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Mayor Signs Proclamation

City's Application For Water Improvement Loan Approved

The City of Cisco's application for favorable rate loan funds for use in water works improvements was approved by the Texas Water Development Board at a meeting last Wednesday in Austin, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

Approved was a \$500,000 loan with an interest rate of 5.6 per cent and a \$800,000 loan to bear interest at the rate of 10.98 per cent. The two figures total 1.3 million that Cisco voters approved in the April 3rd election for

the water project.

Appearing before the board in support of the city's application were Mayor Eris Ritchie, City Councilman Loyd Lundstrom, City Manager Moore, City Engineer Ken Martin and Finance Counsellor Joe Smith.

The bonds, which will mature in 20 years, will be delivered and the sale completed after plans and specifications for a new water filtration plant and other work are complete,

bids called and accepted and the project made ready to commence, Mr. Moore said.

Water rates will not be raised until the bond sale is completed, which will be six months or more, the city manager said.

Mayor Ritchie said that city officials were "real pleased." Cisco's was the largest project on the board's agenda, he said.

"We believe that the water board realized that we have a very genuine need and that

our people are united in an effort to solve our water problems," the mayor said.

Engineer Martin of Decker, Jacob and Martin, Abilene, was in Cisco Friday to work on details of plans for a new 10-inch sewer outfall line that will relieve congestion in the west and north parts of town. Plans call for a contract to be let on this project in the next two months, Mr. Moore said.

Mr. Moore said that the city's application for a grant and loan for sewage and waste water disposal facility improvements was proceeding.

Street Widening Project Is Tabled

The project to widen South Avenue D (State Highway 183) from 14th Street to IH-20 was tabled until the State Highway Commission's resolution and plans are presented at a meeting of the City Council here last Tuesday night.

County Engineer Buddy Haun said the project plans were now at Austin and the commission will be ready for the council to consider in a few weeks. The council directed City Manager Mike Moore to make a public announcement when the project is ready to be considered.

In other action, the council approved plans for the new Conrad Hilton Avenue street signs to go up in place of the Avenue D signs. The renaming of the avenue was

considered and approved by the City Council on April 8, 1980.

Mr. Moore told the council that the new Conrad Hilton Avenue Signs were ready for installation and work would start in about ten days at 2nd Street.

Other routine reports were presented. The meeting lasted less than an hour as the agenda was short.

The Folklife demonstrations will again this year play an interesting and educational part in the Cisco Folklife Festival. Many old favorites will again be demonstrated this year, such as corn husk dolls, fur animals, rush lights, noodlemaking, fruit drying and jerky making.

The Civic League's members has tried to learn more about and expand the rug making and basket making demonstration. A crocheted rug has been started by Barbara Pope and may be placed in the Civic League's railroad depot in the years to come. Won't you come help us add to our rug so years from now you can say, "I did this part back in 1982." The basket weaving includes pine needle baskets, split willow, ivy stem baskets and numerous others. Helen MacKellar has come up with some interesting new types. The League invites everyone to come try their hand at it.

The hoe cakes are always popular because samples are given away. Hoes are actually a form of hot

water cornbread cooked on a hoe over a wood fire. Come hear Gus Smothers tell about the origin of these interesting cakes.

A demonstration has been added that is sure to make a hit with all the mothers. It will make them appreciate the modern day electric washing machine. There will be an old fashioned scrub board complete with lye soap and wash tub. Come try your hand at it. Lye soap recipes will be available for those who want to go back to the old way of washing.

The League has gained a quantity of white wool this year for their spinning wheel and would like to try to teach you how to spin wool on a wooden bobbin. A primitive weaving technique can be achieved with a "v" shaped tree branch. Yolanda Anderson says. Also other forms of weaving will be demonstrated.

This year the League is fortunate to have three special demonstrations. One will be Wes Valek and daughter Rachel making sauerkraut. This will be at 2 p.m. on Saturday and Sun-

day at the entertainment tent. Samples and recipes will be available.

