Mayor Issues Statement Regarding Cable Television

Mayor Eris Ritchie has issued the following statement relative to the current promotion of a premium channel service by the local cable franchise:

"I believe I can speak for not only myself, but for the Mayor Pro-Tem and most if not all the Cisco City Council in stating that we were caught completely by surprise when the cable company began putting the premium channel signal into their distribution system. This came entirely without advance announcement, and was very poorly handled in my estimation."

"I have personally asked the cable company to immediately remove the signal from homes which have not specifically requested it, but they have declined to do so. However, they have stated that any cable subscriber wanting to have the signal blocked from their home

may have this accomplished by calling the company's office. After their initial two-week free signal promotion, then of course it will be blocked from all homes that have not indicated that they want to purchase the service."

"We strongly object to the manner in which this promotion was initiated. The impact could have been considerably less had there been ample forewarning by mail or in the news media, so that parents could have been prepared, and also so that they could have requested in advance that the signal not be put through their particular connection. My objections have been voiced to the cable company both in personal conversation and in writing. We regret the situation with which many parents in the city were confronted, and we very much hope that similar incidents will not occur again."

Southern Television Responds To Cisco Mayor's Statement

To: Cable Subscribers, Cisco, Texas

Subject: HBO

There seems to be a misunderstanding in Cisco about the new movie channel that has been placed on channel 2. I would like to take a moment to try to clear up a few things.

(1) No one has to have HBO on their television if you desire not to subscribe to this service. Within the next two weeks to thirty days we will "trap" out HBO from all homes that do not wish to keep it.

(2) Mayor Eris Ritchie has demanded that we cut HBO off immediately and give it only to those subscribers that request it. I very much appreciate his concern and position but it is imperative that he and others with similar feeling understand that this company, or any company, will not make an investment on a product and not try to sell that product. The method of advertising in this case is simply to let you, the viewer, see the product and decide whether or not you wish to keep it.

(3) Southern Television went before the Cisco City Council last year to get our franchise renewed. Before we could get approval our council demanded, in writing, that we would have HBO or a similar movie package on the cable within one year. Under these conditions our franchise was renewed Oct. 13, 1981.

CJC-RJC Football Game Is Just Another Notch In History

It's billed as the Fifth Annual Zone 9 Lions Clubs Benefit Bowl—but on the field, it'll be just another notch in history.

That's the annual meeting between the Cisco Junior College Wranglers and the Ranger Junior College Rangers. The action gets underway at 7:30 p.m. Saturday in Buckaroo Stadium in Breckenridge, but it's really a continuation of a life-long tradition.

The series between the two clubs started back in 1947 when the two teams met "officially" for the first time. CJC won that encounter, 20-0. Through the years, the Wranglers have been able to hold a slight edge—but the gap is closing.

Ranger has dominated the series for the last nine years, winning 12 of the 15 games played, including last year's

30-21 victory. CJC last won in 1980 when the Wranglers escaped with a 14-12 victory. The only other CJC win came in 1974, 14-6.

The longest win streak in the series belongs to CJC, with 14 in a row, coming from 1961-68. The Rangers ended the streak in the second game of the 1968 season with a 23-21 victory.

CJC is undefeated going into this season's battle, having won three in a row, while RJC is 1-1. The Rangers dropped a 17-7 decision to Kilgore Junior College Saturday night while CJC defeated the Texas A&M JV 13-6 Thursday night. Ranger

has a 27-0 victory over Henderson County Junior College this season while CJC has wins of 34-18 over the McMurry Indians JV, 21-12 over Tyler Junior College and 13-6 over the Texas A&M JV.

"We were surprised by Saturday's game (Ranger and Kilgore)," CJC head coach Bob Keyes says. "We thought Ranger would win."

As far as the Ranger team is concerned, Keyes and his staff are looking for a good contest between the two clubs. "They (RJC) have excellent size in the line. They have a running back with good speed and, defensively, their linebackers run well, and their secondary has good speed," Keyes adds.

The main thing Keyes is worried about is their loss to Kilgore Saturday. "They're going to be out to prove something with their loss last week. They'll be mad," Keyes reasoned.

Keyes also noted that turnovers may be the key to the game. "It will be a close game—dead even. It may just be whoever gets the breaks who come out on top."

"We'll try to avoid having their line fall on us," Keyes said as he spoke of the size of the Ranger offensive line.

