeria were blooming. Philodendron is considered a weed, it grows in such profusion.

A highlight of the visit to Kauai was a helicopter trip over the Hanalei Valley, into the crater of Mt. Waialeale, an extinct volcano, through and over Waimea Canyon (called the Grand Canyon of the Pacific) and over the Na Pali coast, NASA's Kokee Tracking Station and the beaches of the islands. A helicopter is a great way to see the beautiful scenery, especially areas inaccessible except by hiking or boat.

The Fern Grotto is another popular tourist attraction

some of the group visited. The boat ride to the Grotto, along with the Hawaiian musicians for entertainment, is pleasant, although the Grotto is not wheelchair accessible.

An authentic Luau, including the morning ceremony when the pig is buried in the ground to be roasted, was attended by the group. There was much good Polynesian food, including poi, to be relished. Pineapple, papaya, mangoes, coconut and macadamia nut ice cream were favorite foods during the trip. Seafood, such as shrimp, crab, tuna and a fish called mahimahi, were enjoyed more than such delicacies as octopus and raw fish by the Texans.

Flower and koa seed leis were presented to the visitors. Plumeria, carnations, and orchids are among the flowers used in the leis. One hotel even placed a vanda orchid on each pillow at night, a very nice custom.

At the Luau and hotels the Polynesian shows with Hawaiian, Tahitian, etc. songs and dancing were very colorful and entertaining, too, with all performers wearing native costumes.

The next stop for the group was the island of Maui, beautiful in a slightly different way from Kauai. The drive to the Kaanapali beach resort area is compared to the Amalfi drive because it is a rugged coastal area. Nearby is the old whaling village of Lahaina. It was said that tourism is "off" in Hawaii, but the narrow streets of Lahaina and the shops were filled with people. Several went on glass-bottom boat trips to see the coral and colorful fish

Beautiful pink, red, and black coral jewelry is made on Maui. The view of the blue Pacific water looking toward the island of Lanai and Molokai was especially nice.

Finally, the Flying Wheels group flew to Oahu and their Waikiki beachfront hotel. The 23rd floor view of Diamond Head and the ocean was spectacular. A trip around Honolulu in wheelchair vans was the most convenient way of sightseeing on the trip. Included were the National Cemetery and Memorial, the University of Hawaii, residential areas, downtown Honolulu, Iolani Palace, the statue of King Kamehameha and the modern new Capitol building.

A boat trip to Pearl Harbor just three weeks before the 40th anniversary of the Japanese attack was a moving experience. The remains of the USS Arizona and memorials to the USS Utah and the USS Nevada were grim reminders for those who remembered December 7, 1941. The USS Kitty Hawk, a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, was in port at Pearl Harbor, along with some other naval craft. The cruise back to Honolulu harbor and seeing the city from the ocean was interesting, also.

Another highlight was the Polynesian Cultural Center at Laie, Oahu. On the way there, the group traveled through fields where pineapple was in varying stages of being planted, grown and harvested, as well as sugar cane, past the North Shore surfing area, past Aloha Stadium and Schofield Barracks. The Mormon Temple at Laie is near the Polynesian Cultural Center, where Brigham Young University has built replicas of seven Polynesian island villages. Their way of life, including many crafts, are shown by BYU students from these

islands. In the afternoon a long-canoe pageant is held in a lagoon area with brief histories of the cultures, music and dancing in native costumes. At night a very beautiful and professional show is staged in an outdoor theatre by 175 students.

On a free day many of the group went to the Ala Moana Shopping Center, one of the largest in the world. On free nights some of the group attended shows such as the Jim Nabors Show, which was very enjoyable, a mixture of popular and Hawaiian music.

After eleven days in Hawaii the Flying Wheels members said goodbye to new friends who had shared a wonderful experience together. Everyone agreed that it was a great trip for anyone, physically han-

dicapped or not.

The Texans returned to 38° weather after leaving Honolulu in 83°, wishing they could have stayed in

Paradise longer, and with the knowledge that things are improving for the physically handicapped where travel is considered.

