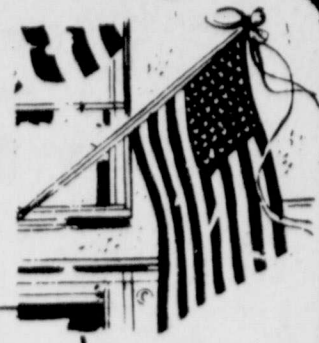

Christmas in May committee reports that the two renovation projects they accepted for this year are 90% completed. One more work day should complete the project it was reported.

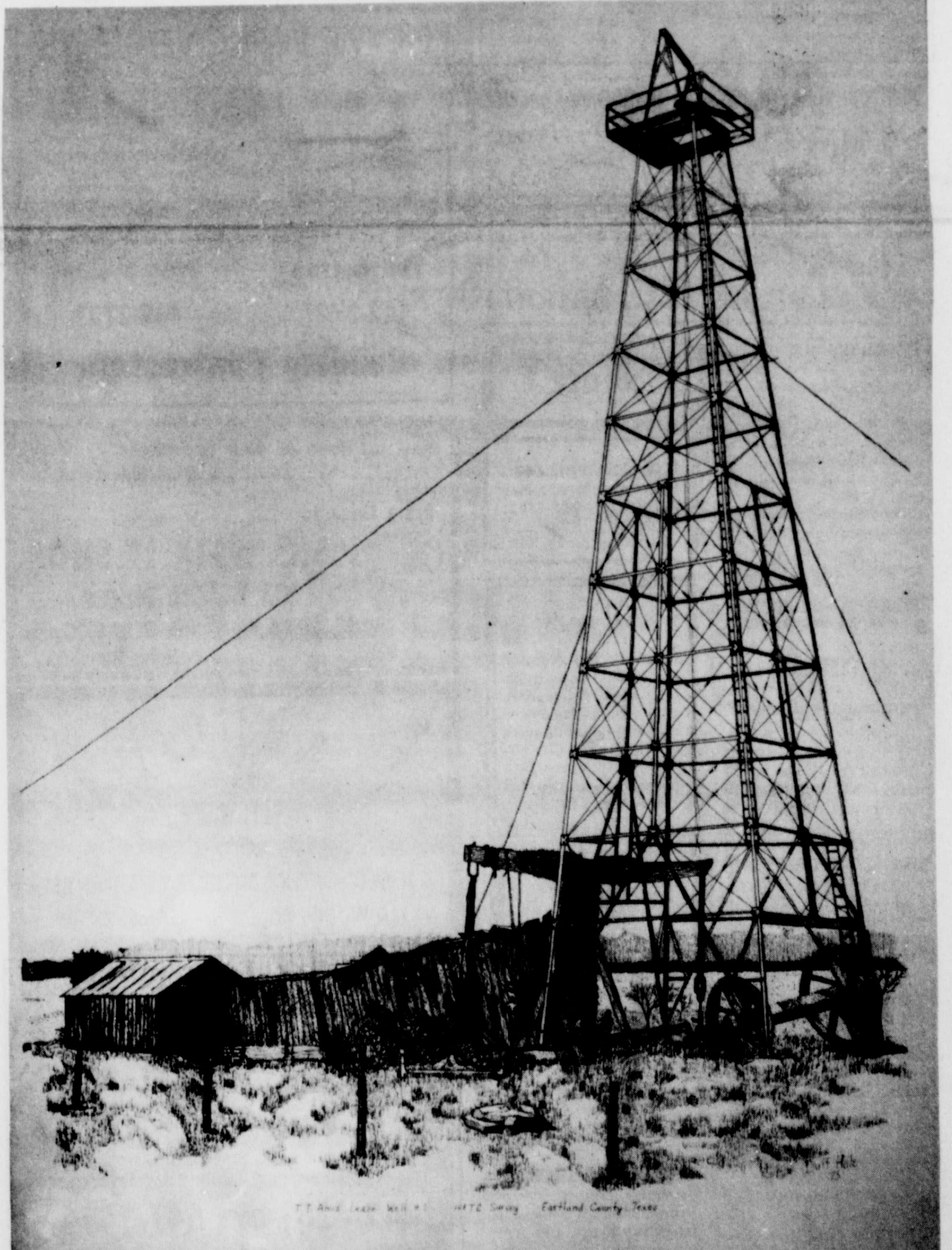

Eastland County Oil Industry Landmark



One of Eastland County's oldest producing gas wells, shown in the above painting, is the Hoffmann Oil Company No. 1 T.J. Amis, located on the Charles Clark Ranch about one mile west of Eastland on Highway 80.

