As in other efforts, there needs to be a combined, dedicated effort on the part of all citizens in Eastland County to promote and encourage the use of the air service so that the line can prosper and grow.

Chamber Holds Organizational Meet For 'Christmas In May'

An organizational meeting for a new program to be called "Christmas in May" was held Tuesday night, Jan. 19, in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Dr. Norman Wallace, Cisco Junior College president, was elected chairman of the drive to raise money for the project. Other officers include Emma Watts, treasurer, and Bill Roberts, recording secretary-reporter. A board of directors was also elected for the project. It includes Ivan Webb, Gene Abbott, Stanley Pirtle, Red Honea, Wallace, Watts, Gene Gwinn, Tom Autrey, Sherry Wright, Elaine Dixon, Roberts, Gus Smothers and Debbie Whitley. "Christmas in May" is a program for community improvement, and is patterned after a similar program called "Christmas in April" which has been in existence in Midland since October, 1973. It will call for volunteer housing repair for the elderly and handicapped. Money contributed for the project by the Cisco community is to be spent only for materials to make repairs. The house chosen is to be repaired by volunteer labor (the people are not paid for the work they do).

Cisco Attorney Found Guilty Of Professional Misconduct

Truman Kirk, Cisco attorney, was found guilty Tuesday of five of 10 allegations of professional misconduct by 231st District Court Judge J. Spurlock. Kirk was publicly reprimanded by the Judge.

Judge Spurlock, who was substituting for 91st District Court Judge Jim Wright, found Kirk guilty of backdating legal documents, thus making them fraudulent, and then of notarizing the fraudulent papers.

The allegations of misconduct were contained in a civil lawsuit filed by the State Bar. Spurlock said the case did not merit disbarment or suspension of practice but promised that his findings would be made public and ordered Kirk to pay all court costs incurred in the year-long lawsuit.

The judge had found Kirk guilty of "willful, dishonorable conduct," which he labeled as "reprehensible."

The papers, which were reportedly fraudulent, involved property owned by Tom Stark, who died Nov. 4, 1979. A warranty deed to the property signed by his brother, A.F. Stark, purportedly conveyed the land to Archie Chamness, who had been Tom Stark's business partner. Kirk claimed the deed and an accompanying certificate of acknowledgement were prepared Oct. 15, 1979. But Spurlock believed that the papers actually were prepared Nov. 15—almost two weeks after Tom Stark's death—and backdated to Oct. 15.

Deborah Whitley, who served as Kirk's secretary during the time the fraudulent papers were prepared, testified Monday that Kirk ordered her to prepare backdated papers that she eventually refused to notarize.

But Charles Yett, assistant general counsel for the Bar, argued that Mrs. Whitley's was the most believable testimony and suggested that Kirk was offering "a multiple choice defense."

Spurlock told Kirk, after finding him guilty of the charges, "It's a personal tragedy for you and your family, and one that we can each find ourselves in if we're not very, very careful."

Nevertheless, the judge contended, "The Deborah Whitleys and other (citizens) must be assured" that the legal system is reliable. "We have to believe in the system," Spurlock said.

Kirk repeatedly denied the accusations against him as he was led away from the bench by his attorney.

A 2000-ft. wildcat for oil is scheduled for drilling one mile south of Scranton community by Lynn Birt Petroleum of Cisco. The well is designated as the No. 1 Stuart. It will be spudded in a 13-acre lease in Eastland County's CT&MCRR Co. Survey.

U.S. Exploration of Fort Worth has filed first production figures for the No. 1 Thurman, a gas wildcat located three miles northeast of Gorman.