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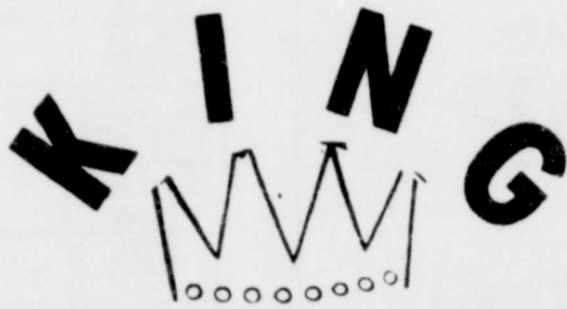

## Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

To counterbalance high heating bills and cooler temperatures this winter, pay special attention to indoor wear.

Fabric layers and fabric construction are the keys to warmth in clothing.

A fabric that contains several layers does an excellent job of warming the body, as it traps air inside itself and prevents the transfer of heat or cold through itself. This is especially true if the outer layer of fabric is tightly woven as air pass through easily. Quilted fabrics are one example of fabric with several layers.

Fabrics with only one layer also provide warmth if they're thick enough. The thicker the fabric, the warmer it is.

In thick fabrics, air is trapped between yarns or fibers and acts as insulation. Bulky sweaters provide warmth in this way.

Harshness and fuzziness of fabric's surface also affect warmth. For example, the

surface textures of bulky sweater fabric and corduroy trap air to insulate the body.

Of course it isn't always practical or comfortable to wear thick, fuzzy or quilted fabric, so remember the layered look for warmth. Several layers of thin fabrics may be just as warm - or even warmer - than a single thick layer.

Also consider how moisture affects warmth. Depending on the temperature, some fabrics, such as tightly woven synthetics, trap moisture next to the skin. This causes clamminess or an overheated feeling.

Even though wool and cotton are known for their absorbency - and the resulting comfort this provides, some new treatments for the two fibers are making them less absorbent, so choose wool and cotton fabrics carefully.

The best choices for comfort as well as warmth are woens that have not been treated to make them machine washable. Also,

wool blended with nylon, polyester or acrylic may be more comfortable for some people.

For cotton comfort, choose cotton that has not been treated with a durable press finish. Or choose cotton blends for easy care and comfort.

As a general rule of thumb in choosing clothing for

warmth, remember all of the above for ordinary indoor wear -- layerability, thickness, fuzziness and absorbency of fabrics.

For nighttime warmth of pajamas and gowns, consider only the fuzziness and thickness of single-layer fabrics.

With the ice and snow that we have had this week, con-

sider these clothing hints to help you and your family stay warmer.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:** Nothing is better in the winter time than a hot gingerbread muffin. Delicious for a snack or a dessert. This week I am featuring a refrigerator gingerbread recipe that can be stored in the refrigerator

for up to 2 weeks.  
**REFRIGERATOR GINGER BREAD**  
4 cups flour  
2 tablespoons ginger  
¼ teaspoon allspice  
½ teaspoon cinnamon  
1 cup molasses  
1 cup buttermilk  
2 teaspoons soda  
1¼ cups shortening  
1 cup sugar

4 eggs  
Sift flour and spices together. Mix molasses, buttermilk and soda. In large mixing bowl, cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture alternately with buttermilk mixture. Bake in greased muffin cups at 375° F. for 15 to 20 minutes.

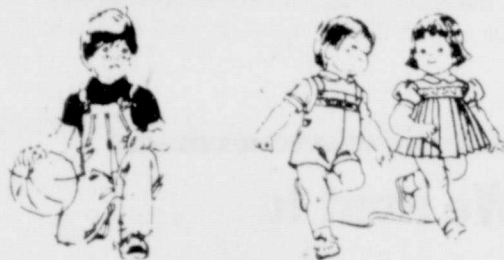

## GOT YOUR CARD?

Eastland County Law Enforcement Officers will first issue warnings rather than citations on failure of motorists to comply with the new Liability Insurance law.

Information from Cisco, Eastland and Ranger Police Department indicate that they will follow the general guidelines set up by the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, giving a 90 day period of time in which to phase in compliance. Exceptions to this may be made in case the motorist is involved in an accident, or has been issued an initial warning.

The state law came into effect on Jan. 1, 1982, with fines beginning at \$75.00 for drivers found without proper proof of insurance.

