Rhode Pipe Company of Silvertown was the low bidder for a contract to build a sewage outfall line for the City of Cisco when bids were opened by city officials at 1 p.m. Wednesday at City Hall. The Rhode bid was \$117,551.

A special meeting of the City Council was held at 6 p.m. Wednesday and the contract was formally awarded to the Silvertown firm.

Nine contracting firms submitted bids for the contract. The highest bid was \$296,180.50. The Rhode firm's bid was low by some \$15,000.

Other bidders were Tri-J Construction Co. of Paris, Panhandle Construction Co. of Lubbock, West-Tex Construction Co. of Borger, Improvements, Inc., of Pendleton, Circle C Construction Co. of Fort Worth, Oscar Renda Contracting of Roanoke, Lightning Construction, Inc., of Seagoville and Regional Utilities of Irving.

Hilton Ave Widening Project Is Approved by City Council

A resolution authorizing the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation to widen Conrad Hilton Avenue from 12th Street south to IH-20 was approved by the City Council at their semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

Plans call for the street, which is U.S. Highway 183, to be widened eight feet on each side for a total of 52 feet of paved road, County Engineer R.P. (Buddy) Haun told the Council. The project costs will be financed by the highway department after the city and utility companies move their service lines back.

Mr. Haun said it would probably be six or seven months before the utility line work can be completed. City Manager Mike Moore said the city water department would incur expenses of some \$1,500 in moving water lines. SW Bell Telephone Co. and West Texas Utilities Co. will have considerable expense in moving their line poles, while Lone Star Gas

Company will have to move only a few lines, Mr. Moore said.

The street widening project had been first brought up in 1961. Mr. Haun told the Council. He said that the present traffic level makes the two-lane road dangerous and that widening was a safety measure. He added that the accident rate on the street was high. His county office has received little or no objection to the project, Mr. Haun said.

Mrs. Lela Lloyd appeared to suggest that Hilton Avenue and Avenue E be used for Highway 183 traffic, Hilton for southbound and Avenue E for northbound—a one-way thoroughfare. She said that many of the 20 business firms and 40 residences on Hilton Avenue would have problems with widening the highway.

Billy Reynolds of Gardenhire Oil Co. said he had a petition signed by most residents of the street, asking that the widening project be turned down by the city.

He noted that Hilton Avenue, from 8th to 3rd street, was two-way and wondered if widening the balance of the street would be good economics. Engineer Haun said that traffic in the business district was much slower and less dangerous.

CofC Manager Gene Abbott read an endorsement of the widening project from the Chamber of Commerce's board of directors.

The Council voted unanimously in favor of widening the 7 of a mile section of Highway 183-Hilton Avenue.

In other action, the Council discussed a suggestion that the parking meter ordinance be voided and that the meters be removed from downtown streets. A survey conducted in the business district showed that business firms favored removing the meters, City Manager Moore said.

After considerable discussion, the Council vote was 3-to-2 for voiding the ordinance. Since four "yes" votes were required (two

councilmen were absent), the matter was tabled for further study and consideration at a later date.

The Council passed a resolution declaring six buildings in residential areas to be unsafe and dangerous structures and requiring their demolition and removal. The structures are located at 805 Beech St., 1301 Beech St., 504 E. 12th St., 706 E. 11th St., 803 W. 11th St., and 805 W. 11th St.

Copies of the resolution will be mailed to owners of the properties, and unless they take action within a prescribed time the city will demolish the property and clean off the lots and bill the owners for the costs, under provisions of the order.

The second and final hearing on the proposed Revenue Sharing Budget for fiscal year 1982-83 was held. The budget calls for spending \$6,244 for office furniture and equipment, including a copying machine; \$20,850 for the street department, including a pickup truck, an air compressor, a street roller and maintenance materials; \$3,000 for parks and recreation, including a playground in East Cisco and a slide for the swimming pool; \$8,000 for the fire department, including air breathing apparatus and tanks, bunker gear and hose and nozzles; and \$16,150 for the water and wastewater department, including a pickup truck, mobile-portable radio equipment, and maintenance materials. The budget totals \$54,244.

