

GROWING BEAUTIFUL AFRICAN VIOLETS By Ted Brice

Hybridista have created thousands of cultivars from the original few African violet species. They are free flowering and much easier to grow than their ancestors. The foliage can vary from somewhat velvety smooth or plain smooth, scalloped or wavy, lance or heart-shaped, green or variegated. The flowers range from single, to double or semi-double in shapes of pink, blue, lavender, purple or white. The soil must be sterilized or a commercially mixed package of potting soil specifically for African Violets must be used. They need bright light in the spring and summer and some sun in the fall and the winter They must be set so that the crown is slightly above the soil line. Remember African Violets always need good air circulation. The soil needs to be watered moderately in order to keep it slightly moist but never wet. You should always use tepid water to water either the soil or the leaves. Bottom watering is ofter advised to insure even moisture at the roots but you can water from the top as well.



You can alterate watering from the bottom and the top, this would insure even moisture at the roots. Never leave the leaves wet for any length of time. Remember to arrange for proper drainage when potting and don't let your plants stand in water. African Violets need humidity of forty to sixty percent which is very essential and can be promoted by setting the plants on pebble filled trys. Dry air will cause the leaves to curl and the buds to drop. There are two ways to propagate and that is by seed and leaf cuttings. Remember humidity, moist soil (not wet), sterilized soil

THE and the amount of light are major factors in growing African Violets. Some of the Alakazam, Big Boy Blue, Lady Wilson and Purple Knight; Some of the White cultivars are, White Girl, White Doll, and White Perfection; Some of the Pink cultivars are, Bloom Burst, Flash, Happy Time and Pink Rock; Some of the Red cultivars are, Red Honey, Honeyette and Chochise. This month and next month will be the time of year for the African Violet Shows and you can learn more about growing African Violets by visiting one of these shows. In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth? The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much; others, not enough.

I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we


pay and treat our teachers. believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good. conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics. relieve our teacher of burdensome pape placed upon them cognize and reward or teachers with better pa, for the sake of our children, and our future.

The Berlin Wall **After 21 Years**

On the hot summer night

West Berlin with cement block and barbed wire. Through this action East Germany slammed shut the last escape route out of a drab police state, a police state which to this day is bolstered by 19 Soviet divi-

As President John Kennedy noted, the Berlin Wall was an admission of failure. By 1961 the stream of refugees from East Germany had reached unprecedented levels. Between 1945 and 1960 some 3,300,000 East Germans - one fifth of the population of the Soviet zone - had fled to the West. A majority of these refugees were young people and a sizeable number consists of professionals, technicians, engineers, teachers and docors who had become disillusioned with what their leaders had called a worker's paradise." In the first half of 1961 over 150,000 had "voted with their feet" against the East German regime. During July alone more than 30,000 had fled. In the words of Secretary of state Dean Rusk: "East Germany was hemorrhaging to death. The Berlin Wall relfects

the regime's need to quarantine itself from the infection" of Western ideas. The regime has consistently demonstrated its refusal to adhere to the third basket" of the Helsinki Accords, which aims to widen East-West contacts and to facilitate the flow of information. Laws passed in the summer of 1979 prohibit East German writers from publishing in the West without the regime's permission and make unofficial contact with Western journalists a criminal offense. In the fall of 1980 East Germany raised the required exchange rate for visiting the country. Upper and middle level party members are forbidden to maintain contacts with Westerners. The regime's continuous desire to isolate itself shows that its sole interest in the Helsinki Accords is the recognition of post World War II boundaries, not the freer exchange of ideas.

The Wall thus serves as a reminder of what communism stands for in practice: first, the denial of individual freedoms and equality before the law, which are the cornerstones of Western democracy; second, the concentration of power in the hands of a party elite that disdains criticism and opposition of any kind; third, an ideology that totaly subordinates the individual to the state.

The popular song-writer, Wolf Biermann, was expelled from East Germany in 19.7 for "slandering the East German state" although he The scientist, Robert Havemann, was arrested in 1978 for criticizing the East German leaderhsip. The economist and industrial manager, Rudolf Bahro, was expelled in 1979 for the 'crime" of publishing his suggestions for improving East German economic efficienchy in the West. In open

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violation of the Helsinki Accords, the East German leadership continues to pursue a determined witch-hunt against writers.