As has been the case in the past, anything you read on paper can be just about tossed out when these two teams meet on the football field. The Fifth Annual Zone 9 Lions Club Benefit Bowl should be no exception.

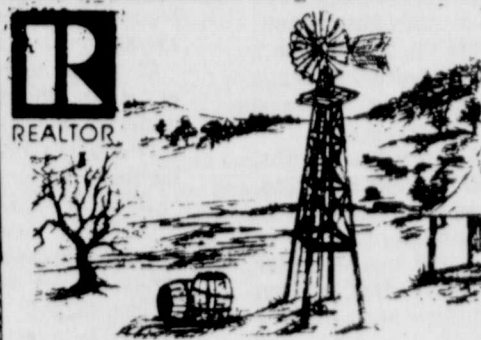

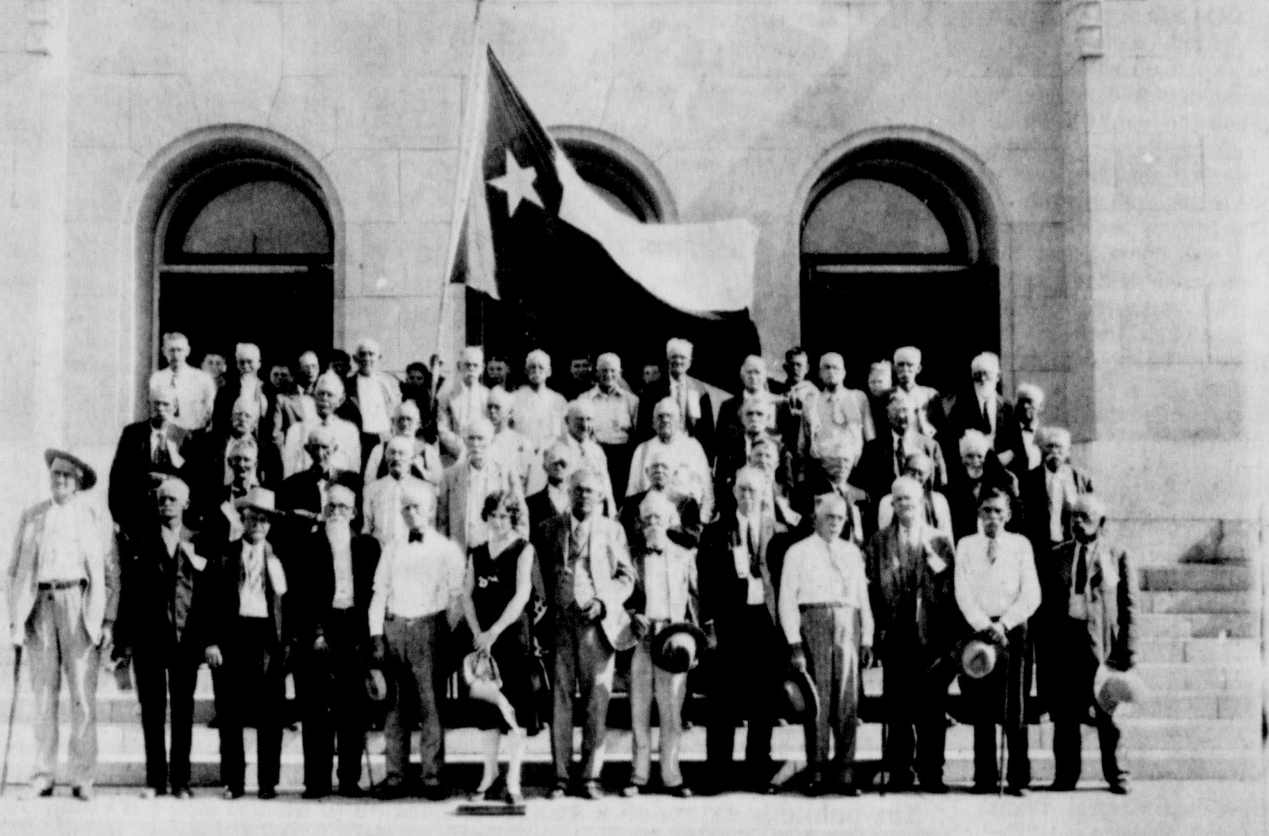

CITIZENS JOIN "WAR ON DRUGS"

The Gorman Police Department, in cooperation with a citizen committee, and in conjunction with Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney's "war on drugs", announces the formation of a program providing for rewards for information leading to the arrest and indictment of persons involved in certain types of crimes.

