CJC Wranglers Are 4-3 For Season Following 21-16 Loss

Suddenly, the Cisco Junior College Wranglers find themselves 4-3 for the season—and wondering what will happen when bowl-picking time comes around.

Last season, the Wranglers finished 7-2 during the regular season and were invited to the Wool Bowl in Roswell, N.M., only to lose to Snow College of Utah.

This season, several things will have to happen before the Wranglers are considered for a bowl—and Tuesday night's 21-16 loss to the University of Texas at Ar-

lington's junior varsity didn't help matters any.

Head coach Bob Keyes isn't making any excuses for the Wranglers, but he did reflect on the two days the Wranglers had to prepare for the Mavericks after the game was changed from Thursday to Tuesday.

"That made a difference for us, physically, I think," Keyes says. "They brought some real good football players, but that didn't hurt us that much. We still had opportunities to win."

One thing that Keyes is thankful for is that the two-day change gives the

Wranglers a little more time to heal from some injuries. CJC will have at least three players back who've been out several weeks—Robbie Birdwell, Burt Burnell and Keith McCarty—and Nate Lindsay, the Wranglers' No. 6 tackler through six games will be back in the lineup.

CJC's next game is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 23, when the Wranglers travel to Roswell, N.M., to battle the New Mexico Military Institute Broncos.

The Wranglers have won the last three meetings between the two clubs, but Keyes is concerned.

"They (the Broncos) play well up there, and, so far at least, we don't. They think they can compete with us," Keyes says.

"They didn't play well last year (CJC won 43-12 in Cisco), so they're after us. It's their homecoming, too. They have an open date this week so they'll have time to get some of their injuries healed, too."

The Broncos are 0-5 for the season, but have played some very tough competition, according to Keyes. "They lost to Sul Ross on a week when Sul Ross had an open date and loaded up on them. They also have lost to four Arizona schools, one of which is rated in the top 10," Keyes reflects.

About the loss to UTA, Keyes says, "It really hurt all the kids, and it hurt the coaches, too. We felt like we played well at times, but the fact that we started most of our freshmen didn't beat us. Our quarterback played well, the receivers played well—dropped a few passes they could have caught, but we played well enough to win—we just didn't."

CJC quarterback Johnny Yglecias has his best game of the season, completing 18 of 38 passes for 233 yards and only one interception—a far cry from last week's seven interceptions.

Willie Williams, a freshman wide receiver, pulled down eight of those passes for 107 yards, and another went to Eugene Carodine for a nine-yard touchdown toss.

However, the Wranglers just couldn't contain the Mavericks, who rolled up 350 yards of total offense against a usually stingy Wrangler defense.

CJC got a safety early when Stuart Stubbs helped pull down a Maverick in the end zone, but there were only 30 seconds left in the first half when the Wranglers finally found paydirt.

The scoring pass from Yglecias to Carodine came at that point, and Kioumars Rezaie's extra point boot gave the Wranglers the lead for the only time in the game, 9-7.

After intermission, the Mavericks came storming back with Shane Giese going in to give the UTA squad the lead for good. CJC got a two-yard effort from Sylvester Gregory with 5:05 left in the game and Rezaie's PAT closed the gap to the final margin, 21-16.

CJC got one more chance. Yglecias completed a 15-yard pass to Gregory to move the ball to the Mav 33, then the signal caller scrambled for three yards. On the next play, however, Yglecias fumbled the snap for a two-yard loss and then tossed two incomplete passes to kill the Wrangler hopes for a comeback victory.

Cisco's Junior Varsity team still remains undefeated after beating the Anson Tiger J.V. here Thursday night by the score of 22-13; however, Cisco's seventh and eighth grade teams both lost their games. The seventh grade score was 26-6 and the eighth grade score was 30-6.

In the seventh grade game, Anson scored first on a 15-yard run with 1:55 left in the first quarter. The try for two extra points was good making the score 8-0.

Cisco's Kevin Kirk returned a punt in the first half for an apparent 65-yard

touchdown run, but a penalty on the play, against Cisco, wiped out the score.

