communicator of the Christian message who believes that preaching must be more than "cheerleading."

Inspiration is to preaching as seasoning is to a salad, Bailey says - important but not the main ingredient. Ideas which transcend a particular culture - ideas like peace, love, compassion, mercy - these are the stuff of reality, he claims.

"We need a better idea of God if we are to have a better world," he reasons. Teaching is the intellectual part of preaching. A good preacher will do some teaching, and a good teacher will engage in some preaching.

Bailey sees the value of television as an effective means of communicating the Gospel, but he guards against the popularity accorded TV preachers today. "Jerusalem was the TV of Jesus' day, and he didn't use it much," reflects Bailey. "Rather, he spent most of his time teaching in the remote areas of the community, much as I imagine he might be doing today were he here. People often confuse popularity with truth, but truth doesn't have to be popular to be true, you know.

Then the Fort Worth preacher/teacher says why he is on television. "After one cuts through the reasons of ego and showmanship, I hope the genuine reasons emerge: to bring a sense of meaning to hungry people, and to say to them, "The Church doesn't have all the answers but let's look together to find God's way for life."



Who Owns The Media?

Many Americans have become concerned in recent years over the growth of newspaper chains, which continue to buy locally owned newspapers. They may not initially change editors and the tone of the newspaper, but eventually many changes are certain. And it's always possible that a central business headquarters could dictate editorial tone--if it decided to do so.

With the three commercial television networks all cozily headquartered in New York, and cooperating too closely in news coverage to suit many, the danger in a few chains controlling the American press is dis-

But there is also another trend, according to some. That is the trend among many corporate giants to buy up newspapers and stations. They too have not initially changed editors and editorial tone automatically. But corporate headquarters could, and they could plug their products and economic causes--if they wished.

Westinghouse is very heavily into radio and television. American Express is heavily into cable television, RKO General is currently being required to sell some of its TV stations by the Federal Communications Commission. Other corporate giants own newspapers.

Thus the FCC and the public should be aware that the danger in a very few corporate giants owning most of the media, both print and broadcast, is real. And it is not only a threat from media chains but from giant corporations not primarily in the news business.

When Ronald Reagan took office a year ago, he promised the American people a "New Federalism," a state-federal partnership which would return to the states the powers and responsibilities that belong to them.

This year, in his State of the Union Address, the President outlined a program which will take us a long distance toward the "New Federalism" goal. Under this plan, the states would take over responsibilities for two major domestic programs, Aid to families with Dependent Children and Food Stamps. This would allow administration and tormulation of the aid programs to be at the local level where they can be more effective and more efficient. In return, the federal government would take on the considerable burden of Medicaid.

Further, more than 40 federal grant programs would

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be turned back to the state where they could be oriented toward local community needs and their services delivered more efficiently. To finance these programs, federal excise tax revenues would provide a trust fund -- initially to provide money for the entire current cost and then to be phased out at a gradual rate. Thus, we would be allowing the states the means and the time to absorb these new -- or renewed -- responsibilities.

This \$28 billion federalism trust fund, and growing savings from Medicaid federalization from fiscal year 1984 to fiscal year 1987 would provide not only increasing revenue sources to finance new state program responsibilities, but also remove federal funding uncertainty for the rest of the decade. The states would have six years to determine best the mix of program savings and state tax increases before the federalism trust fund begin to phase out in fiscal year 1988

Over the past two decades, we have overloaded the federal government with management and fiscal responsibilities. This program would restore the balance of state and federal responsibilities. This balance, after all, was the justified nor effective. original function of the federal system outlined in our

The federalism initiative also would largely abolish the existing, unworkable federal-state grant-in-aid system which tends to transform non-federal units into subordinate middle management extensions of the Washington bureaucracy.

In other ways, the move toward the New Federalism has begun. During the past year, we have cut the growth of new federal regulations nearly in haif. We have begun looking at and modifying existing regulations which are counter-productive or cost-inefficient.

Let me emphasize, though, that neither the President nor the Congress wants the federal government to shirk the responsibilities that belong to it.