The picture was made from a painting by Duff Hale, Dallas insurance man, who presented it to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Hale of 1107 West 14th Street in Cisco. Duff Hale, who grew up in Cisco, lives at Midlothian with his wife and three children.

The Amis well, in Section 29, Block 4, H&TC Survey,

was drilled by Gordon Petroleum Company in 1923. A few people may remember "Colonel" Gordon who was active in this area during the 1920s. Drilling of the Amis well began July 12, 1923, and was completed Oct. 8, 1923. It was drilled to a total depth of 3,207 feet and completed in the Lake Sand formation. Initial production was estimated at 13,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Sometime after the completion of the well, it was acquired by the Hoffmann and Page company, a partnership. Following the death of

Karl Page in 1938, C.W. Hoffmann, Sr., bought the Page interests and the operation of the Amis well has remained in the Hoffmann family since that time. The firm presently operates under the name of Hoffmann Oil Co., and W.H. Hoffman, Jr., of Eastland is the executive officer of the company.

The old well currently produces approximately 500,000 cubic feet of gas per month. Other wells drilled in the immediate vicinity were plugged and abandoned long ago. The present steel derrick replaced the original wooden

derrick that was torn down years ago. Few derricks of this type remain today.

Charles Clark, owner of the land, reported that photographers and artists frequently stop to photograph or sketch the derrick and landscape. The well is located near the highway.

The Duff Hale painting hangs on the wall at the Hale home in Cisco. The painting was copied for publication by Cotton's Studio of Cisco. The well is regarded as an Eastland County oil industry landmark. -JWS

