Lone Star Gas Files For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Co. Manager, Wayne West, today (July 19, 1982) filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Cisco about \$2.38 in the winter and \$.38 in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of eight thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$37.17 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$39.55.

Commercial gas customers' rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule. "Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says West. "This rate increase is necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Cisco became effective in 1979.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says West. "And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

INSULATING YOUR GARDEN

We hear so very much today about the "R" factor and insulating our homes to retain heat in the winter and the coolness in the summer in order to conserve energy. We have the same problems in our gardens and flower beds. But here the insulation is called mulch. Mulch performs many functions, it helps to retain moisture year round. In the heat of the summer it helps to keep the plants cool and in the winter it help to keep the plants warm and offers protection from freezing. There are many different products offered for sale for mulching your beds. We must look for the best product to perform the above described functions and then we must consider the appearance of that particular mulch our beds. There is one additional consideration and that is will the mulch we use counter-act any of the elements (acidity) that is in the beds or will the mulch enhance the elements.

Lets look at the most popular mulches in this area. They are pine bark, cedar bark, rice hulls - sugar cane, red wood, corn cobs and leaves/grass clippings. The pine bark mulch is by far the most popular due to the abundance of the product and the lower price. Pine bark mulch will protect the plants and will offer a good appearance in the beds. But we do have a problem with pine bark mulch it will leach the nitrogen out of the soil.

The cedar bark mulch is becoming a very popular mulch. It performs well in the protection of your plants and offers a good appearance and smell to your beds. Cedar bark mulch is 5.2 acid and will enhance the soil form this acidity stand point. There is also one unproven advantage to cedar mulch. It seems to retard insects in the beds. You must remember Grandmother's cedar lined closets to keep out moths, some of this insect retarding qualities seems to have carried over to the cedar mulch.

Lets examine the rice hulls and the sugar cane together. These two mulches are quite popular along the coastal areas. The sugar cane may attract ants to your beds and the appearance is not as pleasing as other mulches. The rice hulls have a pleasing appearance but the water retention is not as good as the other mulches and there is a blowing problem with rice hulls.

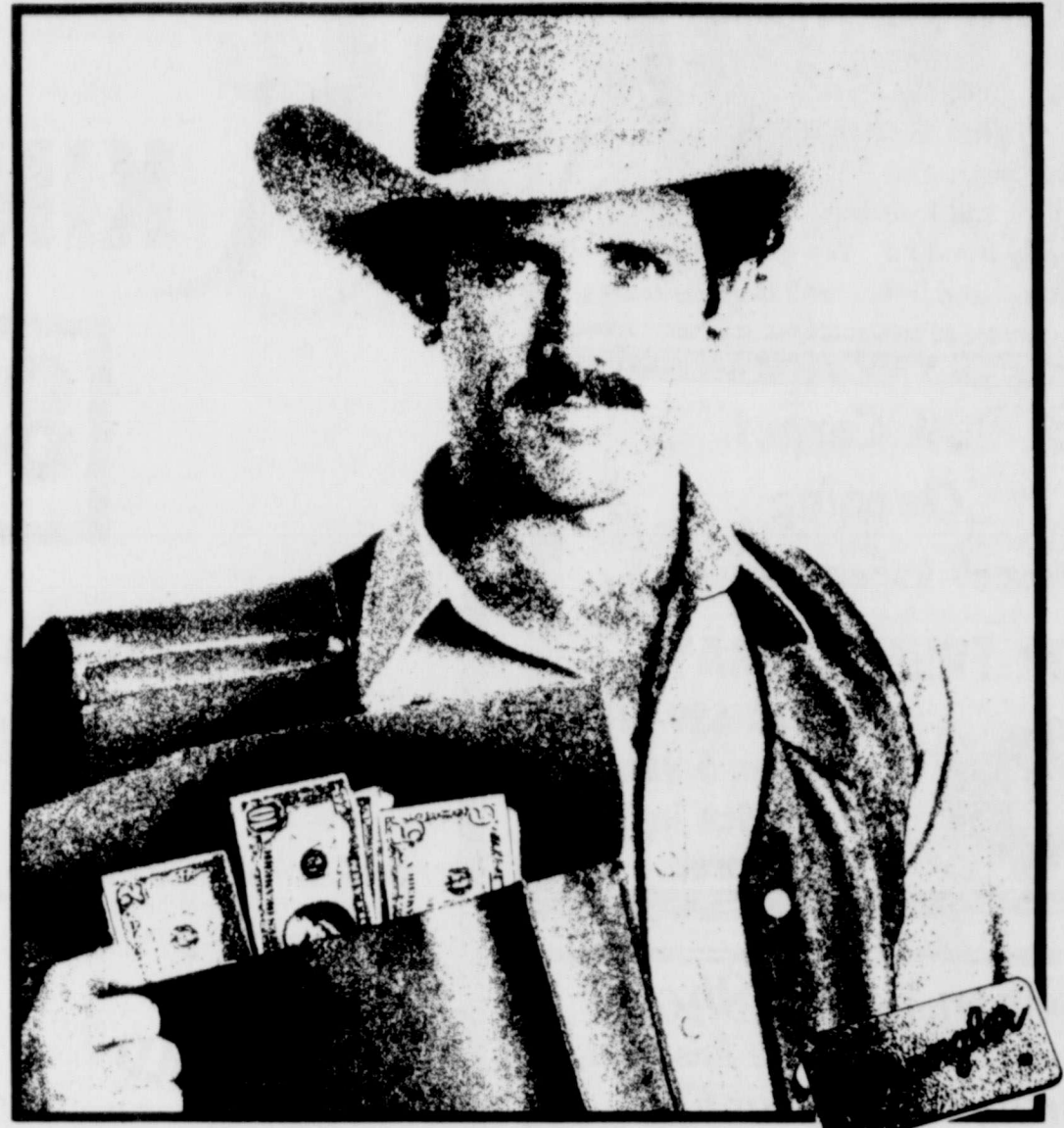
The red wood bark mulch is the most pleasing of all the mulches to the eye but it is the most expensive of all the mulches. Over all the red wood bark mulch is an excellent mulch.

