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Lt. Governor's Wife Speaks To Group At Laguna Hotel

"When have you last seen our present Lt. Governor, Bill Hobby?" and "How many people know what the Lt. Governor does?"

These were two main questions asked by Annette Strake, wife of George Strake, Republican candidate for Lt. Governor, after she arrived in Cisco Friday afternoon Oct. 1.

She also brought a special announcement to her reception at the Laguna Hotel - the confirmation that George Strake will stop at the Eastland Airport on Tuesday, Oct. 21, at 2:22 p.m.

Mrs. Strake's visit was the second stop in Eastland County by a family member of a candidate involved in the hotly contested race for Lt. Governor. The other visit was made in August by Paul Hobby, son of the Democratic incumbent Bill Hobby. Both Hobby and Strake are from long-time Houston families, and make their homes in that city.

Annette Strake, an attractive woman with gray eyes and russet hair, appeared tireless in spite of her campaign trail through Brady, Brownwood, Bangs, Coleman and Putnam. She was greeted in Cisco by Peg Morris, Chairman for the Eastland County Geo. Strake for Lt. Governor campaign, and a group of enthusiastic citizens from this area.

Mrs. Strake began her talk with a discussion of her first question.

"It brings up one of the real issues I have found everywhere in my travels around the state," she said. "Most people have not seen Bill Hobby, Lt. Governor, during his ten years in office. He has lost his touch - no wonder citizens feel alienated from the persons who have the power of government."

"That is one reason why George and I and the older of our six children are traveling through the whole state. We want to be sure that every town in Texas will see some of the Strakes."

"We've learned what a big state this really is! But I love campaigning - it's been quite an education."

"On the duties of Lt. Governor - few people seem to know that he does anything. But actually this office is one of the most powerful in the state. The Lt. Governor is the Presiding Officer of the State Representatives, and Chairman of the State Finance Committee.

In these positions he can

influence decisions on the most vital of matters.

"Instead of working to water down crime legislation, as Billy Hobby did last season, George Strake, at Lt. Governor, will work to see that the Texas Senate comes to grips with these problems," Mrs. Strake said.

"George Strake supports stronger laws to curb the rising crime rate, the increasing drug traffic, and the slaughter on our highways and streets caused by drunk drivers."

"We are the parents of six children. Fortunately these children have stayed out of trouble, for which we are thankful. But from our children's first-hand reports we know how wide-spread the drug problem is today."

"With this and over one-half of all fatal auto accidents involving drunk driving, the legislature must act forcefully."

"The weak half-measures which have been enacted during Mr. Hobby's tenure are not working."

"On taxation - it should be noted that Texan's state and local taxes are up 155% since 1970."

"George Strake is opposed to this runaway taxation, and will try to curb that right along with curbing spending."

"He was educated in economics and business - he has been an independent businessman."

"When he was Secretary of State under Gov. Clements in 1979-81, he used sound business practices in the management of his office."

He returned three million dollars to the state treasury from his budget, rather than looking for ways to spend it. Sometimes people wonder why we have left our private lives to trail around the state

"In thinking it over, I realize there are basic reasons why George decided to make the run. He wants to preserve and protect the rights we have known."

When asked about Strake's chances to win this race, Mrs. Strake replied that she felt it would be "Very close - right down to the wire." She urged all citizens to get out to the polls and make their wishes known.

Then she concluded: "Please go out and meet George at the Airport when he comes to Eastland County. This is a crucial area for the race - your support and encouragement could make a great difference."

After leaving the Cisco reception, Mrs. Strake drove to Abilene for another meeting.

Cisco Lobos Will Take On Undefeated Albany Lions Here

The Lobo Varsity of Cisco High School will continue in their District 10-AA play here Friday night as they take on the undefeated Albany Lions in Chesley Field. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

Junior High and Junior Varsity teams will travel to Albany Thursday night for their games. The seventh graders will be kicking off at 5:00 p.m., followed by the eighth and J.V.

Following last Friday night's whipping of the Baird Bears 49-20, the Lobos district record now stands at 1-0-1 while their season record is 3-1-1.

Albany, along with Eastland, is one of undefeated teams left in the Big Country area according to Cisco Head Coach Jim Puryear. The Lions are 5-0 for the season and 2-0 in district play.

Coach Puryear stated Albany may be ranked in the same class as Eastland. He said the Lions defeated

Dublin this year when Dublin was ranked sixth in the state.

In district play, the Albany Lions have defeated Baird (42-12) and Anson (14-2). Cisco also defeated Baird (49-20) and tied Winters (21-21) in their district games.

According to Coach Puryear, the Albany Lions have "good quickness, tough kids and execute plays well. We expect a good game Friday night and we need all the support from fans we can get."

He explained the Lions will be trying to keep their undefeated record, since they will be facing the Eastland Mavericks next week and both teams will want to be undefeated at that time.

Mike Williams, who saw little action last week due to bruised ribs, is expected to be back in the lineup this week and ready to go against the Lions. Coach Puryear reported the Lobos have no

injuries and the starting lineup will be about the same as in the past.

In last Friday night's game in Baird, the Bears recovered a Cisco fumble during the second play of the game giving them good field position at Cisco's 29-yard line.

With Ronnie Casey at quarterback, the Bears made the first touchdown of the game four plays later. On the first play, QB Casey ran 21 yards on a keeper-play. A handoff to Alan Tatum netted three yards and another keeper-play by Casey placed the ball one yard from Cisco's goal-line.

Another keeper-play by Casey gained the touchdown with about 10 minutes left in the first quarter. The PAT kick by Ben Mendez was good giving the Bears a 7-0 lead.

The Lobos received the ensuing kick and moved the ball from Cisco's 34-yard line to Baird's 10-yard line in eight plays, before losing possession of the ball on a fumble.

