Fire Department **Releases Info On Fire Sirens**

The Cisco Fire Department has released the following for public information concerning fire sirens: one short blast 20 seconds, rural grass fire; 10 short peaks one minute, structure fire; 3 40 seconds blast, storm watch; repeat of storm watch plus continual blast at end, storm warning. The storm warning siren consists of a steady 40 second blast, off 20 seconds, another 40 second blast, off 20 seconds, and a final 40 second blast. If a storm actually strikes in the city the siren will be turned on and left on until the situation improves. Special Note: During sirens do not call fire station

or police station. The Fire Department needs spotters around this area.

FHA Loan Application Approved By Council

The City Council authoriz-**Counselor In Cisco** ed the filing of an application for a \$250,000 loan to the Farmers Home Administration and studied details of a waste water disposal plan at the semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

The FHA loan would provide additional financing for the over-all Cisco water treatment plant and system improvement program as approved by voters last April. Part of the financing has already been arranged through the Texas Water Resources Board with a lowinterest rate loan.

In approving the application, which was prepared by City Manager Mike Moore and Ken Martin of Decker, Jacob and Martin, Inc., Abilene engineering firm, Councilmen noted that the city would not be obligated to accept the loan if offered in the event the money was not needed or the interest rate was too high.

Plans for the waste water project, which calls for acquiring some 40 acres of land that would use the treated sewage water for irrigation, was discussed. Jim Webb of Cisco appeared before the board and offered to cooperate with land he owns northeast of town. Mr. Moore said this land would be inspected along with other plots under consideration.

The city manager called attention to a letter from the Texas Water Resources

Board that suggested action within 30 days on an application for a Step 1 Federal EPA grant that has been pending since 1974.

In other action, the Council voted to accept the \$210 bid of Bob Bailey for Lot 25 on the south shore of Lake Cisco.

The resignation of O.T. Killion as municipal judge was accepted. Mr. Killion had served in that capacity for eight years. Loyal Lundstrom, mayor pro tem who presided in the absence of Mayor Eris Ritchie, spoke for the Council in saying "we sincerely appreciate the honesty, sincerity and hard work that Mr. Killion gave to the job." A successor will be named soon, it was noted. Application of Hanvey Oil Production Co. for a second oil well drilling permit was approved. The company's No. 1 well, back of the Cisco Junior College Ag Building, was drilled to 4,100 feet with a good oil show. Officials were reported to be op-

timistic for a good producer. No. 2 was drilling below 2,000 feet. The city manager's schedule for preparation of the 1982-83 budget that will go into effect next Oct. 1 was approved. This calls for work to start with department heads on June 1 and for final approval of the budget on Sept. 14. The Council will hold several hearings and

special meetings before final

approval.

Mr. Moore said the 1981-82 budget would need revision later since water and sewer rate adjustments were made, with expenditures for improvement work and additional income to cover same. The city manager reported that the Eastland County Tax District office has advised him that the City of Cisco will have real property valuations of some \$42,079,306 under the new 100% appraisal program. City valuations of real and personal property was set at \$19,387,823 for the current tax year.

With the new figure, the city tax rate would be about 66 cents per \$100 valuation instead of \$1.65. Mr. Moore noted that the tax rate next year would be set to provide the same revenue that the higher rate has brought in on the lower valuation.

The city park swimming pool is ready for opening of the new season this weekend, the city manager told the Council. He said that eight of 10 old buildings that were condemned have been removed and two others are being repaired or will be soon. Seven more structures are due to be condemned soon, he added.

RAINS MAY BRING MOS-QUITOES

Gordon Woolam Mosquitoes are a problem in all parts of the state. In one way or another they affect everyone. Mosquitoes occuring in the home, about the yard and in public parks can become a nusiance disturbing man in his work and leisure.

Some species of mosquitoes readily transmit diseases such as malaria and yellow fever to man, encephalities to man and horses and heartworms to dogs.

In extreme south Texas, mosquitoes may breed throughout the year. However, in most areas the warmer temperatures of spring, summer and fall are needed for breeding.

All mosquitoes pass through four stages of development - egg, larva (wiggler), pupa and adult. The two most encountered are wigglers and adults.


Although the habit and habitats of different kinds of mosquitoes differ greatly, they all require water to produce their young. Female mosquitoes lay their eggs on water or in areas which will later become flooded.

