HALLOWEEN IS MASQUERADE TIME!
Around Halloween, there is considerable activity with harvesting, Fall Bazaars, "Trick or Treat" for the youngsters, and parties galore. The Fall theme is particularly used at this season in decorating with pumpkins, cornstalks, Indian corn, colored squashes, pictures of witches, goblins, skeletons, and interwoven crepe paper of orange and black; in using refreshments of apples, cider, pumpkin pie, and popcorn; in entertaining with bobbing of apples, touring haunted houses or rooms, and telling ghost stories and fortunes. It is a special time, too, for putting on masks and dressing up and pretending.

If one meditates on the Word of God day and night (Ps. 1:2), he cannot help but associate it with Halloween. Let us look at some of the masks, starting first with a CLOWN. "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine." (Pr. 17:22); but sin can creep in if the clown resorts to improper antics or lewd jokes. "As a man thinketh, so is he." (Prov. 23:7). And he usually says what he thinks.

Let us next consider a group of masked people such as a WITCH, a GYPSY FORTUNE TELLER, and a GHOST. The Lord in His written Word, counsels against the worship of stars, fortune telling, calling up the spirits, magicians, sorcerers, and the like for the devil is in all of these. Take heed, therefore and read Deut. 18:10-14, Lev. 19:31, 20:6, Isa. 47:12-15, I Chron. 10:13, II Chron. 33:6, Rev. 21:8 and 22:15, etc. Remember that Saul turned to the WITCH OF ENDOR to determine what would happen to him. This was his undoing. Only God can predict the future accurately (Isa. 42:9) and can give successful lives, find suitable mates, and answer all questions through His Bible and through His Holy Spirit indwelling men.

Usually, you can find a PRINCESS, QUEEN, or KING at the masked parties. As we observe their attire, they make us think of wealth, power, and position. This in itself is not wrong unless it becomes a god in lives in the feeling of superiority, of pride, and of not being a sinner. True wealth and power is to be able to say "...He hath clothed me with the garments of salvation; He hath covered me with the robe of righteousness..." (Isa. 61:10).

In Matt. 23:27, Jesus used some strong words to the Scribes and Pharisees. He called them hypocrites! On the outside they looked pretty good to people and appeared like WHITED SEPULCHES (TOMBSTONES), but on the inside they were full of DEAD MAN'S BONES (SKELTONS) and all uncleanness. They were DEAD IN TRESPASSES AND SINS. Their hearts were far from the Lord. In fact, they rejected Jesus Christ at His first coming.

Some church people hide behind MASKS OF RELIGION. They walk down the aisle to become a member but are not walking with Jesus in them; they glory in the name of the church rather than having heart surgery; they base their salvation on water baptism when only the Holy Spirit of God can baptize; they think they can work or pay their way to prestige and salvation but the Bible plainly states "not of works, lest any man should boast"; and the worst of all is the DECEPTIVE MASK given by the devil in getting man to think he can live a good life under his own power. Only the Holy Spirit of Jesus living inside a person can guarantee a good life.

There is the MASK OF DIFFERENCE to God's plan to repent of sins and accept His only begotten Son, for He is not willing that any should perish. We need to look at ourselves in a mirror not to see how much we look like a certain Halloween character because our mir-

ror is the WORD OF GOD, the Bible, which reveals just what we are--SINNERS! Remember, no one can fool God by the outward appearance for He looks on the heart. (I Sam. 16:7). So, if any of these false masks fit, get rid of them and believe on Jesus Christ who can cover ALL SINS with HIS BLOOD shed on that OLD RUGGED CROSS and can make you into a beautiful and NEW CREATURE. And best of all, you can look forward to not just being the life of a party or to the short life on this earth but to everlasting life in the heavenlies!

