## C.J.C. Record At 4-2 Following 20-16 Loss

Since hindsight vision is 20/20, the Cisco Junior College Wranglers had that on their minds Tuesday night when they hosted the University of Texas at Arlington Junior Varsity in a 7:30 p.m. game.

"If we had just scored nine or 10 more points, we could be 6-0," reflected CJC head football coach Bob Keyes. Instead, the Wranglers are 4-2 for the season following last Thursday's 20-16 loss to the Texas Tech Red Raider JV.

"They (Tech) played a pretty good football team against us," Keyes reflected. "Again, we had several turnovers—including seven interceptions. We got behind quick."

Tech scored two quick touchdowns on the Wranglers—both following interceptions and one an interception return for a TD. That gave the Raiders a quick 14-0 lead over CJC before they could get anything going offensively.

Defensively, you couldn't ask for a better game, as Keyes suggests. "Defensively, we played another great game. The score could have been 34-16 if the defense hadn't played so well."

The Wranglers limited the Raiders to 173 yards total offense—with 84 rushing and 89 passing. "It's a hard loss," Keyes says, "the kids worked real hard."

As for the seven interceptions, Keyes said he couldn't blame them all on CJC quarterback Johnny Yglecias. "Two were the result of a breakdown in pass protection, two were tipped and two more were because he (Yglecias) was forced out of the pocket and just missed his target. The other one went for a touchdown," he recalls.

In Tuesday night's game, the Wranglers faced two players who formerly played for CJC—Victor Sendlein and Doug Shiflett. Sendlein was an honorable mention junior college all-American last season.

UTA pulled some players off the varsity for this game, and since the Mavericks have a game Saturday, they

asked that this game, originally scheduled for Thursday night, be moved to Tuesday, which posed a problem for the CJC coaches.

"They'll field a pretty good team against us," Keyes said Monday. "We'll only have two full days to prepare for them and that's going to be hard, especially after a loss."

This will be the only game of the year for the Mavs' JV squad.

Against Tech, the Wranglers finally got rolling on offense, at least long enough to get on the scoreboard a couple of times.

Running back Eugene Carodine capped a 84-yard, 13-play drive with a four-yard run near the end of the first quarter and Kioumars Rezaie's extra point closed the gap to 14-7.

After Tech countered with a field goal, Yglecias led the team on an eight play, 79-yard drive, completing passes to Lloyd Voight (for 25 and 21 yards) and a 31-yard scoring play to Alfred Garcia for the TD. Again Rezaie converted to make the score 17-14 at the half.

Five of the Tech interceptions came in the second half, one after the Wranglers had moved 43 yards in 11 plays to the Tech 32.

The Wranglers travel to Roswell, N.M., Saturday, Oct. 23, for their next game as they battle New Mexico Military Institute in a 2 p.m. contest.

CJC and NMMI have played nine games, with NMMI owning a 6-3 edge in the series. The Wranglers have won the last three meetings, including last year's 43-12 victory.

## CHS Lobos Cage Lions 43-35, Will Face Tigers In Anson Fri.

### Jr. High and J.V. Will Play Here Thursday

Cisco High School's Lobo varsity team upset the Albany Lions here last Friday night as they handed them their first defeat of the year in a 43-35 District 9-AA thriller.

The Lobos will be traveling to Anson this Friday night to take on the Tigers in probably their most important game, according to Head Coach Jim Puryear. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m. Cisco's Junior High and

Junior Varsity teams will play in Cisco Thursday against Anson. The games had originally been scheduled for play in Anson, but Cisco Junior College changed its Thursday night game to Tuesday so the other games were changed back to Cisco.

The seventh grade teams will begin play at 5:00 p.m. in Chesley Field, followed by the eighth grade and Junior Varsity games.

Coach Puryear said Anson has a tough defensive team this year with some big players, but they have not done much offensively. In six games they have scored 70 points but have only given up 68 points, an average of 11.3 points per game.

Anson's season record is 4-2 and their district record is 2-1, having lost to Albany (14-2) and defeated Hawley (19-7) and Jim Ned (11-8) in district competition.

The Lobos are 4-1-1 for the season and 2-0-1 in district play. The Lobos have played Winters (21-21), Baird (49-20) and Albany (43-35) in district competition.

Anson will be having its homecoming this Friday night and Coach Puryear stated the Tigers have lost very few homecoming games. He also said this year's Anson team has given up very few points. They have size but not much speed. He went on to say they have a good football team and Cisco feels it will be playing for a play-off spot when it takes on Anson.

Coach Puryear said Friday night's game with Anson is bigger than the Eastland game and they feel it is more important. He emphasized the Lobos need the support of their fans more than ever.

He said the Lobos have some bruises but everyone should be ready to play Friday. This week's lineup will be the same as last week's.

Concerning last Friday night's game with Albany, Coach Puryear commended the Lobo offensive line which he said was the key to the ball game. He said they opened up holes in Albany's defense for Cisco ball carriers "which you and I could have run through." He stated the offensive line has finally matured, "and that's what we have been waiting for."