JoAnn Cermin will also present a Folk Medicine talk showing various plants and herbs and what they were used for by the pioneers. Some are still used even today. This is a 1 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday in the demonstration area.

The third special demonstration will be Kenneth Deitiker talking and demonstrating about black powder rifles. This will be at 12 on Saturday and 4 p.m. on Sunday outside.

The Service Club will be demonstrating their quilting talents on another quilt for everyone to see. The Abilene Model Railroad Club will be bringing trains, tracks, etc., for a big display in front room of the Ag building.

Face painting will be featured again this year. Carolyn White, face painting chairman, has come up with some terrific new designs for everyone to choose from. Willow Whistles can also be carved by the older children at the festival.

Everyone is invited to par-

ticipate in all the demonstrations. They may even add some information they don't have. Come have a good time at this year's Folklife Festival.

The Cisco Folklife Festival will be held April 24 and 25 at the CJC Agricultural Building (old national guard armory). The festival will be open on Saturday from 10 to 10 and again on Sunday from 12 to 6 p.m. The cost of admission is \$1.00. There will be continuous entertainment and demonstrations of pioneer skills.

Food will be available in the food tent.

Forty-one exhibitors have reserved booths to demonstrate and sell their arts, crafts and goods.

Holistic Health Leader Is Lions Club Speaker

The mission of people in the new holistic medical movement is the use of a harmonious balance of mind, body and spirit to achieve good health, Miss Charlotte McGuire of Telluride, Colorado, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday.

The founder and first president of the American Holistic Nurses Association, Miss McGuire is a registered nurse with bachelor and master's degrees and some 20 years of experience as a nurse and as an official in medical management. She was in Cisco during the past week to visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John McGuire, after attending meetings in the east.

Miss McGuire said her work during the past few years had given her the insight of medical world developments that moved her to dedicate her life to the new belief—holistic health. She felt that the progress in medical care has, in many instances, been accomplished without considering the patient's welfare.

"We have too many specialists," she said; then asked, "Where are the general practice doctors who gave us personal care—treated each patient as a whole person?" She felt that many doctors were too quick to prescribe medication. "Seventy-eight per cent of illnesses are stress related, according to a national survey," she said. She added that the holistic movement urges recognition of illness causes.

The holistic movement is young, Miss McGuire noted. The American Holistic Medical Association is four years old, and the American Holistic Nurses Association was founded in 1980, she said. The latter now has more than 600 members.

"We urged the teaching of good, positive health practices—without focus on disease," Miss McGuire said. "Attitude is all important in the positive approach to good health practices."

The speaker was presented by Gene Abbott, program chairman. Guests included William Billbrook of San Angelo, Mrs. Frank Barrett, Mrs. John McGuire and Mrs. Gene Abbott, all of Cisco.

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Rep. Stenholm Believes Funding Will Be Restored For Senior Employment Program

U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm of Stamford told more than 120 Green Thumb workers and sponsors attending a training session in Coleman on April 13 that he believes "funding will be restored" for the senior employment program.

Workers from 13 counties attended the session, held at the Coleman senior center. Green Thumbs from Eastland County were Elva Notgrass, Jo Phillips, Annie Rendall, Bonnie Snyder from Cisco and Ruth Cartee, Senior Center Director, and James Elmore from Eastland.

Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employs almost 1,000 low-income, rural persons aged 55 and over, in 106 counties. It is currently funded along with other senior employment programs by Title V of the Older Americans Act—but President Reagan's proposed 1983 budget does not provide funding for Title V.

"Green Thumb is a high priority program for one reason," Stenholm said. "It's a work program, not a giveaway program."

The two-term congressman, who is unopposed for re-election, also cited the favorable cost-benefit ratio of Title V. Green Thumb workers provide services to senior centers, schools, libraries, and museums and, at the same time, maintain their own dignity by avoiding welfare rolls.