The eggs of most species hatch in 2 to 3 days. The wigglers which hatch from the eggs feed on organic matter. The wigglers usually pupate within a week. Pupae usually become adults within 2 days. In another day or two the female adults are ready to feed. Male mosquitoes do not bite.

Because of the need for water to breed, the recent rains will play an important role in local mosquito populations. Tin cans, buckets, old tires or other such containers which may collect rain water will become breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

Effective mosquito control requires community cooperation. Homeowners should take every precaution to prevent breeding on their premises by eliminating standing water. In addition to removing water-holding containers, dripping outdoor faucets and leaky pipes should be repaired and puddles resulting from evaporative coolers or air conditioners should be properly drained.

The proper use of insecticides around the home also aids in controlling mosquitoes. Malathion or Sevin' is a commonly used insecticide for mosquito con-







Eastland County Rains Exceed Average; Threaten Peanut Crop Planting, Watershed

The latest Eastland County rains have brought totals above average in some localities, according to DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent, and other weather observers. The exta moisture has been beneficial in some situations, and damaging in others.

The towns of Eastland, Cisco, and Ranger, as well as the community of Morton Valley, have received lover totals than outlying areas to the north and south. Storm damage has not been heavy, although lightening started a fire in an oil storage tank on the Robert Kincaid property N.W. of Eastland during a thunderstorm Tuesday night. There was also a Texas Electric power outage in the Eastland area during this storm, and it lasted about 30 minutes.

"The Tuesday night rains added .8 on the Eastland gauges," says Gordon. "Several small rains during the week totaled 1.5 inches,

which brings the May total in Eastland up to 6.7 inches. The Eastland total for the year is 12.14 inches."

Anton White, weather observer at Cisco, caught .6 in his gauge during the late Tuesday night rain, marking the third night of rain. He has a 5.8 May total for Cisco, making a 10.5 total for the

vear. The Ranger totals, following this pattern, are estimated as .75 on Tuesday night, and about 10 inches for the year. Field inspections made in Eastland County indicate the best time for spray application is May 28 through May 31. Insecticide applications

Price Decontrol Boosts Stripper Oil Production

One very positive effect of the accelerated de-control of crude oil prices last year was the bestever year for drilling, nationally as well as in Texas. A less-publicized, but also very positive effect, was a tremendous increase in stripper well production.

According to premilinary figures from the National Stripper Well Association, output from wells which produce 10 barrels or less of oil per day totaled about 420-million barrels. That represents an increase of some 10-million barrels (4.7-percent) over 1980 production from stripper wells.

In Texas, the increase was even more dramatic. Last year's production of 156.9 million barrels, a 15-million barrel jump over the 1980 level, represented a 10.6-percent increase.

Also increasing dramatically was the number of stripper wells active last year in the state: 114,788 wells. That number is up 11,194 from the 1980 total of 103,594 and represents a 10.8-percent increase.

Those figures are good news for the petroleum industry in Texas. Last year, the state witnessed the phenomenon of many drilling projects which were specifically designed to bring stripper wells into production. More wells drilled and more wells producing means additional work for service and supply companies, further strengthening the state economy

The value of this production - using a preliminary statewide average figure of approximately \$34.58 per barrel for crude oil and condensate amounted to more than \$5.4-billion. Additionally, the severance tax paid to state government - at the rate of 4.6-percent of wellhead value --- was more than \$249.6-million from these producers, often referred to as marginal wells.

Obviously, the benefits for Texas from a healthy petroleum industry are widespread. Decontrol of crude oil has allowed stripper well production to play an even more significant part in the industry's continuing contribution to economic well-being here.

These figres also mean that Texas - the nation's No. 1 crude oil and condensate producing state last year with 928,710,351 barrels - realized 16.9-percent of its production from wells averaging 3.7-barrels per day. Certainly the search must go on for big reservoirs all the way up to major fields with ultimate recoverable reserves of 100-million barrels or more. But, it is no time for this country to take actions that would discourage the recovery of oil from marginal wells.

An end to the so-called windfall profit tax on stripper well oil would be one way by which to prevent a downturn in this vital area of domestic petroleum production.





Six weeks after writing this letter, Nona Reeves gave birth to Emmie Reeves Swinson, my mother. She is now living in Eastland.





Firemen Put Out Lightning Blaze