Ground corn cobs make an excellent in expensive mulch but the appearance is not pleasing until the corn cobs have aged by the weather while in the bed.

Grass clippings and or leaves have one very serious problem. They need to be ground up to very small particles where they will decompose rapidly. This mulch will build up heat during decomposing and can create very serious problems.

War Against Fleas

Fleas have been a major problem in parts of Texas this year, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Cat fleas which infest dogs or cats and readily attack humans are the most common. Fleas control must include treatment of pets and thorough treatment of the entire premises—indoors and outdoors. Insecticides containing carbaryl (Sevin), dichlorvos (DDVP), pyrethrin, rotenone, malathion, methoxychlor or propoxur (Baygon or Sendar) are labeled for use on animals. Outside the home use chlorpyrifos (Dursban), diazinon, propoxur or carbaryl. Chlorpyrifos should also be used on floors and bedding areas.

Dr. Charles M. Barnes of Rising Star, recently retired space scientist from the Johnson Space Center in Houston, has been notified of his selection to be Chief United States Veterinarian for Central and South America with duty station at the American Embassy in Panama.

In this new assignment Dr. Barnes will be employed by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. A major objective of his work will be administration and management of United States cooperative programs in animal health within Latin America particularly emphasizing the control of exotic foreign diseases and preventing their entry

into the United States. Just one of these diseases, should it gain a foothold in this country, could literally decimate our livestock populations and for all practical purposes make ranching unprofitable.

Veterinary Services of the USDA has a proud record in the control and eradication of animal diseases within the United States. Particularly familiar to those in West Texas are sc eworms; which have been eliminated as well as hog cholera which, for over 140 years was of major agricultural concern costing farmers over \$50 million annually. Other programs currently underway in-

clude vigorous campaigns against Brucellosis our undulant fever, tuberculosis, and fever ticks. Foot and Mouth Disease, sometimes called the "billion dollar disease" threatened the United States due to a large epidemic within Mexico in the late '40's and early '50's. This outbreak was caused by animals brought in from South America. In the ensuing eradication campaign about 900,000 head of livestock had to be slaughtered and after eight years of effort and expenditure of \$136 million dollars the disease was eliminated from North America. Dr. Barnes worked for

3 years in the Mexican foot and mouth eradication program and has also been involved in the screwworm campaign. He says, "I am delighted to be able to return to work which has direct benefit to the American farmer and rancher. We must keep a strong vigilance to protect our livestock."

