



Council Votes To Remove Parking Meters; Sets Tax

Cisco's city council voted to remove parking meters and impose a two-hour parking limit in downtown Cisco at Tuesday night's regular meeting. They also approved the first reading of an ordinance which levys the city taxes for 1982-83 fiscal year at "\$.47 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property"

With a full council present, the minutes from three previous meetings (one regular, one special called and one emergency called) in July were approved as presented in a motion by council member Loyal Lundstrom. The motion was seconded by council member Bobby Ingram and all voted in its favor.

City Manager Michael Moore presented a financial report for the month of June to the council and stated that with the completion of June, 75% of the fiscal year was

In the general fund, 95% of the budgeted estimate of \$660,830.00 had been collected by June 30, 1982. The amount collected totalled, \$624,603.15.

In expenditures, the general fund has expended 75% of the budget appropriations of \$663,830.00. The total expended by June 30 in the

general fund was \$494,642.71. Council member Ingram made a motion to accept the financial report and council member Ivan Webb seconded the motion. All voted in its favor.

City manager Moore also gave a report to the council in which he said the sewer project on the west side of town is on its way with the contracts having been signed. He said it is hoped it will be under operation before the first of the year. The city is in the process of finalizing the plans and specifications

for the program at this time. discussed the possibilities of having the city's water sedimentation and overhead tanks cleaned. He stated the city staff is looking at all improvements which may be to the betterment of the citizens of Cisco.

Mayor Eris Ritchie opened two sealed bids for an oil and gas lease from the city at the meeting. The first bid was from Stanson Oil Co. for \$30 per acre and the second bid from Matney Oil and Gas was for \$55.55 per acre. Council member Brad Kimbrough made a motion to accept the higher bid of Matney Oil and Gas and give him a two-year lease as he requested. Council member Lundstrom seconded the mowhich passed tion

unanimously. The results of a survey made of local businesses concerning parking meters were made available to the council by city manager

Moore at the meeting. Mr. Moore stated that 69 businesses were contacted by the survey and only 22 responded. From those responding, 16 said the parking meters should be removed, while five voted no; 11 said they would prefer and support a two-hour parking limit in the downtown area. while six said they would

Mayor Ritchie emphasized his main concern with removing the parking meters would be someone parking along Conrad Hilton Avenue in front of businesses and leaving their automobile all day. He said he would like to see such a situation avoid-

hour parking limit should be

enforced. Council member Batteas made a motion to do away with the downtown parking meters and have a posted two-hour parking limit. Council member Webb seconded the motion. A roll call vote had council members Ingram, Webb, Lundstrom and Batteas voting in favor of the motion, for the majority and the approval of the motion. Council members Bobby Rains and Kimbrough voted against.

An ordinance establishing the tax levy for the 1982-83 budget year of the City of Cisco at \$.47 per \$100 of the assessed market value was passed on its first reading. Originally the rate had been set at \$.66, but was changed to the above mentioned amount. Council member Lundstrom made a motion in favor of the ordinance and council member Batteas seconded the motion which

passed unanimously. After much discussion, council member Ingram made a motion to table a Lone Star Gas rate request ordinance until the next council meeting. Council member Batteas seconded the motion which also passed

unanimously. The rate request by Lone Star Gas would change the consumption price of natural gas and also set a minimum customer service charge for every working meter. Consumption prices would be different during the summer months and winter months, according to local office

manager, Wayne West. Residential customers would pay \$4.50 per month for a customer service charge, regardless of how much gas they had used, in addition to their regular gas bill. The customer service charge for commercial users would be \$7.50 per month for

each working meter. Consumption charges would be the same for residential and commercial customers. Winter month rates would be \$4.38 per Mcf, while summer rates would be \$4.13 per Mcf.