A contract between the city and the M-K-T Railroad Co. for a right-of-way for the proposed 10-inch sewer outfall line was approved. City Manager Mike Moore said the right-of-way would cost the city some \$2,000.

A contract with the Eastland County Appraisal District to provide the city tax department with statements showing details for the 1982 tax notices that will be mailed in October was approved. The ECAD will furnish the material for five cents each. Mr. Moore said there were between 3,500 and 4,000 parcels of taxable property in the city and that the savings in labor would be considerable. The ECAD has the material on computer and it can be provided with a minimum of effort, he said.

Plans for drilling oil tests at the City Airport were approved. The property was leased recently by a Dallas firm. The Council also agreed to advertise for bids to lease some 30 acres of city owned land, including the sewage disposal plant area for oil and gas exploration.

After discussion, the matter of enacting a Comprehensive Animal Control Ordinance was tabled for further study. The matter was brought up after the city received several complaints about horses, cows and other animals being kept inside the city limits.

Mayor Pro Tem Loyall Lundstrom presided in the absence of Mayor Eris Ritchie who was out-of-town on business. Councilmen present were Bobby Ingram, Bobby Rains, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Batteas along with City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright. A dozen spectators were in the audience.

Charles LeFlore Murder Trial Reset For August 16

A new indictment for capital murder has been handed down against Charles LeFlore, and a lot of things are in a state of flux as a result of the new grand

jury action. The trial of LeFlore which was scheduled to begin Monday, July 19 on the original murder indictment, has been cancelled and the new trial date is Aug. 16.

The indictment issued Thursday by the 91st District Court Grand Jury will presumably permit the state to ask the death penalty. One of the rulings is a "no statements to the press by officials" declaration but speculation is that new evidence brought on the new indictment.

Big question right now appears to be whether the new indictment "nullifies" the earlier rulings made in the case, paramount of which was the court ruling that LeFlore's statement could not be admitted as evidence in the murder trial.

Ten indictments came out Thursday, with 16 cases having been considered. There were five no-bills (no indictments) and one case passed.

Five indictments were based on a new law under the organized crime act, in connection with five persons charged with the manufacture of dope. Three have been arrested, and two others were expected to be picked up quickly, it was reported.

There were two felony DWI indictments; one forgery case in which a 17-year-old Cisco youth is charged with a \$150.00 check; two burglary indictments in connection with the robbery of the Ranger Swimming Pool Concession Stand; one felony theft case involving a \$700 worthless check to Caldwell Motor Co.; and one indictment for the break in of Freddie's Texaco and theft of an Eastland girls' auto.

The trial of Charles Allen LeFlore, 20-year old Ciscoan, on charges of murder in the shooting death of Debra Garcia in Cisco last December was to have begun with jury selection at 9 a.m. Monday in 91st District Court at Eastland. A panel of 200 prospective jurors was selected to report

1. Determine by order that this proceeding may be maintained as a class action;

2. Issue a temporary restraining order pursuant to Rule 65 (b) restraining the Defendants, their successors and employees and all those in concert with them for collecting illegal supervisory fees for an illicit probation department;

3. Issue a temporary restraining order pursuant to Rule 65 (b) restraining the Defendants, their successors and employees and all those in concert with them from detaining and trying juveniles without a juvenile probation department or officer;

4. Issue a temporary

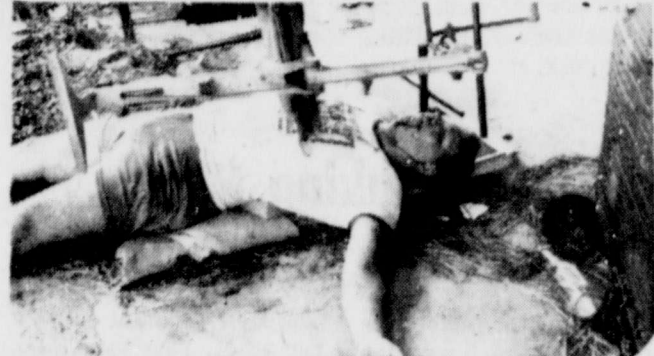

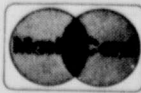
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No Injuries In July 4th Traffic Accidents

In Eastland County, there were five traffic accidents over the July Fourth weekend, according to Department of Public Safety Officer Sargeant Mathews.

