WITH SUNDAY, October 24, being Mothers-in-Law Day, I thought the following article from Florists' Transworld Delivery might be of interest.

The article which follows was entitled:

HALF A DAY FOR MOTHERS-IN-LAW?
Mothers-in-law can't seem to win. Their "day" is coming up on Sunday, Oct. 24, but it's only been recognized by half the U.S. Congress.

The House of Representatives last October passed a resolution officially naming the fourth Sunday in October as Mother-in-Law's Day. In November, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen (D-Tex) introduced a similar proposal in the Senate (S.J. Res. 128) but it hasn't been acted on yet and probably won't be until after the holiday this year.

But hopes are high that mothers-in-law soon will have an official day of their own to help make up for the centuries of abuse they've tolerated with remarkable good humor.

Sponsored by the Florists' Transworld Delivery Association (FTD), Mother-in-Law's Day is dedicated to remembering a group of women who have contributed positively to family life despite a lot of bad jokes and more serious torments.

Sen. Bentsen's interest in mothers-in-law is understandable because one of the first efforts to do something for them occurred in his state in the 1930s. An Amarillo newspaper publisher promoted a Mother-in-Law's Day celebration in that city for a number of years after one of his columns upset his own mother-in-law. One year, 125,000 visitors, including First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, traveled to Amarillo for a Mother-in-Law's Day parade and other festivities.

Since FTD, the

cooperatively owned florist wire and membership service, first launched its Mother-in-Law's Day celebration in 1977, half the states and more than 20 cities have proclaimed the day at one time or another. Governor Ed Herschler of Wyoming, for example, recognized the day after he got into hot water by describing his mixed feelings on an issue as being "like watching my mother-in-law drive off a cliff in my new car."

While mother-in-law jokes still persist to some extent, most people seem to be genuinely fond of their "other mothers." As one man said, "If my wife ever throws me out of the house, I'll run home to her mother!" A daughter-in-law put it more poignantly: "Mother is a word for love; in-law just means we found it later."

Jokes are just one of the punishments mothers-in-law have suffered over the years. Shunning was common in some ancient cultures because of fears that even looking at your mother-in-law could cause blindness or sterility.

The question now is, will the U.S. Senate be as brave as the House, where members let everyone know how they stood on mothers-in-law in a roll call vote on the resolution? The resolution passed, 305 to 66 with 28 abstentions.

Among those who will be watching the Senate action with interest will be Rep. Jonathan Bingham (D-NY) and Rep. Edward Derwinski (R-IL), who co-sponsored the House resolution with 216 other members.

However, if the resolution fails in the Senate, Bingham and Derwinski won't be able to lead a renewed fight — they both are leaving Congress this year. Such is the luck of mothers-in-law.

Eighth and J.V. Defeat Eastland, Seventh Grade Team Loses Thurs.

Cisco's eighth grade football team got back on the winning track here Thursday night as they defeated Eastland's team 22-8. The Junior Varsity team remained undefeated as they romped on Eastland 18-0 and the seventh grade Cisco team was defeated by the score of 20-8.

In the seventh grade game, Eastland received the opening kick-off and drove the ball downfield until Clyde Wilson scored with 1:30 left in the first quarter. An incomplete pass attempt for two points left the score at 6-0 in favor of Eastland.

Cisco came back in the second quarter when Lance Angel received a kick-off from Eastland at his own 45-yard line and raced 55 yards to the end zone for a touchdown. Angel also scored two extra points on a quarterback keeper-play, giving Cisco a half-time lead of 8-6 with 2:55 left in the first half.

Cisco's Raiford Rattan scored an apparent 28-yard touchdown run with 3:14 left in the third quarter, but a Cisco penalty wiped out the score.

Later in the game, Eastland's John Collins scored on a 61-yard run with 1:25 left in the third quarter. The try for two was no good making the score 12-8.

Eastland's Wilson scored in the final quarter on an eight-yard run. A pitchback with a reverse handoff to Pee Wee Gosnell netted the extra two points with 13 seconds left in the game for a final score of 20-8.