The ever-growing incidence of drug-related crimes in our community is a cause for concern for each and every one of us. Most citizens are not aware of the drug problem in Gorman, with the majority feeling that this type of problem only exists in larger cities such as Dallas or Fort Worth. The Gorman Police Department, in 1981, confiscated over two pounds of marijuana and varying amounts of methamphetamine ("crack" or "crank"), biphentamine ("Black Mollies"), Quaalude ("Ludes"), and several different types of "Speed", as well as paraphernalia for using or preparing these

substances. The amount of controlled substances and paraphernalia that has been confiscated thus far in 1982 has already surpassed that of 1981. A visit to City Hall by every concerned citizen is encouraged. There, in the police department office, you will see just a small portion of these confiscated items.

Most people have a mental image of the typical drug user... long-haired, bearded black leather jacket, tattoos, riding around on a motorcycle in dark alleys, shooting heroin or cocaine into their veins. This is the type of drug user we see on TV, but it is not an accurate picture of the real-life user. Most of the drugs and paraphernalia that was confiscated in Gorman last year was taken from high-school and junior high-school students! One packet of marijuana was taken from an eleven-year old child! Where do our children get it? They get it from people who do not have a conscience; people who have found a fast way to make money and

don't care what the consequences are. We have drugs coming into Gorman from Ft. Worth, Ranger, Cisco, and several other places. They bring these drugs into Gorman and sell them to local dealers, who then sell this poison to our children...or what's even worse...they give it to our children in hopes of developing a future customer, once the child gets hooked on the drug. These people, the dealers, are hard to catch. They are aware of the location of the people, at all times, and they are smart enough to keep their "merchandise" well hidden. We the concerned parents, concerned business-men, concerned church members, concerned citizens, need help in ridding our community of these people, and that is the purpose of the Crime-stopper Program. Through the program, we can offer money in exchange for information that will help us to put these "child-poisoners" behind bars, where they

belong. But in order to do this, we first have to raise the money for the reward fund— Three concerned citizens, Darrell Dossey, James Mears and Brent Lasater, are in charge of administering the program, and constitute the committee that will make the determination of when a reward is deserved for information that leads to arrest and indictment for drugs and other serious crimes. The article is signed by a large number of Gorman citizens and business firms.

Those concerned citizens who wish to help in our efforts to STOP CRIME in Gorman may do so by being alert to suspicious activity and reporting it to the Gorman Police Department at 734-2730. A fund has been started at First National Bank in Gorman, and those wishing to contribute may send your check to: GORMAN CRIMESTOPPER FUND, c/o First National Bank, Gorman, Tx. 76454.

State Comptroller Reports

Reports are in from the office of Bob Bullock, State Comptroller, listing the monthly and annual State Sales Tax being returned to Texas cities.

Eastland has \$18,990.53, which is considerably above

the \$12,617 for the comparable time last year. Cisco is up to \$12,617 from \$8,816.47, while Rising Star collected \$1,556.62 in place of the 0 collection at this time last year. Ranger and Gorman are running lower than during the same time last year, with \$8,321.31 for Ranger, compared to \$13,763.38 in Sept. '81. Gorman has been returned \$825.75 in comparison to \$1,140.44 this time in '81.

On an annual basis, Eastland County is up 25.07% from last year, 1982 payments to the County to date have been \$485,112.91, as compared to \$387,682.97 for 1981.

Percentage wise for the year, the town of Eastland has increased its returns 41.45%, and Cisco 32.71%. Rising Star has increased 27.06%, and Ranger 2.39%. Gorman has a -6.65% in '82 as compared to 1981.

Some of the increase in State Tax revenues can be accounted for by inflation, but much of it reflects the added growth and disposable income of this area.

