Not only in Bailey County, but in many other Plains counties, is this nuisance gaining ground until now it is a serious impediment to farmers and a consideration when land is to be sold. And while the new chemicals developed during the war will kill it, the cost of application is said to be pretty high, and other methods of killing are slow and involve the loss of at least one crop from the land. It is a complicated problem. for when one farmer attacks Johnson Grass without the co-operation of his neighbors, his efforts may be made useless if fresh seed is blown onto his fields.



Sugar is added "straight" to tender, juicy fruit like peaches, cherries and berries. If the fruits stand overnight in sugar, they become firmer and are less likely to go to pieces in cooking. The sugar draws out the juice and shrinks the fruit somewhat, but the juice provides enough liquid so that no water need be added and this shortens the cooking time. The shorter the cooking, the better the color and flavor. Juicy fruits with a firm skin, like plums, do not need overnight firm-





Fruit preserves are successful only if the fruit holds its shape, yet s tender and translucent in the syrup, home economists for the U. Department of Agriculture say as they explain that sugar has a firming effect on fruit tissues but must be applied differently to varous types of fruit.

Sugar is added "straight" to tender, juicy fruits like peaches, cherries and berries. If the fruits stand overnight in sugar, they become firmer and are less likely to go to pieces in cooking. The sugar draws out the juice and shrinks the fruit somewhat, but the juice provides eniugh liquid so that no water need be added, and this shortens the cooking time. The shorter the cooking, the better the color and flav-

Juicy fruits with firm skins, like lums, do not need overnight firming. But because they are juicy, they are put in a thick syrup. This helps keep their shape as they cook and the juice, as it cooks out, thins he necessary amount.



Q. Where does the cut and how is it identified? A. The cushion shoulder of lamb made from the square cut shoulder, which is the thickest part of the forequarter. This is boned and left flat, then sewed on two sides. One side may be left open for stuffing, then sewed or skewered later.

Q. How should this cut be prepared? A. The cushion shoulder of lamb is usually roasted. It may first be filled with a moist bread, rice, vegetable or other stuffing. Then it is placed, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan and roasted in a slow oven (300°F.) until tender. From 30 to 35 minutes per pound are required. During cooking the stuffing quired. During cooking, the stuffing expands, giving the roast a "puffed-up" appearance and making it resemble a small, square cushion.

EXPERIMENT CONDUCTED

Lubbock-Steers grazed in rotation on five irrigated pasures seeded with various combinations of grasses at Texas Technological College showed average daily gains ranging from 1.03 pounds to 1..61 pounls, according to the pasture, during a 76-day grazing period.

This grazing trial is the first of bandry and plant industry departments at Texas Tech are seeking to answer farmer inquiries relative to the value of various irrigated beef.

Through the rotation system, teers were moved from a plot each time they had grazed it to a degree of most practical utilization. From May 1 to July 16 the steers had agcess to no supplementary feeds while on pasture. No bloat occurred when grazing alfalfa alone or in grass mixtures. Once placed on a particular pasture the steers were not removed until it had been grazed down and they were ready to rotate to another one.

In each plot being grazed, the steers had various combinations of salt, bone meal and ground limestone free choice.







Water alone is not a satisfactory cooling agent, because only in rare instances is its temperature lower than 60 degrees. The addition of ice to water will help, but storage difficulties and the work involved in keeping the tank adequately supplied present certain obstacles to its use. In addition, its cost, if purchased, often is so high as to offset the price received for satisfactorily cooled milk.

Because of this situation many electric milk coolers (either of the tank or aeroator type) are being installed on electrified farms. Such coolers, according to the Pennsylvaria State college school of agriculture, meet the farmer's requirements for they are "designed to cool fresh milk quickly, uniformly and economically."

On the basis of tests conducted recently on 101 electrified New York state farms, the cost of cooling milk electrically averages from 12 to 13.5 cents per hundred pounds. The power rate in the test area was 3 cents per kilowatt hour of power, which is about 1/2 cent lower than the national farm electricity rate.
