Tribute Paid To Veterans In Annual Memorial Day Service

The same principles and challenges uttered by President Lincoln in his famous Gettysburg address are still timely today, some 120 years later, Mayor Eris Ritchie declared in a Memorial Day talk at Oakwood Cemetery in Cisco Monday.

"Over the past dozen decades, from horse-drawn carriages to our age of jet aircraft and space vehicles, some things in our lives have become vastly different from that of our forefathers. But, remaining steadfast and timeless, are qualities such as the value of comradeship and pride in our country," Mr. Ritchie said.

"We also hold an eternal sense of gratitude, beyond our ability to express in words, for those who have laid down their lives so that we can enjoy all the blessings of our free society."

Mr. Ritchie said that similar services across the country were honoring military veterans in various ways. "In Cisco, Texas, flags are being placed at the graves of those who served our country so bravely."

Noting that Lincoln's famous Gettysburg Address has been traditionally read at Memorial Day services for many decades all across America, Mr. Ritchie said the speech still expressed timely sentiment. He read the address. He closed his talk by quoting "words of a

Great Master: 'Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends'."

Mr. Ritchie commended the American Legion for continuing the tradition of the Memorial Day services each year and expressed gratitude to the Cisco Cemetery Association for the beautiful condition of the cemetery.

Brad Kimbrough, Legion Post Commander, presided at the service held in the center of the cemetery under a new flag pole and dedication marker.

The service opened with music by two trumpets (Al Young and Ben Strieff), two trombones (Kendall Anderson and John Bailey) and drums (Greg Sipe), playing the national anthem led by Mark Bird, music director at East Cisco Baptist Church. The audience sang "America the Beautiful" and "God Bless America."

The Rev. Ben Hubert, interim pastor of First Christian Church, gave the invocation. The benediction was given by the Rev. Arno Bentley, pastor of East Cisco Baptist Church, and "Taps" was sounded on a trumpet by Mr. Hubert to conclude the service.

Miniature flags were made available by the Legion Post for anyone present to place on graves of military veterans.

Mr. Kimbrough and Gene

Abbott were in charge of arrangements for the annual service.

The cemetery flag flew at half-mast during the service. At the conclusion of the pro-


gram, the flag was raised to the top of the pole. A record crowd attended the program, which was the highlight of holiday activities in the Cisco area.







Farm Bureau Campaigning To Improve Farm Income

Ernest Reich of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, says that Farm Bureau is conducting an all-out campaign to improve farm income.

He attended a Farm Bureau district meeting May 27, in Abilene, Tex., where the organization's "Action Plan for a Profitable Agriculture" was discussed by leaders throughout this area. Similar meetings are held in all 13 Farm Bureau districts in Texas.

The county farm leader said that Farm Bureau is taking this action because farmers and ranchers are facing their worse crisis since the Great Depression of the 1930s.

Mr. Reich added that the problem is overproduction, coupled with the high cost of production.

Here is Farm Bureau's four-point Action Plan in brief:

(1) Support completion of Economic Recovery Program to stop inflation and lower interest rates.

(2) Expand export markets through export financing of agricultural commodities, and removal of trade barriers.

(3) Stop government from "breaking" markets through export embargoes and release of commodity reserves.

(4) Cut red tape immediately to expedite approve FmHA loans.

"This is the third consecutive year of depressed income in U.S. agriculture," Mr. Reich said. "Prices of the commodities produced in Texas are down on average of about 12 percent from last year at this time. Prices of some of our more important crops are down as much as 20 to 40 percent."

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"This is a serious situation and calls for unity in agriculture," the farm leader said. "The problem we as farmers face are economic and demand economic, not political, solutions."

In explaining the need for completion of the Economic Recovery Program Mr. Reich pointed out that a healthy economy is essential to agriculture and can be best achieved through a balanced budget.

"We continue to believe that the long-term outlook for agriculture is good. We are competitive in world markets and our productivity is unsurpassed. Our profitability in the future depends upon a healthy economic climate at home and abroad," Mr. Reich said.