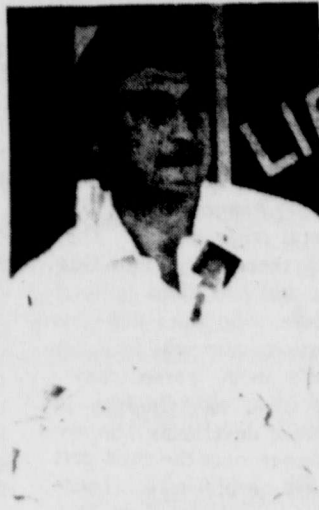

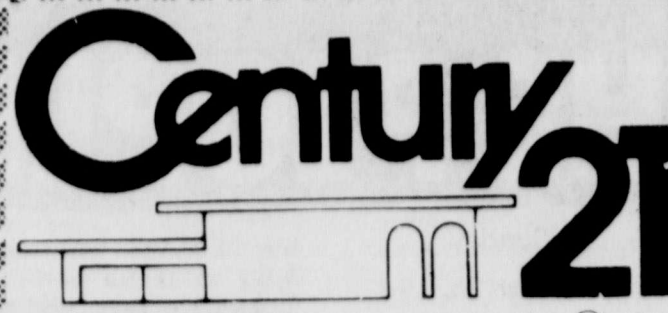

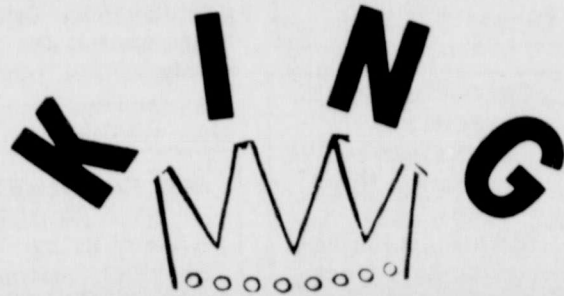

'Battle Of The Budget' Comes To Happy Conclusion

For almost 1,000 older workers in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program, the "battle of the budget" came to a happy conclusion with the recent congressional override of the President's veto of a supplemental appropriations bill.

The bill provides money for a variety of programs and agencies ranging from the defense department to NASA to Title V of the Older Americans Act, which funds TFU Green Thumb and other senior employment programs, according to Diane Parrish, Green Thumb state director.

Speaking to 128 Green Thumb workers at a training session in DeLeon on September 23, Parrish said the Congressional override "was decisive" in saving the jobs of more than 54,000 Title V workers nationwide. The workers are all 55 and over, low income, and provide services for libraries, schools, senior centers, and museums.

"Without the override, the only hope would have been yet another appropriations bill," she said, "and there were no real guarantees that another one would have been passed and signed in time to keep the program going." The new bill funds the program through June 30, 1983.

Green Thumbs had already received letters informing them that their last day on the job was to be Sept. 24. Parrish said the letters had to be sent out because "there was no assurance that both houses would override the veto. What we've seen is a minor miracle." The override vote in the Senate was 60 to 30, exactly the two-thirds majority necessary.

"One more vote against

the appropriations bill and the dismal news in your letters would have been all too true," she said. "And I'm afraid we all know that there aren't enough jobs out there in the private sector for 54,000 older workers."

Green Thumbs from Eastland County attending the training session at DeLeon were Leora Bean, Elva Notgrass, Jo Phillips, Bonnie Snyder of Cisco and J.O. Elmore, Gertrude Richardson, and Alta Stickland of Eastland. Ruth Cartee, Senior Citizens director for Cisco and Eastland, also attended the meeting as did several other sponsors of the district.

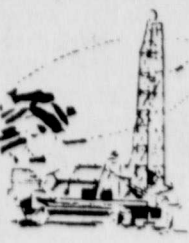

Oil and Gas Report

Location has been staked by Cauble Drilling Company of Albany for a 2,000 foot Eastland County oil wildcat. The explorer well will be known as the No. 2 1st National Bank, Albany. It is in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC RR Survey 11 miles south of Cisco.

Orinxo Oil Company of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. McCracken, a projected 1,100 foot wildcat for oil or gas, one mile south of Romney. The venture will be in a lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Survey.

Buck Wheat Resources, Inc. of Eastland has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Spencer, a 4,000 foot wildcat, 12 miles southwest of Cisco. The operation will be in a 20-acre lease in Eastland County's Maryann Clark Survey.

The No. 7, 8, 9, and 10 V.P. Simpson, three developmental tries in Eastland County's

ty's Hawkeye Field, are scheduled to be spudded 1.5 miles northwest of Romney. With projected total depths of 1,350 feet, the wells will be in a 243-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey. Mercury Exploration Company of Ft. Worth is listed as the operator.

A 350-foot developmental well is planned by Continental U.S. Exploration, Inc. of Dallas at a drillsite five miles west of Cisco, Eastland County. The location is in a 326-acre lease in the BBB&CRR Co. Survey. Well's designation is the No. 8 Brown. It is in the Eastland County Regular Field.

