

# HALL OF REMARKS

The following article concerns the month of June, which I received from Marietta Fuller of Jeffersonville, Ind. The article is as follows:

**LET US GO FISHING!**  
Why do people like to go fishing? Some say, "For the sport, for a good mess of fish, for companionship with others, as a part of camping out, as a time to read or sketch, as a time to work out problems," and the like. Others say, "I feel so close to God in the out-of-doors, and a feeling of peace and tranquility comes over me as I view the skies, the beauty of the trees, the wildlife, and the other things which He has created, and as I smell the fresh air, bask in the sun, and meditate on His Word, His blessings, His wonders, and in general, fellowship with Him."

Now fishing was a big industry in Biblical days for fish was a commonly used food. And did not Jesus choose some rough and common and unlearned fishermen as His disciples? God never chooses self-made man for only He can make something beautiful out of the unlovely, the rough, the common, for He is the potter at the wheel molding and conforming me to the image of Christ. He knows what His good purpose is for each life for He is in charge of the universe, for He is God! So we hear His call in Mark 1:16-20; and that call is for you and me today; so hear His Words: "Now as He walked by the Sea of Galilee, He saw Simon and Andrew his brother casting a net into the sea; for they were fishers. And Jesus said unto them. Come ye after me, and I will make you to become FISHERS OF MEN. And immediately, they left their nets and followed Him. And later on He called to James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, mending their nets; and they too LEFT ALL TO FOLLOW HIM."

Now fishing has to be in the water for that is where the live fish are; and we know that we don't eat dead fish that are floating stomach up on top of the water or the ones on shore dead from lack of water causing stagnation, or atomic, or other pollution. So it is with the souls of men. It is the water of the Word which gives them life and washed away their sins for JESUS IS THE WORD. "Faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God." (Rom. 10:17). We fish for the live ones! It is too late for the dead for it is given unto man once to die physically and after that the judgement (Heb. 9:27) - at the Bema Seat of Christ for rewards of works for the Christian; and at the White Throne for judgement of the degree of punishment for those still in their sins; for did not God provide a covering for these sins through the blood of Jesus Christ shed on the cross? Only the dead are to be blamed for God is not willing that any should perish in trespasses and sins. Just as the fisherman checks his tackle and is sure he has the right kind of bait to be used in fishing; so the FISHER FOR SOULS prepares himself with the WORD OF GOD in his heart by reading and studying the Bible and meditating on it day and night and praying. All over the world we see people fishing in lakes, in mountain streams; in fact, everywhere they can find water, but usually close to home. Did not Jesus say "...that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His Name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem (home base)? (Luke 24:47). Different bait is used. The worm is quite popular for it still wiggles after being put on the hook, thus tantalizing

the fish. Those "FISHING FOR MEN" use everlasting life, too! "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved..." (Acts 16:31); and John 3:16. Doughboys made of a mixture including cornmeal are used. Did not the Bible say, "Cast thy bread upon the waters: for thou shalt find it after many days." (Ecc. 11:1). Well, physically the doughboy brings a mess of fish; but spiritually, it brings forth life for others; for when we cast our money and prayers into the ministry streams of others; we, too, enter into that ministry of FISHING FOR THE SOULS OF MEN. And you can never truly outgive the Lord! Other bait is used such as minnows, shrimp, artificial, etc.; and so likewise this is a lesson to use ALL KINDS OF BAIT - anything that has the water of the WORD (The Bible) in it.

According to my two brothers, there is a great skill in fishing in knowing how, when, and where to fish. So, there is a caution to remember the incident when Peter and others were fishing all night and could catch nothing until Jesus came and told them how and where to cast out their nets. Through faith, they OBEYED HIS WORD; and the nets were so full they could hardly pull them in. "Without me, Jesus said, you can do nothing." (Jn. 15:5). Today through His Holy Spirit indwelling the believers, He directs the greatest fishing industry of all times. Jesus calls to you and me today, LET US GO FISHING!