Mathews said that all the accidents involved property damage and none of them involved any injuries.

Two accidents were caused by people driving while intoxicated (DWI), one was caused by someone following another car too closely, according to Sgt. Mathews.

Mathews said that the last accident was caused by someone who fell asleep at the wheel.

Across the state, some where not as fortunate as those in Eastland County, as 55 people died over the weekend. The time period included was from Friday at 6 p.m. to midnight Monday. The DPS predicted eight less deaths, for the period involved.

DPS Director Col. Jim

Adams said that the number of deaths underscored the need to restore the certainty of punishment for speeders and drunks.

"This needless loss of life, pain and suffering cannot be tolerated," said Adams. "We must look for ways to deal more effectively with the main causes of these accidents, which are excessive speed and alcohol."

DPS records showed 19 persons were killed Saturday, 12 Sunday, 13 Monday, and 11 during the six opening hours of the count Friday.

"We must not overlook the fact that on the average, for each fatality recorded, 44 persons are injured in traffic accidents," Adams stated.

The DPS recorded 54 deaths at the end of its count, but the total rose to 63 when people injured in those accidents died later.

Adams said the governor's traffic safety task force which he chairs, anticipates it will give the governor positive recommendations by the end of the summer for dealing with drunken drivers and speeders.

Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

The following recipe was incorrectly printed from the Homemaking Hints article on Sunday, July 11.

HONEY DRESSING

- 4 T. sugar
- 1 t. salt
- 1 t. paprika
- 1 t. dry mustard
- 1/4 t. pepper (optional)
- 1/4 t. cup fresh lemon juice
- 3/4 cup oil (any kind for salads)
- 1/2 t. scraped onion with juice
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1 t. poppy seed

Combine first 6 ingredients and dissolve sugar, shake in a jar. (I warm this enough to dissolve sugar and salt seems faster). Add remaining ingredients and shake in a jar vigorously until thoroughly blended and chill before serving. Making about 1 1/2 cups. Just before serving fruit, carefully pour over the fruit and gently toss to coat fruit. This dressing will get thick when chilled. I've poured it over the fruit (while fruit is in a mixing bowl) and gently toss fruit - then put the fruit in a watermelon bowl or a salad bowl lined with lettuce leaves, if it is a buffet meal. It can be served with the dressing on it. Put the dressing on just before serving.

Cucumbers are now in season, and many of you are probably busy making pickles and relishes.

Here are some pickling pointers that are good general guidelines.

1. If you are in an area where the water is particularly hard, and/or alkaline, it is best to use distilled water for making pickles.
2. Always water bath pickled products. Many people feel this is what causes pickles to be soft; however, just the opposite is true. The water bath treatment is mild heat treatment designed to destroy spoilage organisms and inactivate enzymes. Processing beyond recommended time may lead to softness in the product.
3. Calcium chloride can be added to improve texture.

Use 1/8 t. per pint or 1/4 t. per quart. Your local drug-gist should be able to get this for you.

4. Use only pickling salt. Table salt has anticaking agents which may cause cloudiness of the brine.

5. Pickle your products the same day they are picked. This is very important.

6. Be sure to use at least 1/2 cup of undiluted vinegar (5% acetic acid, 50 grain) per quart of pickles. 100 grain (10% acetic acid) vinegar should be reduced to 50 grain by mixing in half and half with water.

7. Be sure you are using a pickling variety cucumber and not a salad type.

Avoid using waxed fruits. Pickling failures can be real disappointing. Some of the common causes of poor quality pickles are the following:

SHRIVELED PICKLES: Shriveling may result from using too strong a vinegar, sugar, or salt solution at the start of the pickling process. In making the very sweet or very sour pickles, it is best to start with a dilute solution and increase gradually to the desired strength. Overcooking or overprocessing may also cause shriveling.

HOLLOW PICKLES: Hollowness in pickles usually results from— Poorly developed cucumbers. Keeping cucumbers too long before pickling. Too strong or too weak a brine during fermentation.

