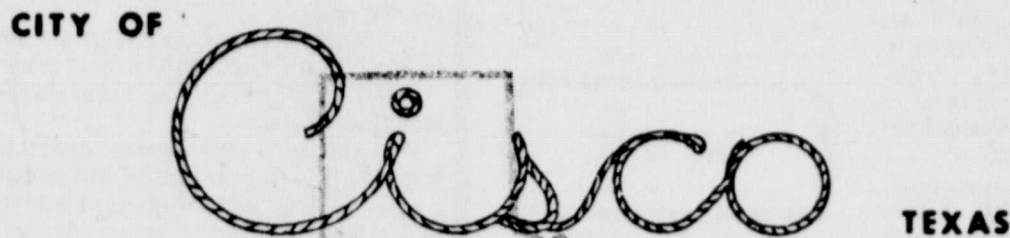

WHERE A PROUD PAST GREETS A PROMISING FUTURE

Bond Issue Propositions Given Approval As 1,050 Votes Cast

An improvement program for the community's water and sewer system received the approval of Cisco residents by a majority of almost 2-to-1 when 1,050 voters went to the polls last Saturday in the annual city election.

Election judge Douglas Fry certified returns in the three bond propositions as follows:

No. 1 (\$1,450,000 for a water filtration plant and system improvements)--For, 692, against 344.

No. 2 (\$300,000 for sewer plant improvements)--For, 682, against 357.

No. 3 (\$175,000 for new sewer out-fall lines)--For, 682, against 394.

City Councilmen Loyal Lundstrom and Bobby Rains, who were unopposed, were re-elected. Mr. Lundstrom received 937 votes, and Mr. Rains was given 952 votes.

Results of the election were to be canvassed at a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

College Board
Wm. E. (Bill) Austin, veteran of eight years as a member of the board of regents of Cisco Junior College, was re-elected over B.D. Trice, challenger. Mr. Austin received 755 votes while Mr. Trice got 283 votes. They were running for Place 2.

Re-elected without opposition were Lloyd McGrew, Place 1; Billy Reynolds, Place 3; and Roy Dennis, Place 4.

Returns of the college board election will be canvassed at the regular meeting Monday night, April 12.

Public School Board
Bill Kendall was elected to

Place 2 and Emmett Rich was re-elected to Place 7 for the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District in the Saturday voting. Returns were reported by Thelma Smith, election judge, as follows:

Place 7--Emmett Rich 669,

Steve Cozart 365.

Returns of the public school board were to be canvassed at the regular meeting last Monday night.

Elected to the three vacancies on the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital board of directors were the candidates--Emma Lee Donovan, Dr. Charles M.

Cleveland and Dr. Ayres Cermin.

Votes for hospital board directors were recorded as follows: Emma Lee Donovan, 758; Dr. C.M. Cleveland, 845; and, Dr. Ayres Cermin, 701.

Returns of the election will be canvassed at the regular meeting of the hospital board on Monday night, April 26.

City, school and hospital officials were pleased with the comparatively large turnout of voters.

Trustees Organize For Coming Year

Returns of last Saturday's election were canvassed, the board was reorganized and the calendar for the 1982-83 school year was approved at the monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District Monday night.

Emmett Rich, who was re-elected in the Saturday voting, was named as the school board president. Charles Humphries was elected vice president, and Willis Parker was named secretary. Other board members are Johnny Cagle, Shirley Smothers, Donald Gorr and Bill Kendall. Mr. Kendall was elected last Saturday.

The 1982-83 school year calendar, as approved by the board, provides for the opening of school a week earlier on Monday, Aug. 23. This will allow extra time to prepare for the opening of football season, Supt. James Couch reported.

The calendar calls for the second semester to begin Jan. 7, 1983, and for the school year to end on May 27th. Holidays will include

Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas, as usual, and for a spring break.

Mr. Couch said the board approved plans to offer an old school bus for sale at a bus sale auction to be held in Abilene about May 1. The board approved the transfer of nine students into the Cisco School District, approved payment of monthly accounts, and heard routine reports.

