

HALL OF REMARKS

HERE WE GO again, weather forecasters were predicting a chance of snow or freezing rain for the Cisco area Friday morning and also on Saturday. The first part of this week had been really nice with sunshine and warm temperatures.

LOCAL PUBLIC school held open houses this week and a good number of interested parents turned out to view some of their children's work.

IF YOU READ the article which was reprinted from the Star Telegram, in last Wednesday's edition of The Cisco Press concerning the aligning of the planets, then you might find an article by Bob Miller in The Hamilton Herald-News of equal interest.

Mr. Miller's column "Full Circle" is reprinted as follows:

"Next Wednesday, March 10, 1982, Earth and the other planets will all be on the same side of the sun. This is called "The Grand Alignment" despite the fact that they won't all be in a straight line. Actually, they will be within a 95 degree angle, extending out from the sun in a single direction.

"It happens only once in every 179 years that all the known planets in the solar system end up on the same side of the sun. This affords prophets of doom a rare opportunity to prophesy a catastrophe for the world, and they are not missing the opportunity.

"Some religious organizations have linked the alignment with Biblical references to the end of the world.

"Most scientists deny that anything disastrous will happen, but some scientists are wary. They fear that the combined gravitational pull of the other eight planets on one side of the sun will cause some weird things to occur. They predict increased sunspot activity, higher solar winds, a change in the earth's magnetic field, different air circulation patterns, a change in the earth's rotation and potentially disastrous earthquakes.

"I'm not exactly frightened, but I'm going to get up early next Wednesday and read the obituary column to see if I'm in it.

"Seeking reassurance, I did a little calculating. I figured that history ought to indicate what the "Grand Alignment" means to earthlings, so I traced history back to the time of Christ in chronologies of important events. It was the year 1803 when the alignment of planets happened 179 years ago, and 1824 when it last happened before that. In 179-year increments, the other important years were 1445, 1266, 1087, 908, 729, 550, 371, 192, and 13 A.D.

"If nothing cataclysmic happened in any of these years, it seems reasonable to deduce that the Grand Alignment isn't likely to cause anything catastrophic this year.

"Amazingly, only four of the years listed were even mentioned in the four different historical chronologies I examined. In the year 550 A.D. Justinian's missionaries smuggled silkworms out of China. In the year 1087 William the Conqueror died. In the year 1624 Cardinal de Richelieu became the chief minister of Louis XIII. And in the year 1803, the United States made the Louisiana Purchase from France.

"Those stolen silkworms may have had a more profound effect on world history than any of the other events, but the Louisiana Purchase appears to me to be the only true catastrophe in the string of Grand Alignment years.

"Under the terms of the purchase, the United States paid \$15 million for 827,000 square miles of land extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the Canadian border. That's less than three cents an acre.

"The disaster is that I didn't get in on the deal."

Don't Hinder Fire Fighters In Their Work, Police Warn

State laws regulating persons driving or appearing in the area of fires will be strictly enforced, Acting Police Chief Raymond Blevins reported Friday.

Fire Marshal Bill Webb reported that the Cisco Fire Department was unable to drive their fire truck near a burning house recently because several cars had gone to the scene, blocking the street. Firemen had to locate the drivers and have them move before fire fighting equipment could begin work.

"Fortunately, this was not a serious fire but the damage would have been less if we could have started to work without delay," he said. Chief Blevins quoted sections of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws as follows:

"The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than 500 feet or drive into or park such vehicle within the block where the fire apparatus has stopped to answer an alarm.

"No driver of a vehicle, except a driver on official business, may follow closer than 500 feet behind an ambulance when the flashing red lights or the ambulance are operating. No driver of a vehicle may drive or park his vehicle at a place where an ambulance has been summoned for an emergency call in a manner calculated to interfere with the arrival or departure of the ambulance.

"No driver or a car or vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on any street, private driveway, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the fire department official in command."

"We're going to start issuing violation tickets to those not obeying these laws," the chief said.

Scranton Musical Is Set

The Scranton musical will be held Saturday night, March 6, beginning at 7:00 at the Scranton Community Center. All area musicians are invited.

A school's expenditures turn over several times each month in the community it serves, indicating that the sum \$3,739,878 generates considerably more business - possibly three times that much.

The CJC budget for the current year anticipates collecting some \$2,190,188 in state funds, including \$1,028,342 in state appropriations for approved academic courses and \$1,104,822 for ap-

proved vocational-technical courses.

