The following article concerns the month of June, which I received from Marietta Fuller of Jeffersonvile, Ind. The article is as follows:

LET US GO FISHING!

Why do people like to go fishing? Some say, "For the sport, for a good mess of fish, for companionship with others, as a part of camping out, as a time to read or sketch, as a time to work out problems," and the like. 

### Railroad Commission To Proceed With UPS Hearing

The Railroad Commission this week directed its Transportation Division to begin hearings on the application of United Parcel Service for authority to transport packages from point to point within Texas. Specific dates for the hearings have not yet been set.

The Commission took no action on several motions filed at a pre-hearing conference February 25, and restated in oral arguments before the Commission May 3. by truck and bus companies which are protesting the UPS application. One of the motions concerned whether or not the Commission has the authority to grant the certificate UPS requests. Protesting companies also asked the Commission to rule on the admissibility of some types of evidence that may be presented at the hearing and whether or not testimony of witnesses must be written and filed in advance of their

appearance. Commission's The Transportation Division had originally planned to begin the UPS hearings May 11.

They were postponed after parties in the case asked to present oral arguments to the Railroad Commissioners on the prehearings motions.

United Parcel Service will be the first to present evidence when the hearings start. Earlier, UPS told the Commission it would need eight weeks to present the testimony of some 300

witnesses. The first two weeks of testimony will be given in Austin by UPS personnel and public witnesses who live in the area. The hearings will then move to Dallas where the remaining testimony on behalf of the UPS application will be heard. UPS said that Dallas transportation facilities and accomodations make it the most convenient location for many of the witnesses scheduled to testify. Truck and bus companies who oppose the UPS application will present their evidence following UPS.







### Social Work Director **Belittles** Jail Buildings

Building more jails won't necessarily alleviate the overcrowded jails in Texas, believes a former employee of the Federal Correctional

Institution. Diversion from the criminal justice system, improvement in societal conditions and swift punishment are all better solutions, believes Arthur Berliner, who is now director of Texas Christian University's Social

Work Program. Berliner also feels that the death penalty is not the answer. "There is no evidence that the death penalty discourages capital offenses," he said. "The real deterrent to crime is the swiftness and certainty of punishment. If people know for sure that if they commit a crime, they will be caught, tried and promptly punished, it is likely that all kinds of crime would be deterred, including capital crimes. It is a fact that most major crimes are not solved and their perpetrators are not punished.

Another reason for overcrowded jails is that many prisoners do not need to be there, continued Berliner.

If prisoners "were able to remain in the community under supervision, work so that they paid taxes instead of being a burden to the taxpayer, supported their own families instand of having their families on welfare, then we would be accomplishing more socially constructive ends, he said.

Societal conditions also are implicated in the frequency of criminal behaviour.

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## July 4th, 1982 - The 110th Anniversary Of Calvin Coolidge's Birth

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When President Reagan entered the White House, he rearranged the portraits in the Cabinet Room, replacing Thomas Jefferson's with Calvin Coolidge's. But I think Calvin Coolidge would have been more honored if his portrait had been side by side with that of the author of the Declaration of Independence.

Coolidge, the 110th anniversary of whose birth falls on Independence Day. 1982, is the only president of

the United States to have been born on the Fourth of July. This is something seldom remembered, and one wonders whether President Reagan remembered it.

Abraham Lincoln onced remarked that "The principles of Jefferson are the definitions and axioms of free society." And, in a speech delivered in Independence Hall, in Fegruary of 1861, (on his way to his inauguration as sixteenth president of the United States,) Lincoln said "that all the political sentiments I entertain have been drawn... from the sentiments which originated and were given to the world from this hall. I have never had a feeling politically that did not spring from the sentiments embodied in the Declaration of Independence." Calvin Coolidge might have said the same thing, as he is the most notable interpreter of the Declaration since Abraham

Lincoln

Indeed Calvin Coolidge's first notable achievement as a young man was when, as a senior at Amherst, he won the gold medal in a nationwide contest for the best essay on the causes of the American Revolution. This essay still merits study today, for in it we see the beginning of a life-long devotion to the articulation and understanding of what he termed "the seasoned and established principles which have made our country the greatest among the nations of the earth."