Burglars broke into the J.C. Penney Company store in Cisco sometime between the time the store closed last Saturday and the opening Monday morning, Police Chief Raymond Blevins reported Monday.

The building was entered through an opening on the roof. An inventory of missing items was not available, Mr. Blevins said.

The chief said the sheriff's department was helping investigate the break-in. Police have a suspect, he added. The Penney store had similar break-ins a few months ago.

Juveniles Held In Local Robberies

Two juvenile boys, ages 15 and 16, were due to appear before Judge Jim Wright in 91st District Court in Eastland Tuesday to answer charges for breaking into and robbing four businesses here last Thursday night.

Police Chief Raymond Blevins said the youths were picked up last Friday afternoon, and they were placed in the Eastland County jail. They were released to the custody of their parents Monday morning.

Soft drink machines were robbed at Speegle Gulf Service, the Cisco Intermediate School and the Lobo Barber Shop, and a 7-inch B&W television set was taken from Sight 'N Sound television store. The drink machines were damaged and robbed of some \$60.

Mr. Blevins said the television set was recovered.

The Rebekah Lodge was broken into the same night and the youths were also charged with this. They entered through a window and took some \$5 from a desk drawer, the chief said.

The Eastland County sheriff's office assisted with the investigation.

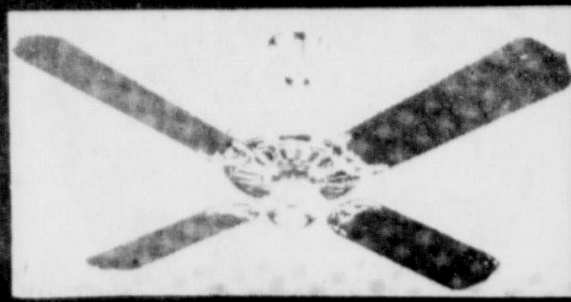

May 1 Is Deadline For Filing Open Land Exemption

The deadline for filing your 1982 Open-Space Land Exemption is May 1, 1982. To qualify for this exemption, land must be devoted to agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area. It also must have been devoted principally to agricultural use for five of the preceding seven years. The qualified open-space land also includes all appurtenances to the land.

The application for the Open-Space Land Exemption must be on a form prescribed by the State Property Tax Board and must contain the information necessary to determine the validity of the claim.

The application must be properly filled out, signed, and returned to the Eastland County Appraisal District office prior to the May 1, 1982 deadline.

Applications that are made for land that does not qualify must be rejected by the Appraisal District as is required by the State Property Tax Code. If an application is rejected, the property owner will be notified by mail of the rejection and will be given the cause or reason for the rejection.

The Open Space Exemption remains on the land as long as the land remains in agricultural use. It is therefore not an annual exemption. If the land qualifies in 1982; then as long as the use remains the same it is still covered by the original application. However, it is the responsibility of the property owner to notify the Appraisal Office in writing before May 1 of the year in which the land use changes or the eligibility of the land ends. The law provides a penalty for failure to notify

the Appraisal District of this change.

The deadline for filing the Open Space Exemption, as well as all other property exemptions, renditions, and homestead applications is May 1, 1982. If you have any questions concerning the exemptions available, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District at 629-8597 in Eastland, Texas. The Appraisal District Office is located on the 2nd floor of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Studies For Next Legislature Session Underway

During the interim between sessions of the Legislature, committees are formed to study in-depth various subjects that may be considered during the next session of the Legislature.

One of the committees that I am serving on is the committee studying the proposed "codification" of the rules of evidence.

This simply means that the committee is trying to draw up "rules of evidence" and put such rules into a code form. Presently, the judges and the lawyers refer to the Texas caselaw (previous appeals court decisions) to determine if particular evidence is admissible.

