IF YOU are interested in seals? helping to protect wildlife, then you may be interested in the following article from the Seal Rescue Fund, (A project of The Center for Environmental Education), 624 9th Street N.W., Washington, D.C. 20001.

The article is as follows: While many people are aware of the brutal annual clubbing of 10-day old baby Harp Seals in Canadian waters, few people - in the U.S. and abroad - are aware

of similar threats facing

other species of seals. Each of the species being talked about - the Hooded, Ringed, Harbor, Fur and Monk Seals, as well as the Walrus - are under such intense pressure from hunting and habitat destruction, that the Seal Rescue Fund (SFR) is increasing its efforts to stop the decline in seal populations before it's too

The threats facing the survival of each species of seal vary significantly but each is caused by man's reckless abuse of nature.

For instance, the Hooded Seals are clubbed and killed exclusively for their valuable pelts, which are sold to satisfy European fashion desires. While the clubbing of Harp Seal pups grabs the headlines, the pelts of Hooded Seals bring 300-400% more money than those of the Harp Seals and are the real profit motive for the Canadian seal massacre which takes place each spr-

The Ringed Seal population has declined by an alarming 50% in areas of seismic (explosive) testing for oil exploration, apparently because nursing mothers are abandoning their pups.

Without due care or caution, the oil industry is rapidly bringing havoc to the otherwise idyllic environment of Alaska's North

The Harbor Seal is a victim of conflict with the commercial fishing industry where years of overfishing, as well as interference from hydroelectric dams, has epleted once fertile fishing grounds. The industry's answer? "Kill the seals, 'cause they're eating too

many fish." The Hawaiian Monk Seal population has also suffered a dramatic decline caused by destruction of their habitat resulting from increased human disturbance of their fragile environment. The 500-600 remaining Hawaiian Monk Seals are the rarest of all American marine mammals.

Even the docile, colorful Walrus has fallen prey to man's greed. In this case, however, it's not food - or even competition for food which is causing its demise, but the lucrative "black market" which exists for Walrus tusk ivory.

Incredible though it may seem, the Walrus poachers shoot the Walrus and then use a chain saw to decapitate their catch. Almost 10,000 Walruses were killed last year, up 670% in just two

Why does this carnage continue? Why won't the U.S. and Canadian governments "do something" about the increased killing of

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

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

Canned Pickles

Now that pickling season is here, insure that you have the right vinegar on hand to insure a safe pickled pro-

Read the label carefully when selecting vinegar for making pickles, advises Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Buy vinegar for pickles that is between four and six percent or 40 to 60 grains (one percent vinegar is equal to 10 grain), she recommends.

Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Some vinegar on the market is 100 grain vinegar

The frontier era when men on the scene in this region in the early 1920s, noted that "we have gone through two periods of inflation - the 1920s and the present." He recalled the great depression that followed the stock market collapse in 1929 and cautioned that "we can see some of the same conditions and signs that prevailed

prior to the depression." It is a good idea to consider the past when we take steps to shape the future, Mr.

Butler said. The first oil drilling took part in this county around 1910 when a man named Lightfoot promoted a well near Eastland, Mr. Butler said. There was no news of the well but it was abandoned and the promoters moved away, he added.

A few years later, another project by Texas Coal Co. found shallow gas but abandoned it.

After the boll weevil ruined the cotton planting industry of the county in 1915 and 1916 and a severe drought took its toll in 1917, Mr. Butler said, the county needed the oil boom that resulted when John Gholson and Col. Gordon began prospecting. The famous Mc-Cleskey well near Ranger flowed over 1700 barrels per day in 1918 and the boom was underway

Mr. Butler said that the present conservation laws resulted from mistakes at the Mexia boom, the Ranger boom and, finally, the East Texas boom when oil wells were drilled without regard for location or need and oil sold for as little as ten cents

The National Guard and Texas Rangers were called on to handle law and order in early day oil boom cities, Mr. Butler recalled. He said that on one occasion, some 1,500 undesirable persons were rounded up in Mexia and placed on a special train going south.

Geologists and oil men have told Mr. Butler that as much as 70 per cent of the oil that could have been produced in Eastland County remains under the ground due to the complete disregard for conservation practices. He noted that oil drilling has progressed over the years from cable tools and nitroglycerin in the 1920s to rotary rigs with acidizing and formation fracturing.

Rotarian Joe Sitton was program chairman and introduced Mr. Butler. President Armo Chambers said that nine members of the club attended a luncheon at Ranger last week.

BLOSSOM-END ROT Gordon Woolam

Are your tomatoes turning black and starting to rot on the blossom-end just as they start to ripen? If they are they are probably suffering from blossom-end rot. This is a non-parasitic or physiological disease. That is to say it is not caused by a

plants have grown rapidly and luxuriantly during the early part of the season and then are subjected to prolonged dry weather at a time when the fruit is in an early stage of development. However, it can also occur after periods of unusually abundant rain. Heavy applications of nitrogen and extreme fluctuations in water supply are favorable to

blossom-end rot.