The President's federalism initiative leaves in federal hands domestic programs including the social insurance system of Social Security retirement, disability and Medicare; transfer aid to the needy elderly; health insurance and medical insurance, and projects of national

Exercise Pays Dividends

Many of us feel guilty about not doing exercise. We continue to put it off although we know a regular schedule of exercise is one of the keys to a healthy, pro-

Exercise to some sounds boring although just about everyone who jogs or runs claims to eat better, sleep But, somehow, exercise just doesn't seem much fun.

But with a large dose of willpower and patience, a faithfully kept schedule of exercise will pay dividends in good health. The first month or two of activity may tax your willpower because the benefits don't develop overnight. It will be a few weeks before you get that bounce in your step that suggests you're hooked on exercise and physical



Then, you may find it easier to cope with everyday stresses and cut down on cigarettes, coffee and alcohol. But the most important thing is to stay with the commit-

Find a program that delights and captivates you and suits your lifestyle.

Search for activities that challenge you physically. As your endurance increases, your circulation and breathing will improve. Your heart and lungs will function better and become stronger as your body muscles become firm and supple.

A note of caution: While weak stomach or leg muscles can make you less attractive or cause discomfort, you can overdo the exercises—particularly in the beginning. Overtaxing a heart that is weak from lack of exercise

The best exercise for your heart involves rhythmic repetitive motions. You should be able to sustain the exercise for two or more minutes without huffing and puffing for maximum benefit and to indicate you are becoming more physically fit.

Once you discover the joy of stimulating activity, you are likely to continue it for the rest of your life. Eventually, you'll look forward to exercising. You may even feel vaguely uncomfortable if you skip the exercises.

Remember, you're never too old to start, and you're never too much out of shape to change.

Six Flags newest attraction



"CLIFFHANGER" ANNOUNCED BY SIX FLAGS OVER TEXAS-The world's first total freefall ride, the Texas Cliffhanger, will debut late this

spring at Six Flags Over Texas. The Arlington theme park's general manager, Ray Williams, said the towering, 2.1 million dollar ride will give thrillseekers "the same falling sensation they would feel if they stepped off the top of a nine-stery

Williams said the ride has no precedent in the industry. "Even our less coaster," he said "had 'ancestors' that were built around the turn of the century, but there's nothing in amusement ride history which resembles the Texas Cliffhanger."

Williams, who recently rode the prototype model of the ride at the Intamin AG factory near Geneva, Switzerland, said, "The sensation is unlike anything developed up to now. There's no way to compare it even the biggest of roller coasters, or any existing ride."

The "L-shaped" ride tower juts 128 feet into the air. Passengers board the Texas Cliffhanger on the underside of the tower. They will be seated four abreast in sleek, padded gondolas. The gondolas rise one at a time to the top of the tower, with the trip up taking only ten seconds.

At the top, the gondolas move into "drop position" and will be held at that point for ten seconds. Riders, protected by over-the-shoulder "las bars," have an obstructed view of the area in front of them.

After the pause, the gondolas - weighing 1,500 pounds without passengers - drop at freefall speed, guided by tracks.

Near the bottom of the drop, the track curves and riders will sudden find themselves on their backs looking straight up at the sky.

A computer controlled braking system will stop the gondolas near the end of an 86-foot-long horizontal track. Then the gondolas will be slowly turned upright and lowered to the bottom of the structure for unload

During the freefall drop, riders will experience a 3.5 G force. The rid accelerates from zero to 55 miles per hour in the first 1.3 seconds of the plunge.

Williams said the computer safey systems engineered into the ride are "state of the art" devices.

He said 103 electronic sensors send messages to the computer during each ride cycle.

Some of the sensors detect the ride's speed. Others give the computer information on the exact location of each gondola. "If the computer isn't satisfied with the ride's operation, it will tem-

porarily close it down," Williams commented. Williams said the ride is currently on its way by ship from Europe to Texas. Foundations for the 110-ton structure have already been poured. After construction is completed, extensive tests will be conducted

before the ride is opened to the public in late April. The Texas Cliffhanger will occupy a site on the edge of Six Flags Boomtown section.