"I would like to impress upon motorists that the law is in effect," stated Sgt. Jerry Matthews of the Eastland-Callahan County division of the D.P.S.

"We will attempt to warn motorists to comply with the law. That is the purpose of the phase-in period."

and estates must use this form in order to receive any exemption. This form must be sent to purchasers (or other withholding agents) so they can adjust the withholding. Properties which provide a qualified Royalty Owner more than 2 royalty barrels per day cannot be adjusted. But an owner can apply for a refund at the end of the year if an inability to certify such properties causes him to over-

pay the tax. Individuals may also apply for a 1981 exemption up to \$2500 on the Windfall Profit Tax. In this situation, a form must be secured from the purchasing agent, stating

how much tax was withheld during 1981. This is applied to the Income Tax, and any portion of it not owed for taxes is returned.

All this relaxation of taxes was due to legislation passed by the recent (91st) Congress in Washington. Oil Companies and Royalty owners were strongly in favor of the measure, with their only complaint being that the matter did not go far enough - that the whole tax measure should have been done away with. But even the 2 barrel per day lifting of the Windfall Tax after Jan. 1st is expected to lead to an upsurge of drilling activity.

## Changes In Underground Injection Regulations

On Dec. 21st the Texas Railroad Commission approved changes in the regulations governing underground injection of fluids. There are changes in

Rules 9 (disposal wells) and 46 (injection wells) and new Rule 71 (underground storage).

The new rules establish permit requirements and standards for enhanced recovery, disposal wells and hydrocarbon storage facilities. They also provide for increased notice of injection well permit applications to local governments and other interested persons.

The technical standards include requirements for casing and cementing, tubing, and valves as well as for

testing, monitoring, and plugging. Review provisions for unplugged wells were also set up.

These new rules will become effective on April 1, 1982.

## Sun Oil Water Injection Begun In Ranger Fields

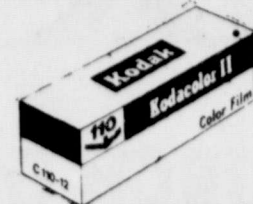
Charles L. Dickson of Abilene, Director of the Ranger Project of Sun Production Co., stated that water injection of the old Ranger Boom Field began

drilling the middle of December with 4 injection wells and 5 producing wells. At this time the Company is meeting with the Texas Railroad Commission, seeking approval for the first Ranger Production Unit. Approval is anticipated by March 1st.

It is too early in the project, Mr. Dickson says, to tell the results of the water flooding in the producing wells. By late summer there should be positive results. The Company plans to analyze results of the pilot

area, then move into other units and duplicate what has already been done. It is planned to eventually have 400 producing wells in the old Ranger field.

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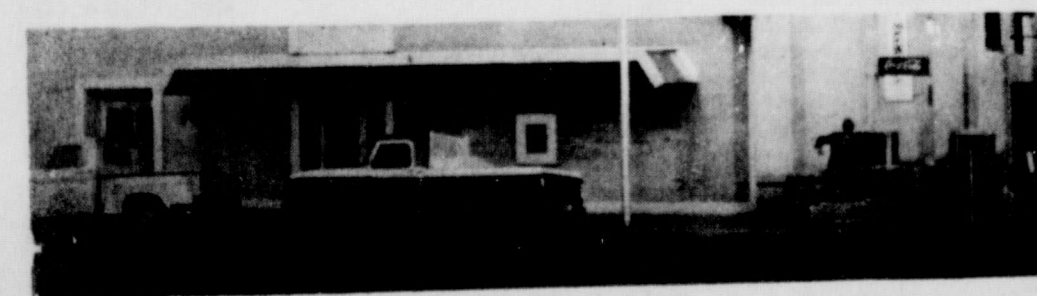

