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

Live Marijuana **Plants Found At Cisco Residence**

City and county authorities confiscated 18 marijuana plants growing in a garden back of a residence on Avenue A in Cisco at 12:30 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 28, according to a report by Police Chief Raymond Blevins.

The raiding party, armed with a search warrant, was headed by Chief Blevins, Sheriff Johnny Morren and District Attorney Emory

Mr. Blevins said the plants, which were near maturity, were stripped of leaves that weighed 17 pounds wet. When dry, the marijuana yield would amount to five to six pounds worth some \$3,000, the chief said.

The residence was vacant although it had been rented. Nobody was at home or in the area of the house, Mr. Blevins said. He added that suspects are known and arrests are expected to be made.

The marijuana was taken to the DPS Lab in Abilene for analysis and distruction.

Farmers are encouraged to purchase crop insurance

In the view of many lenders, there's something farmers today Eastland County should be doing with money between the time they borrow it and the time they spend it: they should insure it. According to Ardell M. Kalmbach, All-Risk Insurance Director for Eastland County, more and more lenders are urging farm borrowers to carry a crop insurance policy large enough to at least cover their short-term production debts. Kalmbach points out that even though All-Risk insurance for wheat is now available primarily through private insurance agents, the policies continue to be fully backed by the USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. The federal government also pays up to 30 percent of the cost for farmers who qualify for the insurance.

"The premium subsidy and tax deductions make All-Risk insurance an extremely affordable way to be certain of having enough income to repay crop production loans when they come due and thus avoid additional interest costs," according to Kalmbach.

Wheat growers who carry insurance on their 1983 crops are offered a selection of yield guarantees as well as a choice as to the amount they want to be paid for each bushel of loss. This flexibility makes is possible to adjust their insurance coverage to their need for protection.

The deadline to obtain insurance on wheat in Eastland County is Sept. 15, 1982. Farmers can obtain a list of local insurance agents from the ASCS office in Eastland.

There was a time you could pass along the road and see a gasoline plant, most of which belonged to an independent oil operator. All of these small companies have long since been put out of business.


They control the price of the crude oil, refinery prices, wholesale, retail and pump prices. This is certainly a monopoly in the true sense of the word.

Energy savings that stem from laundry-room tactics can be dramatic, but laundry mistakes can become a pocketbook tragedy Know your laundry's performance capabilities and

limits before trying to save energy - at your own expense. Energy conservation in the laundry room starts with lower water temperatures

for the washer, but don't cooler switch to temperatures until you know how to use them. In water below 60 degrees F., detergents become ineffective. Also, lower water temperatures affect a granular detergent's ability

to dissolve. The colder the water, the slower a powder will dissolve. So use a liquid laundry detergent - or predissolve a granular one - if you want to lower water use temperatures.

You can't always use cool temperatures for the best effect, either. For removing certain soils, such as oily or greasy stains, hot water at about 140 degrees F. is a must Otherwise, heavily soiled

laundry may become gray and dingy if you wash it in cool or cold water several times. Cool-wash cycles definite-

ly have their place in today's complex world of taxtiles and advancements in treatments for them. Many washes require warm, cool or cold water because of color, fiber content or finish of fabrics.

tion tactic sometimes focuses on cramming washers and dryers too full of laundry items.

"standing room only" - they need "elbow room" so enough wash water and dry air can reach them. If you crowd them, clothes won't wash clean, and some may not dry enough.

Also, excessive abrasion of

washer is overloaded or when too-little water is used, and this can cause "pilling" or balling up of man-made

fibers on clothes. Bleach is another possible disaster in the laundry room as consumers use more of it to help overcome the 'dingies'' that result from using too-little detergent or too-cool water.

Some polyester/cotton blends and 100 percent cottons have chemical finishes that actually "grab and hold" chlorine bleach. These fabrics should warn you of this.

Read labels and follow instructions so you don't ruin them by trying to use bleach. For most all other fabrics, overuse or misuse of bleach will result in damage such as rips and tears. Again, read labels - especially the one on bleach containers. Always silute bleach

before it comes into contact with clothes.

When using a bleach dispenser, add bleach before loading the water with clothes to avoid accidentally spilling bleach on dry clothes.

Finally, make learning the ropes about laundry - and energy savings - a family affair. With more women

With the increasing cost of water, and in some areas the reduced availability of water, it becomes even more important to water the lawn correctly and when establishing a new lawn give consideration to those tur-



> The faster the lawn grows, the more water it requires. The new slow release fertilizers that contain materials like sulfur-coated urea or ureaformaldehyde as nitrogen sources do not tend to produe high growth rates. Heavy applications of fertilizers high in soluble nitrogen should be avoided. The use an an aerifier or coring device will aid in increasing movement of water into the soil. A surfactant or wetting agent may also aid the movement of water into high clay soils.

Ideally a lawn should be watered just as it begins to wilt. Most grasses take on a dull, dark appearance and the leaf blades begin to fold or roll. Grass under stress also shows evidence of tracks after someone walks across the lawn. A common bermudagrass lawn should be able to go at least 5 days between waterings. Early morning is con-

sidered the best time to water. The wind is usually calm and the temperature is



evaporation. The worst time to water is late evening because the lawn tends to stay wet all night making the lawn more susceptible to disease.

When a lawn needs water, enough should be applied so that the soil is wetted to a depth of 4-6 inches. One to 1-1/2 inches of water should wet the soil to a depth of 4-6 inches. If the water applications are too light and too frequent, the turf tends to

> become weak and shallow rooted which makes it more susceptible to heat and drought stress.