Pumping 76 barrels of crude per day, a new producer has been finalized in the Madewell Field by Nimrod Operating Company of Cisco.

The location is in a 35-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, 5 miles north

of Nimrod. Well's designation is the No. 5 J.N. Broyles. The well was perforated to produce from an interval 1,358 to 1,362 feet, total drilling depth was 1,438 feet. The pay zone was entered at 1,356 feet.

EnRe Corp. of Cisco has revealed plans to drill a developmental probe in the D.R.S. and Tee Jay Fields, 10 miles north of Cisco. The well will be located in a 97-acre lease in the TE&L Survey and is to be designated as the No. 2 Gertzender-Layton Heirs.

At a location four miles northwest of Carbon, Phase IV Petroleum Company of San Angelo has completed the No. 1 Vogel, new oil well in Eastland County.

Drillsite was in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey. The well showed daily potential for 64 barrels of oil on an open choke. Production will be from an interval 1,062 to 1,066 feet. Well's total depth was 1,600 feet, with top of pay logged at 1,060 feet.

A natural gas developmental well has been successfully completed by Morning Star Oil & Gas Company of Cisco. The new Eastland County producer, designated as the No. 2 Leah Brown, is situated in a 640-acre lease in the SP RR Co. Survey.

It was drilled to a total depth of 4,100 feet and will produce from a perforated interval 3,729 to 3,737 feet into the wellbore.

Showing daily potential to yield 711,000 CF gas on an open choke, the well was given an absolute open flow rating of 1,107,500 CFD.

County Hay Show Program Oct. 1

All hay producers in Eastland County are urged to attend an educational program on hay production on Friday, October 1 at the Eastland County Livestock Show grounds. The program will be a part of the County Hay Show and will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the new show barn.

Dr. George Alston, Extension Service Agronomist, will discuss the hay show results and other topics such as quality hay production, soil fertility, feeding value and forage testing. Implement dealers will have hay harvesting equipment on display at the program.

Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon reports that there were 41 entries in the hay show. Ribbons and plaques will be presented to exhibitors during the afternoon program.

On Friday morning Dr. Alston will judge the hay entries. The chemical score (crude protein) will be averaged with the physical score to determine the final classification score. The physical factors include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, and color. Ribbons will be awarded based on final score. Plaques will be given to exhibitors with the highest scoring entry in each of the following classes: Alfalfa, Coastal Bermuda grass, Sorghum-Sudan Hybrids, other perennials and annual grasses.

The hay show and program will help hay producers do a better job of producing hay quality forage for livestock says Gordon. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

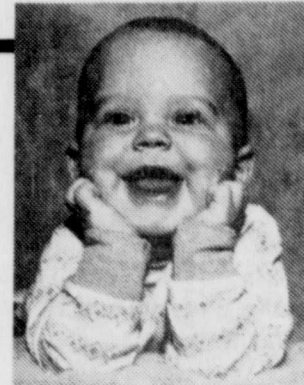

GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

A few peanuts are being dug in Eastland County, but most of the crops need four or five more weeks of good growing conditions before they mature.

We had a peanut tour last Tuesday and on Wednesday afternoon four people from M&M Mars in Albany, Georgia looked at several fields with us.

There are some good irrigated peanuts, but over all the Eastland County crop does not look good. One grower told us on the tour that he thinks this will be a worse year than 1980. He believes a number of growers will not be able to continue farming after this year.

It will be most important to leave the peanuts in the ground until they are mature. This is especially true of late planted florunner peanuts. It takes the florunner about 140 days to

mature. Because of heavy rains in May and June, most peanuts were not planted until July. Harvesting the peanuts too early will reduce yields and quality.

This past week was Farm and Ranch Safety Week. Agriculture had more fatal accidents in 1981 than any other occupation. Sometimes we get tired hearing about safety, and then we hear of a tragic accident that occurred at Carbon a few weeks back and we realize that safety should always be on our minds.

Producers should recognize that general industry employs thousands of safety specialists to design and promote a safe workplace while a few agricultural safety specialists must reach farm and ranch audiences largely through the media.

Harvest time is probably the most dangerous time for accidents since most crops are harvested mechanically.

Although harvesting machines may be different, they all have a few things in common and a basic set of safety rules:

1. Read and follow the operator's manual on each machine.

2. Make sure all workers are trained in carrying out assignments safely.

3. Keep all shielding in place and stay away from unshielded parts.

4. Always disengage and turn off the engine before working with it, especially when unclogging, adjusting or servicing the harvesting machine.

