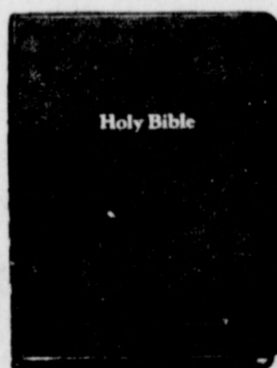
\$1,000 College Scholarship Applications Are Available

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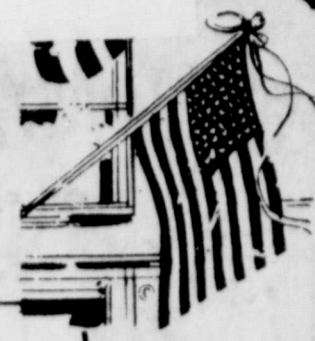

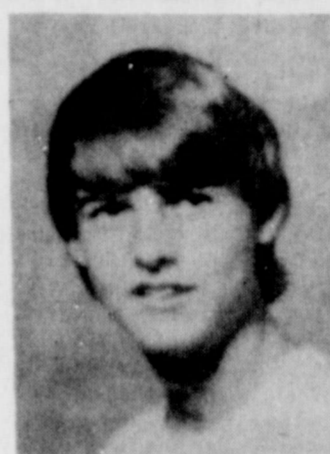

Charles LeFlore Charged With Debra Garcia Murder Monday

To Go Before Grand Jury Tuesday

Charles Allen LeFlore, 20, a native Ciscoan, was charged with murder at 1:45 p.m. Monday in connection with the slaying of Debra Garcia, a Cisco convenience store clerk who was abducted Nov. 29th from work and found shot to death two days later.

Intensive investigation by the Cisco Police Department, Texas Ranger Gene Kea, Sheriff John Morren's Department and the District Attorney's office, assisted by a generous reward by

the public resulted in the solving of the crime, officials reported.

Exactly 50 days after the event, officers filed charges in Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder's office in Cisco and he set bond for LeFlore at \$50,000.

The suspect was then returned to Eastland County Jail where he has been in custody since last Thursday. Earlier Monday, District Attorney Emory Walton said police would release LeFlore, an unemployed oil field worker, by evening if they did not charge him with the murder.

Mayor Eris Ritchie Issues Statement On Garcia Case

Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie issued the following statement here Tuesday regarding the arrest of a suspect in the Debra Garcia murder case. His statement follows:

"I feel certain that I can speak for the entire community of Cisco in an expression of gratitude to the law enforcement officers and others who cooperated in bringing the Debra Garcia murder case to the point that it has now reached. We appreciate the time, attention, and perseverance that have been given by District Attorney Walton, Sheriff Morren and his deputies, Texas Ranger Gene Kea, and the members of the Cisco Police Department. I personally know that many of these officers have at times been up late into the night working on this case, and our citizens will now rest a bit easier because of it."

Mayor Ritchie continued, "We would also like to express our deep appreciation to all of the good people of our community who made pledges to the reward fund, which reached a total of \$6,100. We also owe a large debt of gratitude to The Cisco Press and its editor and publisher for keeping the publicity regarding the reward fund before the public continually for the past several weeks. And of course we again express our condolences to Debbie's family in this most tragic and senseless loss that they have suffered."

Mayor Ritchie said that it was as yet undetermined whether or not any person or persons had qualified for the reward fund, and that the city council would likely discuss the matter with area law enforcement officers to make a final determination. Even if a person had qualified, he said, the reward would be conditional upon the conviction of the person apprehended and charged.

ed on statements and evidence, that the incident started as a robbery, and that the suspect took the girl from the convenience store so she could not identify him. He allegedly killed her Sunday night and put her body under the bridge the same night. It was discovered the following Tuesday.

District Attorney Walton said Mrs. Garcia was held and killed in the garage of a home northwest of Cisco. The house's occupants, Walton said, were not home at the time of the murder.

Although initial reports indicated Mrs. Garcia had not been dead long before her body was found, Walton said Monday she probably was shot the night she was kidnapped or the next day and her body was then placed in the ditch. Cold weather, may have kept her body from deteriorating rapidly, according to Walton.

LeFlore is on probation for burglary according to the district attorney. He was given a five-year probated prison term in Callahan County after he pleaded guilty to a March 28, 1980, burglary in Putnam.

LeFlore will go before a 91st District Court Grand Jury when it convenes next Tuesday, Jan. 26. Walton said the grand jury may consider capital murder charges since Mrs. Garcia's death was associated with other felonies — robbery of the store and kidnapping.