Proponents of the codification feel that having a rule book on evidence will simplify the rules of evidence and make the rules more understandable for the judges and attorneys involved. They feel that this will help prevent errors in

Smiling Faces Of Pansies

The pansy is known botanically as the Viola Tricolor Hortensis and Viola Cornuta. The pansy is one of the most popular plants because of the variety and combination of colors.

You can find colors of purple, white, blue, rose, and dark red and yellow. Many people describe these combinations as smiling happy faces. The pansy comes to us from Europe and is one of the most hybridized plants.

A pansy always has five overlapping petals. Most pansies have blooms of two to three inches, but we have the Rogue Giants and the California Giants which are a hybrid type and can have

blooms of up to four and one half inches.

Pansies are technically a perennial but they tend to deteriorate very fast in this climate after the first year and, therefore, we must treat them as annuals or even bi-annuals where the temperature is warm or hot such as we have in the Southwest and Gulf Coastal areas.

Pansies normally grow to a height of about eight inches and are considered to be a low-growing plant which makes them excellent for borders. They are also good as an edging as well as in window boxes and used as pot plants.

They have a delightful fresh fragrant aroma. Remember that the more often you pick your pansies during their blooming stage, the more blooms that they will produce for your pleasure. They are one of the mainstays of Grandmother's Garden, and this is one of the reasons why.

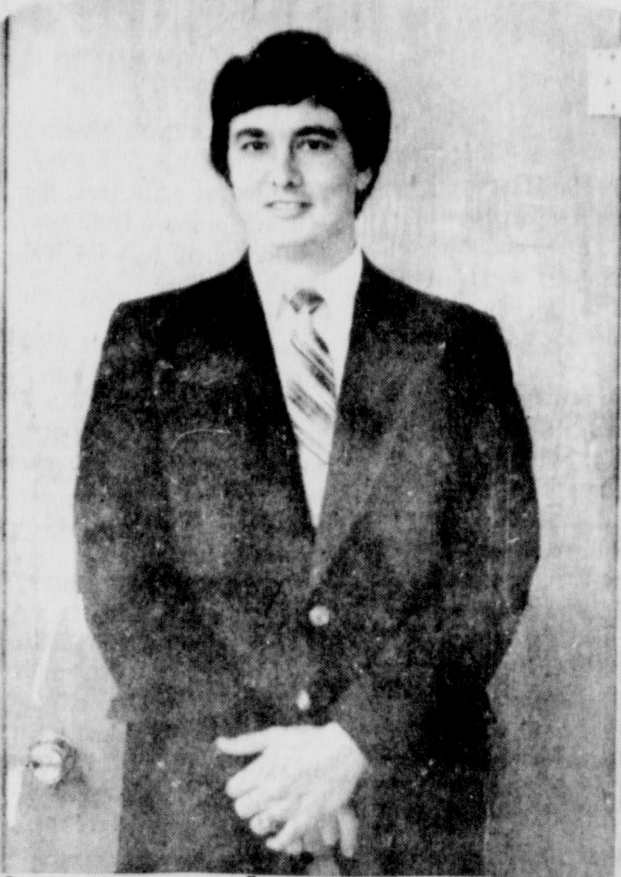
Pansies like full sun except where the temperature

exceeds 90 degrees. They can also grow in semi-shade so they are very versatile as to both color and growing conditions. A mass display of pansies is very effective landscaping.

There are two ways to start pansies. One way is to buy bedding plants. Local nurseries all have good stocks of pansies on hand now. Remember when selecting plants to pick vigorous looking ones, as you get what you pay for in most instances.

Pansies from seed should be planted around here from August to November, and you can enjoy their blooms from November to May. If you mass plant and stagger your planting dates, you will receive a greater abundance of color for a longer period of time.

Pansies like rich sandy loam with an abundance of humus. Pansies like a regular well-balanced diet with a water soluble fertilizer. Remember that pansies will reward you with larger and more abundant blooms if they are fed on a regular schedule, and the spent blooms are picked off.

