Be Used April 5th

The City of Cisco's new sanitary landfill will be open to the public and operate under a recently enacted city ordinance on Monday, April 5, City Manager Mike Moore announced Tuesday. The old landfill will be closed

after Friday, April 2. The new landfill is fenced and will be open for the dumping of trash and debris three days a week - Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The old landfill will be fenced off and no longer used

after this week. Under the new landfill ordinance, any citizen of Cisco or city sanitation customer may use the landfill free of charge during the hours it is open by presenting the gatekeeper his water bill stub from the previous month indicating a sanitation charge and a valid

REST TAKE A AREA BREAK driver's license

Others may use the landfill by paying a \$10 monthly charge or one-time or occasional users will pay \$2 for dumping from a passenger car or vehicle smaller than a pickup truck. Pickups and larger vehicles will pay from \$5 to \$50 for dumping loads of debris, depending on the

A city employee will be on duty during the three days per week that the landfill is open to supervise and collect

The ordinance provides that "it shall be unlawful for any person to scavenge or carry off waste, garbage, refuse or any other item or materials from the sanitary landfill so as to violate the regulations of the Texas Department of Health." Loitering in the landfill area will not be permitted.

Violation of provisions of the ordinance will be deemed a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.

gram, if approved Saturday, will carry some "ifs." If we get the 5.6% financing from the state for \$500,000 of the project, along with most of the remaining amount at 11%, then we could begin the preliminary work within 6 months to a year. When the bonds are sold, the increase in water bills would take effect. Water bills would go up on an average of 90 to 95 percent when the project begins, and the bond payments would be largely paid off in 20 years. If we do NOT get the state financing, then we must turn to the federal agency, the Farm and Home Administration, and await and hope for their approving financing for us. Their current interest rate is 12.3%, but the rate fluctuates periodically. If this funding is used, water bills would still be approximately doubled, but the bond payments would extend to 40 years due to the higher rate of interest. If the FHA will not fund us, the project will of necessity be abandoned until such time as other funding can be arranged. We foresee no other available sources of funding, however. Naturally we are hopeful of the statefar the more desirable (2) The \$300,000 sewer

plant issue...This carries the biggest "if" of all. This proposition simply authorizes the city to proceed with its application for a federal grant through the Environmental Protection Agency, which would be a 75% federal-25% local participation program. The \$300,000 would be our share of a total project costing over a million dollars. Even if we pass this issue, we are not assured of the EPA grant. But if we do NOT pass it, then our chances of the grant are lost...and federal grants of this nature are becoming more and more scarce. If we do pass the proposition, it will be at least 1983 or 1984 before the project can begin. When and if it begins, sewer rates are scheduled to be raised approximately \$2.25 per customer per month to finance our part of the new sewer plant.

(3) The \$175,000 sewer outfall line...This is the one issue that has no "ifs" whatsoever. Should it pass, we can begin virtually immediately on constructioncertainly by summer, as all blueprints and plans are completed, and financing of the bonds has already been approved. The funding will be through the First National Bank of Cisco, at an interest rate of 11%, to be paid out over a 10 year period. When these bonds are sold. sewer rates will be increased to pay out this project in the amount of \$2.00 per customer per month.

Proponents of the codification feel that having a rule book on evidence will simplify the rules of evidence and make the rules more understandable for the judges and attorneys involved. They feel that this will help prevent errors in

evidence rulings which often result in costly and time consuming appeals. These appeals, in turn, further clog our court system.

The Federal court system and many states use codified rules of evidence. The proposed draft follows the format of the Federal Code while retaining the Texas rules of evidence.

The committee is composed of legislators, appeals and district court judges, prosecutors, plaintiff's attorneys and defense attorneys. Serving on the committee in my area are attorney Rusty Duncan of Denton, Judge Charles Murray of Fort Worth, District attorney Tim Curry of Fort Worth and myself. The committee has been meeting for the last several months and are trying to have a draft of proposed rules ready by the State Bar Convention scheduled for June 29 through July 2, 1982.

The proposed draft will also be appearing in the May and June issues of the Texas

Bar Journal. There is expected to be extended debate on both the merits of the proposed rules and ther merits of whether or not we should codify the rules of evidence. In the pro-







Homestead benefits available to those over-65 until closing time April 1

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their School District Homestead Exemption in 1979 have until April 1, 1982 to stil sign up. In this way, Over-65 homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 Homestead exemption given by the School Districts of the State.