Stenholm reminded his audience that difficult times require sacrifices from all segments of society, and this might mean a reduction in cost of living increases for social security recipients. This majority of those present said they could accept a moderated reduction—of 3 percent or so—in their cost of living increases.

For his part, the congressman said he "was personally going to decline" the tax benefits recently approved by and for members of congress. "I won't ask sacrifices of the people without sacrificing myself," he said.

Stenholm predicted the current budget problems would eventually be resolved by making some cuts in

defense spending and by increasing taxes to offset the big deficits anticipated by most economists.

In earlier comments, Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller also said that Green Thumb had a good chance of survival.

"I think the Texas dele-

gation is going to vote to continue the program," Moeller said. "Texas has the best Green Thumb program in the nation, and you, the workers, deserve most of the credit for that." Moeller also thanked Green Thumb sponsoring agencies for their strong and effective support.

Lloyd London Discusses Coin Collecting For Rotary

Coin collecting as a hobby and as hedge against inflation was discussed by Lloyd London at the meeting of the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday noon.

London, whose lifetime of experience in banking and investment makes numismatics, as the hobby is called, a reasonable investment, confined his remarks to the American silver dollar. The range of detail reflected in pamphlets distributed to the club proved much too great and, even as limited, the program time allowed for little more than generalities.

The source of coins, said London, is indicated by tiny letters—or by the absence of such—imprinted usually upon the reverse side. Such letters designate the various mints which struck them, only the Philadelphia mint, until recently, having no such indication. These are known as "mint marks."

There are two classes of coins, he explained. One is known as "proof" coins and is made for souvenir giving or collecting. These have special characteristics of finish lacking in the more plebeian "trade" dollars. The proof coins, originally sold at the mint for a premium, are different from similar coins of general circulation only in

the method of manufacture.

Silver dollars fall into two ornamental types, London said—the "Morgan" design, named for its designer, and minted in various motifs until late 1921, and the new "Peace" pattern adopted on that year. Among exhibits of his collection viewed by club members, was a proof coin of the new Susan B. Anthony dollar which he called the greatest failure of all American mints, principally because of its near relationship in size to the quarter and the half-dollar.

He suggested, not in recommendation, however, that a purchase and hoarding of the Anthony coin could prove profitable to some future time when or if the bungle is removed from circulation.

As a note of warning, he recommended that anyone interested in coin collecting, confine his interest to American money and not yield to the devices of a growing number of coin dealers attempting to market foreign specie.

Tables of comparison in the gain of values as between rare coins and other forms of long term investment, tended to emphasize the soundness of numismatics as a hedge against inflation.—BAB

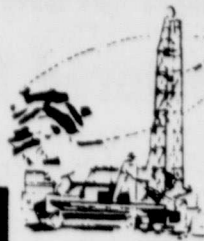

Windfall Profits Tax and Complications Are Still In News

The Windfall Profit Tax and its complications are still very much in the news. Royalty owners with less than 2 barrels per day received their first 1982 exempt checks (for the Jan. oil runs) in late Feb. Now they

are applying through the IRS for the 1980 WPT withheld. Some of this will be received in the form of tax credits.

The forms for this application are reported to be "Complicated - different from last year", and "Not available through the Purchasing Companies, like last year". They must be obtained through the IRS, or local accounting firms.

Payments on these refunds are expected to be made in late May.

Royalty owners and producers with more than 2 barrels per day are calling for a public hearing on the whole procedure. A WPT technical corrections bill is now being prepared by the Joint Committee on Taxation in Washington.

One problem, as cited by Producers, is that the statute is not being followed in the definition of the amount of exempt royalty oil. The statutory amount equals the number of days in the calendar quarter multiplied by 2. The IRS definition, however, terms this as "2 barrels a day".

New fields which come into production during the last part of any quarter would stand to lose under this definition. It should be pointed out, however, that the IRS would allow an end-of-the-year refund for the uncertified portion.