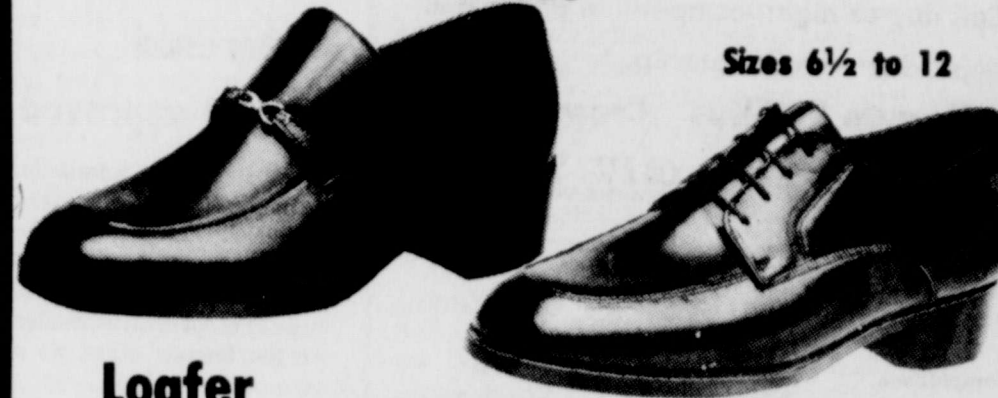

Texas crude production totals over 73 million in January

Texas crude oil production totaled 73,777,006 barrels in January 1982, according to

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent. The figures compares with

reported December 1981 production totaling 75,357,782 barrels and January 1981 production of 77,205,910 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,379,903 barrels daily in January 1982, down from 2,430,896 barrels daily in December 1981 and down from 2,490,513 barrels daily in January 1981.

The January 1982 allowable totaled 97,014,541 barrels.

The preliminary January summary indicated Texas oil production was 23.59 percent under the allowable for the month.

Cooperative waterflood project approved

The Railroad Commission approved a cooperative waterflood project in the East Texas Field on Monday. Participating companies hope to recover an estimated 423,000 barrels of oil as a result of the project.

Hunt Oil Company and Placid Oil Company will inject a mixture of fresh water and a polymer into the Woodbine Formation from leases they hold in Rusk County. The project will include four Hunt Oil Company leases and one Placid Oil Company lease.

In theory, the addition of a polymer to the water used in conventional waterflooding techniques increases the amount of oil recovered from a reservoir.

Operators must have the approval of the Railroad Commission to conduct waterflood recovery projects in Texas.

Eastland County Oil News

The No. 1 K.T.-Lloyd Smith "A" was finalized by W. Don Smith of Breckenridge.

It is a developmental well in the Stephens County Regular Field, one mile west of Ivan. Drillsite is in a 40-acre lease in Stephens County's TE&L Survey, A-1032.

Daily potential of 3 barrels and a small amount of casinghead gas was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 4,600-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations 3,250 to 3,260 feet into the wellbore.

Sun Exploration & Production Company of Abilene has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Stephens County Regular Field. The No. 122 J.M. Ward "C" showed potential to make 31 barrels of oil and 9,000 CF casinghead gas per day.

The operator has 5,058 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's TE&L County Survey, A-669, two and one half miles north of Breckenridge.

The well will produce from an interval 3,156 to 3,176 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,301 feet.