Le Brun's Self Portrait A Favorite Painting At Fort Worth's Kimbell Art Museum



Visitors to the Kimbell Art Museum - located on Will Rogers Rd. off Lancaster Blvd. in Ft. Worth are often drawn to the Le Brun "Self Portrait". The painting has a strange, luminescent quality. The eyes seem alive, the hair shines softly, the earrings glow.

This painting was a favorite of the late Mr. and Mrs. Kay Kimbell, who left their fortune for the establishment of a place where fine art would be available to the public.

Now people of this area will have a rare opportunity to view 56 works of this French artist Elizabeth Louise Vigee Le Brun (1755-1842) in a major exhibition at the Museum. It will last from June 5 through Aug. 8, and the hours will be Tuesday-Saturday 10 a.m.-5 p.m., Sunday 1 p.m.-5 p.m., closed Monday. Admission will be free.

There will be public lectures dealing with the painter and the era in which she lived, as well as films about the French Revolution. The films will be presented on Saturdays and Sundays at 1:30 p.m. from June 12 through July 3. All of these events are free, and seating will be on a first-come basis.

Vigee Le Brun, best known for her portraits of Queen Antoinette and the aristocratic society of that time, is considered one of the most successful women artists of any age.

The exhibition will include works lent from major museum and private collections in the United States and Europe, and they range in date from the early 1770's to 1819. Paintings done in Paris during the 1770's and the 1780's as well as portraits painted later in Italy, Austria and Russia after the French Revolution will be on view.

Some of the most important sitters represented will be Duchesse d'Orleans, Lady Hamilton, King Stanislas II of Poland, the painter Joseph Vernet, and Queen Marie Antoinette. Also featured in the show will be portraits of the artist's family, and her early history painting "Peace Bringing Back Abundance". This was recently conserved by the Louvre for inclusion in this exhibition.

Major lenders, besides the Louvre, include: The Palace of Versailles, National Gallery of Art, Washington, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.

This is the first time such a Le Brun exhibition has ever been assembled, and will be shown exclusively in Ft. Worth. It was undertaken at the suggestion of David Robb, Jr., Chief Curator, as part of the Museum's 10th Anniversary celebration of its 1972 opening.

The viewing of this collection is an experience no one should miss. So it is hoped that a number of Eastland County people will be able to visit Kimbell Museum, during this time.

PLANTING AND CARE OF ROSES

In picking a location and preparing the bed, remember roses need at least one half day of sun light and they do not like wet feet. Roses are classified as shallow rooted plants, therefore they need proper drainage.

Here I suggest that rose beds be raised up to 12 inches above the ground level by using cross ties, bricks, concrete blocks, etc. Place a one inch layer of gravel at the bottom of a 12 inch bed for drainage. Then fill the balance of the bed with sand, peat moss and perlite or vermiculite in equal amounts.

When digging the hole for the bush be sure to dig it large enough that the roots can be spread out and not bunched together. Do not dig a two-bit hole for a five dollar plant. At the bottom of the hole mound a small hill in the center for the rose to sit on with its roots spread out on all sides. Then fill in with your planting medium to within one half to one inch of the bud union.

The bud union is the large knot between the root system and the canes. Roses are grafted on different root stock than what appears above the ground. Usually the root stock is the Hawaii cultivar.

There are two ways to purchase roses, bare root and canned roses. You may plant canned roses any time of the year by simply cutting the rose can way and placing the rose

with soil intact in the hole in the bed. The bare root roses can be planted only in the spring or late fall. Which is the best is a matter of personal opinion.

Roses are graded by standards such as No. 1, No. 1½, No. 2, and No. 2½. The number one grade rose has at least three canes with the canes one-half to three-fourth inches in diameter. Remember, you may save money on your initial purchase by buying a rose which is of quality less than a No. 1 but you will spend as much or more on fertilizer and care and still you will not have a No. 1 bloom.

After planting, I recommend a good application of humic acid as this lessens the shock of transplant. Humic acid is not a root stimulator, the first year rose must be kept well watered and not allowed to dry out. They are building their root system. After the first year, a bush needs two inches of water per week. Here I recommend you place a coffee can in your bed to keep track of the water weekly, especially if mother nature does not furnish the needed rain.

