Unless some 300 members subscribe to the Pafford-Patterson Ambulance Service by Wednesday, Aug. 18, rates for non-members for the coming year will increase by almost 40%.

That's the announcement by Co-Owner Operator Tommy Paterson who expressed his appreciation to those who have placed their confidence in the important service, and recognize it as a community effort.

Family membership rate is \$36 per year.

The firm is still short of its goal-to-operate. In order to provide the service, the firm reports that it needs 850 subscribers in Cisco and the same number in Eastland. As the week drew to an end

Local Students Begin Registering

Cisco Primary School registration will be held August 13th. The schedule is as follows:

First And Second Grades

All first and second graders are to register on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. The children already have their room assignment; therefore, go to their homeroom teacher to register. Only those who received a special letter in May need to bring the immunization record. Every first and second grader must have shots up-to-date before they can enroll for the 1982-83 school year.

New Students
If a student did not finish the 1981 school year in Cisco and will be a first or second grader in the Cisco Schools this year, please

only 598 had signed up in Eastland and 635 in Cisco.

The firm has picked up about 150 new subscribers from the area towns including Ranger, Carbon, Olden, Morton Valley, Putnam, Moran, Scranton and Desdemona.

The firm has re-extended the membership deadline to Aug. 18 in a last-ditch effort to provide the service to the most the least cost. If the 850-goal is reached for each town, the new non-member rates will not go into effect.

If the 850-goal is not reached for each town, the non-member rates will be as follows:

Base rate per ambulance call: \$100, (formerly \$70); mileage \$1.70 per mile (formerly \$1.50); emergency run, \$20, (formerly \$15); oxygen \$15, (formerly \$10); and supplies \$10, (formerly \$7.50)

That totals \$146.70 for an average ambulance run for a non-member, compared to \$104 previously.

Mr. Patterson emphasized that non-members will be expected to pay cash or check, and that insurance assignments will not be accepted for non-members. It will be the responsibility of the non-member ambulance user to pay the firm, and collect his own insurance coverage.

Last year, Pafford-Patterson Ambulance made 916 ambulance runs in the county, 641 were members, the remainder for non-members.

Memberships in the Ambulance Service is a cooperative effort that makes it possible for the firm to operate here with any subsidy from any governmental entity.

Without this cooperative effort it's probably that no ambulance service could operate, without some kind of subsidy, most agree.

Application form and information about the ambulance service appears in this issue of the newspaper, and forms are available at city hall.

Kindergartners
The boys and girls in the Cisco School District who are now five or will be five on or before September 1, 1982, will register for kindergarten on August 13 at the Kindergarten Building. Registration will be from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. with kindergarten teachers, Mrs. Collins and Mrs. Denison.

But a child's immunization records and certified birth certificate has not been checked by Mrs. Webb, go to her first before enrolling a child.

Parents and students may come by the Primary School any morning from 9-11 beginning August 9th through August 12th to get their child's records checked.

Do not bring a hospital birth certificate. Parents must have a certified copy of the birth from the city hall of the town where their child was born, or the county seat courthouse, or the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin (if a Texan).

The shots required before a child can enroll in kindergarten are: 3 DPT (one has to be after the fourth birthday); 3 polio (one has to be after the fourth birthday); one measles, one mumps and one rubella, (sometimes these are given as one shot called the MMR).

All other kindergartners must see Mrs. Webb before registering.

All students of Cisco Intermediate School in grades 1, 4, 5 and 6 will need to register Friday, August 20, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Students who attended school in Cisco last year will report to their homeroom teacher. (Names and room numbers will be posted in the hall.) All new students will need to come by the principal's office for room assignment and will need to bring a copy of their scholastic and immunization records from the school they last attended.

Classes begin Monday, August 23.

All students in the seventh through the 12th grades who plan to attend Cisco Junior-Senior High School this fall need to pre-register at the high school August 10 through August 13.

