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Reappraisal Notices Near Release

Most Eastland County property owners will be receiving their 1982 property revaluation notices within the next few days. The revaluation or reappraisal notices are set to be mailed out from the Eastland County Appraisal District during the week of June 14, 1982.

The reappraisal notices will inform the owners of taxable property within the County as the new reappraised value of their property. Every type of taxable property-residential, commercial, business personal, and agricultural has been reappraised.

The reappraisal work is being done by the professional appraisal firm of McMorries and Company. The work has been going on for over 12 months in order to meet the State mandated dealine of 1982. The new State Property Tax Code requires that all taxing districts have a fair market value placed upon all categories of property for the 1982 tax year.

Each appraisal notice will contain information as the name and address of the property owner, the legal description of the property being valued, the taxing jurisdictions the property is located within, the new appraised value for the property, and the estimated tax rate and amount of tax due for the property. This last item is only an estimate, as the actual tax rate and amount of tax due on the property will not be determined until later when the various taxing jurisdictions set their 1982 tax rates and set their 1982 budgets.

It is important that the property owner not confuse the notice of reappraisal

with a tax statement. It is not a tax statement and is not to be paid.





It will be located in a 30-acre lease in the TE&L Survey. Aimed at either oil or gas pay, the wells is earmarked for 4,500-ft. total depth.

Flowing 10 barrels of oil and 287,000 CF casinghead gas per day on a 16/64 choke, the No. 1 Nolen has been finaled by LHG Resources Inc. of Midland in the Stephens County Regular Field.

Drillsite was in a 190-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey, four miles north of Ranger.

Showing 125 PSI tubing pressure, the well was bottomed at 3,990 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,560 to 3,620 feet into the hole.

The Jones Co. of Albany has driven stake for the No. 8 Roy, a developmental well in Stephens County's Corbett gas field. With projected total depth of 4,950 feet, the well is aimed at gas production in either the Duffer or Strawn Formations. Location is in the Ruthy Campbell Survey, four miles northeast of the Ivan community.


