

Under Texas law, because he used a deadly weapon in the commission of the offense, he will have to serve a minimum of 20 years before even being considered for parole.

pending at this time. Under Texas law any person taking any part in the commission of the crime is also equally guilty and can be convicted of the same

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

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MULBERRY LEAFSPOT

Perhaps you have noticed the leaves of most fruitless mulberry trees are spotted, yellowed or in some cases defoliating. These conditions are caused by a leaf spotting fungus. In some extreme cases trees can be defoliated by this disease. Older trees

are especially susceptible. Infection and spread of the disease are favored by rainy weather. The wet weather we experienced in the early summer provided this fungus with the needed favorable weather conditions to initiate infection. Disease development is also favored high

temperatures and therefore is the most destructive in winter months.

Severe infections or valuable specimen trees should be treated with a fungicide. Recommended fungicides include maneb, benomyl and chlorothalonil (Daconil or Bravo). However, this late in the year fungicide applications probably would not be extremely effective. The most effective applications of fungicide would follow early season rains or when signs of

infection first appear. Sanitation is also important. The fungus overwinters in plant debris. Therefore

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the removal of fallen infected leaves should be of benefit.

Another disease which attacks mulberry is bacterial blight. The symptoms appear as water-soaked spots on leaves and shoots. They later become sunken and black. The leaves at the twig

tips wilt and dry up. Some control is obtainable on young trees by pruning dead shoots in autumn. Shoots should be pruned at least six inches below the infection site. Spraying with a cooper fungicide (such as Kocide 101) the following spring is also recommended. Streptomycin sprays may

also be effective. For more information contact your County Extension Office. .

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

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND ESTABLISHING A TAX EN-TITLED "HOTEL OC-CUPANCY TAX", CON-TAINING THEREIN DEFINITIONS; LEVYING A TAX EQUAL TO TWO PERCENT (2%) OF THE CONSIDERATION OF THE COST OF OCCUPANCY OF ANY ROOM OR SPACE IN ANY HOTEL WITH CER-TAIN EXCEPTIONS: PRO-VIDING FOR COLLEC-TION TO MAKE RULES AND REGULATIONS; DESCRIBING THE USE OF REVENUE; DESCRIBING VIOLA-TIONS; PROVIDING FOR A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$200 FOR EACH VIOLATION AND THAT EACH DAY A VIOLATION EXISTS CONSTITUTES A SEPARATE VIOLATION; PROVIDING PENALTIES; AND FOR AN

WHEREAS, the 65th Texas Legislature amended Art. 1269j-4.1, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, authorizing cities to levy a hotel occupancy tax not to exceed four percent (4%);

EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the revenue derived from this tax can be used to promote tourism and convention activities for the benefit of the City of Cisco, and other appropriate activities as allowed by State law; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Cisco would benefit from such programs and facilities; THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX Section 1. Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, for the purpose of this ordinance, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning, are defined as follows:

(a) "Hotel" shall mean any building or buildings, or other facility, in which the public may, for a consideration, obtain sleeping accomodations. The term shall include hotels, motels, tourist homes, houses or courts, lodging houses, inns, buildings or facilities where the consideration paid by the

rooms are furnished for a consideration, but "hotel" shall not be defined so as to include hospitals, sanitariums or nursing homes.

(b) "Consideration" shall mean the cost of the room, sleeping space, bed or other facility in such hotel and shall not include the cost of any food served or personal services rendered to the occupant not related to the cleaning and readying of such room, sleeping space, bed or other facility for occupancy.

(c) "Occupancy" shall mean the use or possession, or the right to the use or possession of any room or rooms, sleeping space, bed or other facility in a hotel for

(d) "Occupancy" shall mean anyone who, for a consideration uses, possesses, or has a right to use or possess any room or rooms, sleeping space, bed or other facility in a hotel under any lease, concession, permit, right of access, license, contract or agreement.

(e) "Person" shall mean any individual, company, corporation or association owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel.

