

Diamond Can Be Chipped

The diamond, the hardest smaller quantities. substance known, can be jeweler, told the Cisco Club in a Rotary 'classification' talk Thursday noon.

Otherwise, he said, it would not be made into the beautiful stones one buys in rings and other jewelry. The 'cutting' is done by taking skilled advantage of a natural graining which exists in all diamonds and by polishing it on wheels of diamond dust.

The diamond crystal, he explained, is cubic and generally eight-sided in shape and the grain runs parallel to the sides. The size and facets, or faces, of the finished stone are determined by the character and quality of the rough gem, and splitting, if necessary, is accomplishing by locating the trend of the grain, notching it with a diamond powdered saw, and then sharply striking the selected line of clevage with special

Faceting, to realize the greatest potential brilliance of the gem, is done with special grinders. It was once done by hand and not always very efficiently. Today's grinders accurately position a selected number of facets in each circle of the gem. A flat surface at the top admits light to be reflected through

the encircling facets. There are three principal cuts, said Anderson - the European, the British, which has a larger flat top, and the marquise, the latter an elliptical shape used where an occasional flaw in a large stone would prohibit a maximum cut in the other styles.

Diamonds are measured in carats of 100 points. The carat is the largest of popular sizes in which prices are stablilized and assured marketability is a consideration. Persons investing in stones of larger sizes would find their market limited and prices subject to negotiation. Diamond prices have not fluctuated, he said, but have risen steadily over

the years. Responding to a question as to where diamonds might be purchased unmounted for investment, Anderson said he didn't know where such stones could be bought in

"But if I were buying diamonds ment," he said, "I think I would invest in gems of smaller sizes, say 10, 20 or 30 points. You would find a more ready market for stones in that range.'

Diamonds come in a wide range of quality, determined by clarity, brilliance, etc., and an even wider range of prices, he said. They also come in a variety of colors which have to do with their power of reflecting light. Stones of the lower quality are largely used in industry, including their employment in the cutting surfaces of oil well drilling bits. Here too, he said, there is a considerable price range.-BAB



This project was first considered some 15 years ago and had come up several times since, he said. It has been postponed each time for one reason or another.

The state now has funding for the project and plans to pave an additional eight feet on each side plus the installation of curb, Mr. Haun said. This will give the street 52 feet, enough for four lanes of traffic. It will be necessary for

electric, telephone, gas and some water lines to be moved, Mr. Haun said. A meeting of utility company officials was scheduled at 9:30 a.m. Thursday at the city manager's office to discuss the project. Mr. Haun said he would



They have two grandchildren Vicki J. Green a nurse from Memphis, Tenn. and Tim Green a Senior at Lee High School in Midland.



DPS Trooper Candidates May Substitute For Hours

Colonel Jim Adams, Department of Public Safety director, announced today that "effective with the June recruit class, DPS trooper candidates may substitute law enforcement-related experience for the current educational requirement of 60 college hours. Thus, applicants with two years of commissioned law enforcement experience or two years of honorable active military service would be eligible for a waiver of the two year college requirement. Likewise, one year of such qualifying experience could be substituted for one year college work.

This temporary modification is intended to increase the reservoir of qualified applicants yet ensure a continuance of the high personal standards which have been the hallmark of the Department's success."

'An evaluation of the results of the temporary modification of educational requirements will be conducted to determine whether a continuation is justified." Colonel Adams said the DPS hopes to recruit 268 new troopers this year, including



Pest Alert

ROSE CULTURE

With spring just around the corner and recent spring like weather, interest in flower gardening and yard work is on the upswing. One enjoyable and rewarding form of flower gardening is rose gardening.

Successful rose gardening requires intensive management. However, with hard work and diligence the results can be rewarding. Beautiful roses are the result of proper cultural practices and preventative measures taken early in the growing season.

Rose culture begins with pruning in the early spring when new shoots are 1/4 inch long. Remove all dead wood and shorten the remaining braches by one third.

Roses are heavy users of nutrients and require regular applications of fertilizer for optiumum growth. Begin fertilizer application with new growth in the spring

Area soils tend to be alkaline, which tends to encourage iron chlorosis. This is a condition where leaves turn yellow and drop. It is due to an iron deficiency. Application of an iron chelate will cure this problem.