Baird was unable to get a drive going and was finally forced to punt after being pushed back to their own one-yard line.

Cisco started their next drive on Baird's 35-yard line. A handoff from quarterback Randall Rattan to David Seabourn gained five yards and a keeper-play by Rattan netted six more yards and a first down. Jason Potter picked up three yards and another keeper-play gained 12 yards. A pitchback to Brian Fleming gained the five yards needed for Cisco's first touchdown. With 2:43 left in the first quarter, Lobo Kenneth Seaton made the first of his extra points of the game when his PAT kick kicked. Glenn Starr held the Bears at 10-yard line.

In the second quarter of the game, Cisco's lead was a 7-7 tie, but when his PAT kick kicked. Glenn Starr held the Bears at 10-yard line.

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Seabourn touched down for the first time in the game. A handoff to Rattan resulted in a 20-yard play. Seabourn's PAT kick was good making the score 14-7.

Cisco's final points came about early in the third quarter when the Lobos had received a Bears punt and were starting out on the 50-yard line. Potter broke loose on a handoff from QB Rattan with a 50-yard touchdown run. With 9:30 left in the third quarter, Preston's final PAT kick was good making the score 49-7.

The Bears rallied back and on the first play of the fourth quarter, QB Casey completed a pass to Jody Turnbow for a 10-yard touchdown play. The PAT kick by Casey was good making the score 49-13 with 11:56 left in the final quarter of play.

Baird's final scoring drive was set up when Cisco QB Billy Escovedo was sacked by Baird and Tatum recovered the fumble for the Bears at Cisco's 46-yard line.

A pass from Baird QB Te Howard to Andy Ash moved the ball 26 yards to Cisco's 20-yard line. A pitchback to Turnbow lost one yard and a pitchback to Wayne Fox lost six more yards. Learn Not To Burn Wherever You Are

October 3-9, 1982 is Fire Prevention Week in Eastland County and across the nation, with the theme "Learn Not To Burn Wherever You Are"

According to Ernest Reich, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, fire prevention has special significance to farm and ranch families for the following reasons:

Fires on farms and ranches pose a special threat, unlike an urban or city property that has immediate access to a well organized fire department and an abundance of water.

Most farm and ranches are relatively isolated from fire fighting equipment and may lack adequate water for fighting a fire.

Many farms and ranches have the added fire risk brought on by traversing of railroads and roads. Trains cause grass fires as the result of a "hot box". The careless smoking motorist uses the roadway instead of

his ash tray to discard his used smoking materials - thus turning valuable farm property into ashes. Vehicles traveling along the roadway on a bare rim create or produce sparks that result in grass fires spreading over many acres of crop and rangeland; many times destroying valuable structures and equipment.

Though U.S. fire losses amount to approximately \$5 billion annually, the human misery caused by unwanted fires is the most terrible cost. More than 6,000 people die and many more are injured in over 1,000,000 fires each year.

Farm fire property losses (dwellings, buildings, animals, cotton, hay, grain, supplies, timber, machinery and vehicles) approach an estimated \$300 million annually.

Frequent causes of building fires include electrical faults, smoking and matches, heating and cooking equipment, children

playing with matches, open flames and sparks, arson, chimneys and flues, lightning and spontaneous combustion.

Joe Smetana, Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau, Waco, Texas, offers these suggestions for fire and burn prevention:

* Plow fire lanes around pasture/range/timber land.

Also, plow fire lanes around farm structures, equipment and hay bales. Spray to kill weeds and grass that later become a fire hazard.

* Up date any old electrical system. Wiring may fail due to faulty installation, overloading, physical damage, aging, and the deterioration caused by chemical action, heat, sun, moisture and weather. Check your fuses and circuit breakers. Check wire size with the amount of current being used. For example: At 110-120 volts, No. 14 A.W.G. copper wire will handle a maximum of 15 amperes or 1800 watts; No. 12 wire will handle 20 amperes or 2400 watts; and No. 10 wire 30 amperes or 3600 watts.

* Be careful with matches, lighters and smoking. Do not smoke in places with combustible or flammable materials, nor when refueling or handling flammable or explosive materials.

* Think about fire prevention when you use a welder; especially when you use an oxy-acetylene torch for cutting. Too high oxygen pressure can blow sparks twice as far as need be.

* Locate above-ground fuel storage tanks at least 50 feet from buildings; keep the tanks painted white, under shade. When refueling a tractor, turn off the engine and extinguish smoking materials. If the engine is hot, let it cool for a few minutes. For added protection, have a fire extinguisher handy.

County Farm Bureaus sponsor several free, public service safety education demonstrations conducted by staff from the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department in Waco. In addition to the standard 45-minute graphic fire prevention demonstration for junior high, high school and adult audiences; Farm Bureau now presents the E.D.I.T.H. (Exit Drills in the Home) program designed especially for grades K-6.

Schools, civic clubs and other organizations planning fire or other safety education programs for the year may schedule these programs by contacting the Eastland County Farm Bureau at Eastland. Telephone 629-1704.

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Senator Bob Glasgow Reports

For the next several weeks, I will be discussing with you the Six proposed Constitutional Amendments that will appear on the November 2, 1982, ballot. From this information, it is hoped you will have enough

facts to decide how you wish to vote on the issue.

The first reference is how the proposed amendment will be stated on the ballot, and the rest is a discussion thereof.

Amendment No. 1. "The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

This proposed amendment repeals the State property tax. This tax is pledged for funding construction at 17 named State universities. These 17 universities do not participate in the Permanent University Fund. North Texas State University and Texas Woman's University are the colleges from this Senatorial District that received funding for construction from this tax.