Students will be given a pre-registration packet and a class schedule which are to be returned the first day of school. Students are encouraged to come by the school on the date set for their particular grade level, in order to avoid delays in scheduling.

The following dates and times for students to register are:

Tuesday, August 10-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, seniors; 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. juniors.

Wednesday, August 11-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, sophomores, 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. freshmen.

Thursday, August 12-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, eighth grade; 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. seventh grade.

Friday, August 13-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, late registration for all grades.

Classes will begin August 23 with all students (7-12) reporting to the high school auditorium at 8:05 a.m.

Industrial Development Consultant Will Be In Eastland August 19th

Chloe Chaddick, an industrial development consultant with the Texas Industrial Commission (TIC), will be in Eastland on Thursday, August 19, to brief community leaders on ways the TIC can be of service in local industrial development efforts.

The Industrial Commission is the state's primary economic development agency responsible for job creation. Texas is now the fastest growing state in the nation, surpassing California for the first time. Much of this population gain can be attributed to the influx of people from the Northeast and Midwest, many of them unemployed. A recent report by the Governor's Texas 2000 Commission found that 170,000 new jobs must be added to the Texas economy each year in order to handle these new entries to the labor force and still keep the state unemployment rate relatively low.

"In today's economy the competition for industrial expansion is fierce," Chaddick said, "and it is even more important that Texas communities be aware of the assistance available to them from the state."

Chaddick will speak at 10:30 a.m. at the Chamber of Commerce Board Room. The presentation covers all assistance programs available through the TIC with emphasis on industrial revenue bond financing, accessing the state's rural loan fund and start-up training programs.

A.C. Lebrede ----- Investing In Boys

Not long ago A.C. (Earl) Lebrede, Director of the Ranger Boy's Club, signed up Michael Cockburn of Ranger as his 100th member. Just after that two more boys came into the Club, making an all-time high of 102 members.

All these boys pledged to abide by "The Boy's Club Code", which consists of four statements printed on each membership card. They are: "I believe in God and the right to worship according to my own faith and religion."

"I believe in America and the American way of life - in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."

"I believe in fair play, honesty, and sportsmanship."

"I believe in my Boy's Club, which stands for all these things."

A number of members can be seen at the Clubhouse from 12:30 to 5:00 on these hot afternoons. One boy walks 2 miles each day to reach the Club. The boys play games, work out in the gymnasium, read, or just visit. Some take time out for a cool swim in the City Park, which adjoins the Clubhouse grounds.

Recently Lebrede held a Games Tournament, in which trophies were awarded to the winners. First Place was won by Charley Alberson, Second by Craig Koch, and Third by Brian Davtevil.

Most of the boys who utilize the Clubhouse are residents of the town of Eastland County, but some are from places much further away. Visitors from Abilene, Alabama, Arizona, Florida, California and Canada have enjoyed the Clubhouse this summer.

In a few weeks officials from the Boy's Club of America, with the Ranger group is affiliated, will drive over from Dallas to visit. The Ranger Boy's Club always gets a high rating from this group, in both facilities and management.

Sometimes persons from other towns will come to Ranger to observe the Club in action - wondering if they could have a similar one in their locality. They realize the need for such a recreational, social, and character-building program.

They study the 62 ft., three room building, noting the division into gymnasium, a

long recreation room, and a smaller room for table games and snacks.

They note the equipment: a number of pool and ping-pong tables, bumper pool, ice hockey games, and old favorites like dominoes and checkers. They see the weight lifting equipment, the basket balls, the "muscle builder", the soft drink machine, the record player. There are things here to interest every boy. They can duplicate all these things, and have a Club like the one in Ranger.

But then they realize a problem: How in the world are they going to duplicate Lebrede?

Where will they get that same warmth, or that hand on some troubled boy's shoulder? Where will they get a man who will spend every afternoon with 'his boys', content because they are having worthwhile enjoyment?

