Bobby Ingram Is Named Local Chairperson For Cystic Fibrosis

Mr. Bobby Ingram has been named Chairperson of the Fall Breath of Life Campaign for Cystic Fibrosis in the City of Cisco. The announcement was made by the North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic

Fibrosis Foundation. Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is a chronic, fatal disease - the number one genetic killer of young people in the United States. It primarily attacks the lungs and the digestive system by producing an abnormal accumulation of mucus which interferes with breathing and with the

body's absorption of food. When a child is born with CF, chances are the disease will not be immediately detected. Often called "the great masquerader", cystic fibrosis mimics other lung and digestive problems, so as many as 40 to 50 percent of the individuals with CF are not diagnosed or sometimes misdiagnosed.

That's unfortunate, because early diagnosis and treat-

ment help to prolong life. Cystic Fibrosis is a major health problem because there is no test to identify the 10 million symptomless carriers of the CF gene; there is no control for cystic fibrosis; and, worst of all, there is no

But progress against CF has been made largely because of the efforts of the CF Foundation and the many volunteers who give time and energy to raise much needed dollars.

The goal of the Foundation, pursued through its care and education programs, is to lengthen and improve the quality of life for CF patients and to reduce the impact of the disease on the patient, the family and

Interviewing of prospective jurors was going slow: one side finished with one citizen by about 10:00 a.m., haming started at 9:00.

LeFlore, 20, a Cisco oil field worker, was first indicted in January for the shooting death of convenience store worker Debra Garcia. The woman disappeared Nov. 29 from Quickway Grocery, where she worked, and her body was found in a roadside ditch two days later.

The 91st District Court Grand Jury later re-indicted LeFlore on capital murder charges, for which he is being tried. The re-indictment was seen as an attempt to have LeFlore's statement admitted as evidence. It had been earlier been refused as evidence by Judge Wright and he ruled a second time that it could not be entered because of defense testimony given regarding the taking of the statement, at the first motion to consider the statement.

Don L. Wilson is defense attorney and prosecutors are District Attorney Emory Walton and Eastland Attorney Bill B. Hart, who has been named a special prosecutor in the case.


Capital murder carries a maximum penalty of death by injection, while life in prison is the maximum punishment for a murder conviction. Law enforcement officials and attorneys connected with the case are prohibited by a "gag" order

from discussing the case. Suposition was that "new evidence" may have brought about the re-indictment, but after Judge Wright ruled against admission of the statement for the second time, it was assumed that there had not been new

evidence in the case. Under state law it would appear that LeFlore could have been indicted on the capital murder charge the first time around in the death occured in connection with the commission of another crime.







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Myrtle Wilks - A Window On The World

by Viola Payne

The studio of artist Myrtle (Mrs. Vov) Wilks, in her farm home south of Cisco, attracts a number of visitors. First they cross the spacious yard around the brick house, into a comfortable living room. They stop to admire favorite paintingsa landscape, with clear water tumbling into a bluegreen pool, a portrait of husband Voy Wilks, and pain-

Wilks children. These pictures are all prize winners, like so many others of Myr-

The artist, pleasant and soft voiced, leads across her kitchen to a narrow room with shelves of canned goods. Home canned things in glass jars, with the same jewel-tones of the Wilks paintings.

Finally comes the studio-a room with large windows







"Navajo Falls" Arizona by Myrtle Wilks

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
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pecan trees. It's a magnetic spot-a room which almost seems like an extension of the outdoors. Mrs. Wilks says it is a "dream come true"-a place to plan and study and work.

The paintings, too, lined along the walls and on easels, are like open windows on a world captured by Myrtle Wilks. There are a few Central Texas scenes, showing bluebonnets, oaks with fresh leaves, and still ponds. But most of her paintings depict a land far to the northwest-silhouettes of mountains and trees, and inland bodies of water. Gurgling streams, splashing brooks, a melting glacier, waterfalls, and lakes which

The colors of aure, turquoise, blues and greens predominate, with flashes of gold, apricot, or rose. There are few mechanical things in the pictures. Just a lone windmill, a rowboat, a homestead covered with snow. This is serenity transcribed and bordered with canvas.

mirror the sky.

But Myrtle Wilks paints much more than landscapes. She works in various mediums - oils, pastels, watercolors, acrylics, pen and ink. The pictures in the studio reflect only a portion of her output, for many paintings have already sold. She has painted a number of portraits, which she says is actually her favorite type of work. She has drawn persons of all ages, and has plans to draw all her 15 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

She points to a portrait in

an easel-a blonde girl with Anglo-Saxon features. Symetrical and lovely-cool blue eyes and shining hair.

