with no increase in the ad valorem tax rate and is based on total anticipated revenues of \$1,166,223.00, with total anticipated expenditures in the same amount. This total includes Revenue Sharing funding and a grant to the Airport Fund from the Texas Aeronautics Commission. For this upcoming fiscal year the Eastland County Appraisal District has rendered an estimated total valuation of real and personal property of \$55,643,537.00. This is a 288 percent increase over last year's valuation of \$19,287,823.00. This new evaluation revises the existing tax rate of \$1.35 downward to \$1.47 per \$100.00 assessment based on a 100 percent assessed value.

The estimated tax roll for Cisco was set at \$264,152.00 on Monday of this week by Mr. Moore.

City manager Moore continued in his council address, "No increases in the current water, sewer or sanitation rates are projected for the implementation of the recommended budget. However, upon the implementation of the substantial water improvements project to begin in the upcoming fiscal year, a significant increase in the water rates will be required to pay for the increased bonded indebtedness. At that time, I will present to the City Council a budget amendment indicating the increased water

revenue and expenditure requirements. Also, except for adjustments due to promotions, this budget includes a general across-the-board cost-of-living increase of 7.5 percent for all employees. "Included in the proposed budget is a detail of expenditures for the City's anticipated Revenue Sharing funds in the amount of \$54,078.00. This is the last year of the three-year Revenue Sharing allocation authorized by Congress in 1980. As in this last year, all Revenue Sharing funds are designated for capital investment expenditures for both the General and Utility Funds. Also included in the Airport Fund detail of revenues and expenditures is a grant from the Texas Aeronautics Commission in the amount of \$15,200.00. This grant will be for the continued development and improvement of the Cisco Municipal Airport, in particular repaving of the airport apron area.

"In summary, this budget represents a comprehensive program of municipal operations for the City of Cisco for the upcoming year. While this budget is extremely "tight," with proper administration and good fiscal management, this budget should enable the City to continue to improve its position in regards to the quantity and quality of service rendered to the residents of Cisco."

Warren Newberry has served as executive director of the Texas Farm Bureau since February of 1972.

In this position he is the chief administrative officer and business manager of the Texas Farm Bureau and Affiliated Companies.

TFB membership in 1972 totaled 136,943 families. Today, it is 276,247.



A native Oklahoman, the TFB executive director was reared on a cotton, wheat, and beef cattle farm near Lone Wolf, Oklahoma. He still maintains an active interest in the management of this farm. He graduated from Lone Wolf High School in 1942 and attended the University of Oklahoma.

Newberry operated the family farm until joining the staff of the American Farm Bureau Federation in 1953.

He was the first president of the Oklahoma Junior Farm Bureau, and also served as vice chairman (in 1950) and chairman (1951) of the American Farm Bureau Federation Young Farmers and Ranchers Committee.

In 1953, he was employed by the American Farm Bureau Federation as director of Farm Bureau young people's activities, from which Farm Bureau's Young Farmers and Ranchers Program developed.

In 1956, he was assigned to work with the Southern states as area field services director. He held this position until May of 1970 when he became the director of the field services division of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the position he held when he became Texas Farm Bureau executive director.

During the period that he served as area field services director with the AFBF, Newberry resided in Vernon, Texas, where he was an elder in the Christian Church.

Newberry and his wife Jewell live in Waco, where he is active in Waco Rotary. He is an elder and past chairman of the Board of the Lakewood Christian Church, and has been appointed a trustee of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.

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Articles From Young People - Recipes For Coping

WORD of GOD

(Editor's Note: Although this article is about Cisco young people, I believe their writing is also representative of the depth of thought found among High School students in all the Eastland County schools. Young people want correct information and good judgement with which to meet the problems of society.)

What do young people think about these days? Very mature, contemporary subjects, judging by articles written by the spring of '82 English Class at Cisco High School.

The teacher of this class, Josephine Cleveland, was so impressed by the quality of work from the students, that she passed some of the themes on to me for reading. I agreed that the articles were interesting, and that each of the students had talent in the field of communication.

One thing which was very apparent was the difference in scope of the subjects I had been expected to write about in High School, and the subject these students had worked with.