In another matter Tuesday night, this time concerning a state-wide rate increase by Lone Star Gas, council member Kimbrough made a motion for the city to adopt a resolution authorizing the city's participation in the Lone Star Gas rate case and appropriating \$180.68 for the city's pro-rata share. Council member Lundstrom seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

In this case, Lone Star Gas Company has applied to the Texas Railroad Commission for a 19% gate rate increase state-wide. The Texas Municipal League (which serves cities in Texas) has asked for cities on the Lone Star system to band together "to investigate the reasonableness of Lone Star's gate rate increase and

to oppose any excessive in-With the passing of the ordinance, Cisco is pledging its support to the Texas Municipal League in its in-

vestigation. In a similar resolution, this time concerning a statewide rate increase by Southwestern Telephone Company, council member Webb made a motion to accept the resolution authorizing the city's participation in the case and appropriating \$158.10 for the city's pro-rata share. Council

member Ingram seconded the motion which passed

unanimously. In other action, council member Lundstrom made a motion to pass a resolution "authorizing the mayor of the City of Cisco to execute a license with the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company regarding the installation of a ten-inch sewer outfall line beneath the railroad rightof-way at mile post 361.48." Council member Kimbrough seconded the motion, which passed unanimously, needed for the completion of the new sewer line in the northwest

part of town. In a discussion of the acquisition of a new wastewater facility site, city manager Moore informed the council he is still looking for a suitable site. He said two places which had been discussed were not feasible: the first because of the price; and the second because the owner would not sell just a part of the land and the city would not have a use for the rest because of its

Council member Batteas made a motion for the council to have a budget work session for the 1982-83 budget Tuesday, August 17, at 6 p.m. Council member Kimbrough seconded the motion

and all voted in its favor. During citizen-council discussion, Louise Allison questioned the city manager regarding recent news articles printed in Houston and Lubbock newspapers concerning the drilling of oil wells on city property. Mrs. Allison asked why local news agencies were not given the article first if the city was to receive large amounts of

money from the wells. City manager Moore stated the articles were written for the oil company responsible, not for the City of Cisco. He also stated that any figures quoted by him in the articles were pure conjecture on information given him by the oil personnel. He said the city has received no money from any wells at this time and until he has a check in his hand from the wells, he is not going to worry about

how it should be spent. He also said that money will not be considered in next year's budget, since it is impossible to budget what you don't have in hand." He agreed with Mrs. Allison that the royalty money could be well used in the paving of streets, "if and when we get

right it won't last long.

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Siblings Of Cystic Fibrosis Patients Are Often Forgotten Sufferers

Editor's Note: This is par of an occasional series or how the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation spends its money to help fight this inherited, fatal disease. Today's piece focuses on problems of the brothers and sisters of chronically-ill children.)

Brothers and sisters are often forgotten sufferers when one child in a family is stricken with cystic fibrosis. a disease that usually kills its victims in childhood.

These siblings "are more withdrawn socially, find life generally harder and have more difficulty coping," says Marsha Kanoff, a social worker at Children's Medical Center in Dallas, citing studies of families in which children have cystic fibrosis, the nation's leading genetic killer, or other chronic illnesses.

Parents, doctors and nurses "tend to forget siblings" as they struggle to cope with the terrifying illness, in which abnormally thick mucous secretions obstruct respiratory, digestive and other organ systems, Kanoff told caregivers attending a Cystic Fibrosis Foundationsponsored conference

recently in Washington, D.C. Fred Greene, president of the North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, said the conference is a good example of why so many volunteers are working locally to help raise funds for educational meetings, basic research and treatment for children and their families.

Siblings usually are buffeted by a wide range of emotions - jealously, resentment, anger - that lead to guilt, she said. With guilt, "the whole process starts over again.'

The threat of death hanging over a sick child haunts brothers and sisters but often "they protect their nts and don't talk about said Knoff. "They fear hat each admission (of their

ill sibling) to the hospital is the last admission.

She said that the Dallas hospital's cystic fibrosis center encourages familes to let brothers and sisters visit the hospital, and even to stay overnight.

"When they don't know what's happening to their siblings in the hospital they grow really fearful," she

At the same time, "a lot of them (well siblings) think the hospital is fun, with kids getting presents, attention, candy she said. Showing them the unpleasant aspects of treatments, examinations and of feeling sick can alleviate the jealousy that grows as siblings watch parents devote much of their time to the ill children.

