FALSE FIRE ALARMS Three false fire alarms were turned in at the Cisco Fire Station Thursday, officials reported. Several

grass fires were reported and put out by firemen during the month.

In other action, the Council rejected two bids for a contract to pave Avenue N from just south of 14th Street to the IH-20 access road and 13th Street from Avenue D to Avenue M. Two bids were submitted - one for \$46,961 and the other for \$41,225. The project will be re-submitted to bidder with specification changes, it was decided. The Council plans to pave 10 to 15 blocks of city streets each

year, beginning this year. A plat for the new "The Oaks" Addition, located between 14th and 15th Streets from Avenue Q west to Front Street in southwest Cisco, was accepted and approved.

Ray Farris, representing the owners, was present and told the Council that 14 lots compose the area of the addition. He said that plans call for building three-bedroom brick homes to sell in the \$40,000 range. Plans call for starting two houses in the next ten days, he added.

Mr. Farris, who owns the property with Alden Kathey, said that plans call for water and sewer lines to be put in and for some street work. The two men live in Abilene and are veterans in home

building. The Council approved on first reading an ordinance to vacate the one-block alley right-of-way behind the old Mobley Hotel. The Hilton Foundation owns both the hotel and the property back of it and plans to include all of the area in its Mobley Hilton Restoration project.

Dr. Rinaldo Petrini, architect for the restoration project, was present at the meeting and told the Council that contractors have been inspecting the property and will be bidding soon on the work. He hopes to have work underway by May 1, he added, and some 18 months will be required to restore the hotel.

The Council authorized City Manager Michael Moore to advertise for bids for oil and gas leases on city-owned land north and east of town.

A financial statement as of January 31, as prepared by City Accountant Jean Gray, was presented. It showed that some \$350,000 or 53 per cent of general fund revenue expected for the years has been collected. General expenditures amounted to \$202,191 or 30 per cent of the year's anticipated total.

The Council approved payment of bills for January The bills totalled \$71,155 from the general fund and \$21,332 from the utility fund. 



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Property owners informed of rights

AUSTIN -- Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide effort to inform property owners in Texas of their rights and remedies as taxpayers.

"Major changes in the state's tax laws were effective January 1 with implementation of the new Texas Property Tax Code," Graeber said. Among the more significant provisions are those which:

-Establish a central appraisal district in each county which will value all property for tax purposes and provide that value to each

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taxing unit in the district; -Provide a single board of equalization-which will be empowered to hear taxpayer appeals on a wide range of matters rather than just

questions of value;

-Make it possible for taxpayers to file all exemption applications and property renditions with one office in a county rather than with multiple tax offices.

-Permit one-time applications for homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation, rather than annual applications as previously required;

-Provide, for the first time in Texas, a method for taxpayers to limit property tax increases to eight percent annually through an intiative and referendum process applicable to all taxing

Graeber said that all except 17 of the state's 254 counties, the new appraisal district has been implemented. Local officials delayed appraisal district operations until 1983 in Bexar, Glassock, Gray, Hartley, Jasper, Jeff Davis, King, Leon, McMullen, Moore, Rockwall, Oldham, Stonewall and Zapata coun-

Implementation of full appraisal district operations was delayed until 1984 in Bowie, Crockett and Harris counties.

The SPTB administrator noted that in counties which have delayed appraisal district implentation, taxpayers shoudl file their property renditions and exemption applications with city,

school, county and special district tax offices as in prior years. In all other counties, renditions and exemption applications should be filed with the appraisal district's chief appraiser.

"It is important that taxpayers file renditions and applications for tax relief prior to May 1," Graeber

To call attention to available exemptions and tax administration procedures, he noted that SPTB will be working with appraisal district, local tax offices and the state's news media to help make Texans aware of changes in the law.

"State law requires any person who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to file a rendition statement with the appraisal district," Graeber noted.

Additionally, the chief appraiser of a county may require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the owner or manager.

Special rendition procedures apply to property on which an exemption applicable on January 1 terminates during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires the proper;ty on the date eligibility for the exemption terminates must render the property for taxation within 30 days of that date.