## Roof Garden Dinner Theatre Rehearsing Musical Comedy

"Jesus," the first totally authentic film on the Life of Christ - shot on the actual Biblical locations throughout the Holy Land - will be shown July 3, Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and July 7th and 9th at 7:30 p.m. at the Word of Life Church, 501 South Lamar, Eastland, Texas.

"Jesus" adheres faithfully to the account of Christ's life as chronicled in the New Testament gospel of Luke, which is acknowledged to be the most complete story of Christ of all the four gospels.

"Other films on Christ have been made by people who have thought it necessary to write a screenplay and embellish the gospels...but the language of the scriptures has endured longer than any screenplay ever will," notes John Heyman, the film's producer.

## Railroad Commission

### To Proceed With UPS Hearing

The Railroad Commission this week directed its Transportation Division to begin hearings on the application of United Parcel Service for authority to transport packages from point to point within Texas. Specific dates for the hearings have not yet been set.

The Commission took no action on several motions filed at a pre-hearing conference February 25, and restated in oral arguments before the Commission May 3, by truck and bus companies which are protesting the UPS application. One of the motions concerned whether or not the Commission has the authority to grant the certificate UPS requests. Protesting companies also asked the Commission to rule on the admissibility of some types of evidence that may be presented at the hearing and whether or not testimony of witnesses must be written and filed in advance of their appearance.

The Commission's Transportation Division had originally planned to begin the UPS hearings May 11.

They were postponed after parties in the case asked to present oral arguments to the Railroad Commissioners on the prehearings motions.

United Parcel Service will be the first to present evidence when the hearings start. Earlier, UPS told the Commission it would need eight weeks to present the testimony of some 300 witnesses.

The first two weeks of testimony will be given in Austin by UPS personnel and public witnesses who live in the area. The hearings will then move to Dallas where the remaining testimony on behalf of the UPS application will be heard. UPS said that Dallas transportation facilities and accommodations make it the most convenient location for many of the witnesses scheduled to testify. Truck and bus companies who oppose the UPS application will present their evidence following UPS.

## Social Work Director Belittles Jail Buildings

Building more jails won't necessarily alleviate the overcrowded jails in Texas, believes a former employee of the Federal Correctional Institution.

Diversion from the criminal justice system, improvement in societal conditions and swift punishment are all better solutions, believes Arthur Berliner, who is now director of Texas Christian University's Social Work Program.

Berliner also feels that the death penalty is not the answer. "There is no evidence that the death penalty discourages capital offenses," he said. "The real deterrent to crime is the swiftness and certainty of punishment. If people know for sure that if they commit a crime, they will be caught, tried and promptly punished, it is likely that all kinds of crime would be deterred, including capital crimes. It is a fact that most major crimes are not solved and their perpetrators are not punished."

Another reason for overcrowded jails is that many prisoners do not need to be there, continued Berliner.

If prisoners "were able to remain in the community under supervision, work so that they paid taxes instead of being a burden to the taxpayer, supported their own families instead of having their families on welfare, then we would be accomplishing more socially constructive ends, he said.

Societal conditions also are implicated in the frequency of criminal behaviour.

When President Reagan entered the White House, he rearranged the portraits in the Cabinet Room, replacing Thomas Jefferson's with Calvin Coolidge's. But I think Calvin Coolidge would have been more honored if his portrait had been side by side with that of the author of the Declaration of Independence.  
Coolidge, the 110th anniversary of whose birth falls on Independence Day, 1982, is the only president of the United States to have been born on the Fourth of July. This is something seldom remembered, and one wonders whether President Reagan remembered it.  
Abraham Lincoln once remarked that "The principles of Jefferson are the definitions and axioms of free society." And, in a speech delivered in Independence Hall, in February of 1861, (on his way to his inauguration as sixteenth president of the United States,) Lincoln said