Dr. Barnes was "born and raised" in Rising Star and graduated from Rising Star High School in 1940. He received his doctorate in veterinary medicine from Texas A&M University of California in Comparative Pathology. He is retired from the U.S. Air Force in the

grade of Colonel and recently returned to Rising Star after 15 years at the space center.

Dr. Barnes is married to the former Anna Loyce Rose of Gladewater, Texas and they have four children, Mrs. Douglas Blankenship of Idabel, Oklahoma; Mrs. Daryl Pizanie, Webster, Texas; John Barnes, a veterinary student at Texas A&M; and James Barnes, recently discharged from the US Army, Ft. Carson, Colorado. Dr. Barnes' sister is Mrs. C.L. Parker of Rising Star.

Dr. and Mrs. Barnes have been establishing a ranching activity 5 miles NW of Rising Star and recently purchased a lot at the corner of Mayben and Ross streets on which they expect to construct a retirement home upon their return from Panama.

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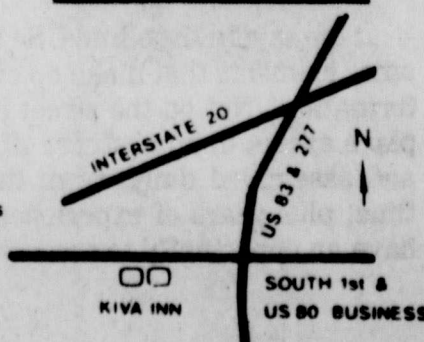
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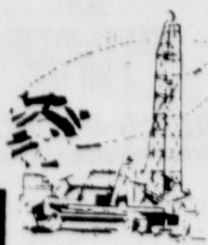

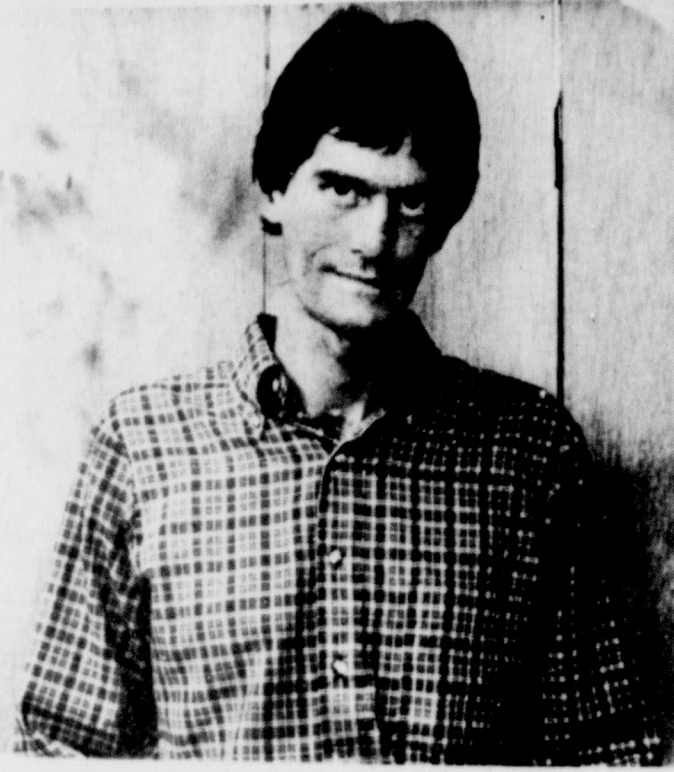

Tim Scarlett-

A Man Finding His Dreams

"Lost sweet dreams - the benzine ring
A dog can but bite.
Jimmy James Joyce, a yellow Rolls Royce
A writer can but write."

These are only part of the stanzas in a Tim Scarlett poem called "Quelques Mots Seulement" (Trans. "A Few Words Only") published in a May 1981 issue of "The Branding Iron" of Cisco Junior College.

"That poem's only a ditty, really," explains Scarlett, a slender, dark eyed young man with thinly veiled intensity. "It's written on several levels. Even a child can enjoy it, yet there are visual and spacial images the adult brain can relate to."