This is where a good mulch comes in handy. A one-inch layer of cedar mulch helps conserve your moisture. Cedar mulch has been proven to retard nematodes and restore nitrogen to the soil.

Roses should be fed twice a year, the first year with a well balanced fertilizer such

as 20-20-20 water soluble. Remember that your fertilizer has to get into a liquid form before your plant can use it.

Roses go dormant in the winter in the Northern states. Pruning is done in the spring after the last freeze. You should cut the canes back to within 15 inches of the ground. This is done on all the different varieties except the climbers.

The new blooms are born on old growth on the climbers. A climber is pruned only when needed to control the growth after the blooming season is over. This lets a climber produce new canes before going dormant.

The biggest problem with roses is powdery mildew and blackspot which can be controlled by regular spraying of a fungicide such as benlate. If you already have powdery mildew, this can be eradicated by the use of P M Acti Dione. Red spider on your roses can be controlled by the use of an insecticide such as Isotox. If you should have Aphids, you can control them by the use of Malathion.

Your garden editor hopes this helps you with your roses and that you will have beautiful roses this year.

Oil Report

Location 2.5 miles north-northeast of Lacosa, LHG Resources of Midland has finished a new oil producer in Stephens County's Northeast Frankel Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Eddleman Oil Unit, producing oil at the rate of 10 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 185,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in an 80-acre lease in the T&PRR County Survey. Bottomed at 3,429 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,190 to 3,235 feet into the hole.

Fagadau Energy Corp. of Dallas has filed first production on a new oil well in the Four J Field. The No. 1 C.W. Wulfjen showed potential to make 14 barrels of oil per day.

The operator has 165 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's TE&L County Survey, eight miles southeast of Breckenridge.

The well will produce from an interval 3,706 to 3,710 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,318 feet.

A 2,300-ft. developmental well is planned by W.C. Neill Drilling Company of Abilene at a drillsite 12 miles south of Breckenridge, Stephens County. The location is in an 80-acre lease in the T&PRR County Survey. Well's

designation is the No. 1 Wagley. It is in the Stephens County Regular Field.

The No. 2 Clayton "C" has been completed by a Houston operator as a sturdy new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's Talus Field. The location is seven miles northwest of the Oran townsite and about 3,500 feet south of the Jack County line.

Tested on an 18/64 choke, the well flowed at the rate of 2,059,000 cubic feet of gas per day and was rated at 3,800,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Drilled to total depth of 4,752 feet, the well will produce from a perforated interval in the Conglomerate Formation, 4,215 to 4,326 feet into the wellbore. The drillsite was in a 240-acre lease in the Texas Emigration and Land Board Survey. Mitchell Energy is the operator.

Locations have been staked for two Palo Pinto County

wildcats, both carrying permit for 5,000-ft. total depth at drillsites two miles northeast of Mineral Wells. The wells will be known as the No. 2 and No. 3 McMinn, with RAW Energy Inc. of Weatherford as operator. The operator will be in a 300-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's Richard Starr Survey.

Dallas Producing has filed for permit to drill the No. 35 SET Ranch, a wildcat for oil or gas three miles north of the Brad community, Palo Pinto County. With projected depth of 4,700 feet, the well will be in an 11,625 acre lease assembly in the T&PRR Survey.

Chester R. Upham Jr. of Mineral Wells has filed first production figures on a new gas wildcat, successfully completed three miles southeast of Brazos in Palo Pinto County.

Tested on a .625-in. choke, the well flowed at the rate of 185,000 CF natural gas per day. It was rated at a respectable 1,500,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Bottomed at 4,500 feet, the well will produce from a set of perforations in the Bend Formation, 4,142 to 4,150 feet into the wellbore.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Crawford-Dunaway. It was spudded in a 153-acre lease in the J.W. Cox Survey.

The same Mineral Wells operator has also posted initial potential for the No. 6 Calabria, a successful developmental probe in the Calabria Field, three miles east of Brazos.