The Wall has had farreaching effects upon the political situation in divided Germany. It extinguished the last spark of hope for German reunification while strengthening in certain ways the East German regime. East Germans, realizing the total absence of an alternative, tacitly support the regime and work for their own material prosperity. Political stability has brought tremendous economic advancement, and East Germans have become conscious of the fact that theirs is the richest of the

The Berlin Wall stabilized the East German regime, strengthened the country economically, and therefore brought it international recognition. Prior to 1961 the very survival of East Germany, drained of its strength by the constant flow of refugees, was doubtful. Its economic and political stability enabled the country to become a member of the United Nations and to establish full diplomatic relations with most coun-

Vieiwing the Wall, how can one respect a regime that is anathema to all Western democratic values? What kind of regime is it which needs to wall in its citizens in order to maintain economic and political stability? Those who are relieved to hear Soviet professions of peace despite Czechoslovakia, despite Poland, despite Afghanistan - need only to gaze at the Berlin Wall for a silent but pentrating reminder of the harsh reality of communism. This is a 21st anniversary which should not go unnoticed.

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
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Maude Bailey With Stories To Share

Summer is family reunion time in Eastland County, and among the June and July reunions were those of the Arnold and Bailey families. The main attraction at both of these was 92 yr. old Mrs. Maude Bailey of Cisco, a daughter of the late E.J. Arnold, and wife of the late M.D. Bailey.

Only one of Mrs. Bailey's seven children - Judge Scott Bailey - lives in Cisco now. The others are scattered across the southwest and as far away as Oregon. All have made remarkable contributions in various professions in the Air Force, in education, and in government Community Development work. There are also 21 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

The grandchildren are a bonus - they add life to all the gatherings. When the grandchildren cluster around Maude Bailey, they are always interested in her stories and the poems she recites.

"Tell us about when you were a little girl! And how did you meet Grandfather? And why were you always so interested in your children getting an education?"

Mrs. Bailey has lived through a number of these "stories", leaving a kaleidoscope of memories. But her sweet smile and the sparkle in her gray-blue eyes show that happy times have far outweighed the sad ones.

Maude Bailey's first "story" concerns the Cisco tornado, which hit the town April 28, 1893. Although she was only three years old at the time, she has a vivid recollection of the event.

Maude was living with her family about 12 miles S. of Cisco, in the Long Branch Community, on the banks of the Sabanno river. Her father had a 321 acre stockfarm, and most of his crops were planted for the

year. The family had a good frame home, but their storm cellar hd not been finished. The men of the community were working together to build each family a cellar, and had not quite completed the Arnolds.

A nearby neighbor, George Branton, had invited the Arnolds to use their cellar if necessary. "Now Jim, if it comes a storm, you bring your family on down. There'll be plenty of room."

By April 28 E.J. Arnold was very worried about the weather. He had a special interest in weather signs, and an almost uncanny ability to forecast. He had been telling Maude's mother, Melinda Arnold, that there was going to be a storm.

"The moon and stars are in the right position. And you notice how the wind has been making quick changes to different directions for several days. Blowing from first one, then another."

That afternoon intensely balck clouds gathered in the northwest. After sundown lightening flashed continously. The parents collected

their children, rolled the baby in a quilt, and headed for Mr. Branton's cellar.

As they were walking along, about 9:00 p.m., a loud roaring came from the cloud. This was accompanied by a strange sound which Maude Bailey describes as "a rattling clatter - like tin pans hitting a wire fence.'

It was the sound of a town being destroyed.

"Cisco is being blown away right now," her father

The next morning Arnold found out how correct his statement was! The mailman brought tragic news from Cisco. A direct hit by a tornado - 23 people killed - about 93 injured.

E.J. Arnold drove his empty wagon into town to help. He stayed overnight, working among demolished buildings. Maude Bailey remembers that when he came home and told of the sad experiences, her kindhearted mother wept.

Other times were happier ones for the Arnold family. They visited friends and neighbors, attended the local Church of Christ (where E.J. Arnold was Elder) and most the school events.

At Hallmark - a new school in the community - there was a Literary Society which presented a program each month. A teacher named Ola Ezell was in charge of these exciting events. Maude was very impressed by this teacher and the programs.

One evening, when she was only seven, Maude Arnold began the program by giving a "Welcoming Address" to the community. She stepped before a large crowd and said:

"I have been called on to give the 'Welcome Address' tonight, but I am so small I think they have imposed on me. But when I have a task to perform, I try to do my

The audience was delighted with the small, blonde girl with the clear voice.

These events were so interesting to the children that they often played at "giving programs". This led to a mishap for Maude - but it also brought her the most beautiufl dress of her girlhood.

One day the Arnolds were visiting the Noland family, who lived between Pioneer and Cross Plains. A group of girls were "giving a program", using a big stump for a stage. Maude gave her speech, then jumped off the stump like a "tomboy" rather than the little lady she was supposed to be. A piece of limb caught her long dress, and ripped it right off

Mrs. Noland came to the rescue. She took Maude in the house, found a dress which fit, and gave it to her.