Anson's second and third touchdowns occurred in the second quarter of the first half. The first was a one-yard touchdown run with 2:44 left in the quarter. The try for two was no good making the score 14-0. The second touchdown was a 40-yard run with 1:04 left in the half. Again, the try for two was no good making the score 20-0.

Cisco managed to score in the first half when Brian Wagon busted loose for a 50-yard touchdown run with

three seconds left. A pass for two extra points fell incomplete, making the halftime score 20-6.

Anson's final touchdown came about with 19 seconds left in the third quarter. It was a 15-yard run and the try for two was no good making the final score 26-6.

Cisco's eighth grade team, which had been undefeated for the past two years, saw its perfect Junior High record come to an end Thursday night as it suffered its first loss.

Anson, which scored in every quarter of the game, got its first touchdown with 3:10 left in the first quarter on a one-yard touchdown run. The try for two was good making the score 8-0.

In the second quarter Anson scored again, this time on a 58-yard run. The try for two was good making the score 16-0 with 19 seconds left in the half which ended with no one else scoring.

Cisco's only score came on the second half kick-off when Jason Rattan returned the ball 65 yards for a touchdown with 7:46 left in the third quarter. The try for two was no good making the score 16-6.

Anson scored in the third quarter on a 10-yard run and the try for two was good. With 1:25 left in the quarter, the score was 24-6.

The final score of the game came about with 5:24 left to play, when Anson scored from 13 yards out. The try for two was no good making the final score 30-6.

The Junior Varsity Lobo team kept their undefeated record, after being behind 13-8 at the half, by scoring twice in the final quarter of play.

Anson scored twice, once in the first quarter and once in the second quarter, to make it seem as though Anson might be headed for its third victory of the night.

Cisco was able to get on the scoreboard during the first quarter of play on an 11-yard run by Billy Escovedo. The try for two points, a pass from quarterback Joe Perry to Patrick Qualls, was good giving Cisco its only first half score.

However, in the final quarter of play, Cisco was able to score with a one-yard run by QB Perry. A pass from Perry to Tommy Elrod gained two extra points to put Cisco ahead by the score of 16-13.

Cisco put the icing on the cake when QB Perry scored on another one yard run later in the quarter. The try for two was no good making the final score 22-13.

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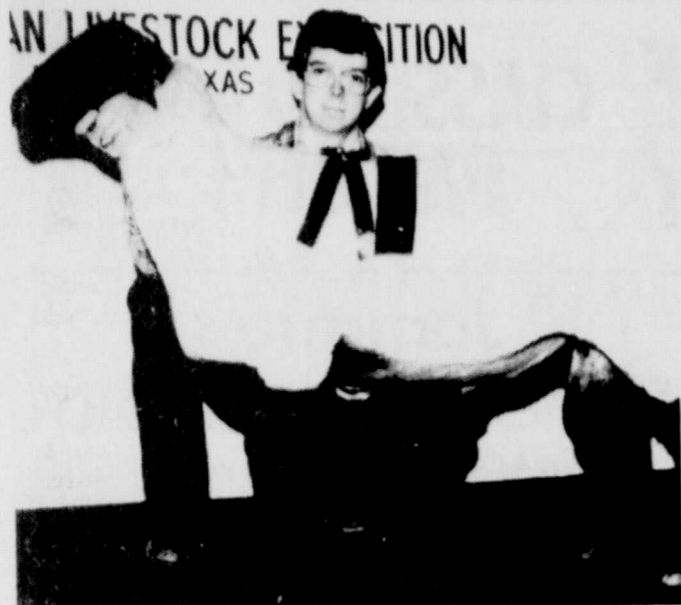
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Tommy Claborn Adds To Honors At Dallas Fair & Livestock Show

When you purchase medication, examine the lid and the container cover. Many medications have sealed containers. Look at the package very slowly and ask yourself... "has the medication been tampered with?" If you feel the bottle, or container, has been opened, when it should have been

sealed, or if the container has been damaged in any way, call it to the attention of the store clerk.

Remember...medicine is to make us well, not to make us ill. Let us be aware of the medication we take...regardless whether it be prescription or non-prescription.

