Gruver Man Called As Local Church Pastor

Mr. Steffen served as youth and education director of the First Christian Church at Borger before becoming pastor of the Christian Church at Gruver some three years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Steffen attended a fellowship meeting of the First Christian Church in Cisco last Thursday night and spoke to the group on his views of the church and its minister. He had been invited and recommended by the pulpit committee, which was composed of J.C. Fletcher, Standlee McCracken, Randy Speegle and Mrs. Vandell Weathers.

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Extension Programs Meet Today's Challenges 'Head On'

COLLEGE STATION—Call 'em "trying times," "hard times" or a recession," the early '80's pose one of the greatest economic and social challenges Texans have faced in many decades.

Texans also are "face to face" with one of the most exciting opportunities ever to meet problems head on and overcome them, says Lynn Copeland, assistant to the director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

TEXAS 'TAKING UP CHALLENGE'

Today in Texas' 254 counties, people at the grass roots level are taking up this challenge as perhaps never before, especially in one "time-tested way:" using

the already-in-place educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as local "energy-efficient fuels for the fires of success," Copeland says.

With its long-time "slogan" of "People Helping People," today's Extension Service serves Texans through a staff and program in every county with a unique combination of "tried-and-true" educational tools, such as result demonstrations, as well as up-to-the-minute high-technology, including ever-expanding computer systems for the benefit of farmers, individuals and families, youth and communities, Copeland explains.

"Informal education" is our "product," he adds — "to help people help themselves" attain a better quality of life.

The people themselves — in each county — decide what those educational programs should be and the Extension Service implements them — "tailor-made" programs IN each county FOR each county, he says.

Funded by county, state and national monies, the agency teaches subject matter based on the latest research findings of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), other universities and private industry in a variety of ways.

PROGRAMS CHANGE TO MEET NEEDS

Extension educational pro-

grams, directed toward "helping people help themselves" solve problems on farms, ranches, in homes, communities and agribusiness, are flexible by their very nature, Copeland says.

They include programs in agriculture and natural resources, marine resources, home economics and family living for individuals as well as for families, community development, 4-H and youth, along with other special programs, such as the Expanded Nutrition Program, the Urban Gardening Program, Farm Safety, leadership-development programs, county officials programs, energy programs and agribusiness management programs, each designed to meet the needs of the public whom Extension serves and to be responsive to their changing needs, Copeland says.

'UNIQUE SYSTEM' BEGAN IN 1914

This unique system of informal education was made possible by the federal Smith-Lever Act in 1914. In 1915, the Texas Legislature accepted the Smith-Lever Act terms and established the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, assigning it to the Texas A&M University System for administration, Copeland says.

State legislation also authorizes financial participation by county commissioners court in this cooperative effort.

So the Extension system is a partnership of the federal government through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), the state government through a state-designated land-grant college and the county government through the commissioners court in each county. Nationally, this system is known as the Cooperative Extension Service.

TEACHERS: AGENTS, SPECIALISTS, VOLUNTEERS

Teachers in this far-reaching system of education include County Extension Agents, who are professional educators with broad training either in agriculture, home economics or related areas, Extension specialists trained in subjects for which Extension has educational responsibility and more than 100,000 volunteers who serve as leaders in adult and youth programs, Copeland says.

Agents conduct educational programs in each county of Texas to help people apply scientific information to solve practical problems using available resources.

Specialists, which form a link between the County Extension Agents and the Research and teaching staff of The Texas A&M University System, are located at the university and at the 14 district headquarters throughout the state. District Extension offices are an integral part of Texas A&M Research and Extension Centers set up to serve the people of specific geographical areas, Copeland explains.

The Eastland County Extension staff includes: DeMarquis Gordon, Extension Agent-Agriculture; Mrs. Janet Thomas, Extension Agent-Home

THE SOUTH has risen again!

At least that's what we found on a leisurely trip through the mid-South on a whirlwind return down deeper.

Of course anybody who lives in the middle of Texas travels half a day just getting out of the state. Once out, one of the things you find is bad highways. Our 3,000-mile sojourn was without any major mishap and only two semi-minor inconveniences. Oh, yes we had our fun with expressways through, around and into and out of the larger cities.

One thing we found for certain, particularly with the older towns, and some of these are really old, is that development has added to confusion. For instance, in some places, an old street will be one name for a distance, and then suddenly it's something else. It causes confusion.

At Memphis, Tenn., we went all around the town one on the expressway looking for our street into town, and only found it when we got

Into South Carolina, bound for Charleston, we found something really unusual: traffic and especially trucks driving the legal speed limits. The state troopers use unmarked vehicles and we saw a lot of truckers stopped.