"I thought it was the most beautiful dres I had ever seen." Mrs. Bailey says. "It was thin white material, with white stripes in it which looked like lace. There were ruffles on the long skirt, and a pretty belt. I felt so dressed up - I kept it and wore it for ages!"

Families attending the Church of Christ often carried their noon meal, and ate together after the service. Maude's mother had a little "trunk" which was always packed with the best food the family could afford. You can be sure the children were curious about what was in it!

In the summer there would be fried or baked chicken, fresh vegetables, and good homemade cakes and pies. Church was scheduled at 11:00 a.m., which allowed the families time to reach there by wagon or horseback.

Sometimes preaching. singing, and Bible discussions would resume after the noon meal, and last most of the afternoon.

"The fellowship - the joy of being there with my family is something I have never forgotten," says Maude Bailey.

Her family was soon broken by death. When she was 10 her father died, leaving her mother with seven daughters (two older ones had married) and a four yr.

For several years the family stayed on the home place, with the girls trying to do the work of men. Then Melinda Arnold made a farreaching decision. She realized that education was very important for her girls, and that they should be more nearer a High School. So they rented out the land and moved to Rising Star, where she bought a home.

This decision in favor of higher education was a turning point in Maude's life, and it continued to bring good things. After High School she attended Hankins Normal College in Gorman. Within a year she was able to pass a State teacher's Examination and obtain her certificate.

This began her career in teaching in pioneer schools in Hamilton and Eastland Counties. It would have been difficult to find a more dedicated teacher than Maude Arnold, or one who tried as hard to instill a sense of values into her pupils.

In 1916 Maude Arnold was Principal of a two-teacher school (Cook) west of Cisco. An attractive young man from Kentucky was visiting relatives - the Gardeners - in the area. He enrolled in a Teacher's Training Class

Maude Arnold was coaching. Maude was impressed with M.D. Bailey, but conversations between them were impersonal. She scarcely hoped to see him again after school closed.

She went ahead with plans to enter N. Texas State at Denton in September, where she planned to major in Home Economcis. At the beginning of the term she rode the train over to Denton to enroll. A group of welcoming students were waiting at the station to give official greetings. Imagine her surprise to see M.D. Bailey right in the middle of the

The "welcome" included a party that night, and M.D. Bailey continued to be attentive. He escorted Maude Arnold back to her dormitroy

after the party was over. This began a courtship which lasted during the whole school year. The young people attended lectures, ball bames - and the 1916 Dallas Fair. By spring they had decided that marriage to each other was the most important thing in the

world to them. On May 30, 1917, M.D. Bailey and Maude Arnold were married at the Texas Hotel, in downtown Ft. Worth. The groom wore a neat dark suit - the bride a lovely crepe de cheen white dress. The ceremony was performed by A.O. Collie, a Church of Christ minister. Shortly afterward the Baileys left from the Depot on the Sunshine Special, with a destination of Morgan-

town, Ky. As the train pulled out of the station, Maude Bailey felt that life was working out beautifully. Her mother had encouraged her to get an education - and this had placed her in a position to meet someone she could be happy with. But it was sad, in a way, to leave her home area. Of course she could not foresee the future - how she and M.D. Bailey would someday return to Cisco to make their home.

Nor could she realize they would have a family of seven children, who would reap the benefits of her education and training.

And of course she could hardly visualize that she would be active more than sixty years later, involved in Community work. Queen of the Senior Citizens group in 1980 - other honors bestowed upon her. And then, in 1982, children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren thronging home to see her again interested in hearing the stories which bound them all together.

But that's one of the great things about living a long time - you get to see some of the results of your work!

All-Risk Wheat Insurance Offers

New Benefits

Eastland County wheat farmers can participate in a new All-Risk insurance program that includes yield guarantees based on their individual production records. The program, known as Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) was announced by Ardell M. Kalmbach District Director of All-Risk Crop Insurance.

Kalmbach explains that the plan will provide higher levles of insurance protection for wheat producers who can verify higher than average yields for at least the most recent three years. In the past, insurance guarnatees have been based on the average yield in the area where the crop was produced. Farmers interested in participating should contact the local ASCS Office in Eastland or for information concerning yield verification

procedures. All-Risk Crop Insurance, which has been expanded to replace the Disaster Payments program abolished by Congress a year ago, is designed to provide reasonaly priced protection against the loss of money invested in crop production. A subsidy by the federal government reduces the cost of carrying insurance by as much as 30 percent, according to Kalmbach. The policies are available through private insurance agents.

The deadline to apply for insurance on 1983 crop winter wheat in Easltand County is September 15th. Growers wishing to participate in the Individual Yield Coverage program, however, are urged to contact their ASCS office as far in advance of this date as possible to allow time for yield verification.