This property tax is the only remaining state property tax that is set at a value of 10 cents per \$100 evaluation. In 1979 the Legislature attempted to effectively repeal the tax by reducing the tax rate to .001 cents per \$100 evaluation (thus making the tax revenue so minute that the amount would not even justify collection). Legal scholars and subsequently the Legislature agreed that this "back door repeal" of a part of the Texas Constitution could not be done by

statute but must be done by submission of voters for a repeal. This tax has not been collected since 1979.

Underlying arguments for and against the repeal are as follows:

FOR
(1) Property taxes are the primary means of support for local governments, which are generally hard-pressed for revenue. The State, which has other means of support, should not compete with local governments for taxes by continuing to tax already overburdened property owners.

(2) The need for dedicated construction funding for universities is not as great as it once was. The Constitutional provision that is being repealed was passed in 1947, at a time when college enrollments were booming because of the GI Bill and other reasons. In the 1980's the colleges are not expanding nearly as rapidly as they once were.

(3) Constitutionally dedicated funds unnecessarily limit legislative discretion to appropriate funds where the most need is shown. Also, in the appropriations process the needs of the colleges can be compared and weighed along beside the needs of the State.

AGAINST
(1) The constitutional provision providing for source of funding construction at non-PUF colleges provides

the most rational and cost effective method of providing construction monies for these universities. Construction requires an orderly, planned process and is most efficiently achieved through the issuance of bonds to carry out the plans. Constitutionally dedicated funds, allocated according to an equitable formula provide for orderly, planned growth based on anticipated and actual need. The few universities that have political "muscle" of those that will be competing will receive a disproportionate share of the

funds allocated through the appropriations process.

(2) Although a 10-cent state property tax levied against 100 percent of market value might generate more money than actually needed, repeal of the tax is not the proper answer to that problem. Proposals such as reducing the tax to 3 cents could generate the amount needed without imposing a burden on property owners or threatening local government revenues. A 3-cent tax on a \$50,000 home would result in a tax liability of only \$15 a year,

disregarding any applicable exemptions. The State itself faces potential revenue problems, and repealing the tax will increase the drain on general revenue.

(3) Article VII, Section 17, is part of a tradition in this state. Beginning in 1845, each Texas constitution has provided some form of dedicated funding for elementary or secondary education. If education is to retain its status as a top priority, all forms of dedicated funding for that purpose should be preserved. The repeal of Article VII,

Section 17, would result in an inequitable situation in which only a few preferred universities in The University of Texas System or The Texas A&M University System have dedicated construction funding.

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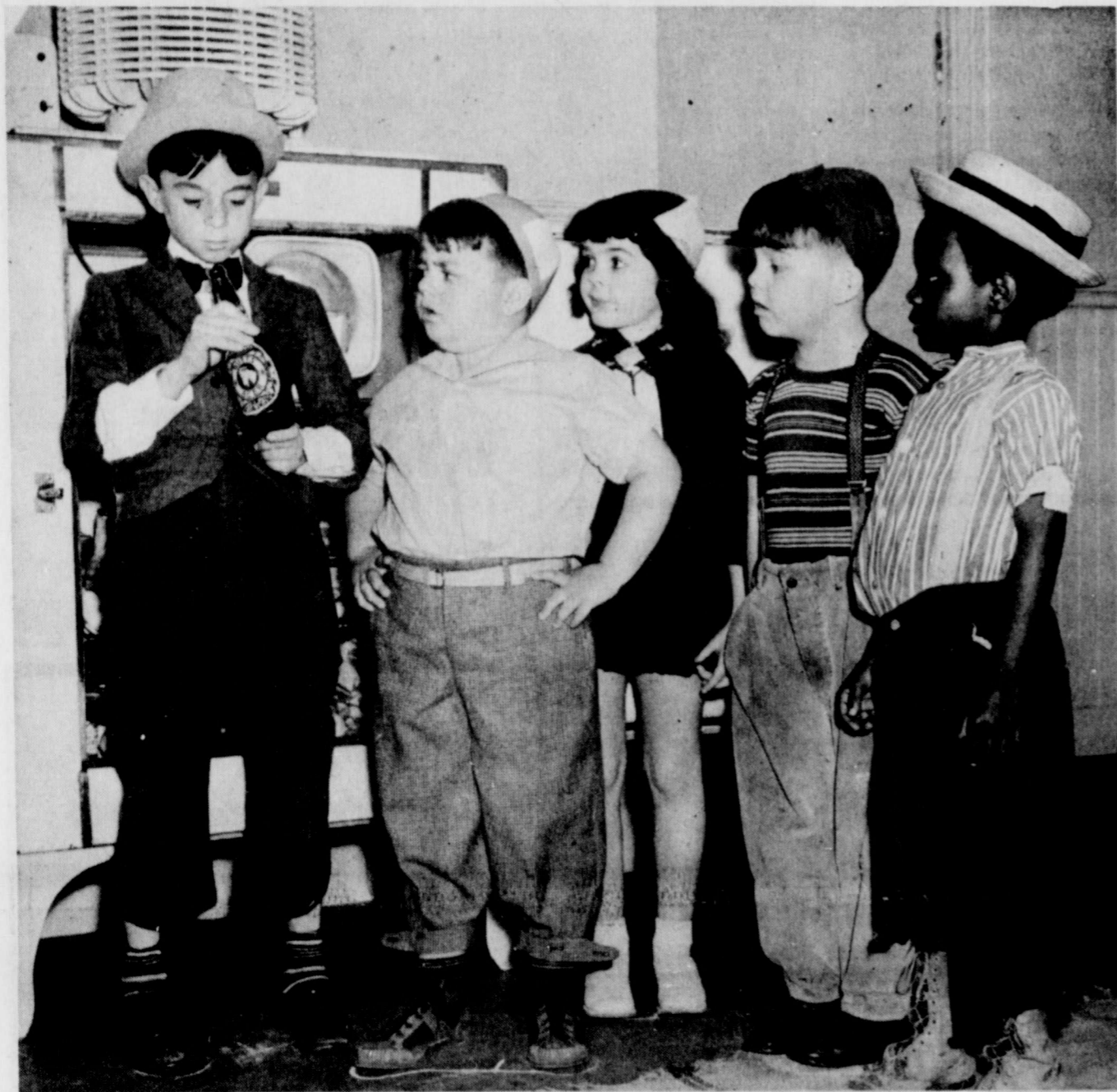

