after a similar program called "Christmas in April" which has been in existence in Midland since October, 1973. It will call for volunteer housing repair for the elderly and handicapped.

Money contributed for the project by the Cisco community is to be spent only for materials to make repairs. The house chosen is to be repaired by volunteer labor (the people are not paid for the work they do).

The procedure for selection begins with people who would like to have their houses considered for the project obtaining an application from the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office, filling it out and returning it.

Each application will be read and each home will be visited by project personnel. A surveyor will then visit each home to help determine what repairs will be needed. Pictures will be taken of the home selected and an information packet for volunteers

To be qualified for consideration, applicants must be 60 years or older or handicapped (if not elderly); must own the home (or be in the process of buying it); have a low income (financially unable to afford repairs, receiving Social Security or Veterans benefits).

An account has been set up at First National Bank in Cisco to handle donations for the project. Anyone interested in donating money and/or time to the project may call the chamber office. If you have any special talents (such as carpentry, working with electrical wiring, painting, etc.), or if you would just like to help, you are invited to participate in

the project. Some \$800 has already been donated to the project. The Cisco Service Club has given \$500; the Women of CJC, \$200; \$100 from D.D. Williams; and \$300 from the Cisco Civic League.

The board is also asking for anyone with left-over materials (paint, wallpaper, lumber, drapes, etc.) to also donate these types of items. Small items may be turned in at the chamber office. If you have larger items to donate, call Emma Watts at

Members of the board would also like to remind all applicants that only one house will be chosen each year for repair. Applications not chosen will be considered for next year's project.

#### Soil Insect Control

GORDON WOOLAM Soon area vegetable gardners will begin preparing their garden sites for spring planting. The most destructive insects that gardeners will encounter this time of year are soil insects. If they are not controlled they can cause a reduction in vegetable quality and yield. The best time to control the insects is before planting.

Most soil insecticides, in order to be effective, must be applied at least two weeks prior to planting and must be thoroughly mixed into the soil at least 4 to 6 inches. This of course cannot be done if the garden is already

Soil insects that vegetable gardeners are most likely to encounter are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, abbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, and cut-Since soil insects have different feeding habits, while others may cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Garden sites which were previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Vegetable gardneners

shoud inspect their garden site to determine if insecticide treaments are needed. use a shovel or spade and randomly sample the soil at several locations to a depth of 5-6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule an average of one or more soil insect pest per sampled location suggests the need for treatment.

Most soil insects can be controlled in the home garden with Diazinon 25% liquid concentrate or 5% granular usually give the best control. Do not use Dursban which is recommended for control of soil insects in lawns. This chemical is not cleared for garden use and may contaminate your produce. Also do not treat lawns for grubs at this time. Treatment is ill advised because adequate levels of insecticide usually cannot get through the thatch to be effective against the large grubs present at this time. White grubs in lawns are best controlled in the late summer after the seasons eggs have hatched

and larvae are still small. Before applying any pesticide always read and follow its labeled instruction. For more information on this subject or others contact your County Extension Of-





U.S.D.A. actually completed its testing five years ago, but firms have been slow to act since they were not sure the product would find public acceptance.

Persons with a rural background probably remember that beef tallow made a most acceptable product two generations ago, and that soap made from beef was white - unlike the yellow product made from pork fat.





Their extra instruction, which gives them educational opportunity to advance in accordance with their abilities, stresses creative and productive thinking, research, orginiali-

ty of mind, independence of

thought and other qualities

that cultivate higher levels

of cultural achievement. Usually, said Turner, from four to five per cent of the student body have a level of mental endowment that admits them to consideration. The Cisco program began with about 25 students but competing interests, such as athletics and other activities, drew some away. Once out of the program they

cannot return, he said. Most gifted students excell in certain areas, he explained; rarely is there an 'across the board' degree of higher excellence. Among the qualities which distinguish youngsters of the pattern, he mentioned a natural desire to achieve, high self-imposed self-expression.

Special talents, he explained, impose obligations-and sometimes, a stigma. It seems incredible, he said, that what is usually thought of as at the opposite end of the educational spread is applied to those at the front. But it is something to be dealt with, he admitted.

A phase of the program, not evident in instruction but very much so in the attitude and application of the student, is parental influence, he told the club. An effort is being made to reach the parents with a sense of their responsibility and an understanding of how they

Of particular importance, he emphasized, is parental acceptance of the child's gifts. Ways in which parenting can contribute include: Encouraging the child to see things in a new way; the stimulation of curiosity; development of hobbies of the child's own choosing, and a generally supportive home enviroment.

"Loving helps a child excell," he said.