'Every face is a challenge. I like to get acquainted with a person, be with them long enough to get an impression of their personality. I work with a photograph as reference, but like to have one good sitting, sometimes as many as

How she conveys this impression from the brain to the hand to the canvas is a process which seems to defy analysis.

On the technical side of art, however, Myrtle Wilks points to some fine teachers who have assisted her. She has studied under Sue Millinax of Cisco Junior College, Phyllis Sanders of Seymore, Robert Miller of McMurry College, John Birdsong of Canyon, and Naomi Brotherton of Dallas.

During recent years Mrs. Wilks has entered in many art shows, and carried away prizes from almost every one. These have included exhibits in Cisco, Eastland, Abilene, Graham, Snyder, and Cross Plains. Prizes have consisted of cash awards and ribbons, enough to cover a whole side of the studio.

Mrs. Wilks has won popular awards, such as the "Best Of The Show" decided on by public vote. She has also had a one-person show in Throckmorton, an exhibit at the Chamber of Commerce Bldg. in Eastland.

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and has been featured three times as "Artist For The Month" at the Maner Learning Center at Cisco Junior College.

Myrtle Wilks has lived in this area about 30 years, but her early life was spent in other places. She was born in Oklahoma, but lived in Arkansas, New Mexico and various parts of Texas before coming here.

She remembers trying to paint when she was a child, and feeling more love for crayons and their colors than any other part of school. Once she spent her school-paper money on crayons and then she had nothing to paint on. So she spent the whole day painting her crayon box.

Most of her longing for art was unsatisfied, for there were few supplies and no studies available. So she simply sketched things using her own ideas. Her first real painting was a dramatic landscape done with water colors.

While living in De Leion, Myrtle met Voy Wilks, a young man who lived in Dublin. They were married during wartime, World War II, and six weeks later Wilks left for the Army. It was more than two years later before the war was over and he could return home.

After the war Voy Wilks worked around Carbon, and then Cisco. In 1953 the Wilks bought a farm in the Nimrod community, an area with gently rolling landscapes. Myrtle was "sold" on this land when she saw a beautiful grove of pines at a home adjoining the proper-

When they moved to their arm the Wilks first lived in what they call a "goat shed". But soon they began to construct their brick home, working in slow stages.

"Very slow stages," laughs Myrtle.

As he built this house Voy Wilks found bricklaying so nteresting that he was encouraged to learn more about the construction ousiness. After that he full-time pecame oricklayer.

Those early years on the farm were busy ones. The Wilks had five children, who grew up there.

They are: Alva (Nelms), Cisco; Beth (Maynard), Rising Star: Ruth (York), Cisco; Farris, Cisco; and Dan, who lives at Lake Leon. The younger Wilks are now in various businesses and professions.

Along with house building and other activities, the Wilks led out with the local Seventh-day Church of God. The Church had a number of community projects, such as furnishing programs and music for Nursing Homes. The Wilks also established a large Church library, with books on such subjects as Creation vs. Evolution.

By 1960, with her children older, Myrtle Wilks had more time and energy for painting. She became a

Charter Member of the Cisco Art Club - a group which made numerous contributions to art in this area. She recalls some other Charter Members who encouraged her: Mr. and Mrs. Macie Hyatt, Marjorie Reaves, Winifred Pippin, and Helen Crawford.

Mrs. Wilks served for a time as Secretary and President of the group. She also worked on committees, assisting with exhibits, workshops, and programs. Those were happy and rewarding years, with interest being shown in her paintings. She took time out to study with good teachers and travel to acenic areas.

After about 18 years the Cisco Club no longer held regular meetings. But Myrtle Wilks had won a lot of public recognition by this time, and continued to paint at a rapid pace.

Sometimes artists must struggle through all sorts of difficulties, even discouragement from their families. Not so with Myrtle Wilks, her family has always been appreciative of her paintings. Voy Wilks was instrumental in finishing the studio, and enjoys all the art work done there. Sometimes he suggests things for his wife to paint, and assists her in displaying work at various places. He has also saved clippings and accounts of honors given Mrs. Wilks.

Myrtle Wilks' plans for the future include putting in as many hours as possible in her studio. She is looking forward to studying for two weeks in Ruidoso, New Mexico under nationally known artist Albert Handell. This late-summer course will deal with portraiture and pastel work.

"I want to go into more portrait work, water colors, and the patel medium," states Mrs. Wilks. She explains that the word "pastel" does not adequately describe the bibid shades now available in this medium.

At this time some of Myrtle Wilks paintings can be seen at Central Mud Co., Interiors Unlimited, and Central Masonry in Cisco.