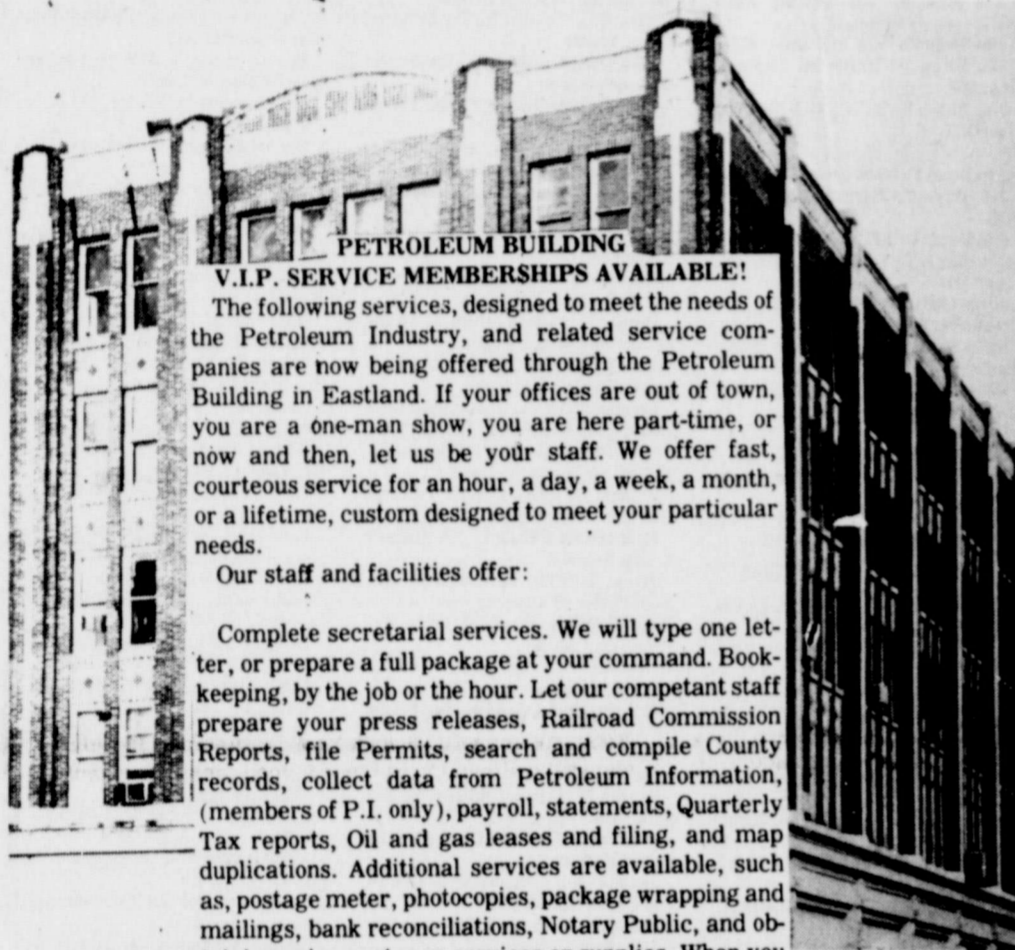

What is hypothermia? It is when the body temperature drops below 95 degrees.

The question is asked since so many elderly live alone, and those who live on a fixed income or low income and in housing with inadequate insulation are prime candidates to hypothermia.

The elderly, like the very young, do not tolerate the cold well, shivering as well as other mechanism which both increase and conserve heat, may become increasingly impaired as a person

grows older. Medication used to treat anxiety and depression may add to the risk as will problems of the vascular systems," states Dr. Noel Robin, chief of medicine at the Stamford (Conn.) Hospital.

What are some symptoms of hypothermia? They are slow and irregular heart rate, weak pulse, shallow breathing, drop in blood pressure, dizziness, dilation of the pupils, slurred speech and impaired mental functions.

First aid for a victim includes re-warming with blankets and hot drinks. A severe case should be rushed to the emergency hospital room.

Soil Insect Control

GORDON WOOLAM
Soon area vegetable gardeners will begin preparing their garden sites for spring planting. The most destructive insects that gardeners will encounter this time of year are soil insects. If they are not controlled they can cause a reduction in vegetable quality and yield. The best time to control the insects is before planting.

Most soil insecticides, in order to be effective, must be applied at least two weeks prior to planting and must be thoroughly mixed into the soil at least 4 to 6 inches. This of course cannot be done if the garden is already planted.

Soil insects that vegetable gardeners are most likely to encounter are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggot, abago maggot, mole crickets, sowbugs, and cutworms. Since soil insects have different feeding habits, while others may cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Garden sites which were previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Vegetable gardeners

should inspect their garden site to determine if insecticide treatments are needed. Use a shovel or spade and randomly sample the soil at several locations to a depth of 5-6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule an average of one or more soil insect pest per sampled location suggests the need for treatment.

