Marijuana Harvest Worth Over \$8,000

A report from the Department of Public Safety's laboratory at Abilene showed that marijuana harvested in the yard of a vacant house on Avenue A in Cisco recently had a street value of some \$8,000.

Police Chief Raymond Blevins said the DPS lab report showed that the dry weight of the marijuana was nine pounds and a half ounce. The value of the drug is about \$60 per ounce, he said. The marijuana will be burned by the DPS.

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City Council Is Reviewed By Mayor

Mayor Eris Ritchie reviewed the work of the City Council since his election some 15 months ago in a talk last Wednesday 1:00 at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. Lion Loyal Lundstrom was program chairman and introduced the speaker.

Planning for water and sewer system improvements and passing a bond issue to finance the projects were the top accomplishments for the city during the period, Mr. Ritchie believed. He said "this was very definitely a positive step for the community."

As approved by a two-to-one vote by citizens of Cisco, the program included a sewage outfall project to relieve congestion, a water treatment plant and improvement for main lines, and sewage plant updating.

Mr. Ritchie said the contractor is about two-thirds complete in the sewage outfall line project and hopes to finish this work by Nov. 1st. This will relieve congestion in the north and west areas of the city, he added.

The water system improvement program will be done in three parts. In the first stage, new 12-inch main lines will be laid from the College Hill reservoir to the overhead water tower in south Cisco. This will allow the water department to use as much pumping equipment as might be needed to meet any demand for city water, the mayor said.

The second stage will be building a new filter and water treatment plant at Lake Cisco, and the third stage will be new six and eight inch line loops in several areas of the city to provide constant water pressure, Mr. Ritchie said. Cleaning and repairing the water storage facilities at College Hill and the overhead tank are planned, he added.

It might be necessary for the city to use condemnation proceedings to obtain land for a new sewage disposal plant, Mr. Ritchie said. He said that negotiations are continuing to buy suitable land and, hopefully, it won't be necessary to use legal means to obtain it.

As approved by the voters, financing for the program has been arranged in a large part through loans from the First National Bank, the Texas Water Resources Board, and the Farm Home Administration. The city still hopes to obtain a 75 per cent grant for the sewage plant project, the mayor said.

Mr. Ritchie said that engineering details are underway and that action in the water program is expected before the year's end.

Increasing taxes last year was a distasteful task that the Council could not avoid, the mayor said. He said this has allowed the city to pave 12 blocks of streets this year, to replace a number of water lines, and operate in the black. The current fiscal year ends this month and the city will have money in the bank, the mayor said.

The Council is awaiting results of oil and gas well developments on city-owned land, Mr. Ritchie said. The operator of the oil company is optimistic that the project will be worth a lot of money to the city, he said.

Two wells have been completed on the old airport tract, a third is in the completion stages at the Municipal Airport, and a fourth well is planned, Mr. Ritchie said.

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

Dr. Kevan Blaser, Ranger Veterinarian, says there have been several cases of blackleg in the last few weeks in Eastland County. Livestockmen should never assume their farm ranch is free of this fatal disease of young cattle. The most practical defense is vaccination of all calves. Normally, calves should be vaccinated when they are 4 to 6 months of age. If blackleg has been a problem on the farm calves should be vaccinated at a younger age and revaccinated in 6 months. Replacement animals should be revaccinated after 12 months.

Speaking of vaccinations, calfhood vaccination is one of the most effective ways to prevent Brucellosis. All replacement heifers should be officially vaccinated when they are 4 to 12 months of age. This must be done by an approved veterinarian or official of the Texas Animal Health Commission. The official vaccination is provided free to cattle owners. This is a practice that should not be passed up.

We welcome the new veterinarian to Eastland County. Dr. Paul Duncan has begun practice in Eastland.

The sixth 1982 screwworm case in Texas was confirmed August 31. Location of the newest case was in Starr County, a long way from Eastland County, but local ranchers and household pet owners are reminded to continue to check their animals for possible cases. It's been a long time since screwworm have been a problem, and we sure want to keep it that way.