Earl Lebrede has been with the Ranger Boy's Club since 1974, right from the start. He agreed to serve as Executive Director when no one else could be found. He is quick to point out that a number of leading citizens of the town saw the need for a good program and did something about it. At first the group raised money for equipment, and used any available building. In 1978 W.S. Wagley, who had worked with the Boy's Club in Abilene, had the present metal-sided structure erected.

At the present time the President of the Ranger

Boy's Club is Jerry Richardson, of Ranger Savings. The Vice President is Jerry Edwards, of Edwards Funeral Home and the Secretary/Treasurer is John Graham, Vice President of the First State Bank of Ranger. Names of the Board of Directors read like an Honor Roll of leading citizens - which of course it is.

"The people and businesses of Ranger have given us wonderful support," says Lebrede. "Contributions - which are always welcome - help us to keep going. We are not funded by any government agency - it is all local."

Visitors to the Ranger Boy's Clubhouse are amazed at the cleanliness of the place, and the respectful attitude of members.

"These boys know how to act," Lebrede says. "I have never had any trouble. We've never had any serious accidents, and no fights. Boys of every race and religion know they are welcome here. But they also know they must treat each other right, and take care of the equipment."

Earl Lebrede was born in Cuba, but his parents emigrated to Tampa, Florida when he was very young. He credits these

parents and his Church with installing a desire in him to help other people.

In 1941 he was drafted into the Army with the Florida National Guard. While stationed at Galveston he met and married a Texan - Kathaleen Howard. After the war Lebrede took a job with the Palo Pinto Gas Company in Strawn. Later he became Department Manager of the Montgomery Ward store in Ranger.

Although they have lived briefly in other places, the Lebredos have called Ranger their home since that time. Four children were born to the family - Martha, Richard, Mike, and John. All except John are married and live around Dallas. The Lebredos have two granddaughters and seven grandsons.

After more than 20 years in the merchandising field, Lebrede "retired" in 1974. The rest is legendary. Some of the boys who come to the Ranger Boy's Club have many advantages at home - both parents, love, care, good training, material things. Others have little of anything to launch them in this world. Lebrede is adept at spotting the sad and discouraged. To those who come from broken homes, he

offers the warmth and concern of a father-figure.

"If we find that a boy needs help in serious matters," he says, "We help him. When I need assistance from the community, people are always willing to lend a hand."

"Sometimes people say to me - 'Lebrede, you are crazy! You are supposed to be retired! At your age you should be with the Senior Citizens - or out on the Lake fishing! What do you get out of this?'"

"Then I tell them something which happened not long ago. I was in a big shopping center in Dallas, in

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. 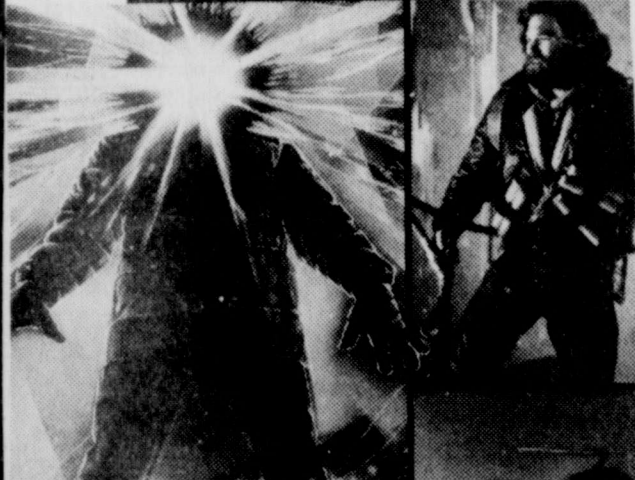

Grandpaw's Smokehouse May Become Packing House

The big and shiny new building at Grandpa's Smokehouse seems to be an ideal location to start a small packing plant operation, and owners Fred and Donna Brown seem willing and able.

With the hog farm of Bill Gressett at Gorman producing one hundred and twenty-five or thirty fat hogs a

month that go to market for a price of pork in the stores, Mr. Gressett is interested in a more profitable method of marketing his product.