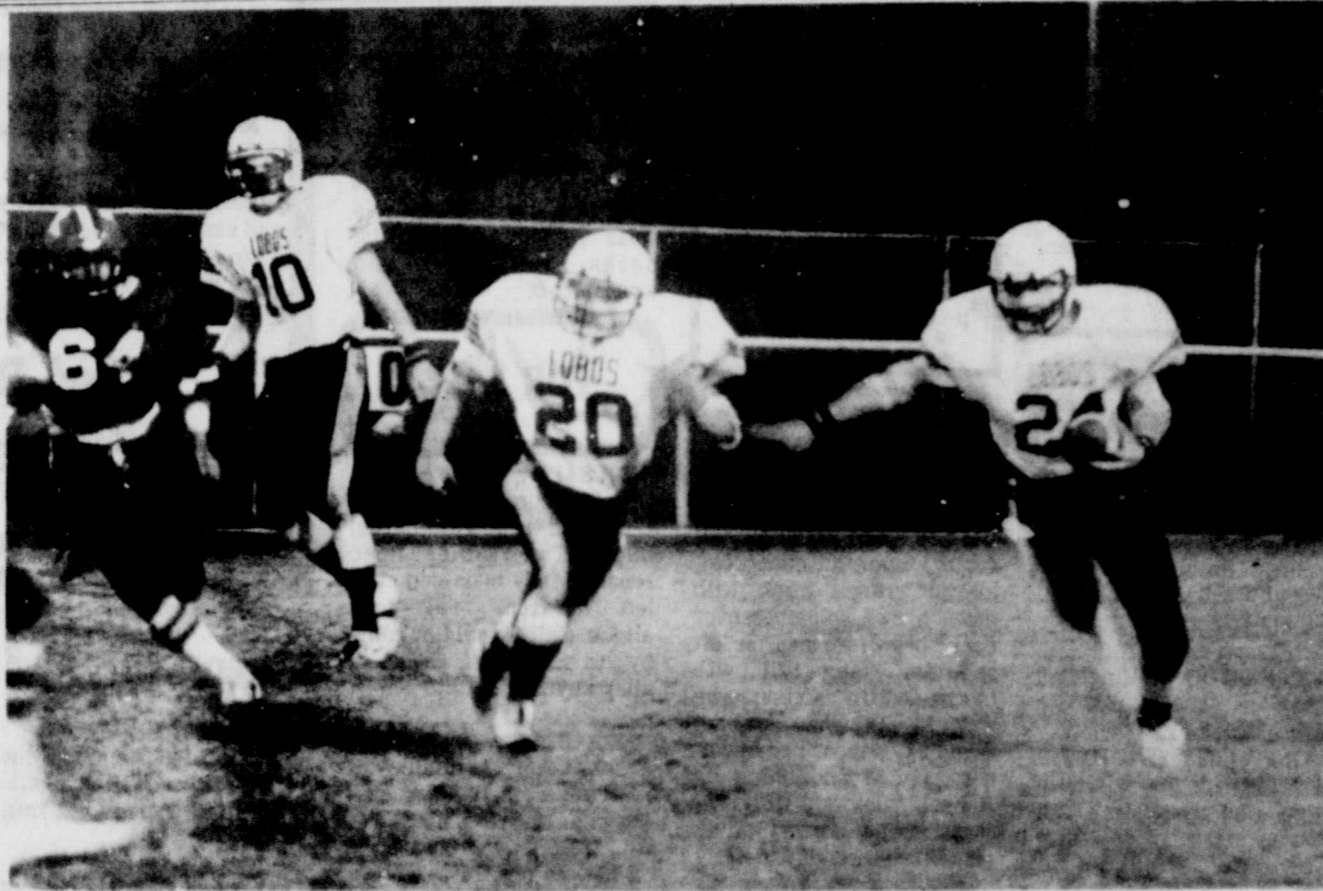

Lobos Regrouping For Friday Game With Hawley In Cisco

Cisco High School's Varsity Lobos were regrouping this week, following a 62-0 beating at the hands of the No. 1 ranked Eastland Mavericks last week, in preparations for the homecoming festivities scheduled here for Friday night's game against Hawley.

