



Bobby and Mary Jane Little, after more than 20 years in Tyler, have moved back home to Eastland County. but as they and 11 yr. old daughter La Dawn look across the bare living room of their house in Olden, they realize that things are quite different from what they had expected.

For who would ever expect to have a 24 ft. covered U Haul truck full of your furniture and household goods stolen before you even left the town you were moving

three days later near the town of Zapata (between Laredo and Rio Grande City), empty except for a filing cabinet and some papers?

It is a shocking loss estimated by the Tyler newspapers as around \$50,000. It probably runs more than that, for the load included such things as a spinet piano, furniture for three bedrooms, a living room, a den, an L shaped couch, desks, a refrigerator. two deep freezes loaded with food, a washing machine and

dryer, and irreplacable things such as family pictures, original paintings, a coin collection, jewelry and

A number of business papers were packed in the truck. Possibly some of these will be recovered with the "papers" located by the Sheriff of Zapata.

We had several Bibles in the truck they took," Bobby Little says.

"How we hope they will see something in our possessions that will change their lives!" Mary Jane adds.

The move from Tyler had been planned for some time. Mary Jane Little had accepted the position of first grade teacher in the Ranger Schools, beginning fall of '82. Both had grown up in this area - Mary Jane as the daughter of the late R.V. Rendall of Cisco, Bobby as the son of the late John Little of Flatwood community.

Bobby finished High School at Carbon and went on to Cisco Junior College. After that he attended East Texas University in Commerce, where he received a Masters degree in Agricultural Education. He received an additional certificate as an Educational Administrator.

Mary Jane Little attended Cisco Schools, Cisco Junior College, and McMurry at Abilene. She received her Masters Degree (Library Science) at East Texas University at Commerce.

The Littles taught and did Administrative work in the Tyler Schools for about 22 years. They were also very active in the Baptist Church.

Their older daughter, Lara

Arlene (Barfield) and husband Terry Barfield live on Lake Tyler. But other relatives are here in Eastland County - Mary Jane's Mother, Annie Rendall of Cisco, and her Aunt, Lela Latch Lloyd, in Cisco. Bobby's mother, Mamie Little, lives in the Staff community. Two of his brothers, Jimmie Little and Charles Little, live with their families near Lake Leon.

The move to Eastland County began routinely enough. The Littles located the well-kept A.O. Thompson home in Olden, which they "fell in love with" at first sight. After purchasing the property they started moving small household things in a pickup on trips out. Fortunately these items included outside equipment. During the last packing in Tyler Charles and Carolyn Little

and Judy and Randy Hall (Mary Jane's sister and brother-in-law of Cleburne) loaded smaller things in their vehicles. In that way the good china, silverwear, some clothing, books, and a few keepsakes were saved.

On Friday, July 23 Mary Jane and Bobby cleared the last furniture from their Tyler home and shut the doors on the large U Haul. Among the carefully packed objects was a brass bowl full of silk flowers - a gift which the members of their Baptist Church had purchased with a "love offering"

The Littles were tired, and would not have possession of their Olden home until next day at noon. So they pulled into a Motel 6 to rest until early the next morning.

Bobby locked the truck carefully, noting that it was parked in a well-lighted area near a restaurant, and that the Motel had a security guard. They had several kinds of insurance which they assumed covered their household goods - insurance on the house in Tyler, the one in Olden, and a Travel Insurance which they thought covered the furniture in transit.

Sometime in the night, before 5:00 a.m., someone entered the truck, managed to start it without a key, and drive it away. The Security Guard reported that he had checked it at 3:15 a.m., when he went off duty.

When the theft was discovered, the scene became almost unreal. There was a wait at the police station, among people in various kinds of trouble. Afterward the Littles waited in Tyler, while friends from the Baptist Church tried to

And then came a shock when the Insurance companies began to point out various small-print "clauses" in their coverage which would not take care of this type of theft. Furniture in the houses - yes, in a

wreck, yes - but not this. The Tyler Police initiated a statewide search. On Tuesday, July 27 the U Haul truck was discovered near Zapata, with word from that County Sheriff that the furniture had probably gone into Mexico. He would call back, if anything was found.

So the Littles came on to Olden, where they moved in and began collecting enough furniture and goods for essentials.

You learn real quick what is the most important," chuckles Bobby.

And they keep hoping the next phone call will have

some good news, like maybe something found. Some of the cherished family picture, or other things.

"But we realize we have a lot to be thankful for," Mary Jane smiles. "What if Bobby had noticed someone breaking into the truck, and had tried to stop them? He might have been terribly injured. At least our family is all

"I would have probably made a run at them out the door." Bobby shakes his head. "But it's not the material things that count so

much. It's just surprising how quick something like this can happen to you, and how little can be done.