Transportation companies subject to regulation of the Railroad Commission are required to render the value of their intangible property to the State Property Tax Board.

Banks and railroad companies are required to file special rendition statements with the appraisal district chief appraiser.

Graeber said rendition forms are available from ap-

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payer appeal, is available at no charge from appraisal district offices, from most local tax offices, or from the State Property Tax Board.

"The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas, and will generate approximately \$6 billion this year to help fund the operations of public schools, cities, counties and special district," Graeber said.

"We urge all property owners to become familiar with the tax process and to file renditions and apply for all exemptions or other tax relief measures to which they are entitled," Graeber



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

There is even a free idea Handbook for all local planners, which can be obtained by writing to the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission, P.O. Box 1986, Austin, Texas 78767.

One excellent suggestion from the Commisson, and one which would interest children as well as adults, is the idea of making 1986 a "Year of Wildflowers".

Texas residents are asked to seed area roadsides and private fields with native wildflower species as a beautification project.

Fall is the best time for a seeding program, and once started, the native wildflowers propogate themselves. The State Department of Highways has stated with it will be pleased to work with any individual or group on a project

For information of wildflower seed and supplies, planting procedures, and advice on which flowers will do best your area, write: Herbert Neimann, Landscape Architect, State Dept. of Highways and Public Transporation, 11th and Brazos, D-18L, Austin, Texas, 78711.

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

"Three Eastland County young men, all under 21, are presently at the Vernon Drug Center for treatment," he said, "and we're in the process of sending a 14-yearold junior high school student there for treatment."

The availability of drugs in the county is widespread, and in advising the concerned public, D.A. Walton said that the general public needs to realize that there is a problem, and to keep their eyes open for information which can be passed on to his office

407 qualified signatures needed to call election

Approximately qualified signatures are believed to be needed to call an election to legalize bingo in Eastland County.

Petitions are presently being circulated, having been

obtained on a verbal request from the county clerk's office. The verbal request and time limit of return are new provisions under the new state law on local option for bingo. There reportedly is no time limit on when the petitions have to be returned to the County Commissioners.

The number of required signatures is ten per cent of the total number of voters who voted in the last election (1980) at which a governor was elected.

One spokesman indicated that the request for the petitions came through a representative of the local VFW Post.

Homestead benefits available to those over 65

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their School District Homestead Exemption in 1979 have until April 1, 1982 to still sign up. In this way, Over-65 homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 Homestead exemption given by the School Districts of the

According to House Bill 885 which was passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, homeowners who Qualified For the school homestead "Tax Freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the Chief Appraiser of the County Appraisal District in which the home is located.

This application must be made with the Chief Appraiser of the Eastland County Appraisal District before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1. 1979 a homeowner Must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years of age or older

- Own his or her home

- Use that home as his or her Principal Residence

The Chief Appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the Chief Appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the Over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school distirct would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

Judge Bailey Speaks At Rotary Club

A law, HB 640, recently passed by the Texas Legislature defining the abandonment of cemetery lots and the procedure for recovery of title by the governing body of the cemetery, was discussed before the Rotary Club Thursday, by County Judge Scott Bailey.

Under the definitions stated in the law, he explained, there is some question as to whether or not it would apply to the Cisco cemetery, however, and some amendment of its provisions might become necessary.

The 40-acre burial ground is managed by a non-profit association and under that status the law would seem to apply. But the City of Cisco is the grantor of title to the lots and for that reason the cemetery may be in a category to which the law is not applicable as it now stands. Another condition in what would be, overall, a matter for delicate concern, prevents any recovery action in the case of a title granted in perpetuity, even though the lot in question may otherwise come within the warrant of the legisla-

The act, which applies to private or association-owned and non-profit cemeteries, presumes abandonment as a condition in which the lot has not been cared for or maintenance fees, if required, not paid for ten consecutive years. Before any action for recovery of the unused lot or lots is taken the authority must give notice of intention to the owner or his representative, either directly or by mail to the last known address. After a stated period of time there must be four newspaper publications once a week, before a petition to declare abandonment and sale can be filed in district court.