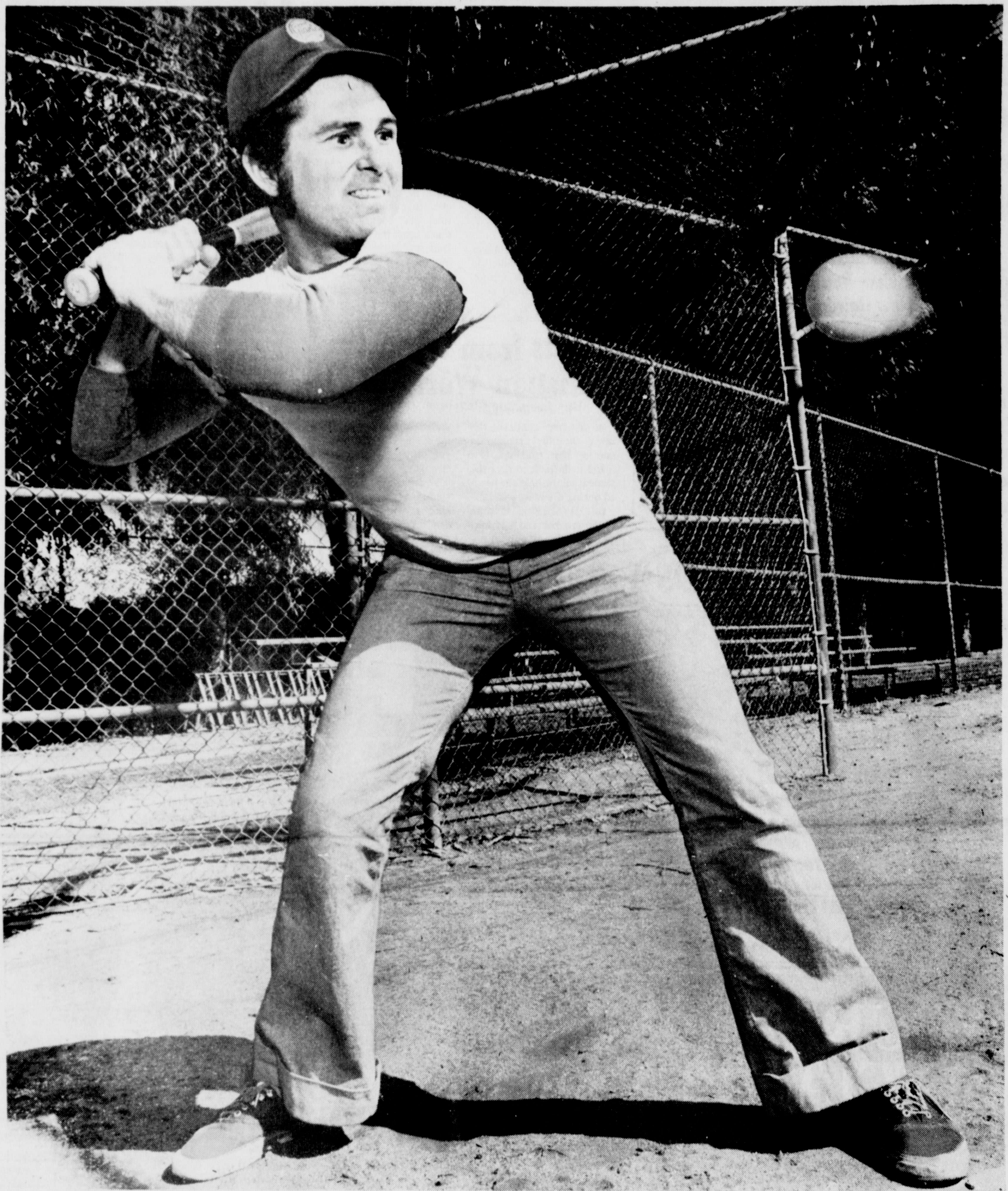
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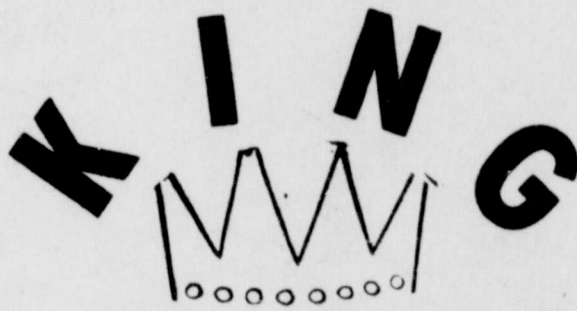

Texas farmers plan to plant fewer acres this year

COLLEGE STATION--Texas farmers intend to plant at least half a million fewer acres to crops this year.

"Farmers are cutting back because of current financial troubles and to be eligible for farm program benefits," points out Dr. Carl Anderson.