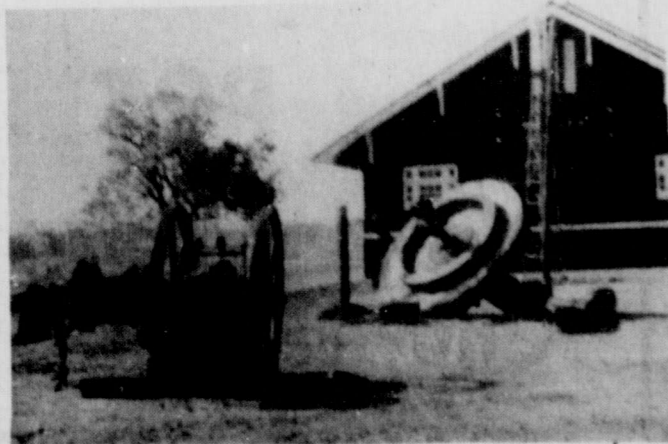

Sun Exploration Co. Gives Vintage Oil Rig To Museum

A boom day vintage oil field rig has been donated to the Roaring Ranger Museum by the Sun Exploration and Production Company. Hollis Deats, District Production Superintendent and Jerry Bergeron, District Manager of the Human Resources Department of Sun were in Ranger recently to make the announcement. Deats said the unit is actually composed of two rigs that were on old Texas & Pacific leases now owned by Sun. One rig was located about a mile west of Ranger while the other was about two miles west. The parts are being reconstructed into a single rig on the yard of the old T&P railroad depot which now houses the Roaring Ranger Museum. When completed the rig will feature a large wooden sheel connected by a belt to two smaller steel wheels

powered by a Cooper-Bessemer engine. Also a small pump jack will be in place. Topping it off will be a large wooden "walking" beam. The Ranger Jaycees are to be commended for their work in moving and reconstructing the rig. Assisting the Jaycees and donating their services are Jerry Wilson of Wilson Oil Field Salvage, Polo Jiminez and Bobby Justice of Ranger Oil Field Salvage and Aubrey Wynn who has lent his technical knowledge and advice. Roaring Ranger Museum Opens Saturday, October 9

The "Roaring Ranger Museum" located in the old Texas & Pacific Railroad Depot will officially open its doors Saturday, October 9th at 11 a.m. The ribbon-cutting ceremonies and museum dedication will serve as the keystone event for the first annual "Roaring Ranger Days" Festival to be held that same day, according to Jerry Bob Greer and Tom Brashier, Museum Co-Chairmen. Originally, this historic landmark had been scheduled for destruction, but through the efforts of a group of local citizens, an agreement was reached with the Missouri-Pacific Railroad to preserve the depot for posterity and make it the permanent home for the museum that will chronicle the colorful past of Ranger, the boom town. Erected in 1919, it stands as the largest unchanged reminder of the boom days

of Roaring Ranger. The south end of the structure remains as a working part of the Missouri-Pacific with several crews working out of the office. Many of the items for the museum are in place but the Chamber of Commerce is issuing a plea to anyone and everyone who might have artifacts or pictures they want to donate or loan to the museum. 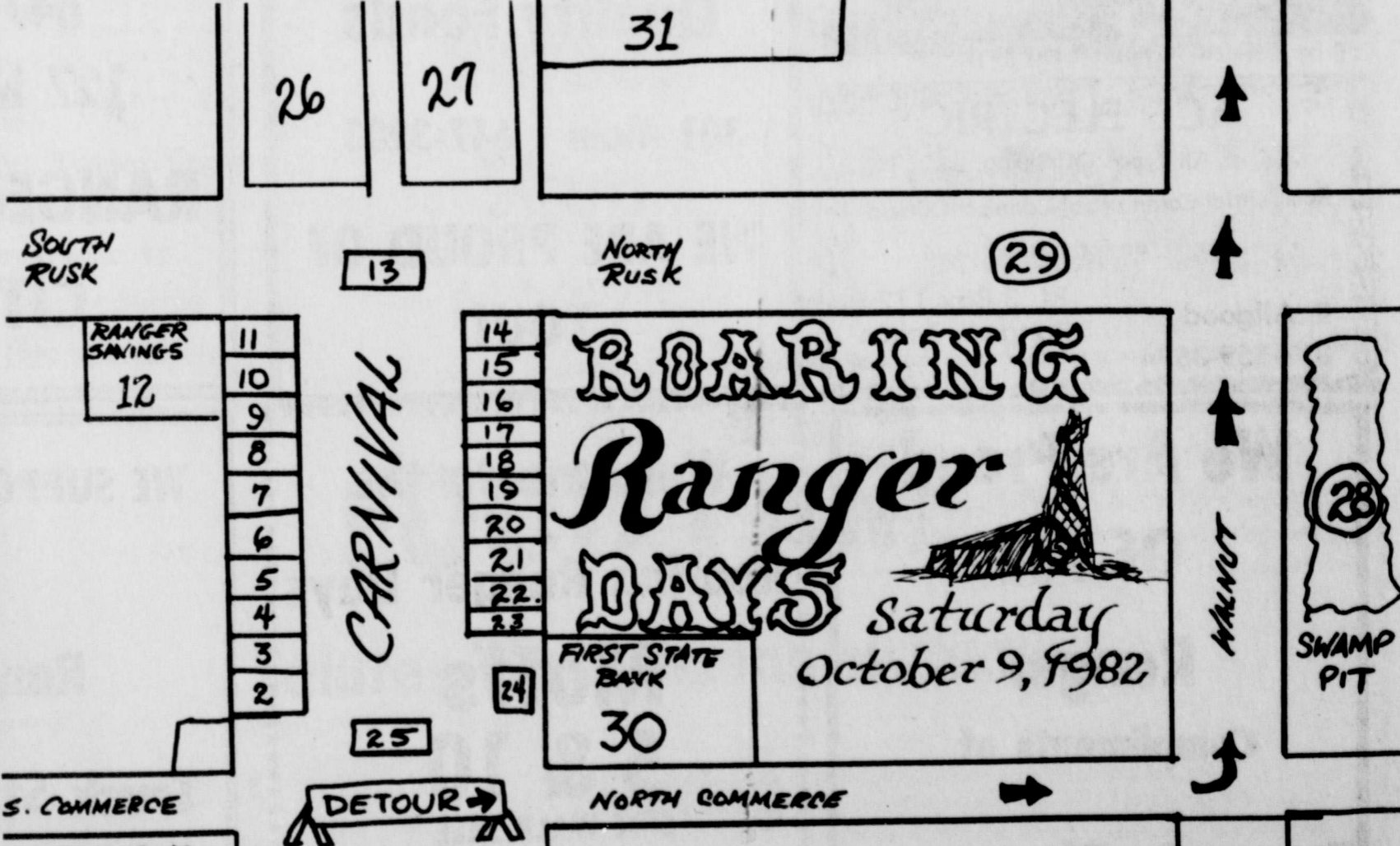