Other income will include some \$6,700 in federal funds, \$489,478 in tuition and fees, \$115,000 in local taxes and some \$124,000 in assorted other income. Auxiliary enterprises, including athletics, transportation, the bookstore, student center operations, cafeteria and dormitories, will bring in another \$563,000. And student aid income will total around \$250,000.

Thanks to the Rockwell Foundation and to donations to the CJC Memorial Fund, the college has some \$200,000 in a special President's Reserve Fund - money in an uncommitted reserve controlled by the Board of Regents. In addition, the Endowment Reserve amounts to more than \$200,000.

The President's Reserve and the Endowment Reserve Funds earned nearly \$80,000

in interest income last year - money used largely for scholarships. This money is kept invested in high yield securities and certificates of deposit.

College Is Area's Biggest Business

tion in general academic courses and \$736,372 for instruction and other costs in the vocational-technical school. The total payroll for instruction amounts some \$1,500,000.

Maner Memorial Library, with its assortment of services, expects to spend some \$63,000 during the year for operations, books and equipment.

The college expects to spend some \$320,000 on physical plant operations, including labor, upkeep, maintenance, utilities and the like. Auxiliary services cost the college about \$600,000. This includes the athletic program, transportation, the cafeteria, dormitories, bookstore and the like.

Grants and aids expenses will total some \$283,000. The college's debt service expects expenditures of \$80,720. A tax bond series

voted and issued by the college in 1982 in the amount of \$125,000 to erect the science building was paid off 12 years before maturity date. The final payroll of \$74,810 was made in 1980 from the bond reserve fund. Most of the college's debt is secured by revenue bonds that are being retired from fees.

As state aid has increased - from \$708,521 in 1973 and \$1,140,419 in 1976 to \$2,133,164 expected in the 1981-82 school year - local taxes have gone down. The current college tax rate is 22 cents per \$100 valuation - down from 50 cents in 1980.

Dr. Norman E. Wallace, president of the college, noted that an analysis of the school's statistics will show that its growth and overall usefulness to the community have increased at a steady rate over the years.

"We can't be anything but optimistic," he added. -JWS

Three Contests on Ballots For Elections Set Here April 3rd

Voters of the Cisco area will have two public school trustee contests and one college regent contest when they go to the polls on Saturday, April 3, in the annual city, school, college and hospital board elections.

All of the elections will be held at the Laguna Hotel Corral Room with a separate judge and clerks to conduct each.

The City Council ballot will list only the two incumbents - Loyal Lundstrom for Place 3 and Bobby Rains for Place 4. No other candidates had filed as the deadline passed March 3, City Secretary Ginger Johnson reported.

Members of the Council not up for election this year are Mayor Eris Ritchie and Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Ivan Webb, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Battaes.

The Cisco Independent

School District trustee election has contests for both places that are to be filled. Running for Place 6 are Eddie McMillan, Bill Kendall and Jackie A. Witt. Incumbent Roy G. Hathaway.

did not file for re-election. In the Place 7 contest, Incumbent Emmett Rich is opposed by Steve Cozart.

Hold-over trustees are Charles Humphries, Gus Smothers, Donald Gorr

Willis Parker and Johnny Cagle.

Place 2 of the Cisco Junior College board of regents is the only one of four to be filled that is contested. Incumbent Wm. E. (Bill) Austin is opposed by B.D. Trice. Lloyd McGrew of Place 1, Billy Reynolds of Place 3, and Roy Dennis of Place 5 are unopposed incumbents.

The college board has six year terms. Mr. Dennis, who was appointed to fill a vacancy, is running for the balance of a term - two years. Hold-over regents are Rudolph Schaefer of Place 4, J.D. Yardley of Place 6, Charles Preston of Place 7, Dick Woolley of Place 8, and Brad Kimbrough of Place 9.

Three candidates will be on the ballot for three vacancies on the board of the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Candidates are Emma Lee Donovan, Dr. Charles M. Cleveland and Dr. Ayres Cermin.

Dr. E.E. Addy, current board president, did not file for re-election. Bruce Stovall and Armo Chambers are hold-over board members. Absentee voting is expected to be announced soon.

There will be a meeting of interested citizens Monday night to organize a public relations campaign in behalf of the April 3rd election on the proposition of issuing bonds for water and sewer system improvements, according to an announcement.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Monday at the Laguna Hotel Corral Room.

Mayor Eris Ritchie will be present to lead a discussion and answer questions concerning the bond issue proposition. He has made several appearances before civic clubs and groups to lead discussions of the need for water and sewer system improvements.

