LET US DIG FOR TREASURE

As a scouter and as a kid you loved those scavenger hunts; as a boy you enjoyed digging for pirate's treasure; and even as an adult you may have tried to locate old coins, rings and the like with a metal finder. There is a place where we can go and dig out the greatest of all treasures! Perhaps you have already guessed that it is the Bible.

The first scoops are the hardest because the earth's dirt is packed on top; and so it is with a beginner in reading the Bible for it is very difficult to understand as the devil is "on the spot" ready to take it from us in any way that he can. However, we can pray to the Holy Spirit to help us (Jn. 14:26), attend a Bible-believing church, listen to good radio and TV programs, get into one of the many home Bible Study courses of going through the Bible in one year, take advantage of such books as Dr. J. Vernon McGee's where Bible Scripture is explained verse by verse, read books on special subjects such as the "Holy Spirit" by Drs. Theodore Epp and Bill Bright. Since it is Biblical to help, edify and encourage others, why not share other names and helps, especially those in your own area.

Now that we have removed the hard surface, we can get into the treasure underneath.

"In Christ are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge for He is wisdom." (1 Cor. 1:30) Search for wisdom throughout the Bible for it is given to all men liberally. (Jas. 1:5) Solomon was not truly wise but a fool for he turned from God in his old age to sins of heathen wives, habits, pleasures and wealth, and found that all was vanity -- nothing without God. (Ecc.) There was another fool, too, that man in Luke 12:19-21 who had so many goods that he wanted to build bigger barns to store them in and then to take his ease; but that very night God took him in death and those things were no longer any good to him. "So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

Did you every buy surprise bags and then excitedly dug in your lists to see what was in them? Well, Luke 12:33,34 tells us how to store up treasures of alms (charity or love) in bags which cannot be stolen or corrupted and these things of great worth will be awaiting us in Heaven at reward time. God loves a cheerful giver and you cannot truly outgive Him, for as you give of your time, talents, compassion, prayers, patience, money, good words, witnessing and telling others about Jesus, and sharing goodies and possessions with others in need (even a bowl of soup), God's blessings are greater than your gifts; and love isn't love until it is given away!

"A good man out of the good treasure of the heart bringeth forth good things..." (Matt. 12:35). How do we have treasure in our hearts? We need to pray, "Create in me a clean heart"; in order to get rid of our old sin nature and to be filled with the new nature of Christ, for it is His Spirit which gives us the fruits of love, joy and peace for ourselves and to share; long-suffering, gentleness and goodness for others; and faith, meekness and temperance which we can render unto God. When we see others in need, we have the Good Samaritan within us and do not pass by on the other side.

As we dig deeper into the Bible, we find a most precious thing in these words: "If ye continue in my Word" (Jn. 8:31), or "If ye have love one to another" (Jn. 13:35), or "If ye bear

much fruit" (Jn. 15:8), "then are ye my disciples indeed."

The treasures of God's Word are so many, you will just have to search for them; but here are a few: the answer to all our problems, a lamp unto our feet (Ps. 119:105), a weapon of warfare (2 Cor. 10:4), power in our lives (Acts 1:8), God speaking to us (Heb. 4:12), a blessing (Deut. 30:19), spiritual growth and happiness (Prov. 16:20 and 29:18). If we keep His commandments, we will have favor, health, inheritance of glory, peace and long life (Prov. 3). If we keep the words of the Bible in our hearts and teach them to our children, and make them a part of our lives as we sit, walk, lie down and arise in the morning; then not only will our days be multiplied, but also those of our children. (Deut. 11:18-21).

If you meditate on the Word day and night and delight in it, and obey it, then according to Ps. 1:3 and Joshua 1:8 you will bring forth fruit and "whatsoever you do shall prosper." So that your life might be successful, I wish for you "good digging!"

City Council Votes To Suspend Gas Rate Hike

Cisco's city council unanimously approved a resolution Tuesday night which will suspend a proposed Lone Star Gas rate increase for 120 days, giving the city time to investigate the increase and see if it is fair to customers.