"But that's part of the problem," stated a spokesman for the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association. "There's no reason for the Treasury to sit on this money for up to 16 months. We hope that this proposed technical corrections bill will help royalty owners whose properties produce more than 2 barrels a day."

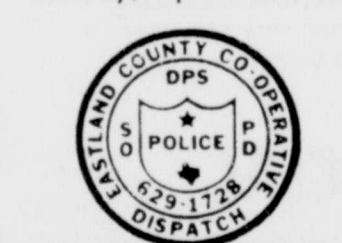
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Helen Wallace Has Magazine Articles Printed

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

The percentage of elderly people living on welfare or handouts has declined sharply since the social security program began in the 1930's, a government report, the social security bulletin, notes.

A social security study in 1938 estimated that only 2.7 million of the then 7.6 million elderly, or 35 per cent were "self-dependent" people who "were essentially self-sustaining and able at least to subsist on their income."
Some 2/3 of the elderly were existing by public assistance, charity or handouts from friends and relatives.

By contrast, 97 per cent of today's 24 million elderly are "self-independent" according to the bulletin.

It is of interest to note the accuracy of the forecast, percentage-wise, when the social security began existence. However, while the percentage of total people on social security is accurate, the report missed its target dollar-wise about 1-105 speaking in terms of billions of dollars.

The total payroll tax is higher today because it also covers disability and medicare benefits, which were added to the program in 1956 and 1965.

Originally it was felt the cost of the old age program would level off after 1980, but that date has been revised and it is felt it will be 2030 before the program becomes a manageable program.

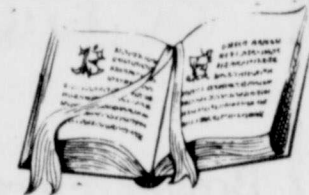

Bass Club Report

ENTER THE SUPERBASS!

If some of the local fishermen begin telling stories about the extra large bass they are catching this spring, don't assume they have lost all regard for the truth! For there is actually a "Superbass" in Texas now, and it might show up in area lakes.

The "Superbass", like some other living things, is the result of hybridization. This time the cross was between the northern largemouth black Bass (native or Texas bass) and the Florida bass, which was first introduced in Texas in the 1970's.

This Florida subspecies is known to grow larger than the native largemouth. First this characteristic was thought to be the result of the long growing season and warm waters of the Florida's original habitat, but research has indicated that it's ability to grow larger is also genetically influenced.

The Florida and native bass are very similar in appearance, other than the size. The Florida bass do appear more golden-brown in color than the greenish hue of the native bass, however.

A better method of differentiating between the two subspecies is to count the scales along the lateral line. The Florida bass has 70 or more lateral line scales, while the native bass has 68 or less.

In waters where both fish occur, hybridization is common. The resulting offspring is apparently superior to either parental strain in growth and survival.

The current state record, a 15 1/2 pounder taken in 1981 from Lake Echo, has been verified as a hybrid.

This hybridization of the subspecies is upgrading the genetic composition of the native bass populations - an impact that is sure to have positive effects for fishermen.

Red Cross Provides Assistance In Paris

Although the American Red Cross has provided disaster assistance to over 1050 victims of the Northeast Texas and Southwest Oklahoma tornadoes, the organization is concerned that many more families need assistance but have not visited the Red Cross Assistance Center located in the Paris Boys Club, it was announced today.

"We have committed more than \$300,000.00 in disaster assistance to victims in Lamar County," John Crafton, Director, Red Cross Disaster Operations, said. "However, with the number of families affected by this disaster, we expect that figure to go much higher."

In an effort to reach more disaster victims, trained Red Cross workers are making home visits to individuals who are unable to come to the Red Cross Assistance Center at the Boys Club as well as provide follow up assistance to those who have visited the Center.

Over 30,000 meals have already been provided in fixed sites and mobile feeding units three times a day to victims and emergency workers by Red Cross volunteers. Other workers have answered 1,949 disaster inquiries regarding friends and relatives in the affected areas. Red Cross nurses continue to assist the hundreds of individuals who were injured.