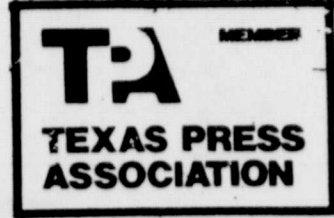

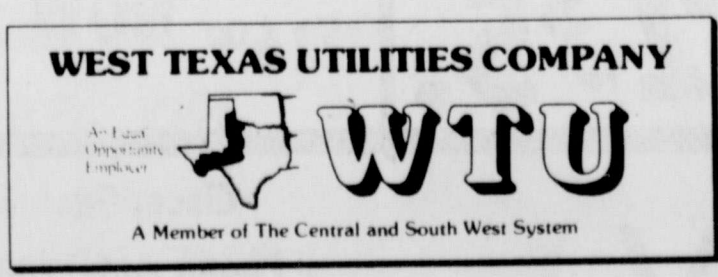

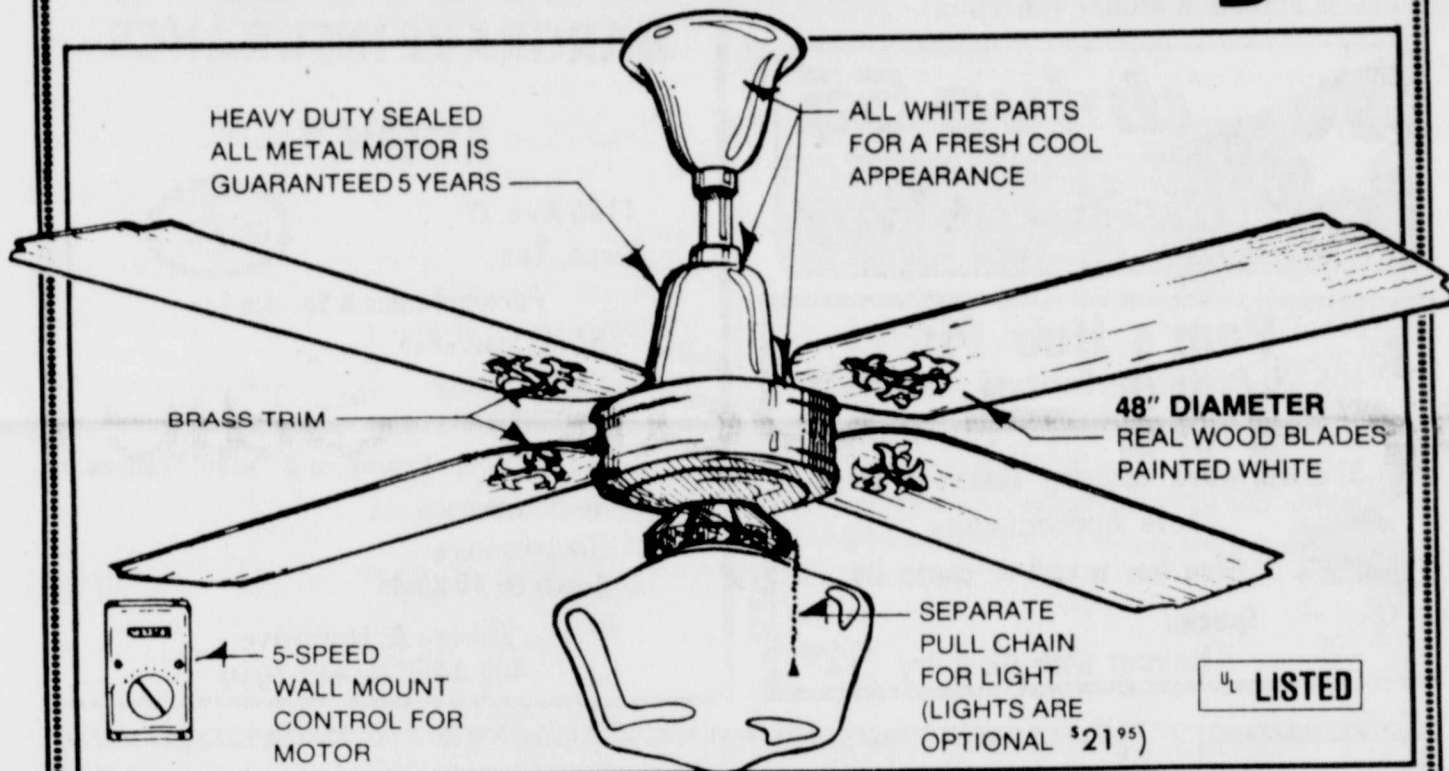

Graham Reports On Soviet Trip

London (AP)—The Rev. Billy Graham, criticized for his comments about freedom of religion in the Soviet Union, said Monday that reports of his trip contained "apparent distortion and actual mis-quotes."

Graham accepted an invitation from the state-authorized Russian Orthodox Church to attend a Moscow conference last week on peace and the threat of nuclear war. He was criticized in conservative American religious circles for saying he found a measure of religious freedom in the Soviet Union.

In a statement released Monday he said freedom is relative and that there are restrictions on prayer and Bible use in United States public schools.

But the United States has a "great degree of freedom for which I am grateful," he said. In China "there are many restrictions and yet leaders in the United States seem to be applauded for going there. Perhaps less than 200 churches are open in a population of about one billion," Graham's statement said.

Graham said he issued the statement to "clarify"

Graham's statement called the Soviet Union "an atheistic society which does not encourage religion," but where the churches "have some measure of freedom to hold public worship services on church properties" and "families are free to teach their children the Bible and to have prayer in their homes."

"In the Soviet Union there are an estimated 20,000 churches open and each year hundreds of permits are granted for new churches. Most authorities in the field say there are more practicing Christians than Marxists."

Graham told reporters he went to Moscow because he thinks the "more contact we have the better," and from his concern that nuclear weapon technology is going "almost beyond man's control."

"I believe we stand on the brink of Armageddon," he said. "I am not a pacifist and I am not for nuclear disarmament, but I am for a ban on mass destruction weapons."