Cisco's eighth grade team scored first on a quarterback keeper-play by Jason Rattan who made a 31-yard run. A pass from QB Rattan to Dusty Petree netted the extra two points making the score 8-0 with 4:51 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter Cisco scored twice, first on a 48-yard run by Shelby Nixon with 6:27 left in the quarter and later on a three-yard run by Brent Evatt with 51 seconds left in the half. The first attempt for two extra points failed, but following the second touchdown a pass from QB Rattan to Evatt got the two extra points making the half-time score 22-0.

Rattan. In the third quarter, Eastland drove to Cisco's three-yard line but their drive came to an end when Cisco's Ronnie Scheuren dropped the Eastland runner short of a first down or score.

In the final quarter of play, Eastland again threatened to score when they recovered a Cisco fumble 12-yards from the goal line. Eastland drove the ball to Cisco's one-yard line but the Cisco defense held them from getting into the end zone and Cisco took over possession on fourth down.

With less than two minutes to go in the game, Eastland finally got on the scoreboard with a four-yard run by Eastland quarterback Fullen. A pass to Housson scored two extra points making the final score 22-8 with 1:30 left in the game.

Cisco's Junior Varsity Lobo team kept its undefeated status by shutting out Eastland 18-0. The first score was made

in the first quarter on a nine-yard run by Billy Escovedo. The extra point try was no good making the score 6-0 as it remained at half-time.

In the second half of play, Cisco scored once in each quarter but neither extra point attempt was good. In the third quarter, quarterback Joe Perry scored on a sneak play from the one-yard line. Josh Potter scored in the fourth quarter on a three-yard run making the final score 18-0.

Cisco Blood Drive Is Set For Wednesday

The Cisco Service Club has set Wednesday, Oct. 27, as the date for the first Cisco Blood Drive of the club year. The blood drive will be held

on the campus of Cisco Junior College from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Student Union Building. A team of laboratory technicians from

Mary Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene will be present to take donations. To add a bit of sport, technicians will be dressed in costume in keeping with the Halloween theme.

Regularly scheduled blood drives were begun in our community in September 1979, due to a large debt to the Mary Meek Blood Bank, and to insure an adequate blood supply for Ciscoans. Citizens have responded well to the blood drives, and have been commended for their support of the joint rotating project of the Cisco Service Club and the Cisco Civic League.

A blood insurance policy is available for those persons interested. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured of having blood available to them for one full year, should the need arise. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco's debt. But for those persons interested in the policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer routinely paid donors, due to Federal Drug Administration legislation. Therefore, blood donors must be solicited on a voluntary basis.

So necessary is this blood, for life itself, every appeal for your continued support is sincerely offered and appreciated. Please be aware of the following when preparing to give blood.

(1) All donors must be age 18 or older. There is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

(2) Blood donors should eat as usual, and are encouraged to do so, before giving blood.

(3) No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood. However, no medication should be deleted without the advice of one's doctor.

(4) Any person who has been sick or had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood should not donate blood.

(5) Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months, at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

(6) Any person who has been in Southeast Asia within the last three years is ineligible to donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

(7) Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood should not donate.

(8) No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is should give blood and she should do so until six weeks after termination of pregnancy.

(9) Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems. Prospective blood donors are questioned prior to donating blood and are carefully screened. 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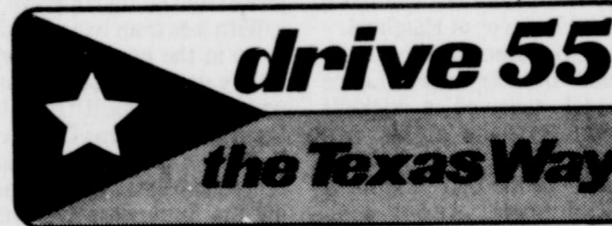

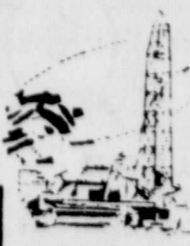

The operation is in an five-acre lease in Section 128 of Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey.