"Red Cross assistance is given in the form of dispersing orders which victims can take to merchants of their choice and purchase whatever they need," said Mr. Crafton. "We have found this to be the most effective way of delivering assistance to disaster victims and at the

same time, keeping money in the local community."

The Red Cross is working closely with representatives at the Federal Assistance Center to make sure all the needs of the tornado victims are met, according to Brady Fisher, Lamar County Red Cross Chapter Chairman. Citizens in the 17th Congressional District are unique!

They are represented by what appears to be a vanishing breed...a truly honest Congressman.

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that he will forego a provision passed by Congress late last year that gave Congressman and Senators an increased 1981 income tax exemption.

Stenholm said passage of the tax break, attached to the Black Lung Benefits Revenue Act of 1981 and giving legislatures a \$75 per day exemption for living expenses incurred while Congress is in Session, did not "meet the minimum standards of equity and fairness that the public has a right to expect from its elected officials."

"At a time when we are asking thousands of Americans to make sacrifices in order to cut federal spending, members of Congress chose to give themselves what amounts to a salary increase," Stenholm said. "We had managed to fight off repeated attempts to pass an outright salary increase, but this legislation was slipped through when our guard was down during the final hours of the first half of the Session."

Stenholm was one of only 47 Congressman voting against the provision, which is retroactive to include the 1981 tax year.

"I am cosponsoring legislation that would prevent this kind of maneuvering in the future," Stenholm said. House Bill 4807 would defer Congressional pay increases until after an election of the House has taken place, he pointed out, giving the electorate the option of determining whether or not a public official should be re-elected before benefiting from a salary increase for which he or she had voted.

"And we are still trying to rescind the bill passed last year," Stenholm said. "In the meanwhile, I have no intention of taking these increased exemptions in my income tax return this year. Simple fairness dictated no other action on my part."

Cong. Stenholm is unopposed on the May Democratic Primary. Voters, in our opinion, should, if for no other reason, go to the polls on Election Day and give him an overwhelming vote of endorsement.

Pest Alert

APHID ATTACK

Nearly all insects are host to one or more species of aphid, a kind of insect that draws sap from plant tissue. Aphids can become a particular problem in early spring.

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, pear-shaped insects. Aphids have a very high reproductive capacity, allowing populations to build up very rapidly. They usually attack in mass, preferring the undersides of young tender shoots. There are many species of aphids and almost all plants are susceptible to attack by one or more species.

Their attacks can cause serious damage to plants 1) by robbing plants of sap, 2) by injection of toxin during feeding and 3) by serving as vectors for disease causing viruses. Aphid damage may also stunt growth or deform leaves.

Aphids also excrete a sticky substance known as "Honeydew." When aphids infest trees, this material falls onto cars, chairs, tables or other objects that happen to be beneath them.

Aphids can be readily controlled with the use of Diazinon, Dimethoate (Cygon or De-Fend) or Malathion. However, certain insecticide formulations may injure some tender ornamental plants. To avoid damaging valuable plants, apply the material only to plants specified on the label

and mix according to directions.

Large trees or large numbers of trees present a distinct problem in pesticide application to the homeowner. Because of this, most people are content to rely on natural control measures.

There are several beneficial insects which play an important role in reducing aphid populations, including lacewings and ladybugs. Another form of natural control which would be of benefit to everyone in the area is a hard rain.

Beneficial insects can control the aphid infestation on ornamental trees. However, garden plants should be closely inspected and control measures taken when warranted. For additional information on controlling aphids and other pests, contact the County Extension Office.

Census statistics are now available closer to home

You don't have to ask Washington for census statistics any more.

Now the numbers that help America's business and governments run better are available closer to home: in your state capital or perhaps even in your neighborhood public library.

In cooperation with state governments, the Commerce Department's Bureau of the Census has developed a network of 44 State Data Centers that offers facts and figures from the bureau, other federal agencies, and state sources.