"They face poor income prospects due to low farm prices and continued high interest rates," notes Anderson, an economist in cotton marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Final plantings may be even lower as farmers make last-minute decisions regarding participation in the '82 acreage reduction program."

Cotton plantings will likely be down more than a million acres to about 6.3 million this year. High costs of growing cotton and depressed market prices have combined to discourage planting cotton, says Anderson.

Plantings of barley, oats and rice are expected to be down only slightly.

On the other hand, farmers will likely increase grain sorghum plantings to 5 million acres, up from 4.8 million last year. Final plantings, however, may be less if a significant number of producers decide to comply with the 10 percent reduced

acreage program for feedgrains, says the economist.

Texas farmers also plan to plant slightly more corn, soybeans, hay, peanuts, sugar beets and sunflowers.

Texas' winter wheat crop seeded last fall totals 8.2 million acres, up from 7.8 million a year ago. This is the largest wheat acreage ever seeded in Texas, says Anderson. The increase stems from fairly strong market expectations at planting time plus lower production costs when compared to cotton. Many farmers have shifted acreage from cotton to wheat.

"This year's decrease in planting intentions for total crop production clearly reflects the distressed financial condition that agricultural producers are facing," says Anderson. "Because many commodity prices are below the cost of production, farmers are cutting back."

"Along with reducing total plantings, many farmers are cutting back on such production inputs as fertilizer and irrigation water because of the high cost of credit and difficulty in projecting sufficient cash flow to cover borrowed capital. This should lead to somewhat reduced food and fiber production in 1982 and eventually higher farm prices," says the economist.

Statewide vaccination program launched

AUSTIN--Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission are launching a statewide program aimed at encouraging livestock producers to vaccinate their animals for brucellosis control.

"Vaccination is a key element of the Texas brucellosis control program. We can build up immunity in the Texas cattle population by vaccination of all eligible heifers," John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, explained.

He noted these are other advantages for vaccination: 1. Vaccinated cattle can move more freely in accordance with brucellosis regulations;

2. Vaccinated cattle have more value. "Financial assistance is available. You should contact your veterinarian or area Texas Animal Health Commission office for details," Armstrong said.

The program to encourage vaccination is a part of the ongoing efforts of the TAHC in this phase of the Texas brucellosis program. Recently, a statewide committee, made up of several livestock organizations, recommended that the TAHC pursue an educational program among livestock producers and the general public informing them of the economic advantages of vaccination.

"In the past three years, Texas cowmen have shown their awareness of the need for vaccination for brucellosis. In 1979, about 20 percent of the eligible calf crop in Texas was vaccinated; in 1981, this figure had increased to almost 32 percent. This is a good record, but we need to improve it," Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, said. He said a 70 percent level of vaccination of eligible calves is needed to significantly reduce the disease.

Vaccination ages for heifers as official vaccinates are 4 to 12 months of age. A one-time vaccination is normally sufficient for the life of the animal. Bulls are not vaccinated. The reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine is recommended.

"Although vaccination alone is not the single answer to the Texas' brucellosis problem, it is the single most important thing cowmen can do now in their efforts to control brucellosis," Armstrong said.

County appraisal work continues

The last several months have seen much of the property within the County reappraised. This appraisal work is continuing as the mandated 1982 deadline imposed by the new Property Tax Code is here. The law requires that all taxable property within the State of Texas be placed on the tax rolls of the States' taxing jurisdictions at the fair market value.

The firm of McMorries and Company, a professional evaluation firm has been handling the task of measuring, classifying, and valuing the properties within the

County. The work is scheduled to be completed during the next few weeks.

Although the majority of the work has been completed there are still scattered property parcels that must still be looked at. The properties in the Ranger area will only have to be updated as they were reappraised in 1980. All of the businesses within the County will be visited during the next few days by the appraisers who will be obtaining business personal property renditions and other information that is required by law.