Now that your roses are off to a good start, you want to make sure that roses are the end result. To insure this, pest problems must be prevented or controlled.

The major pest problems of roses or diseases. The two major diseases of roses are blackspot and powdery mildew. These diseases should be prevented rather than attempting to control them after they occur.

Begin the spray schedule as soon as new growth commences in the spring and repeat applications at inter-

vals of 7 to 10 days throughout the growing season. The most recommended chemicals for prevention of both diseases are Benlate and Folpet.

Blackspot can be distinguished from other spots by the dark colored spot which is often surrounded by a yellow halo. Powdery mildew is characterized by foliage which appears to have been dusted with flour. Younger leaves also have a tendency to curl upperward.

The major insect pests of roses are aphids, thrips and spider mites. Aphids and thrips are usually a problem in the early season. They may be controlled with Diazinon, Cygon, Defend or Meta-Systok-R. Spider mites tend to be more of a problem later in the season when the weather is hot and dry. The best chemical for control of spider mites is Kelthane. Insects should be treated on as needed basis.

Follow recommended cultural practices and apply preventive fungicides for beautiful and healthy roses. For more information contact your County Extension Office.

Homemaking Hints By Janet Thomas

This year, many people will buy more ceiling fans for homes and businesses, and from all expectations, they'll make a big difference in energy savings for spring and summer.

Families will be setting thermostats from 76-80 and turning on the fan - to find they're still comfortable and have air-conditioning savings of from 18-25%. One of the best reason for a fan is money!!!

One major electric utility company says that a one-ton air conditioner costs about 10 cents per hour to operate. A fan costs less than a penny per hour to operate.

You don't have to be a whiz in math to figure the difference - 10 hours of one or the other can add up to either a dollar or a dime.

Of course, fans don't actually lower room temperature, but the constant breeze makes you feel

The cost of having a ceiling fan installed can sometimes run as much as the actual cost of the fan, so be sure to consider this before buying.

Some fans have only a few instructions on installation, but others are complete with pictures, so it's possible to install the fan yourself.

Be sure to pick up the instructions when you buy the fans, and read them careful-

Manufacturers will tell you if fans can be installed on ceilings as low as eight feet. They usually say mount the fan to a standard three or four-inch function box securely anchored to support 45 pounds.

and runnig power to it. Another easy way to get power to the fan is to hang the fan as it if were a swag lamp, draping the power cord through a chain to the nearest wall, then down the wall to a plug. There are swag kits available for this

purpose. In deciding which way to go, remember that the first method mentioned really is the easiest way - using an existing ceiling fixture. With this method, the competent do-it-yourselfer can easily install a ceiling fan in an hour or two.

February drilling report

AUSTIN, Tex., March 5--Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 107 gas and 44 oil discoveries in February 1982.

One year ago, 118 gas and 62 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the second month of the year included 35 in deep South Texas, 20 in Southeast Texas, 15 in West Central Texas, 12 in East Texas, 11 in the Refugio area, seven in the Midland area, three in the San Angelo area, and one each in East Central Texas, the Panhandle, North Texas, and the Refugio area

Oil discoveries included 10 in the San Angelo area, eight in deep South Texas, six each in Southeast Texas, East Texas, and North Texas, three in East Central Texas, two each in the Panhandle and the San Antonio area, and one in the Lubbock area.

In February, operators reported 534 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2.279 in February amounted to 2,571 against 3,315 a year earlier.

Operators filed 770 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 670 amended requests.

Windfall tax exemptions not easy to implement

Some oil royalty owners have indicated that the Internal Revenue Service has not properly implemented their 2-bd exemptions from the windfall tax. Congress intended for the IRS to allow royalty owners from doing


Senator Bensten has objected strongly to this situation in a letter to Treasury Secretary Donald Regan. He gives the example of two neighbors in Texas who own royalty interests, one of 1.9 barrels per day, the other 2.1 barrels. The first can file the exemption certificate and no windfall taxes will be withheld. The other, according to IRS, must wait up to 16 months in order to receive a refund.

The IRS has been urged to payments by the value of the uncertified exemption.