"that all the political sentiments I entertain have been drawn... from the sentiments which originated and were given to the world from this hall. I have never had a feeling politically that did not spring from the sentiments embodied in the Declaration of Independence." Calvin Coolidge might have said the same thing, as he is the most notable interpreter of the Declaration since Abraham Lincoln.  
Indeed Calvin Coolidge's first notable achievement as a young man was when, as a senior at Amherst, he won the gold medal in a nationwide contest for the best essay on the causes of the American Revolution. This essay still merits study today, for in it we see the beginning of a life-long devotion to the articulation and understanding of what he termed "the seasoned and established principles which have made our country the greatest among the nations of the earth."  
It can be regarded as an act of Providence that the child, born on the Fourth of July, 1872, whose prize essay on the American Revolution in 1895 first brought him distinction, should have been president of the United States in 1926, when the nation observed its one hundred and fiftieth anniversary.  
(It is a badge of our shame that, in 1976, no one in authority seems to have noted what Calvin Coolidge

had said a half century earlier.  
This is all the more regrettable, when one contemplates the poverty of the speeches and addresses of our two hundredth anniversary. The center of the nation's attention was absorbed in the televised sailing of the tall ships into New York harbor. However beautiful was this reminder of the age of sail, no one doubted that that age had been superseded forever. If the Declaration of Independence was remembered with nostalgic fondness, it was because it was remembered as if it had been a tall ship.)  
Coolidge's speech in Independence Hall, July 5, 1926, was entitled "The Inspiration of the Declaration of Independence." It was a profound exploration of the historical and philosophical meaning of that famous document. Coolidge never doubted for a moment that the importance of American independence was to be found in the principles by which that independence was originally justified. "It was not because it was proposed to establish a new nation, but because it was proposed to establish a nation on new principles, that July 4, 1776, has come to be regarded as one of the greatest days in history." (The truths expressed in the Declaration, he said, were very old. But never before had they been adopted by a duly authorized and constituted

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Coolidge spoke in the heyday of the so-called "progressive era." The idea that a final political truth might be pronounced at any time was wholly inconsistent with the evolutionary, historicist, and relativist theories that dominated his world -- as they still dominate our own. But Coolidge was wiser than the "intellectuals" of the academy and the media of his day.  
Although at the time of the sesqui-centennial, Coolidge spoke in the midst of unprecedented prosperity, he reminded his countrymen that the cause of that prosperity was more important than the prosperity itself. ("On an occasion like this a great temptation exists to present evidence of the practical success of our form of government...But it is not results and effects so much as sources and causes that...it is...necessary to contemplate.")

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## Senator Glasgow Reports

The recent Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals' decision on Texas prisons will conceivably save Texas taxpayers several hundred million dollars.

The Court knocked out the lower court provision requiring individual cells for each inmate or either sixty square feet of dormitory space for each of its 34,000 inmates.

However, even with this decision, Texas is still having problems with providing space for the inmates already there and the record increase in the number of inmates.

The 34,000 inmates in the Texas prison system makes it the largest prison system in the nation. In addition, the

prison population is increasing at a net rate of 500 inmates per month. This would mean an increase of 6,000 prisoners per year making the TDC population 40,000 by July, 1983.

At the present time, ten thousand prisoners are residing in dormitory-type facilities, and another 4,000 are being housed in temporary army tents.

During the recent special session, the Legislature appropriated fifty-three million dollars for relieving the problem. The Texas Department of Corrections designated that over thirty million dollars of that money is to be used to construct 500 two-man cells.

Anyone with a little application of mathematics can see that the thirty million dollars goes only far enough to handle a thousand prisoners in high security units. The State is involved in a net increase of six thousand inmates a year with four thousand in temporary facilities.

The Legislature will be involved next session in passing legislation and appropriating monies to further relieve the prison overcrowding.

We will be involved in evaluating the needs of the prison system and making certain that the public will be protected from those that need incarceration.

However, because of the high cost of maintaining prisons, we will be examining the use of facilities other than high security cells for

those who are not violent offenders and do not constitute a physical threat to society.

We may need to consider reduced security facilities for non-violent offenders and the expanded use of dormitories. Both are substantially less expensive.

Also, there will be an evaluation of expanding the use of parole supervision and probation. In some cases intensive probation or parole supervision may be a better solution instead of incarceration.