Homecoming festivities call for a Sing-Song at 7 p.m. Thursday night at Cisco High School followed by a bonfire. A parade is also scheduled for Friday afternoon with public schools dismissing at 2:30 p.m.

Also on Thursday night, Cisco Junior High teams and the Junior Varsity Lobos will travel to Hawley for their weekly games. The seventh grade will begin playing at 5:00 p.m., followed by the eighth grade and the J.V.

Cisco Head Coach Jim Puryear said the Lobos will be trying to regroup for this week's game and finish the season by successfully winning their next two games, this week with Hawley and next week with Jim Ned.

Coach Puryear said he was not sure Tuesday morning who would be ready to play for the Lobos Friday night since there were a number of bumps and bruises on the players. He said they would just have to wait and see.

Hawley is rated last in District 9-AA play having yet to win a District game. Their District record is 0-4-1 and their season record is 1-6-1. They have scored 55 points on their District opponents and have given up 94.

The Lobos are 2-2-1 in District play and 4-3-1 for the season. They have scored 126 points in District play and have given up 162.

In last Friday night's game against Eastland, the Lobo offense was unable to sustain a drive long enough to put any points on the scoreboard and the defense was unable to contain the Mavericks.

Eastland scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, one in the second

quarter, and three in each of the second half quarters.

Eastland started their scoring in the first quarter when Gary Stuart scored on a 58-yard pass. The PAT kick by James Morton was good making the score 7-0.

The second touchdown was a two-yard run by Morton, who also kicked the extra point to make the first quarter score 14-0.

Eastland's only touchdown in the second quarter was on a five-yard run by Jay Hess. The PAT kick by Morton was good making the half-time score 21-0.

The Mavericks busted loose in the second half of play and scored six touchdowns, three in each quarter.

Publisher Announces Advertising Increase

Publisher H.V. O'Brien has announced that advertising rates of the Eastland County Newspapers will be increased on November 1st of this year.

The Eastland County Newspapers consists of The Cisco Press, The Eastland Telegram, The Ranger Times and The Rising Star. Advertising may be placed for any one of the four papers or for a combination of the four.

Local rates will be increased 10 cents per column inch, from \$1.90 per column inch for one paper to \$2.00 per column inch. For any two papers the new rate will be \$3.00 per column inch, for any three it will be \$4.00 and for any four it will be \$5.00.

Repeats of the same ad will be half-price, if there are no changes and no editions of the paper are skipped.

Political announcements will be \$75.00 for county, district and state offices, and \$35.00 for precinct, city offices and school elections. The payment of these prices entitles the candidate to