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





A HEAP OF HELP FOR THE GARDENER

Once you get the knack of it, you'll realize there's actually no mystery at all to composting. Almost any plant—and much animal—matter is just "made" for your natural fertilizer heap, although the decomposition process does work faster if you avoid using whole bones, grease, animal fat, and chunks of meat. Then, too, coarse or bulky plant matter-such as large leaves, cornstalks, branches, and sawdust-should be shredded or added to your stack of future fertilizer somewhat sparingly.

Grass clippings, kitchen trimmings, coffee grounds, spoiled hay, bone meal, blood meal, spent hops, water plants, weeds, and animal manure of all kinds willwhen stacked in five-inch-thick layers and watered well -turn into rich black dirt for the next planting season. The more variety you add to your pile, the better. Sprinkle in some ground limestone, rock phosphate, or potash rock (which is available at gardening shops)

from time to time, too. Pile yourself up a big stack of the above odds and ends right now, water it, and cover it with black plastic. Turn the top and sides of the pile in toward the center after two to three weeks, and add more water whenever the digesting matter seems dry. Then cover the compost again and let it "work" right through the winter. Come next spring, you'll have some rich (and entirely natural) top dressing for your garden.

Or, if you want to run a really basic composting operation, just dump all your kitchen scraps into a two-cubic foot hole in the back yard after every meal, sprinkle it with about one cup of slaked lime, and cover the deposit with enough loose dirt to contain any odors.

When the first excavation will hold no more, start filling a second. And by the time this pit is full (two or three months), the material in number one will have completely decomposed into loamy potting soil.

Then, again, if you like the simplicity of the pit composting technique, but want (or need) to be a tad more prim and proper about it, make an underground com-poster with a lid. Simply buy two bottomless galvanized-steel trash cans upright in the ground, with only the tops left visible. As soon as you've filled up one can, start putting

your waste organic matter into the second. Then, by the time that container's full, the material in the first will be ready to use.

State forms new organization to combat oilfield theft

Austin, TX - Texas Independent producers and Royalty Owners Association announced today the formation of a new statewide organization to combat oilfield theft, a problem that costs the Texas oil industry an estimated \$100 million annually

Named the Petroleum Industry Security Council (PISC), the new organization is the culmination of months of research and study by various oil and gas trade associations in Texas of the rapidly escalating problem of oilfield theft. Those associations include TIPRO, North Texas Oil and Gas Association, Permian Basin Petroleum Association, Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association, West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association, Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association and the Association of Oilwell Servicing Con-

tractors. Several of these associations recognized the growing problems of oilfield theft in the summer of 1981. At that time they established an oilfield theft "hotline" where people could report a theft or information regarding a theft. The success of the "hotline" indicates that the problem of oilfield theft is more serious than previously thought. This "hotline" will become part of PISC's

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FOR FREE ESTIMATE

TIPRO President L. Frank Pitts and Harrold E. (Gene) Wright, chairman of TIPRO's Task Force dealing with the theft problem, said the new organization's goal will be fourfold. Its program will involve theft prevention activity, apprehension of oilfield crime, investigation,

and prosecution. It is anticipated the Council will open its doors before spring. Among the duties to be immediately assumed will be operation of a statewide hotline for reporting theft activity, initiation of training seminars to reduce in-house theft opportunity in producer firms, and the creation of a standardized marking system for oilfield equipment.

In cooperation with the Council, the Texas Independent Producers Legal Action Association will finance a vigorous special prosecution program to secure more indictments and convictions of oil thieves across the state. The Council is also expected to cooperate with various state agencies, police organizations, security personnel, organizations already working in the industry, and the sponsoring associations to seek stronger laws and improved coordination of effort to reduce the theft problem. Eventually, there will be attempts made with surrounding states to expand the program to interstate status, since much of the oil theft problem involves crossing of state boundaries.

Various trade associations will finance the Council during the first year of opera-