5. Watch where you're going. Adjust speed to field and crop conditions and avoid ditches, steep slopes, and other obstacles.

6. Keep extra riders off the machines.

7. Wear personal protective equipment when needed. Choose work clothes with adequate skin protection but

no loose ends that could get caught in machinery.

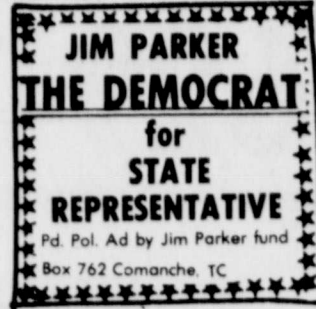
8. Take work breaks to maintain alertness and reduce fatigue.

Make accident prevention part of every farm and ranch activity by becoming educated in safe work practices.

Pest Alert

PLANT PARASITIC NEMATODES

Gordon Woolam

Plant parasitic nematodes are slender wormlike animals that move among soil particles and root surfaces. They attack numerous ornamental and garden plants as well as lawn grasses, peanuts, cotton, pecans and many other important plants. They are too small to be seen by the naked eye; however their damage is apparent in stunted, unproductive plants.

The most common nematode encountered by the home gardener is the Root Knot Nematode. The root galling caused by this pest are easily noticeable. Some of the more commonly attacked garden crops are tomatoes, okra, and beans.

If you suspected nematode damage carefully dig up the plant roots and inspect them for root galling. Should nematodes be present control measures are limited and no known measure will completely destroy all nematodes. Chemical control for the home owner is currently limited to Vapam. This is a liquid which volatilize into a toxic

gas after application. This application must be followed with a "water seal" or an airtight cover. Do not use this material around roots of living plants.

Because of the toxic effect of Vapam on living plants, some home gardeners may be limited in the use of this material due to nearby trees or shrubs in such cases home gardeners may be limited to non-chemical control measures.

First of all remove all infected plants and roots. Next till the soil. Nematodes require water to live and if exposed to the drying effects of the sun would soon be destroyed. Nematode resistant varieties should be used when available to provide natural resistance.

Some of the nematode resistant varieties are: Tomatoes - Big Sweet, Bonus, Better Boy and Small Fry; Southern Peas - Mississippi Silver; Sweet Potatoes - Jewel and Centennial; Sweet Corn - All varieties; Onion - All varieties; and Garlic - All varieties.

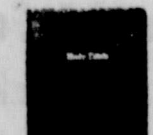

Citizens Ban Together For Anti-Drug Education Program

"We want the drug traffic stopped in Eastland County right now!"

That's the rallying cry of a group of citizens who have banded together to assist and support the law enforcement agencies and courts and to work toward an anti-drug education program from preschoolers up.

Action came almost voluntarily as the result of a recent 91st District Court grand jury report to the public that the drug problem in the county is serious.

The county reportedly has been labeled a "key drug center" in publications and broadcasts across the nation, and the local citizens are rising up to rid the county of the pushers and to hopefully educate the young people of the mind-shattering dangers of drug abuse.

Core committees are already formed in each town in the county and a central county committee will coordinate the work and efforts of the individual groups. As the organization grows, it is hoped that every phase of life and business in the county will eventually be touched and helped by the effort.

Details of the organization were first presented to lawmen at their monthly meeting Friday of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association by County Judge Scott Bailey, at the request of the citizens group.

The grand jury will meet Tuesday, Sept. 28, and is expected to be presented statements from each of the community organizations, pledging support of law enforcement and goals for educating young people to the perils of drug abuse.

The various community organizations are made up of sub-committees which cover the following topics: religion and recreation, law enforcement, publicity and community involvement, education, finance and fund raising, intra-county communications and cooperation, medical and legal counsel and research.

Each of the community organizations is meeting independently and a wealth of ideas is sought for helping solve the problem. Among the various ideas now being discussed are the publication of hot-line telephone numbers, distribution of literature through the schools, possible an anti-drug Sunday on which all ministers would deliver sermons about the dangers, and a great number of other projects which will be launched in the near future.

"The bottom-line goal of all of our efforts," one spokesman said, "is to save our young people."

Individual members will also stand ready to hear problems from young people who can not or will not discuss them with their parents or law enforcement.