Most soil insects can be controlled in the home garden with Diazinon 25% liquid concentrate or 5% granular usually give the best control. Do not use Dursban which is recommended for control of soil insects in lawns. This chemical is not cleared for garden use and may contaminate your produce. Also do not treat lawns for grubs at this time. Treatment is ill advised because adequate levels of insecticide usually cannot get through the thatch to be effective against the large grubs present at this time. White grubs in lawns are best controlled in the late summer after the seasons eggs have hatched and larvae are still small.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow its labeled instruction. For more information on this subject or others contact your County Extension Office.

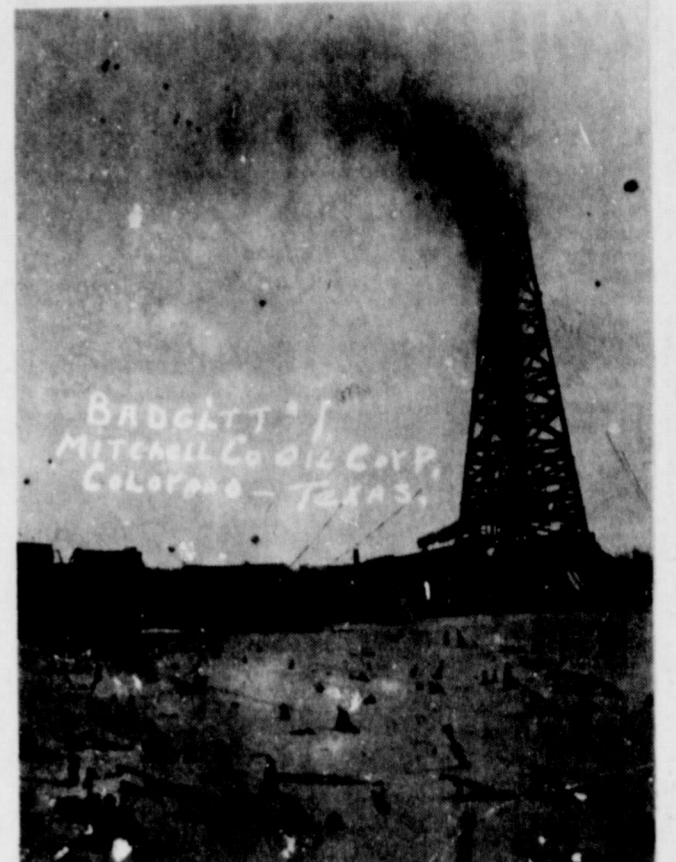

taught by Miss Brenda Land. The students, selected in tests designed to discover exceptional talent, participate in the regular curriculum. Their extra instruction, which gives them educational opportunity to advance in accordance with their abilities, stresses creative and productive thinking, research, originality of mind, independence of thought and other qualities that cultivate higher levels of cultural achievement.

Usually, said Turner, from four to five per cent of the student body have a level of mental endowment that admits them to consideration. The Cisco program began with about 25 students but competing interests, such as athletics and other activities, drew some away. Once out of the program they cannot return, he said.

Most gifted students excel in certain areas, he explained; rarely is there an "across the board" degree of higher excellence. Among the qualities which distinguish youngsters of the pattern, he mentioned a natural desire to achieve, high self-imposed

standards and a wish for self-expression.

Special talents, he explained, impose obligations—and sometimes, a stigma. It seems incredible, he said, that what is usually thought of as at the opposite end of the educational spread is applied to those at the front. But it is something to be dealt with, he admitted.

A phase of the program, not evident in instruction but very much so in the attitude and application of the student, is parental influence, he told the club. An effort is being made to reach the parents with a sense of their responsibility and an understanding of how they can help.

Of particular importance, he emphasized, is parental acceptance of the child's gifts. Ways in which parenting can contribute include: Encouraging the child to see things in a new way; the stimulation of curiosity; development of hobbies of the child's own choosing; and a generally supportive home environment.

"Loving helps a child excel," he said.