"The campaign we plan is an effort to provide complete information that anyone might want in connection with this important community matter," a spokesman for the group told The Press. "We hope that a good crowd of concerned and interested citizens will be on hand for the meeting."

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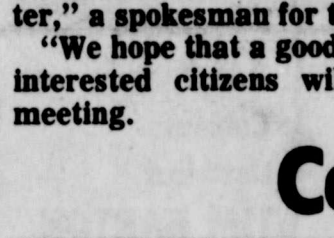

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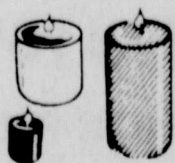

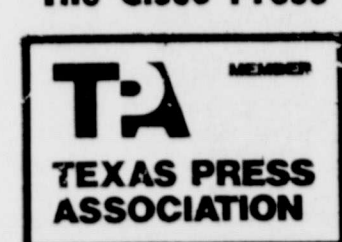

WTU Granted Interim Increase For Wholesale

West Texas Utilities Company has been granted an interim rate increase for power sold to its wholesale customers.

The increase was approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, effective February 26, 1982, and will remain in effect until final resolution of a rate application filed last October by WTU.

The interim rates granted will result in an increase of \$3.5 million, or 8.1 per cent, annually from 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality, and one investor-owned distribution system.

In its application, WTU has asked for a \$4.3 million increase to become effective December 15, 1981. The FERC initially suspended this increase for five months, which would have delayed the effective date of the new rates until May 16, 1982. Granting the interim rates has the effect of shortening the suspension period and allowing lower rates to go into effect subject to refund.

The FERC decision follows closely the increase in retail rates granted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas effective February 12. Together, the increases are expected to provide an additional revenue of \$15.3 million on an annual basis, with \$11.8 coming from retail customers and \$3.5 from wholesale customers. The original cases filed by WTU were designed to produce \$32.2 million in additional revenues.

Standards for all JCAH accreditation programs are developed with the assistance of specific advisory committees of representatives from national health care organizations. The standards are described as "optimal achievable" because they reflect the best of current thinking in the field. JCAH standards are revised periodically and new standards are often developed to keep the level of care consistent with current knowledge, techniques and/or government regulations. This ongoing process gives JCAH standards considerable validity and credibility. The JCAH survey team includes a physician, a nurse, a hospital administrator, and a laboratory technologist. This team visits the hospital and evaluates performance in 24 different areas. Such evaluation results in an educational process that aids hospital staffs in their pursuit of excellence in patient care.

Lions Hear Mayor, Endorse Bond Plan

The proposition of voting revenue bonds to finance improvements for the city's water and sewer systems was endorsed by members of the Cisco Lions Club after Mayor Eris Ritchie discussed the matter in a talk at their weekly meeting last Wednesday noon.

The election will be held Saturday, April 3, at the Corral Room on the matter of issuing revenue bonds in the amount of \$1,925,000 to pay for a new water filtration plant, water main line improvements, and a new sewage disposal plant and line extensions.

Mayor Ritchie explained that the city has made application for a federal grant that would take care of part of the cost. The city also has applied to the state for a 5.6 per cent loan from special funds for part of the needed money.

Water and sewer rates would have to go up to retire the revenue bonds, Mr. Ritchie explained.

Full details of the bond issue and financing plans will be outlined for citizens of the community at a Town Hall meeting at 7 a.m. Monday, March 22, Mr. Ritchie said. "We want everyone to have full and complete information and to vote their conviction," he added.

"It is tragic that these im-

provements were not made a good many years ago when financing was no big problem," Mr. Ritchie said. "Our needs are very real. We are the only Texas city without an approved public water supply, and the State Health Department could legally shut down our system until improvements are made."

Mr. Ritchie pointed out that the improvement plan has the unanimous backing of the City Council members. Nothing can be done until after the election, the mayor said. If approved, the city can upgrade its sewer system within a year, but 18 months or more will be needed to make the needed improvements to the water system, including the filtration plant at Lake Cisco.

Boss Lion Jack Farleigh introduced the mayor. Following his talk, Lions voted their endorsement of the project.

Mr. Farleigh reported that the club's board of directors, meeting last Tuesday morning, voted to send two band students to the annual convention of Lions International in Atlanta in late June. More than 100 musicians will represent District 2-E-1 at the convention, he added.

Lion Winston Heidenheimer was elected acting taitwister to fill a vacancy.