"I really believe the Soviet

people want peace, and their leadership too - but on different terms," Graham told the news conference.

"But what we were talking about is the devastation of this planet. I don't think I was naive. I don't think I could have seen more or that the Soviets tried to keep me from seeing things," Graham said.

He said that in private talks with Soviet officials and religious leaders, including the chief rabbi, he raised a number of problems about religious freedom, including the six Siberian Pentecostals who want to leave the country and who took refuge in the United States Embassy in Moscow in 1978. He met the six and prayed with them.

Is graduating hazardous? Yes!

As the high school graduation season rolls around, a tragic fact is noted by safety specialists. A disproportionate number of high school seniors and recent graduates die from traffic accidents every year.

In fact, the Highway Users Federation says that almost 4,000 18 and 19 year olds were traffic casualties last year, accounting for over eight percent of all motor vehicle deaths. This age group represents about five percent of all U.S. drivers.

"The most dangerous driving time for this age group is after dark, especially on weekends," explained Robert M. Calvin, manager of the Federation's Highway Safety Programs. Statistically, more young people between 18 and 21 die from traffic crashes than any other ages. June, July and August are the peak fatality months, says the National Safety Council.

"The fact that young drivers with limited experience in a high risk age group are entering the high risk driving season should send up warning signals to the graduates themselves and their parents," says Calvin.

"Statistics alone can't indicate the magnitude of the problem, and the pressing need to do something about it. More use of safety belts, strengthened driver education and other school safety programs, and a lot more concern by everyone would go a long way toward easing the problem."

"The positive news is that many states and communities seem to be moving in the right direction," Calvin continued. "Seventeen states have passed tougher drunk driving laws so far this year, including higher drinking ages, and many more are pending."

Attempts to weaken state driver education support have failed in five states, Calvin noted, while Kansas and Idaho expanded their driver ed commitments. Other states are raising taxes to fix up unsafe roads and streets; and a national safety belt use campaign is underway. "Steps like these are positive actions to improve traffic safety," Calvin said.

The Highway Users Federation is a non-profit coalition of businesses, industries and associations promoting safer, more efficient highway transportation.

Eighteen and 19 year olds accounted for the worst traffic fatality records last year, according to preliminary data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The report was incomplete at press time, as it only takes into account 46,088 of the traffic fatalities for last year. The latest 1981 estimate, from the National Safety Council, is that 50,700 people lost their lives as a result of traffic accidents in 1981.

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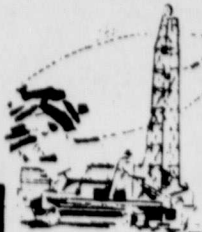

Report on county oil activity

Reita Exploration Inc. of Fort Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Finney, a 2,500-ft. wildcat nine miles southeast of Springtown. Location is in an 835-acre lease in Parker-County's J. Witcher Survey.

Oilwell Operators Inc. of Pampa has revealed plans to drill a 3,000-ft. developmental well in the Stephens County Regular Field. The operator has 361 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's Blind Asylum Land Survey and has designated

the venture as the No. 1 Zant. Drillsite is 16 miles east-southeast of Albany.

Seven 4,500-ft. developmental wells are planned by First Texas Crude Inc. of Weatherford, Stephens County. The locations are in a 160-acre lease in the TE&L County Survey. Well designations are the Nos. 5,6,7,8,9,10 and 11 Van Crudgington. They are in the Reid-McLennan Field seven miles northwest of Breckenridge.

At a location 12 miles west of Mineral Wells, Ray Templeton Company of Abilene has finalized a new gas wildcat in Palo Pinto County.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Nowak, producing gas at the rate of 1,199,000 CF per day on a 1/2-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 5,800,000 CFPD.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Bottomed at 3,900 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,506 to 3,525 feet into the hole.

Chester R. Upham Jr. of Mineral Wells has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the Ittleson Field. The No. 1 Industrial Foundation showed potential to make 851,000 CF of gas per day on a 1-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 1,300,000 CFPD. The operator has 173 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Survey, two miles east of Mineral Wells.

The well will produce from an interval 3,919 to 4,700 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,700 feet.