Flowing at the rate of 225,000 CF gas per day on a

.625-in. choke, the well indicated ability to produce 1,100,000 CFD on absolute open flow. Upham took the hole to 4,500-ft. bottomhole. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Big Saline Formation, 3,833 to 3,844 feet into the hole.

The Calabria Estate well is in a 2,176-acre lease block in the Allen Williams Survey, Palo Pinto County.

A 4,500-ft. wildcat well is scheduled for spudding two miles west of Palo Pinto in a 960-acre lease, T&PRR Survey, Palo Pinto County. Originala Petroleum Corp. of Fort Worth will be the operator. Aimed at gas production, the explorer well will be known as the No. 9 Padgett Ranch.

Flowing at the rate of 694,000 CF natural gas per day, the No. 1 Worth Ranch has been brought on line in the Palo Pinto County Regular Field by Dawson Operating of Amarillo. Initial production potential was tested on a 24/64 choke at a drillsite four miles north of the Palo Pinto community.

The well was rated at 750,000 CFD potential on absolute open flow.

Drilled to total depth of 3,000 feet, with plugback to 2,373, the well will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Formation, 2,226 to 2,244 feet into the hole.

The South Mineral Wells Field gained a new gasser when Vortt Exploration of Fort Worth finished the No. 1 Rhodes-Green three miles south of the city limits. The well flowed at the rate of 294,000 CFD and was rated

450,000 CFD on open flow. Location is in a 320-acre lease, F.H. Gray Survey, with bottomhole at 4,464 feet. The production interval is in the Mineral Wells Conglomerate, 2,541 to 2,549 feet.

Also in the South Mineral Wells Field, Best Petroleum Exploration Inc. of Mineral Wells successfully completed the No. 1 Parker-McClure, two miles south of the city. It flowed at the rate of 783,000 CF gas per day on a 1.25-in. choke. On absolute open flow, the well came in at 4,700,000 CFD.

The well bottomed at 4,321 feet and will produce from an interval of perforations, 4,144 to 4,152 feet into the wellbore. The operation was in a 45-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's James Dimpkins Survey.

Flowing natural gas at the rate of 1,347,000 cubic feet per day on a 20/64 choke, the No. 3 T.D. Williams has been completed by Breckenridge-based Ridge Oil Co., six miles north of Strawn in Palo Pinto County's North Strawn Field.

After entering pay at 3,934 feet, the well proceeded to 4,175-ft. bottom and was perforated to produce from the Big Saline Conglomerate, 3,936 to 3,940 feet. Location was in a 160-acre unit in the T&PRR Survey.

The Calabria Field gained another new gas well when Harken Oil of Abilene finished the No. 1 Bean "A," six miles northeast of Santo. It flowed 1,324,000 CF per day on a 3/8" choke and was rated 1,605,000 CFD on open flow.

Congressman Kent Hance honored

Texas Congressman Kent Hance will be awarded the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners (TIPRO) Hats Off Award at the Association's 36th Annual Meeting to be held at the Shamrock Hilton in Houston June 6-8.

According to TIPRO officials, Hance will be cited for his outstanding performance as a Congressman and member of the Ways and Means Committee, where he fought for equitable taxation of the independent producer and royalty owner. Hance will respond to the award, and inform an expected 1,000 TIPRO leaders on energy issues from the Administration's point of view.

Natural gas deregulation is one of the subjects which some of Texas' best known independent operators and royalty owners will discuss in open business sessions. Some of the experts who will address the group include C.M. Butler, Chairman of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, and Charles J. Dibona, President of the American Petroleum Institute.

TIPRO members will be informed of issues facing the Texas Legislature by State Representative Gib Lewis of Ft. Worth. Lewis presently serves as Chairman of the House Committee on Inter-governmental affairs, and is a candidate for Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. An economic report of the oil and gas industry will also be presented by Llewellyn King, publisher of Energy Daily.

The meeting will include sessions in which TIPRO's 1982-83 course will be charted for action to improve the political and economic climate for Texas Oil and Gas producers.