In last Friday night's game, the Lobos ran over the Lions, rushing for a total of 413 yards compared to Albany's 191 rushing yards.

Albany made the first points when Billy Boland scored a one-yard touchdown. The extra point attempt failed making the score 6-0 with 8:10 left in the first quarter.

In less than two minutes, Albany scored again on a one-yard touchdown run by Boland. The PAT kick by James Schkade was good giving Albany a 13-0 lead with 6:39 left in the first quarter.

The Lobos lit up their side of the scoreboard when Jason Potter scored a three-yard touchdown with 2:07 left in the first quarter. The extra point try was no good

making the score 13-6.

Before the end of the first quarter, the Lobos took the lead in the game when Potter scored on a two-yard touchdown run. Quarterback Randall Rattan kept the ball for an additional two points on the conversion play putting the Lobos ahead 14-13 with 57 seconds left in the first quarter.

The Lobos scored first in the second quarter on a five-yard touchdown run by Potter. The PAT kick was no good for a score of 20-13.

The Lions narrowed Cisco's lead when Boland scored on a four-yard touchdown run. The PAT kick missed making the score 20-19 with 4:12 left in the second quarter of the first half.

With 54 seconds left in the half Cisco widened their half-time lead to 27-19 when Brian Fleming made a three-yard touchdown run. The PAT kick by Kenneth Preston was good giving Cisco the half-time lead.

In the third quarter, Albany came back and tied up the score on a nine-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jamie Garcia to Rob Hudman. QB Garcia added two more points on the conversion play with a keeper.

Cisco was unable to score during the third quarter of play which ended in a 27-27 tie; however, in the fourth quarter Cisco scored twice and held Albany to one touchdown for the win.

Lobo Brian Fleming scored first in the final quarter on a 12-yard run which was followed by a two-point conversion by Potter making the score 35-27.

Potter made Cisco's final touchdown on a one-yard run and the PAT try was good for two points making the score 43-27 with 8:46 left in the game.

Albany tried to rally back but the best they could do was a five-yard touchdown pass to Todd Burdine. He also added two extra points on the conversion play with another pass, making the final score 43-35.

Potter carried the ball 43 times for a total of 285 yards for Cisco in the game against Albany. He also made four of Cisco's six touchdowns to help contribute to the Lobos win.

Albany Head Coach Tank Nelson said, the Lions suffered a blow which greatly contributed to the loss, when junior James Schkade, a running back, was lost for the season. Schkade, a consistently leading player for the Lions, was thought at first to have a minor knee injury, but upon examination, doctors found a broken rotator cup in his right leg, Nelson said.

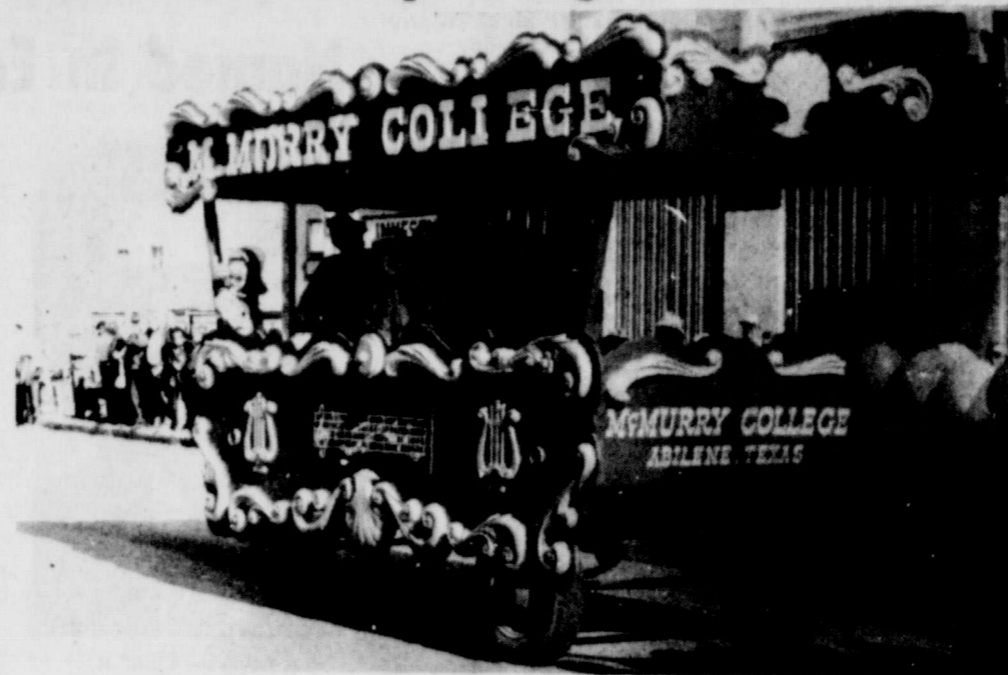

## Hundreds Help Ranger Roar During Celebration Saturday



Hundreds of people came to Ranger Saturday, October 9, to be a part of the festivities marking the first annual Roaring Ranger Days. The celebration was sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the many hours of planning and hard work put into this day paid off with the success of each event. Everyone connected with the preparations knew this would be an exciting day, filled with a variety of activities, and all were very pleased with the crowds and the enthusiasm shown each segment of the days schedule of events.