Council members also denied a proposal which would allow Lone Star Gas to go ahead and temporarily charge the proposed increased rates while the council is studying the resolution.

City manager Michael Moore reported Thursday that he was scheduled to be in Dallas Friday for a meeting with Don Butler of the Texas Municipal League

and Greg Tarasar of Touche Ross Associates. They, along with the city manager, were to go over the proposed Lone Star increases and try to come to some conclusion as to whether they are necessary.

City manager Moore is to report back to the council on their findings at the Tuesday, August 24, regular council meeting.

Mr. Moore also reported the council had a work session last Tuesday night on the budget for 1982-83, which is now being typed for final presentations to the council at regular city council meetings on September 14 and 28.

Cisco Baptist Assoc. Begins Seminary Extension Center

The Cisco Baptist Association has been certified to form a seminary extension center. An extension center is an opportunity for people to take courses in Bible, theology, religious education, etc. without going to an actual seminary. Diplomas can be earned or courses can be taken just for personal study and enjoyment. Classes are open to anyone; not just ministers and not just Baptist.

The center, to be known as Cisco Association Seminary Extension, will begin offering classes this September. There will be two classes offered. Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 7, will be "Principles of Preaching". On Thursday Sept. 9, a study of the General Epistles (I & II Peter, James, Jude) will begin. These classes will begin at 7:00 p.m. and end at 9:15 p.m. They will meet once a week at the First Baptist Church of Cisco.

There is a cost involved. Tuition is \$18.00 a course plus the cost of the required text. If you have access to the books necessary then you do not need to purchase them through the center. The tuition is used in the following manner: 1) \$12 to the main center in Nashville for all records and operation and 2) \$6 for the local centers expenses.

The two courses, books, and cost are listed below. We invite anyone interested in an intense but informal study to come on the opening night of the class and register. We will welcome everyone interested. Future courses and times will be publicized at appropriate times.

Cost: Tuition \$18 and books \$22.90 for a total cost of \$40.90.

Texas Industrial Commission's Chloe Chaddick Talks To Locals

The purpose of the Texas Industrial Commission is "to create jobs in the state" Chloe Chaddick told citizens in Eastland County this week.

The Commission offers many services, the consultant for T.I.C. explained, and keeping each community's profile up to date in the state computer is one of the main thrusts. The information is scanned to match prospective industries to the right areas, she said, and it's important that each town make sure that their latest information is on file with T.I.C.

In the area of financing, T.I.C. assists with industrial revenue bonds (which Eastland is presently developing its first project with), rural community development and start-up training financing.

T.I.C. arranged the Eastland County meeting in cooperation with Lone Star Gas Co. in its continuing and expanding effort to be of assistance to cities throughout the state in the quest for more jobs and payrolls for the state.

Ms. Chaddick's presentation provided a two-way feed of information: she explained T.I.C. and listened and recorded comments, goals and work of the individuals attendees so that she will be better prepared to steer industry prospects to the right area. She is one of four consultants in the state: she covers West Texas.

"Right now industry is on 'hold,'" she explained, "but as economic conditions clear, we all need to be ready to work toward creating

more jobs as expansion comes." She spoke Thursday in Eastland, Sweetwater and Snyder and was to be in Coleman, Brownwood and Stephenville Friday.

Attending the meeting Thursday at the Eastland Chamber office were Fannie Underwood of Gorman; Jerry Morgan and Allen Masters, both of Cisco; H.V. O'Brien, James Wright, Don Pierson, Lawrence Janeika, Lewis Tiner, Steve Haines, M.H. Perry, Mike Kiser, Ron Kenney and Don Bradshaw, all of Eastland.


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

One in ten Americans has an invisible handicap: the loss of their hearing. Some people literally suffer in silence, too embarrassed to admit their difficulty.

There is an organization, called the "Speak-Up Institute", that would like to change this attitude. The organization encourages the hard of hearing to tell people they need extra help in communicating.