AMENDMENT NO. 3

By Senator Bob Glasgow

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry from ad valorem taxation."

This amendment proposes to exempt from ad valorem taxation implements of husbandry used in the production of farm or ranch products.

In 1981, the Legislature amended the property tax code to provide "an individual is entitled to an exemption from property taxation implements for farming or ranching that he owns and uses in the production of farm or ranch products."

The Constitution presently allows the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation "the personal property homestead of a family or an adult." Personal property homestead is defined in the Constitution as the personal property of a family or an adult that is exempt from forced sale for debt. There is an exemption ceiling on personal property for a family

of \$30,000 and for a single adult \$15,000. An Attorney General's Opinion held that this limit applied to the exemption of farm implements. Thus the necessity for the Constitutional Amendment if all farm implements are to be excluded from the property tax.

Also, the Attorney General's Opinion held that the exemption applied only to the property of an individual and not to farm partnerships or corporations.

This proposed constitutional amendment would remove the \$30,000/\$15,000 ceiling and make the exemption available to all engaged in farming - individuals, partners and corporations.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The proposed amendment promises partial relief for economically pressed farmers and ranchers without serious adverse effect on local governments' tax bases.

2. Taxing agricultural equipment and machinery often is barely cost-effective because of the disproportionately high expense of locating the property and assessing and collecting the tax.

AGAINST:

1. The voters have amended the constitution twice since 1979 to give tax relief to farmers and ranchers--expanding eligibility for favorable methods of valuing agricultural land and totally exempting from taxation livestock and poultry in the hands of the producer. Additional tax relief for farmers and ranchers is not needed.

2. It is trite but true: a tax exemption merely shifts part of the tax burden from the beneficiaries--farmers and ranchers in this case--to all other taxpayers. Owners of homes and businesses, among others, will have to pay for the proposed exemption through higher property taxes.

Tuesday's Rain Comes Too Late

The rain in Eastland County last Tuesday morning was appreciated by farmers and ranchers, but for the peanut growers it was too little too late says County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

The peanut crop which was planted later than normal because of late spring rains has been drought stressed and needed rains in early September. Even though moisture is available now there is not enough time in the growing season for the peanuts to make a good crop the agent said.

Rain did help irrigated peanuts that will be maturing in the next two weeks.

A rather small peanut crop is expected throughout the county. Dryland peanuts are very poor while the irrigated peanuts range from very good to poor.

Most pastures and range land are grazed very short. Usually ranchers depend on

fall rains to get grass growth for winter grazing. Since the weather is cooling off some there will not be time for much growth of grass before frost. Some of the winter rangeland grasses should get off to a good start, but these grasses to not provide much grazing until late winter.

When all is considered the rain was helpful, but too late to be of much help to peanut crops and summer grasses.

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

Gardeners can get-back-to-basics and save money too by developing an old standby-by-the compost pile. And with fall here, plenty of leaves will soon be available for composting.

With transportation costs pushing the price of peat moss and other bulky types of organic matter higher, the backyard compost pile or compost bin is becoming more and more important.

With most Texas soils lacking in organic matter, composting is an excellent

way to add humus to the soil while at the same time disposing of unwanted plant material from the yard and garden.

Leaves, straw, lawn clippings, sawdust, garden debris and even shredded newspapers can be converted into usable humus through the decomposing process. These composted materials will make both clay and sandy soils more suitable for growing vegetables and ornamentals.

It is usually best to have three compost bins—one being filled, one in the process of decomposing, and another ready for use. The most workable size for more gardeners is a 4 feet by 4 feet bin, with one side hinged or removable for easy access.

Gardeners may select a convenient site near a source of water, yet out of sight of

the outdoor living area.

Start the compost pile by spreading 6-to-8 inch layer of debris. Top this with a 1-to-2 inch layer of soil or finished compost. Sprinkle about two cups of a complete fertilizer over each layer of soil and organic matter to encourage bacterial action and hasten decomposition. Manure or blood meal may be used instead of fertilizer. Water thoroughly; then add the next layer as material becomes available.