When the appraisers visit your property, whether it is a residence or a business, they will identify themselves as representatives of the Appraisal firm. If you have any questions concerning the appraisal work you should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The

telephone number is 629-8597 and the office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Following the completion of the reappraisal work, all property owners within the County will be notified of their new property values. If the work is completed as scheduled, these notices should be mailed out sometime in the early part of May.

As soon as a definite target date is determined for the mailing of these notices, information will be provided to the property owners through this newspaper concerning the information contained by the notice and also the right of the property owner to appear before the 1982 Board of Review concerning his property values.

Outsmarting Crappies

Guess where the fancy of a number of Eastland County people is lightly turning during these spring days?

Why to fishing, of course; waiting for the water temperature to rise enough in the lakes and tanks for the fish to move to the top and feed.

Crappies are certainly one popular variety of fish to catch, and there is a chance to "outsmart" them in several different ways.

One way is to build a fish attractor in a tank stocked with this fish. There are a number of good, inexpensive ways to do this, including the old method of using brush piles. Another method is to install a series of stakes to make a stake bed attractor. Where a surplus of old tires is available, they will make a very effective shelter to attract fish.

In many areas these shelters are called freshwater reefs, but by any name their main purpose is to get the fish and fisherman together. The beginner may want to start with the brush attractor. Hardwoods usually last longer than the soft woods, and oak brush seems to be the most effective. As far as design goes, it appears that the fish are not impressed with architecture. Nevertheless, they tend to go the flatter designs in shallow water, and taller structures in deep water.

An attractor constructed of bales of hay is extremely effective. As the hay decays, the growth of insect larvae and other nature fish food increases. This attracts minnows, and the crappies follow soon after. Hay bales are probably not effective for more than one season, however.

Old tires work well and are very durable. Holes must be drilled in the tread portion of the tire to let any trapped air escape. These holes need to be about two inches in diameter. Most tire reefs must be weighted down with cement blocks or heavy rocks, else they will try to float to the surface. It might be noted that two tires, with one folded and pulled through the other, make an effective reef for small ponds.

Whatever the method used, there should be some way to mark the spot. It's interesting how the April and May rains can fill and tank and cover up all traces. But the fish, underneath, seem to appreciate their cover all the more. Until they are pulled out at the end of the line, that is.

90-Day Period Expires For Texas

Austin—The 90-day DPS warning period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expired this week. After midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers were to begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.

The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damage of \$5,000.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the law is encouraging more drivers to obtain the required coverage.

"DPS figures show that during 1981, approximately 73 per cent of drivers involved in reportable accidents had the insurance," Adams pointed out. "That number increased to 81 per cent for the first two months of this year."

Drivers who fail to carry the required coverage risk being fined from \$75 to \$200 for the first offense and from \$200 to \$1,000 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under the new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

Easter Unfolds In Holy Land

For the first time in 2,000 years, visitors to the Holy Land are able to witness a depiction of the events Easter notes and celebrates in the area where they happened.

And it's the time nearly a quarter of a million American travelers begin planning their pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Two of the world's most important religious dramas — The Jerusalem Passion Play and The Nativity Play of Bethlehem — will be performed on historic Holy Land sites August 2 through November 6.

The dramatizations of Christ's birth and final days are performed in the general area where they happened, with ancient religious ruins serving as the "stage" for these plays.

The old Church of St. Pierre en Gallicante on Mount Zion serves as focal point for the Passion Play. You see the ruins of the palace of Caiaphas, the High Priest; the dungeon where Jesus was incarcerated; the courtyard where Peter denied his Lord; and the ancient steps which led Jesus from the Garden of Gethsemane to the house of Caiaphas the night of His arrest.

The Nativity Play is set in Shepherd's Field outside Bethlehem, where the Angels heralded Christ's birth.

"You feel as if you're somewhere between heaven and earth here," says Producer Francisco de Araujo, a respected religious dramatist who adapted his production from

Seventeen Cases Reported Of Child Abuse In Eastland Co.