Starting with the long and colorful parade with Spanky McFarland as grand master. The celebrity of the day the leader of the "Our Gang," "Little Rascals" movies.

The dedication of the museum at the depot was an impressive and important time for the citizens of Ranger who want to keep the

past alive and remembered. The days before the oil boom of 1917 plus the unusual happenings of a town that had a population of 800 then suddenly there was an excess of 30,000 people. The memories of many local families are among the memorabilia and artifacts already housed in this new museum but the building is among the most prized and noteworthy objects of lasting interest. The depot was given to the city by the Missouri and Pacific Railroad Company and will house the office of the Chamber of Commerce and the newly formed Ranger Exes Sports Hall of Fame along with the museum. The oil boom made changes and created situations that must be preserved and remembered but the actions of Ranger today will be the history of tomorrow and this too will need to be preserved. Now there is a place in Ranger for these things and they will live on and continued to be told when the folks who experienced them are no longer around to tell their stories.

Stories and pictures of the muddy unpaved streets in town during the oil boom created a problem in crossing from one side to the other and sleds pulled by mules were devised, for payment one could ride back and forth. Thinking of this made Jerry Richardson come up with the idea of the ingenious game of 'swamp surfing'. For just this one event a hole was dug 100 feet long and 50 feet wide on an empty lot. This hole was filled with water mixed with drilling

mud and contestants paid money to ride a cushion with a cord attached to a dune buggie.

On signal the driver of the dune buggie would pull the contestants through the muck and mire. Those who remained standing at the end could then compete in the first world championship swamp surfing. After hours and several heats, the first champion and winner of the \$50 prize money was Jerry "Killer" King of Ranger.

The street fair covered three blocks and was complete with food booths, a cake walk and a flea market. At 6:30 p.m. Rangers version of the games "Almost Anything Goes" was held at Bulldog Stadium. Spanky McFarland and Tommy Brashier shared the emceeing of the three hours of team games. There were four teams, the Southeast Fabulous Red team, the Northwest Rebels, the Northeast Bombers and the Southwest Swamp Ratz. After many battles in each event, WE of the Swamp Ratz team were the winning team. A trophy was presented to Boss Hogg (Harvey Lipkin) on Tuesday, October 12.

A street dance ended the days activities. Those who attended are already looking forward to the second annual Roaring Ranger Days.



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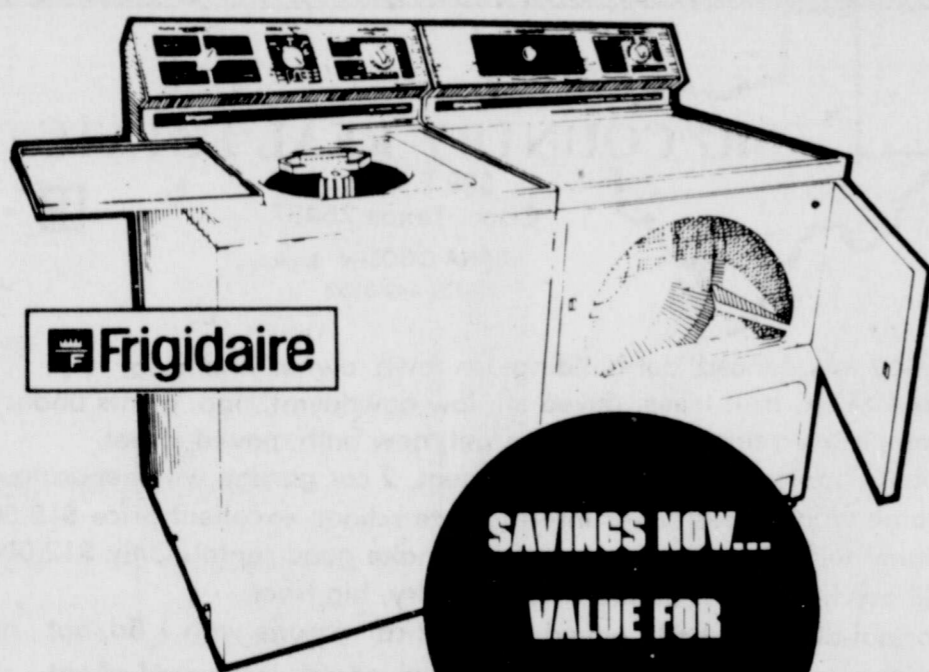

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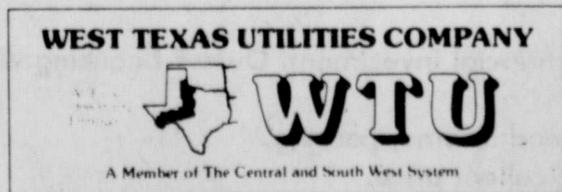

### Preparing for major industry changes

Two changes are coming up which will have a significant impact on how Southwestern Bell provides telephone service to its customers.