What Makes Dentristry So Expensive?

I think everyone will agree that one of the most anxious moments in a person's life is that which follows the complete dental check-up. You wait in near panic for the revelation of what do I need done and...WHAT WILL IT COST? You know something will be forthcoming because of the ache you now have in your teeth after the doctor poked and dug around on them. Also you're sure you caught something about possible root canal and crown mumbled in what otherwise seemed to be Latin to the bright and cheerful assistant. Finally the moment comes and you are confronted with a load of x-ray films, models, charts, diagrams, and that sheet that says "Cost Estimate." After another Latin lecture during which you try to appear at least a dull-normal modern adult, you are congratulated for the finding of not being too poor a dental specimen. Your cost for this minor application of dental science miracles will be a mere \$2,500.00 only half of which will be due immediately. At this point your need shifts to that of medical science in the form of a car-

For all of you who have at one time or another played this scene I offer a few facts drawn from mostly my own practice experience to give you a glimpse of what is behind those shocking fees. A dentist's expense load falls into two basic parts particularly in the first half of his career. First, the cost of a dentist's education and beginning of practice is very great, and this expense is likely to follow him many years into his practice life. When you have the ongoing weekly, monthly, and yearly expenses many of which are

\$186.00. The cost of full metal semi-precious alloy crown was fifty-nine. A simple allacrylic partial fee was seventy-five fifty.

Most of those friendly and helpful receptionists and assistants who populate modern dental offices are costing the doctor and you anywhere from six hundred to twelve or fifteen hundred per month. In addition, most offices have a clean-up crew to keep those halls scrubbed and disinfected.

Finally are what I call the hidden costs which are mostly in the role of necessary evils. Most dentists are members of at least one set of professional associatons. Dues for the ADA, TDA, and local districts will run three hundred per year or more if you did not attend a single meeting. If one should happen to make one of the major conventions, he may add five hundred to a thousand to his annual budget. Also in this day of mistrust of authority and consumer activism almost every dentist finds malpractice insurance mandatory for survival-add three to five hundred to the budget. We will not go into the many other types of insurance protection which most find necessary.

Aside from all these are the monthly utility costs to run those blessed air conditioners in this Texas climate as well as compressors and central evacuator (suction) systems, heat sterilizers, etc. Just as any other small business, the dentist seems to be a sitting 'fat' duck for everybody who wants to levy some kind of tax. For example, the dentist as an employer (most have at least two helpers) pays 2.7% of gross salaries for unemployment tax (which he himself can never draw) plus the 6.7% matching social security tax for each worker. Also as you business people know comes the selfemployment FICA tax of over 9% of net income. (Those of us under 35 likely will collect none of this either) If then our doc is lucky enough to own his own office he is subject to property tax and costs for maintenance, which for us came to over a thousand in a recent year. Of course, if he should be too successful (35 to 45% net is considered success) and get into an upper income tax bracket then he must share 25 to 50% with Uncle Sam, who will happily share it throughout the world with every enemy and deadbeat with his hand out. Sure it costs like rip for

good dental care, but no more proportionately than the cost of other services in this inflated economy. Don't be too hard on the dentist who is probably struggling to make it just as desperately as you are. Where are you going to be when it becomes completely unprofitable to practice dentistry? Most thinking people still regard dental care as a necessity. I saw a recent survey that indicated a decline in general dentist's profit margins for at least ten years past. Also there is the report of dental schools in a recent year unable to fill all available places in the freshman class. A cutback in enrollment is being seriously discussed. The potential return is just getting too small for what must be a gigantic investment in time and money. Though you may not have noticed, there is getting to be a great abundance of dentists. Of course, if dental

schools cut enrollement, the pendulum will start to swing back toward a shortage of dentists in a few years. This will surely raise fees to new heights for the next genera-Most younger dentists now are in a real financial and emotional bind. Also the majority really want to help people by doing ideally correct work. Unfortunately, this is going to require a cost. The forces currently at work should see more reasonably priced dentistry becoming more available in the future usually in the form of large group clinics. I just hope the pressured young dentists can maintain some level of quality as well as sanity in those circumstances.



one municipality and one investor-owned distribution company, and for partial requirements electric service it supplies to two municipally owned electric systems.

In its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, WTU proposed rates which will produce about \$2.1 million in additional revenue for the Company during the 1983 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately three per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1983. Present

total requirements rates have been in effect since February, 1982, and the partial requirements rates have been in effect since 1977. Except for the rate level, no other major changes were

proposed. WTU officials said the rate change is needed to bring the Company's revenues from wholesale customers to a level equal to the cost of providing service.