Here are some guides that the Institute has developed to help those who have a hearing loss:

- (1) Don't shout. Search for a voice level that can be understood.
 - (2) Don't speak fast, but slowly and clearly.
 - (3) If you are misunderstood, rephrase your sentence.
 - (4) Do not try to converse if there is background noise.
 - (5) Stand so the person, to whom you are speaking, may see you clearly.
 - (6) Do not obscure your mouth with a cigarette, or hand, or while chewing food.
 - (7) Ask the person, who is hard of hearing, what you may do to enable them to hear you better.
- Most of all . . . Remember you could lose your hearing, honor the individual who cannot hear well and assist by remembering the above steps.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Enjoy the mellow goodness of fall pears. You'll certainly want to enjoy some right off the tree or baked in an old-fashioned cobbler.

PEAR COBBLER:
6 medium pears, peeled & sliced
1 T. lemon juice
3 T. flour
1 cup sugar
1/2 t. ground cinnamon
1/2 t. ground nutmeg
1 T. butter or margarine
Cheddar Cheese Pastry

Arrange pears slices evenly in a 10 x 6 inch baking dish; sprinkle with lemon juice. Combine flour, sugar, and spices; stir well and sprinkle over pears. Dot with butter.

Roll pastry to 1/4 inch thick. Cut into strips and arrange in lattice fashion over pears. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

CHEEDAR CHEESE PASTRY:

1 cup all purpose flour
1/2 t. salt
1/3 cup shortening
1/4 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
2 or 3 T. cold water

Combine flour, salt and cut in shortening with pastry blender. Stir in cheese. Sprinkle cold water over flour mixture and stir with fork until all dry ingredients are moistened. Shape dough into a ball.

With fertilizer getting more expensive due to rising costs, producers must continue to pay more attention to getting the most out of the fertilizer they apply. Everyone must assess his own situation regarding topdressing of summer grasses for additional forage to get the most from his fertilizer dollar.

Just how "good" is the hay you harvested this year? It's really hard to tell without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you

dollars supplemental feed or livestock condition. Feeding low quality hay without supplementation can result in livestock weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages. At the same time, feeding supplement with top quality hay may not always be necessary.

Only when your hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly starving without a supplement.

A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tests for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers are available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Dept., Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

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GORDON SPOT

Whether or not to topdress summer pastures is a commonly shared dilemma at this time of the year. Some producers like to wait for rain before topdressing while others prefer to put fertilizer out first.

First, fertilizer must be in the root zone before a crop can use it. If applied before a rain, it will be carried into the soil and both the fertilizer and moisture will be more effective than waiting until after the rain to fertilize.

Second, fertilizer will not lose its effectiveness if applied on dry soil during prolonged dry weather except for urea, which undergoes some hydrolysis reactions that can result in a moderate loss of nitrogen.

Phosphorus and potash needed for next year's perennial grasses can be applied this fall. This is a special advantage if cool season grasses or legumes are to be planted.

Late summer or fall fertilization of summer grasses with nitrogen also can produce additional hay and fall grazing once rains come. This can mean improved grazing and less hay needed to get livestock through the winter.

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Monthly Rebates To Texas Cities Are Running Above Last Year's Totals

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$97.9 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for August.

"So far, these monthly rebates of local taxes are running nearly 12 percent ahead of last year's totals," Bullock reported. "As we predicted last month, the oil glut has slowed down the pace of this growth markedly, especially in the places that were experiencing oil booms. But the general state growth rate is still strong and healthy."

Cisco received second in the net payments this past period of \$31,998.01 with last year's \$17,406.70 and the 1982 total to date there is \$151,357.86. 31.91% change, in Eastland County.

Eastland was first in the county, with \$33,772.53 net payment this year, \$29,754.71 last year and 1982 payment to date of \$159,697.03, a change of 40.79%.

Next in county order is Ranger with \$15,442.88 net payment this year, \$26,384.33 last and a 1982 total to date of \$96,977.09, a change of 15.35%, from last year.

Gorman city was next in the City Sales and Use Tax Allocation Summary from Bullock with \$4,775.86 a change of -5.53%, from last year's total of \$89,073.49, their total to date in 1982 being \$96,977.09 and \$6,789.52 in 1981, a 1982 payment to date of \$20,117.60.