Homeowners can help prevent future plant disease problems in flower beds and gardens by practicing some simple preventive maintenance this fall.

Plant disease organisms usually overwinter in infected plant parts such as leaves, stems and rotted or dried up fruits. Removing infested plant material from flower beds or gardens will help reduce next year's disease problems.

Remove infected leaves and fruits from plants and prune stems or branches back six or more inches below the last sign of infection. Use disinfectant dip such as a 10% solution of household bleach for the pruning instrument to avoid mechanical spread of the disease.

Fall plowing can follow this clean-up. Deep burial of plant residues is one method of disease control that has been successfully used by farmers for many years.

Diseases can't be completely eliminated by clean-up practices, but gardeners and homeowners who clean up their gardens and flower beds in the fall will have fewer disease problems next year.

Homemaking Hints

Meals on the run, mid-morning breaks, after-school snacks, TV munching and bedtime snacks. Frequent small meals are replacing the traditional three and consumer surveys confirm Americans are eating more food between meals. Snacking has become part of the America way of life.

Sound familiar? Don't fight it! Just make it your way to eat nutritious snacks. Kick the bad snack habit and BE A SUPER SNACKER!

Snacks are an important source of everyone's daily nutrient and calorie intake. Although habit influences food selection more than health, eating nutritious snacks can be a choice, not a chance. Through a state-wide campaign, the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is introducing a BE A SUPER SNACKER! program to promote snacking as a super way of keeping up with good nutrition.

Super snacks are delicious, a snap to fix and super for you--whether you're on a restricted diet or trying to lose weight; whether you're on the go at home or at the office.

Who Needs Super Snacks? Young children generally are so active that they are constantly burning up energy and calories. They have small appetites and small stomachs so they can't eat enough in one meal. Children need enough energy to last until the next meal and still be able to play, grow and feel well.

Active teen-agers often are too busy to sit down to eat a full meal. Those involved in athletics require an extra large number of calories

to meet their energy needs. Super snacks can help balance the meals teenagers miss, as well as supply extra energy.

Older adults often feel more comfortable when they eat several small meals. Overweight people may find they can better control appetite when they eat five or six small meals a day to keep from getting too hungry and "pigging out" at the next meal. Underweight persons, on the other hand, sometimes have trouble eating a large meal and can eat more if the food they need is spread out with snacks between meals.

People in poor health, particularly those who have an ulcer or gastric intestinal problems, generally respond better to treatment when they eat several small meals during the day.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK: What shows up at a party, in addition to today's Texans? Snacks, of course, and party snacks can be super and nutritious too. Here are some easy, nutritious dips to have at your next party.

Fiesta Meat Dip
1 pound hamburger
1 pound pork sausage
1 pound American cheese
1 10-ounce can Rotel tomatoes
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt

Brown and drain hamburger and sausage. Cube cheese and melt in double broiler (over low heat). Add tomatoes to melted cheese. Combine meats with cheese mixture. Season. Serve hot with vegetable dippers or

whole wheat crackers.
Spinach Dip
1 10-ounce package frozen spinach, chopped
1 8-ounce package cream cheese, cut in cubes
3 tablespoons milk
2 tablespoons butter
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
6 slices bacon, crisp cooked, drained and crumbled
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Crackers or vegetable dippers

Cook bacon, drain, crumble, and set aside. Cook spinach according to package directions; drain well. In a saucepan over low heat, cook and stir together the cheese, milk, butter and

nutmeg until the cheese has melted. Add the spinach, half the bacon, and the tablespoon of lemon juice.

Robert Tucker - 'Green Pastures' At Home

On Sunday, Sept. 12 Robert Tucker, 84, will give the history of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church to a large group celebrating its 90th anniversary.

It is fitting that Tucker, who lives on a farm 2 mi. east of the Church, give the account. Not only has he been a member of this Church for 70 years, and held numerous Church offices, but the story of his whole life is closely tied to the Church.