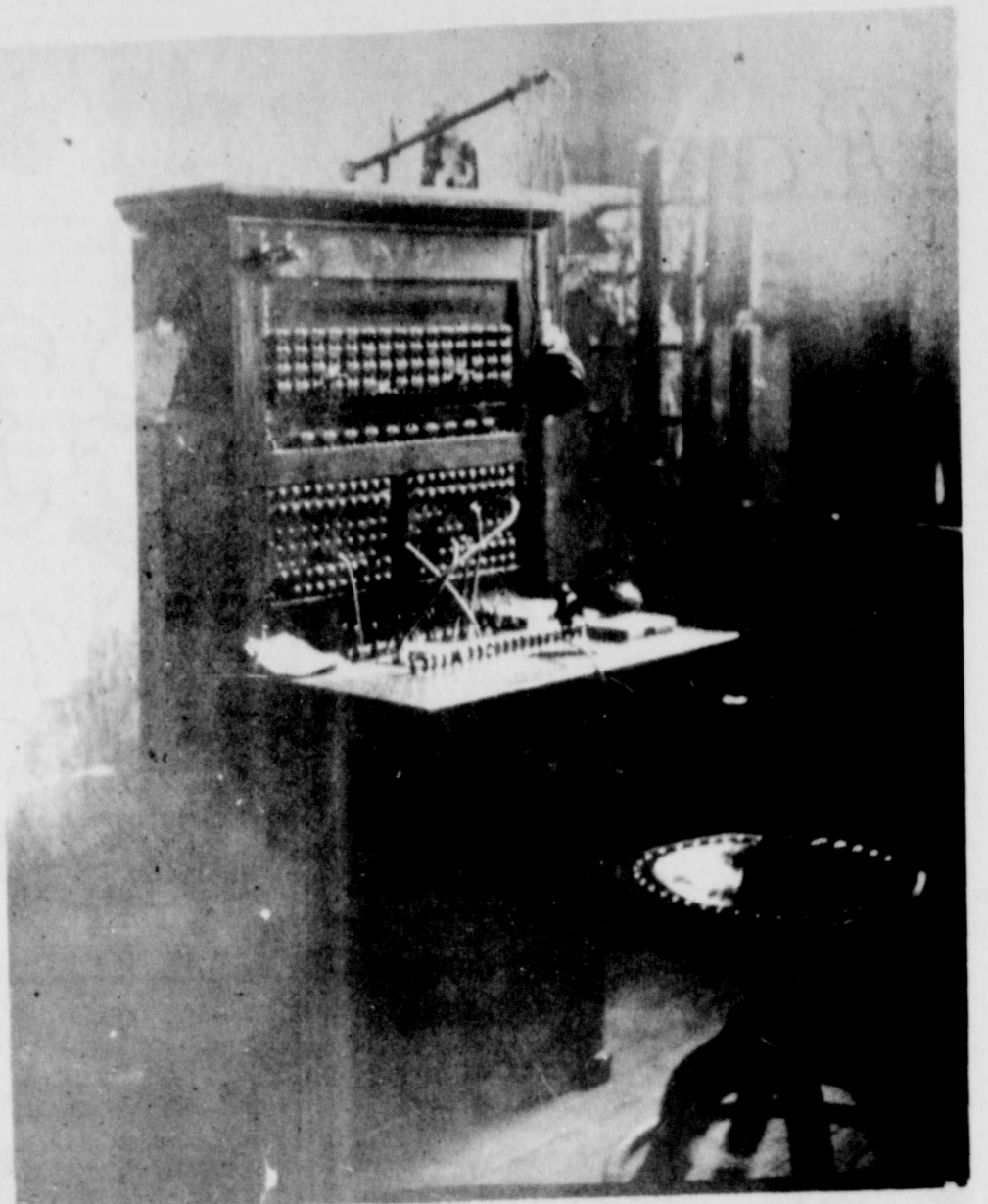

"The town has been divided into four sections with each section to field an athletic team made up of men and women of all ages," Butler said. "All team members must be proprietors or employees of Ranger based businesses or companies. Each team will have equal numbers of men

and women."