If the Declaration of Independence was remembered with nostalgic fondness, it was because it was remembered as if it had

dependence Hall, July 5, 1926, was entitled "The Inspiration of the Declaration of Independence." It was a profound exploration of the historical and philosophical meaning of that famous document. Coolidge never doubted for a moment that the importance of American independence was to be found in the principles by which that independence was originally justified. "It was not because it was proposed to establish a new nation, but because it was proposed to establish a nation on new principles, that July 4, States in 1926, when the na- 1776, has come to be regarded as one of the greatest dred and fiftieth anniver- days in history." representative body, a body supported by general public opinion, and by armies in the field. It was this uniting of philosophical thought with political action that made the Declaration of Independence "the most important civil document in the world.")

Near the end of his oration, Coolidge remarked that there was, about the Declaration, "a finality that is exceedingly restful." The assertions of man's equality, of his endowment with inalienable rights, of the derivation of the just powers of government from the consent of the governed, are all, he insisted, final. "No advance, no progress can be made beyond these propositions." Anyone wishing to deny them, he continued, can only go backward. And those who wish to proceed in such a direction "are reactionary."

Coolidge spoke in the heyday of the so-called "progressive era." The idea that a final political truth might be pronounced at any time was wholly inconsistent with the evolutionary, historicist, and relativist theories that dominated his world -- as they still dominate our own. But Coolidge was wiser than the "intellectuals" of the academy and the media of his day.

Although at the time of the sesqui-centinnial, Coolidge spoke in the midst of unprecedented prosperity, he reminded his countrymen that the cause of that prosperity was more important than the prosperity itself. ("On an occasion like this a great temptation exists to present evidence of the practical success of our form of government...But it is not results and effects so much as sources and causes that...it is...necessary to con-

We live in an age of science and of abounding accumulation of material things. These did not create our Declaration. Our Declaratin created them. The things of the spirit come first. Unless we cling to that, all our prosperity, overwhelming though it may appear, will turn to a barren sceptre in our grasp. If we are to maintain the great heritage which has been bequeathed to us, we must be like-minded as the fathers who created it. (We must cultivate the reverence which they had for the things that are holy.)

Let us hope that, as Ronald Reagan glances from time to time at the portrait of our scholarly and philosophical thirtieth president, he draws increased confidence in his own mission, to preserve and transmit this great heritage.

## Senator Glasgow Reports

The recent Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals' decision on Texas prisons will conceivably save Texas taxpayers several hundred million dollars.

The Court knocked out the lower court provision requiring individual cells for each inmate or either sixty square feet of dormitory space for each of its 34,000 inmates.

However, even with this decision, Texas is still having problems with providing space for the inmates already there and the record increase in the number of in-

The 34,000 inmates in the Texas prison system makes it the largest prison system in the nation. In addition, the

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prison population is incrasing at a net rate of 500 inmates per month. This would mean an increase of 6,000 prisoners per year making the TDC population 40,000 by July, 1983.

At the present time, ten thousand prisoners are residing in dormitory-type facilities, and another 4,000 are being housed in tempory army tents.

During the recent special session, the Legislature appropriated fifty-three million dollars for relieving the problem. The Texas Department of Corrections designated that over thirty million dollars of that money is to be used to construct 500 two-man cells.

WHAT DO we West Texans think of when we hear "Memphis, Tenn."? The beginning of the "real South". A cotton empire? Home of rhythm and blues? Home of Elvis? A Mississippi River port? All these and more?

Our first visit to Memphis (named by Andrew Jackson for the city on the Nile) was an eye-opening experience.

An old, old town, (1819), it's now a re-a-building. Reminds us of our own Galveston -- turning old dock-side warehouses into shops, restaurants and chic boutiques.

When we drove in we found Beale St. "under construction" and work underway on "Mud Island" which will open in July as a major recreation center in the middle of the river connected by a tramway, to the city. About three hours drive east of little Rock, Memphis is Tennessee's largest city and a complex of industry, medical facilities, recreation and tourism. But the "old town" hard by the river needed and is getting a face

We found Elvis Presley's statue right off downtown but it took another day to find W.C. Handy's on Beale

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17 TO 25

St. (Handy is credited with St. Louis, Beale St. and Memphis Blues).