But as he stands straight and tall before friends, family and former Pastors, Tucker cannot be blamed if the past overwhelms him for a little while. Other people - other times. But the same peaceful setting: a hill 9 mi. south of Cisco, with big oak trees framing a white rural Church.

There was a brush arbor north of the building in those other days. An arbor made of willow limbs from the lovely little creek the

pioneers had named Dead Horse. An arbor which was always ready for the August meetings, when the crops were 'laid by'. Wagons and buggies tied under the oaks, with local families climbing from them in the twilight.

The girls, shy and demure, with long ruffled dresses. The boys, lean and brown from hard work, standing outside the rim of lantern light, wondering how to approach the girls.

And those sermons, usually on the basics of sin and salvation, were outstanding, as were the young preachers who gave them. Such as A.J. Morgan, a minister who had baptized young Robert Tucker that August so long ago in 1912.

"A lean, gaunt, evangelistic type," Tucker describes Morgan.

But his work must have been effective. For Pleasant Hill had long periods of growth under such preachers, before people started moving away from the rural communities. Hunting those "greener pastures", some of them said.

Robert Tucker was one who stayed on, serving in such offices as Sunday School Superintendent, Class teacher, and then Deacon for 33 years.

Robert Tucker's parents, M.C. and Annie Shannon Tucker, were Charter Members of the Pleasant Hill Church. Both the Tucker and Shannon grandparents were very early settlers of Eastland County. Grandfather Leonard Green Tucker arrived in 1879, coming from North Carolina by way of Arkansas. His wife died in Comanche during the trip, but he came on with his children and made a home for them. The family settled on the Leon River in the Pleasant Valley community, S.W. of Eastland, and the Shannon family lived nearby.

M.C. Tucker married Annie Shannon, and moved across the hills to the Pleasant Hill Community. They acquired land about a mi. S.E. of the present Church building.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church was organized Dec. 3, 1892, in a schoolhouse which stood 100 yds. north of the present cemetery. Besides the Tuckers, Charter Members were: E. Dawson, Amanda Dawson, L.P. Stevens, H.F. Reynolds, L.E. Reynolds, and Mrs. M.J. Reynolds. H.F. Reynolds was chosen as the first pastor.

In 1905 the Church building, by mostly voluntary labor, was erected on its present site. In Dec. of the same year, after a Christmas program, the building burned to the ground during the night. The next morning the men of the community met under the oak trees and decided to rebuild.

Later, in 1909 the pioneer school was moved to the N.W. corner of the Tucker farm. It was closed in the 1940's, and the site became a home for Mr. and Mrs. M.C. Tucker.

Robert Tucker was born on the homestead in 1898. His brothers and sisters were: Lelia, Lillie, Roy and Winfred.

Like many men of his time, M.C. Tucker was skilled in a number of things. He basically knew agriculture - cotton, grain and cattle. He was also an excellent carpenter, and constructed homes in the area. Robert Tucker, too, grew up learning how to make a living farming. He especially liked good horses and cattle. But he developed a number of other skills, and used them at different times.

Robert Tucker believes he is one of the charter depositors of the Cisco National Bank. He received \$37.00 from his grandmother Shannon's estate in 1917, and put it in this bank. He has kept an account there since.

On March 2, 1919 he married lovely Johnie Hardin,

who also lived in Pleasant Hill Community. Pastor P.D. O'Brien performed the ceremony. Best man and matron of honor were Clarence and Nina Hastings.

Tucker was farming that year, and says it was one of the most prosperous times he has seen. Cotton was 40 cents per pound, and peanuts \$3.00 per bu. He decided to stay with Eastland County farming, and meet the good and bad times which came.

In 1926 he bought the land where he now lives. He improved the house and crop land, and it became a most attractive place.

Robert and Johnie Tucker had four children: Billy Tucker of Abilene, who is now the manager of Watson's Oilfield Supplies, Bobby Tucker of Carbon, a well-known farmer, Juanita Tucker Anderson of Wichita Falls, a retired school teacher, and June Tucker Hicks, who is an English, Math and Resource teacher at Cisco.