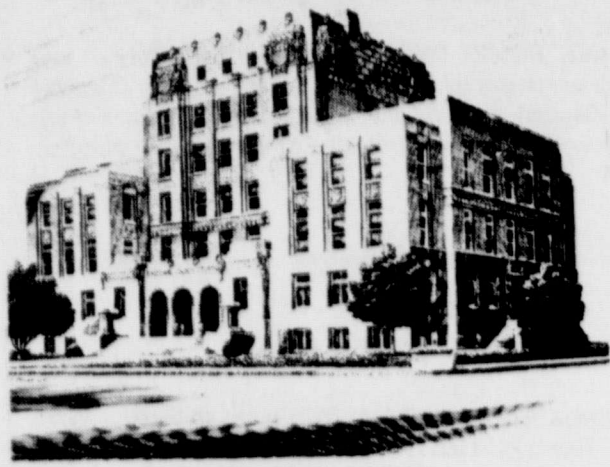

## OUR COURTHOUSE -NO MONUMENT

That recent article by Doug Harlan in the Dallas Morning News titled "Feudal County Government" began with this statement:

"County Government is the dark continent of the American political system, especially in Texas."

Mr. Harlan goes on to say that nobody is in charge of County Government - that the authority is not centralized. He remarked: "County officials will howl like coyotes on a moonlit night at any suggestion of such changes."

Well, I am neither a coyote nor a County official, just a citizen who likes responsive government. But I have noticed one interesting phenomena - the further the seat of government is from

you, the less it listens to you. So I would like to keep as much government as I can right where it belongs - there in the County Courthouse. If we let it get away from us there, even to the extent of hiring some expensive person to "administer" the whole works more "properly", then we are done for and it is gone forever.

It is easy to see that my philosophy of the aims of government is quite different from that of Doug Harlan. That is not surprising, for our Republic embraces a wide area though. Within this area the type of efficiency he discusses undoubtedly has its place. Inefficiency wastes both time and money, with the poor usually paying a disproportionate share of both. But it

seems to me that our government was not founded with the ultimate goal of perfect efficiency. The most efficient governments in the world - if you count those who can equip a military machine the quickest, pass laws and stamp out crime (and criminals) with less fuss and bother, and control most aspects of life - are not representative governments at all, but totalitarian regimes.

But the trouble with total efficiency is that it means total control - and it breeds out interaction and creative thought. The system, instead of people, becomes all important. I prefer a government which extends justice - and even mercy - to the weakest of the weak, even if it takes more time and money.

I believe our nation had other goals than control and efficiency: freedom, within the bounds of responsibility, for an enlightened, honest, unselfish people, with equal justice and opportunity for all. With less than these virtues, we have an imperfect condition-even on a County level. But should we throw out the system, when people fail to measure up?

So - inefficient or not - I like having the powers of County government fragmented, and each office accessible to the public. There are more checks and balances in the present system than meets the casual eye - even if the

office-holders can't control each other! Any office holder is subject to public recall if his conduct become intolerable. County Commissioners can withhold funds from an office. And Judicial and Law Enforcement officers are subject to state auction in case of misconduct. All these office holders are directly responsible to the voters who put them there in the first place. And they certainly can be turned out office!

I fail to see where it is so bad, as Harlan suggests, for an office holder to be responsible only to the voters! Who is going to look out for the voters more capably than themselves?

Yet numerous people do not actually trust government in the hands of the people. Nor do most legislators even trust people - as we can assume from the complex laws placed upon us, regulating many aspects of our lives. (And pocketbooks, of course, since more laws always bring more charges).

The authors of the Texas State Constitution, which was adopted in 1873, did trust government in the hands of local people - and they didn't trust it much anywhere else! And they, we might remember, had more experience with tyranny than we have even dreamed of. Within a span of 40 years they can come through the Medieval regin-of-butchery by Santa Anna, into a

## GORDON SPOT

There is a new St. Augustine grass available to homeowners this year. If you are putting in a lawn this year or if you are replacing grass in an old lawn I would suggest you consider "Raleigh" St. Augustine grass. It is a vigorous, St. Augustine Decline (S.A.D.) resistant variety released by

repressive Federal regime after the Civil war. Now they were hoping to walk as self-governing free men, so they sharply divided the functions of County Government from that of State. Individual rights were vested in local government. These divisions have been blurred in recent years, unfortunately, with the state assuming more and more of the citizen's rights.

In looking for ways to improve County Government, Mr. Harlan suggests: "A Mayor or City-Manager form of system -"

I would like to reply that City Government has not been notoriously better than County Government anywhere - not even in Eastland County! Nor have the District of Federal Courts been more efficient than County Courts - and certainly not more just or even more sensible! So actually Texas, rather than having one of the worst systems of County Governments around, actually has one of the best. Ask someone from Louisiana, Alaska, New Mexico, or even South Carolina how things operate in their locality!