Extension meat specialist Dennis Stiffler of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service at Texas A&M may provide the ingredient to bring these two businesses together.

The idea is to get the producer into the marketing process and in Mr. Gressett's case it would mean for him to sell his fat hogs as hams and other cuts of pork, not as hogs at a livestock auction.

Grandpa's Smokehouse seems to be the most economical solution for converting the fat hogs to cuts of meat.

But the idea is a good one only if buyers can be found for the meat.

Since a better product at a lower price is the easiest to market, Mr. Stiffler is here doing research or experimentation into the application of advanced technology to a small batch operation.

Being tested is the Value Added Concept of cured meats.

In this instance it would be producing first a sectioned and formed ham and second a restructured shoulder steak or shoulder roll. This is done to reduce the fat content and to provide a more convenient, smaller, ready to serve cut of meat that is uniform in size, quality and appearance to better suit the desires of the customers.

This operation will require the addition of some equipment such as a meat massaging machine, which massages the meat to remove the protein fluid that causes the meat fibers to adhere to each other, and a forming unit to shape the product.

The protein fluid is returned to the meat when it is shaped so that it will retain that shape.

The turkey hams available from local stores are examples of this type of forming as turkey legs don't grow into hams.

Another question that may determine the future of this idea in marketing is if a large enough volume of production can be maintained at a low enough price, in other words can it be cost effective.

As an experiment three hogs have been butchered using the technology, but without the use of excessively expensive equipment. Detailed records of the uncooked and cooked yield of each hog and labor costs are

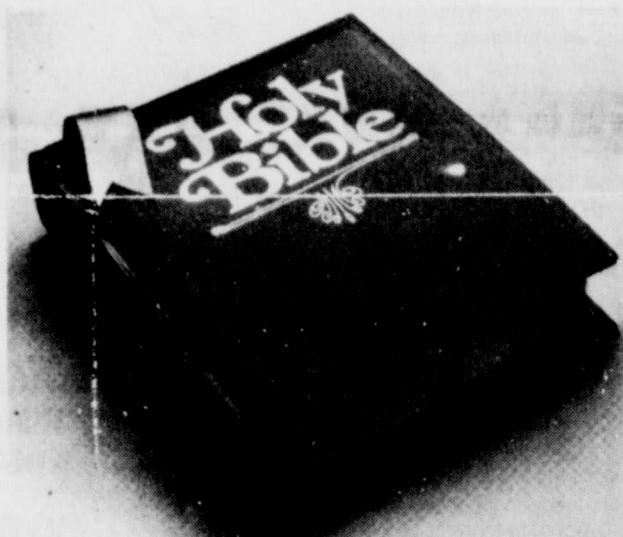
The final question will be answered only if and when some small grocery chains or other retail outlets agree to stock the products and they are readily purchased by the consumers.