Rising Star, last in the Summary from Bullock had a net payment of \$3,022.74 as compared to \$4,292.58 last,

their total to date is \$14,652.04 as compared to \$12,702.53 last; a change of 15.35% over 1981.

Eastland's total net payment in 1982 this period has been \$88,992.02 as compared to \$84,636.84 last; their payments to date amount to \$442,801.62 in 1982 and \$351,246.18 in 1981 to date, a net change of 26.07% to date.

Houston received the biggest share of the one-cent local sales tax with a check for \$20 million, based on taxable sales of \$1.96 billion by 51,166 business outlets. So far in 1982 Houston's payments are up 14 percent over 1981.

Dallas got \$11.1 million, bringing the total received during 1982 to \$53.6 million.

The City of San Antonio received a check for \$5.3 million, up 5.4 percent from last August's payment of \$5 million.

The City of Fort Worth and the City of Austin each received checks for \$3.3 million.

El Paso received a \$2.1 million check based on tax-

able sales of \$217.5 million; 9,912 business outlets.

Bullock also forwarded August rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$22.1 million, bringing the total received this year to \$115.1 million, up nearly 10 percent over last year. The San Antonio MTA got a check for \$2.9 million, bringing the 1982 total to \$14.2 million.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

No Additional Heavy Taxes On Oil

It appears that independent producers and royalty owners have escaped added direct taxation in the national Congressional process that may result in a 100 billion tax bill this year.

The Senate version of the bill, developed under the leadership of Senate Finance Chairman Bob Dole, passed July 23. This week, after about 18 days of lengthy sessions, the House agreed to adopt a similar measure. The bill is up for final approval.

During these discussions members of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association visited numerous Senate and House offices relaying the petroleum industry story opposing further direct taxation.

There was agreement that now was no time to endanger further the maximum development of domestic reserves. One of the most telling arguments for this position was that domestic drilling rig utilization had dropped this year. New tax burdens could aggravate the rate of decline to disastrous levels.

President Reagan supports the final version of this bill, which is called a "Tax Reform" rather than a "Tax Raise". Final passage is expected to be very close, with Senator Dole stating that a failure of the measure would be a "blow to the Presidency". It could also be a blow to independent producers and royalty owners, if Congressmen who had no knowledge of oil production wrote a new bill.

The IRS position that advance royalties and lease bonuses are generally not eligible for percentage depletion has been seriously undermined by a decision of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The 7th Circuit reversed a Tax Court decision (Engle, 76 T.C. 915) which had upheld the prohibition as it related to advance royalties.

Court Rules On Advance Royalties

Until 1975 it was assumed that advance royalties and lease bonuses were eligible for percentage depletion. Then the law was changed to limit percentage depletion to certain amounts of daily production (currently 1,000 barrels per day). The Internal Revenue Service then stated that physical extraction during the year payments are received was a prerequisite for claiming percentage depletion.

The Court of Appeals decision should also apply to lease bonuses, according to some tax advisors. Consult an advisor if you have received advance royalties or lease bonuses in years when the lease had no production.

Parker was being held on a July 8 driving while intoxicated charge when he escaped from the Eastland County Jail July 27. He was apprehended about two hours later.

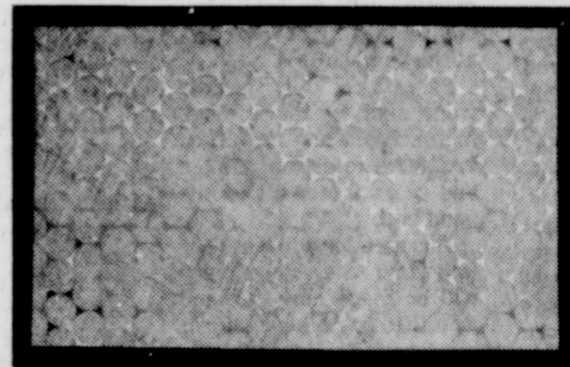
Jim Farrar was Parker's court appointed attorney. District Attorney Emory Walton prosecuted the case.