A conviction of capital murder carries a maximum penalty in Texas of death by lethal injection; a murder conviction, a maximum penalty of 99 years to life in prison.

The suspect's residence is listed as 1604 Railroad Avenue, Cisco. He had attended Cisco Public Schools through 1977.

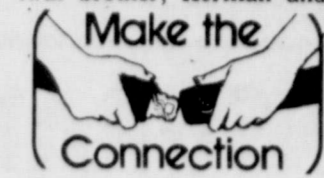

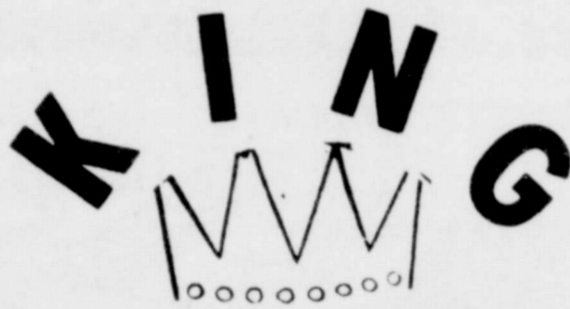

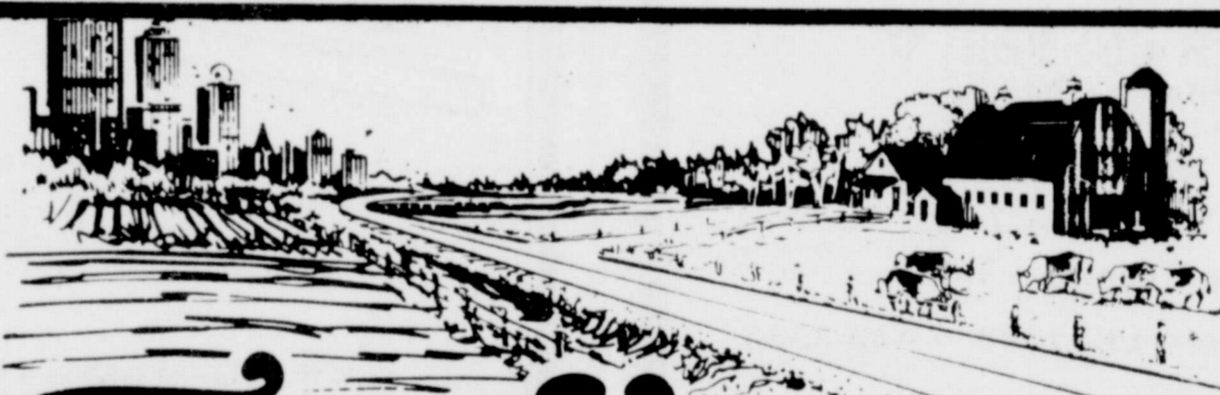

Taxpayers pay for trash

The Brownwood Highway Department District of nine counties which includes Eastland County spent a total of \$189,000.00 just to pick up trash along the State's highways during the fiscal year that ended August 31, 1981.

The figures released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, show an increase of 26 percent.

The litter problem, particularly in heavily populated areas is growing to gargantuan proportions.

"If motorists would properly dispose of their trash it would save Texas taxpayers millions of dollars and would save DHT thousands of man hours. That's time and money that could be spent on keeping our aging highways in better repair," said DHT Engineer-Director Mark Goode.

Milk is still all time best

COLLEGE STATION--Drinking less milk these days because its price is higher?

If so, then you are losing money - not to mention nutrients, says Mary K. Sweeten, a good and nutrition specialist.

Even with today's higher prices - and what isn't more expensive? - milk alone offers greater amounts of calcium, protein and other nutrients than many other foods combined, no matter how many you eat, she says. For that reason, milk still ranks among consumer all-time best buys, the specialist says.

Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

For example, to get the all-important nutrient calcium, consumers can turn to dark leafy greens, of course, but it would take enormous quantities to provide just one day's requirement for adults, Sweeten explains.

Two glasses of milk (eight ounces each) provide the calcium an adult needs. Or eight ounces of cheese, yogurt or cottage cheese will do the same, she says.

Calcium is not the only benefit, though. At the same time, those two glasses of milk provide a significant amount of the high-quality protein you need every day.

In addition, the two glasses are a good source of the vitamin A you need every day (if the milk is "whole" or "fortified"), and they're a good source of the vitamin D needed daily.

Also, two glasses of milk are a good source of the riboflavin needed daily - along with the lesser amounts of other vitamins.

There's more: milk supplies phosphorus, potassium, magnesium, sodium, zinc, copper, iodine and other trace elements.

Milk also contributes carbohydrates (lactose or milk sugar) and fat (in whole or low-fat varieties) used for energy, Sweeten says.