Repeat the layering process until the pile is 4 to 5 feet high. Keep the center slightly lower than the sides to aid in retaining water. Keep the pile moist for rapid decomposition; however, avoid saturation or bad odors may develop.

To speed up decomposition and insure that wastes on the outer edge of the bin have a chance to break down, turn or mix and restack the pile every 60 to 90 days. Do not add new material once the pile is turned; rather start a new pile in a nearby location.

For better aeration and faster decomposition, spread fresh lawn clippings and shredded green materials into thin layers. When adding dry leaves to the compost pile, wet them thoroughly before adding soil. A shredder will convert twigs and small branches into smaller particles for faster decomposition.

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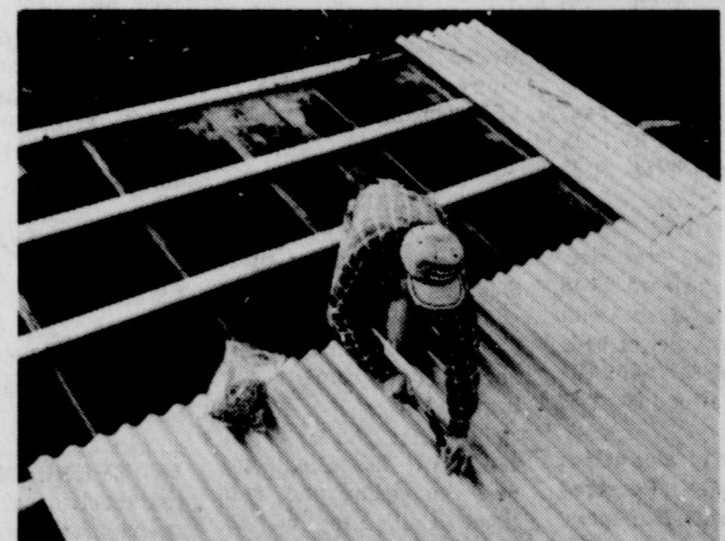

Cisco Baptist Association To Hold Meeting



Dr. Jesse Fletcher

7:00 p.m.
Everyone is welcome to attend these sessions and hear some good preaching, singing and learn of some of the things this association does through the year.
One of the messages will be brought by a special guest, Dr. Jesse Fletcher, President of Hardin Simmons University. His message will begin at 5:00 p.m.
Dr. Jesse C. Fletcher brought a unique combination of talents to Hardin-Simmons University when he was asked to become that historic institution's 12th president in 1977.
A background of business and administration (a bachelor's degree in business administration

from Texas A&M University in 1952 and extensive administrative and planning responsibility with the Foreign Mission Board), theological and pastoral credentials (Master of Divinity and Doctor of Philosophy from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and several pastorates), and educational experience (at Southwestern Seminary and the University of Texas-Austin), peculiarly prepared him for his task.
Under his leadership, HSU has experienced a four year surge in enrollment of nearly 25 percent (from 1,649 in 1977 to an all-time record of 2,049 in 1981) while increasing academic standards each year; faculty salaries have

jumped 50 per cent; and complete academic reorganization around a core curriculum into a College of Arts and Sciences and schools of Business and Finance, Music, Education and graduate studies has been accomplished.
During the same time, HSU wiped out a \$1 million carry-over debt that was a legacy of earlier lean years—the first time in 26 years HSU had had no accumulated deficits and increased endowment by 40%. Fletcher came to HSU from the 4,000 member First Baptist Church, Knoxville where he served as pastor for almost three years.
At the Foreign Mission Board he was director of the Mission Support Division,