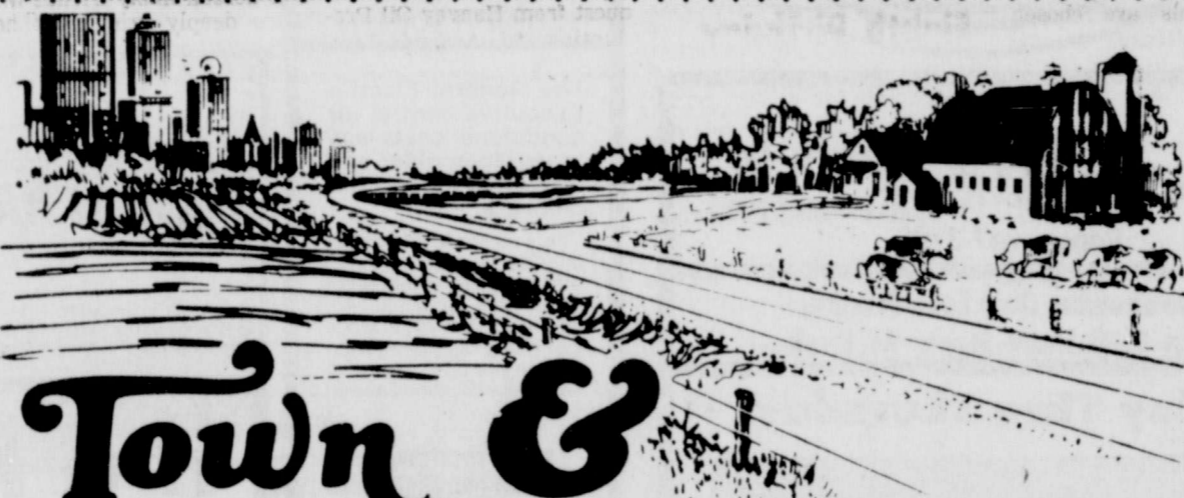

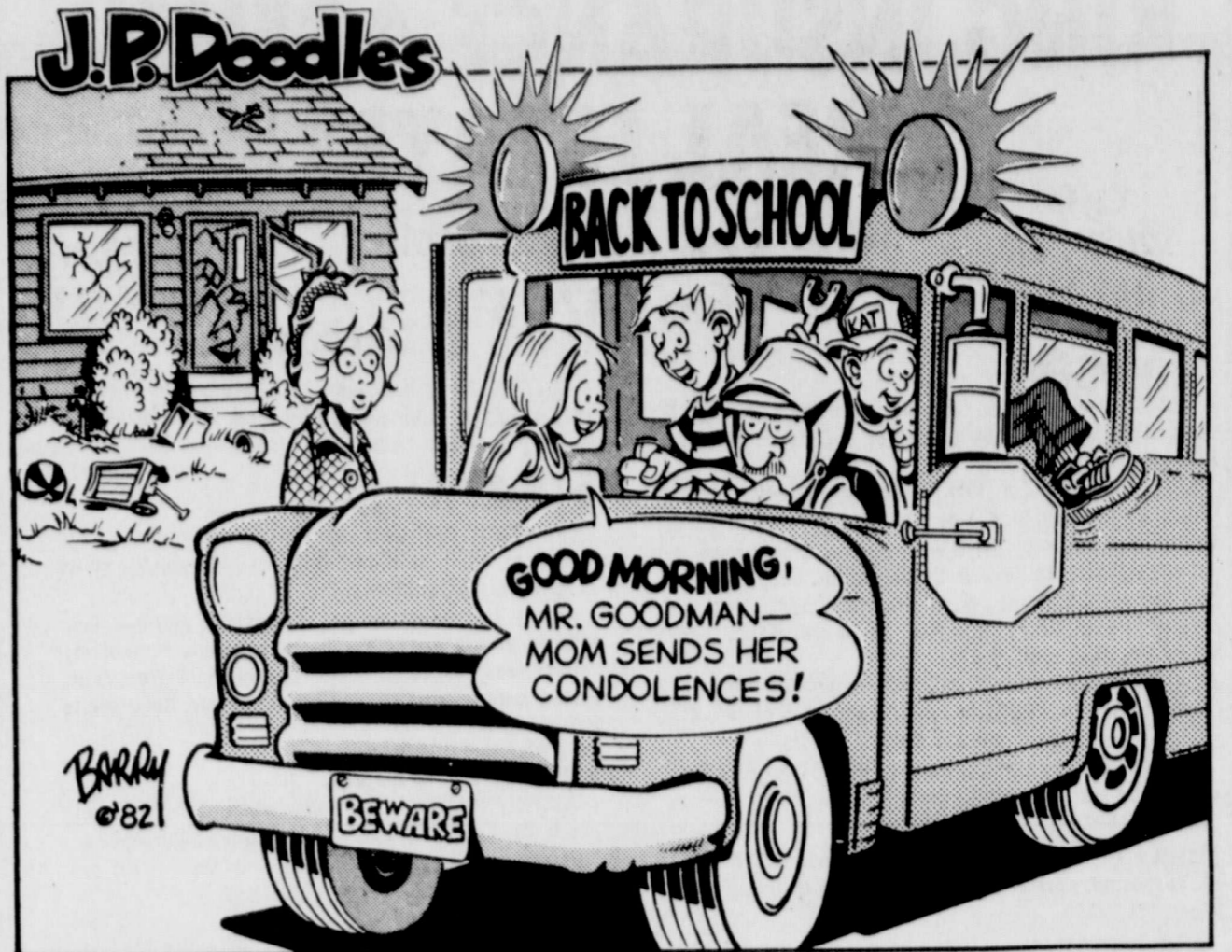

Pest Alert

THE CRICKET INVASION
 Gordon Woolam

Batten down the windows! Secure the doors! The annual attack of field crickets is eminent. Advanced forces have already appeared. The main attack force is being formed.

Crickets are attracted to lights which may account for their particular attraction to downtown areas, especially under street lights. Crickets enter buildings seeking a hiding place.

Crickets are general plant feeders and normally live and breed outdoors. They can damage garden plants and be a real nuisance inside a home or business. In addition to the annoying chirps, crickets can damage woollens, cottons, silks, synthetic fibers, furs and carpeting. They also feed on foods, leather and rubber products.

Field crickets lay as many as 150-400 eggs in the soil. These hatch into nymphs that complete their development in about 12 weeks. There may be as many as three generations per year.

Crickets control begins with sanitation as an important means of reducing cricket feeding and breeding sites. Eliminate weeds and dense vegetation around the house, as well as piles of bricks, wood and other debris where crickets hide. Insect-proof your home by caulking and weather stripping. Make sure all screens and doors are tight-fitting. Reduce nightlights while infestations are large.