Is there anything milk doesn't provide?

Milk is low in vitamin C, iron and fiber content, the specialist says. But, of course, other food groups, such as fruits and vegetables, bread and cereals, along with the meat-group foods balance out the daily diet, she adds.

RRC grants permits for pipelines

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that 12 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in Dec. 1981. Six of the permits were granted for gathering pipelines, four were for trunk transmission lines, and one was for a gas plant line. Another was for a multi-purpose line.

Cordova Resources Inc. of Dallas had gas line approved for Eastland County. Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases while a trunk transmission line is a larger diameter line into which smaller lines connect. At gas plants, natural gas is stripped of liquid hydrocarbons usually present in wellhead gas.

Nine of the newly-permitted pipelines will transport gas, while one will move petroleum products.

Two will carry other materials.

Private pipelines accounted for 10 permits last month, while two were for gas utilities. A common carrier performs public work for hire, such as the movement of petroleum products.

In December, three permits were granted in East Texas, two each in the San Angelo area, West Central Texas and North Texas, and one each in Southeast Texas, East Central Texas and the Midland area.

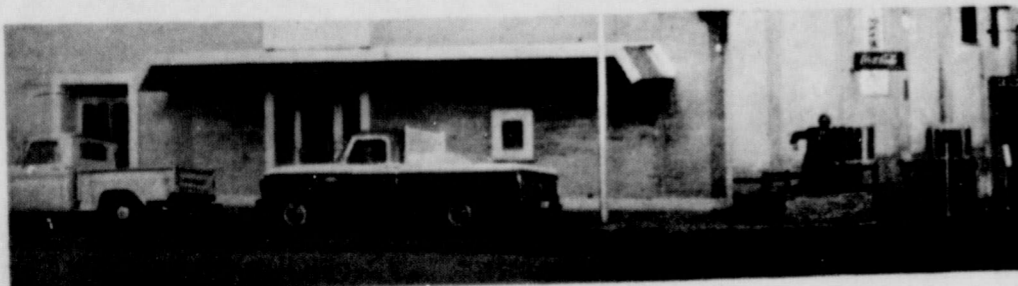

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Peanut referendum to determine future

According to D.B. Warren, a referendum vitally important to peanut producers will be conducted by a mail ballot from the County ASCS office during the period January 25-29. The following message in respect to the referendum has been endorsed by the National Peanut Growers Group and by all peanut grower organizations in the state.

"Peanut growers will have an opportunity to vote in a very crucial belt-wide referendum during the week of January 25 to determine if we will have a peanut price support program this year.

If growers approve quotas by a two-thirds majority of those voting, quotas and price supports will be in effect throughout the four years, 1982-1985. If growers fail to approve quotas, there would be no quotas or price supports in effect for 1982 and another referendum would be conducted next December to determine marketing procedure in 1983.

There is a big difference in the result of this referendum and those held in the past for peanut growers. In past referenda, if growers had failed to approve quotas,

there still would have been a program with support prices at 50 percent of parity for those growers planting within their allotments. This year, however, if growers fail to approve quotas, the new Farm Bill specifically provides that there will be no price support. In other words should growers fail to approve quotas, there would be

no program whatever, neither quotas nor support price, in 1982. However, if two-thirds of the growers participating in the referendum vote to approve, we will maintain our program framework with a quota support rate of \$550 per ton in 1982 - a 21 percent increase over 1981 - and with mandatory increases in

subsequent years to help offset production cost increases. We will have a national poundage quota of 1.2 million tons in 1982, along with substantially strengthened undermarketing carry forward provisions beginning with unused undermarketings in 1980.

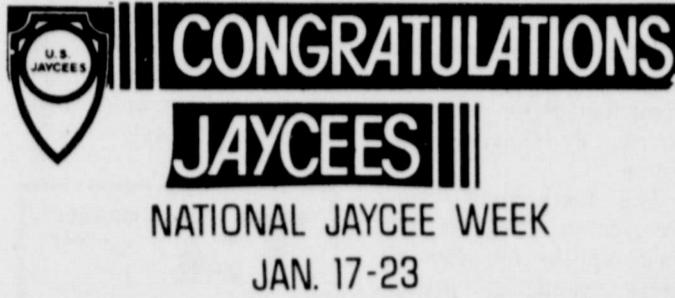
We know that many

peanut producers are unhappy with the program and its future outlook. Such feelings are understandable, but they are not good reasons for voting out the peanut program altogether or for not voting. With all of its problems, the peanut program is one of two remaining commodity programs that contain the basic essentials for

success - supply management and support prices. These features must be preserved. Don't risk losing those fundamental concepts - VOTE FOR QUOTAS AND PRICE SUPPORTS. We urge that you not only vote in the referendum, but that you join with other

growers in your community in setting up a telephone call campaign just prior to and during the referendum period to remind growers to vote. A vote not cast can be used by program adversaries almost as effectively as a vote against quotas."

