





Alaskan Holiday Is Enjoyed

By Mary Crofts You can get all kinds of advice about what to take in the way of wearing apparel on a trip to Alaska, from "just a sweater will do" to "be sure to take a raincoat and galoshes and plenty of warm clothes and even thermal underwear." It's all true, according to what weather you happen to hit. If we'd gone a week earlier, we would have had rain constantly. But we lucked out and had perfect temperatures and clear views of the gorgeous mountains and seascapes, except for a light rain at Skagway, which didn't slow us down a

We flew from D/FW to Seattle, then a 3-hour wait to go on to Vancouver via Victoria, where we landed to go through customs (a mere formality). Next day we went on to Whitehorse, in the Yukon Territory, our most northern stop. Of course, this is in Canada, so to mail a postcard cost 35 cents, a cup of coffee was 75 cents, with a refill for 25 cents, and one bottle of beer \$2.60. But we didn't complain -- the scenery was worth it. Had a lovely sail down the mighty Yukon River, formerly so turbulent that it drowned a lot of gold-seekers, but now subdued by dams. In the evening we attended a lively show called, appropriately, 'The Frantic Follies" featuring in addition to the can can dancers, a vivid enactment of Robert Service's "Cremation of Sam McGee." We were incredulous, when we came out at 11:00 p.m., to see the sun still shining brightly. Travelling down from

Whitehorse to Skagway over the famous Gold Rush Trail (we chose the coach instead of the narrow-gauge railway, as it saved 4 hours and we'd been on narrowgauges in Colorado), our driver-guide kept us entertained with stories of the early days, and was very lenient about stopping whenever his passengers got the urge to point their cameras at a mountain reflected in a lake, or a "stamp mill," a relic from gold-mining days. He also burst into song on a couple of occasions, egged on by those who had been with him since Fairbanks.

Skagway is picturesquely situated on its harbor, surrounded by towering, snowcapped mountains. Its main streets have board walks, for practical purposes - they have lots of rain and mud. Since we were now "back in the States," we mailed several postcards here. There was another historical show, "The Old Days of 98" and the legend of Soapy Smith, but we had to pack and get ready to put our bags out by 6:00 a.m. to be transferred to the ferryboat, M.V. Fairweather, for our voyage down the Lynn Canal to Juneau, so we retired betimes, as did most of our fellow travellers.

The M.V. Fairweather was a fine boat and our half-day cruise didn't seem that long. Besides the beautiful mountain ranges and wooded islands, we were instructed to watch out for spouting whales and seals sunning on the rocks. When the cry came, "Whale spouting at 11:00 o'clock!" (meaning the position of the animal-not

the time of day!) there was such a rush to the portside of the boat it's a wonder it didn't capsize. But it was too

sturdy for that. When we landed at Valley Cove, 13 miles out of Juneau the captain pointed out a bald eagle's next up in the 2nd hemlock tree to the right as you go up the long ramp to where our buses were waiting. He said the weight of the nests averaged about a ton apiece.

On the way to our Baranof Hotel in Juneau, we paused for a memorable closeup of the vast and beautifully blue Mendenhall Glacier. They told how far it had receded in the last ten years, and added when your grandchildren come to view this glacier, it may have receded another 10 miles." (Of course, they didn't know our grandchildren might be there next

We had an even more spectacular view of the Mendenhall, as well as all of the capital city of Juneau and environs, when we took a bus tour and went across the Gastineau Channel to Douglas Island. Here, too, we were lucky enough to catch a bald eagle that was willing to pose for 15 minutes on the top of a tree - a perfect target for cameras. An added pleasure in our visit to Juneau was having a conversation with Carla Whitley, daughter of the Carl Hargroves of Cisco, who moved there this past February

Next day we boarded our cruise ship, the Cunard Princess, and thankfully hung up our clothes, secure in the knowledge that we wouldn't be routed out at 5:30 a.m. to get our bags out by 6:00. That part had been a chore, but I still wouldn't trade the scenery we saw inland for the comforts of a cruise both ways.

At midnite, after a full day

of sightseeing, we set sail for Glacier Bay. It's quite a distance, however, (100 miles) and we didn't see our first full-size glacier until mid-morning. Contrary to our pre-conceived ideas, not all glaciers are lily white. Some have brown streaks from debris collected as they grind their way slowly to the sea. There are 16 active glaciers in this bay, and they brought us up close to some of the major ones for picturetaking and to see and hear the glaciers "calving"-that is, dropping off chunks of ice with a loud crack. There were many of these small icebergs, or "flores," in the bay, and seals were fond of parking on them. At the turnaround point was Margerie Glacier, the most spectacular of all, next to it was Grand Pacific, half of which was brown from the erosion, coming back, we proceed up John Hopkins Inlet farther than any other ship had done this season. Another very photogenic glacier was the Lamplugh, which is called a "terminal glacier." The Fairweather mountain range, down whose fiords the glaciers flow, are as impressive as the glaciers themselves. Actually, the fiords are created by the

After this awesome sight the rest of the vovage would have been anticlimactic if it hadn't been for the variety of events and entertainment on board the ship. We did put in at Sitka, the original capital of Alaska, and got a Kaste of the history of the place by visiting the Sitka National State Park, where the biggest collection of totem poles we had seen was located, and we enjoyed the Russian dancers performance. These were 12 local girls, 6 posing as men, and going through all the fantastic gymnastics that male Russian dancers do. It was the Fourth of July. and they had a brave little parade and a brave little carnival, but nothing to compare with what you undoubtedly had in Cisco!