First, there's the decision by the Federal Communications Commission (which regulates telecommunications on the national level) that AT&T (the parent company of the Bell System) should set up a fully separate subsidiary to market telephone equipment.

This subsidiary, called American Bell, is expected to begin operations on January 1, 1983.

Competition in providing customer equipment has been an established fact for several years now. The introduction of American Bell into the picture will provide one more option for customers when it comes to selecting a vendor for such things as telephones, PBX's and other communications equipment.

An even bigger change is slated for January 1, 1984. That's the target date for Southwestern Bell being divested from AT&T.

After this divestiture, Southwestern Bell will be primarily a local telephone company. Most of our long distance calling facilities will remain with AT&T.

The 22 divested Bell telephone companies, like Southwestern Bell, will be reorganized into seven re-

gional units. Southwestern Bell will be one of these seven units.

After divestiture, we'll continue to provide basic local phone services, Custom Calling Services, Yellow Pages and special network services. We'll also be allowed to offer telephones and other terminal equipment.

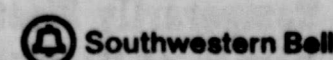

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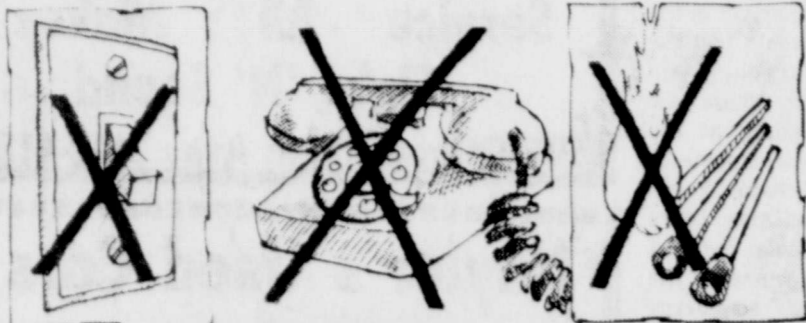

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# Changes In Small Churches Discussed At Annual Conference

Rural or small church congregations are undergoing a lot of change, and this is causing alienation among people, said an official of the United Methodist Church of Houston here today (Oct. 4). Bishop Finis Crutchfield, speaking at the 37th Annual Town and Country Church Conference, cited four causes of alienation on today's small churches:

1. Loss of sense of community—no closely knit neighborhoods.

2. Movement of people from urban to rural areas.
3. Absentee ownership of land and other resources.
4. Impact of industry on the church.

"The church today must have a reconciling role," said Crutchfield. "Reconciliation is the church's fundamental role."

"The church must simply be the church," he emphasized. "It is not the church unless it is open to all persons—it cannot be a closed corporation. The church cannot be 'closed' due to family or social molds."

Crutchfield also called for churches to be more ecumenical, to provide recreational programs due to increasing leisure time, and to play a bigger role in counseling and interpersonal relationships.

"The church is the last great unregulated volunteer institution in the U.S.," he said. "It is the principal hope for a free humanity."

In opening remarks to some 200 small town ministers and church lay leaders attending the conference, Texas A&M University System Chancellor Dr. Arthur Hansen lauded conference participants for their work and the tremendous responsibility they have in providing guidance to those in their congregations.

"You are persons who influence others and I applaud you on your desire to become better informed about the issues of today," he said. "You have a demanding position that requires a knowledge about a wide range of subjects as you influence others and shape their ideas and thoughts," Hansen said.

Two other speakers, Frank Sturzl with the Texas Municipal League and John Clary with the Texas Department of Community Affairs, both of Austin, discussed the impact of the "New Federalism" on community churches.

Sturzl said that the philosophy of new federalism is for the federal government to do less, to put more responsibility at state and local levels of government, and to let volunteers fill the gap for other services.

"Federal budget cuts have been mainly on monies normally transferred to state and local governments, which amounted to 15 percent of the total budget this year," said Sturzl. "And there will be more cuts in these monies, so volunteerism will become more important. However, it is the most neglected aspect of the new federalism."

Sturzl cited three reasons why volunteerism hasn't progressed:

1. Volunteerism has been ignored.
2. It has been blocked by the widespread attitude that what people are giving in taxes is all they're going to give. People no longer are as willing to give of their time and resources.