According to House Bill 885 which was passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, Over-65 homeowners who Qualified For the school homestead "Tax Freeze" in 1979, but di not apply for the limitation, may file and application with the Chief Appraiser of the County Appraisal District in which the home is located.

This application must be made with the Chief Appraiser of the Eastland County Appraisal District before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979, a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

-Be 65 years of age or older -Own his or her home -Use that home as his or her Principle Residence

The Chief Appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the Chief

Appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the Over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.



problems we face, so that we can then see a logical solution

Secondly, we now are seeing distortions in supplies. The effect of partial deregulation already in place has been to give pipeline companies with large reserves of cheap, regulated gas an advantage in competing for expensive, uncontrolled "new" gas. They are able to bid at prices above the market value because they can average the cost of the new and old gas and sell at a competitive level. Companies without access to these artificially cheap supplies are not able to compete for these new reserves.

Since most intrastate pipelines do not control cheap, regulated gas, Texas and other producing states already are beginning to experience shortages. We cannot be expected to watch our resources being pumped to other states in vast quantities while we are unable to obtain sufficient amounts for our own needs.

Phased-in, complete decontrol of gas prices would solve these supply problems; allow the increased cost of gas to be absorbed by the economy and individual consumers gradually, and set us on a course of realistic, efficient use of our gas resources. Studies indicate that the longterm price to consumers will not be significantly greater with complete decontrol than with the currently scheduled partial decontrol. Further, with gradual decontrol, consumers will not face the burden of supply shortages ending in an abrupt price increase.

The President shares these views, but has concluded that this Congress is unlikely to act favorably on the issue. For that reason, he has decided not to press for action this year. I am extremely disappointed in this decision, though I understand the reasons for it. However, I will continue to urge the Administration to work to develop and prepare a feasible decontrol plan for submission to Congress as soon as is practical.

Care Is The Concern At Cisco Nursing Center

Care is the concern at Cisco Nursing Center. This is evident as one walks through the 106-bed facility located at 1404 Front Street, Cisco.

Begun in 1962 under the name of Green Acres, Cisco Nursing Center is currently under the management of Mrs. Suzette Hendry, local administrator. Mrs. Hendry came to her position here in January, 1982, after five years of experience as assistant administrator of Ballinger Nursing Center.

'Nursing homes are necessary," says Mrs. Hendry. "Increased longevity and the problems of failing health that accompany this longer life expectancy demand this service.'

Mrs. Hendry speaks with animation and authority. She secured her professional training at Incarnate Word, San Antonio, specializing in long-term health care. She later completed a 200-hour course sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association at Austin.

"Nursing care is the responsibility of the professional staff," Mrs. Hendry affirms, "but for these homes to be functional, residents need family support, volunteer services, and community identification. These contacts help meet their total social, emotional and spiritual needs."

"We are proud of our present staff of nurses and aides," Mrs. Hendry asserts. Heading the staff is Director of Nurses, Mrs. Donna Campbell. Mrs. Campbell comes to Cisco Nursing Center with seven years experience as a Licensed Vocational Nurse, the last four of

those in the position of Director of Nurses at Ballinger Nursing Center. She received her professional training from the San Angelo School of Vocational Nursing, a school now incorporated with Howard Payne Univer-

"All Mrs. Campbell's personal references come from the State Health Inspectors, and we feel fortunate to have a director of nurses with such excellent nursing care ratings," Mrs. Hendry remarks. Deliberate and quiet in her actions, Mrs. Campbell evidences her dedication when she invites response from families of the residents. "Families should feel free to contact me at any time and especially for emergencies," she

In addition to a local competent nursing staff, Cisco Nursing Center receives professional reinforcement from R.P. Tanis and Association. This company provides a registered nurse who consults weekly with Mrs. Campbell. R.P. Tanis also conducts a bi-weekly state-approved training program for local nursing aides and dietary assistants.

Lloyd McGrew, Cisco pharmacist, spends six hours monthly reviewing the individual patient's drug regimen. He also checks to see that Cisco Nursing Center complies with all state and federal phar-

maceutical regulations. Assistant administrator Diane Wheeler, wife of the Rev. Steve Wheeler, has been employed at Cisco Nursing Center for three years. Families of residents are all acquainted with Diane and

her smiling face, for her office is the place where the monthly "payoff" takes place for resident care.

