Mr. Moore noted that the City of Cisco is typical of small town in that its population is relatively static with an annual population gain of about three per cent and significant without developments in taxable residential and shopping

buildings. The Council will set a tax rate in the area of 66 cents per \$100 valuation to generate the same revenue under the reassessed valuations as the \$1.35 tax rate provided for the 1981-82

fiscal year, Mr. Moore said. Although a good many people have reported that the new appraisals have raised their tax bill, the over-all tax revenue will be unchanged, the city manager said. The reappraisal has, in some cases, redistributed the tax

burden, he added. The cost of living pay hike for city employees will be accomplished without layoffs or staff reductions, Mr. Moore said. "We will be able to cut a few corners here and there in order to raise salaries without increasing the over-all budget re-

quirements," he said. Preliminary figures indicate that the new budget will call for expenditures of \$706,675 in general fund money plus \$380,500 for the

utility fund. The 1982-83 revenue sharing budget will call for spending \$54,244 and the city manager said that a second hearing on this matter will be held July 13. Anyone with suggestions will be welcome at the meeting, he said.

With the abundant rains we have had in Eastland Co. in May and June, everything is green and growing fast. This includes weeds in crops

and lawns. Home lawn weed control can be very frustrating. Following good maintenance program will help alot in building a dense turf that will discourage the invasion of weeds. On the other hand, a weak, thin turf will allow weed seed germination and establishment.

Once a weed is established, it can either be removed physically by digging or it can be removed chemically. Physical digging is fine if the weeds are few and if they do not have underground reproduction organs. The dallisgrass plant is a good example of just such a plant. You can dig it up but the chances are it will just regrow from underground parts that you don't get.

When considering chemical weed control, it might be well to remember that you are trying to remove an undesirable plant that is growing among desirable plants and many times it is not an easy task.

Generally, lawn weeds may be divided into two groups, those that have broad leaves such as chickweed, henbit, spurge, etc. and those that have grassy type leaves such as dallisgrass, crabgrass, goosegrass, etc.

Grassy type weeds may be controlled in bermuda grass lawns with either MSMA

(Monosodium methanearsonate) or DSMA (disodium methanearsonate). Several applications may be necessary and the bermuda may turn yellow, but it should recover. Grassy type weeds cannot be selectively controlled in a St. Augustine lawn. They may be removed by spot treating just the individual weed with either of the above chemicals or with glyphosate (trade name--Roundup or Kleenup).

Broadleaf weeds are usually controlled with products containing 2,4-D MCPP and dicamba. These chemicals are not safe for every lawn or for every situation. The only way to be sure is to check the label on the container. Be sure the chemical will control the weed you are after, is safe to use on the type of lawn you have and will not injure nearby ornamental plants.

For best results, apply the herbicide only when the weeds are actively growing. The hardest time to kill a weed is when it is hot and dry and the weed is under moisture stress. Try to pick a cooler day with little wind movement and when soil moisture levels are fairly

Behrer, 26, expecting to complete the ride in about six months, departed from the Northwest Kidney Center in Seattle, WA, April 16, 1982, and will arrive in his hometown of Pittsburgh, PA, October 25, 1982.

A graduate of Colorado State University, Behrer suffered kidney failure in 1977 and received a kidney transplant in 1978. Since that time he has made numerous bike trips in the Western U.S. covering over 9000 miles.





Debates On Tax Energy Taxation

An advertisement - complete with a border and picture of insects - appeared recently in a Shopping Paper from the Abilene area. It

"Three 'Boll Weevils' Gramm-Leath-Stenholm voted against a bill to grant the Papo Indians water from Federal Lakes and set up a 15 million Trust Fund to identify them for water rights stolen from them.

"The 'Boll Weevils' have joined the 'Gypsy Moths' Jackets' Yellow 'Republicans' to tip off people they are supposed to

"We need a good insect spray (Voters) to rid Texas of these pests!"

What the ad did not say was that these Congressmen - along with Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen and several others - have been in the forefront of a fight to keep new taxes off national energy resources.

This battle, which is shaping up in Washington as a continuing fight between a northeast -midwest Congressional coalition and representatives from oilproducing states, will have far-reaching effects.

Oil industry officials warned that moves by Congress to boost taxation on their products will cause a continued U.S. recession and an inability to compete overseas. Increased energy taxation, they said, should not be used to balance the Federal budget.