"The steady development of the State Data Center network since its start in 1978 is exactly the type of federal-state cooperation that produces benefits for everyone," said Bruce Chapman, director of the Census Bureau.

"Each of the State Data Centers established so far is geared to serve the information needs of state residents," he added. "Businessmen and women, local government officials, community and minority leaders, social and economic fabric of his or her state, county, city and neighborhood can make good use of the centers."

The concept is a simple one.

Under a voluntary, cooperative agreement between the bureau and each state government, each State Data Center receives free copies of each census publication, microfiche, map, and summary computer tape produced for that state. The materials include the bureau's population and housing census and survey reports as well as extensive bureau reports from its economic censuses and surveys in such areas as

retail and wholesale trade, manufacturing, construction, agriculture, services, and transportation.

In exchange for receiving these data products, each state sets up a depository for the materials, usually in an existing branch of the state government, a state university, or library. States joining the program agree to enlist other organizations as affiliates to help distribute the information to the public. So far, the state centers are working with almost 900 other organizations to carry out an information network "ripple effect."

"The result is a broader use of census statistical products for community and business planning," Chapman said. "The State Data Center network fits squarely into the Census Bureau's

commitment to distribute its information widely and to help people learn how to use it."

Many of the State Data Centers sponsor workshops explaining how to find the numbers people need from what often - at first glance - resembles a maze of census reports, microfiche, maps, and computer printouts. The centers receive assistance from the bureau's Data User Services Division, 12 regional offices, and field information services specialists who also conduct data user workshops around the nation.

Four parcels of county land registered as foreign owned

Four parcels of agricultural land in Eastland County amounting to 939.5 acres have been registered as foreign owned by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) since a Federal law was passed in 1976.

This total is .2 percent of the agricultural land in the county, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

Foreign ownership in the state has increased only slightly from 5% in the first compilation in 1980 to 6% in 1981. The total land registered in Texas is 792,408.2 acres with an estimated value of \$884,859,162, Brown said.

A new Texas Department of Agriculture publication compiling the USDA reports as of December 1, 1981, is available by writing the Texas Department of Agriculture (P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711).

Ninety-five percent of the owners indicated that they do not plan to change the agricultural use of the land. "So far, this amount of lost acreage has not been a

threat to our volume of production.

"Land is a vital natural resource, and we should take steps to protect it if the acreage purchases by foreigners begin to mushroom," Brown said.

"The worst threat now is in the conversion of prime farm land around large metropolitan area to industrial or residential development," Brown said. "That is a serious problem, whoever the owner may be. Solutions are also very controversial because Texans have traditionally been against any type of land-use legislation.

"The best answer is to make agricultural production as profitable as industrial and residential development," Brown said, "and that is what everyone in agriculture is working toward today."

Gear Up for Color

There's no doubt about it. Color photography is definitely "hot." And that's understandable. Often color in a print can turn a technically "bad" shot into a marginally good one. And it can snap-up a good shot to prize-winning caliber.

But shooting color does not come cheap. Commercial processing of color prints and slides is still more expensive than black-and-white. And that's only the beginning. For the photographer interested in going beyond basic film-and-camera combination, there's a whole world of assorted accoutrements, things to make the task of turning out beautiful color slides and prints just that much easier.

The influence of color begins with the lens on the front of your camera. All modern lenses are crafted with specially formulated glass and further treated with secret color-corrective coatings in order to increase light transmission, reduce flare, and produce vibrant, natural-looking color. While all lenses do the same thing, some do it better than others. Super-discriminating photographers may spend many years and even more dollars seeking just those lenses having the best possible color-transmitting properties.

Then there's the home darkroom arena. To nearly everyone's delight, do-it-yourself color chemistry is now simpler than ever before. Whether processing color print (negative) or slide (positive) film, there's a kit of pre-measured chemistry in ready-to-mix proportions. And, for slide do-it-yourselfers, there's a wide range of plastic, cardboard, and glass slide mounts for finishing the job.