A 5,700-ft. wildcat is planned by GSG Royalty Corp. of Dallas at a drillsite six miles southeast of Grafard, Palo Pinto County. The location is in a 231-acre lease in the Bennett McNally Survey. Well's designation is the No. 4 Levi Jenkins.

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CAPITOL UPDATE

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Our economy -- the strongest and most productive in the history of the world -- was built on the foundation of small business. Thus, it is fitting that when we speak about the strengths and weaknesses of our economy, we refer to the small business sector of the economy.

But small business is more than just a catch-all economic term. It is the neighborhood drycleaner who knows his customers by name, the service station down the street that checks the oil, the corner drug store. "Small business" touches each of our lives every day.

Almost half of Americans working in the private sector are employed by firms with fewer than 500 employees. The firms produce 38 percent of the gross national product and two and a half times more innovations and new products come from these small businesses than from large corporations.

In Texas, firms with less than 100 employees comprise 98 percent of the number of businesses, 57 percent of the employees and 50 percent of the state's total payroll.

Yet, I am concerned about the problems that face this vital force in our economy. To a large extent, they are the same problems that afflict businesses of every size. But smaller firms have fewer resources to cope with over-regulation and less cushion to ride out protracted periods of high interest rates and economic recession.

A recently released Presidential Report, "The State of Small Business," notes several disturbing trends.

During the 1970's, the small business share of growth national product declined. In particular, the sales share of firms with less than 20 employees dropped, and there was an overall decrease in the number of small businesses with fewer than four employees.

With the growth of federal regulation, I fear that there has been tremendous pressure on small businesses to grow to cope with red tape, or to go under. The Regulatory Reform Act, already passed by the Senate, along with other measures taken by the Administration to streamline government rules, carries the promise of reversing this trend.

The Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 also has special application to small business through incentives to increase capital outlays, accelerated cost recovery provisions and other measures.

Changes in the estate tax law will make it easier for the next generation to continue family businesses.

Inflation, which has plagued business as well as consumers, has dropped significantly.

These are all promising signs. High interest rates and a general uncertainty about the course of the economy still cast a shadow over the future of small business. However, in my view, the Administration's program to reduce federal spending and regulation still further without sacrificing last year's gains will begin to alleviate these problems. Certainly, small business finds a better friend and advocate in this Administration than it has had in Washington in the recent past.

But an even better sign would be for the Congress to consider how each of its actions affects these businesses. Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



Americans spend more than a billion hours each year filling out forms imposed by the federal government, and the Internal Revenue Service is the biggest offender.

Of the 1.3 billion-hour federal paperwork burden, IRS tax reporting forms account for 641 million hours...that's nearly half, or almost as much as all the other federal agencies' paperwork put together.

Individuals and businesses share the IRS burden about equally, with individuals spending 318 million hours each year working on tax forms and businesses putting in 323 million hours.

That load could be lightened almost immediately if the IRS would adopt some sound management procedures recommended in a study by the Government Accounting Office (G.A.O.), the investigative arm of Congress. I requested the study during the 96th Congress when I was Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee.

According to the G.A.O., the tax paperwork burden could be reduced at least 4.5 million hours by making changes in only three tax forms. That simple move also would save the IRS from \$806,000 to \$1.3 million in its own operating costs.

Non-essential details could be cut out of Schedule F (Form 1040), Farm Income and Expenses; and Form 4835, Farm Rental Income and Expenses and Summary of Gross Income from Farming and Fishing. The G.A.O. thinks that certain taxpayers should be allowed to bypass altogether Schedule E (Form 1040), Supplemental Income Schedule.

More savings, both in time and money, could be made if the IRS would adopt an 1120 (U.S. Corporation Income Tax Return) Short Form; and eliminate duplication on Form 5884, Jobs Credit; and Schedule K-1 (Form 1041), Beneficiary's Share of Income, Deduction, Credits, etc.

In general, the G.A.O. recommends that IRS improve its control over development and revision of tax forms; start a program to ensure information collected is needed and used; improve coordination between forms and regulations; make sure forms and instructions are clear and consistent; and involve top management more in the process of reducing paperwork and developing forms.