SOFT OR SLIPPERY PICKLES: These generally result from microbial action with causes spoilage. Once a pickle becomes soft, it cannot be made firm. Microbial activity may be caused by Too little salt or acid. Cucumbers not covered with brine during fermentation. Scum scattered throughout the brine during fermentation period. Insufficient heat treatment. A seal that is not airtight. Moldy garlic or spices.

Blossoms, if not entirely removed from the cucumbers before fermentation, may contain fungi or yeasts responsible for enzymatic softening or pickles.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

This week the newsletter from Ball Canning Company arrived. I was reading with interest a recipe for fake pineapple which is made from zucchini squash.

For years we have made fake strawberry preserved from figs. So now you can make fake pineapple out of zucchini...sounds interesting!

For those of you that have an abundance of zucchini, you might like to try this recipe.

FAKE PINEAPPLE
4 quarts grated or diced zucchini
1-1/2 cups "Real Lemon" juice
1 can (46 oz.) unsweetened pineapple juice
3 cups sugar

Remove peeling and seeds from zucchini. Grate or dice, mix all ingredients thoroughly and simmer for 20 minutes. Stir frequently. Pour hot zucchini mixture into clean, hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch head space. Process 30 minutes in boiling water bath.

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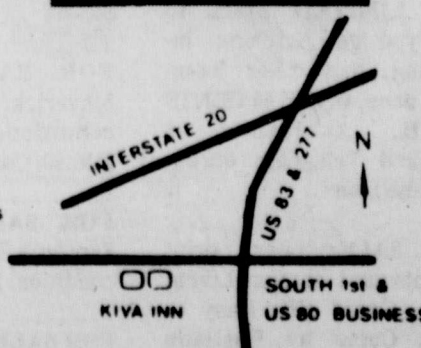

Because of the abundant spring and summer rains, hay is being made at a record pace in Eastland. I don't remember ever seeing this much hay produced in this county. The quality of the hay is very good in most cases too.

One producer told me his forage sorghum looked like the pictures in the ads for the first time. Even though the sorghum is tall, it is very heavy and has small stems.

I still see a lot of small bales, but it seems more and more producers are rolling hay in the large round bales.

While the big package hay systems help reduce labor and equipment costs on many farms, they require special storage and feeding.

Traditional storage and feeding methods aren't suitable with big hay packages. Due to their size, they must be stored outside in a well drained area. Also, they must be dense because low density packages absorb more water and spoil quickly.

Many producers stack hay on a hillside with the belief that this is a well-drained site. This is a mistake because drainage from above runs under the stacks, causing excessive hay spoilage.

Another mistake is to stack bales under trees, which prevents rapid drying after rainfall.

Stack bales two feet from each other so sides won't touch when settling occurs. If bales touch, spoilage is excessive.

In determining hay supplies, allow two round bales

per cow to compensate for additional consumption realized when large packages are fed free-choice. Feed large packages in a rack to prevent trampling losses.

Studies have shown that animals waste 2.6 per cent dry matter when hay is hand fed. When large packages are fed daily with free access on a sod, up to 15 percent is lost. Panels can cut wastage to 5.5 percent. About 35 percent is wasted when feeding a week's supply without racks.

Since production costs continue to rise, hay should be stored and fed properly to reduce losses and increase operating efficiency.

The Eastland County hay show is scheduled for October 1. I would like to encourage producers to make plans now to enter the hay show. It's a good opportunity to determine the quality of your hay. A protein analysis will be made of each entry and a judge will also add a physical score.

It is a good management practice to have your hay tested for protein content. This can be done by the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M. We have mailing containers and other information on forage testing in the County Extension Service Office.

Pest Alert

Judging by the frequency of phone calls coming into our office regarding fleas, these parasitic little creatures appear to be one of the major pests affecting local residents. There is no one quick easy step to flea control. The control of a flea infestation requires diligence and persistence. Effective flea control must include treatment of the pet(s) and through treatment of the entire premises—indoors and outdoors. These three areas should be treated simultaneously in order to break the "flea-cycle" and maximize control results.