After reports of an upcoming beautiful weekend in Charleston, that day we drove with a severe thunderstorm hitting the entire east coast, and as we listened to radio reports of tornado warnings and hail storms, we drove into Columbia, S.C., to see trees blown over, power lines down, traffic jams

everywhere, and general confusion, but since the Lord takes care of those who can't take care of themselves, we sailed all the way through without a stop or incident.

However, since we drove all day in rain, we had our headlights on all day, and when we stopped in Charleston for the night found that our battery was dead, with no hope of getting it charged until. No big thing, until the missus pondered out loud, "What would we do if a hurricane hit and we had to get out?" Hitchhike, I guessed, as we all worried. Not to worry: a mechanic tightened the alternator belt, recharged us, and we were as good as new.

July 9, 1982 Proclaimed As National POW-MIA Day

Next July 9 has been proclaimed National POW-MIA Recognition Day by President Ronald Reagan to honor all former American prisoners of war as well as those still missing, and their families.

He called on "all Americans to join in honoring those who made the uncommon sacrifice of being held captive in war, and their loved ones." Appropriate ceremonies and activities to mark the special day are planned at Veterans Administration medical centers and regional offices in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and elsewhere.

The VA also is advising former POWs in the Texas-Gulf area who haven't done so yet to contact its Waco, Houston, New Orleans or

Jackson Regional Office or a local veterans service organization to see if there are more benefits and services due them now because of their imprisonment.

That is important, VA directors said, because the Prisoners of War Health Care Benefits Act of 1981, which covers persons detained or interned during periods other than wartime, liberalizes certain eligibility requirements and extends existing benefits.

Former POWs also are able to establish that certain disabilities are related to their POW experience

without producing military records confirming they were incurred or aggravated during active duty.

Under the same new legislation, the VA established a Veterans Advisory Committee on Former Prisoners of War. The committee consults with and advises VA Administrator Robert Nimmo on the administration of benefits for former POWs and their compensation, health care and rehabilitation needs.

Chrysanthemums can be traced as far back as the Ming dynasty, there are as many historians claiming the Chrysanthemum originated in Japan as there are who claim China as the originating country for the Chrysanthemum. Many people think the flag of Japan displays the rising sun when in fact originally the yellow-red center of the flag of Japan was taken from a Spider Chrysanthemum.

Chrysanthemums moved from the far East to England where a lot of cross breeding took place by many hybridizers and the English Chrysanthemum was produced. The Chrysanthemum then migrated to the United States where today it is the largest year round pot plant grown.

There are many individual types of Chrysanthemums. Basically we have the Garden Hardy which grows outside in the landscape in mass plantings. Then we have the disbud which can be grown in flower beds or in pots. Basically the requirements of both types are the same. With in the two above mentioned types we have additional breakdowns such as; The In-curve (Football Type), The Spider, The Decorative, The Reflex, The Pompon, The Anemone, The Spoon, The Quill, and the Brush and Thistle. We have two methods of obtaining Chrysanthemums plants—by cuttings and by seeds. When planting Chrysanthemums from seed you will never obtain a true cultivar because of the cross pollination. The professional and show grower always plants anew from cuttings. This insures a true cultivar. On the Garden Hardy type, they will repeat year after year from the same root system. When the Garden Hardy type has completed its blooming cycle and

the leaves have turned brown cut them back to the ground level and mulch with leaves and they will return in the spring.

Chrysanthemums like a slightly acid soil with a good organic base. Mums do not like wet feet but to do their best and reward you with good blooms in size and color you should never let them dry out. When planting Chrysanthemums never overcrowd them. Plant the mums on fifteen to eighteen inch centers. They will fill in the open area as they grow. Chrysanthemums need to be fed on a regular basis every two weeks to obtain the maximum in bloom and clarity in color. Remember Mums as well as other plants have to have the fertilizer converted into a liquid before they can use them. If you use a water soluble fertilizer such as a 20-20-20 you are furnishing the Chrysanthemum the fertilizer in liquid form to begin with, ready for the mum to use at once. If you will pinch back the Chrysanthemum you will get an abundance of blooms.

Some varieties of Chrysanthemums will bloom in the spring and again in the fall. The Bloom for the Chrysanthemum is controlled by the amount of light. It takes twelve and one-half hours to initiate the bud and eleven and one-half hours of light to set the bud. I speak of these two times in reference to the maximum amount of light to accomplish both functions.

There are many Chrysanthemum shows in the fall of the year and you must remember that all the Chrysanthemums shown in the shows were grown outside and not in greenhouses.

