


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Bench Marks For 1982 School District

school districts have been raising property taxes more than necessary, a Texas Research League report says. Last fall school trustees adopted budgets increasing operating expenses by \$718 million. The legislature provided \$483 million of additional state aid and the budgets proposed to use \$125 million of fund balances leaving \$110 million to be paid from increased local property taxes.

But school districts boosted taxes by \$325 million for operating purposes plus another \$58 million increase for debt service.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the League. The Texas Research League is a private, nonprofit, Austinbased corporation engaged in governmental research.

Locally, the Cisco, Eastland, Ranger ISD's tax levy was increased by 15.5% for Cisco, 48.2% for Eastland and 18.8% for Ranger for 1981-82 as compared to a 15.4 percent increase for the average school district in

School budgets adopted for 1981-82 called for spending

> The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Cisco, Eastland and Ranger ISD in 1980-81 was \$14307 for Cisco, \$13965 for Eastland and \$14768 for Ranger which was above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$15,690 per classroom teacher, or 18.7 percent over minimum. The legislature has increased the state minimum by \$80 a month for 1981-82 and by another \$88 a month for

> There was an average of one teacher for 19.2 students in Cisco, 21.2 in Eastland and 17.2 in Ranger ISD compared to a statwide pupilteacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not

number of hours each day. The report noted that the share of the total school payroll paid to classroom teachers has dropped from 73.4 percent of the total in 1969-70 to 60.9 cents of each payroll dollar last year as many more nonteaching personnel have been hired. Locally, classroom teachers were paid 65.7, 57.5 and 64.8 percent of the school payroll

in 1980-81.

School districts are permitted to levy property taxes abvove the amount needed to pay the local share of the Foundation Program cost. In 1981-82 the average school district levied property taxes five times the \$159 per student needed for the Foundation Program, leaving \$728 per student for enrichment. The Cisco, Eastland and Ranger ISD needed \$137 for Cisco, \$142 for Eastland and \$120 for Ranger for the local share, leaving \$439 for Cisco, \$499 for Eastland and \$465 for Ranger per student for spending beyond the Foundation Program level.

For next year, the 67th Legislature provided an additional \$297 million of state aid to schools. The minimum salary has been increased by \$88 a month and the operating allowance was upped by \$17 per student. Local school trustees must adopt a school budget and set a tax rate before the new school year starts on September 1. Beginning this year, if the

school board increases preoperty taxes by more than 8 percent, voters may exercise a limited form of initiative and referendum to roll back the increase the following year.

Crepe Myrtle, The Lilac Of The South

lagerstroemia indica, is a deciduous shrub or small tree that has been cultivated in the Southern United States for more that 150 years. The plant was introduced to the United States from Asia and has become associated in this country with Southern gardens and ante-bellum grandeur. Sometimes referred to as the "Lilac of the South" crape myrtle derives its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and resemblance of its leaves to the true myr-

The flowering season begins in June or July and continues until fail. Each long panicle is comprised of hundreds of one- to two- inch red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. Leaves are often garnet tinged in spring. glossy dark green in summer and dull to intense yellow, orange or red in autumn.

When the leaves fall in the winter, the crape myrtle becomes a living sculpture. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character with smooth bark varying in color from light straw to rich deep brown. The bark exfoliates in early summer to reveal

new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.

Full sun is necessary for good flowering. Crape myrtle is cold hardy throughout the Southern United States. The planting site should be slightly elevated and open to allow free air movement to avoid mildew problems. For example, planting near a wall is undesirable because of restricted air movement around the plant.

Crape myrtle tolerates a wide range of soil conditions, but grows best in a heavy loam that is slightly acidic (pH 5.0 to 6.5). Nutrient requirements are minimal; high fertility levels produce excessive vegetative growth and fewer flower panicles. Application of 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 fertilizer in early spring at the rate of one to two pounds per 100 square feet of planting bed may be beneficial to established plants, especially those growing in poor soils. Mulches of cedar bark or hardwood chips are beneficial in retaining soil moisture and minimizing



soil temperature fluctuations during the summer. The ideal time for transplanting container-grown crape myrtle is late spring or early summer, when new shoots are emerging. Balled and burlapped or bareroot plants are best transplanted during dormant periods.

Deep soil watering is required periodically during dry periods in summer when the plant is actively growing and producing flowers. Insufficient watering may prevent flower formation and result in premature leaf drop. Crape myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form. However, tip pruning to remove old flower clusters will promote more abundant floweres and renewal of new wood. Small twiggy growth

should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and allow free air circulation. Crape myrtle can also be trained into single-stemmed, tree-like plants by removing all but the strongest stem while the plant is young. Spanish moss may be found growing on crape myrtle. It should be removed to allow better circulation. The crape myrtle is virtually insect free and has few disease problems. When planning additions to your landscape include the beautiful crape myrtle for beauty as well as maintainance free.

QUESTION: What about the World's Fair at Knoxville? Should you go?

ANSWER: Definitely, if you're in the neighborhood. Otherwise, well, there are a lot of other good things in the area, so you might want to consider a round-robin, and/or kill two birds with one stone.

We were at the Fair farily early, so the heat was not bad, and even on a Sunday, the crowd wasn't really crushing - except in spots. (We now read that people are dropping from the heat in droves.)

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USDA Moves To Improve School Lunch Application Accountability

A new monthly reporting and budgeting system that reduces food stamp losses and improves program administration was announced by a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) official.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary C. Jarratt said the system changes the way benefits are computed and requires monthly reports of income from most participants. "This will improve the program's operation because it will base benefits on a family's actual financial status rather than anticipating what next month's status will be," Jarratt said. It is expected to save \$280 million in fiscal year 1984 when all states must have the system implemented, she said.