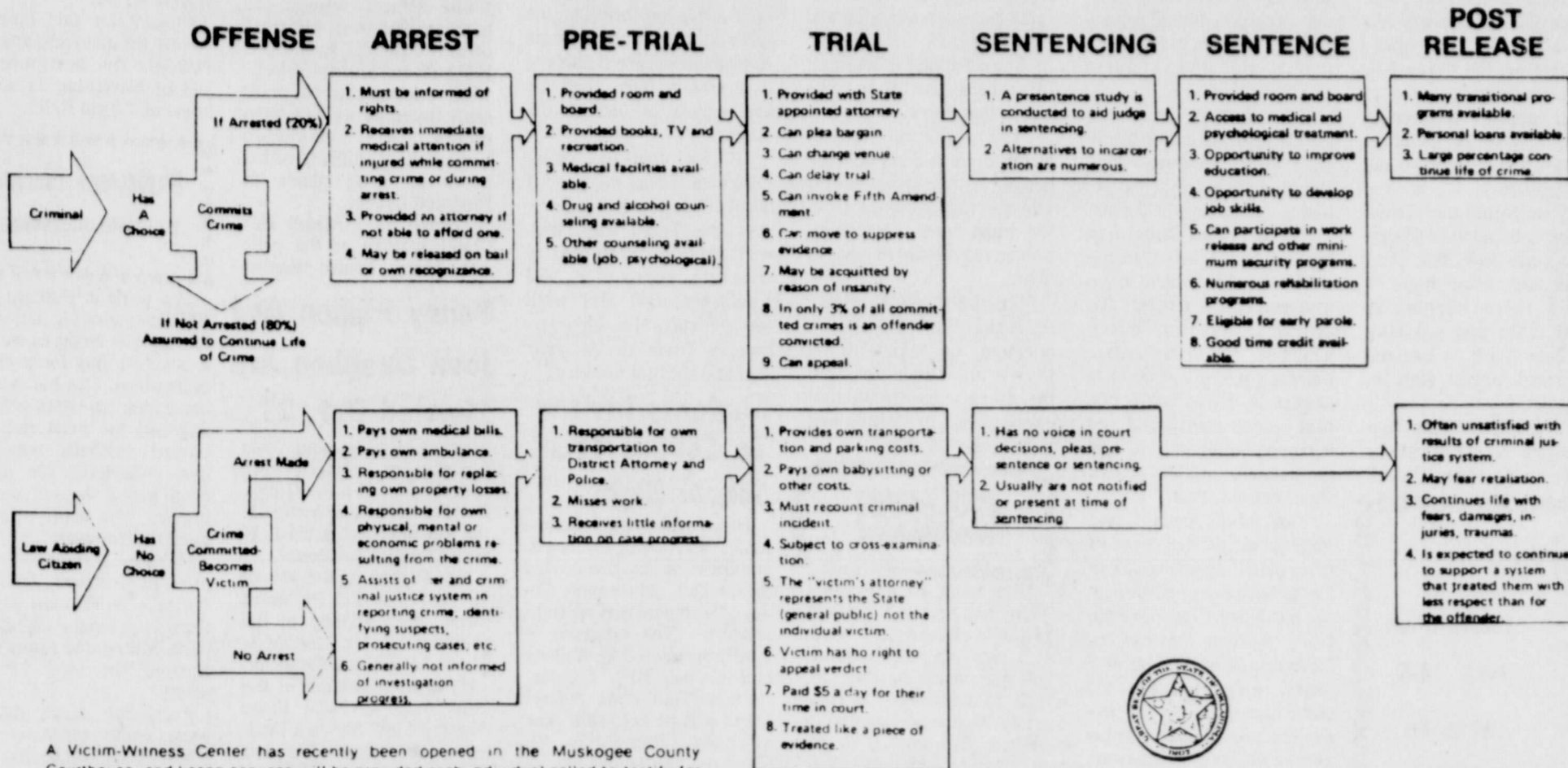

IT JUST ISN'T FAIR-This chart shows that the criminal element (top row of boxes) stands an 80 per cent chance of not being caught, and if caught, stands only a three per cent chance of getting convicted; whereas the law abiding citizen (bottom row of boxes) faces a multitude of trauma through the system to see that justice is done. The chart was prepared by District Attorney Michael C. Turpen of Muskogee County, Oklahoma, and it recently appeared in a law enforcement publication. D.A. Turpen, in giving us permission to reproduce the chart, said in a letter: "You certainly have my permission to do with it whatever you think will reach the most people. Only when citizens become mad enough to do something about this ridiculous situation will our country begin to take a different course, and put some justice back in to the system, which now serves only the criminal."

RITA CLEMENTS SAYS:

"I grew up just 90 miles south of here in Brady in McCulloch County and by west Texas terms, I guess that makes me a neighbor of yours. I'm glad you invited me to your county fair.

"A county fair is where we showcase the very best of our county and Eastland County obviously has a lot to be proud of. The quality of life here is something that just can't be duplicated anywhere else.

"The Governor and I have traveled all across Texas in the last four years, and we've met many outstanding people and we're convinced

that Texas is the best place in America to live, work and raise a family.

"However, the Texas that we know today is going to change rapidly in the coming years, and we're going to face tough challenges to our quality of life.