TIPRO welcomes the attendance of interested persons at these meetings. Some of the decisions formulated at this Convention are certain to have a bearing on the future dealings of independent operators and royalty owners with Legislators.

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The well will produce from two sets of perforations in the Big Saline Formation, 3880 to 3,890 and 3,928 and 3,934 feet into the hole. The drillsite was in a 160-acre unit, Andrew Klenke Survey, about 470 feet west of the Brazos River channel. Total drilling depth was 4,450 feet.

Snow Oil Company of Fort Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Barrett, a 1,350-ft. wildcat 1.5 miles northwest of Romney. Location is in a 5-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey.

A Dallas-based operator has staked location for the No. 2 J.B. Boggs, a wildcat to be located one mile north of Cisco. With projected total depth of 4,100 feet, the well is in a 202-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey. The operator is Hanvey Production.

3-B Oil Company of Lovington, N. Mex. has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Hawkeye Field. The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 3 Tarver. Drillsite is one mile west of Romney.

Buck Wheat Resources of Eastland has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Hawkeye Field. The No. 3 Cox showed potential to make 50 barrels of oil per day.

The operator has 134-acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, ten miles south of Cisco.

The well will produce from an interval 1,138 to 1,140 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,162 feet.

Texas gas production down 4.52%

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 490,786,592 Mcf of gas in February 1982, down 4.52 percent from field runs a year earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 418,038,756 Mcf and reflected a 4.96 percent decrease from the February 1981 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas exported from Texas in February totaled 276,910,150 Mcf. Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America was the month's largest exporter, moving 75,619,368 Mcf of gas of which 37,144,697 Mcf was Texas-produced gas.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in February totaled 196,879,171 Mcf, and reflected a 6.31 percent increase from the year-earlier month.

Texas gas production in February came from 223,379 oil and gas wells.

In January 1982, Texas wells produced 554,272,209 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in January totaled 472,026,121 Mcf. January exports of Texas-produced gas totaled 216,047,170 Mcf.

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1982-83 Hunting, Fishing Regulations Adopted

New regulations on taking red drum (redfish) in both fresh and saltwater and numerous modifications of deer hunting regulations highlighted action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a meeting here Thursday (May 13).

The commission adopted 1982-83 hunting and fishing regulation changes for counties under its regulatory authority. However, sportsmen are cautioned that in some counties, the adopted regulations are subject to approval or disapproval by county commissioners courts. Hunting and fishing laws in non-regulatory or "general law" counties remain the same.

The adopted regulations will go into effect Sept. 1, 1982. Hunters and fishermen should consult the Parks and Wildlife Department's 1982-83 hunting and fishing regulations digests and supplements which will be available from license outlets in August, officials said.

The commission adopted a regulation prohibiting the retention of saltwater redfish and spotted seatrout taken by nets, seines or trollines. Exceptions are dip nets and sail lines.

Another regulation prohibits the use of nets by sport netters. Only holders of commercial fishing licenses are permitted to use nets.

New regulations also established a daily bag limit of 10, possession limit of 20, for introduced redfish in Texas' freshwater impoundments. A minimum length limit of 16 inches and maximum length limit of 35 inches also were adopted.

A revision of the method for controlling the harvest of antlerless deer in counties which have an either-sex deer hunting season was one of the major hunting law regulation changes adopted.

In those counties, the department will issue special antlerless deer tags to landowners in areas having a surplus of antlerless deer on an unlimited basis. Last season, hunters were required only to attach tags from their hunting license on antlerless deer taken. Most Texas counties have the standard antlerless deer permit system, wherein landowners are issued a specific number of permits, based on deer populations in the county or compartment of the county.

The antlerless deer tag system for either-sex counties offers the potential for a significant harvest of surplus antlerless deer, but gives landowners more control than they had in the previous program, officials said.

In most counties, the white-tailed deer season will be Nov. 13, 1982, to Jan. 2, 1983. Other hunting regulation changes included:

- Antlerless deer permits no longer must be attached to a foreleg of the animal. The regulation requires only that the permit be attached to the carcass.