At these businesses, just as in an art show, it is interesting to watch the effect the Wilks paintings have on people who see them. The observer usually lingers and looks intently at the painting, as if he has discovered something. Perhaps it is a long-lost dream of tranquili-

This indicates that the artist has been able to fully use the mechanics of technique, and thought has become form and substance.

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
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FREE EDUCATION AND THE UNDOCUMENTED WORKER

On June 15, 1982, The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4 that Texas and other states must provide free public education for the children of undocumented workerspeople in this country

Our current Lt. Governor. Mr. Hobby, was happy with the decision, praising it as the "only rational decision the court could have made. On the contrary. I think it

was a wrong decision that defied both law and logic. One of the principal underpinnings of an orderly society is that one should not benefit from breaking the law. All around the world. thousands of people stand patiently in line at our embassies, waiting for legal en try into this country. By its recent ruling, the Supreme Court told these people that if they are smart, they will ignore our immigration laws. find some other way to enter. and then there's a good

likelihood all manner of

taxpayer-supported benefits

will be open to them and their families

We can all feel sympathy for people driven to emigrate by desperate economic conditions. And I believe we should be compassionate toward the children of undocumented workers who are here through no fault of their own. We have been told we must educate these children and we will: it is our duty.

But I am deeply concerned about the effect this will have on our school systems and the quality of education. We have only a certain amount of desks and dollars with which to address the problems of educating Texas' children.

The court was essentially establishing social policy under the guise of ruling on a constitutional question. The result was bad law and bad social policy. It should now be up to the Federal Government to help pay for the mess they have created by not properly policing our

WHAT IS A WEED? A weed is any unwanted plant. Therefore, a weed could be a rose in your

tomato patch. But that's not

our typical notion of a weed. Conventional wisdom holds that a weed grows so fast and in such profusion that it crowds out a desired plant, crop or lawn.

But weeds are not always what they seem. Some are beautiful-like orange day lillies, and daisies and purple thistles. And all types of weeds are used in fresh and dried floral arrangements.

Often what one person considers a weed is a welcome addition to another's garden. Many homeowners delight in the morning glory and its bloom. But the same morning glory is nothing but trouble for the farmer who calls it bindweed. And the crabgrass that drives every

homeowner crazy is often used by strawberry growers, instead of hay, to mulch between rows.

There is agreement on one point, though, and that is that weeds grow and develop at a much faster rate than do many cultivated plants. Weeds reach soil moisture faster and cut out valuable sunlight for cultivated plants-thereby crowding out wanted plants.

Lawn weeds are especially troublesome to homeowners. A thick, healthy turf is the best way to prevent lawn weeds. Weeds, like every other plant, need moisture and nutrients to survive. If they can't find a place to take hold, they will not sur-

Regular mowing, water, proper fertilization and pest management will keep your lawn in tip top shape so

weeds won't stand a chance. But even the healthiest and best cared for lawns have spot weed problems.

Some weeds can be controlled during July and August but because grass grows at a slower rate during these hot months, bare spots left by dying weeds will most likely be filled by new summer annual weeds-such as crabgrass-rather than grass. These summer, annual weeds are even tougher to get rid of, and some, there is no control. It is best to wait for cooler fall weather to attack big weed problems. If weeds are a scattered problem, try spot treatment

Cisco and the oil wells appeared in newspapers last weekend. In case you haven't seen the article, we quote it as follows:

In the 1920s, Cisco was the heart of a booming oilfield.

The town's population swelled to more than 20,000. Young Conrad Hilton operated his first hotel here, a two-story, red-brick building that still stands. Some of the rooms were rented three times a day to oilfield workers toiling around the clock.

But by the 1950s only a few low-volume wells remained among the scrub oak, mesguite and cactus. The oil boom was over. The population had dwindled to about +,000 people trying to make a living from a largely unproductive, hilly range-land about 50 miles east of

"This area was well known to oilmen as a depleted field," Dallas oilman Don Hanvey said. "They said it had low pressure and low

and high volume. Hanvey, who specializes in finding oil others have overlooked, has drilled 13 wells in the Cisco area since January and struck oil or

gas in every one. "The other oilmen call me the Cisco Kid," he said with

All are relatively shallow free-flowing wells. Hanvey has one pump unit on the scene, but hasn't had to use

"We finished this one two weeks ago," engineer Harry Brooks said of the J.B. Boggs Lease Well No. 2, "It was flowing 1,500 barrels a day on a 2-inch opening."

Hanvey sells the oil to J.M. Petroleum Co. in Dallas. In addition, the gas from this well and others will be sold to Enserch, which is building a six-mile pipeline to the area. Hanvey said.