The first sign of the disorder is a water-soaked spot near the blossom end of the fruit. This spot becomes brown and enlarges until it may cover a third to a half of the surface.

The basic cause of the disorder is a calcium defeciency. This can be caused by the leaching of soluble calcium. Another cause could be due to excessive total salts in the soil. When salt concentration increases, the effective concentration of available calcium salts decreases more rapidly than other soluble salts.

In dry weather, soluble salts accumulate in the surface soil either by movement upward in the soil or by fertilizer side dressings. When rain moves these accumulated salts downward. the total salt concentration increases and the calcium

ratio is decreased. When soils remain excessively wet, the ammonium nitrogen accumulates and can markedly reduce the uptake of calcium and cause blossomend rot. The accumulation of the ammonium nitrogen inhibits uptake of calcium by the roots. This disorder can occur in both excessively moist and dry soils even though an abundance of calcium may be present.

Very rapid vegetative growth, which often is associated with blossom-end rot, draws heavily on the supply of calcium. Since calcium is not moved from older to younger plant tissues, even a temporary deficiency of the element can cause injury to develop-

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New Method For Applying Nitrogen

Did you ever reach the realization that some of the tings that you were taught over & over as a youth are wrong? A basic fact taught me while in college soils courses was that nitrogen applications should be split when rates exceeded 100 pounds of actual nitrogen (300 lbs. of ammonium nitrate). I believed that I was taught, as have most other farmers, ranchers and agronomists," says Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist in Stephenville. could not have been

On soils known to be deficient in calcium, gypsum or lime may be added to soil prior to planting. After the tomatoes are planted (when the problem is usually noticed), surface application of materials containing soluble calcium are not generally advisable. The available calcium can be supplemented by spraying the foliage with an hydrous calcium chloride. However, the produce is not readily available and prolonged use can injure the foliage. Soil aeration in excessively moist soils may be beneficial.

This disorder can be very frustrating to the tomato gardener because there is no solution readily available. Remove blemished fruit and attempt to maintain a stable water supply.

The data indicated that 300 lbs. of nitrogen (900 lbs. of ammonium nitrate) gave a higher coastal bermudagrass hay yield than 100 lbs. of nitrogen applied in the spring and after the first & second cutting. "Since I had been taught well, I knew this data was incorrect & continued the demonstration to prove my point. When my data agreed with previous work, I concluded that this particular field was different --- my teachers

wrong..." says Alston.

Continuing to prove that split applications of nitrogen are better than one single, large application, plot location & size were changed. Alston then went to large plots with baler harvest only to find that the books were wrong. An Eastland Co. hay producer, R.D. Hart and his County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon, have been conducting coastal bermuda grass fertilizer demonstrations since 1979. They have found that nitrogen applied in April gives better results than when the applications are split. One large application of nitrogen will work. A little thinking on his part convinced him that this all makes sense. If you put down 300 pounds of nitrogen in April, all the nitrogen is available for plant growth for the duration of time that it remains in the soil. If split applications are use, the second and or third application may not receive surface moisture which is necessary to move the nitrogen into the root zone. However, if nitrogen is already in the soil, moisture may, & most times is, adequate for



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

The good rains we had in May helped crops, pastures, gardens and lawns grow at maximum rates, but the warm, humid weather also is

the cause of some problems. We are seeing some leaf spot on bermudagrass lawns known as Helminthosporium leaf spot. Symptoms of this fungal disease appear as irregular patches ranging in size from two the several feet in diameter. Infections on leaves appear as a small olive green spot which enlarges to form dark blotches. Infected leaves die and fade to a light tan color. The entire plant is killed whn the root rot phase of this disease developes.

The disease causing fungus over winters in thatch at the base of the plant and develops when the weather is warm and humid.

A chemical control is recommended where this disease is a problem. Any one of the following fungicides will control the spread of this disease: Captan, Daconil 2787, Acti-Dione, Tore or Tepsan LSR.

Grey Leaf Spot is another we have seen in lawns. The chemical fungicides listed above will also control this disease.

Do you have problems trying to keep home grown potatoes? Fresh potatoes can be harvested any time for immediate consumption, but quality is lowered by harvesting all your potatoes before tops begin to dry down. Potatoes harvested early have thin skins which allow fairly rapid water loss, causing them to shrivel and become soft shortly after storage.

Once harvested, proper storage is important to maintain the quality of fresh potatoes. Do not wash the potatoes after harvest. In washing, if a disease is present, the organism will be spread. A number of abrasions may occur which will result in areas where disease organisms can enter. When the lenticels (pores) are

******** enlarged due to a high rate of rainfall like this year, disease losses will be greater due to the lenticels acting as infection sites.