3. Problems for volunteerism are so large that people can't see how they can be of help or make any difference.

Clary stressed the important of determining the real needs of a community before embarking on a plan to recruit volunteers for

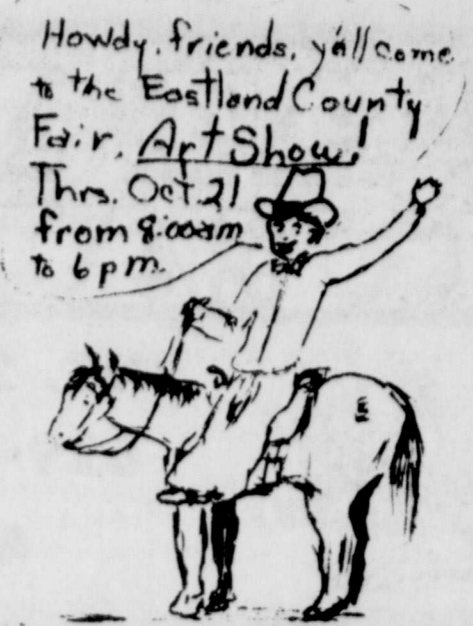
various projects and activities. He challenged the ministers and church leaders at the conference to stress to their congregations the importance of giving of oneself rather than just giving dollars.

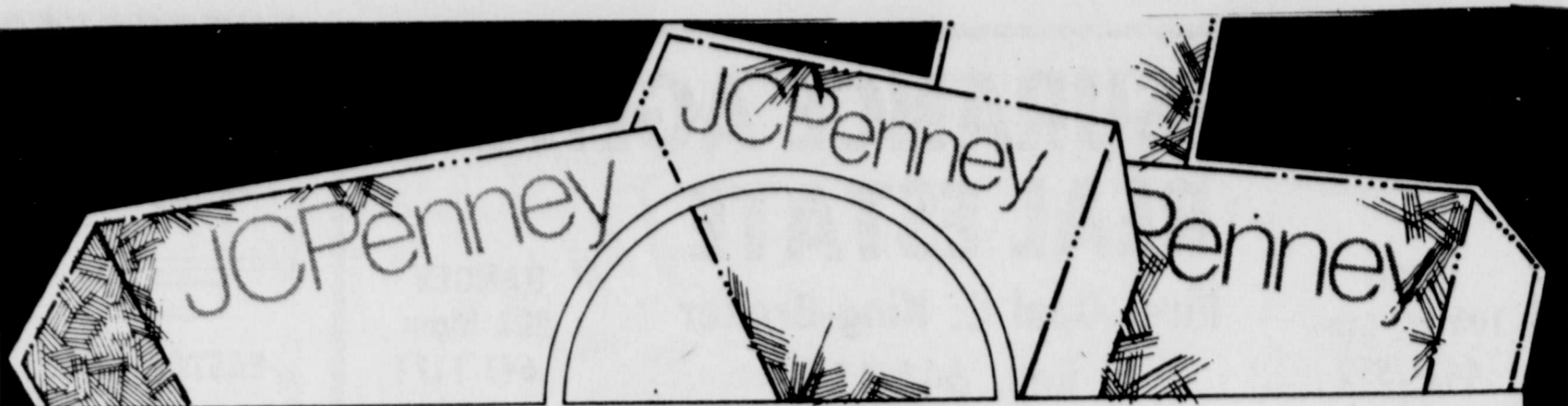

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# Senator Glasgow Reviews Amendment Number Two

AMENDMENT NO. 2

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by law for assistance grants, medical care, and services to needy persons."

This proposed amendment would raise the welfare ceiling limit in Texas for aid to dependent children recipients.

ponents. This raise would be from the limit of \$80 million annually paid out for AFDC recipients to a ceiling of \$160 million for the 1982 and 1983 biennium. Thereafter the limit would be one percent of the state budget each year (the annual state budget presently is about thirteen or fourteen billion dollars).

The \$80 million ceiling was enacted in 1969. With the increase in population and the affects of inflation, the ceiling causes the average payment for a dependent child to be \$34 a month. The Legislature felt that this was too low and chose to submit the amendment to the voters for their review to raise the ceiling.

Additionally, the present loan requires matching federal funds before the State can make assistance grants. Presently, negotiations are being conducted between representatives of the Reagan Administration, members of congress and state officials concerning the "swap" in which the Federal government would assume the responsibility for Medicaid, while the States would assume full responsibility for AFDC.

Although the likelihood of this trade being made is not as great as it once was, if the swap did take place and the Federal aid was cut out, it would be a violation of the Texas Constitution for Texas to place any funds into AFDC. If the Federal matching funds were reduced drastically, the level of allowable State funds might be inadequate to meet the needs of the truly needy children.

## ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. If the federal government reduces the stops AFDC funding, the level of allowable state aid to the needy would be cut or completely stopped because of the current constitutional restriction. The proposed amendment should be adopted to ensure that the AFDC program can operate at levels sufficient to meet the needs of the poor.

2. In spite of meager payments to welfare recipients, inflation, changes in the federal welfare system, and increases in the number of recipients have caused the current ceiling on assistance grants to become inadequate. The proposed constitutional amendment provides flexibility in determining the ceiling and this eliminates the need to frequently amend the constitution to increase the spending limit.

AGAINST

1. Welfare spending should be reduced. Instead of reductions, this amendment would contribute to spending increases by raising the ceiling on assistance grants.

Emphasis should be placed on assuring that welfare money is spent only on those in need rather than increasing the amount spent.