A treasure trove on Beale is Scrieb's Department Store, biggest conglomaration of merchandise we've ever seen and it hasn't changed much apparently for a hundred years. How many stores do you know of where you can find real deerstalker hats, stove-pipe toppers (at \$37.50) and cotton overalls in all sizes. (Would you believe size 60)?

Yes, Memphis is the city where Martin Luther King was assisinated at the Lorraine Motel, now abandoned and shabby looking. We were told that the N.A.A.C.P is trying to buy it to develop a suitable memorial. It's near Beale St. by the River. (Gay Nell and I remembered we were eating supper at J.D. Yardley's Spot Cafe in Cisco the night we first heard of King's assisnation that started the rioting you

We walked the Mid-America Mall, "world's largest" - an eight block strip of First St. closed to vehicle traffic and featuring re-furbished old downtown businesses.

An Adams St. we found restored old mansions from Memphis' hey-day and open now as attractions.

Okay, we'll admit it. We drove to Graceland - but the gates were already closed. (This was before the late Presley's mansion opened to the public on June 7), and so we just read the "messages" written on the rock wall around the home of the former "Memphis truck driver" who shot to the top, and bottom, in rock and roll.


We did make it to the nowrestored Peabody Hotel downtown to catch the 50-year traditional march at 5 p.m. of the resident ducks from the labish lobby fountain to the elevator over red carpets, to be whisked to their upstairs private roasts. They are marched down each day promptly at 11 a.m.

Tonight we went to Blues Alley, a supper club in an old cotton warehouse that serves traditional barbecued ribs and equally traditional Memphis-style blues in equal porportions.

We decided the style was more "scat" than "marching" style New Orleans jazz. It's a sevendays-a-week gig with lots of "color" and not just a little bit of merchandising -records, tee-shirts, etc. We took a couple of hours and the music is probably still going on. Electronic guitars and electronic piano left a little bit to be desired. (Also the trombonist was off for the night). And looking back, in that narrow, long building, the bandstand along one side, with the musicians all lined up in a row, you couldn't help but think maybe about the old time minstrial shows. (The ribs were pretty much vinegar.)


Memphis - a city of many churches (all varieties) and Masonic Loges (ditto) and truly an American city building on its past.

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### **County Oil and Gas Report**



There are two types of hanging baskets, the wire type and the plastic type and they may vary in size. But the adverage is 10 to 12 inches. For the wire type you need unmilled sphagnum moss that is not needed for the plastic basket. For the wire basket attach the three hanging wires so that they cover a wire coming from the bottom of the basket, not just the circular wire at the top. For the plastic basket attach the three hanging wires in the hole provided and wrap over the top and around the same wire. For the wire basket place the unmille sphagnum moss loosely in a three gallon bucket and cover with water and push the moss down to get it throughly soaked. Wring out a hand full of the moss at a time and pat the moss down in the bottom and then on the sides of the wire basket. Let the unmilled sphagnum moss extend over the top of the basket. Hold up the basket and inspect it to be sure that the sides are completely covered. Then place a clay-pot saucer or aluminum in the bottom of the basket which will partially overcome the drying out of the basket after it is hung.

The following applies to both the plastic and wire types of baskets. Fill in onethird of the basket with potting soil. Select the plants and set them out in a space representing the basket. Don't overcrowd the plants as you set them out. Remember they need room to grow in the basket. If the plants are in pots, set then in the basket to see how they

NBC **NEWS/MUSIC** FM 97 ADIO \* 24 HOURS will look. At this point you can tell if the soil level is enough. Never plant the plants any deeper than they were growing at the nursery. Add any potting soil that is needed to bring the soil level to within one inch of the top of the basket. Let the soil slope to the center of the basket in order to retain some water. Plant the center plant first then work out to the sides planting the other plants. After planting, water

slowly until water runs from the basket. Hanging baskets need to be watered daily and fertilized every two weeks with a light solution of water soluible fertilizer.