When he farmed with teams, Robert Tucker worked around 100 acres. But he began to mechanize as soon as that type of equipment was available, and farmed 300 to 400 acres. He eventually built up his holdings to around 600 acres. He was supposed to have "retired" from farming several years ago, but he still raises feed, cattle, chickens, and a garden. He welds, drives his pickup, and keeps busy in various other ways.

During the years Tucker worked off the farm when good opportunities presented themselves. He helped clear up gravel after the building of the Lake Cisco dam, using a good pair of horses to haul the material out to be spread on roads. From the 1930's until around 1968 he was a "Crop Reporter" for the A.S.C.S. office, measuring land to see if crops were within their allotment.

In reading the history of the Pleasant Hill Church, however, it can be seen that a lot of time of Robert and Johnie Tucker went into religious projects. In July, 1944 the group voted to tear down the old building and replace it, and the building committee for the new Church was Robert Tucker, Troy Lamb, Robert Hageman and Jess Hagan, with Pastor Lee Fields as Chairman.

The present building was finished and dedicated in 1945, and has continued to serve the congregation.

Lee Fields was one of the outstanding Pastors remembered by Robert Tucker, all of whom were in the Tucker home at one time or another. Among the others were P.D. O'Brien, who later went to West Texas and served large Churches in Colorado City and Big Spring; Elvin Skiles, who became President of Hardin-Simmons College; Dr. Leon Woods, the present Pastor, who is Vice President (Ret.) of Howard Payne College; Lloyd Elder (today a member of the Committee of the Southern Baptist

Assn.); R.L. Shannon and Bruce Stovall.

Johnie Tucker died in 1978, when the couple had been married more than 59 years. It was a sad milestone for Robert Tucker, but he still kept his faith. Daughter June Hicks moved back to his attractive rock home beside the Carbon highway. While she teaches, Robert Tucker keeps up his various projects, as well as visiting with the family.

"I have six grandsons and one granddaughter," he says proudly. "And six great-grandsons and one great-granddaughter."

A large number of the Tucker relatives met in a reunion recently. It was held at Camp Inspiration at Eastland, and the group voted to make this a regular affair.

Robert Tucker has also retained his faith in a certain political party.

"I can say that I have always voted Democratic," he states. "I believe the Democratic Party is for the common people."

On related subjects he says:

"The farmers would be all right if they could get a fair price - something which would equal other commodities.

"There have been a lot of changes during my lifetime. It is a lot easier now to do the work of farming, but it costs a lot more too.

"The clearing of the land in Eastland County - that is a big change too.

"As for the Church - I used to see as many as 20 baptised after a revival at Pleasant Hill. You see a lot less now, everywhere.

"We need more young people in our Church, like there used to be."

Tucker mentions that he enjoys studying the Bible every day, and has done so for many years. He quotes favorite verses with the sureness of long familiarity.

And suddenly one gets the feeling that this oldest active member of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has found some secrets of really successful living.

Right here at home, too.



SAT and ACT Test Schedules

High school juniors and seniors who are thinking of going on to school after graduation will want to take note of the national test date schedule for the ACT Assessment Program and the Admissions Testing Program of the College Board (including the SAT and the Achievement Tests).

Students who want to take the ACT or the SAT on the first 1982-83 national test date must have their registration materials completed and mailed before the September 24th (SAT) or October 1st (ACT) deadline. The full 1982-83 schedules of test dates and deadlines are as follows:

ACT: Test Date Oct. 30, 1982; Regist. Deadline Oct. 1, 1982; Test Date Dec. 11, 1982; Regist. Deadline Nov. 12, 1982; Test Date Feb. 12, 1983; Regist. Deadline Jan. 14, 1983; Test Date April 16, 1983; Regist. Deadline March 18, 1983; Test Date June 11, 1983; Regist. Deadline May 13, 1983.