Many states have im-

Dependent Children programs. These states include Louisiana and Oklahoma in the Southwest Region of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), which oversees the food stamp program. Representatives of thse two states will meet their counterparts from Texas, Arkansas and New Mexico in Arlington Texas, in mid-June to discuss implementation of the new procedures, said Gene Dickey, FNS administrator in the Southwest.

The rule announced today allows states to incorporate the food stamp and AFDC systems into a single coordinated system of reporting and budgeting for both pro-

Under the system, all households except migrant thly benefits based on their income and other circumstances in a prior month, although in certain hardship cases a household may be exempted from the new accounting system at the time of initial application for benefits. Migrant participants will continue to get benefits based on anticipated income.

Currently, food stamp allotments are based on participants' anticipated monthly income. If the household's income or othercircumstances change during the certification period, recipients are required to notify the food stamp office. The future allotments are then adjusted to reflect changes in income or other circumstances.

This system will permit state agencies to require ticipants to report their financial circumstances on a monthly basis, in order to provide an accurate assessment of a recipient's financial status. If a household fails to submit a monthly report of income, after it has been notified to do so, its food stamp benefits may be terminated.

Migrants, the elderly and disabled, all households whose income fluctuates very little, are exempt from the monthly reporting requirement. They will continue to report changes in income when they occur.

"Our old way of computing food stamp benefits did't work well for households with fluctuating income or unpredictable changes in circumstances." said Jarratt. "Another problem was some households simply did

not report changes. These households continue to receive food stamps until the food stamp office learned of the changes or until their certification periods expired. The state then had to recover any food stamp losses.

States must have the system in operation by Oct. 1, 1983. However, states that wish to use the new system before that time, may do so after the interim rule has been published.

Comments on this rule will be accepted until Sept. 22 and will be considered in developing final rules. Comments will be accepted by Christopher Martin, acting deputy administrator for family nutrition programs, Food and Nutrition Service, USDA, Alexandria, VA.,

New USDA Food Stamp Program Reporting/Budgeting System Announced

In an effort to ensure that school lunch benefits go only to those legitimately entitled, the U.S. Department of Agriculture is proposing that states verify the information on a sampling of applications for free and reduced price lunches breakfasts.

The rules, implementing the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, were issued along with a companion proposal clarifying the specific information parents must provide.

"Congress initiated these changes because verification will greatly improve the integrity of the school feeding programs," said Mary Jarratt, assistant secretary for food and consumer services. "We are

very concerned about the potential abuse in the school lunch program that can be caused when parents underreport their incomes on free and reduced price meal applications. We believe ths regulation strikes the balance between the need we have for increased accountability without imposing excessive paper requirements on school officials," she add-

Under the verification proposal, state agencies are required to ensure that for school year 1982-83, a minimum of 3 percent or 3,000, of all applications for free and reduced price lunch, whichever is less, on file in each school food authority are verified: Verification procedures will be at state and local discre-

This proposal will provide a way to counter abuses in the current free and reduced-priced application system," Jarratt said.

The companion proposal clarifies the information required on the application forms, including the requirement that parents must provide social security numbers for household members that are at least 21 years old.

Previously, applications for free and reduced price meals required only information only if they could show they had reason to suspect it was false or er-

The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 requires that applications include the social security number of all adult household members and requires USDA to set up standards for schools to document the information on the applications.

The proposals, published in two regulations, are scheduled to appear in the May 25 Federal Register. Comments on the revised application procedures rule are due by June 24 for consideration. The comment period for the verification proposal extends through July 26.

Brucellosis Regulations Tightened

AUSTIN--Oklahoma and Missouri are two of several states which are tightening brucellosis regulations on Texas cattle, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Aniaml Health Commission, reports.

Missouri has already im-

posed stiffer entry requirements on Texas livestock, and Oklahoma's tougher regulations go in effect July 1. Iowa has also put in effect a regulation which would treat Texas as a Class C state instead of a B and C state as provided for in federal regulations. that means more testing of this state's cattle for entry into Iowa.

"It appears that Texas livestock producers can expect more states to increase their requirements for Texas' cattle relating to brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe

He cited a couple of reasons for this:

1. Several states are taking action to comply with proposed federal rules;

2. States free or virtually free of brucellosis want to remain that way, and thus are imposing the more stringent regulations.

Missouri probably has the most stringent regulations on receiving Texas cattle:

All cattle moving into Missouri, including steers, will require a prior permit from the Missouri Department of Agriculture Animal Health division. Other requirements include: individual identification on health certificates: two consecutive negative tests before movement for females over 18 months of age, followed by a 60 to 120 day quarantine and retest at owner's expense; and one negative test within 30 days of movement for females between four and 18 months of age followed by the same quarantine and restest.

Also, male or female calves under 12 months of age from quarantined herds and adult vaccinated cattle from Texas would not be allowed entry into Missouri under any circumstances. "These same restrictions apply to cattle from Oklahoma, Florida, Louisiana, and Mississippi entering Missouri," Dr. Holcombe

S branded cattle may move only to a quarantined feedlot or directly to slaughter. S branded cattle or those which may have been exposed to brucellosis.

In addition, out of state farm origin cattle may be consigned to an approved market in Oklahoma without prior test, permit, or vaccination. Before being released from such market, they must meet all of Oklahoma's requirements.

According to records of the TAHC, Oklahoma received 213,000 head of cattle and calves in 1981, Missouri received 4,000 head, and Iowa received 47,000 head. This will give us some idea as the amount of trading we do with just those three

Nationwide, Texas shipped more than 2,046,000 head of cattle to other states in 1981. "The Texas' livestock industry does indeed depend on other states for markets, so it is imperative that we in