I recalled how disgusted I used to be during Essay Writing Contests in the County or District meets when we were sequestered in rooms and supposed to expound on such subjects as:

"I've Just Washed My Hair, and I Can't Do Anything With It." Or "Moonlight - And My Favorite Song."

Young people of today are as sheltered from the adult world. That probably has had as well as good points, yet all of us need information about situations we may face.

Robert Gorr wrote on "Hypnosis". Linda Justice wrote about "Television, Its Influence on Children". Glen Boles reported on "Suicide". Tricia Rich wrote on "The

Mafia", Candy Canada wrote on "Rehabilitation", and Michael Williams wrote about "Alcohol, Pleasure or Foolishness?" Williams' article has excellent original art work, and will be published in full in all the papers. With the rise in alcoholism and alcohol-related deaths, the message in this article is urgent.

"Mafia", by Tricia Rich, is a chilling collection of information about a sinister facet of life. Not only in America, but internationally. The author quotes a number of sources, and brings out such sobering statements as:

"Mafia, an Italian word of etymology, denoting the criminal bands which conducted a campaign of lawlessness and violence in Sicily in the nineteenth and early twentieth century -

"When the purge began, many fled to the U.S., where they again took up their nefarious ways....

"On 24 January, 1889, the Mafia made its presence known in America for the first time. Vincenco Otrunuo was knifed and thrown into the 16th Street Canal in New Orleans.

"There have always been two things demanded of the Mafia hierarchy - absolute obedience and absolute silence.

"What makes organized crime different from all other types is just what the name implies - it is tightly organized. Families are tied together in an intricate network. This close cooperation multiplies its powers."

Tricia Rich goes on to describe how the Mafia is organized, and how the organization acquires and uses its money.

"The largest single source of revenue for the syndicate is gambling on horse racing and other sports events, in the numbers lottery, and in the casinos in areas where gambling has been legaliz-

ed."

"The net profit from gambling operations is estimated at about seven billion dollars a year.

"The second largest revenue producer for organized crime is narcotics. The syndicate grosses more than five billion per year from selling heroine and other hard drugs."

Here are the statements which give me a worse jolt than the previous ones:

"What does organized crime do with its enormous wealth? It is investing in legal businesses..."

Some of the businesses listed are advertising, music recording, wholesale foods, banks, airlines, liquor and beer distribution.

"Suicide", by Glen Boles, is another sobering article. The U.S. doesn't have the highest rate, however, we learn that Hungary is the highest, with Austria, Japan, East and West Germany and the Scandinavian countries following right behind. But with 25,000 to 35,000 self-inflicted deaths in this country each year, we really have nothing to brag about.

"Suicide is the 10th cause of adult death in this country," says Boles. "It's the third cause on the college campus and in the armed forces.

"The all-time high rates in the United States were in the early 1930's. The lowest suicide rates have come during war times.

"The rate among American men is three times what it is among women.

"The suicide rate is lowest in the Deep South (except for Florida) and is highest in the far west. The American city with the highest rate is San Francisco."

The author discusses the possibility that some people have "suicidal tendencies". These tendencies can show up in such practices as "dangerous sports or hobbies - excessively fast driving -

"The 6th Commandment says: 'Thou shalt not kill', and Christian doctrine for fifteen centuries has applied this to self killing as well as to the killing of others."

In "Hypnosis" Robert Gorr tackles a subject which is probably as mysterious as that of the suicides. In a thoughtful 10 page article he brings forth some interesting statements.

"Hypnotism is the act of producing a hypnotic trance... which is a change in a person's conscious awareness..."

"Hypnotized persons are different from sleeping persons because they can be active... They can remain quiet... but usually perform acts suggested by the hypnotist..."

The article goes on to say that hypnotism has been used as an aid by athletic coaches. It has also been used to help persons remember things which they saw during times of great stress, such as a license plate number seen during the kidnapping of the Chowchilla, Calif. school bus.

The use of hypnotism in solving crime is also discussed.

"If hypnosis in the courtroom or police station seems rare, the situation probably is destined to change."

Another use of hypnosis is in a medicine, whether in relieving pain, or in treating anxiety and destructive behavior patterns.

"Hypnosis doesn't stop the pain process, but it does alter the perception of awareness of the pain, and so stops all conscious suffering."