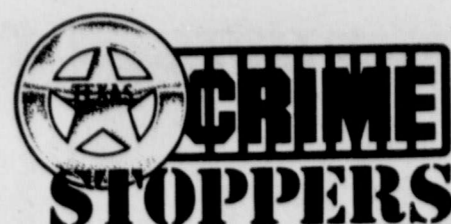
2. The ceiling on assistance grants set in the proposed amendment for the years after the 1982-1983 biennium is too uncertain. The term "state budget" is not defined by the proposed amendment and this results in some ambiguity. The wording grants the legislature the authority to determine what constitutes the percent of the state budget without providing necessary guidance. All funds appropriated by the legislature can be considered in determining the state budget, and this could include millions of dollars received in Federal funds. If a variable ceiling is to be adopted, the wording of the amendment should set out that ceiling clearly and definitely.

For the month of August, the Crime Stoppers Advisory Council is focusing the statewide "Crime of the Month" on fencing. Any citizen having information regarding the fencing of stolen property

is urged to call the Crime Stoppers hotline at 1-800-252-TIPS. Cash rewards are available for information leading to the arrest and indictment of these criminals.

Your local Police Department will be happy to supply you with equipment needed to identify your belongings. This step toward crime prevention could be the deciding factor for a thief. Call 1-800-252-TIPS and help stop this lucrative business in Texas.

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## Farm Picture Bleak But Hope Remains

Texas farmers are suffering from a siege of economic setbacks that are the most serious since the depression of the '30s. But despite the catastrophic situation, there is some glimmer of hope as farmers forge ahead and plan for 1983.

"Both weather and the marketplace have devastated the hopes of many producers this year," said Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "It's been a year filled with widespread crop losses due to hail, wind, floods and drought, and now at harvest time, huge stockpiles of most crops coupled with a sagging demand are driving prices below production costs."

And delinquent loans are running rampant, with almost half of the 25,000 Texas farmers with Farmers Home Administration loans behind in their payments. To make matters worse, most have nowhere else to turn for financial backing, said Anderson.

Many farm prices have been driven through the floor by huge crops the past two years, noted the economist.

During the first half of 1982, prices for cotton, cottonseed, rice and hay dropped more than 30 percent below the same period last year and grain sorghum averaged about 20 percent less.

Texas livestock producers are faring a little better than crop growers. Hog prices are up 21 percent and beef cattle prices are holding even compared to the first half of 1981 while milk prices are off slightly. Prices for calves, sheep, turkey and eggs are averaging 5 to 10 percent less while wool prices are off 20 percent.

Along with poor prices, farmers continue to face high interest rates when compared to returns to investments generated from their operations, and high exchange rates have destroyed growth in the export market, Anderson said.

With this overall dismal situation, how can there be hope for farmers? "Economic health can return from either lower supplies or increased demand that will boost market prices or through more favorable farm program prices," said Anderson. "Either adjustment may

take up to three years to develop fully.

"Currently, Texas farmers are looking to Commodity Credit Corporation loan rate, farmer-held reserve loan rates and target prices as their main hope for surviving the most severe financial pressure in half a century," he said. "Unfortunately, earlier this year many of them did not recognize the benefits of support prices and the looming financial dangers."

According to Anderson, failure of more than half of the sorghum farmers to take part in the farm program has caused grain prices to fall sharply below the CCC loan rate. This resulted because nonparticipants were ineligible to put their grain into the loan program and thus had to dump large amounts on the open market, driving prices down.

Now farmers must look ahead to the 1983 farm program. Specifics of the program are being developed, said Anderson, and should be available soon for planning next year's crop.

However, farmers can use expected target prices and loan rates for various crops in their early planning. Expected target prices are \$4.30 per bu. for wheat, \$2.86 per bu. for corn, \$4.91 per cwt. for grain sorghum, 76 cents a lb. to \$3.65 per bu. for wheat, \$2.65 per bu. for corn, \$4.50 per cwt. for grain sorghum, 55 cents per lb. for cotton and \$8.55 per cwt. for rice. Anticipated farmer-held reserve loan rates are \$4 per bu. for wheat, \$2.90 per bu. for corn, and \$4.91 per cwt. for grain sorghum. There is no reserve loan for cotton and rice.

Using these anticipated figures, maximum deficiency payments (difference between target price and CCC loan rate) that farmers could expect are 65 cents per bu. for wheat, 21 cents per

bu. for corn, 41 cents per cwt. for grain sorghum, 21 cents a lb. for cotton and \$2.85 per cwt. for rice.

"Since reduced production will be a major goal of next year's farm program it will likely call for laying out 15 to 25 percent of the base acreage for each eligible crop," said Anderson. "Farmers should take this into consideration as they begin land preparation and fertilizer and herbicide applications for next year's crops."

1983 farm income could improve some with increased participation in the farm program since reduced production would help the supply situation and allow loan rates to be more effective in setting price floors. On the demand side, lower interest rates should give a boost to the marketplace. And an improved economic climate could spur the demand for farm products, said the economist.