Spinach is one of many green leafy vegetables grown in abundance in Texas. Eight thousand to 10,000 acres of spinach are produced in the Winter Garden area each year, providing more than 80% of the nation's supply. Most of the canned spinach for consumers is processed at a plant in Crystal City, Texas. In the middle of the small town is a large brightly painted statue of the cartoon character Popeye, signifying that the town is the spinach capital of the world.

Fresh, Texas spinach is usually available from November through April. The savory or crinkley leaf type is mostly handharvested and sold as fresh spinach. The flat or broadleaf type is usually machine harvested and used mainly for canning. SELECTION

Fresh spinach cannot be stored very long, so select greens before buying. Look for crisp, clean leaves that are fresh and tender with a healthy green color. Avoid greens with coarse, fibrous stems; wilted or yellowed leaves and brown edges. Reject greens with excessive dirt and evidence of insects which are hard to remove.

Buy fresh spinach loose by the bunch or prepackaged. One pound of bunched spinach or 12 oz. of packaged spinach serves three or four people. Packaged greens are more convenient becuase they are somewhat trimmed and washed before packaging. There is less waste with

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packaged spinach, but it may cost more per pound and deteriorate more quick-

Canned or frozen spinach may be a less expensive choice, especially when fresh spinach is not in good supply. Either form stores well, can be used in many recipes and requires little preparation.

NUTRITION Gaining super strength from spinach may only appear in cartoons, but spinach is rich in blood-building iron. It has an abundance of vitamins A, C & K and supplies a good source of fiber. Spinach also contains some B vitamins and the minerals potassium and magnesium. Although it is packed with nutrition, this tasty, green vegetable only has about 20 calories per serving, so even if you are dieting, you can

PREPARATION Combine the unique color and flavor of spinach with other foods to make salads, quiche, casseroles, dips, souffles or crepes. For a delicious side dish, season cooked spinach with butter, onions, herbs or spices. Spinach also blends well with hardcooked eggs, bacon

eat all you want.

Too cook spinach, remove damaged leaves and large stems. Heat the leaves in a saucepan with the water that clings to the leaves after washing. If the spinach has been stored a few days, add one or two tablespoons of

To retain the emerald green color, remove the lid briefly during the first few cooking minutes to allow steam to escape. This releases chemicals that turn spinach a dull olive green. Do not add soda to preserve the color. Soda is not needed and can change the flavor. Cook the greens just until the leaves or tender. Overcooking also causes discoloration.

STORAGE Store fresh greens properly to preserve the quality of the leaves. Spinach keeps only three to five days, so plan to use it shortly after purchase. Rinse the leaves thoroughly but gently in a container of cool water to remove dirt or sand. Shake the leaves to remove excess water and drain them on a wire rack or towel. Packaged spinach can be stored a day or two without washing,

but wash it before using. For crisp leaves, keep spinach cold and moist. Store spinach in a plastic bag or a damp cloth in the refrigerator.

FRESH SPINACH SALAD 1 ten or 12 oz. package or 1 pound bunch fresh spinach (wash dried and chilled)

OPTIONAL INGRE-DIENTS: Hard cooked eggs, mushrooms, ham, water chestnuts and black olives. Tear spinach leaves into bite size pieces in a large bowl. Cook bacon in a skillet over low heat until crisp. Remove bacon from skillet and drain on paper towl. Saute green onions in bacon drippings just until tender. Several aphids infest small grains. The greenbug is the major small grain pest. In most years, damaging populations develop throughout the area. However an individual producer may not need to apply control measures for greenbugs every year.

Greenbugs develop in large numbers under certain conditions and may cause economic losses. In some cases, entire fields of grain are lossed. Greenbugs suck plant juices and inject toxins into small grain plants.

During the winter, infested fields may have yellowed spots preceding the appearance of small deadened areas. Later, greenbugs in these spots may increase and spread throughout the field. Greenbugs cause more damage when small grain crops suffer from deficient moisture during midwinter and cool spring.

The greenbug reproduces rapidly at temperatures bet-

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
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