"I think people should be warned to be more careful about theft, especailly when moving or traveling. And they should check insurance policies, to see if they really cover anything. I may get \$500.00 from this loss, with a \$100.00 deductable!





Better known as Scotty's Castle, this Alhambra of the West attracts hundreds of tourists each winter. A restless, insecure Westerner. Walter Scott (Death Valley Scotty), and a Chicago millionaire, Albert Johnson, combined Scott's imagination and Johnson's money to build a magnificent palace in the 1920s for their idea came from the Spanish Alhambra.

Unplanned, it came into being room by room on a 3,000-foot elevation at the north end of Grapevine Canyon, Death Valley, Inyo County, Calif. A room was finished before furnishings were ordered or made.

Scotty traveled five years with Buffalo Bill's

Wild West Show, and covered the United States and Europe. In his wanderings, he discovered the famous Alhambra at Granada, Spain. Obsessed with its architecture, history and location, he convinced Johnson they should leave a memorial in this land of natural wonders.

Built 500 years apart in time, there is likeness in the architecture of the two palatial homes; both sit high above surrounding countrysides, and both were built for homes, magnificent enough to bolster feelings of insecurity, an overpowering desire to gain recognition.

The original Alhambra was a fortress built over a period of 100 years by a succession of rulers from A.D. 1300 to 1400 — the last stand of the Moors against the Christians in Europe.







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become complacent about peanut leafspot and its control. In recent years control of leafspot, especially dryland peanuts, has not been extensive due to dry

Peanut leafspot is one of the major limiting factors in peanut production. Leaves manufacture all food that is stored in the nuts, thus premature defoliation from leafspot infection reduces yield and grade.

Requirements for peanut leafspot development include presence of the fungus, a susceptible host and favorable weather conditions. Fungi causing the disease are present in all peanut growing areas. The fungus and susceptible host are present. Therefore, the limiting factor to disease development is favorable weather conditions.

Prolonged high relative humidity is conducive to disease infection. Early season excessive rainfall has provided an abundance of

soil moisture which has resulted in higeher than normal relative humidities. especially in the plant

Low levels of infection are occuring in local fields. These low level infections serve to increase inoculum potential. The inoculum potential is the number of spores available to initiate

The infection process occurs in 4 to 12 hours when the relative humidity is 95% or more at the leaf surface. Infection is most rapid when himidity and temperatures are high.

Because of leafspot is not visible to the unaided eye until 10 to 12 days after the infection occurs, infection must be anticipated. In dryland peanuts Florrunners or Spanish), begin fungicide applications at the first evidence of leafspot or when rains or dews favor disease development. In irrigated runner peanuts, fungicide applications should be 60-65 days after planting (35 to 40 for Spanish)

Protecting Landscape Trees

By John Blair Extension Agent

Often building sites for new homes are chosen because of the presence of mature trees. However, any change in the grade or top soil around existing trees can have a marked effect on their survival and future

One problem encountered is when the grade or level of the soil around trees is lower. This exposes the existing roots to the air and reduces the supply of nutrients and moisture. Your also damaging the most important part of the root system, the outer edge. This is where the root hairs are and most of the nutrients and moisture intake hap-

Another problem is when you add soil or raise the grade level. When fill of any type is placed over the exsting root system, it causes a reduction in the oxygen supply to the tree roots and slows down the rate of gas exchange between the roots and the air in the soil pore

Root pruning will cause drought symptoms to occur. Fills made while installing curbs or other masonary structures may cause root pruning. The construction of driveways, patios and other masonary or asphalt structures near or around trees will again interfere with the exchange of gases around root systems and result in root pruning.

If you plan on building a new home or add on to the one you have now, it would be good to remember these problems that may occur. If you have any questions, contact the County Extension Office, (629-1093).

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

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



Most folks can tolerate the heat but some, whose bodies cannot adjust, are subject to heat exhaustion and heat strokes. This may happen to young or old and is not a respector of persons.

Heat stroke is more severe than heat exhaustion because our body temperature zooms up because the body is unable to cool itself.

You may recognize a heat stroke by feeling of being too warm. The skin will be hot, dry and flushed. Weakness, nausea, dizziness and rapid pulse are other symptoms.

In extreme cases the body temperature goes to 105 degrees, or higher, and the victim loses consciousness, experiences brain damage or even die. How can you help victims of heat strokes or heat exhaustion? 1. Remove from the sun or ble. 2. Apply cold compresses or give a cool bath. 3. Make attempts, with a fan or cooler, to lower the