An assortment of zany games have been set for the Almost Anything Goes competition. Leading off will be "Here Come the Brides". In this game a man and a woman from each team will represent a bride and a groom. The object will be for the groom to drive a golf cart

blindfolded through an obstacle to the bride who will be shouting instructions from atop a stepladder. Upon reaching her he must climb the ladder, claim his bride and carry her across the threshold.

Game two will be "Bringing Home the Bacon". In this contest the

men will push a wheelbarrow carrying a pig and a woman through a relay course. Four men and four women plus one pig will participate on each team.

"Rush Hour" will be the third game. In this event a husband and wife jump out of bed, wife puts shaving cream on man and shaves him. Then he leaps into the shower and she begins peeling an egg. The husband dresses, runs to the breakfast table where he eats the egg, drinks a cup of coffee, then gets into the golf cart and the wife drives him to work across the finish line.

The fourth event will be the "Blind Puddin' Feed" in which a blindfolded person will feed pudding to a person with their hands tied behind their back.

"Road to Ruin" is just what it sounds like...a tough obstacle course run in a relay involving all twelve team members.

"Coming Round the Mountain" will be the sixth test featuring a person riding a bicycle in a circle with a bucket tied to his head. As he passes a stepladder, the person on top of the ladder must pour water into the bucket on his head, then climb down the ladder, get more water, go up the ladder and repeat the process until the rider's bucket is full.

"Treasure Hunt" will feature three members of each team going into the audience looking for scavenger hunt items from people in the crowd.

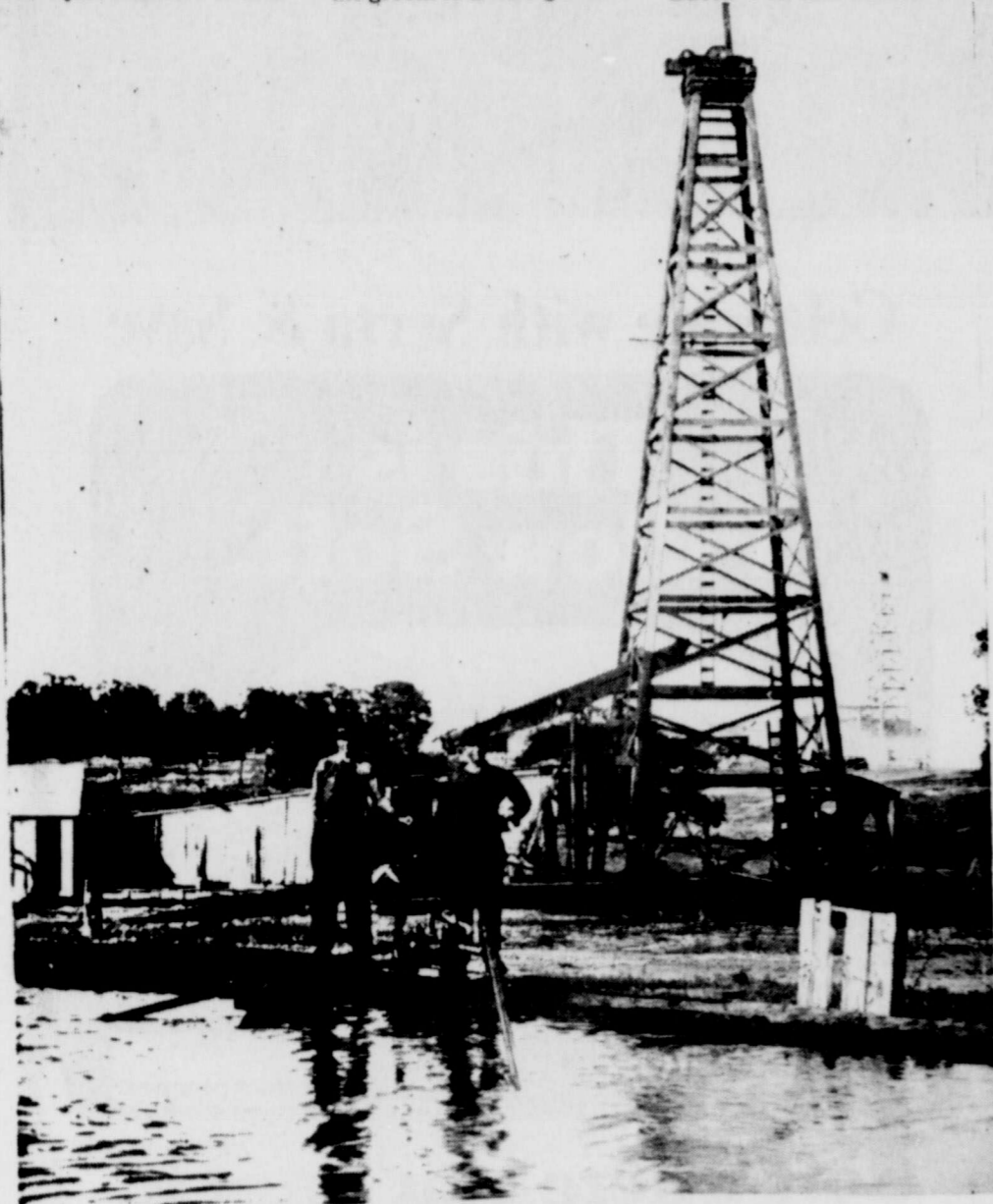
"Changing Partners" will be a relay in which a man in women's clothes will push a woman in men's clothes on a tricycle to a point then the man will give his clothes to another man and the woman will give her clothes to another woman then the relay will continue until one team crosses the finish line.