Kanoff believes that well brothers and sisters would help with the work of caring for a young cystic fibrosis patient at home, but warns against placing too much responsibility on the sibl-

"We see many role changes and reversals," she said. "A younger sibling can become the rescuer, for example, at school, of the CF child.'

When the oldest child in a family is not afflicted with cystic fibrosis and is a girl, she often becomes mothering and protective of her afflicted sibling, and "has the most trouble when the patient gets sick."

"Siblings develop close relationships with their sick sister or brother. It becomes very important for them to be close to their brother or sister, especially in adulthood. I think they understand they don't have much time with them."

Kanoff said communications is vital in families with cystic fibrosis because "kids feel so often that no one explained why all this is hap-

pening to them." Time is a big factor in families because parents must spend so much of it with the sick children, leaving the well ones to feel jealous and lonely. It is important that parents talk with the well children, helping them to understand why the children don't have more time with

their parents. The well siblings feel angry when there are no family vacations and activities, when money, time and parental energy are focused on the sick child. "If they can talk about it with parents, it helps the well child not to feel guilty," said

Parents' absences at the hospital also interrupt the routines of well children, and rob them of time they need with parents.

"Parents in some ways have to encourage kids to be more independent because a child with CF takes so much time," said Kanoff. "Then when the child dies, the parents treat the well children as if they had not grown older since the child with CF became ill."

And when the brother or sister dies, well siblings often feel a lot of survivor guilt, because they are the ones who are healthy, and because "they got the good genes."

The genetic implications of belonging to a family in which a child is afflicted with cystic fibrosis are enormous for the unaffected siblings, she said. The siblings know they may carry "bad genes" and could themselves have a child with cystic fibrosis. "They are all very conscious that they 'have a high probability' of being carriers. It has an important impact on their selfesteem and self-image. They fear their own deaths more, and a lot of psychosomatic things go on.'

Other problems reported in children include depression and withdrawal from friends and family members. Some children begin to have trouble in school, drift into deliquency and even end up in court.

Families should not fear that such reactions are inevitable, however.

How siblings cope depends on many factors their parents, their peers, how sick their siblings are, and many more," said Kanoff. On the positive side, children can be helped to become more empathetic and more mature, while facing the enormity of cystic fibrosis can "sometimes bring families closer together.





GORDON SPOT

Many trees throughout Eastland County are showing symptoms of scorching. This is not a disease but is either some type of chemical burn or simply leaf scorch.

In years, such as this year, when May & June are extremely wet and cool, many trees put on excess foliage, even more than the root system could support under normal conditions. When the weather changes and becomes extremely hot & dry, such as has happened the last month, the root system is not able to support the foliage that has been produced. The edges of the leaves will consequently burn from the edge back toward the mid-rib of the leaf and the tree will take on a yellow appearance and in many cases show severe defoliation. This usually will not kill trees, but in some cases might. This is referred to as leaf scorch and thought of as a physiological disease.

We are also seeing quite a bit of c'hemical or herbicide damage. The symptoms will be much the same as with physiological leaf scorch as will the damage, due to the fact that the chemical damages a large portion of the root system and then as it begins to get hot, the tree cannot support the foliage. Also, during periods of high levels of rainfall, chemicals that are in the soil can move some distance from the point of placement and consequently, do damage much further away from original placement than most people

Construction damage also causes these symptoms and often kills trees. This may be the misuse of fill dirt, scraping away soil trenching, or walks, patios, buildings or roads that cover part of the

Be on the alert for armyworms! Armyworms are being found in coastal bermudagrass pastures and the early signs are being seen in lawns. The early signs of young armyworms are small white spots on leaves. The very young worms eat the green cells of the leaf which gives the white spot appearance. The larvae feed mostly at night and usually hide in debris on the soil surface in the daytime. As the worms grow larger they consume the entire leaves.

Begin control measures when the worms are small and there are three or more worms per square foot. For control of armyworms on pasture grasses, use Sevin, Naled or Dylox. For lawn applications, use Sevin, Diazinon or Dursban. There is no grazing restrictions or waiting period between application and harvest for Sevin, Naled or Dylox.