Steve Thomas Tells Rotary About County Tax District

Tax appraisal notices will be mailed to Eastland County advalorem taxpayers about May 1, Steve Thomas, of Cisco, chief appraiser for the new all-inclusive Eastland County Tax Appraisal District, told the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday noon. The notices, resulting from a mass re-appraisal of the county's taxable property under a law passed by the 79th Legislature of Texas, will also list the "estimated" tax to be levied under the law by each taxing authority.

Thomas emphasized that the District is not a taxing agency and that the estimates provided are not to be accepted as binding. The District's responsibility is limited to the appraisal of property under the law which requires all such to be rendered for tax purposes at "fair market value." The ultimate responsibility for setting the tax rate and the collection of taxes rests with the individual taxing authority, he explained.

But the law requires, and compliance will be supervised by the Appraisal District, that each such taxing authority collect no more than three per cent of revenue in excess of the previous year's collection under the fading system. In each case the tax rate must be scaled to insure this result, he said.

This does not mean, however, that tax rates in future years cannot be adjusted to the revenue needs that arise. But any increase, he said, must first be submitted to a public hearing, and in the event of dissatisfaction with a higher rate, it may be offered to a public vote upon petition of ten per cent of the qualified voters. If the voters approve the increase it applies, if not, it is limited to eight per cent of the previous year's revenue.

If the tax payer is dissatisfied with the "fair market value" placed upon his or her property, appeal can be made to an appraisal Review Board of three men, now in process of appointment. The three tentatively chosen are from Eastland, Rising Star and Ranger. Final resort can be made to the courts.

Seven persons make up the tax appraisal district directorate. It hired an experienced firm of appraisers out of Hereford, Texas, to make the evaluation of all county property which is binding upon all taxing agencies.

All "entitlement" benefits in effect, or applicable, such as homestead exemptions, exemptions by reason of age, etc., will remain frozen no matter what taxable value is placed upon the person's property, Thomas explained. Thus those who paid no

taxes in past years by virtue of such exemptions - of as much as \$15,000 for persons 65 and over - will pay none under the new valuations. He suggested that taxpayers who had been entitled to such exemptions but had neglected to file for them, make immediate application to the appraisal office. He also warned that the exemptions will continue only at the pleasure of the next Legislatures.

About 20,000 pieces of property are under re-appraisal in the county.

Under the new law business inventories are included in taxable assets, Thomas pointed out, and within a short while each business will be visited by a representative of the appraisal district with rendition forms upon which such property may be entered at the wholesale prices paid for it. If the representative is refused admittance, a figure representing the "normal value" of the inventory in question can be entered by the district. It may be, he warned, considerably in excess of what would otherwise be listed.

All property is being valued on a scale from 0 to 7.5. Thus storage houses, etc., will take a rate different from residences on the same site, and the age and quality of homes and other buildings will be governing.

A process of continuing re-appraisal at four-year intervals will insure an overall equity in renditions, Thomas explained, while all substantial additions to properties are required to be registered. Each piece of property, its description, history, appraisal figures and so forth will be listed in massive card record systems from which reports required by the State can be made.

Land renditions can be made on the basis of fair market value or agricultural use, a choice governed by regulations obtainable at the appraisal office at Eastland. Thomas urged land owners to proceed at once with the establishment of "open space values" upon their acreages under these rules, if they have not already done so.

Thomas was presented by Billy Wright, program chairman for the day.—BAB

Two Trucks and Car Have Wreck Near Putnam

Billy Hughes received a broken right leg in the accident and Bobby Johnson required stitches in his right forearm. They were both taken to E.L. Graham Hospital by Pafford Ambulance Service of Cisco.

Department of Public Safety Officer Phillip Dean reported a Continental Trailways bus stopped to offer shelter to the injured while awaiting the ambulance and that several 18-wheel trucks blocked the interstate to prevent more accidents from happening.