I am interested in hearing from you on these issues. As a former District Attorney, I am an advocate of a fair trial for the individual and punishment if he is found guilty. However, we are facing a situation where it will cost a lot of money to continue to incarcerate at the same rate we are going or to incarcerate in the same manner. I need to hear from you as to your views.

WHAT DO WE West Texans think of when we hear "Memphis, Tenn."? The beginning of the "real South". A cotton empire? Home of rhythm and blues? Home of Elvis? A Mississippi River port? All these and more?

Our first visit to Memphis (named by Andrew Jackson for the city on the Nile) was an eye-opening experience.

An old, old town, (1819), it's now a re-a-building. Reminds us of our own Galveston -- turning old dock-side warehouses into shops, restaurants and chic boutiques.

When we drove in we found Beale St. "under construction" and work underway on "Mud Island" which will open in July as a major recreation center in the middle of the river connected by a tramway, to the city. About three hours drive east of little Rock, Memphis is Tennessee's largest city and a complex of industry, medical facilities, recreation and tourism. But the "old town" hard by the river needed and is getting a face lift.

We found Elvis Presley's statue right off downtown but it took another day to find W.C. Handy's on Beale

St. (Handy is credited with St. Louis, Beale St. and Memphis Blues).

A treasure trove on Beale is Scrieb's Department Store, biggest conglomerate of merchandise we've ever seen and it hasn't changed much apparently for a hundred years. How many stores do you know of where you can find real deer-stalker hats, stove-pipe top-pers (at \$37.50) and cotton overalls in all sizes. (Would you believe size 60)?

Yes, Memphis is the city where Martin Luther King was assassinated at the Lorraine Motel, now abandoned and shabby looking. We were told that the N.A.A.C.P. is trying to buy it to develop a suitable memorial. It's near Beale St. by the River. (Gay Nell and I remembered we were eating supper at J.D. Yardley's Spot Cafe in Cisco the night we first heard of King's assassination that started the rioting you remember.)

We walked the Mid-America Mall, "world's largest" -- an eight block strip of First St. closed to vehicle traffic and featuring re-furbished old downtown businesses.

An Adams St. we found restored old mansions from Memphis' hey-day and open now as attractions.

Okay, we'll admit it. We drove to Graceland -- but the gates were already closed. (This was before the late Presley's mansion opened to the public on June 7), and so we just read the "messages" written on the rock wall around the home of the former "Memphis truck driver" who shot to the top, and bottom, in rock and roll.

We did make it to the now-restored Peabody Hotel downtown to catch the 50-year traditional march at 5 p.m. of the resident ducks from the lavish lobby fountain to the elevator over red carpets, to be whisked to their upstairs private roasts. They are marched down each day promptly at 11 a.m.

Tonight we went to Blues Alley, a supper club in an old cotton warehouse that serves traditional barbecued ribs and equally traditional Memphis-style blues in equal proportions.

We decided the style was more "scat" than "marching" style New Orleans jazz. It's a seven-days-a-week gig with lots of "color" and not just a little bit of merchandising -- records, tee-shirts, etc. We took a couple of hours and the music is probably still going on. Electronic guitars and electronic piano left a little bit to be desired. (Also the trombonist was off for the night). And looking back, in that narrow, long building, the bandstand along one side, with the musicians all lined up in a row, you couldn't help but think maybe about the old time minstrel shows. (The ribs were pretty much vinegar.)

Memphis -- a city of many churches (all varieties) and Masonic Loges (ditto) and truly an American city building on its past. (NEXT: Guess who we see from Eastland County at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville?)

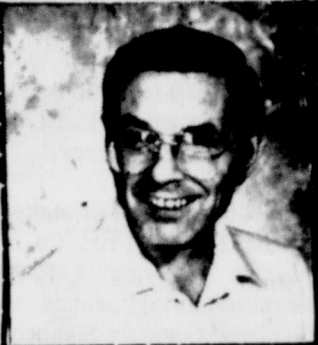
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## County Oil and Gas Report

Supreme Oil Co. of Abilene has added a new natural gas producer in the Eastland Co. Reg. Field. It is the No. 2 Lula Canet, located in a 155-acre lease in Eastland County's McLennan Co. School Land Survey, five miles east of Eastland.