The motion asks the Tax to be overturned on three constitutional grounds:

1. The U.S. Constitution requires that excise taxes be levied uniformly, but crude oil production from parts of Alaska is exempt.

2.The Constitution prohibits taking private property for public use without just compensation, but the tax constitutes a blatant confiscation of private property, and imposes an unprecedented burden on a small minority of the popula-

3. Energy independence and the reduction of crude imports have repeatedly been cited as the fundamental purposes for adoption of the tax, but every major economic analysis of the tax shows it has had precisely the opposite effect. Since the tax defeats the purpose for which it was adopted, it fails to meet even the most minimal standard of due process as required by the fifth amendment of the Constitution.

The U.S. Government also filed motions which must be answered by April 16th. A formal court hearing on the arguments is expected to be held shortly after that date.

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## USDA peanut poundage quota regulations for the 1982 crop

Washington, March 5 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed regulations for reducing state and farm peanut poundage quotas — as required under the 1981 farm act — and has requested public comment on the proposals.

The deadline for recieving comments is March 23.

Under the proposals, each state would receive the same pro rata share of the 1.2 million-abort-ton 1982 national poundage quota it had of the 1981 quota, according to Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

USDA would then establish a preliminary poundage quota for each farm that had an allotment in 1981, Rank said. Current law requires individual farm quotas be reduced based on the farm's production characteristics during the 1979-81 crop base period.

"We propose to divide peanut farms into three priority categories," Rank said. "After the division, USDA will reduce individual poundage quotas based on the priorities.

"Category 1 would include farms with inadequate tillable cropland to produce the poundage quotas; category 2, farms on which the quotas were not fully produced in at least 2 of the last 3 years; and category 3, would include quotas on all other farms."

Under law, any peanuts produced on a farm without a poundage quota or in excess of the farm poundage quota will be classified as additional peanuts and must be contracted for export or crushing by April 15, or placed in the price support loan pool for additional peanuts.

Rank said USDA will determine cumulative undermarketings for each farm, including undermarketings not used in 1980 and 1981. Under the proposal, these undermarketings could be carried over on a farm until used or until the 1981 farm act expires after the 1985 crop.

Undermarketings would be subject to a national car-

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ryover limitation of 10 percent of the national poundage quota, Rank said.

Under the proposal, farmers would be permitted to transfer their quotas – by lease or sale – within their county, Rank said. In addition, farmers who had a quota in 1981 would be permitted to transfer therir quotas to other farms they own or control, either within the county or to a farm in an adjoining county within the state.

be permitted to transfer their quotas to other farms they own or operate in nonadjoining counties in eight states: Arizona, Arkansas, California, Louisiana, Mississippi, Misiouri, New Mexico and Tennessee.

Rank said farmers would

All Transfers would be on a pound-for-pound basis with no productivity adjustments, Rank said.

Rules for identifying marketings, assessing marketing penalties and handling violations will be issued later, Rank said.

## Congressman Stenholm unveils marketing plan

WASHINGTON, D.C-With farm prices falling to pre-Depression era levels, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm recently unveiled a voluntary orderly marketing plan-dubbed the 20-10-20 Plan-to deal with glutted markets and depressed commodity prices.

"When adjusted for inflation, today's agricultural income levels are far below even those of the Depression days," Stenholm said, "with net farm income estimated at only \$8.4 billion (in constant 1967 dollars) last year, compared to \$12 billion in 1929.

"The opening salvo of the plan that we are encouraging farmers to voluntarily adopt is quite simple," Stenholm told members of the Washington press March 4. "Stop selling any non-perishable crop below the cost of production."

Stenholm, along with 10 other farm state representatives who support the plan, outlined the four-point plan as follows:

1) Farmers immediately curtail all sales of nonperishable commodities at current prices.

NBC NEWS/MUSIC FM 97 RADIO ★ 24 HOURS 2) Farmers agree to participate in an orderly marketing system (20-10-10) designed to encourage market adjustments. Basically, they would place 20 percent of existing supplies into a farmer-held reserve, with the remainder of the crops to be marketed at fixed increments during the year or when market

prices permitted.