With a brief sketch on learning how to practice hypnosis Robert Gorr concludes his informative article.

"Television has been a powerful influence on recent generations of children," states Linda Justice in her article. "Study after study has indicated that more

hours are spent in front of the television set than in a classroom -

"Very young T.V. watchers don't see any difference between the flickering images of programs, and those of commercials."

"Through the situations portrayed on television, youngsters are exposed to values that may not agree with those you want your children to have."

Linda Justice discusses some of the controversial aspects of television, as to programming and other things. She concludes:

"It has been estimated that by the time a teenager graduates from High School, he will have watched 15,000 hours of television. That's approx. 3,000 hours more than he will have spent in school!"

"Even if we choose to ignore the quality of the material viewed, the amount of time spent being passively entertained is staggering.

"Is it any wonder that some children emerge from High School illiterate, that achievement scores continue to decline, and that a growing number of students lack the basic skills necessary to function effectively in our society?"

Candy Canada, in her article "Rehabilitation", deals with a totally different aspect of life, that of how the physically, mentally, emotionally or socially handicapped person can learn to cope with today's society. She discusses the role of the counselor, explores the

changing world of mental retardation, and recreation for disabled persons.

In "Learning to Live Again" the author explores the idea that "adjustments are necessary, when an individual's disability is such that a full recovery of a function is not possible."

The conclusion is that "Psychotherapy... may be needed to enable the disabled to believe that life is still worth living."

"I'm not certain that psychotherapy could ever totally pull this trick for me, but one thing I am certain of. These young people are not

among the bunch who have watched too much television, and are "functionally illiterate". Nor will they drop out of college the first year, as so many do, because they have no skills in communication. I predict that they will continue to write articles about the current scene, which is not always the flower garden I wish it was.

And it was a nice retirement present for teacher and librarian Josephine Cleveland - having a batch of good articles turned in all at once!

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91st DISTRICT COURT GRAND JURY REPORTS TO EASTLAND COUNTY

TO THE RESIDENTS OF EASTLAND COUNTY:

We ask each and everyone to become actively involved in helping find a solution, and encourage everyone to cooperate in the apprehension and conviction of the individuals involved. In addition, we encourage each succeeding grand jury to review the situation and evaluate any progress made.

The primary beneficiaries of our efforts will be our children and grandchildren. However, if we continue to ignore the problem, hoping it will go away, some of our children will be harmed and eventually we will all suffer the consequences.

TO THE CITIZENS OF EASTLAND COUNTY:

Drug traffic can be stopped in Eastland County. I have been working with the Grand Juries of Eastland County for some time regarding the drug problem in the county because it is evident that the problem is getting worse. Several years ago, a jury assessed a 99 year prison sentence for delivery of a marihuana cigarette and that sentence scared the dope pushers. Afterwards, the Texas Legislature reduced marihuana possession of less than 4 ounces from a felony offense to different misdemeanor offenses, depending on the amount possessed.

When the state legislature reduced the possible penalties of various drug offenses, it appeared that the public became somewhat apathetic about the drug problem. There are some who contend that smoking an occasional marihuana cigarette is no worse than a youth drinking an alcoholic beverage. That contention is incorrect. In the first place, it is not in the best interest of a youth's health and development to drink alcoholic beverages or occasionally smoke "pot" because of the possible consequences and long term effects. In the second place, seldom, if ever, does a person go from alcoholic beverage consumption to "speed", LSD, heroin or other strong drugs, but it is certainly not uncommon for a person to go from smoking "pot" to harder drugs.

Ten years ago, drug usage existed primarily among those persons in their early twenties or older. Today, we are seeing drug usage in teenagers. Within the last year, we have committed youths, as young as 13, to a state institution as drug addicts. You do not have to wait until your loved one or friend is arrested for drug usage to ask for help. There is no such thing as an innocent experiment with drugs because any usage of drugs creates a potential for further usage with the ultimate probability being addiction. In fact, the State Bar of Texas has developed a program to warn pre-school children how to avoid the dangers of marihuana and other drug usage and this program is being given to pre-school children in various parts of the State.

Fortunately, a majority of our Eastland County youth know and realize the dangers of drugs; nevertheless, anytime a person, regardless of age, becomes involved with or addicted to drugs, not only is that person affected but also his or her family and friends.