Since nothing in this world is perfect, undoubtedly some changes could be made within the system to tighten up County government. There is some duplication of effort, with other gaps in coverage of services. There is some weakness in purchasing power. There are times when more cooperation is needed between the various offices. And perhaps a two-party system would make the elections more viable - although I have found plenty of differences between a lot of Democrats! But, everything considered, I still have a feeling of pride when I walk into the Courthouse. It is still alive, well, and operating - not just a monument to freedoms that we once had.

North Carolina State University. It is more cold and shade tolerant than "Floritam" St. Augustine. Raleigh, unlike Floritam, is not resistant to chinch bugs. Both are resistant to S.A.D.

As for appearance, an established lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine looks similar to a lawn of common St. Augustine grass although Raleigh is slightly coarser and faster growing than common.

Raleigh can be grown wherever common St. Augustine grass can be grown.

In new lawns, Raleigh can be sodded to improve an "instant" lawn or plugged on about 1-foot spacings to provide a cover in two or three months. To restore a St. Augustine lawn weakened with S.A.D. I suggest plugging 4-inch blocks of Raleigh directly into the lawn on about 1-foot spacings. After one complete growing season, Raleigh will cover the lawn.

Maintenance requirements for Raleigh will be similar to those for common St. Augustine grass. Weekly mowing at a height of about 2 inches, spring and fall fertilization, and watering as needed to prevent severe wilting should produce an attractive lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine.

A robust weed population in dormant bermudagrass or St. Augustine lawns is not only unsightly but can delay recovery of turfgrasses for several months.

Clover, chickweed, henbit and dandelions are common weed problems in Eastland County in lawns during winter and early spring months.

Homeowners can take several steps to control winter weeds in lawns.

Application of a preemergence herbicide such as Dacthal or Balan in October will prevent many winter weed problems. However, if you missed that opportunity, there are other methods to keep winter weeds in check.

Close mowing following periods of milk temperatures in February and March will greatly improve the appearance of a weedy lawn and will promote early recovery of turfgrasses.

However, mowing will not eliminate the weeds. Systemic herbicides (chemical weed killers) such as Wipeout (Greenlight), Weed-B-Gon (Ortho) and Systemic Weed Control (Ferti-lome) will successfully control most broadleaf

weed problems if used according to label instructions. Two applications of these material about 14 days apart may be required for complete control of broadleaf weeds.

These chemicals will not control grassy weeds such as annual bluegrass and rescuegrass. preemerge herbicide treatments in the fall are required to control those grasses.

Systemic herbicides can be applied with an air pressure sprayer or a hose-end sprayer. Use care to apply materials uniformly at the recommended dosage when temperatures are above 60 degrees F.

If herbicides are applied properly, broadleaf weeds will begin to shrivel a few days after the first treatment and will turn brown after the second treatment. Close mowing several weeks after the second treatment should remove all traces of the broadleaf weeds and should promote recovery of desirable grasses.

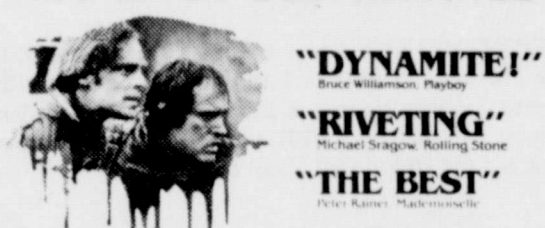

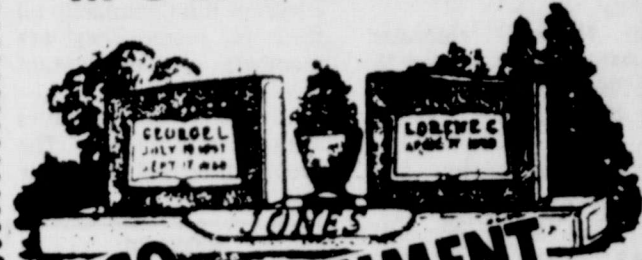