"It's projected that Texas may grow by another 50 percent by the year 2000. That means we may have 7 million more people, 21 million total and we may pass New York to become the second largest state in the nation.

WTU Enters Agreement With Haskell Gathering

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low Btu gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.

The gas is cheaper than WTU's main supply, but is of lower quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Because it is a lower Btu gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said. "But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for low Btu gas at some of its other

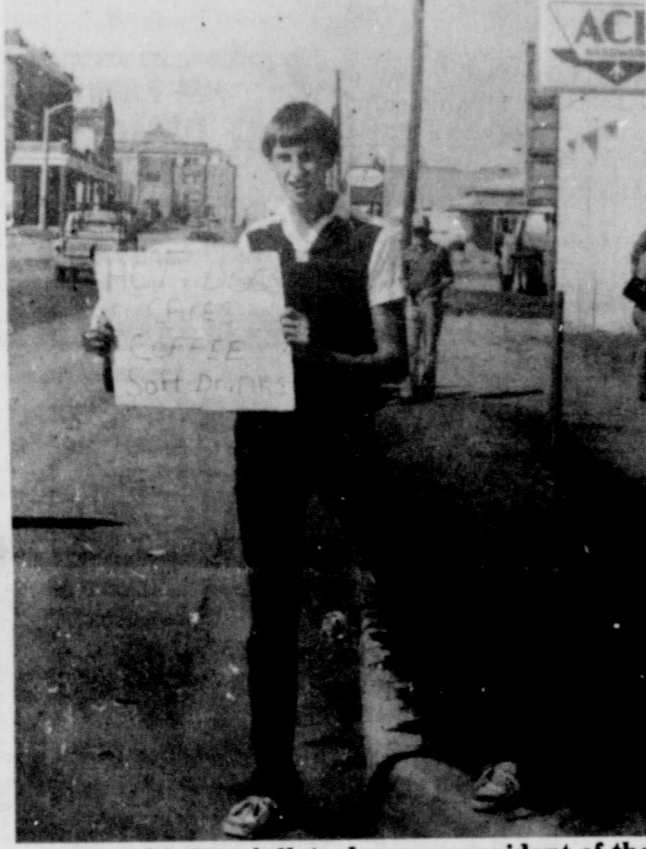

Judge Dismisses Probation Suit

In a hearing before Federal Judge Hal Woodard in Abilene on Monday evening, he dismissed a federal civil rights suit filed by Stan Boose of Cisco against retired District Judge Earl Conner, Jr., District Judge Jim R. Wright, County Judge Scott Bailey, County Commissioner's Richard Robinson, C. B. Dill, L. T. Owens and Jack Blackwell, and Criminal District Attorney Emory C. Walton.

The suit was filed by Stan Boose on behalf of Robert Tipton, Walter Wells, John Edward Barnette, Barbara Williams and Dorothy Webb and alleged that Eastland County was violating the rights of adults and juveniles by not having a certified probation officer.

The defendants' positions were that Eastland County had a probation department run by a lady who did perform the duties of a probation officer and that there was no basis for such a lawsuit in Federal Court.

At the hearing, Judge Woodard considered motions to dismiss by Frank Scarborough and John Hart on behalf of Judge Bailey and Commissioners' Robinson, Dill, Owens and Blackwell; Virgil Seaberry, Jr., who represented Judge Conner and Judge Wright; and Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton who represented himself, and at the conclusion of the hearing Judge Woodard ordered the case be dismissed and asked Virgil Seaberry, Jr. to prepare the order.

When contacted afterwards, Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton said his position had been that the allegations were frivolous and without any merit whatsoever and apparently Judge Woodard thought the same.

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Lawman Tells 'Old Rip' Story

The recent Roaring Ranger Days brought out a number of visitors, and one of the most interesting was Texas Ranger Robert M. (Bob) Hammett of Midland. Hammett and his wife Mabel (Adair) Hammett drove over to visit relatives as well as to attend the celebration. A brother, J.L. Hammett, lives in Eastland.