The various law enforcement officers and school officials are concerned about the drug problem; however, there are certain high court rulings which make it difficult for the law enforcement officers to be as effective as they would like. Consequently, I am glad that the citizens of this county are becoming more aware of the drug availability in the county and are willing to become actively involved in the "war on drugs". Any help that any citizen can be is welcome and gratefully appreciated. Too, the assistance and involvement of any citizen may help save another person from the physical, mental and financial problems that do result from drug usage.

Please help in the "war on drugs"; the life you save may be one you know and love. You, the mother, father, loved one or friend of a young person, can help stop the drug problem by becoming familiar with the various warning symptoms of potential drug usage. For instance: Do you know where your child is tonight?

To The Citizens of Eastland County:

Mr. O'Brien, Editor of the Eastland Telegram, has asked that I give this letter in regard to marijuana and drug use in Eastland County. This unquestionably is the single most important danger in our community. Marijuana and drug use must be supported by money. The only way users can obtain money is by committing theft, burglary, robbery and other crimes.

The single most dangerous myth in our country today is that marijuana is a harmless drug. This myth is based largely on research done in the late 60's and 70's. Scientist now know that marijuana is an insidious, subtle and very complex substance, and that moderate to heavy use can damage the lungs, alter the structure of brain cells and produces serious psychological and psychosocial effects. Some would argue that the use of marijuana does not lead to the use of other more dangerous drugs. This simply is not so. For example, it has been proven in other areas that among the 50% of high school seniors who smoked marijuana 43% used one or more additional illegal drugs. Among youngsters who don't smoke pot, the use of other drugs is unknown.

Throughout the State it is shown that during the last three years the age for marijuana use has steadily decreased. In many communities eleven is the average starting age.

I sincerely feel if we can stop this before it is introduced to the school children, by this I mean beginning at the elementary level and nipping it in the bud before it gets out of control with our teen-agers.

Marijuana leads to the use of other drugs such as "crystal", "kitchen crank", and other drugs being sold that in many instances the seller has no idea what he is selling.

I want the parents to realize that my office wants to help. When we have the cooperation of the parent and it is brought to our attention as soon as any indication is shown that the child is using any drug, we can help. There are facilities that we, through recommendation or through the courts, can obtain and affect the healing and curing of the use of the problem. There is excellent counseling available as well as the Vernon Drug Center for teen-agers. We have been able to help a great many of our teen-agers by assisting them in becoming involved in the counseling and or getting them admitted to Vernon's Drug Center.

My hope and I believe the biggest step that I can take towards stopping this abuse is by a one on one relationship with the young people through the school system by having a deputy working specifically in the preventative stage by visiting our schools throughout this County on a daily basis. The fact that an officer is around, available not only to the school but to the students, will do more toward curtailing and stopping the use of marijuana and drugs among our school children and the community than all of the arrest and convictions combined.

In short, I believe in preventative enforcement. That takes cooperation from each one of us. If you feel your child is involved or has a drug problem, please call me, let me try to help.

College Bound Student Advised Of Test Dates

Juniors who are interested in going to college after graduation should take note that the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholastic Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) will be given on Tuesday, October 19, 1982, at Cisco High School.

The PSAT/NMSQT gives students a chance to find out what the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like and can be used to predict scores on the SAT. It also helps students in planning for college. Further, students who opt to participate in the College Board Student Search Service have an opportunity to hear from colleges that they might not otherwise learn about. The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students who wish to participate in the nationwide scholarship competitions administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Students in competition for this scholarship awarded in 1984 must take the PSAT/NMSQT in 1982.

Before the test, students will receive the PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin which contains a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions. In December, students will receive a Report of Student

Answers which displays the correct answers and the student's responses as well as scores. Schools will return booklets at the same time so that students can review the original questions. Students will also receive About Your PSAT/NMSQT, a booklet containing information on interpreting PSAT/NMSQT results and on general college planning.

The fee for taking the 1982 PSAT/NMSQT is \$4.25 per student, to be paid at the time of registration. Fee waivers may be requested for students from low-income families who cannot afford to pay the fee. Students may register for the test in the counselor's office before October 6th. Students requesting fee waivers must register before September 27th.