SAT: Test Date Oct. 16, 1982; Regist. Deadline Sept. 24, 1982; Test Date Nov. 6, 1982; Regist. Deadline Oct. 1, 1982; Test Date Dec. 4, 1982; Regist. Deadline Oct. 29, 1982; Test Date Jan. 22, 1983; Regist. Deadline Dec. 17, 1982; Test Date March 19, 1983; Regist. Deadline Feb. 11, 1983; Test Date May 7, 1983; Regist. Deadline April 1, 1983; Test Date June 4, 1983; Regist. Deadline April 29, 1983.

The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$9.50, the SAT \$10.50. Students can obtain ACT Assessment and SAT registration packets, as well as other college and career

planning materials, from the counseling office at Cisco High School. At area test centers on national test dates it will take about three to four hours to complete the ACT or the SAT. In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet is available in the counseling office. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT or the College Board at cost.

Information reports resulting from the tests and the questionnaire are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as

to those colleges and other institutions specifically designated by the students. It is recommended that students take these tests during their junior year or early in the senior year so that resulting information will be available in time to be of maximum assistance to students and their counselors in education and career planning. Students who are uncertain if they need to use the ACT or the SAT, or are concerned about the location of the nearest test center, are urged to contact Mrs. Mouser in the counseling office at C.H.S. It is noted that the ACT will be given at Cisco Junior College on the February date.

THE FLAT-RATE TAX AND HOUSING

by Richard R. Muth
Dr. Muth is a professor of economics at Stanford University and an authority on the housing industry. In recent weeks there has been considerable discussion about substituting a flat-rate tax for our current personal income tax, and several bills which would do so have been introduced into the Congress. The flat-rate tax, under most proposals, would retain or even increase the personal exemption in the current federal income tax. It would abolish most or all deductions, however. The current system of taxing additional income at ever-increasing rates would be replaced by a constant rate of tax throughout the income range.

Though new to many, the flat-rate tax is really a rather old idea. Nobel prize winning economist Milton Friedman suggested it in his book *Capitalism and Freedom* twenty years ago. Moreover, until inflation lifted Americans into progressively higher tax brackets in the seventies, the federal income tax was in effect a flat-rate tax throughout all but the very highest income levels. This was because as the taxpayer's before-tax income rose so did his total deductions, offsetting the higher tax rate applicable to his additional income. Among the most important of these deductions are those for mortgage interest and property taxes paid. Not only do these reduce the degree of progression in the personal income tax, but they reduce substantially the cost of living in an owned home.

Under the personal income tax in this country, the taxpayer need not report the imputed rental value of his home as income. He can, however, deduct mortgage interest and property taxes paid from his taxable income. Together, interest and property taxes amount to about three-quarters of the cost of living in an owned home. Thus, if a taxpayer pays 20 cents additional tax for each additional dollar of income, he pays only 85 cents per dollar of his housing costs after tax. Since the level of taxes is fixed ultimately by the level of government expenditures, lower taxes for homeowners mean higher taxes for renters.

The personal tax treatment of income from owner-occupied housing is often justified by the social benefits of homeownership. The tax advantage, however, is a very inefficient way of inducing more households to become homeowners. Most studies

suggest that the sizeable tax advantages of owning one's home have led only about 4 per cent of the nations households to become homeowners, increasing the extent of homeownership from 62 to the current 66 per cent. Data contained in a recent Congressional Budget Office study indicate that roughly \$50 billion of tax revenue is lost currently because of the way income from owner housing is taxed. The tax subsidy is thus of the order of \$15,000 per year for each additional household induced to become homeowners. Most of the subsidy - about \$1,000 per year per homeowner - goes to those who would have been homeowners without the tax subsidy. Surely more cost effective ways could be found to stimulate homeownership.