The most common flea encountered is the cat flea. Cat fleas also attack dogs, humans, rabbits, squirrels, rats and poultry. Although pets are usually involved in a flea problem, an infestation may occur in the absence of pets.

Pets must be treated on a regular basis. Shampoos or dusts containing Sevin(Reg.) are generally preferred over sprays to remove fleas from pets. Flea collars containing naled(Dibrom) or propoxur(Sendran) seem to be the most effective in keeping fleas off of pets.

Sanitation is an important step in flea control. Carpet, rugs, furniture and pet's bedding should be vacuumed or washed to remove eggs and larvae to break the cycle. Dispose of the vacuum sweepings immediately to prevent flea escape and subsequent reinfestation. Carpets and baseboards may be sprayed with Malathion or Sevin(Reg.) The effectiveness of a pesticide is directly related to the thoroughness of application. If the house is on a pier and beam foundation, treatment under the house is necessary. Retreatment in

about 3 to 6 weeks may be required to kill fleas that had not hatched at the time of treatment.

Foggers are also effective. Some of these foggers contain a quick kill insecticide such as dichlorvos(DDVP) and a residual insecticide such as propoxur(Baygon). Within the last year aerosol products containing methoprene(D-Con Flea Stop or Spectracide Professional Flea Control) have come onto the market. These products will prevent flea larvae from becoming adult fleas, thus breaking the flea cycle.

Treatment of outside areas such as the yard, porches and garages can also be helpful. Lawns should be treated with Diazinon(Reg.) or Dursban(Reg.) For flea control spray formulations would be more effective than granular.

No one of these control measures alone will provide satisfactory control. A persistent effort using the above mentioned methods should reduce flea populations. Once the population has been reduced, sanitation and repeated treatment of pets should control fleas.

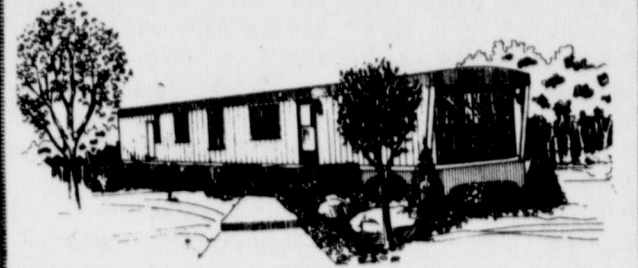
terstate Church of Christ in Cisco, and the Morton Valley Home Demonstration Club.

ASHVILLE IS the heart of what we learned was W.N.C. (Western North Carolina), and the initials are used to designate the little "panhandle" of the state, which is so different from the "eastern-short" portion. The heart of Asheville is Vilmore House, a mansion used many times for movie scenes and a tourist mecca.

(One aside before a description of Biltmore House: in this area we observed what appeared to be an ancient dance. We'd never seen it, but you might be familiar with "clogging," which appears to be a sort of early aerobics, done to what we'd call "break-down"-type music. No touching, and maybe

even without a partner, it just pretty much amounted to individual "stomping" in place.)

Young George W. Vanderbilt, grandson of Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, situated Biltmore House on 125,000 acres of Carolina upland property that included Mt. Pisgah. He and his architect, Richard Morris Hunt, chose the French Renaissance chateau style and incorporated in the home the most advanced technology of the day. In a time when few houses had central heat, mechanical

refrigeration, electric lights and appliances, Biltmore House had all these conveniences. Every family and guest bedroom had its own bathroom, an unheard-of luxury. Most of the original equipment is still in use, including the steam heating system.

First opened on Christmas Eve 1895, Biltmore House took five years to complete, involving over a thousand workers, craftsmen, and artisans. A temporary railroad was built to transport men and materials from Biltmore Village to the House. Brick

and tile kilns and a complete woodworking mill were erected on the grounds.

Following George Vanderbilt's death in 1914, the family deeded most of the acreage to the U.S. government to form the nucleus of Pisgah National Forest.

The entrance gate seems to be on a busy, busy downtown Asheville main thoroughfare, but the three, winding three-mile road runs along ravines, streams and fern-fringed pools, finally revealing the House only when you turn into the courtyard.