A potent new gas well has been completed in Eastland County's JMJ Field by Southeastern Resources of Rising Star. It is the No. 2 Nash, flowing gas at the rate of 1,452,000 CF per day on a 1-in. choke.

Railroad Commission Approves Rate Hike

The Railroad Commission has allowed new gas rates for customers of Lone Star Gas Co. in the unincorporated areas near Cisco, San Angelo, and Estelline.

The new environs rates are identical to those already approved by the respective nearby cities for customers within their corporate limits.

With the changes, an average monthly residential bill in winter for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas will increase by \$2.64 for 51 customers in the environs of Cisco and by 82 cents for 591

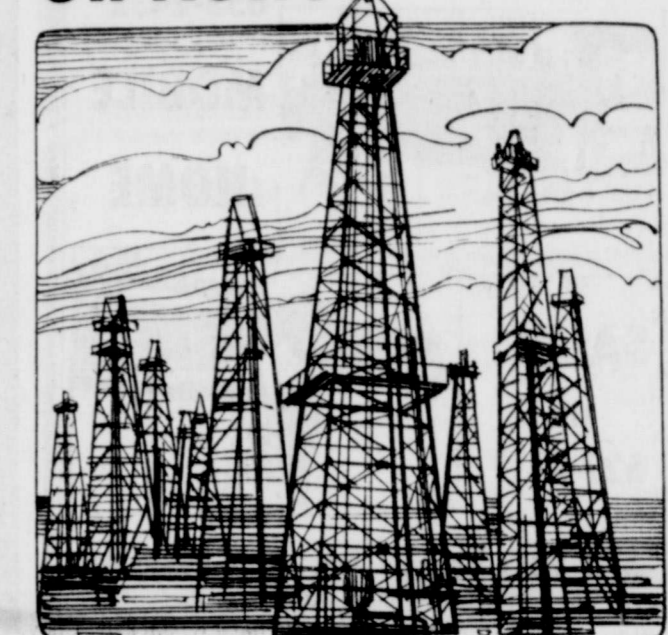
customers in the environs of San Angelo.

In Estelline, a monthly residential bill in winter for seven Mcf of gas will increase by \$5.22 for 28 customers.

The new rates become effective Nov. 3.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of Texas. Proposed gas rates for these areas are examined in light of the company's operating efficiency and the rates that have been approved by the nearby city governments.

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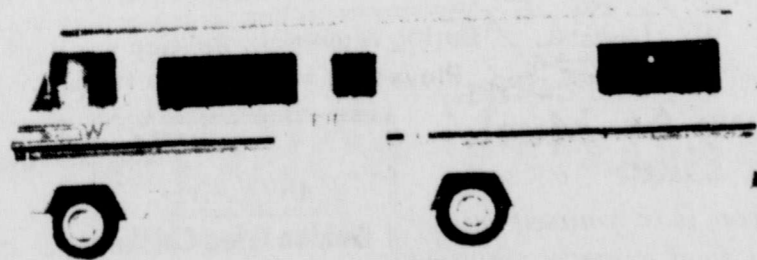





When it comes to real estate you have heard for years that "there is NO more land being made" this is true when referring to gardening as well as farming. The top soil is lost from wind, and water. The soil has become depleted in many instances by the same plant material year after year. The farmer has tried to help this by rotating his crops but this is not the answer to the problem.

Bob Glasgow Reports On Admendment 5

By Senator Bob Glasgow
AMENDMENT No. 5

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in certain counties."

This proposed amendment abolishes the offices of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties and transfers the powers, duties and functions of the office to the office of county auditor or its successor. Abolition of the office would also have to be approved by the voters in a local election in each of the two affected counties.

The office of the county treasurer is required by the constitution. The duties set out by statute include receipt, custody and disbursement of county funds.