Another effect of the income tax treatment of homeownership is that it draws capital away from the industrial sector of the economy. Somewhat surprising to many is the fact that about half our country's fixed capital stock is in the form of residential real estate. I have estimated that, because of the tax advantage, the capital invested in the typical owner-occupied house is almost 15 percent greater than it would otherwise be. Our non-residential capital stock is about 5 percent smaller. The tax advantage for owner housing thus runs counter to the current Administration's concern for increasing investment in the industrial sector of the economy.

If a poll were taken, the vast majority of economists would almost certainly support eliminating the current tax treatment of income from owner-occupied housing. To attempt to do so, however, would encounter strong opposition. If the tax advantage were removed, the prices of houses would fall, in effect imposing a tax on the wealth of existing homeowners. Clearly, there is little likelihood of adopting a flat-rate tax system which is detrimental to the interests of two-thirds of the electorate. Nor would there be any economic advantage

to changing the tax rules for existing housing. For there is no way in which the extra resources invested in existing houses would be recovered and put to other uses.

Changing the rules could, however, reduce the amount of future investment in owner houses and increase the amount of new investment in the rest of the economy. To do so, however, would still be difficult in the absence of a radical revision of the personal income tax.

The flat-rate tax offers such an opportunity. Moreover, it could provide the substantial advantages of simplicity for the taxpayer, equity among taxpayers and efficiency for the economy as a whole.

Broadening the tax base to include the imputed rental value of owner housing built after its enactment would be an important step toward securing the potential advantages the flat-rate tax scheme has to offer this country.



Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

For the past two weeks we have reviewed a book by an outstanding nutritionist, Dr. Edward Weiss.

We have noted his ideas in saving the minerals and nutrients through the preparation and cooking process.

He states the preparation and cooking habits of a cook will determine the nutrient losses or retention.

For example: when whole potatoes are boiled in their skins, they retain almost all of their Vitamin C or B-1, then if the skin is eaten it is an excellent source of fiber; or when you prepare a green salad save as many of the outer leaves as possible, as these leaves generally are higher in calcium, iron and vitamin A.

"Vegetables," he states, "should always be the last on the stove and the first off, as this keeps their color, crispness and flavor."

He feels vegetables should be cooked with as little water as possible, and this helps to keep the important nutrients.

In summary he states, "Vegetables are an important source of nutrients, color and flavor. Treat them with care and you will get what you paid for."

Outlook For City's Oil Wells Told By Writer

Prospects for the City of Cisco to realize substantial returns from oil and gas development on city-owned land were reviewed in an article by Frank Trejo in The Fort Worth Star-Telegram in their edition for September 9.

The Trejo article follows: CISCO - Residents of this West Texas city soon may be paving their streets with trash. Actually, the pavement in all likelihood will be made of the usual material, but the funds to pay for the work will come from an unusual source - the city dump.

The dump is the site of two oil wells recently drilled by a Dallas oilman who has drilled a total of 14 wells in the Cisco area since January. Three of the wells have been drilled on land leased from the city, including two at the dump and one at the airport.

"The two wells at the dump are already producing oil," said Cisco City Manager Michael Moore. "Of course we're very excited about it because we're expecting our first royalty payment around the first of October."

Although there are no firm estimates of how much revenue the city will get from the oil leases, the oilman, Don Hanvey, said the city should receive a "minimum" of \$200,000 a year just from the wells already drilled.

That's not bad, coming from land once covered with trash.

Hanvey said that although the Cisco area has been the

from companies such as Fort Worth's Western Company, has been able to develop ways to "stimulate wells" with chemicals.

The result, he said, has been 14 free-flowing oil wells.

"We have one well out there that produces about \$51,000 of oil a day," Hanvey said.

Cisco officials said they hope to cash in on some of that action.

"Of course, there are lots of things that must be taken into account, such as the price of oil, the cost of getting it out of the ground and how the wells hold up, but we're optimistic that the money from the wells can help out our capital improvements program," Moore said. Funds would likely go toward projects such as sewer and water system improvements and street work.

About 50 percent of the city's streets currently are unpaved.

Understandably, Moore said, there were no objections earlier this year when Hanvey's company expressed an interest in leasing the land to drill for oil. City officials were only too happy to have the landfill put to good use.