Through out the South and Southwest we have many Chrysanthemum Chapters that are associated with the National Chrysanthemum Society, which welcomes

visitors to their monthly meetings and shows. If your area does not have a Chrysanthemum Society Chapter and there is a minimum of ten interested people I will be most happy to help you set up a chapter and obtain your national charter. 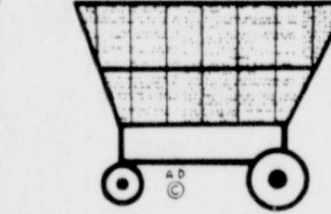

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Criminal Justice Intern Begins Summer Work In Office Of Local Attorney

When a tall young man with blonde hair dashes up the Eastland County courthouse steps these afternoons, he is not just another tourist looking for "Old Rip". He is William Sidney (Sid) Vanderland of Stephenville, a Criminal Justice Intern from Tarleton State University who is working toward his Degree.

Vanderland's summer Internship in the office of Stan Boose, Cisco, began May 3. It will net him six hours toward his August graduation, where he will receive a B.S. Degree in History, with a Minor in Criminal Justice.

Soon afterward he will enroll in Baylor University as a law student. In three or four years he hopes to pass his State Bar Examination and become a practicing attorney.

Vanderland's wife, Laurel Lee, will be working toward her Teacher's Certificate at Tarleton this fall.

His parents, Chaplain (LTC) and Mrs. Elwin C. Vanderland live in Killen. One sister, Sandra, attends Texas Lutheran College, and the other, Marian, is a student at McMurry in Abilene.

Sid Vanderland feels that the background of his parents kindled his interest in a profession which deals directly with people.

"My father's work as a Chaplain lay in the field of helping people. My mother (Diane) majored in Sociology. These are both related to Law."

The family moved often, due to his father's profession. Sid Vanderland says he has lived "Everywhere from New York City to Pidcoke, Texas!"

He performed part of his High School work in Killeen, then moved to Alaska. But when time came to enroll in College, he gravitated back to his favorite territory.

"The area I particularly like," he says, "Lies as far south as Austin, as far west as Abilene, and stops just before you get to Dallas."

Vanderland had only "passed through" Eastland County before he became a Criminal Justice Intern, but now the roads are very familiar. He drives over from Stephenville around noon each weekday, and spends 4 hrs. on various legal duties.

Attorney Boose will give a formal evaluation of his work at the end of the term. If his performance is considered satisfactory, Vanderland will receive 6 hrs. Credit from Tarleton University for his Internship.

He describes his duties here as "Manifold. Filing documents at the Courthouse. Contacting people - investigation, interviewing, observing, getting field experiences.

"I feel I am getting a varied experience here. A number of facets of Law practice are covered at the office of Attorney Boose. There is Civil Law, Criminal

Law, Oil and Gas, Corporate, Administrative, and other areas.

"There is more going on here legally than I expected. Much of it, of course, relates to the oil business. I really enjoy all parts of this field work. The actual practice is much more interesting than the academic studies."

Vanderland explains that the Criminal Justice Internship of Tarleton University was begun about one and one-half years ago under Dr. James W. Shores, who developed a well-rounded program involving a number of students. It was prepared with special goals, hoping to begin students in criminal justice practices in various fields. Under the Intern program, students work under close supervision for a designated period of time, and in a community setting.

This was visualized as a time for students to apply work theories and principles to actual work practices. Vanderland is the only Tarleton Criminal Justice Intern in Eastland County at this time.

While going about his duties Vanderland has the opportunity to get acquainted with local people, and to reflect a bit on the career he is headed for.

"Our legal system is based on the premise that everyone is entitled to a fair trial," he says. "A lawyer should be a liaison between the citizen and the legal system. His job is to be an effective ambassador - to make the client

understand what is going on.

"I understand more now why legal language has its complications. The law has to be specific - to bring across nuances of meaning. To the layman, it almost seems like a foreign language.

"I do like this area," he adds thoughtfully. "But there is not the faith I would like to see in the Criminal Justice system here."

When asked where he would like to practice law, after passing his bar examination, Sid Vanderland answered quickly:

"Why somewhere in Central Texas, of course - in a small town."