If you're interested in doing your own color slides or prints, you'll also need a good quality color thermometer for maintaining critical color chemical temperatures. Prints from negatives or slides? A motorized color processor is a real blessing, speeding up the procedure and insuring uniform results from print to print.

And, while we're in the darkroom, let's not forget about the backbone of darkroom processing—the enlarger. It can be used to make prints from either color negatives or slides as long as it features a color filter drawer. That's for adding the necessary filtration via color-corrective gelatin filters.

For a little more money, you can get a lot more technology in the form of a designed-for-

How does one determine the right filtration for producing a quality color print? Traditionally, it's been done either by trial and error (producing a test print and then making the necessary filtration changes) or by using a color analyzer, a smallish device which reads the color present in the image and then suggests the proper filtration and exposure for a quality print.

What else can you buy to increase your enjoyment of color photography? If you're into slides, you'll need a slide projector and screen. Or buy one of the new twin-lens projectors with automatic dissolve from one slide to the next. Some models even feature built-in recorders for stereo sound accompaniment.

Have I lost you? Is this more in the way of accessories than you ever hoped to afford? Well, take heart. Because, for just a few dollars, you can increase the impact of your color photography a hundred times over. Check out some of the newer special-effects filters available at most photo retailers. There are multiple-image filters, starburst filters, soft-focus diffusers, twin-color filters—just about anything you could ever imagine to put a little pizzazz into your color shots.

The best single filter you can buy? In my opinion, it's a polarizing filter. Besides eliminating glare and flare from most objects, it will improve overall color saturation and slightly darken blue skies. And it won't cost you an arm and a leg.

Wichita Falls, and Kenneth Wayne Roop, 48 of Wichita Falls. Arrested shortly thereafter by Constable Gene Hicks of Rising Star were J.L. (Jewel Loranzel) Elledge, 50 of Archer City, and Bobby Ray Green, Jr., 18 of Wichita Falls.

pleas of guilty, Judge I.W. Ussery assessed fines against J.L. Elledge at \$200 plus costs, Billy Ray Green, Jr., at \$50 plus costs, Laura Jean Elledge at \$100 plus costs, Rickie Dee Smith at \$50 plus costs and Kenneth Wayne Roop at \$100 plus costs.

County Appraisal District Holds First Review Meet

The first meeting of the 1982 Board of Review for the Eastland County Appraisal District was held Thursday afternoon.

The Board of Review is a three man Board created by the recently enacted State Property Tax Code. The new Code requires that each

County within the State have a Board of Review which is appointed by the Board of Directors of the County-wide Appraisal District.

The Eastland County Appraisal District Board of Directors appointed John Nevill of Eastland; Truman Fambrough of Ranger; and Bob Shults of Rising Star, to serve as Board of Review members for 1981.

In the meeting held Thursday, John Nevill was elected to serve as the Chairman of the Board with Truman Fambrough being elected to serve as Board Secretary.

Following the election of their 1982 officers, the Board discussed rules and procedures to be established for the 1982 Board of Review Hearings. The date of the Board Hearings is not determined at the time, but is expected to be set for sometime during the month of June.

The board of Review hearings will allow property owners the opportunity to question the appraisal placed upon their properties for 1982 was a result of the County-wide reappraisal which has been going on for the last year.

The procedures for appearing before the Board will be published at a later date as well as information needed by the property owner in understanding the appraisal notices he will receive from the Eastland County Appraisal District.

Mr. Menton also stated that if any of the five persons should do any pest control business without a proper license again a charge can be filed which could result in an penalty of up to \$1,000 per day in addition to any criminal charge. Sheriff Morren said that there are reliable and licensed pest control businesses in Eastland County and anyone who thinks it may be necessary for a home or building to be inspected or treated for termites should contact a local licensed pest control business.