On the other side of the battle, Rep. Howard Wolpe, D. Mich. said that such a tax - preferably a 30 per cent tax on domestic crude oil should be enacted to replace the so-called windfall profits

"It should be noted that one of the Treasury's largest sources of energy-related revenue, the windfall profits tax, will, for the first time.

raise less revenue in 1983 than in the previous year," said Wolpe.

"Our nation's energy resources should be viewed as American resources," he said. "Their benefits should be enjoyed by all of America, not just by the oil industry or a few states, who by geological chance find these resources within their borders..."

Under Wolpe's proposal, 75 percent of the tax would go directly to the government to reduce defecits. The remaining 25 per cent would be split between conserva-. tion efforts and block grants to revitalize state economies.

The House Energy and Commerce Committee conducting the hearing on the crude oil tax is also considering an oil import fee, a tax on gasoline and a tax on the British thermal units of energy used. A similar hearing was conducted by a Senate panel two weeks ago.

Charles Di-Bona, President of the American Petroleum Institute, said any new taxes could stunt growing efforts by U.S. oil firms to find domestic sources of oil.

DiBona also sought to halt ideas that huge Federal defecits should be reduced by taxing energy production.

"It is critically important," he said, "that the formulation of a tax policy under current budgetary constraints not jeopardize the energy capability or the industrial capacity of the na-



An Eastland County Independence Day Family Remembers Their Historical Past

During the Fourth of July Holidays Ed Posey Jr. of Cisco will pump gas as usual at his large Gulf Station south of the Interstate. A number of tourists pulling down the access road to Highway 183 will stop, and notice his friendly manner and attention to their needs.

They will probably not realize that Posey has some other things on his mind this Independence Day - subjects which add quite a diminsion to his life. Things like the American Revolution, and the part his ancestores played in it.

Of course this is a long way in time and place from Cisco, yet it has some bearing on the present too. The present is actually a good time for Posey and his wife, Jean. They have a home, the Gulf business, six children, and five grandsons. And Posey is involved in current as well as historical things his fine pecan trees, local happenings, the Eastside Baptist Church, and the Cisco High School Football Team. (And speaking of the Lobo Team, how many other people have had a son and two grandsons who played on a football team at the same time? This happened to the Poseys in 1982.)

But when the Poseys have enough time for a trip, they are quickly drawn to museums and historical places.

"I like old things," Posey explains. "Antiques, old documents. Even old deeds and tax receipts really interest me.'

Recently Ed Posey Jr. obtained an interesting book about the Posey family in America. This volume was compiled by Lloyd Franklin Posey, an Asst. Professor of

Education at the University of Southern Mississippi, and his wife, Betty Sue Posey, a Librarian at the same school. Until Ed Posey read this book, most of his family information began with happenings in Red River County, Texas, where the family

settled in 1846.

Research by the University Professors led them to conclude that the name 'Posey' was not originally Anglo-Saxon, as one might think, but was derived from the French name "Poschet". There are not a large number of persons in America with the name of Posey, and they are probably all related to each other. Some of the families had a well-documented life in Virginia, where a Capt. John Posey was a friend and neighbor of George Washington.

Around 1750 Capt. John owned a plantation called "Rover's Delight", which joined Mt. Vernon and touched the Potomac River on the east. Posey operated a ferry, fishery, and fish-drying business in addition to the plantation.

Capt. John first distinguished himself in the 2nd Virginia Regiment during the French and Indian wars. He later fought in the Revolutionary Washington referred to him

in diaries as "Mr. Possey". Capt. John's operation of the Ferry probably accounted for his connections over in Maryland, and he began to make some purchases for George Washington.

The first entry in Washington's Diary is dated "Tuesday, Jan. 1, 1760." In this entry he states: "I called for Mr. Possey's on my way home, and desired him to engaged me 100 barrells of

corn upon the best terms he could in Maryland."

Posy procured land for Washington in Pennsylvania, some from as far away as Florida, and land to add to the Mt. Vernon plantation. Capt. John was also a frequent companion on hunts with Washington, and his wife and children were frequent guests in the Washington home. Milly Posey, Capt. John's only daughter, spent a lot of time as a guest and companion of Martha Washington's daughter, Patsy Custis. Milly stayed in Mt. Vernon after Patsy's death and the death of her own mother. Washington paid for part of Milly's education.

After the death of his wife Capt. John recovered enough to write George Washington an amusing note saying that he was "hunting for a rich widow". He found another wife, but apparently there was no great riches. Times were hard, and eventually George Washington came into possession of the Posey estate. Although this is not verified. The Posey silverwear is thought to be part of the display at Mt. Vernon now.