- Duval County will be added to those South Texas counties having a buck permit system for quality deer management. Issuance of buck permits in this county will be on an unlimited basis for the 1982-83 deer hunting season.

- Deer hunting regulations were standardized in Dimmit, Harrison, Kinney, Medina, Robertson, Uvalde and Zavala Counties. They will have the standard 51-day deer season, Nov. 13, 1982 - Jan. 2, 1983, with the standard bag limit of three deer, no more than two bucks, antlerless by permit only.

- The commission proposed the addition of 14 counties to the "either sex" deer hunting regulation, with tags issued to landowners on an unlimited basis in portions of those counties which have an overpopulation of deer. Counties added are Bandera, Comal, Crockett, Edwards, Gillespie, Hays, Kerr, Kimble, Lampasas, Mason, Real, San Saba, Sutton and Val Verde. This proposal is subject to approval or disapproval by commissioners courts in these counties.

- In Medina and Kinney Counties the buck bag limit would be increased from one to two, subject to approval by the County Commissioners Court.

- Duval County was given the early antlerless-only deer hunting season, Oct. 23 - Nov. 7, to provide landowners additional hunting days in which to remove surplus antlerless deer.

- Smith County was given the standard 51-day deer season, with a bag limit of three deer, no more than one buck, antlerless by permit only.

- Harvest of antlerless deer by permit will be allowed

in Robertson County, subject to approval by the commissioners court.

- Dimmit, Edwards, Kendall, Kinney, Medina and Real Counties received the standard 30-day archery-only deer season, Oct. 2-31, which provides five weekends of hunting, subject to approval by commissioners courts in those counties.

- Controlled archery-only deer hunts conducted by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service will be permitted on the Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge in Grayson County. The deer season remains closed in the remainder of Grayson county.

- A no-closed season, with a bag limit of two, is proposed for javelina in Edwards, Frio, Kerr, Medina and Real Counties, subject to commissioners court approval.

- The bag limit for squirrels in 32 northcentral Texas counties are eliminated, since existing hunting pressure is low.

Hunters in 12 Panhandle counties offering a two-day prairie chicken hunting season will be required to bring birds to department check stations so biologists can determine the age and sex ratio of the harvest.

- As in the past, the commission delayed setting quail bag limits until late summer production surveys are completed.

- A standard-length turkey season was approved to run concurrently with the deer season in Dimmit, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, Uvalde and Zavala Counties, subject to approval by county commissioners courts. The change also would allow archery turkey seasons in Dimmit, Edwards, Kendall and Real Counties.

- A spring 1983 turkey gobbler season will be proposed for 11 additional counties. They are Bandera, Brooks, Edwards, Frio, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Medina, Reagan and Real. This recommendation is sub-

ject to approval of county commissioners courts.

- An additional small portion of south Newton County was adopted for a spring turkey gobbler season 1983, as a result of increased populations from restocking programs.

Mrs. Fields was born on September 22, 1902 near Rising Star. She later moved near Cisco. She met Christ face and face and was saved at Grapevine on August 2, 1922. She joined the Missionary Baptist Church and was baptized in the summer of 1923.

She married Lee Fields on December 9, 1925, at Carbon. She was a housewife, a member of the Mangrum Baptist Church. She taught Sunday School for many years.

State Health Plan Given Approval

Health priorities for Texas have been set in the 1982 Texas State Health Plan (SHP) which was adopted by the Statewide Health Coordinating Council and approved by Governor Clements.

The SHP was developed by the Bureau of State Health Planning and Resource Development of the Texas Department of Health (TDH). It reflects the input from 18 state health and health-related agencies, as well as numerous private associations and organizations and staff from TDH programs.

Health priorities included in the SHP include communicable diseases, maternal and child health, cardiovascular conditions, dental conditions, cancer, nutritional conditions, respiratory conditions, alcoholism, mental illness, drug abuse, and mental retardation. The environmental health issues of water quality, solid waste disposal, and air quality are also addressed in the SHP.