Also, District Attorney Walton stated that from time to time fly-by-night vacuum cleaner salesmen, roof repairmen, insurance peddlers, siding salesmen, home repair businesses and pest control operators come into the county. He warned citizens to be cautious of such persons who go from door to door because the citizens are often times the victims of unscrupulous

Saving money and becoming better money managers is a special concern of many families.

Using one basic "rule" can help eliminate many of the costly impulse purchases that, in turn, eliminates or reduces many financial problems or complications for today's families.

The rule is the "Delayed Action Rule" will allow you time to think and discuss the purchase without the pressure of the sales person—or the merchandise itself. It will give you time to answer important questions before deciding. These are the questions to ask—in deciding whether to buy or not buy.

First, do I really need it? Unexpected sales, blue light specials and unadvertised specials are ways to catch your attention and get you to buy.

Second, Have I checked or researched the item? What do other models offer me?

Is the price reasonable? Is this the best time of the year to buy the item? Comparison shopping and seasonal sales calendars will assist you in answering these questions.

Fourth, consider if the item on "sale" is the price of a true sale price?

Can I substitute something else for this? This is an important question for consumers to think through. A product you already own may do the same task or provide the same enjoyment as the new product. A used product also may be acceptable depending on how much you expect to use it.

Does this product have any disadvantages? If so, do they offset the advantages, or do they create a need for other products or services?

Consumers should also consider what is the retailer's reputation? What services will be provided?

And finally, what am I willing to give up if I buy this product?

Consumers can establish a basis for making a satisfactory buying decision rather than a financial mistake when they use the "Delayed Action Rule" with its built-in time for making those decisions.

This week, I am featuring a recipe for Chicken Casserole.

Chicken Casserole

Cook 1 large chicken with 1 onion until chicken falls off of the bones.

1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can sweet peas
1 can cream of celery soup
1 pkg. stuffing mix (corn bread)
1½ cups broth

Place a layer of stuffing in the bottom of a baking dish; add boned chicken and sweet peas.

Pour over this the cream of mushroom and cream of celery soups. Add another layer of stuffing mix. Pour over this the chicken broth.

Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees F.

The deadline is rapidly approaching for Eastland County farmers who want to carry insurance against the possible loss of their peanut crops. All-Risk Crop Insurance Dist. Director, Ardell M. Kalmbach points out applications to insure spring planted crops must be received by April 30.

A new peanut policy will give better investment protection to farmers who chose All-Risk Insurance this year.

Major policy changes include a guarantee in pounds, coverage on all acres of quota and non-quota peanuts, lower guarantee reductions for unharvested acreage and a replanting payment provision, according to R.W. Crouch, Jr., field Operations Director for Federal Crop Insurance. "In addition, peanut farmers will also benefit from government subsidies on premiums and three coverage level options that have been added to all crops," Crouch said.

The All-Risk Insurance program is designed to provide farmers an economical way to protect against a loss of the record high sums of money they will have to invest in their crops this spring.

To participate in the government backed program, farmers must contact any local agent authorized to sell and service All-Risk Insurance policies.

Theft of farm machinery is getting to be a bigger problem each day. The Texas A&M University Experiment Station is no exception. On March 26 and April 2, five tractors were stolen from the Farm Service compound 8 miles west of the A&M campus. The tractors included a 1530 John Deere, a 1520 John Deere orchard tractor, a 1020 John Deere and a 140 Farnall International Harvester. Some of the tractors had spray equipment

mounted and one had a post hole digger mounted. If you hear of farm equipment of any kind being offered for very favorable prices, you should report it to law authorities. All machinery should be stamped with identification numbers. Efforts are being made across the state to adopt a uniform identification system.

The tractors stolen from the Experiment Station were identified. Maybe this will help in locating the stolen equipment.

Pecan budding and grafting time is here. The annual school is scheduled for April 23 at Cisco Jr. College. This will be a good opportunity to learn to do this work. Approximately 2,000 people have learned this skill during the past 28 years. The school begins at 9:30 a.m. at the Texas Room in the library at CJC.