3) Farmers agree to participate in production control programs, including the Reduced Acreage Program (RAP) administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

4) An expanded effort is made to use all available resources to increase foreign and domestic sales of farm commodities at profitable prices.

"A growing number of agricultural leaders from across the nation are supporting this marketing concept," Stenholm said, calling it "the only available means farmers have at the moment to stay out of the bankruptcy courts."

## Local vets, families can get free independent claims help when DAV benefits expert visits

Local veterans and their families can take advantage of free veterans' benefits counseling and claim filing assistance when a field service unit of the nonprofit Disabled American Veterans (DAV) visits Stephenville on March 23 at the VFW Hall, Highway 281. The field service unit will also be at Brownwood on March 24 at the Community Center, Room B, on the corner of Adams and Carnegie.

The DAV's office-equipped van-manned by a highly trained veterans' benefits expert— will be located at Abilene at the DAV Home, 1030 E. 19th Street. These field service units are generally open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A third of a million veterans, their dependents and survivors have visited DAV vans during the past eight years, seeking advice and assistance encerning their benefit entitlements. As a result of these visit, DAV national service officers have filed 118,500 claims for Veterans Administration (VA) disability compensation and pension

In just the past year, the 700,000-member DAV filed for reopened approximately 10,000 claims for service-connected disability compensation on behalf of claimants visiting the field

service units. More than 1,500 claims for nonservice-connected pension were also filed or reopened, and more than 3,500 veterans visiting the vans received DAV help in obtaining VA hospital care and other health services.

Also resulting from DAV

Due to several changes in veterans' entitlements during the past year, DAV officials expect large turnouts of veterans and their families again this year as the organization's mobile service offices visit communities from coast to coast for the ninth straight year.

"People are going to have questions," explains DAV National Service Director Arthur H. Wilson. "The DAV wants to make sure veterans and their families get straight answers from experts who are on their side—who are independent of any government agency. This is particularly important at a time when the government is trying to cut back spending."

Veterans need not be members of the DAV to take advantage of this free service

NBC NEWS/MUSIC FM 97 RADIO \* 24 HOURS The project is an extension of the 62-year-old organization's National Service Program, which provides a variety of assistance at no cost to veterans and their families. Under this program, the association of wartime disabled veterans employs some 300 full-time national service officers—more than 90 percent of whom were disabled during the Vietnam War—at VA facilities across the country.

During the most recent year for which statistics are available, these veterans' benefits specialists successfully handled 189,788 individual cases, winning federal benefits totaling approximately \$858 million for veterans, their families and their survivors.

"But it's not the numbers that count," said the DAV's Wilson. "It's the people we've helped who make it all worthwhile. You'd be surprised at how many veterans and their dependents know very little about their benefit entitlements until they step into one of our mobile offices.



Veterans and their families in cities and towns across America are taking advantage of the free counseling and claims filing services provided by the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Field Service Unit program.

"Sad to say, this is particularly true of Vietnam era veterans," added the service program manager, himself a veteran of that war. "So many of these men and women were really turned off when they left the Armed Forces, and they never took advantage of their benefits and services they earned.


"While the DAV concentrates its services and disabled veterans of all periods," he added, "it's especially rewarding to see how many of these younger

veterans have visited our field service units. Like veterans of previous service periods, they've learned to trust us because the DAV is not part of the government bureaucracy, and we've worked hard for their interests."

The DAV reminded any veteran or family member who visits the van to bring the veteran's VA claim number, if available, and Social Security number. These are needed for the purpose of filing claims.







Diet is important to people of all ages, but health problems of the elderly are the result of poor nutrition.

Most people gain weight more easily as they grow older, but they need about the same amount of nutrients as younger people. This means that the elderly, in particular, should eat nurtitious food.

Exercise is also important in keeping extra pounds off. A person who is exercising can eat slightly more without gaining more weight than a person who sits most of the day.

Eating too little, however, can be harmful as well. People who do not eat enough may have less energy; they may become lonely and depressed. In addition, a diet containing too few calories is also likely to be lacking in necessary nutrients.

A "well-balanced" diet should include fresh vegetables, fresh fruits, dairy products, meat and whole grains. Eating these kinds of foods will help reduce the amount of fat and salt in the diet and help provide better health.