There is one other factor that could change all these estimates. The G.A.O. used methods for estimating paperwork that were developed by the IRS. The G.A.O. determined that the methods were unreliable and of doubtful value since they were based on a survey inappropriate for determining tax burden and were not designed for repeated use. Strong recommendations were made on improving these methods.

Of course all these suggestions won't make any dramatic changes in the amount of work we all put into our tax returns each year. However, adopting them would assure us that our tax collectors aren't asking us to do work that just isn't necessary.

Information to farmers on peanut quotas

COLLEGE STATION-- Texas farmers plan to plant some 265,000 acres of peanuts this year, a 3 percent increase from 1981.

However, farmers must comply with reduced poundage quotas as required under the 1981 Farm Act to be eligible for support prices and other provisions of the peanut program, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The 1982 national poundage quota has been set at 1.2 million tons.

For each farm that had an allotment in 1981, a preliminary poundage quota is established subject to certain categories of reduction based on production characteristics of the farm during the 1979-81 crop base period. These categories are as follows:

-Category 1: Farms which did not actually produce peanuts due to inadequate tillable cropland.

-Category 2: Nonproduction of the quota two out of the three preceding years. Quota to be reduced for the current year to the extent that peanuts were not produced during two out of the three years of the base period except when due to natural disaster or other reasons beyond the control of the producer.

-Category 3: All farms which were not reduced to zero poundage quota under Categories 1 and 2 or were not affected by reductions in these categories. A uniform state factor will be applied against the preliminary farm poundage quota on all farms not reduced to zero in the first two categories.

-Category 4: Active farms where peanuts are regularly grown on adapted soils.

establish a state reserve for the correction of errors, notes Feagan. This reserve would not exceed 2 percent of the state poundage quota and would be allocated to counties upon request.

Under the law, any peanuts produced on a farm without a poundage quota or in excess of the farm poundage quota will be classified as additional peanuts. These peanuts must have been contracted for export or for crushing by April 15, or they could have been placed in the price support loan pool for additional peanuts.

Producers will be permitted to transfer their peanut quota by lease or sale within their county, adds the economist.

All peanut growers are required to certify their planted acres to the county ASCS office. A peanut marketing card must be issued to each producer before he can sell any peanuts. This reflects the poundage that can be marketed for domestic edible uses or marketed as contract additional peanuts for export or crush. Any peanuts marketed in excess of the contracted quantity are considered as quota peanuts.

The loan rate for quota peanuts will be \$550 per ton to the farmer while additional peanuts are being contracted for about \$400 per ton, says Feagan.

GORDON SPOT

It is still too early to spray pecan trees for control of the pecan nut casebearer. Usually, we spray pecan trees in Eastland County from May 25 to June 1. However, we have had an unusually cool spring which may cause these insects to be later in their development.

We will be watching the development of the nut casebearer so we can keep you informed of the best dates to spray.

Many Eastland Co. lawns are recovering slowly this spring due to winter injury. St. Augustine and bermudagrass lawns appear thin and slow to recover. Floratam St. Augustine, which is particularly sensitive to low temperature injury, was hard hit.

Lawns that were in poor condition last fall were severely damaged by low January temperatures. Lawns affected by brown patch and St. Augustine Decline last year were in a weakened condition before low temperatures produced further injury. Heavily thatched lawns and heavily shaded lawns also suffered extensive winter injury.

What can homeowners do to promote lawn recovery

and prevent similar problems next year?

We suggest "scalping" the lawn with a mower to remove weeds and other debris, applying a complete fertilizer, and regular mowing to promote lawn recovery.

It's best not to use preemergence herbicides for weed control on lawns that are slow to recover from winter.

Also, avoid excessive fertilizer throughout the growing season because it increases the turf's susceptibility to environmental stresses such as drought and low temps. We recommend 3 to 4 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. per year as maximum for St. Augustine lawns. Lawns deficient in iron should receive two or three supplemental iron applications.

Detailed information, including disease, insect and weed control, is provided in the publication L-1372, "Lawn Care," available at the Co. Extension Office.