The ninth event, "Scrambled Eggs" will feature the entire team lined up one in front of another in a straight line. An egg is thrown to the first member in line. If they catch it intact they move to the end of the line but the line does not move forward. If the egg breaks the catcher is out of the game. This continues until only one catcher is left.

The final event should provide more thrills than the chariot race in "Ben Hur"...the "24-Legged Race". All twelve members of the team will tie their legs together and the first entire team to cross the finish line will be declared the winner.

Points will be awarded in each event and the overall winner will be judged accordingly. In case of a tie a sudden death extra event will be run.

Roaring Ranger Days Kicks Off Saturday

After months of planning "Roaring Ranger Days" will finally become a reality Saturday morning at 10 a.m. with the start of the big parade. Leading the procession down Main Street will be Grand Marshall George "Spanky" McFarland, star of the "Our Gang" and "Little Rascals" comedies and movies.

Following the parade the Roaring Ranger Museum will be dedicated and formally opened in a brief ceremony in front of the recently restored Texas and Pacific railroad depot. 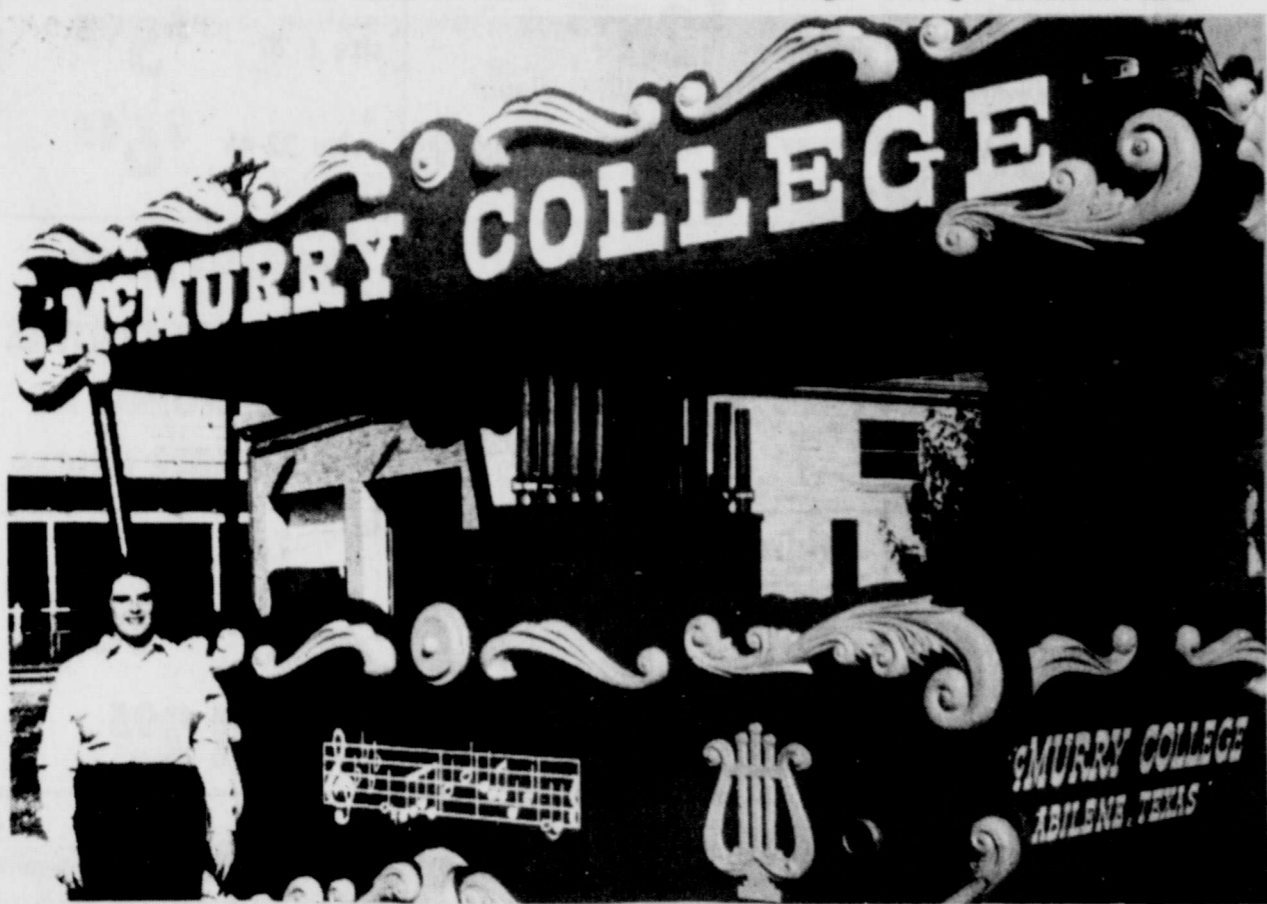

HELMET RESEARCH

Do woodpeckers and motorcyclists have anything in common? Scientists think they might—if the motorcyclists are wearing helmets. Researchers are studying how a woodpecker's skull construction keeps its head from being injured when it bores into a tree. The findings they come up with may mean better designed and more protective helmets for motorcyclists.



Even without this added research the Motorcycle Safety Foundation says the most important piece of protective gear any motorcyclist can use is a helmet. The woodpecker wears a built-in helmet—riders must fasten theirs on. And, they must wear their helmets every time they take a ride—no matter how short the trip. Woodpeckers don't have to think about their protective gear. Motorcyclists have to make a conscious decision to wear their helmets whenever they ride.

