

#### PLANTING AND CARE OF ROSES

In picking a location and preparing the bed, remember roses need at least one half day of sun light and they do not like wet feet. Roses are classified as shallow rooted plants, therefore they need proper drainage.

Here I suggest that rose beds be raised up to 12 inches above the ground level by using cross ties, bricks, concrete blocks, etc. Place a one inch layer of gravel at the bottom of a 12 inch bed for drainage. Then fill the balance of the bed with sand, peat moss and perlite or vermiculite in equal amounts.

When digging the hole for the bush be sure to dig it large enough that the roots can be spread out and not bunched together. Do not dig a two-bit hole for a five dollar plant. At the bottom of the hole mound a small hill in the center for the rose to sit on with its roots spread out on all sides. Then fill in with your planting medium to within one hlaf to one inch of the bud union.

The bud union is the large knot between the root system and the canes. Roses are grafted on different root stock than what appears above the ground. Usually the root stock is the Hawaii cultivar.

There are two ways to purchase roses, bare root and canned roses. You may plant canned roses any time of the year by simply cutting the can way and placing the rose

Roses go dormant in the winter in the Northern states. Pruning is done in the spring after the last freeze. You should cut the canes back to within 15 inches of the ground. This is done on all the differnet varieties except the climbers.


The new blooms are born on old growth on the climbers. A climber is pruned only when needed to control the growth after the blooming season is over. This lets a climber produce new canes before going dormant.

The biggest problem with roses is powdery mildew and blackspot which can be controlled by regular spraying of a fungicide such as benlate. If you already have powdery mildew, this can be eradicated by the use of P M Acti Dione. Red spider on your roses can be controlled by the use of an insecticide such as Isotox. If you should have Aphids, you can control them by the use of Malathion.

Your garden editor hopes this helps you with your roses and that you will have beautiful roses this year.

During spring and fall periods when average outside air temperatures are comfortable (82 degrees F. or below), whole house or attic fans can be used to pull outside air into the home and remove heat, points out Dr. Bill R. Stewart, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. However, this practice may not be desirable for those with allergy problems.

A whole house fan is usually installed in a hallway ceiling or other conveninet location so that it can pull air thorugh any or all the rooms, notes Stewart. Air flow will depend on having windows or doors that will open in each room to admit air. Then openings must be adjusted to equalize the air flow or to control the velocity of air through the room.

Whole house fans should be rated to provide an air flow of 10 cubic feet per minute (cfm) for each square foot of house area. Thus, a 1000 square foot home would need a whole house fan rated at 10,000 cfm, explains Stewart.

Where fans are installed in the ceiling to exhaust air out through the attic, be sure there is enough attic ventilator outlet. Attic screened vents should have 1.75 square feet of area per 1000 cfm of fan capacity, says the engineer. These may be gable vents, under eave vents or roof vents.

When whole house fans are installed in ceilings they should be covered when central air conditioners are used to prevent excess attic heat

from entering the home through the fan openings. Another method of reducing air conditioning bills during the summer, particularly for those homes with low

ly for those homes with low levels of ceiling insulation, is to provide attic ventilation, says Stewart, since air will try to rise as it is heated.

Attics can be ventilated by providing adequate outlet vents near the peak of the roof along with the same amount of inlet vents at the eave. Both inlets and outlets should be uniformly distributed to provide uniform replacement of attic air.

Research with attic ventilation has shown that attic temperatures can be reduced substantially by providing about one square inch each of vent outlet and inlet per square foot of ceiling

area, notes the engineer. The greater the difference in height between inlets and outlets, the greater will be the ventilation rate. High peaked roofs are easier to ventilate than low sloped roofs.

Some roofs are not easy to ventilate by gravity systems, so power vents can be used. However, research in the Houston area has indicated no significant saving in energy use when a home had a ceiling insulation level of R-19 (6.5 to 8 inches of insulation).

New regulations on taking red drum (redfish) in both fresh and saltwater and numerous modifications of deer hunting regulations highlighted action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a meeting here Thursday (May 13). The commission adopted 1982-83 hunting and fishing regulation changes for counties under its regulatory authority. However, sportsmen are cautioned that in some counties, the adopted regulations are subject to approve or disapproval by county commissioners courts. Hunting and fishing laws in non-regulatory or "general law" counties remain the same.

The adopted regulations will go into effect Sept. 1, 1982. Hunters and fishermen should consult the Parks and Wildlife Department's 1982-83 hunting and fishing regulations digests and supplements which will be available from license outlets in August, officials said.

The commission adopted a regulation prohibiting the retention of saltwater redfish and spotted seatrout taken by nets, seins or trotlines. Exceptions are dip nets and sail lines.

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Another regulation prohibits the use of nets by sport netters. Only holders of commercial fishing licenses are permitted to use nets.

New regulations also established a daily bag limit of 10, possession limit of 20, for introduced redfish in Texas' freshwater impoundments. A minimum length limit of 16 inches and maximum length limit of 35 in-

# **State Health Plan Given Approval**


Health priorities for Texas have been set in the 1982 Texas State Health Plan(SHP) which was adopted by the Statewide Health Coordinating Council and approved by Govenor Clements.

The SHP was developed by the Bureau of State Health Planning and Resource Development of the Texas Department of Health (TDH). It reflects the input from 18 state health and health-related agencies, as well as numerous private associations and organizations and staff from TDH programs.

Health priorities included in the SHP include communicable diseases, maternal and child health, cardiovascular conditions, dental conditions, cancer, nutritional conditions, respiratory conditions, alcoholism, mental illness, drug absue, and mental retardation. The environmental health issues of water quality, solid waste disposal, and air quality are also addressed in the SHP. Emergency medical services are viewed by many persons in Texas to be a : special concern and were addressed as such in the plan.

Finally, the SHP for the first time contains a chapter dealing with health resources. This chapter includes a discussion on the provisions of short and long term institutional care and takes a look at the state's health manpower shortages.

The 1982 SHP serves as a compilation of health policy



benchmarks for use in planning by governmental and non-governmental organizations. Specific goals are set forth for health and healthrelated activities and the actions required to achieve those goals are also detailed in the SHP. The plan will be printed and distributed during June, July, and August. 

Notice to Customers of High Turbidity

Dear Customer: The City of Cisco during the month of April, 1982, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria; (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.