EASTLAND COUNTY LIVESTOCK SHOW BARN

Eastland County 4-H and FFA youth had a new, modern show and sale barn for the 1982 county livestock show held in March. The attractive 60 ft. by 80 ft. all

metal facility was made possible by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association and many contributors in the county.

The livestock raisers association under the leadership of Jim Moylan began making plans for the new facility last spring. A decision was made to purchase materials for the building and solicit as much volunteer labor as possible. The association borrowed approximately \$16,000 from the bank, purchased materials and began construction in July 1981.

As the construction progressed, over \$13,000 was donated by businesses and individuals. Many hours of donated labor and equipment was provided by welders, carpenters, and skilled construction workers. Moylan, president of the livestock raisers association and owner of Moylan Construction, supervised the construction and donated much of the labor and equipment used in the construction. With very intensive work the last few weeks before the county show, the new barn was ready for the stockshow.

The floor is all concrete, but sand was brought in for the show arena. On the night of the stock show sale, the sand was removed and chairs were brought in for the stockshow buyers.

The first sale held in the barn was successful, as \$84,000 was paid by the supporters for the youths market animals. During the sale, the new barn was officially named Moylan Exposition Arena. Several donated animals were sold with all proceeds going to the new barn fund. Commission from the sale of animals also was applied to the payment of the barn. A total of approximately \$7,000 was raised for the barn fund during the show and sale. This leaves less than \$10,000 to be paid on the loan for the new show barn.

The 4-H and FFA youth of Eastland County will be able to enjoy and use the show barn for many years because of the efforts of many groups and individuals.

Methodist Conference Set May 30-June 2

Reports of local church gains and the announcement of plans for a regional evangelism conference are expected to highlight the seven United Methodist annual conference meetings scheduled for Texas and New Mexico this spring.

The Houston-based Texas Annual Conference leads the membership increase, both in the two-state region and nationally, with 3,824 net gain for the year.

Fort Worth is the site of a two-day training conference in November, titled, "The Bishops' call to Evangelism" planned for the 2,000 United Methodist pastors in Texas and New Mexico.

Bishop John W. Russell, resident bishop of the Dallas-Ft. Worth Area, presides over the North Texas Annual Conference, May 23-26, meeting in Dallas at First United Methodist Church and Highland Park United Methodist Church. The following week, May 30-June 2, he chairs the Central Texas Annual Conference scheduled for the Americana Hotel in downtown Ft. Worth and nearby First United Methodist Church.

Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt, resident bishop of the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area, presides over the New Mexico Annual Conference, May 24-27, meeting at Gloriaeta Baptist Assembly in Gloriaeta, New Mexico. He presides over the Northwest Texas Conference, June 3-5, meeting at Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo.

Bishop Ernest C. Dison, Jr. resident bishop of the San Antonio Area, presides over the Southwest Texas Annual Conference, May 30-June 2, meeting at Travis Park United Methodist Church in San Antonio and nearby La Villita Assembly Hall. Harkins/Greiger Eastland County WW I Veterans

John Harkins, another World War I Veteran, moved to Ranger last October with his wife, Minnie. At the present time Mr. Harkins is in the Valley View Nursing Home in Eastland.

Harkins was born in White County, Georgia, in 1892. When he was eight the family moved to southern Georgia, then to Hood County Texas in 1903.

In 1918 he entered the Army from Hood County, and was placed in the 31st Div., F. Company, 106th Engineers. He went from Texas to Georgia for training, then to France.

The 106th Engineers were, "Supposed to prepare the way for the men to get to the Germans" by building roads. But there were times when the men had to throw down picks and shovels and use guns instead.

The group also built hospital camps for the wounded, whom Harkins remembers as "coming back from the front by the trainloads." Harkins lost a brother during the fighting.

John Harkins was in Brest, France, when the Armistice was signed. In 1919 he was returned to Ft. Worth for his discharge.

Most of his life after WWI continued to be spent in the Hood County area. A Harkins son, Verlon, was in construction work at Pearl Harbor, and killed during the attack there. Soon afterward John Harkins went into defense work for the duration of the war. He worked for both aircraft companies in Ft. Worth, and munition manufacturers.