Scarlett has finished his courses at Cisco Junior College, and has moved to Wichita Falls to attend Midwestern University in the fall. After completing his work there, he plan to work toward a PHD Degree in Neuroscience, probably at the U. of Nebraska. His eventual goals are teaching, research, and continuation of his writing.

Although he began his College work with a Pre-Med major at El Centro Junior College, Dallas, Scarlett has veered away from medicine to literature - and the creating and thinking processes of the brain. This field is one which has not been fully explored, he says, but has tremendous potential.

Scarlett has lived in a number of places during his life, but Cisco is his family home. Some of his grandparents, Ed and Elizabeth Blackwell, established the first Pentecostal Church in the town. Tim's parents are Wm. D. Scarlett and Edwina Blackwell Scarlett. His father lives in Cisco, and his mother in Dallas.

The first time Tim Scarlett left Cisco was when he was six years old. By the time he was in the 8th grade he was enrolled at San Marcos Academy, in south Texas.

He became an Officer and a Platoon Leader, and won trophies on the fencing team.

Along with basic High School work, he studied Military Science.

He voices no regret for his taste of military life, but somewhere along the line he decided against a career in this field. He left the Academy and finished his High School work at Hillcrest H.S. in Dallas. In 1971 he entered El Centro College.

During the years between El Centro and C.J.C. Scarlett worked at various things, and began some serious writing. In 1979 he wrote a story for "C.Q. Magazine", an international publication. He also wrote a technical article for "73" magazine.

While at Cisco Junior College Scarlett wrote for the prize-winning "Branding Iron" (mostly poetry), and had some interesting prose published in The Cisco Press.

At present he is writing poetry for a New England magazine, and has finished a long prose piece called "The Heisenberg Gang". He refers to newspaper writing as "good discipline", and hopes to write for a Wichita Falls newspaper.

Obviously the writing of Tim Scarlett is not for a casual reader. It is introspective, and sometimes hits the brain obliquely - requiring effort from the reader. But it is formulated with a purpose, Scarlett explains.

"I am trying to develop a new type of literature, along the same type of "Finnegan's Wake". I want my work to have an arrangement of sounds which include subliminal images. This is a language the brain has affinity for. I hope to come up with some scientific theories after working with this creative process."

His own writing, Scarlett says, has been influenced by Lewis Carroll, who wrote for children, by James Joyce, and by William James.

"James had a good literary style, and straight scientific thinking," Scarlett remarks. "He brought his material to a level of art."

This meshing of art and the brain will no doubt continue to be a quest of Tim Scarlett. Like some other Eastland County young people, his horizons have widened. You can say that he is finding his dreams, instead of losing them.

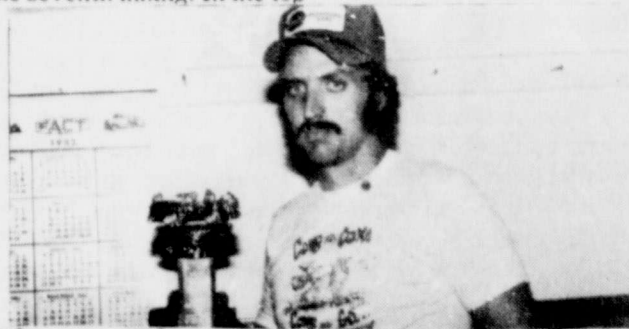

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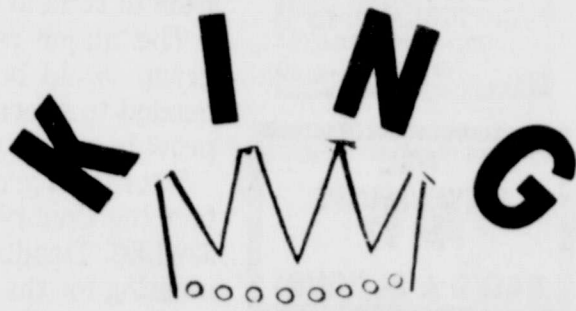

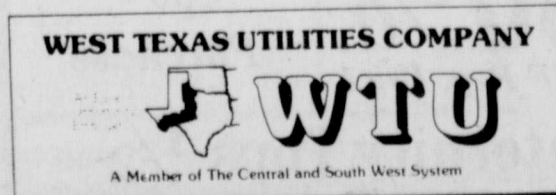