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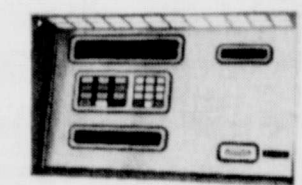
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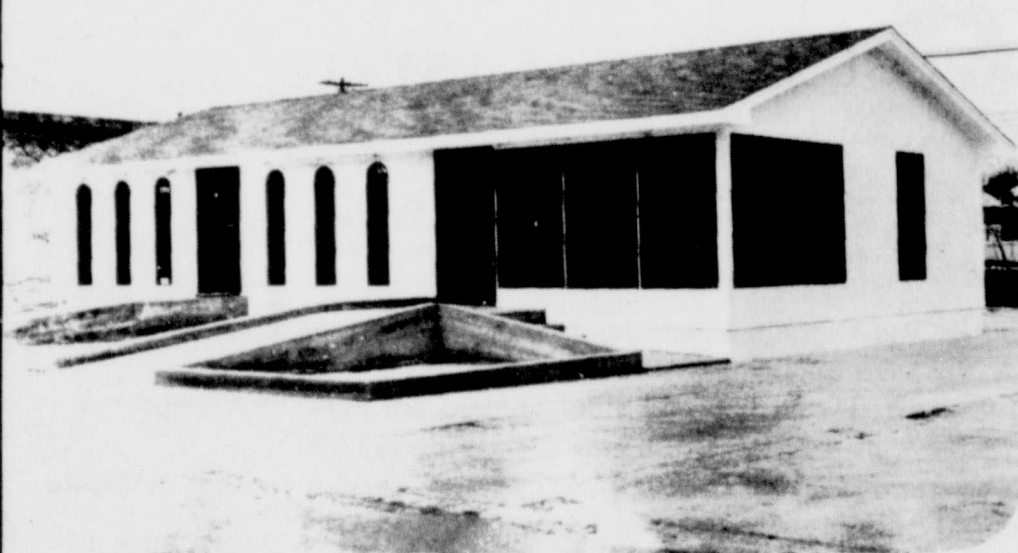

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New Dreams..... For An Old House

A stately old concrete home in Cisco has a new lease on life. For a young couple, Dianna and Gerry Webb, have begun a restoration process which will take, according to Gerry, "About seven years."

It couldn't be happening to a more deserving old house. For this is the same model the 1908 Sears Roebuck catalogue advertised as "A handsome 9 room concrete residence, which could not be duplicated for \$3,000 if built in the old fashioned way with natural finished stone, but can be built according to our free plans and specifications for \$1,995.00."

A picture beside the words showed this two-story home, complete with a full basement underneath and an attic above the second floor. An attractive porch graced the front, and a tin roof sloped to a peak on top.

Mr. Jessie Penn, a rancher, did more than just look at the "wish book", as catalogues were called in those days. He ordered the Sears kit, and had it delivered to about one acre of land which he had bought from W.J. Donovan in a desirable northwest part of town. This was beside the main highway to Abilene.

There was nothing strange about ordering a Sears House kit in those days, for Sears had about 100 house plans consisting of the proper material cut to specifications. There was even a "money back" guarantee if the purchaser was not satisfied with the final results! Probably no one was ever dissatisfied, for about 50 various types of these Sears originals still stand across Texas, and their value has increased tremendously.

The results of careful workmanship on the Sears kit purchased by Penn are still seen on the 300 Bicok of Ave. I. There workmen made the concrete blocks by hand right on the property, and constructed the home according to directions. The house has withstood heat and cold, sunlight and shadow for more than 70 years.

The Webbs hope to return the house to its original condition, which means putting

a porch back in front, and re-painting the concrete blocks brown. Inside, there will be a slight reshuffling of room, but the spaciousness and beauty of the place will be retained. Furnishings for the house will eventually correspond to the era of its construction. The grounds will be fenced, and the lot planted with pin oaks, weeping willows, and fruit trees. The large pecan trees in front will be saved. Flower gardens, vegetable gardens, and gazebo will be added.

"Oh, we have a lot of dreams," Gerry smiles. Gerry is well equipped to carry out those dreams, for he - like his father Jim Webb - is a professional builder. Cisco has been his home all his life, with his parents living on Country Club Ridge. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Webb, and Mr. and Mrs. Arlin Bint, all live in the Cisco area.

Dianna, daughter of the L.E. Tiptons of Cisco, had a background somewhat different from that of Gerry. Her father was in the military service for a number of years, and her family lived in a number for foreign countries. They had no opportunity to establish a permanent home until retirement and the move to Cisco.

Gerry actually bought the Penn house and moved into about three years ago, after checking it over and finding that the structure was basically sound. The insides, however, were in a bad state of repair. After the death of his wife, Nina, Penn had eventually transferred the property to a relative. Upon Jessie Penn's death in the 1950's the house had been rented and finally left vacant.