Control of crickets outside buildings is necessary to prevent them from moving indoors. Sprays should be applied to foundation walls, window sills, crawl spaces, door thresholds and under garbage cans. Treatment of a 5 to 20 foot swath around buildings may also help. Treatment indoors should be restricted to residual sprays of baseboards in closets, under stairways and other cricket hiding places. Suggested insecticides for both indoor and outdoor control include diazinon, malathion, and Dursban.

COLORADO SPRINGS— Leaving Cisco for a vacation in New Mexico and Colorado, we put our travel trailer first in Buffalo Springs Lake Campground, a few miles southeast of Lubbock. And its a delightful place with excellent camping facilities.

The lake is surrounded by canyon walls, and the water pours from springs, keeping the lake at a constant level. Fishing is good, they told us. They have various facilities for the visitor.

NEXT STOP was Palo Duro Canyon State Park, which is located 12 miles east of Canyon and 25 miles south of Amarillo. The canyon park includes some 16,000 acres of land, a panorama of excellent color and beauty. The name "Palo Duro" is Spanish for "hard wood" and refers to the juniper growing there.

The park has a number of camp grounds and we were assigned to one four-water crossings deep into the park in an area where Kiowa Indians won a battle that historians called the last major encounter in Texas. In 1876, Col. Charles Goodnight established the first commercial cattle ranch in the Texas Panhandle and his crude mud shelter still stands near the road in the park.