(f) "Tax Collector" shall mean the Tax Assessor-Collector of the City of Cisco. (g) "Quarterly Period"

shall mean the regular calendar quarters of the year, the first quarter being composed of the months of January, February and March; the second quarter being the months of April, May and June; the third quarter being the months of August and

September; and the fourth quarter being the months of October, November and

(h) "Permanent Resident" shall mean any occupant who has or shall have the right to occupancy of any room or rooms or sleeping space or other facility in a hotel for at least thirty (30) consecutive days during the current calendar year.

Section 2. Levy of Tax; Rate; Exceptions

(a) There is hereby levied a tax upon the cost of occupancy of any sleeping room or space furnished by any hotel where such cost of occupancy is at the rate of two dollars (\$2.00) or more per day. Such tax shall be

(b) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a permanent resident.

(c) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a corporation or association organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitables or educational purposes of which no part of the net earnings insures to the benefit of any prviate shareholder or individual.

Section 3. Collection Every person owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel, shall collect the tax imposed in Paragraph 2 hereof for the City of Cisco.

Section 4. Reports On or before the last day of the month following each quarterly period, every person required hereby to collect the tax imposed by this ordinance shall file a report with Tax Collector showing

the consideration paid for all room occupancies in the preceding quarter, the amount of tax collected on the City's behalf on such occupancies, and any other information as the Tax Collector may reasonably require. Such person shall pay over the tax due on such occupancies at the time of filing such report. There shall also be furnished to the Tax Collector of the City of Cisco at the time of payment of such tax, a copy of the Quarterly Tax Report filed with the State Comptroller in connection with the State of Texas Hotel



The use of fire as a tool to control brush on rangeland has been gaining interest in the last few years. Eastland County ranchers interested in getting a better handle on using fire in range management are invited to attend a special program at Goldthwaite on October 28.

Called a Prescribed Burning Symposium, the program will be at the Mills County Civic Center with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Texas A&M staff and representatives of other state and federal agencies will be on hand to discuss various aspects of prescribed burning of ranges, with special emphasis on the proper use and effects of fire. Among considerations regarding prescribed burning are brush management

by DeMarquis Gordon forage growth and effects on wildlife and the environ-

> Various types of assistance available to ranchers interested in using fire in range management will also be discussed.

The Extension Service has conducted three similar programs during the past few years. These have been held Carrizo Springs, Kingsville and Junction.

Landowners interested in attending the program should contact our office for pre-registration materials.

Fall is always a critical time of the year for cow-calf producers because it's then that they must usually make marketing decisions. The best decisions, however, come after looking at all possible alternatives.

Marketing alternatives for cow-calf producers include holding calves over winter, backgrounding or feeding calves during the winter months, forward contracting retaining ownership through feeding by placement into custom feedlots, and simply

marketing calves this fall. Short-term prospects for feeder cattle must be considered when reviewing these various marketing alternatives.

Some positive factors for the feeder cattle picture ar

1. Fed cattle prices should decline only slightly in the third quarter and show some strength late in the year. 2. Commercial cattle feeders have rebuilt some equity in

recent months 3. Total 1982 meat production will be down about 4 percent from last year.

4. Competing pork prices are expected to remain firm into the fall

5. Cheap feed and good grazing exists throughout most of the west.

6. Available feeder cattle supplies appear no larger than last year.

Negative factors for the feeder cattle outlook are the following:

1. Profit margins for cattle feeding are narrowing. 2. Equity positions of most cow-calf producers have been sharply eroded.

3. Financing costs have come down but still remain 4. Beef production is ex-



OUR TRIP TO Quito, Ecuador, began Sept. 14th when we drove into Arlington to spend the night and to be on hand for a 7:30 a.m. check-in next day at DFW airport. And our Eastern Airlines plane (Boeing 737) left at 8:30 a.m. on Sept.

A highlight of the threehour flight to Miami, Fla., was a nice breakfast served soon after takeoff. The airplane went to about 31,000 feet and you couldn't see the ground. We arrived at Miami around noon (Eastern time). Since there were no flights to Ecuador after our arrival, we had to spend the night in Miami. Our luggage had been checked to Quito and there was quite a hassle to retrieve it.