Biltmore's ENTRANCE HALL contains an important set of bronzes of Antoine Louis Barye (1796-1875). The adjacent PALM COURT displays an ever-changing exhibit of flowers and plants from Estate gardens and greenhouses. The central fountain was created by the Viennese sculptor Karl Bitter.

The BILLIARD ROOM, part of the Bachelor's Suite, has walls covered with sporting and theatrical prints and trophies of the hunt. The playing tables were designed for the room.

The BANQUET HALL's vaulted ceiling arches some 70 feet above the 72' by 42' expanse. Acoustics are such that guests at opposite ends of the table can converse with ease. A Bitter carving decorates the triple fireplace wall. Five large 16th century Flemish tapestries depict a story of Vulcan and Venus.

The FAMILY DINING ROOM has walls of Spanish leather above red marble. The fireplace is framed with jasperware tiles made by Josiah Wedgwood in England. The monogrammed family china is by Minton and Spode, the crystal by Baccarat. Family portraits hang on the walls.

The highlight of the MORNING SALON is the small chess table, with an antique chess set, owned and used by Napoleon Bonaparte while in exile.

Over the MUSIC ROOM mantle hangs an Albrecht Durer print measuring more than 100 square feet and consisting of 92 engraved blocks commissioned by Emperor Maximilian I. By the fireplace is a rare set of white Meissen Apostles by sculptor Johann Joachim Kandler. Above the Gothic cabinet is a portrait of William Cecil (Lord Burgley), a direct ancestor of the present owner of the Estate.

The 75-foot TAPESTRY GALLERY features three exquisitely preserved 16th century Brussels tapestries depicting "The Triumph of Virtue over Vice." The large family portraits are by Sargent and Boldini.

In the LIBRARY, Mr. Vanderbilt's broad intellectual interests are evident in the collection of over 20,000 bound volumes on world history, art, architecture, landscape gardening, and classical literature in the eight languages in which he was fluent. The painted canvas ceiling, attributed to Giovanni Antonio Pelligrini

(1645-1741), once graced a Venetian palace. Over the black marble fireplace is a French tapestry flanked by Bitter wood carvings.

The GRAND STAIRCASE reaches four floors and is a duplicate, in reverse direction, of one in the Chateau de Blois in France.

The LOUIS XVI BEDROOM contains a magnificent Aubusson rug. Wall panels and furniture are covered in red silk damask.

The LIVING HALL was used for informal gatherings and games. Photographs of family members and friends are surrounded by paintings by Sargent, Guy and Zorn.

The graceful NORTH BEDROOM was planned for Mr. Vanderbilt's mother and contains her favorite colors. Walls are of yellow silk; the rugs are Savonnerie.

In the OAK SITTING ROOM are fine Jacobean furnishes set against carved oak paneling. The small desk is inlaid with mother of pearl and the large ebony curio cabinet is encrusted with ivory. The massive brass braziers were used to keep coal for the fireplaces.

The furniture in MR. VANDERBILT'S BEDROOM is primarily Spanish, Italian, and Portuguese from the 18th and 19th centuries. From this room he had a view of Mt. Pisgah and his entire estate.

The DAUGHTER'S BEDROOM contains a unique collection of fine English and French furnishings, including the canopied antique bed and the ornate marquetry wardrobe.

The GUEST SUITE consists of Bedroom, Sitting Room, and Bath. In the Sitting Room the portrait of George, Frederick, and Eliza Vanderbilt as children was painted by Lazarus. The print of William H. Vanderbilt and his famous trotters is an original Currier & Ives. Over the Bedroom mantle are paintings by Renoir.

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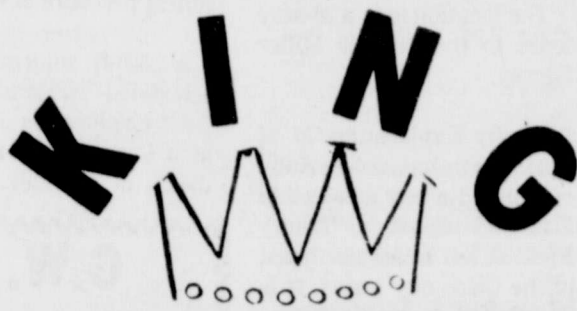



It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.