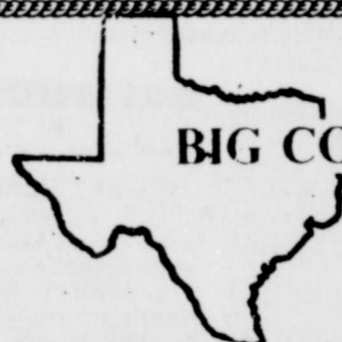

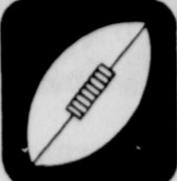

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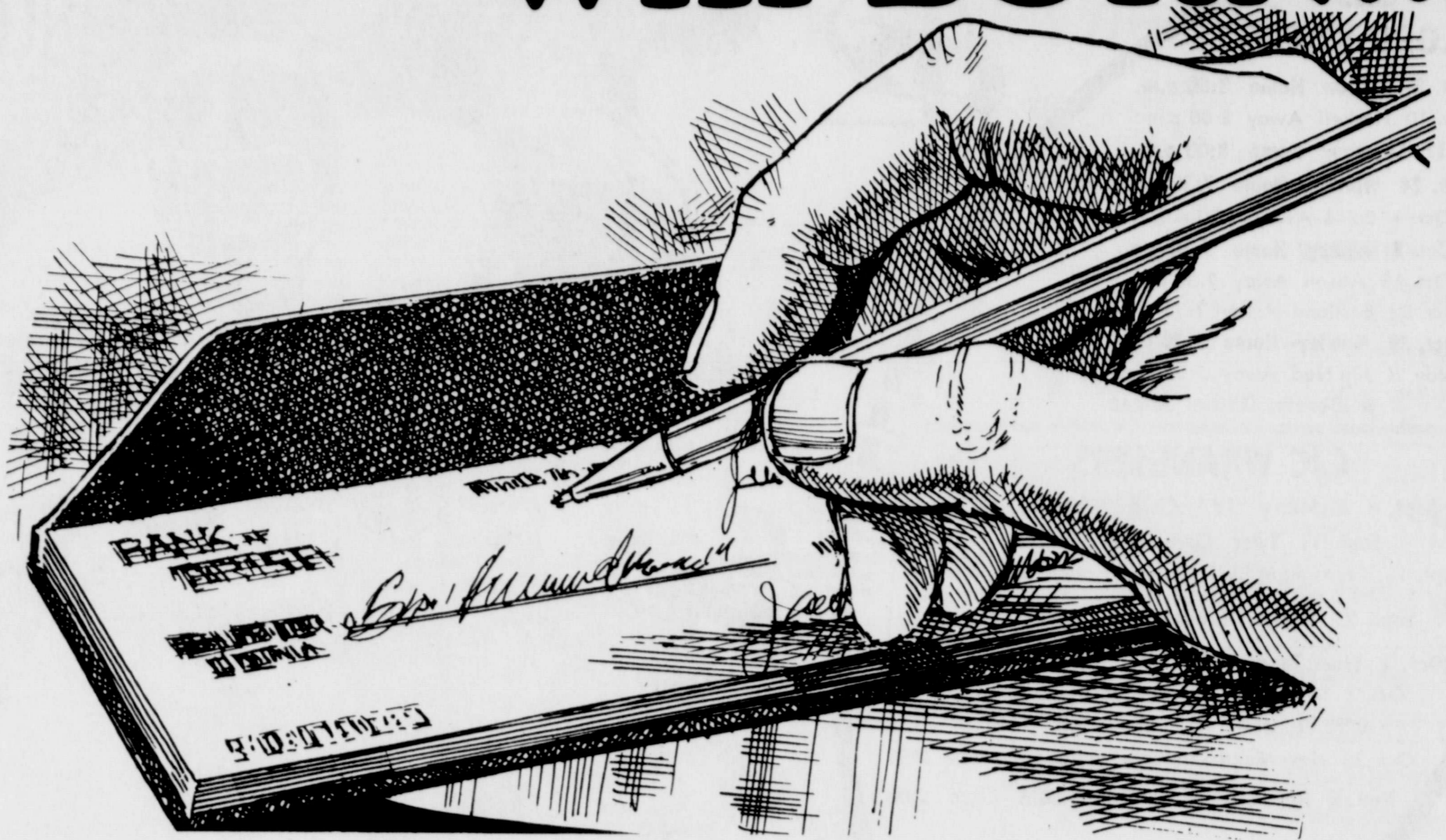

MH/MR Provides Child Screening

The Child Development Center of Central Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center in Brownwood has expanded its services to include Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch, Mills and San Saba counties.

A screening service will be provided every three (3) months for each county. Children from birth to five (5) can be screened when the mobile unit is in the county.

The screening will be held in Cisco on Wednesday, Oct. 13, at Cisco Primary School on Avenue A. Hours will be from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. The screening will be held in Eastland on Thurs-

day, Oct. 14, at Eastland Seibert Elementary on Ostrum and Sadosa Streets. Hours will be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

The screening will be held in Ranger on Thursday, Oct. 14, at Ranger Elementary School on Highway 80 East. Hours will be from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Children will be tested in the controlled environment of a large "mobile unit." Children who are placed in the Out-County Program will be visited on a weekly schedule by Nancy Burnett, the Out-County Rehabilitation Teacher. She will work closely with the parents to reinforce objectives being taught.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to administer, evaluates the child's social skills (playing, dressing, eating), fine motor activity (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor activity

(running, hopping, jumping, etc.), and language (speech, etc.). Any child who is found to be delayed in one or more areas will be given further tests for possible placement in the Home Bound Program or for referral to appropriate services.

Early intervention has proven beneficial to children, parents, and teachers in the detection and treatment of developmental delays in children. The intention of this program is to assist the Central Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center staff in identifying and providing treatment for these children.

There is a \$10.00 screening fee; however, no one will be refused services because of inability to pay.