"I like my varied job of bookkeeping, admissions clerk, and acting administrator in Suzette's absence," Diane enthusiastically declares. "I find my job fulfilling. The residents are appreciative of a friendly touch, a word of encouragement, and any assistance that I can give them. I meet a constant misconception on the part of family and friends that a nursing home is depressing. A fear of nursing homes, Diane continues, "is dispelled when visitors come to see that this is a place of activity and sharing. We do not have visiting hours. Come to see us any time," Diane en-

courages. In keeping with the concept of total care for the residents, Social Activities Director and Consultant, Mrs. Mae Green, supervises a varied program. Mrs. Green works closely with the Resident Council and its president, Mr. Henry Pence. The Resident Council is a representative voice for the people living in the home. Through this body questions are asked, problems are discussed, and goals are achieved.

The front yard patio of the Nursing Home is a result of the planning and vision of this Resident Council. The Volunteer Council, made up of interested citizens of the community and family members of the residents, worked with the Resident Council to achieve this goal. A bazaar, a bake sale, and a book sale were money-

making projects to establish funds. The Cisco Rotary Club gave a \$200.00 donation. Mr. Voy Wilks, a volunteer, built the forms for the foundation, and the dream of a patio became a reality when the cement was poured in May of 1980. Residents can be seen outside enjoying this patio in any suitable weather.

Mrs. Green works directly

with the Volunteer Council which was organized three years ago. Christine Reich serves as president. "Without the faithful help of such volunteers as Vena Hart, Betty Cook, Eva Humphreys, Mildred Geist,. Donald Rhyne, Voy Wilks and others, many projects could not have succeeded," Mrs. Green observes. The Volunteer Council annually supports the Easter Egg Hunt for the Day Care Center held on the Nursing Home grounds. They are involved in the Home's entry in the Folk-life Festival Parade, the Jerry Lewis Telethon, special anniversary celebrations for residents, and the annual


In addition to her work with the Resident and Volunteer Councils, Mrs. Green supervises the schedule of activities for the week for the residents. Mrs. Betty Hastings conducts a Bible study each Monday morning. Mrs. Eva Humphreys and Mrs. Doug Fry escort residents to the Cisco Junior College Cosmetology School each Tuesday for complimentary hairdress-

Christmas Open House.

Church services include a regular Wednesday morning worship conducted by the Rev. Dell Crockett of Redeemer Lutheran, a Thursday morning worship led by Mrs. Millard Slaughter, and a regular Sunday afternoon service conducted by the different Cisco ministers.

"I could not begin to thank all the people of Cisco who have done so much to keep 'our people' here in the home reminded that they are not forgotten," Mrs. Green commented. "School groups, church groups, and clubsespecially the Pleasant Hill Homemakers--have all enriched the lives of those who live here.

Crafts and exercise classes are part of the regular program Mrs. Green supervises. Senior Citizen luncheons and Friday shopping days are special favorites of the residents. Other treats include the Wilks Family Singing Group, the Monday Night





The question that will be answered in the election is not whether the water and sewer systems of Cisco are unsanitary and a health hazard. Consider that: 1. Lake Cisco is the city

water supply. Any contamination on the lake's watershed is carried into the lake -- dead, diseased animals, herbicides/insectides used in spraying pastures/fields, and leakage from septic tanks around the lake. This water is used by the city without filtration; chemical treatment is the only method that is and can be used by the city at the present time. This is ineffective in preventing many water borne diseases and certainly does not properly clean the

2. The city very often has low water pressure. In many areas of the city, water and

sewer lines are in the same ditch. Under the right conditions of water line surge and back pressure coupled with water and sewer line leaks, raw sewage can be pulled or drawn into the water lines and system. Cisco has water line surge, back pressure,

and line leaks often. 3. On a regular basis, raw sewage backs up into alleys, yards, and homes because of overload of the system in certain parts of the city. It also overflows the manholes into the streets and water ditches of the city; most of the overflow excess is carried out of town in a small creek running past the

elementary school. 4. On a regular basis, sewage is dumped onto the area watershed because the sewage treatment plant car.not handle the volume. Chemical treatment is used by the city but is not treatment enough to meet water safety and sanitary standards.

Without a doubt, the water and sewer systems of Cisco are unsanitary, filthy, and a health hazard.

The question that will be answered in the election is


whether the citizens of Cisco are going to vote to make necessary improvements, or whether they will vote to continue to live (force others to live) in these unsafe condi-