The armyworms are more effectively controlled when the worms are small.

The Peachtree borer

The peachtree borer can be one of the most destructive insect pests of peaches in Texas. Damage occurs as a result of the larvae feeding around a tree's base just under the bark. Severe infestations reduce tree vigor and can kill a tree if allowed to continue uncontrolled for several years. Populations that average more than one larva per tree should be treated. Control is achieved with a single late August application of insecticide of Lorsban*

Peachtree borer eggs are laid on the bark near the soil line of a peachtree. Hatch occurs in about 10 days. Newly emerged larvae bore into and feed in the bark cambium for 10-14 months. Mature larvae migrate from the tree out into the soil and pupate just below the surface. Eggs are laid in August or September with adults emerging the following August or September.

Adult peachtree borers are small moths with a wing span of 1 - 11/2 inches. The female is larger, solid black with a single orange abdominal stripe. Males are

black, not quite as robust as the female and have numerous yellow lines on

their body. After emerging from pupae, adults rest for a short period of time before mating. The mating sequence begins with the search for a mate where the male seeks out the female. The female emits a chemical (pheromone) which attracts only the male of the same species. Using the odor the male peachtree borer will locate and mate with the female. Egg laying follows in a few days. It is that period of time from egg lay to larval hatch that the peachtree borer is best controlled with insecticides.

Research has shown that a single late August application of the insecticide Lorsban* or Dursban* will effectively control the peachtree borer. Treatment is made by thoroughly wetting the base of each tree (about 1/2 - 1 gallon) with a spray mixture. Read the label for mixture rates and application restriction.

Certain Rights Accompany Property Condemnation

With changes in roads, streets, and urban living patterns, property is sometimes condemned.

But certain rights accompany condemnation, according to information from the Texas Real Estate Research Center, Texas A&M Univer-

Although the Government has the right to condemn land for public use, you have the right to just compensation at fair market value for the part that is condemned.

You should also receive compensation for any damage to the part that is not condemned. Fair market value includes the land and all improvements permanently attached to it. In addition to being paid for damages resulting from loss of property, the owner may also receive financial assistance under the Texas Relocation Assistance Act of condemnation forces a

"If you are faced with the prospect of having some or all of your property condemened, it is wise to consult an attorney," states the researchers at the University Center.





Most Taxing units in Texas (cities, counties, school district and special taxing districts) are adopting their 1982 tax rates. The actual schedule in each case will depend on when the appraisal roll is approved by the appraisal review board and the effective tax rate and unencumbered fund balances are caculated and publicized.

These provisions of the Property Tax Code were designed to prevent tax increases due to changes in appraised values of property. Basically, after receiving the approved appraisal roll, the tax assessor for a unit must calculate and publicize an effective tax rate which, based on the unit's valuation this year, would provide the same operating revenue as last year, plus sufficient revenue to meet debt service in the coming year. If the governing body anticipates adopting a tax rate which exceeds this calculated effective rate by more than three percent, it must vote its intent, publish a quarterpage notice in a newspaper, hold a public hearing, publish a second quarter-page notice, and then hold a meeting for adoption of the rate.

Because a tax shift to other classes of property occurs when new exemptions are granted for the first time, the revenue lost from the granting of the exemptions must be deducted from the prior year's levy. In some cases, therefore, a taxing unit may be required to advertise a tax increase to produce a 1982 tax levy equal to the levy for

The truth-in-taxation calculation is significant because, beginning this year, taxpayers can exercise a limited form of initiative and referendum to roll back tax increases which exceed the calculated effective tax rate by more than eight

The lower ceiling also covers single-family home loans guaranteed by the Veteran's Administration. Ceilings for interest rates for other FHA insured loans also are being lowered in the next ten days, according to an announcement from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In changes taking effect August 16, ceilings will also decline to 18.5 percent from 19 percent for homeimprovement loans, to 17.5 percent from 18 percent for mobile home loans, and to 17 percent from 17.5 for combination mobile home and lot

"We, as realtors, are encouraged by this drop in interest rates," states Barbara Love, owner of Town and Country Real Estate in Eastland. "We feel this decrease will open the door of home ownership to families who were previously unable to qualify."