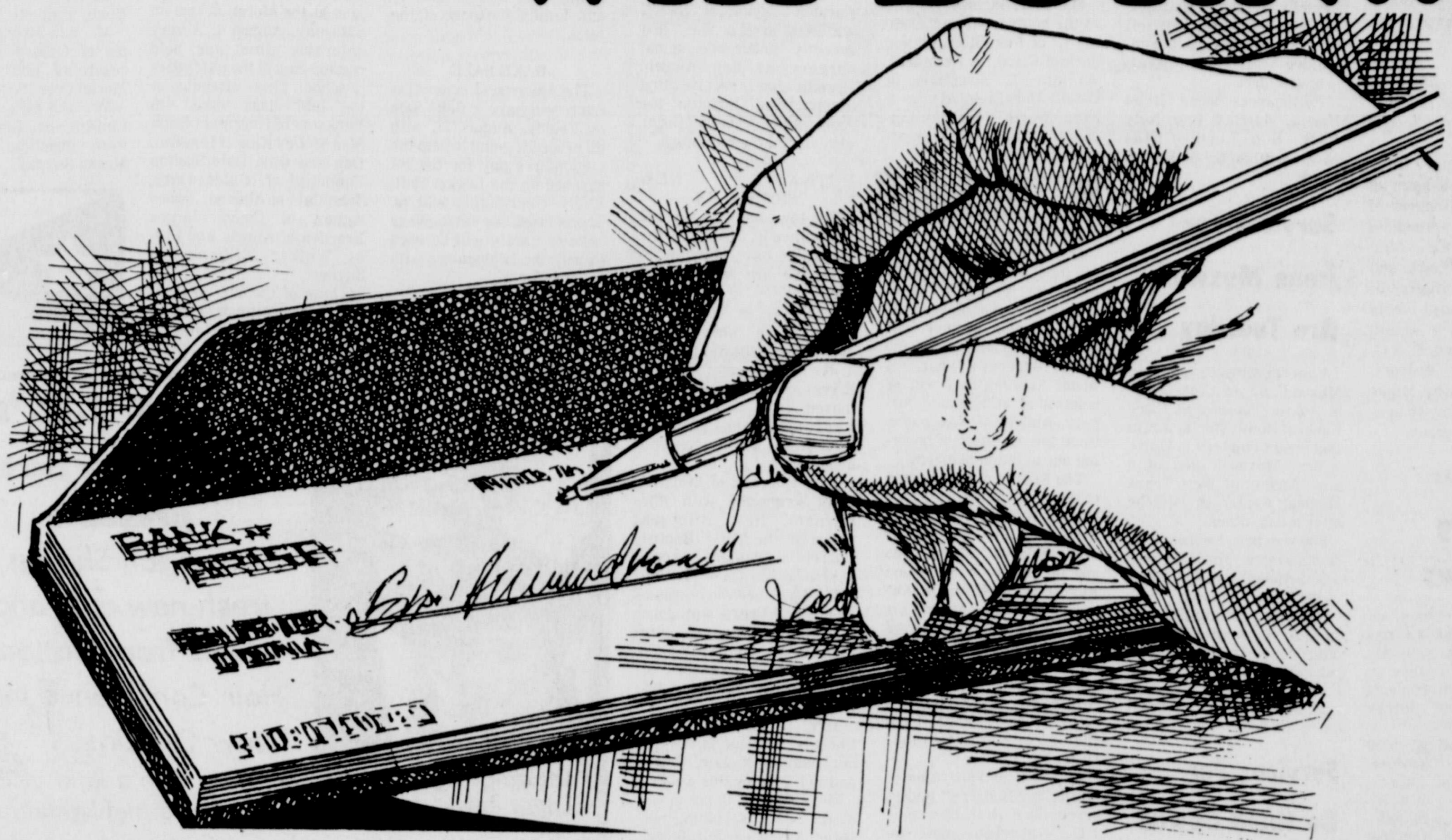

INSECTICIDAL SOAP TO CONTROL INSECTS

An old concept, newly refined, has provided a scientific breakthrough in pest control and has earned the approval of the Environmental Protection Agency for application to fruits, vegetables and ornamentals.

It's called Insecticidal Soap. This breakthrough in the development of an environmentally safe insecticide has come as a result of ongoing studies of the properties of fatty acids—as old as life itself—to provide an alternative to harsh chemicals now used to control insects, plant diseases, and weeds.

Fatty acids, from which soaps are made, are natural substances that occur in the cells of all plants and animals. They are part of man's daily diet. Yet, in certain newly discovered combinations from among their hundreds of varieties, they are deadly to a long list of insects that have been "bugging" mankind for ages.

This has resulted in a "spraying treadmill" in which growers interfered with nature's own controls, which in turn upset the natural balance even more. The world has become aware in recent years that indiscriminate use of harsh chemicals soon would exact a price for the temporary increase it provided in the food supply. Man would have to learn to work with nature, not against it, if his species were to survive on this planet. Hence, the search that was begun some years ago at Safer Agro-Chem and in other laboratories.