By the time Gerry and Dianna were married, in August 1981, Gerry had the interior of the house arranged comfortably. Since his purchase of the home has replaced the plumbing and electrical wiring, sheetrocked the inside walls downstairs, painted the woodwork and rearranged some of the floor plan. His current projects are building kitchen cabinets and rebuilding the upstairs, which will contain bedrooms

and a bath. He plans to use stained glass in some of the windows, and put other original touches on the property. Fortunately the leaded glass in the bay window in front was spared by vandals, although they broke out a number of other windows.

Gerry has discovered some unusual features about the house, and a lot of aspect for the good quality of its original materials. The structure is not framed at all, but supported by the concrete bricks and mortar. These bricks, about 8 by ten inches in size, were made with round gravel, and were covered with brown stucco. The floors are building of heavy pine boards, and are as sound and even as the day they were put in. The graceful winding staircase, as well as the doors and window frames, appear to be hardwood. The house was built to be heated by wood stoves, and the central chimney is sturdy and serviceable. Gerry thinks he may put it to use by constructing a fireplace in the basement, and diverting heat into various rooms.

Unfortunately Sears no longer handles its "house kits", having decided that this part of its mail order business was unprofitable. So there will be no more houses like the Webbs. But obviously Dianna and Gerry are not going to ask for any "money back" from Sears! "I love this place," Dianna says. "I never want to live anywhere else."

AUSTIN, TEXAS

The people of Texas want all children to grow up without undue want or fear and to have a family environment that provides them security, love and protection.

Child abuse and neglect continues to be a problem for some children in the State of Texas. The formation of the first County Child Welfare Board in 1932 was a positive step in resolving this problem by local citizens. The Texas Legislature authorized the establishing of these boards when it created the Division of Child Welfare in 1931.

At present, there are 172 County Child Welfare Boards operating in the State of Texas in liaison with and support of the Child Protective Services work of the Texas Department of Human Resources. This involves more than a thousand Texans who volunteer their time and services to assist children in need.

The Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards, its affiliate Regional Councils and County Child Welfare Boards have undertaken to create greater public awareness of the needs of abused and neglected children and how this tragic problem might be eliminated.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby call attention to the observance of 1982 as A YEAR OF CONCERN BY TEXANS FOR ABUSED AND NEGLECTED CHILDREN by the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards, its affiliate Regional Councils and County Child Welfare Boards and urge all state and local officials, public and voluntary agencies and private groups to give special awareness to the needs of and work to improve services and care for abused and neglected children and their families.

Background on Child Abuse and Neglect

At least 110 children died of abuse or neglect in Texas in the year ending August 31, 1981. The Texas Department of Human Resources received 47,340 reports of suspected abuse or neglect involving nearly 59,000 children from September 1980 through August 1981.

Being a parent is not easy as having a child. Mothers are especially exposed to a complete change in life style and to situations demanding much of their time and attention, often without apparent reward. The results can be depression, anger, tension, and stress.

Child abuse is a complex human problem. Factors related to child abuse are:

1. Stress, such as that caused by unemployment and financial difficulties.
2. Lack of skills in coping with life.
3. Lack of training in child care, including unrealistic expectations of children.
4. Absence of one parent from the home, which places stress on the remaining parent.
5. Isolation from family, friends, neighbors, or other caring people, and lack of access to community services which might be helpful.
6. Alcohol abuse, drug abuse, legal problems, and overcrowded or inadequate housing.
7. Children with handicaps, illness in infancy, and premature or low birth weight infants, which can prevent the formation of a nurturing, loving bond between some parents and children.
8. Parents who themselves were abused or neglected as children.

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Precautions needed to prevent children's accidents

COLLEGE STATION-- Accidents - they're a major cause of death among school-age children.

Car-pedestrian accidents, drownings, fire-related mishaps and firearm accidents are four major death-causing misfortunes among young children, says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist.

Even though the death rate from injurious accidents has declined in recent years, among children ages 5-14, accidents are responsible for more than half the deaths of boys and two-fifths of girls' deaths.

Consequently, children as well as adults should be aware of safety precautions and learn to follow them as a matter of habit, she adds.

Welch is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

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CAR-PEDESTRIAN ACCIDENTS

Motor-vehicle accidents rank highest in terms of cause of death for boys and girls, the specialist reports.

Pedestrian fatalities account for one in every two deaths in car accidents involving children ages five to nine and one out of four at ages 10-14, she adds.

Most pedestrian fatalities occur when children are playing in or crossing the street, Welch notes.

Some precautions to help prevent car-pedestrian accidents are:

- * help children watch for cars when cross streets,
- * teach children to ride bikes safely,
- * find areas away from streets for children to play and
- * urge children to wear belts when riding in cars.