1968-75, after earlier serving as secretary of the Department of Missionary Personnel (1963-68) and associate secretary (1961-63) and assistant secretary (1960-61) in the same department.
He was the professor of the John C. Townes Chair of Bible at the University of Texas at Austin, 1958-60, and director of Baptist Student work there, 1959-60 and a teaching fellow at Southwestern Seminary, 1957-58.
Fletcher, born April 9, 1931 in San Antonio, is married to Dorothy Jordan Fletcher. They have two children, Jordan Scott, born in 1958 and Melissa Dupree, born in 1962.
He is a member of the General Council of the Baptist World Alliance, has been honored as a Distinguished Alumnus of Southwestern, has been a trustee of Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary and held numerous positions within the Southern Baptist Convention. He is a full professor of religion at HSU and holds the Connally Professorship of Missions.
Also, he is a director and vice chairman of Ministers Life of Minneapolis; president of the Trans America Athletic Conference; president of the Abilene Intercollegiate School of Nursing and has been honored with a Litt. D. degree by Rio Grande College of Ohio.
He is the author of 10 books including *Bill Wallace of China*, 1963 (which was made into a movie); *Wimpy Harper of Africa*, 1967; *The Search of Blonny Foreman*, 1971; *Baker James Cauthean: A Man for All Nations*, 1977; and *Practical Discipleship*.

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Welfare Discusses Drug Problem

The Eastland County Child Welfare Board met in the County Commissioner's Court on Wednesday, October 13, to discuss its involvement with the current Eastland County Anti-drug Drive.

Judy Phaneuf, Region IV Child Placement Supervisor with headquarters in Abilene, spoke to the local

board. "In our work," she said, "we have seen an increase in runaways, ages 13 through 17, who admit to the continuous use of illegal drugs. These are county and out-of-county residents who are mixing with your children."

Alice Pritchard, Eastland County Child Placement Worker, stated at the

meeting that some of the children under her supervision come from families involved in illegal drugs. "It is established," she said, "that the use of these drugs usually results in the evidence of abused and neglected children."

The Eastland County Child Welfare Board functions to work with the regional and state officers to provide comprehensive community-based services for abused and neglected children. The law provides for removing children from harmful environments to healthy environments.

Board chairman Christine Reich stated, "This Board stands behind all efforts to work against this drug threat in Eastland County, and it is committed to any cooperative effort to better the situation."

Those attending the meeting were board members H.V. O'Brien, Durel Reid, Connie Watson, Downs Seaberry, and Christine Reich, with Alice Pritchard and Judy Phaneuf also in attendance.

Rep. Stenholm Honored

Rep. Charles W. Stenholm has earned the "Guardian of Small Business" Award—and an endorsement for re-election—from the National Federal of Independent Business (NFIB) for his outstanding voting record on small-business issues.

The nation's largest small-business group presented Stenholm with the award because he voted with the majority of NFIB members 95 percent of the time.

On announcing the award, NFIB President Wilson S. Johnson said, "The voting record of Rep. Stenholm this Congress demonstrates that he is responsive to the needs of his state, because small businesses create the majority of new jobs and if left

Those members of Congress who did not have recorded votes on at least 70 percent of the issues included in the ratings were not eligible for the award.

NFIB is a non-profit, non-partisan organization representing 45,622 small-business owners in Texas and more than a half-million independent businesses across the country.

Jim Parker of Comanche, Democratic candidate for State Representative District 65, recently gained endorsement from the largest teacher organization in the state—Texas State Teacher Association. District XV of TSTA, which includes most of the 65th Representative District, overwhelmingly endorsed Parker earlier in the year and recommended his candidacy to the State TEPAC Board.

TSTA's endorsement is primarily based on Parker's pro-education views and represents a commitment to promote his candidacy within the teaching profession as well as a pledge to encourage active involvement

in his campaign and at the polling booths on November 2.

Parker is running for the Representative office held by Lynn Nabors for 7 terms. Nabors did not choose to run for re-election.

Elections are coming up in November. How did you feel about the election process? It's been awhile since I turned twenty-one and voted

"free." I protested at having to pay the poll tax in my salad days; I was younger and greener then. Do we have a better quality of government since all a

voter has to do is register? And then vote, naturally. Do we even have more people voting? I am pleased for us Shady-siders because our votes are courted as a result of our consistency at the polls. I can't say I'm all hepped up about what the figures show for the rest of the voting population.

In fact I'm danged near the point of "viewing with alarm." I'm about ready to hit the road myself and advocate restoring the poll tax. Over the years I have come to consider the free vote and free schools in about the same light, and I'm not sure I'm not against 'em. Yep. "Against," as in, "opposed to."