One of the next generation of Poseys was General Thomas Posey, son of Capt. John. Thomas Posey, now just a handsome image on a page of the Professor's book, embodied the spirit of his times and the push to the western frontier.

He became a Captain in the Revolutionary War at age 19, distinguishing himself in a number of battles. he spent the terrible winter of 1777 at Valley Forge, but also shared in the glory of the British surrender. Gen. Thomas was present at the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, and he personally recieved the pistols of the British Commanding Officer.

Several years after the war General Posey served a term as U.S. Senator of the Louisiana Territory. He became Lt. Gov. of Kentucky, Gov. of Indiana Territory, and Gov. of the Illinois Territory. He also served as an Indian Agent. and led out in the war of 1812. He became a Major General in this conflict.

In 1846 Texas became a part of the United States, and another generation of Poseys headed for the frontier. Leaiden Posey and family arrived in newly created Red River County, N.E. Texas, one of the first three families to settle there. The Poseys acquired farm and ranch land, and became involved in various enterprises. Clarksville became

the County Seat of this area. Leeaiden Posey had a son named Enos Posey, and then

Ed Jr.'s father was named Edwin Drue. He remembers that his people were farmers and ranchers, with comfortable homes in Red River County

Edwin Posey also worked for the Texas and Pacific Railroad, and continued in this type of work when the Depression hit in 1929-30. Times were very hard for the persons of his family in agriculture.

In 1932 Edwin Posey moved his family to Cisco, and that was the first time a small boy named Ed Jr. saw the place. Edwin Posey continued to work in various TP Depots, and at one time went into the trucking business.

Ed Jr. attended Cisco schools, and played on the Lobo Football team. But he soon found out that the Poseys weren't through going to war! World War II began when he was 18 years old, and he enlisted soon afterward.

He was sent to Eruope, where he served in the 274th Infantry Regiment. This was a combat team fighting along the Metz highway - a German supply route into France. Casualties were

"People don't understand what war is really like," Posey says. "Unless they have been there - they don't know. My best buddy was killed right beside me.'

Posey was awarded the Bronze Star, the Combat Infantry Badge, and what he refers to as "several other things" during this severe fighting

The end of the war meant coming home - and studies at Cisco Junior College. Ed Jr. completed a Businessd Course, then went to work as a bookkeeper for J.M. Radford of Co. Cisco, wholesale grocers.

About 20 years ago he went into the service station business, and acquired the Gulf Station in 1979. He deals

In 1945 Ed Posey married Jean Bailey of Scranton, daughter of pioneer family of that community. 

Lone Star Gas Company Applys For Increase In City Gate Rate

Dallas-Stating that the economic vitality of the utility's service area depends on an assured gas supply, Lone Star Gas Co. Senior Vice President Douglas W Williams announced the utility applied to the Texas Railroad Commission today for an increase in its city gate rate. The company's application requests \$90 million increased revenues for its Transmission Division, including 100 percent recovery of the increased cost of gas purchases. Using a monthly average consumption of six thousand cubic feet (Mcf) per month, a residential customer's bill would increase about \$4 per month.

The city gate rate is the amount that the company's Transmission Division is permitted to charge the Distribution divisions for gas delivered for sale to residential and commercial customers and for Distribution company-used and unaccounted-for gas. The Transmission Division buys

gas from producers and transports it to 536 cities and towns served in Texas by Lone Star Gas Co. The point at which city distribution systems purchase the gas from the Transmission Division for customer consumptions is the city gate.

Since February 1980, the Texas Railroad Commission has allowed the company to recover only 95 percent of its increased cost of gas. This partial recovery has resulted in Lone Star being unable to recover \$13.5 million in gas costs through April 1982 and unable to earn the return granted by the Commission in 1980. For the same period, the average cost of purchased gas increased from \$1.85 per Mcf to \$3.38 in April of this year, an 83 percent increase.

"To compete successfully for new gas supplies, we must recover the increased costs of buying and providing to our customers this premium fuel," said Williams. "Only with full cost recovery can we pay

The requested increase seeks to recover the higher cost of gas, inflation-related increases in operating expenses and a reasonable return on increased amounts of property used to serve the gas utility's 1.2 million customers

95 Attend Foy Family Reunion


Ninety-five members of the John and Edna Foy family met at the Church of God's Camp Inspiration in Eastland on June 26 and 27 for their annual reunion.