HUD officials, also, claimed their ceiling-rate decrease is a sign of better economic times to come.

"This decline in the FHA rate is additional evidence that the economic recovery program is beginning to work," said Under-Secretary Donald Hovde.

Loans carrying the 15 percent interest rate will be available in the Eastland County area, according to Jerry Richardson, Senior Vice President of Ranger Savings.

"Ranger Savings and Eastland Savings are continuing to back FHA and VA loans, and will do so at the lower rate.

"Furthermore," states Richardson, "Ranger and Eastland Savings have acquired money through the Texas Housing Agency. This is for loan primarily to firsttime home buyers, and will go at a fixed rate of 14 per-

Hightower of Vernon will be discouraging, one bright spot has developed. According to the Drug Enforcement Administration, we have made dramatic strides in the fight to eliminate "angel dust.

When "angel dust," or phencyclidine hydrochloride (PCP), was developed in the mid-50s, it was seen as a promising anesthetic for use in operating rooms. Research, however, showed that the drug produced horrifying psychotic reactions. It literally drove people mad, so it was barred completely for use on

By the mid-70s, "angel dust" was fast becoming one of the most abused drugs in the nation since it could be produced at such a low cost-only \$1 per "hit." Between 1976 and 1977, the DEA reported that confiscated dosage units had doubled, from 1.7 million to 3.5 million. This was happening in spite of appalling reports of derangement caused by the drug.

One young man under the influence of "angel dust" pulled out his own teeth with pliers; another gouged out his eyes to avoid seeing grotesque visions; a third youth drank rat poison to kill the rodents he believed had infested his body; and a fourth gnawed being invited to the event. his forearms almost to the bone because of "voices" telling him his hands had offended him.

It took six police officers to arrest another young man brandishing a knife who kept such a "death-like" grip on the weapon that officers had to hit his hand with night-sticks. They shattered the knife handle, but the youth still clutched the blade when he finally was subdued. Later examination showed his hand was broken in four places.

These horror stories could not be allowed to continue. In 1978, I authored and passed through Congress the Psychotropic Substances Act, making it difficult for drug dealers to purchase the chemical piperidine, a key ingredient of "angel

dust." My bill also substantially increased penalties for traffick-Since the law went into effect in 1979, the results have been heartening. Within a year, emergency rooms reported a 24 percent decrease in cases involving "angel dust." Black market

prices for piperidine skyrocketed a hundred-fold, and the average sentence for "angel dust" traffickers went from two years to six Just recently, the new DEA deputy director Jack Lawn told me

the best news yet. He told me that we'd had the most dramatic reduction in "angel dust," by legislation, that he'd ever seen in Hospital emergency cases involving use of "angel dust," he

said, have now been cut in half-from approximately 10,000 in 1978 to about 5,000 last year. That's doing pretty well, as I see it. But I won't be content until



Industrial Development Consultant Will Be In Eastland Thursday

Chloe Chaddick, an industrial development consultant with the Texas Industrial Commission (TIC), will be in Eastland on Thursday, August 19, to brief community leaders on ways the TIC can be of service in local industria development efforts.

The Industrial Commission is the state's primary economic development agency responsible for job creation. Texas is now the fastest growing state in the nation, surprassing California for the first time. Much of this population gain can be attributed to the influx of people from the Northeast and Midwest, many of them unemployed.

A recent report by the Governor's Texas 2000 Commission found that 170,000 new jobs must be added to the Texas economy each year in order to handle these new entries to the labor force and still keep the state unemployment rate relatively

"In today's economy the competition for industrial expansion is fierce," Chaddick said, "and it is even more important that Texas communities be aware of the assistance available to them from the state."

Chaddick will speak at 10:30 a.m. at the Chamber of Commerce Board Room.

The presentation covers all assistance programs available through the TIC with emphasis on industrial revenue bond financing, accessing the state's rural loan fund and start-up training programs.