Flowing natural gas at the rate of 370,000 CF per day on a 3/8-in. choke, the No. 1 Moates is a successful new wildcat well in Eastland County. B&W Exp. of Gorman is the operator.

The well exhibited absolute open flow potential of 449,000 CFD. Location is in a 124-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, about one mile east of Gorman.

After entering the pay

zone at 2,720-feet, the well bottomed at 3,317-feet and will produce from a set of perforations ranging from 2,720 to 2,776-feet into the hole.

Nimrod Oper. Co. of Cisco has posted initial production figures for the No. 1 Kathryn Elliot and also the No. 2 Kathryn Elliot, new oil wells in the Madewell Field, both two miles southwest of Romney.

The No. 1 well indicated potential for 86 barrels of oil and 8,000 CF casinghead gas on an open choke. This well had total drilling depth of 1,212-feet. It entered the pay horizon at 1,144-feet and will produce from a set of perora-

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## Department Of Public Safety Estimates 47 People To Die During Holiday Weekend

AUSTIN—The Department of Public Safety today estimated that as many as 47 persons could die in traffic accidents during this July 4th weekend unless drivers are exceptionally careful.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the risk of traffic accidents will increase during the 78-hour holiday period as more drivers take to the streets and highways for the holidays.

"As in many weekend traffic accidents, alcohol, excessive speed, and failure to use seat belts are the major contributing factors in the traffic deaths," he said.

DPS statistics show that 63 persons were killed during the last 4th of July holiday and 25 of those fatalities resulted from accidents in which driving while intoxicated was a factor.

"We know that drinking may have been involved in more of the traffic deaths, but since state law does not require blood alcohol samples from traffic victims, we are uncertain how many

more of the deaths may have involved drivers impaired by alcohol," Adams noted. "Additionally, 59 persons were seriously injured during the last holiday in traffic accidents."

The DPS director said additional troopers would be assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic are expected.

"Our troopers are working during this holiday period to assist travelers and to watch closely for drivers who may have had too much to drink or who insist upon exceeding the speed limits," he said.

The DPS says many municipal police and county sheriffs' officers will also work local traffic safety programs during the holiday period.

The DPS Operation Motorcade counting period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, July 2nd and continues through midnight Monday, July 5th. The Department will tabulate city and highway traffic fatalities and release totals three times daily at 10 a.m., 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. The first report will be made at 10 a.m. Saturday, July 3.

## Consumers Not Affected By Recent Rains

The recent onslaught of rains will not affect consumer food prices, believes the assistant director of the Ranch Management Program at Texas Christian University.

"I think a small area has drawn a lot of attention because of tornadoes and rapid flooding, but when you spread this out over the whole economic area, I don't think the consumer will be hurt," said TCU's James Link.

## Craftsmen Will Represent Cisco At Annual Texas Folklife Festival

Craftsmen demonstrating candle, hoe cake, and toy making will represent Cisco at the eleventh annual Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio.  
 The Texas Folklife Festival is a truly unique celebration of Texas history, with emphasis on the state's ethnic diversity and cultural traditions. Some 6000 participants will gather on the grounds of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio August 5 through 8. They share with the more than 100,000 visitors their ethnic and folk entertainment, crafts, music, food and games.  
 Jonathan Cermin of Cisco, a new participant this year, crafts beautiful handmade toys of wood. "I enjoy creating animals with

"personality," Cermin says. Cermin will share his craft with visitors, explaining his technique of bringing wood to life in the form of toys.  
 The Cisco Civic League, under the direction of Shirley Smothers, demonstrates the craft of rush light making. By dipping cattails into hot tallow, the Cisco Civic League makes wicks that will burn as torches. Rush light making was originated by early settlers - settlers who knew how to survive on the materials that were readily available.  
 Hoe cakes, a corn meal concoction used by early Texas settlers, will be cooked over an open fire on the blade of a hoe by other members of the Cisco Civic League. Festival visitors are welcome to sample the corn bread and learn the process themselves.  
 At the Texas Folklife Festival, nine entertainment stages feature talented Texans dancing, making music and singing. Festival-goers are invited onto the stage to learn the steps of the Cajun "fais-do-do" or jump between two poles in the Filipino "tinikling." Visitors sing along with gospel groups in the Brush Arb.: and clap their hands to the beat of a bluegrass band. More than 100 performing