The Inside Passage turned out to be mildly scenic, compared to what we had already experienced, so we could concentrate on shipboard events, including the Captain's formal ball, the bingo and horseracing and dance (or listening) bands on three decks. Plus sunbathing, when the sun was out. But the swim suits we packed proved to be just so much ballast, along with all that cold weather gear.

Of course the food was fabulous, but I had one disappointment all thru Alaska I was never offered Alaskan King Crab Legs. I had to come back to the Red Lobster in Fort Worth to get

One of the nicest things that happened to us on the cruise was that some of our friends told the matire'd that we had an anniversary, so he sent a special cake with one candle and all the waiters gathered around and sang 'Happy Anniversary to You" (or at least, made a

stab at it!) P.S. Our tour required us to spend an extra day in Vancouver, going and coming, but luckily for us, we had friends there whom we had met on a Caribbean cruise, and who entertained us royalty.



Permanent change and, it is hoped, improvement in a beef cattle herd is realized through the selection of breeding replacement, both bulls and cows. However, replacement sires exert most of the genetic influence in the herd since each bull leaves so many more offspring than even the most pro-

Five factors are of paramount importance in selecting future herd sires.

These are discussed as follows:

1. Growing Ability-this trait is best evaluated through standarized performance tests. Common measures of growth are weaning weight, postweaning gain, and yearling weight. Desirable prospects should be above average in all of these factors. Attempts to visually evaluate growing ability are

usually unsuccessful. 2. Body Composition-desirable gain in young bulls consists of a minimum amount of fat. Bulls which tend to fatten too soon are early maturing. Consequently, such individuals generally sire calves which quit growing at relatively light weights.

3. Skeletal Size-fast growing, muscular bulls generally are above average in skeletal size. In the absence of gain-test information, relative skeletal size may provide some indication of growing ability.

4. Structural Soundnessregardless of other desirable characteristics, a bull must be structurally sound. Bulls should be able to travel freely and easily. Common defects are crooked legs, bad feet, and coarse, weak shoulders.

5. Sex Character-the best indication of sex character is a satisfactory semen evaluation. Such a test should be obtained, if at all possible. Otherwise, visual evaluation should reveal a burly, masculine bull with a welldeveloped set of testicles.

In conclusion, comparisons among individuals should be limited to those which are about the same age. Also, bulls should have been developed under the same conditions. Bulls which measure up in all the factors that have been discussed, will cost somewhat more than poorer individuals. However, such outstanding sires will more than repay their extra initial costs in the form of faster growing calves for sale and higherproducing replacement





There are several wonderful books about early oil and the men who dedicated their lives to it in the Southwest.

"Early Texas Oil to 1936" and "Oil in West Texas and New Mexico" are both by Walter Rundell, Jr. recently published by Texas A&M

In my memory train from living in Cisco from age 4 to 40 are some wonderful early oil seekers like L.A. Warren, Harry Reynolds, Ernest Sneed, J.C. Anderson, Tom O'Brien, Charles Mount, Robert E. Lee, Richard Bearman, L.M. Flourney, Silas Hill, Charles Kleiner, G.P. Mitchern, Sr., Robert Kamon, Sr., Edger Davis and others.

I could tell you interesting stories about any of thesebut just a couple here. Charlie Mount was a giant redfaced, good-hearted, struggling man from the first oil fields of West Virginia. God bless him-he tried so hard-my heart goes out to him even yet. He was at the Beaumont big 1903 discovery where his Yount-Lee friends all got rich. But not he-the local WAGS called him "Dry-Hole Charlie." He even drilled in India where the well cratered and swallowed up the entire rig. That was back in the cable tool days. Now India, according to "Oil and Gas Journal" this month, is a tremen-

dous developing oil area. SHK-SPR said, "There is a Tide in the affairs of manwhen taken at the ebb-Leads on to Fortune--or missed. Leaves one stranded on the sands of desolation."