Attacks Crime

COLLEGE STATION--Crime--perhaps the most persistent and troublesome problem currently facing Texans--is under attack. Launching a new educational program in crime prevention is the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

"Since preventing crime is the role of every good citizen, the new program will focus on actions that can be taken by both individuals and organized groups to reduce crime in their neighborhoods and communities," points out Dr. J. Fred Cross of Stephenville, Extension community development specialist and chairman of the Extension Crime Prevention Task Force.

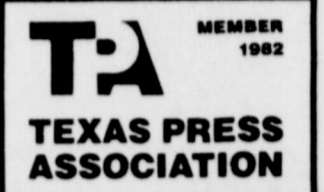
The Extension Crime Prevention Program will focus on the following six areas: vandalism prevention, home security, farm security, personal protection, neighborhood and com-

munity watch, and prevention of con games and other frauds.

County Extension agents will be providing leadership in conducting local programs aimed at crime prevention, says Cross. Local law enforcement officials also will be involved.

How Good Is Guinea Meat?

COLLEGE STATION--How good is guinea meat compared to other types of poultry meat?

Recent studies indicate the nutritional quality of guinea meat is comparable to that of chicken broilers, explains Dr. James Denton, poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Guinea meat provides a good source of high quality protein, is lower in fat and sodium, and is higher in potassium, phosphorous, thiamin and riboflavin than broiler meat," Denton says.

In the studies on guinea meat quality, guinea keets (young guineas) were raised on a modified turkey starter and grower diet for 12 weeks. They were processed like broilers, then breast and thigh meat samples were analyzed.

Guinea breast contained 74.60 percent moisture to 74.46 percent for chicken breasts. Guinea thighs had 76 percent moisture while broiler thighs had 75.81 percent.

From a protein standpoint, guinea meat was 22.3 percent protein in the breast and 18.8 percent in the thigh compared to 23.09 and 19.95 percent in the broiler breast and thigh, respectively.

Fat content in the guinea breast and thigh was .86 percent and 2.9 percent, respectively, both lower than broiler meat with 1.24 percent breast fat and 3.91 percent thigh fat.

Cholesterol levels were virtually identical in breast meat but lower in guinea thighs than in broiler thighs.

Comptroller sends first 82 payments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent payments totaling \$34.7 million to Texas cities with the one percent city sales tax.

The payments, the first of 1982 to the nearly one thousand cities who collect the tax, totaled \$1.6 million more than these cities received in January of last year.

Bullock also forwarded January rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$8.6 million for the period and the San Antonio transit authority received \$874,000.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The net payments this period for Cisco are \$10,414.68. The 1981 payments were \$9,923.58. The percent change was 4.95%.

Eastland's net payment is \$9,924.04. Their 1981 payments were \$7,254.05. The percent change was 36.81%.

The net payment for Gorman is \$532.38. The 1981 payments were \$588.89. The percent change was -9.60%.

Ranger's net payment for this period is \$6,675.13. Their 1981 payments were \$5,415.92. The percent change was 23.25%.

The totals for city sales net payments were \$34,717,342.78. The 1981 payments totaled \$23,108,253.20. The percent change totaled \$4.86%.

Most people, when they think about their U.S. Senators and Representatives associate them with long legislative sessions in the chambers of Congress, national issues, and the maze of bureaucracy in Washington, D.C. This impression is accurate, although not complete, because there is much more to the job than you send your elected representatives to Washington to do.

One of the most gratifying aspects I find in being Senator from Texas is the opportunity to help people who have problems with the federal bureaucracy. These problems range from getting information about a new energy program to questions about Social Security benefits. My office cannot make changes in agency decisions, rules or procedures. However, I can act as a liaison to make sure all pertinent facts are being considered, that the agency is acting in a timely manner, or that paperwork is being properly processed.

For example, Larry Wiard of League City, Texas, recently got in touch with me because he was having problems scheduling back surgery at a veterans' hospital. Mr. Wiard had been told in August he needed immediate surgery. He could barely walk and had severe back pain.