Now, before I'm accused of being anti-Mother, God, and Apple Pie, let me explain why I question whether revoking the poll tax and running free schools is in the best interests of our 'land of the free and home of the brave."

How many freebies do you have among your cherished possessions? Family heirlooms are about the only qualifiers, I'd guess. For the other things you planked down cash on the barrelhead or obligated part of your income. You paid.

You value what you pay-voting or schooling. Or anything else. It would be very easy here to get off on the subjects of the food stamps, the welfare payments, and the other expenses of a patriarchal government. People n Things

IT HAS BEEN about a week (this was written Sept. 30th) since we sat down at this Spanish writing typewriter to report on the situation with the JWSs in Quito, Ecuador. After being here a couple of weeks, we're about to get used to the cool weather - where a coat feels good all the time and you wish for a bit of heat in the evening.

Although Quito straddles the equator, the 9,500 foot altitude makes for a rather ideal climate the year around. Hotels and apartments and offices and homes have neither air conditioning or heating equipment. Some of the homes have fireplaces that they use in the evenings on occasion.

You can imagine what it does to the building cost when you don't have to prepare for heating or cooling.

LAST SATURDAY was an interesting day as we took a trip of 150 miles or so into the Andes Mountains to the village of Otavalo to look at their weekly market. The Otavalo Indian tribe is older than the Inca Indians, which is very old indeed. The men wear black flat top hats, have a lot of hair plaited neatly down their back and wear tight-fitting trousers with leggings. The women dress in bright, neat costumes with black hats and often a baby nestled in a miniature hammock on their backs.

You see other Indian groups in the area and they wear white knicker type trousers and black coats. They all appear neat and clean.

The Otavalo market covered an area of about four city blocks - a square area with concrete walks

and some facilities. And there were several hundred displays of an assortment of goods - everything from many types of clothing, crafts of all kinds, food items, jewelry, leather products and the like.

LEAVING OTAVALO, we stopped at a hotel for lunch. A convention of health officials from throughout Ecuador was in progress, and we enjoyed listening to a native band entertain them.

Outside the hotel, there were displays on the grounds of more Indian arts and crafts that were for sale.

En route back to Quito, stops were made at several villages. One was famous for the wood craft and art objects from shops over town. Another was noted for the products of their weavers and their sewing machines. And still another's claim to fame was leather and what they could do with it. We couldn't resist a leather jacket bargain.

THE LAST STOP was at an Ecuadorian farm that had been in the same family 100 years or more. They had a herd of Holstein cows that were being milked by hand. The milking crew was composed of women. The milk from the cows went across the highway to a neighbor's plant that turned out butter and milk products.

The farm home was a beautiful old place that was built before the turn of the century. The family still lives there but has an apartment in town. Their children attended Quito schools and college in the USA. One son lives in Albuquerque and a daughter lives in Miami.

Before we left, cake and coffee were served in a lovely and large dining room.

THE DAY BEFORE, we were invited with four other people to lunch at the Spanish Embassy. This was a real experience for two people from a small town in Texas. Mrs. JWS got hold of Amy Vanderbilt's book on etiquette a couple of days before the luncheon, and we got a thorough briefing on the assorted do's and don'ts of formal dining.

They started with a casserole in place of a cocktail or salad. Then, a big dish containing roast beef, potatoes and green beans was passed around. This was followed with the serving of ice cream with tasty trimmings and coffee. We sat beside the hostess and got through the meal without complaints.

ANOTHER STOP was to make a picture with one foot on each side of the equator. They have a sign beside the road marking the equator. Nearby, an Indian couple with a little girl had a display of arts and crafts for sale. And this made a colorful scene for the camera to record.

Got back to Quito after dark. It was a very interesting day indeed.

THE MIAMI HERALD comes here around 5 p.m. each day. And it costs about \$1.75 per copy. Our copy that day was full of the professional football strike in the USA.

"I almost wish we were home so I could enjoy the football strike," observed Mrs. JWS.

NOTICE TO WATER CUSTOMERS OF HIGH TURBIDITY

Dear Customer:
The City of Cisco during the month of August, 1982, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water

Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.