AT MIAMI, we stayed at the Sheraton Hotel as per arrangement by our sponsors. The hotel is a real fancy place and rooms cost about \$80 per day

Ran into something new (to us) and interesting - a Par Course Fitness Circuit. This consists of a half-mile jogging track that circles the swimming pool, tennis courts and parking lot of the hotel plus eight or ten stations for exercising.

Each station on the Par Course Fitness Circuit has a sign board that instructs you to do push-ups or the like. Then, you walk on to the No. 2 station and engage in another type of exercise. You are given a pretty good workout by the time you get around the course. Then, you can either jog a few rounds or walk until you're tired. The area is lighted and fenced and perfectly secure. (The Par Course would fit 'nicely around the City Park in Cisco.) A company in San Francisco makes the signs and equipment used in the various exercises.

NEXT MORNING (Sept. 16), we checked in at Miami International Airport for the flight to Ecuador. Again, we were with Eastern Airlines as they have taken over the

routes that Braniff Airlines used to fly to Central and South America. Our flight began around 1 p.m. - an hour or so late. And a lunch (choice of fried shrimp or sirloin steak with all the trimmings) was served.

The flight route carried us over Cuha and you could see Havana 50 miles or so off to the right. After crossing the Carribean, we came in over Colombia, South America, and landed at the capital -Bogota - where we were on the ground about an hour. Went into the airport terminal and browsed among the shops. Bogota is about 8,500 feet high, and the temperature was in the 70s at 3:30 p.m.

After Bogota, the plane flew an hour or so to Quito. Mountains are high and numerous and through broken clouds we could see many small villages. The clouds were solid as we arrived over Quito. The airplane circled for 15 minutes or so and the pilot announced that there was a severe rain storm in the airport area and, since mountains ring the airport, it would be impossible to land as scheduled.

So...the airliner went on 30 minutes to Guayaquil, Ecuador's largest city, on the west coast. Here, we rounded up our four bags (containing enough things for a stay of a couple of months or so) and went through customs. After we spread out our bags, the man waved us through.

WE WERE then told that we were to take our bags to Saeta Airlines and Eastern would send us back to Quito as the airport was now open. With the help of two young men, we and the bags got to the right place, obtained tickets and lined up to go

An hour or so later, the Saeta 737 landed at Quito. Water was everywhere, attesting the fact that there had been a rain storm deluxe. Since the Eastern

plane had been unable to as scheduled, there wasn't anybody there to meet us. And we rounded up our bags, engaged a taxi and went to our hotel, arriving tired and hungry around 9

All in all, it was a pretty eventful day for folks from a small town in the middle of

THAT WAS ALL a few days ago as this was written Sept. 22nd. We've checked in at the newspaper and have about reached the point where the 9,500 foot altitude of Quito isn't noticeable. At odd times, we've done a bit of sight-seeing and are finding Quito and Ecuador very interesting indeed.

### **Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu**

Texas A&M Extension Department has released a little bulletin entitled, "Be A Super Snacker, which clearly indicates Texans are eating more food between meals, to the point that it has become part of our lifestyle.

Their philosophy is...Don't Fight It ... We are going to eat these snacks between meals regardless what nutritionists say, so the Extension Service states, "Follow this trend, but eat nutritious snacks, kick the bad snack habit and be a super snacker

Snacks, the Department states, are an important source for your daily nutrient and calorie intake. Eating healthy snacks can be a choice, not a chance.

What type of snacks must be chosen to be classified as Super Snacks"

Make sure they include meats and other protein food for body building and repair. You may include in this peanut butter, jerky, canned fish, nuts or sunflower seeds. If you consider the breads and cereals to enrich your iron content and some protein, you may want to snack on cereal snack mix or crackers. Milk and cheese, which assists our body with calcium, protein and riboflavin, may include nonfat dry milk and unopened pasteurized cheese spreds.

If you are a snacker, be a selective one, and be classified as a "Super
