

Council Approves Gas Rate Hike, Tax Rate

An ordinance granting Lone Star Gas Company a tax rate increase was approved on first reading, an ordinance establishing a 47 cent tax rate for city budget purposes was passed on final reading, and a decision to continue in the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch was voted at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

The gas rate ordinance, which will be up for a second and final reading next month, gives Lone Star Gas Company an increase of some 10.05 per cent in gross revenues. This was the first rate increase requested by the gas company in three years, City Manager Mike Moore said, and he recommended approval of the hike.

Wayne West, gas company manager, told the Council that the increase would enable the company to operate profitably. The council approved the raise by unanimous vote.

The rate ordinance, which will be published elsewhere in The Press prior to the effective date (within 30 days after final passage), adjusts rates, upward or downward, from a base of \$3.18 per MCF under a gas cost adjustment factor. For example, a customer using three MCF per month now pays \$14.48 and his bill would go up \$2.41 to \$16.89. The minimum rate of \$4 would go up to \$4.50. Big customers, using 25 MCF or more, would pay a slightly

less amount than at present. The tax levy for 1982-83 budget year was officially set at 47 cents per \$100 valuation in the final reading of the ordinance. This rate will yield approximately the same amount of money that the \$1.65 tax rate provided under last year's city property valuations, City nager Moore said. All erty in city, county and state was reevaluated under a state law during the past year. Under the reevaluation, property values were set at 100 per

Mr. Moore told the Council that the 1982-83 budget, which becomes effective Oct. 1, was now being typed and would be ready for anyone to see at City Hall next week. The budget was approved recently.

The Council discussed an ordinance that would establish a parking control zone with a two-hour time limit in downtown Cisco, but action was tabled until the measure can be rewritten to meet legal requirements.

The matter is expected to be taken care of at the next meeting. The Council recently voted to abolish parking meters, hence the need for a parking control measure. Plans call for limited parking on Hilton Avenue, from 3rd to 9th Street; and on both sides of 100 block of West 8th Street, East and West 7th Streets, East and West 6th Streets, East- and West 5th Streets, and East and West 4th Streets.

The parking limit will be from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m., Mondays through Saturdays. Violation would cost motorists \$2 if paid within 24 hours, or \$5 if paid after 24 hours but before nine days elapse. Fines not paid within nine days would be levied by the municipal court judge.

The Council set a special meeting for 7 p.m. Monday to consider a drilling lease problem facing Hanvey Oil Company, operators of oil operations on city-owned

Joe Wheatley, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce tourist and convention committee, reported that the CofC has received the sum of \$4,273 in motel room taxes. A state law permits cities to can be used only for promotion of tourist and convention activities.

Mr. Wheatley said the CofC committee has completed plans to publish 5,000 brochures in color with pictures advertising the Cisco area. He said they hope to have it in the hands of the printer by Sept.

The CofC committee also plans to purchase picture slide equipment to use in advertising the area and to update I-20 signboards regularly. Other ideas are being discussed. He added that "we plan to use the funds properly and judiciously.



He met his wife, Vida (Frazier) at an evangelistic meeting, and they were married in 1933. The couple have a daughter, Judge Dou Vena Knipe, who lives in Houston. They also have four grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren.

Vida Killion obtained a Ministerial license after her inarriage, and was ordained in 1944. The young pastors established churches in Greenville, Trenton, Whitewright, Tom Bean, Sherman, Talco, and Paris, Texas. They also pastored churches in Los Angeles, Dallas, Texarkana, Sulphur Springs, Ballinger, and then Cisco. They began work with the Cisco Assembly in 1969.

In addition to other duties, the Killions held evangelist crusades in the churches, taught Teacher Training Classes, worked with Vacation Bible Schools and Young People's Activities and furnished music for a number of occasions. During WWII Pastor Killion was a contact chaplain for the Armed Forces. Vida Killion, with talent in writing, provided original skits and programs as well as material for publication in Church magazines.

The Killions have contributed much to community life in Cisco. They have worked with the Senior Citizen's programs, have provided regular weekly programs for the Nursing Home, and musical programs in the Church. Vida Killion is a member of the Cisco Writer's Club and the Cisco Music Study Club. Both Pastors are members of the A.A.R.P., Senior Citizens groups, and recently became Charter Members of the Assemblies of God Heritage Society.

Pastor Killion was appointed as a Municipal Court Judge by the late W.b. Wright, Sr. on June 8, 1974. He served as a Court Judge for eight years, leaving the office in May, 1982.



Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Dr. Edward Weiss, director of the book entitled "Nutrition in Later Life" states careful storage and/or cooking of vegetables prevents loss of vitamins and minerals.

He states keeping peas and lima beans in their pods until used, saves nutrients and keeps them from drying out. He indicates vitamins, C,

B-1, and folacin are destroyed when added to the water while cooking. The practice, he says, started years ago because it helped vegetables keep their green color. The result was a bright green color, but important vitamins are destroyed. How we handle foods helps determine the amount of nutrients lost. Saving nutrients saves us

Dr. Weiss states minerals are rather stable during the cooking process, but like many vitamins, minerals can be lost when the liquid used to cook the food is discarded. To some extent vegetables are cut and peeled. He feels scarce tactics in preparation of foods will not be his function, but encourages "good common

sense" is needed in cooking. Next week we will review Dr. Weiss' thoughts in the storage process of foods.