Meanwhile, farmers will be looking at controlling or minimizing operating expenses, evaluating alternative crops for highest returns while taking as little price risk as possible, foregoing capital purchases and taking a hard look at full participation in the government farm program, Anderson said.

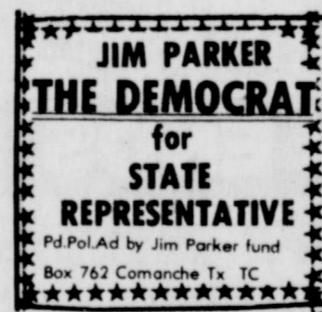

### Harvest Vegetables At Peak of Taste

Too many first-time gardeners, anxious for their reward, being harvesting before vegetables are ripe and most flavorful. On the other hand, more experienced gardeners may tend to let vegetables over-ripen on the premise that bigger is better. The secret to harvesting success is not too late, not too early—but just as vegetables are at their flavorful best.

To help you get the flavor from your garden, here are some harvesting suggestions for popular garden vegetables.

**ASPARAGUS**--Do not harvest asparagus until the third year it is in your garden. Asparagus spears are ready to harvest when 6 to 8 inches long.

**BROCCOLI**--Harvest broccoli when the head stops growing. Cut the bunch before the bud clusters spread out. As long as the buds are tight the flavor will be good. Once the buds spread and turn yellow, the flavor will turn quite strong.

**CABBAGE**--Harvest as soon as head start to form or

when wanted. Flavor will not change much with the age of the cabbage.

**CUCUMBERS**--As soon as they reach three inches, cukes are ready to pick. Pick as much as you want and you'll greatly increase your yield. But don't let them get too large.

**GREEN BEANS**--With green beans watch internal developments more than exterior pod size. The best guide to optimum maturity is seed-size development. You'll want to pick them when pods reach full size but before seeds get too large.

**GREEN LEAFY VEGETABLES**--The younger you pick them, the better and sweeter the crop will be. Pick the outer leaves first and harvest often. It is better to enjoy the crop than to let the plants become bitter. Pick in early morning, this tends to delay wilting.

**ONIONS**--When you pick immature onions, you'll have "green onions." Harvest small bulbs as you need them throughout the

summer. When the tops begin to dry and fall over, you'll know it's harvest time. Dig up the onions and let them sit in the sun several days to dry before storage.

**PEPPERS**--Once firm and green, peppers are ready to pick. Although the bigger they are, the thicker the skin will get. If allowed to stay on the vine, they will turn red but not hot in taste.

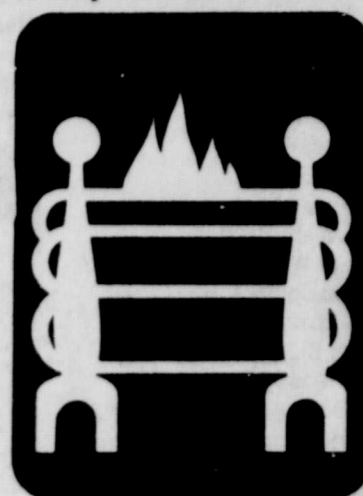
**POTATOES**--Potatoes are harvested after the vines have died.

**SQUASH**--There are basically two classifications of squash: summer and winter. The key to harvesting squash is its skin. Summer squash is ripe when the rind is easily penetrated by your nail. Winter squash, with its hard shell, resists pressure. Since squash are such great producers you can experiment with harvesting at different stages of growth. Test which sizes have the most desirable flavor. Squash may grow to large sizes but in general, squash are tastiest when in the small to medium size range.

**TOMATOES**--Pick at full color. After the first pink shows, the fruit will reach full color in about five days. The longer they stay on the

vine, the better they get, but pick them before they start to soften. In the fall, pick all remaining fruits before the first frost and ripen in a dark area at 60° to 70° F.

#### Home Heating

Fall signals the start of the home heating season for much of the nation. Check your heating equipment BEFORE the heating season gets too far along.

- Check furnaces, fireplaces, stoves and portable heaters. Service as necessary to avoid fire risk, excessive energy consumption and breakdown.
- Check flues and chimneys. If you burn wood, your chimney may need cleaning more often to remove creosote build-up.
- Provide adequate ventilation when using kerosene, oil or LP-gas heaters.
- Set portable heaters away from combustibles and where they won't be bumped or tipped.

**'Get It Together' Launched**

A new national safety campaign, which focuses on use of automobile safety belts and child auto safety, has just been launched and will continue until mid-1983 under the name, "Get It Together." People desiring more information about the safety program should contact local county Extension offices.

"This national educational effort provides opportunities to help reduce the grim death and disability statistics from automobile accidents," explains Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health educational specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Co-sponsors for the campaign are the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, the National Extension Homemakers Council, Inc., and the Department of Transportation.