The office of the county auditor is created by statute and duties include the auditing of county funds, approval of disbursements of county funds and in some counties, preparation of the county budget. The position is filled by appointment by the district judge or judges having jurisdiction of the county. In smaller counties, whether to have a county auditor is optional with the Commissioner's Court.

In 1979 the Legislature attempted to abolish the office of county treasurer subject to approval of the voters of Tarrant County. An election was held in Tarrant County in 1979 and the voters approved the abolition. However, an Appeals Court overturned the election and the legislature had passed on the basis that the legislature could not abolish a constitutionally mandated county office by statute.

In 1981 the Legislature proposed this amendment providing for the abolition of the treasurers office for Tarrant and has added Bee County.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. Allowing the voters of Tarrant and Bee counties to decide for themselves whether the separate elective office of county treasurer serves their needs is the best tradition of local self-government.

2. Merging the offices of treasurer and auditor will eliminate wasteful overlapping of functions and save scarce county revenue—a particularly worthy objective in difficult financial times as these.

3. The idea of an appointive officer serving as treasurer of a political subdivision is neither novel or radical: most Texas cities, many of which have much larger budgets than either of the affected counties, have appointed treasurers.

AGAINST:

1. The duties of treasurer and auditor are incompatible and should not be vested in a single officer. Merger of the positions will eliminate a needed safeguard against

misapplication of county funds.

2. Elimination of a local elective office will diminish the voters' control over county government and make county government less attentive to the will of the people.

3. Although county government may need streamlining and reorganization, the piecemeal approach taken by the proposed amendment is not the answer. A thorough, statewide study should precede any attempt to alter the constitutional framework of local government.

ANTERLESS DEER PERMITS

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Eastland County on Nov. 1, 1982 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. in the County Courthouse in Eastland.

A map with the antlerless deer permit issuance compartments and issuance rates will be posted in the county courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for permits, a landowner must own or control acreage equal to at least one half of the permit issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

After the opening of the hunting season, permits will only be available through the Austin office and will not be issued by local department personnel. Landowners or their agents are urged to pick up permits on the scheduled issuance dates.

Texas Youth Join 4-H Endeavor

Some 140,000 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are members of the action-oriented, "learning by doing" program called 4-H.

4-H is the youth share of the educational efforts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, established in 1915 to diffuse among the people practical information relating to agriculture and home economics.

However, 4-H goes back farther than that. 4-H actually had its beginning 1908 in Jack County when a boys corn club was organized to help grow better corn. Shortly thereafter, girls got involved as organized groups such as tomato club, canning clubs and poultry clubs.

4-H in Texas has grown from an organization for farm boys and girls to one that is quite diverse in its makeup.

Girls now consistently outnumber boys in the program. Current figures show 72,129 girls to 67,653 boys. And about half of today's 4-Hers - 68,783 - come from towns and cities larger than 60,000 people. More than 33,000 still live on farms and ranches while some 37,000 live in small towns and rural non-farm areas. Of these 4-Hers, more than 66,000 4-Hers participate through a number of different programs.

Assisting county Extension agents and the Texas 4-H staff to carry out effective learning activities and programs are some 15,000 volunteer leaders.

4-H continues to be a vibrant organization that is leading the way in helping youth learn practical skills and gain a knowledge of their environment that will make them better citizens and leaders of tomorrow.

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

The magazine "Geriatrics" had an excellent article about the need for the patient and doctor to give more consideration to the elderly patient who often have need of better nutrition.

Sonia E. Patten, a nutritionist, says "Older Americans are a greater risk than younger Americans or other individuals, in some other cultures. In certain traditional societies, the elderly are assured of prestige and receive preferential treatment in the provision of food."

A survey indicates a need type of evidence in that general under-nutrition results from poor food choices regardless of income level or ethnic group. Another interesting observation shows that the elderly who live together are more likely to have adequate diets than are those who live alone.

Ms. Patten continued to state "in almost every society food consumption is essentially a social activity. If an elderly individual is cut off from the social aspects of

eating, he may well feel this rift as a threat to his identity as a person."

Next week we will continue to explore the thoughts of Ms. Patten.