I have missed some and hit some. The biggest miss came when my close friend Ernest Sneed was drilling out near Snyder about 1950 for Lone Star Gas. He called me, saying "come quick." I went that cold night taking good friend L.A. Warren and my father-in-law, John Russell. Ernest said, "I have a hell of a discovery hereand look at those humble 'dry-hole' logs-they are four miles away and exactly the same. Everything between here and there is oil. Just get out there and buy some minerals or leases. L.A. and J.W. evidently didn't believe it-though I did. But I didn't have any money-yet, it is my fault, because I could have begged-borrowed or made some real effort to get the money. That area turned out to be one of the giants ever discovered in this U.S. of A.

I had another "ebb tide" opportunity in 1971 when my friend, a seismographic company owner, said "Look at this Anadarko Basin area--there is a 2000 foot closure here. Go buy royalty-do not buy minerals or you will ruin my reputation with the big companies," I put 5% of my bank stock in this. The pressure was so great that three wells collapsed the casing at 20,000 feet. The ten year 600 acres of royalty all ran out last year. But we, fortunately, had gone 10 miles further north where we bought 160 acres of minerals. Leases there now bring \$4000 per acre, and ten producing acres will play \$3600 per month-so we didn't get stranded on that old SHK-SPR sand-bar.

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If you were held-up and you didn't have any money, you could get shot. Edger got to be worth millions-he never lost his sense of humor even though he took a lot of kidding, because he never learned to read and write.


He did all his deals on the phone. I went with him about 1952 to see all the big money people on Wall Street-but he couldn't, for the above reason, get any cooperation. When we walked into the lobby of the Commodore Hotelthe bell-boys were virtually freaked out. Edger was a 360 pound giant in his big leather jacket, cowboy boots and old ten gallon hat. At the dinner table, he had the menu upside down. He asked, Young Miss-what kind of fish do we have today?" She said--and he replied, 'That's just what I need." They used to tease him, and he always took it good

naturedly. His wife, a school teacher, would say "Now Edger, if you don't do this-I won't read you the funny papers." There never was a better man of ability and honesty in the oil-patch than Edger Davis. Another wonderful guy,

and smart as they come, was Charlie Kleiner who, incidentally, got the city's impossible debt cut from 4 million to about 11/2 million dollars. I asked Charlie, 'How in the heck are you so successful in finding shallow oil." He said, "I just start walking across the land-if I don't get the feel, I just keep walking. When I get the feel-I drill." And brother he hit real regularly! When they asked Charlie to run for mayor-he said, "I ain't got the fixidity and the fiddity for that." But he was outstanding in that and anything else that he put his:

mind to. Lordy--I love to think about all these wonderful people I knew out there.

The federal funding would also provide for renovation of a gym in Brownwood and the purchase of vehicles to transport clients to and from the gym from the surrounding countiey. The gym would be available 7 days a







Historical Marker Will Be **Dedicated At Hargus Farm**

A Texas Historical Market for the Hargus farm, is called E. of Eastland, will be dedicated on Saturday, July 31, 2:00 p.m. This will be the first time in Eastland County that a Family Land Heritage Award farm has had a Marker erected.

The Family Land Heritage Award recognizes Texas families who have maintained continuous agricultural production on the same land for 100 years or more.

Mrs. Pebble Hargus Boles. the present owner, and her son, Winston Boles, will host the event. The public is in-

Larry Hargus, the original farm owner, and his wife Mary (Corder) came to Eastland County in 1879. In 1881 they bought the original tract of their farm at the site from C.U. Connellee, a founder of Eastland.

The Hargus family were also active in the developemt of a local Methodist Church. The family farm was later

inherited by Larry Hargus' sen Barry, who lived there the 120 Access Rd 2 mi. with his wife Mackie (Gilbert) and eight children. Three of these children are still living: Pebble Hargus Boles of Eastland, Valera Hargus of Belton, and Gilbert Hargus of Tyler.

> Pebble Hargus Boles married Claude Boles of Eastland, who operated the farm for a number of years. Eventually the Boles purchased all the property from the other heirs. After the death of Claude Boles, in 1965, the Boles son Winston began active management of the land.

Judge Scott Bailey of Eastland, Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Commission, will speak during the program and make the Dedication of the Historic Marker. Descendants of the Hargus family will also participate on the program.

A large group of family, friends, and Civic leaders are expected to attend.



According to Bill Umphress of the Langston firm, ditches were dug and four inch drain pipes were laid at various locations on the site to drain the underground stream into the highway drainage ditch, then the spring was filled with rock, as a layer of rock up to six feet thick at points was leveled over the site.

A layer of lime was plowed into a layer of earth over the rock layer so that with the addition of water a type of cement is formed sealing off the underground water from the surface. A crushed rock base and finally pavement goes over the seal.

As applying the lime created some dust along the highway, the company had planned to apply it at about 3 a.m. but breakdowns delayed it to heavier traffic hours.

Meanwhile Brothers Constructon Co. has been setting forms and digging ditches for the concrete beams and floor of the new building. Company employees were hoping to pour the concrete by next

As construction progresses, the spring takes its new course flowing from the pipes into the drainage ditch with the original full four inch pipe flow diminished but still healthy.