Some fatty acids are essential to the life process and occur in each living cell. Some are tied in with vitamin production and others are important components of the cell membrane. Moreover, it cleans leaves and other surfaces of sticky honeydew, sooty mold, and general grime, leaving the foliage with a natural, healthy glow. And because it is, after all, merely a soap, it can be used on all edibles right up to the day of harvest with no ill effects.

Also, because it is merely a soap, it has a fresh odor

that makes it acceptable for spraying plants in crowded places such as shopping malls where odors of the old petrochemical sprays make them unwelcome. As a harmless soap, there

is no reason for the gardener to feel any constraint about using it to head off an insect infestation before it can get out of hand. The Insecticidal Soap may be applied with most types of

spray equipment, or can be used as a dip or wipe. It is biodegradable and does not corrode metals, thus eliminating cleanup problems. This Insecticidal Soap has

Farmers & Ranchers Though in Price Squeeze, Continue to Outpace Manufacturing Where Cost Is Transferred to Consumer, You

COLLEGE STATION—Food prices continue to go up at a time when many farmers are "going broke." Thus, American consumers cannot blame farmers and ranchers for high food prices this year.

"There is a retail price, farm price dilemma," says Dr. W.E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Retail prices are moving up at the very time when prices that farmers receive are dropping."

Rising retail food prices are resulting from the ever-increasing marketing margin, which includes processing, marketing, transportation, packaging, and retailing, Black says. In recent years, inflation has been the chief cause of rising marketing margins and retail food prices. It has not been the farmer or rancher, he says.

"Farmers have consistently outpaced the manufacturing sector in productivity per hour, and this

agricultural efficiency has help hold down the inflation rate while providing a generous food supply. Consumers want a plentiful, healthful, safe, nutritious food supply at affordable prices. Our farmers and ranchers have provided this, some of them at the cost of

economic bankruptcy," Black explains.


If America's consumers should have cause for concern, it should be for the nation's farmers who are currently suffering from the most severe cost-price squeeze since the depression of the 1930's, notes Black.

"While farm costs moved up 153 percent in the last 10 years, net income per farm family dropped 20 percent—from \$4,126 to \$3,314," Black says, stressing that this represents net income from farming per family, not per capita income.

how many survive financially will most certainly affect our nation's future food supply and the prices that consumers have to pay," Black says. Once a farmer is squeezed off the farm, he simply does not return to farming, the economist explains.

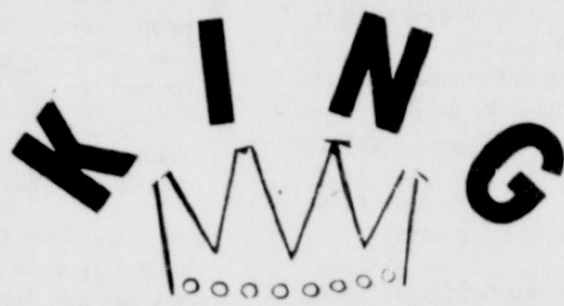

Farmers And Ranchers Are Facing An Uncomfortable Financial Situation

The currently depressed agricultural market prices, increasing production costs and the high cost of credit translate into an uncomfortable financial situation for farmers and ranchers. Time spent on managing the financial aspects of the farm or ranch is extremely important, perhaps crucial, to the business.

Such tight financial situations bring a heightened need for better communications between the farmer or rancher and his lender. This communication must be based on a thorough understanding of what is happening to the financial position of the business. Financial information about the farm business is generally conveyed by the net worth statement and the net income statement.

The net worth statement is taken on a specific date and thus provides a one-day picture of the farm business. The assets show the value of the business, while liabilities show the claim of creditors to the business and net worth (or equity) shows the owner's claim to the business. A series of net worth statements for a business must be examined to determine if the business is showing financial progress.

The net income of profit and loss statement shows the value of the production or in-

come to the business over an operating period (generally a year), deducts the costs incurred during that period and shows the profit (or loss) from operating the farm or ranch business.