DROWNINGS

The threat of drowning has always haunted parents when children are swimming, the specialist says.

Drowning ranked second among boys and girls in accidents causing death, Welch reports.

To reduce the chances of children drowning, Welch urges parents to:

- * have children take swimming lessons both for pleasure and protection,
- * have an adult swimmer or lifeguard watch children when swimming and
- * make sure safety float lines or rescue rings are readily handy.

FIRES

Fire and fire-related accidents ranked second among causing death in girls and third in boys, the specialist points out.

Careless smoking and children playing with matches and lighters are the ma-

ior causes of one out of every five fires, she says.

To prevent fires from occurring, Welch says children should:

- * know that matches and lighters are not toys,
- * learn what should be done in case a fire occurs and
- * never be left alone in a house if they are very young.

In addition, adults need to make sure fire-hazardous articles are out of sight and reach of children, the specialist says.

FIREARMS Accidents involving firearms are another major

cause of death in school-age children, Welch says.

Firearm accidents appear more frequently among boys than girls, she reports.

In addition, a large percentage of firearm deaths occur in the home instead of outside, the specialist adds.

Consequently, to prevent accidents with guns from occurring in the home, Welch suggests that:

- * if firearms must be kept in the house, keep them unloaded at all times,
- * ammunition should be locked in a different place from guns and

* children should not be allowed to handle a gun until they receive proper training.

In addition to a large number of fatalities, accidents can cause permanent impairment, disability and time away from school to young children, Welch says.

In order to prevent possible accidents from occurring, parents should take the precautions listed seriously and teach their children to become aware of making safety a habit, the specialist urges.

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STORM WINDOWS



GORDON SPOT

At this time of the year, lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the growing season, which is just around the corner.

Scalping a lawn in late winter serves to revitalize it and promote spring and summer plant growth. Begin this operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower one-half inch below the normal setting. Then, mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other and remove the clippings after each mowing.

To keep crabgrass, grasshoppers and other unsightly weeds from appearing, apply a pre-emergence herbicide (weed killer) in early part of March. The pre-emergence herbicides will only control annual grass and weeds - those that come up from seeds each year. Daethal (DCPA) and Balan (Benfen) are examples of commonly used pre-emergence herbicides. When applied properly, these chemicals form a barrier in the soil that will prevent the

germination of any seed. This barrier must be in place before the weed seed begins to germinate in order to get control.

The chemical barrier formed by the herbicide usually lasts from 60 to 120 days, depending on the soil and environmental conditions. Since some weeds may continue to germinate through spring and early summer, it may be necessary to make a second application in early summer to get season-long control.

Any lawn maintenance operation that stirs the soil such as dethatching and aeration may cause the chemical barrier to be broken and allow weeds to germinate. For that reason, it may be well to plan these operations before the pre-emergence herbicide is applied.

Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use, but should only be used according to instructions on the label. If you apply her-

bicides and fertilizer separately, wait until April to apply the fertilizer.

On March 8, the topics will be economics of production, marketing and the new peanut program. On March 15, the topics will be recommended production practices, such as fertilizers, seeding, weed control and insect control.

Neatly wrapped in their own package, eggs are nature's own convenience food. They're great for meals and snacks any time of the day - any season of the year. Texas produces over three billion eggs a year and ranks eighth in the nation in egg production.

SELECTION
In Texas, all eggs must be graded before being sold. The grading and packing procedures help ensure good quality eggs in the store.

Egg grade is determined by yolk and shell condition, egg white thickness and air cell size. Interior quality measurements are deter-

mined by a candling process which enables a grader to see inside the egg. Eggs are divided into three grades: AA, A & B; but you seldom see grade B eggs in Texas stores.

Select eggs grades according to intended use. All grades are appropriate for most purposes, but AA makes more attractive poached or fried eggs and may be best for special dishes such as souffles. All grades are equally nutritious.

Egg prices are influenced by grade, but mostly affected by size. The most common sizes are extra large, large and medium, but sizes range from jumbo to pee wee. Generally, recipes are based on large eggs, but other sizes may sometimes be more economical. Select egg size according to family needs or preferences.

There are several ways to compute unit price to determine the best egg size to buy within the same grade. But, the difference in unit price may be minimal and not worth the computation time and effort. In any size or grade, eggs are economical when you compare the cost per pound to other protein-rich foods.