Although the drilling company has proper facilities for the wells at the city dump north of town, Hanvey said there is no getting away from the fact that "the place is a dump."

"We're sitting out there drilling our well and right next to us will be some guy shoveling trash," Hanvey said. "They take the trash out there, cover it up and we drill through it."

The success of the recent drilling has given Hanvey reason to be optimistic. He said he plans to drill as many as 60 more wells within the next two years on the 4,000 acres he has leased in the Cisco area. For some portions of that land it will be the third or even fourth time drilling has been attempted, he said.

That, he said, is why he likes to call them "Hanvey downs."



Approximately 2,700 permits to hunt deer in nine state wildlife management areas will be up for grabs when the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department holds a drawing Sept. 30 to determine the lucky winners.

About 40 permits will be issued for mule deer on the Sierra Diablo WMA, 32 miles northwest of Van Horn in Culberson County.

The remainder of the permits will be for white-tailed deer on eight areas. Areas to be hunted are Chaparral, in Dimmit and La Salle Counties; James E. Daughtery (formerly Chole Canyon) near Three Rivers in Live Oak and McMullen Counties; Engerling, near Palestine in Anderson County; Kerr, near Hunt in Kerr County; Pat Mayse near Paris in Lamar County; Gene Howe, near Canadian in Hemphill County; Somerville Unit, near Caldwell in Lee and Burleson Counties, and Walter Buck, near Junction and Kimbell County.

To participate in the drawing, hunters may submit application cards. These are now available by writing the Parks and Wildlife Dept. at 4200 Smith School Rd., Austin 78744, or by calling the toll free information number 1-800-792-1112. Applications are also available at many department offices around the state.

Costs for those successful in the drawing will be \$20 for a two-day whitetail hunt and \$40 for the mule deer hunt.

All applications must be submitted to Dept. Hdqts. in Austin by 5 p.m. Sept. 27. The drawing will be held at 10 a.m. Sept. 30.

Pest Alert

USE PESTICIDES SAFELY

Homeowners faced with decisions on buying and using one or two of the hundreds of pesticides available for home and garden use need to couple some common sense with a few precautions to minimize pesticide waste and abuse.

The first precaution and probably the most important is to carefully read the label and understand the effectiveness and the limitations of the pesticide.

During each application or use, prepare only as much pesticide mixture as you will need for that particular job. When containers are emptied in preparing the spray mixture, rinse them several

times and add the rinse water to the spray mixture.

All containers, including empty ones, should be kept under secure storage until they can be properly disposed of.

One way to dispose of containers is to wrap them in several thicknesses of newspaper, seal the packages with tape or twine, and then break the packaged container. Do not attempt to crush, break, or puncture aerosol cans, just wrap them and place them in the garbage.

In short, the safe use of pesticides begins with well planned purchases and concludes with proper disposal of used containers.

Using pesticides on animals which have been formulated for plants can be dangerous. Don't do it! Although the same material may be used in some cases on animals or plants, the concentration and chemical formulation may be vastly different. On the other hand, there may be considerable difference between insecticide formulation may contain solvents that speed up

absorption by animals and results in poisoning.

Trouble comes, only when label directions are not closely followed. Pesticides are safe when used as intended by the manufacturer and in accordance with his directions.

Apply insecticides only when needed for the control of a specific pest problem. Use only recommended pesticides and at the exact rates suggested. Read the label prior to each use of the material and follow the instructions to the letter.

Also, use care in treating crops to be used as livestock and observe all limitations and precautions. Be careful when treating for other pest problems in areas open to livestock. Particular caution is advisable when treating around water and feed facilities or milking equipment and supplies. Keep pesticides stored in their original containers so there will be no confusion when they are used.

And again, be sure to read and follow the instructions given on the labels of all pesticide containers.

NOTICE TO WATER CUSTOMERS OF HIGH TURBIDITY

Dear Customer:

The City of Cisco during the month of July, 1982, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.