A third piece of financial information has become increasingly more important in communicating with lenders. Cash flows and the timing of these cash flows in the business need to be monitored. The manager needs to continually be aware of the checking account balance-cash flow planning is needed.

A monthly cash flow plan or projection anticipates the cash position of the business and provides a plan that the manager and his lender can discuss. The anticipated flow of cash income and cash requirements provides a plan to make needed adjustments from. Cash requirements include the operating expenses as well as family living expenses and principal payments on notes and mortgages. Cash flow planning takes an added importance for the manager during tight financial times.

Communication between farmers and ranchers and their lenders is always important. The use of net worth statements, net income statements and cash flow projections help both to see the total financial picture of the farm or ranch business.

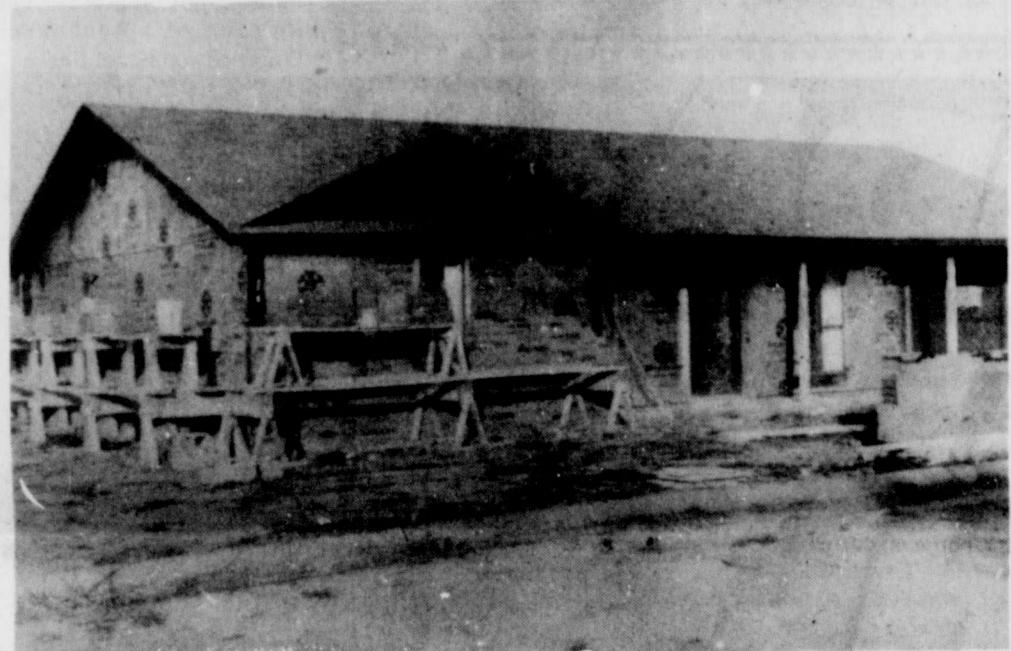

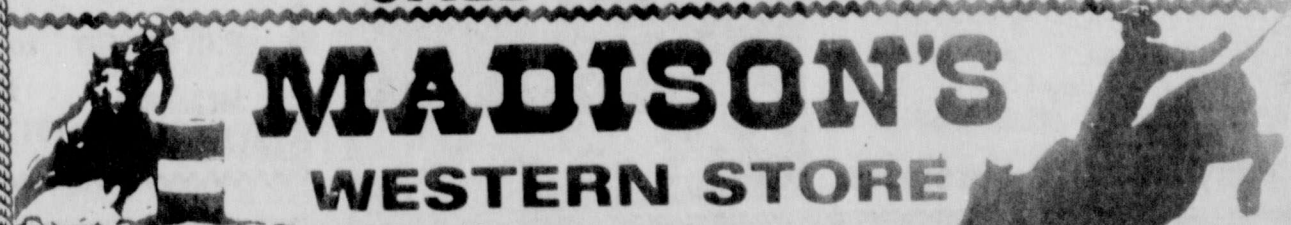