"Many people do not believe that they will ever be involved in an automobile accident. National statistics show, however, that just about everyone can expect to be in a car crash every 10 years, and for one for every 20 persons the crash will be serious," Shirer says. Additionally, for one of every 60 children born today, the crash will be fatal, according to the statistics. The National Highway Traffic Administration reports that only one in 10 people wear auto safety belts, yet by buckling up the safety belts, people have a 60 percent better chance of staying alive in a potentially fatal accident. "More than 50,000 people lose their lives in automobile crashes annually. Increasing safety belt use by 30 to 40 percent would save 14,000 lives each year," she says. Automobile accidents represent the number one cause of death among people 44 years of age and younger. The president of the American Academy of Pediatrics reports that car crashes kill more children—2,000 each year—than polio, diphtheria, measles, mumps and rubella. "Eighty percent of all deaths and serious injuries occur in cars traveling under 40 miles per hour, and 75 percent of the deaths or injuries occur less than 25 miles from home," Shirer says. In Texas, the Department of Public Safety said that 98.5 percent of all people killed in passenger cars, trucks and buses in 1980 were not wearing seat belts.

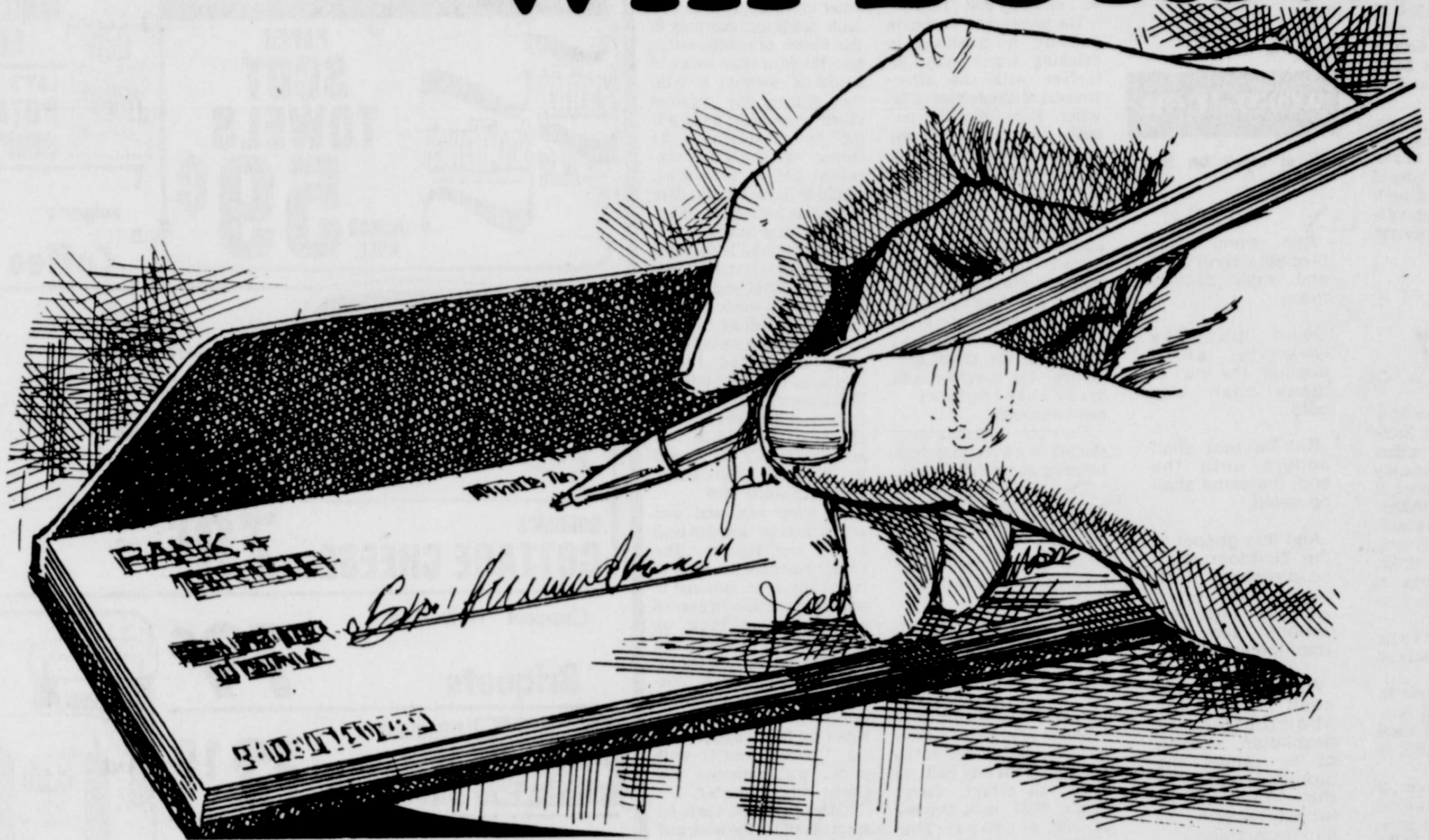

Dear Customer:

The City of Cisco during the month of August, 1982, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.