RECIPES

KOOKIE COOKIES
(Made with Little Brownie Samoa Cookies)
1 pkg. milk chocolate drops (1 1/2 oz. size)
1 box Little Brownie Samoa cookies, coarsley chopped (7 oz.)
1 cup salted cashews, or other favorite nuts
1 cup mini marshmallows
24 Kraft caramels in fourths

Melt chocolate drops in large double boiler over hot but not boiling water. Stir until smooth and creamy. Remove from heat. Gradually add remaining ingredients; mix well. Drop by spoonfuls on wax paper covered cookie sheet. Garnish with multi-colored decorettes or coconut flakes if desired. Chill until firm in freezer section of refrigerator (about 20 minutes). Remove from cookie sheet. Store in tight container at room temperature. Makes 36.

DOUBLE FUDGE MINT CAKE
(Made with Little Brownie Mint Cookies)
1 1/2 cups whipping cream
1/4 cup confectioners sugar
1/4 tsp. vanilla extract
20 Little Brownie chocolate Mint cookies

Beat together cream, sugar and vanilla until stiff. Spread about 1 tablespoon of whipped cream mixture on each Mint cookie. Put together in stacks of 4 or 5. Chill 15 minutes.

Lay stacks on edge of plate or cookie sheet to make one long roll. Frost outside of roll with remaining whipped cream mixture. Freeze three hours or until firm. Cut roll diagonally at 45-degree angle. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

DO-SI-DO STICKS
(Made with Little Brownie

Do-Si-Do Cookies)
1/2 cup chunky peanut butter
1 cup sifted powdered sugar
1 cup shredded coconut
1 cup raisins
1-2 tablespoons milk
1-1/2 cups crushed Little Brownie Do-Si-Dos

Blend well, peanut butter, powdered sugar, coconut, raisins, enough milk to make a firm mixture. Form into thin fingers and roll each in cookies crumbs. Chill.

BANANA PUDDING
(Made with Little Brownie Trefoil Cookies)

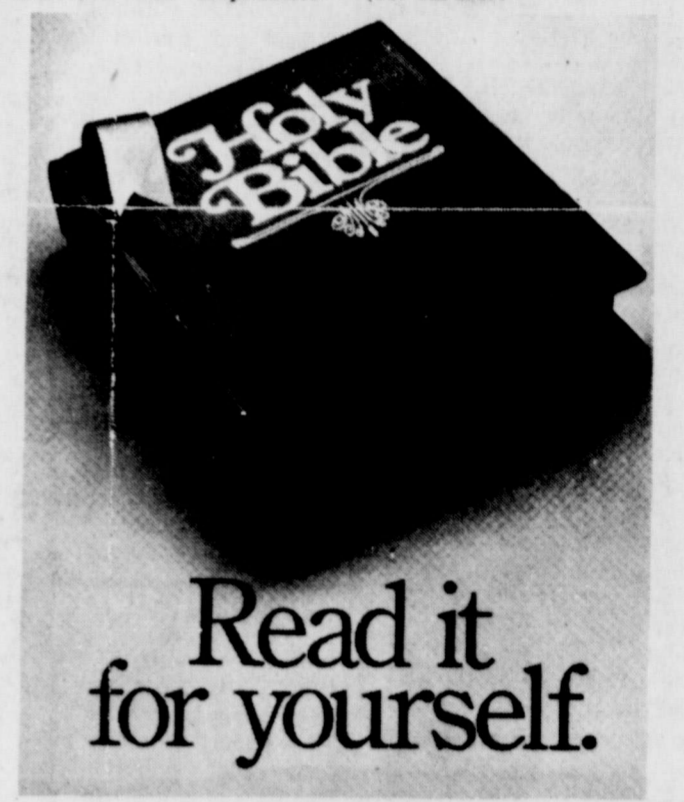
In a deep dish, place a layer of Little Brownie Trefoil cookies. Do not crumble the cookies. Stand a layer on edge around the dish. On the first layer of cookies, place a layer of sliced bananas and so on until you have the desired quantity. Pour over this a delicious custard which is made as follows:

Beat 3 egg yolks slightly. Add to the egg yolks 1/2 cup of sugar, 1/8 teaspoon of salt, 1 scant teaspoon of corn starch. Add this to 2 cups of scalded milk. Place the uncooked custard in a double boiler and cook until the custard thickens, stirring constantly. Pour the custard over the cookies and bananas.

For meringue-beat 3 egg whites with 4 tbsp. of sugar until stiff. Spread this over the contents of the dish and bake in a slow oven 15 to 20 minutes. A delicious hot or cold treat.

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