Never store potatoes that are diseased. These will only continue to decay, causing additional losses. Potatoes which were bruised in harvesting should be consumed first. It is best to dig potatoes and store them in a warm area (55 to 60 degrees) for 15 days and then reduce to temperature of 40 degrees. Prior to using, the potatoes should be warmed to improve quality.

Always keep potatoes in complete darkness. Exposure to light causes freshly dug potatoes to turn green and develop an undesireable bitter flavor. Potatoes can be stored for 5 to 6 months if handled pro-

Congressional debate on the nation's budget design is revolving around various proposals that call for a minimum of 95 billion in new tax revenue during the next three years. The tax total could be even higher. A lot of this is aimed toward oil.

industry takes the position that there should be no new taxes levied on it. According to 1981 reports, the domestic industry paid 58 billions to Federal state and local government, or some \$8.40 per barrel for oil and gas

proposals is the "Crude Oil Profit Sharing Act of 1982", which is back by a coalition of northeast and midwest legislatures. This suggestion would tax domestic crude 30 per cent of wellhead value on top of existing taxes, taking another \$9.00 per barrel.

costs and percentage depletion as preference items under a 15 percent alternate minumum tax structure.

Also being considered is a partial or total elimination of windfall tax changes passes in 1981. These include exemption of independent producer stripper oil beginning in 1983, and a phase down of the two (and later three) barrel per day exemption of royalty owners. There are also suggestions on natural gas taxation, and possible levies on all domestic energy on a Btu basis.

The idea of taxing foreign oil entering the United States remains in the wings. A number of Independent producers and royalty owners have stated that they favor this sort of taxation, rather than further levies on the domestic industry. They point out that there is a current 30 per cent decline in drilling rig operations, nationwide, and that new taxation measures will over-

whelm the country with an

expensive foreign flow of oil. Citizens with opinions on new oil taxation should write the Administratiion and members of Congress immediately pointing out in specific terms what new taxation would do to individual drilling programs and ability of the oil industry to pro-

Homemaking Hints

To offset spiraling food costs, many people are turning to home grown fruits and vegetables. As more and more food begins to ripen, produce which can't be eaten or given away is usually canned. Home canning provides safe, inexpensive, quality products - but only if the fruits and vegetables and especially tomato products, have been carefully selected and properly processed. Improper canning may result in botulism, a food poisoning which may cause death. Botulism is caused by the toxin formed during the growth of the bacteria, clostridium botulinum. This may result from improper processing which may be avoided by following these

canning guidelines. * DON'T TAKE SHORT-CUTS OR EXPERIMENT IN HOME CANNING. Use only tested currently approved methods, such as those described in USDA and Extension Service food preservation bulletins.

* USE ONLY JARS, CANS AND LIDS MADE ESPECIALLY FOR HOME CANNING. Never use ordinary jars such as mayonnaise or coffee jars.

* DO NOT REUSE SEAL-ING LIDS. The rubber rings deterioates easily and prevents a tight seal.

* DO NOT USE OVER-RIPE FOOD. Products change in chemical composition with age and lose acidity

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Rains Cause Optimism For State's Wildlife

Recent rains across Texas may be creating another bumper year for wildlife, particularly upland game birds.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists say the spring rains which have soaked most of the state are almost a carbon copy of last year's weather which helped boost populations of quail, turkey and white-tailed deer to outstanding levels. "If we continue to have a

reasonable amount of ground moisture through the summer months I think we can expect an excellent hatch and survival rates for turkey and quail," said Don Wilson, upland game program leader. "If that happens, it will be the first backto-back years for quail in several years."

Wilson qualified his prediction by saying that in some areas of the state where quail habitat is marginal, populations vary little from year to year "However, in South Texas and other areas the pattern usually is a good year followed by a poor one, or vice versa," Wilson said. "Last year was excellent in virtually all the traditional quail hunting

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



THE JUNE issue of Texas Monthly Magazine has an interesting article entitled "The Horny Toad" by Anne Dingus. The horny toad, as it is called by everybody except Texas Christian University whose athletic teams are the Horned Frogs, is legally a lizard, the article notes.

The article includes this paragraph: "The most famous Texas horny toad was Old Rip, who was placed inside the cornerstone of the old Eastland County courthouse when it was built in 1897. Thirty-one years later, the courthouse was torn down and, legend has it, there in the cornerstone was Old Rip, none too perky but still alive.

'Named after Rip Van Winkle, he went on tour and was exhibited to thousand: of people, including then president Calvin Coolidge (it was reputedly one of the few times that solemn gent smiled). When Old Rip died, his body was embalmed, and it is still on display in Eastland. Biologists scoff at the idea that Old Rip lived 31 years; most horny toads live a mere six years or so.'

The article reports that horny toads live almost exclusively on red ants and that the use of pesticides to kill ants has cut into their food supply. A toad eats dozens of ants at one sitting; one spraying kills thousands. It's an interesting article.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.