NUTRITION
Eggs are a nearly perfect food because they contain all nutrients except vitamin C and are an excellent source of iron, phosphorus, magnesium and vitamins A, B, D & E. Although a good source of protein and fat, eggs are low in calories. They are popular for low calorie diets because one egg has only about 80 calories.

Like more foods of animal origin, eggs contain cholesterol - a substance needed for many normal body functions. Unless you are on a low-cholesterol diet, you will find eggs a wholesome, completely digestible food.

PREPARATION
Eggs are delicious eaten alone as omelets, fried or deviled eggs. They are also valuable ingredients in many recipes. Eggs add color, richness, flavor and nutrition to cakes, pies, breads, salads, casseroles and other foods. Keep eggs on hand for quick meals any time of the day.

Although eggs are easy to cook, incorrect cooking can make them tough, unattractive and difficult to digest. Follow these basic principles for perfectly prepared eggs.

Use a low to moderate cooking temperature for a tender, smooth texture. Eggs cooked too fast, too long and at too high a temperature will be tough, rubbery and usually discolored.

When hardcooking eggs, (often incorrectly called boiled eggs), keep the water temperature below boiling and do not overcook. Cool the eggs quickly and thoroughly. The result is a tender egg without a dark circle around the yolk.

Allow eggs to warm to room temperature for a while before beating yolks or whites for products such as meringues or souffles. More air can be beaten into the mixture for a fluffier product. Always use clean bowls and utensils.

When folding egg white into a mixture, use an under and over motion instead of a stirring motion to maintain the air needed for fluffy products.

When combining egg whites with a hot mixture, pour the mixture slowly into the beaten eggs, stirring constantly. This prevents the hot mixture from cooking the eggs upon contact and creating lumps.

STORAGE
To keep eggs fresh at home, refrigerate them with the pointed end down in the carton. The container helps retain the carbon dioxide which preserves freshness and prevents the eggs from absorbing odors. Eggs will keep for several weeks, although they gradually lose their freshness. But, less fresh eggs are satisfactory for most cooking purposes.

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Crop Insurance deadline is rapidly approaching

The deadline is rapidly approaching for Eastland County farmers who want to carry Insurance against the possible loss of their cotton and grain sorghum crops.

All Risk-Crop Insurance District Director, Ardell M. Kalmbach points out applications to insure spring planted crops must be received by March 15, 1982. Congress has made a number of changes to make the Insurance more attractive and affordable. One such change is a Federal government subsidy of up to 30 percent of the Insurance premium.

A second change enables farmers who document yield records to obtain production guarantees that are based on their individual yield histories.

Still another change, Kalmbach says, it's opportunity to substitute private hail and fire insurance for the hail and fire coverage included in the All-Risk policy. When this option is chosen, the All-Risk Insurance premium is reduced.

WEED CONTROL IN HOME GARDENS

What is the best way to control weeds in the vegetable garden? This is a question that home gardeners often ask when warm weather and spring rains cause a flourish of unwanted weeds to invade their home gardens.

Most home gardeners realize the importance of controlling weeds. A weed is any plant growing where it is not wanted. Weeds are very strong competitors for moisture and nutrients from the soil and for sunlight. Weeds gradually compete much stronger than most vegetables. For this reason, land which is suitable for growing vegetables will often produce a healthy crop of weeds.

Of the several methods which can be used to control weeds in home gardens, probably the least desirable is chemical herbicides. Herbicides are extremely useful when used properly. Herbicides are not desirable in home gardens because the chemicals will control the weeds and will also control the desired crop. Most herbicides are effective on specific weeds at specific rates on specific crops and most home gardeners have several kinds of vegetables growing in a small area. Few companies have herbicides registered for use on home gardens or in lots small enough for garden use.

The best way to control weeds in the home vegetable garden is by means of a "hoe-icide". A sharp hoe is the gardeners best friend. Most home gardens are small enough to be effectively weeded manually. The larger the area, of course, the more difficult it is to remove weeds manually. Mechanical removal of weeds should be practiced regularly and should be done when weeds are small.

Fortunately there are some techniques which can be used to control weeds. One of the best weed control techniques which can be used on both small and large gardens is mulching. A layer of organic mulch applied thick enough to leave a 3 inch deep layer. A 3 inch layer of mulch will not prevent the seeds from germinating, however, it will prevent many of the seedlings of smaller weeds from reaching the light.

The selection of a mulching material for weed control is very important. Any gardener who has used common bermudagrass as a mulch realizes the importance of using mulch that is free of weed seeds.