groups fill the stages with the music and dance of 31 different ethnic and cultural groups.  
 Learning pioneer crafts and skills is also an integral part of the Festival experience. Visitors are encouraged to watch and learn frontier skills, from making yarn on a spinning wheel to thatching a roof, from baking bread to quilting. There are literally hundreds of craft demonstrations to see and try in the "Back 40" area of the Festival grounds.  
 While enjoying the sights and sounds which fill the 15-acre Institute grounds, visitors have an opportunity to try food from around the world. Of the 36 food booths which offer some 150 different dishes, 27 of them feature ethnic cuisine such as Alsatian parisa, Wendish noodles, Greek souvlaki, German sausage and Japanese teriyaki. For the traditionalists, other booths offer barbecue, chili, chicken fried steak and strawberry shortcake.  
 Tickets to the Texas Folklife Festival are \$5 for adults (\$4.50 in advance), \$1 for children under 13 and children under six get in free. For more information write The Institute of Texan Cultures, P.O. Box 1226, San Antonio, Texas 78294, or call (512) 226-7651.

There are two types of hanging baskets, the wire type and the plastic type and they may vary in size. But the average is 10 to 12 inches. For the wire type you will need unmilled sphagnum moss that is not needed for the plastic basket. For the wire basket attach the three hanging wires so that they cover a wire coming from the bottom of the basket, not just the circular wire at the top. For the plastic basket attach the three hanging wires in the hole provided and wrap over the top and around the same wire. For the wire basket place the unmilled sphagnum moss loosely in a three gallon bucket and cover with water and push the moss down to get it thoroughly soaked. Wring out a hand full of the moss at a time and pat the moss down in the bottom and then on the sides of the wire basket. Let the unmilled sphagnum moss extend over the top of the basket. Hold up the basket and inspect it to be sure that the sides are completely covered. Then place a clay-pot saucer or aluminum in the bottom of the basket which will partially overcome the drying out of the basket after it is hung. The following applies to both the plastic and wire types of baskets. Fill in one-third of the basket with potting soil. Select the plants and set them out in a space representing the basket. Don't overcrowd the plants as you set them out. Remember they need room to grow in the basket. If the plants are in pots, set them in the basket to see how they

will look. At this point you can tell if the soil level is enough. Never plant the plants any deeper than they were growing at the nursery. Add any potting soil that is needed to bring the soil level to within one inch of the top of the basket. Let the soil slope to the center of the basket in order to retain some water. Plant the center plant first then work out to the sides planting the other plants. After planting, water

slowly until water runs from the basket. Hanging baskets need to be watered daily and fertilized every two weeks with a light solution of water soluble fertilizer.

Some plants for hanging baskets that require 80 per cent shade and no more than two hours of morning sun would be, Fibrous Begonias (try Fiesta White, Galaxy Pink, Jewelite Red), trailing Strawberry, Wandering Jew, Chlorophytum, Geranium (ivy-leaved or trailing), Ferns and Ivy. The following plants may be used with some afternoon sun: Boston Fern, Dwarf Ageratum, Lantana, Geraniums, Coleus, Marigold, Petunias, Chrysanthemums and the Shrimp Plant.

Hanging Baskets can be used to brighten up the smallest place to the largest. They can be hung from the eaves of the home as well as from tree limbs. Lets add some beauty to our homes with hanging baskets.



## Minister Accepts Christian Pulpit

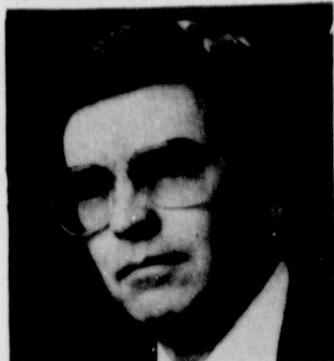