A Harkins daughter, Ann Cuppe, lives in Snyder, and a granddaughter, Marilyn Thomas, in Ranger. A son, Albert Harkins, lives in Hobbs, New Mexico.

The Canna comes to us from Central and South America. Their home is the tropic region, but they do good here each year with outstanding mass of color.

The Canna is often mistaken for a bulb. It actually is a rhizome, which is a member of the tuber family. Their range of size is from one and half feet to six feet tall. The taller cultivars make an attractive tall background against fences.

While the smaller cultivars add the tropical look to pool areas. The Canna is best planted with all one color to an area or bed. Cannas are best suited in a flowing landscape design instead of a formal bed setting.

The Parks Department in Dallas have done wonders with a flowing landscape design using Cannas. Samuel Grand Park has some very magnificent beds of Canna as well as several parks along Northwest Highway and many parks in the Oak Cliff area.

Cannas are planted in the spring of the year. The rhizomes remain in the bed year round here. In the colder climates they have to be dug and dried and stored the same way we do tulips. The Cannas will bloom from mid-summer until frost. Our average frost is November 18, after the Cannas have been bitten by Jack Frost, they turn brown and wilt.

This is the time you need to cut the tip off even with the ground and burn the removed material. Here we recommend very highly that a two inch layer of Botanical Cedar Mulch be added completely covering the area where the Cannas had grown. Then next spring the Cannas will push through the mulch with more vigor and new stalks than the year before.

There is no other member of the tuber or bulb family that is so easy to grow and they multiply very rapidly. Cannas do best in rich moist soil especially enriched by

compost and well-rotted cow manure. They have to have full sun and hot weather. Space the rhizomes fifteen to eighteen inches apart and cover with one to two inches of soil. You must feed every two to four weeks with a water soluble well-balanced fertilizer such as 10-10-5 or a 20-20-20.

Grasshoppers and cutworms are your biggest problem in the insect field. They can be controlled by a regular spraying of Diazinon or Sevin every two weeks.

Every three to four years you have to dig and divide your Cannas. When dividing your Cannas cut each rhizome into leaving approximately three to four inches per rhizome and at least one eye per rhizome. Be sure to use a clean, sharp knife. If there is any rotten or decayed section of the rhizome, dispose of it by burning.

There are many dwarf varieties that make good tub plants.

Some of the varieties found here are Mr. President which is a red five to six foot tall Canna and the Pfitzer Dwarfs such as Chinese Coral, Primrose Yellow, Stadd Fellbach-Orange, Shell Pink, Cherry Red, Porcelain Rose and City of Portland Orange Red.

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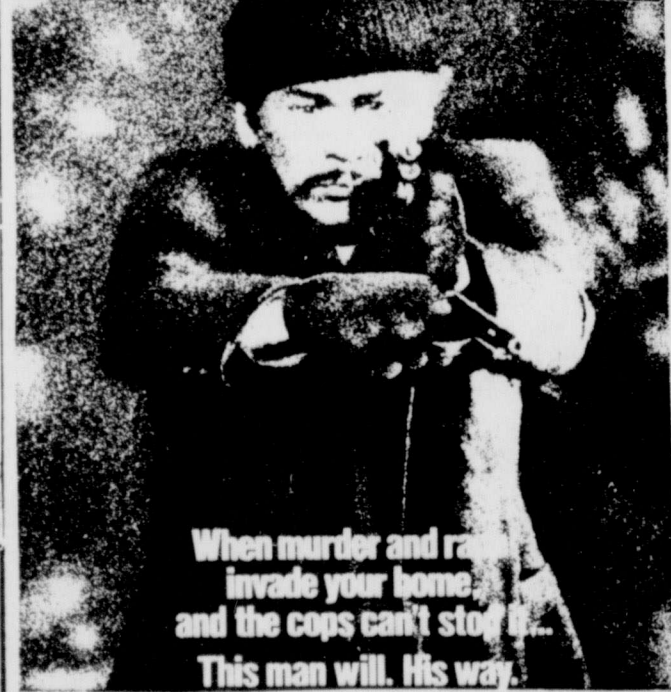


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