Emergency medical services are viewed by many persons in Texas to be a special concern and were addressed as such in the plan. Finally, the SHP for the first time contains a chapter dealing with health resources. This chapter includes a discussion on the provisions of short and long term institutional care and takes a look at the state's health manpower shortages.

The 1982 SHP serves as a compilation of health policy

for the state and provides for resource allocation on the state level. It also presents benchmarks for use in planning by governmental and non-governmental organizations. Specific goals are set forth for health and health-related activities and the actions required to achieve those goals are also detailed in the SHP. The plan will be printed and distributed during June, July, and August. 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20th Annual Stiles Farm Field Day June 15

Discussions on the production of beef cattle, largemouth bass and various crops and how computers can fit into the overall scheme of things will highlight the 20th annual Stiles Farm Field Day at Thrall June 15.

Tours will begin at 2 p.m. and feature the latest information on growing cotton and grain sorghums in the Central Texas Blacklands along with managing farm ponds for largemouth bass and managing different phases of a beef cattle operation to make money.

Keynote speaker at the annual field day will be H.C. "Dulie" Bell Jr., Austin businessman and a member of the Board of Regent of the Texas A&M University System. Bell will discuss the significance of the Stiles

Farm to Central Texas agriculture at a 5:30 p.m. program.

Dr. Frank W.R. Hubbert, chancellor of the Texas A&M University System, will serve as master of ceremonies.

The program also will feature the recognition of 10 outstanding Central Texas high school graduates who have been selected to receive \$500 Stiles Farm Foundation scholarships to study agriculture at Texas A&M University.

A barbecue sponsored by businesses in Williamson County and the surrounding area will conclude the field day.

Jim Pelham of American Legion Post 553 presented the inspiring General Order of The Republic, dated May 5, 1868, by which Memorial Day was first officially recognized.

Father Jim Miller of St. Rita's Catholic Church of Ranger delivered a Prayer For Peace.

The Gold Star Mothers living in Eastland County were recognized by Master of Ceremonies Emory Walton. These are the Mothers who have lost sons during time of war. One such Mother, Mrs. J.D. Parsons, was present for the ceremony. Walton read the names of the living World War I veterans from Eastland County, two of whom were present. They were Carl Timmons and Hugh Mehahey.



Strain of St. Augustine grass improved

Do you admire the bright, soft blades of St. Augustine grass, but have decided that it cannot tolerate the cold snaps, dry summers and grass viruses of North Central Texas?

Then it might be worthwhile to consider a new strain of the grass - a type called Raleigh St. Augustine by the Texas Extension Service.

This new disease resistant variety was recently released by the Texas and North Carolina Agriculture Experiment Stations. In addition to withstanding the St. Augustine Decline virus, this grass shows a considerable amount of cold weather tolerance. It has about the cold tolerance of the old common St. Augustine grass, and considerably more than the previous disease resistant variety.

Floritam.

The new type exhibits a slightly darker green color than common St. Augustine grass, but in other growth characteristics it is very similar to the older type. In tests during the rather cold winter of 1981-82, the grass survived around Stephenville all the way to the Burnet, Breckenridge, and Abilene areas. Green-up percentage was as good, or better, than common St. Augustine grass planted at the same time.

Although this grass is still rather expensive as compared to the older types, its chance of survival over a 4 or 5 year period is much greater.

Some area nurserymen are beginning to feature this promising grass - and it's something worth watching for.

The President took special notice of National Pest Control Month, saying that this is an excellent time to focus attention on the persistence of pests and to discuss how we can all work to contain and control them.

He commended the National Pest Control Association (NPCA) and the industry it represents for participating in this educational effort behind the observance.

"I encourage everyone to support effective pest management whenever and wherever possible," his message concluded.

The association has more than 2,500 members nationwide devoted to controlling unwanted pests that attack food and other stored products, destroy frame homes and buildings, transmit a wide variety of diseases and are generally objectionable.

Pest control firms annually service some 10 million dwellings as well as most of the nation's 240,000 retail food outlets, 400,000 commercial restaurants and kitchens, and 55,000 hotels and motels.