The doctors at the hospital had told Mr. Wiard that he had to have a procedure called CAT scan before the surgery. He made several appointments with the VA clinic, but on each one he was told the funds were not available to provide the scan. On November 3, he called my office to ask for assistance. My office, in turn, inquired at the Houston Veterans Administration Hospital on Mr. Wiard's behalf. At that point, the hospital scheduled yet another appointment for him. On November 9, the doctor told Mr. Wiard that the surgery could be performed without the CAT scan. He had never been told before that he had this option and elected to have the surgery immediately, even though the risk would be greater without the CAT procedure. The surgery was performed November 12, and by Thanksgiving, Mr. Wiard's stitches were out, he was recuperating at home and the outlook for the future was good.

Of course, not all problems can be solved that quickly. But, I welcome the opportunity to attempt to help any Texan who is having a problem with federal red tape.

A Look At The Cisco Senior Center

The Cisco Senior Center has been in operation since February of 1976. During this five year period, it has, (according to John Muller, Administrator) proven itself as a worthwhile program.

In the first two years of its existence, the program provided recreation and economic counseling. Through the actions of employees, volunteers, and concerned citizens, the program has grown. One of those concerned citizens, a local chiropractor, Chief Brown, donated kitchen facilities for approximately 8 months, until federal money could be acquired and the center was remodeled for the purpose of serving meals. The center presently averages 250 meals per day.

In a prepared statement, Ruth Cartee, Director of the Cisco, Eastland, and Rising Star Center, explained the purpose of the program.

"The purpose of the Cisco Senior Center is to serve the basic needs of the elderly (those 60 years of age or older). The Older American Act, was passed by congress, emphasized that special attention will be given in endeavoring to keep the elderly from becoming institutionalized.

This means the needs of proper nutrition will be a prime factor; the social needs will be met; and counseling in regard to the economic needs will be provided. All of these priorities are being provided at the Cisco Senior Center. One of the prime programs developed at our center is in regard to our emphasis in volunteering - the shaping of our time and talents with one another. The program at Cisco is an outstanding one and we are proud of it."

Beside meals, which are served regularly, the program provides activities to promote interaction among members. The activities include ceramics, table games, field trips, crochete, exercise, senior choir, counseling, and the 80± Club which consist of 125 members.

The center provides a daily blood pressure program, and telephone reassurance for each member.

During the past year, members of the program have been informed and entertained by guest speakers and musical groups. Guest speakers included Janet Thomas, Judge Scott Bailey, Congressman Charles Stenholm and Bill Roberts. Musical guest included Viola Payne, Davine Jeffcoat, The Star Bright Band, John Muller and the Little German Band.

The Cisco Senior Center is supported by federal funds through the cooperation of CJC.

The new roses for 1982

The Garden Editor Each year the nurseries and the hybridizers introduce their new offerings for that year. The public knows very little about the testing of the new introductions prior to their initial offering. The new roses are test grown throughout the United States as well as other countries for several years to determine how the new roses will stand the various weather conditions.

The "Jennifer Hart" is a dark red Hybrid Tea with deep, blood red flowers of 40 to 50 petals. It is a medium-tall bush with luxuriantly large, deep green foliage producing an abundance of long-stemmed large blooms. It is truly a celebrity in the rose kingdom. This beautiful rose has the parentage of the "Pink Parfait" and the "Yuletide" and was hybridized by Jack Christensen and Herbert Swim.

The "Gold Badge" is a yellow blend Floribunda with the traditional clusters up to ten flowers on very sturdy stems. The buds, which are classically shaped, open slowly into three inch blooms of 35 to 40 petals. When open it provides a large burst of color that will not fade under extreme summer heat or sun. It is a low growing bush featuring very glossy, dark green foliage and it has above average disease resistance. It is an excellent landscaping rose in mass planting. Its parentage is of the "Gold Bunny", "Variety", "Meigromure", and "Pappy Flash". It was hybridized by Louesette Meillane.

The "First Lady Nancy" is a yellow blend Hybrid Tea with large elegant buds of creamy yellow delicately blushed with very light coral pink. It is a tall bush with very large deep green leaves. It has large cutting stems which bear the 35 to 40 petal flowers in profusion. This is a very stately rose and is fitting to be the First Lady. The parentage of this beautiful rose is the "American Heritage" and

the "First Prize" and was hybridized by Herbert Swim and Jack Christensen.

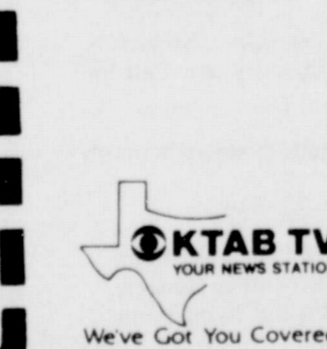
We have looked at only three of the new 1982 roses. There are many others but your "Garden Editor" thinks that these three are the best suited for this area of the county.