"Children in Danger." Most of the people who read this are not guilty of child abuse - unless you count over-indulgence, and perhaps it should be.

But the facts are these: the time has come for those who don't abuse their children to realize that more and more there are those who do, in many ways.

There were 17 reports of child abuse in Eastland County last year. Of the child deaths reported to the Department of Human Resources in Texas last year, 76 were caused by abuse and neglect.

Of 29,476 reports of abuse, 13,885 were found to be valid in the state. A total of 1,510 valid reports were of sexual abuse.

These figures are not from some foreign pagan, emerging nation. These are from Texas, U.S.A.

A county Child Welfare Board is organized and functioning here and its purpose is to help inform the public of the need and to assist the Department of Human Resources in general and Mrs. Gail Jennings, local director, in particular, with the ever-increasing cases of child abuse and neglect right here in this county.

Without a budget and without a lot of outside enthusiasm, Mrs. Jennings and the board is attempting to alert what appears to be a non-caring public to the facts.

So many time, good citizens are willing to come out of their ivory palaces and/or their own little cocoons to help, and then they're faced with the question of "How can I help?"

Here's how: if you want to get involved, contribute to needs and offer services; best bet is to first call Mrs. Jennings' office. That number is 629-1772. Either she or her secretary will be glad to suggest ways that help can be given.

The other big way to help is to memorize and use the Toll-Free Child-Abuse hot line number. For if you can commit this number to memory: 1-800-252-5400.

So long as your report is made in good faith, you are protected from law from damage suits.

Your cooperation is one of the first steps in preventing child abuse and neglect. We've got to know about it before we can do anything.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR: Those in the health care community can do more

than most people to identify and report child abuse. Some parental purchasing patterns and general signs to watch for in the course of your practice are:

- Sporadic vitamin purchases, particularly requests for "quick working" or "complete" supplements.
- Dietary supplements to gain weight.
- Contradictory reports of reluctant reports of a child's injury.
- Repeated requests for body lice remedies.

- Frequent requests for impetigo products.
- Frequent requests for burn products, medicated ointments and creams, bandages, etc., for home treatment of physical abuse.
- OTC drug treatments for fever, diarrhea, coughs, cold, etc., of greater than normal frequency.

CLUES FROM PARENTS: Severely depressed or detached parents; possible high use of psychotherapeutic agents.

- Antisocial personalities.
- Family-altering diseases including alcoholism, mental illness or mental retardation.
- One or both parents addicted to or over-using narcotics, barbiturates.

CLUES FROM CHILDREN:

- Abuse including burns, fractures, bruises, welts, sprains, exploitation, confinement, poisoning, exposure, starvation, malnutrition, and sexual abuse.
- Signs of general neglect including poor skin hygiene; frequent diaper rash; bad odor, scaly, dry skin; lice; and impetigo symptoms from lack of cleanliness.
- Other signs of neglect or abuse include wearing inappropriate clothing (to cover injuries); frequent medical complaints including high fever; diarrhea persisting more than 12-24 hours; obvious infection; chronic cough, etc.

These signs, or others, plus your feeling that something is wrong, warrants your report of suspected child abuse to DHR.

REPORTING CHILD ABUSE: Investigation of reports of child abuse has been made the responsibility of the Department of Human Resources. To report a case of suspected child abuse, neglect, or sexual abuse, call

this statewide toll-free number.

1-800-252-5400
Trained personnel will receive the information you give and take action.

The information is relayed to the nearest child protection office, from which a worker will be dispatched to investigate. The computerized central registry of court cases of child abuse and neglect is also scanned to see if a prior history exists.

Give as much information as you can. You are not required to give your name when reporting, but if a case goes to court, your testimony could be invaluable in getting a child to safety.

If after investigation the worker determines that the parents need counseling, that is provided. But if the child's safety depends on immediate removal from the home, a court order will be obtained. The child is then placed in another home temporarily, it is hoped, but permanently if the situation is insaluable.

Reporting anyone for anything is a difficult thing to do. It requires a judgment, a decision, and willingness to help.