An interesting afternoon excursion was a ride on the Sad Monkey Railroad, a miniature train that takes you through typical terrain of the park. The railroad gets its name from a nearby peak that is said to resemble a sad monkey.

The evening program at Palo Duro, of course, is the pageant "Texas", a musical romance of Panhandle history by Paul Green, nationally known writer and composer. The outdoor musical is produced by the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, a non-profit corporation, in cooperation with

Texas State University. Now in its 16th season, the musical has been applauded by more than 1,400,000 people in Pioneer Amphitheater, which was built as a memorial to the pioneers of the Panhandle in cooperation with the State of Texas. It is an official play of the State of Texas and has received international recognition. The night we were there (in company with Ed and Lillian Bradshaw of Cisco), 1,451 people were in the audience and they represented 16 states and six foreign countries.

The stage's background is canyon walls that provide excellent acoustical effects. There are as many as 50 to 75 singers and dancers on the stage at one time. They used a number of familiar songs to add to the story of the 1880 era when cowboys were laying foundation stones for the Texas Panhandle. Great lightings, soaring sound, excellent music and the like help recreate the blazing of a prairie fire, the crash of thunder and the flash of lightning -- all very realistically -- as background for this story of battles against change and dust and drought and storm.

Members of the cast are paid performers -- some with star rating. Fifty or more cast members are students of West Texas State U. It's a delightful show that you'll want to see if you get in the Palo Duro area. Understand they will show nightly except Sunday through Aug. 21st. Admission charges are \$4, \$5 and \$6 for adults. Mail ticket orders to Texas, Box 268, Canyon, Texas 79015.

FROM CANYON, we drove to Colorado Springs for a visit of several days. Had a tire blow out on the travel trailer and this marred the leisurely drive through scenic country.

August 22, 1982

THE MISCARRIAGE of justice in the John Hinckley case, which is only one example of how irrational the entire judicial system has become, has caused folks to begin thinking out loud and demanding that something be done.

That's the feeling we have found in listening and talking during a vacation trip into Colorado and New Mexico.

Over the past 20 years, it is the criminal who has become the beneficiary of the courts -- not the victim. For example, the Colorado newspaper we read told about five Denver men being awarded \$1,000 each by the State of Colorado because they had been imprisoned under crowded conditions -- a violation of their civil rights. Can you imagine that!

It took the attempted assassination of the president to point out how the most indefensible act of violence can be most legally defensible -- not guilty by reasons of insanity. Over in Oklahoma, the state legislature is changing that. A legislative proposal that seems destined to pass would change the plea of innocent by reason of insanity to guilty by reason of insanity.

Guilty by reason of insanity would be a lot more sensible than innocent by reason of insanity. Don't you agree? It is very likely that the Texas Legislature will consider that same proposition when it meets next January. A number of states have already banned insanity as a defense in violent crimes, and legislation is pending in others. People are literally demanding changes.

Straight out abolishment of the insanity defense would most likely please most of the people. This would eliminate all the psychiatric gobbledygook that no two psychiatrists agree upon anyway. It would be a step in the right direction.

The crowded condition of our country's jails and the over-loaded court dockets are the result of all this civil rights stuff. Penalize those

guilty of crime in an appropriate way and you'll go a long way toward earning respect for law and order.

NOW THAT WE've gotten that off our chest, let us report that the most delightful climate we've run across lately was the southern Colorado country last week. We spent a night at Monte Vista at altitude 8,200 feet. It rained a couple of inches or so soon after we got parked in a campground. And we used an electric blanket that night.

Next day, we drove on west and went through the Wolf Creek Pass at 10,850 feet. It was a beautiful drive through scenic country. Snow patches appeared on a few mountain tops.

Near Bayfield, Colo., we went to Lake Vallecito for a stay at a favorite campground. The altitude was still above 8,000 feet. It was delightfully cool, day and night, with a rain shower or two each day. It's not hard to understand why folks build and live in cabins and nice homes in that region.

AS WE MOVED on south, the temperature eased upward. And it was in the mid-nineties when we arrived at Albuquerque (where this was written). From here, our plans called for a stop in Ruidoso and then a visit with relatives in El Paso.