So it appears that his Internship here will be very useful



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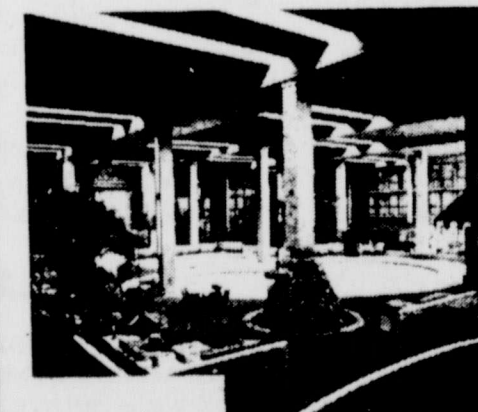

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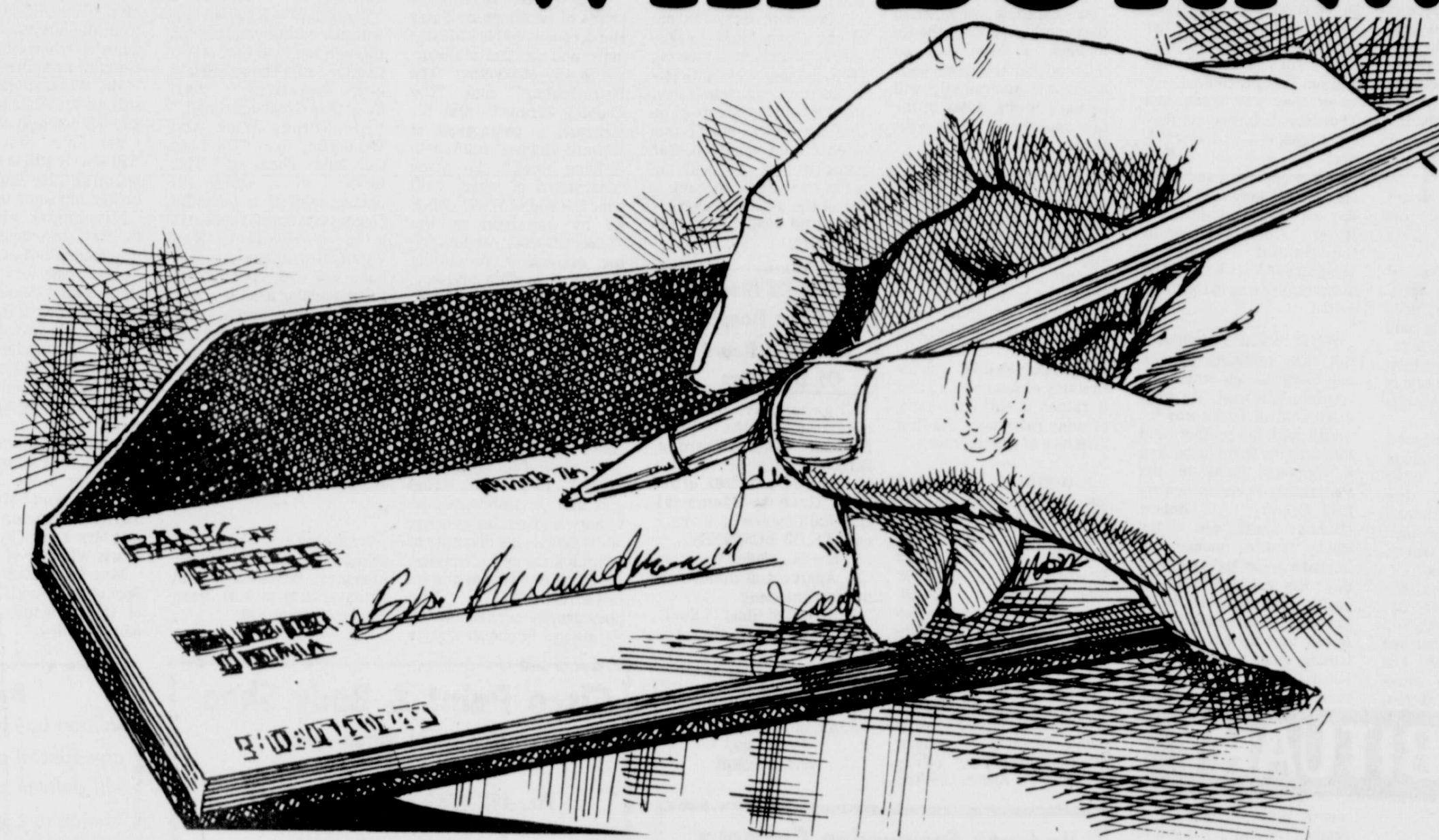

Another new book is James Herriot's "Yorkshire" - a guided tour through the author-veterinarian through the land that is setting for "All (Things) Bright and Beautiful," "All Creatures Great and Small," "All Things Wise and Wonderful," and "The Lord God Made Them All." This book of wonderful photographs of a beautiful country has special appeal to a local resident, Kay Westfall, whose former home was within ten miles of the particular area of which Herriot writes, and a native of the very large County of Yorkshire. Mrs. Westfall is a WWII War Bride who met her husband, Roy, in 1943 while he was stationed in England as an American serviceman. Kay was a volunteer member of the Royal Air Force.