Bob Hammett has a long history of work in law enforcement, some of which involves Eastland County. He was Chief of Police in Ranger in 1922, and resigned to become the first Eastland County Motorcycle Officer. This assignment began Jan. 1, 1923. In 1923 he joined the Texas Department of Public Safety, and served for 35 years in different parts of the state. He attained the rank of Captain in the D.P.S., and upon his retirement from this group was made a Texas Ranger.

Hammett's memories of his life in Eastland County are still clear and detailed. He was one of 10 children born to the William A. Hammett family of DeLeon, and five of these children are still living.

William Hammett was a farmer, but also a Deputy Sheriff, and taught his son Bob a number of things

about the work of a Lawman. It was 1920 when Bob Hammett first came to Eastland County, and that was because he had a job helping build a Highline from Lake Leon to Ranger. At that time, he says, the whole area still had a "Boom Town" appearance, with thousands of people living in makeshift homes.

Hammett went on to Ranger and worked as a lawman for four or five months. When the town fired its Chief of Police Hammett was appointed in his place. Hammett stayed with this position until he decided to become the Motorcycle Patrolman.

"My salary as a Patrolman - \$175.00 per month - was considered really good at that time," he says.

"It's hard to realize how much traffic law enforcement has changed in the almost 60 years since I first took that job. The cars on the road were mostly Model T's and Model A's then, and the speed limit was 25 mi. per hr.

"There were few pavements in the County, other than the one from Cisco to Ranger."

Hammett was known as an expert rider on his Motorcycle and enjoyed trying out various skills on the machine. He often rode standing up.

In 1927 Hammett married Mabel Adair of Eastland. This year the Hammetts have been married for 55 years.

"And I hope we have many more," he adds.

During the Santa Claus Bank Robbery, in Dec. 1927, Bob Hammett was the first out-of-town Officer to reach Cisco. He had been over at Rising Star during the actual hold-up, but hurried back as soon as he was notified.

He was also closely involved in another part of Eastland County history. He remembers that he was standing near the cornerstone of the old Courthouse when it was demolished in 1928 to make way for the present structure. A certain horned toad had been placed in the cornerstone 31 years before.

Hammett states that the cornerstone broke apart, revealing a dried-up looking object. Judge Pritchard picked up the Horned Toad.

"He was holding the frog

up by the tail. At first I thought 'Old Rip' was just a big leaf or something - then I saw him move. He was nothing but skin and bones. But he was alive, alright.

"Bob, take him out of here," Judge Pritchard said.

"So I took Old Rip home, and kept him for the next two weeks. He started eating right away - seemed mighty hungry. He started looking better before long.

"Then the Commissioner's court gave him to the District Clerk's son. I don't think anyone realized how famous Old Rip was going to become.

"Later President Calvin Coolidge saw him, as well as many other people."

After Hammett left Eastland, in 1932, he served as a Department of Public Safety Officer in a number of places. Twice he was stationed in Austin, and he also served in Houston, Amarillo, Corpus Christi, Ft. Worth, Pecos, and then in Midland.

His assignments were varied. For a time he instructed in boxing and judo. In 1937 he wrote the first examination for Driver's Licenses ever issued by the D.P.S. The cost of these first Licenses, he remembers, was 25 cents.

He became a D.P.S. Sergeant in Amarillo, and later was promoted to Captain, in charge of Motor Vehicle Inspection.

Hammett, now in his '80's, is tall, straight, and in good health. He and his wife have continued to live in Midland since retirement. They have a daughter, Bobby Faye Hight, who also lives in Midland. The Hammetts have three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Bob Hammett states that it is always good to be back in Eastland County - a place where he spent so many happy years. He and his wife hope to make another visit soon.

AMENDMENT NO. 6

By Senator Bob Glasgow

"The constitutional amendment relating to the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds."

This proposed amendment raises the maximum rate of interest on certain general obligation bonds from a weighted average annual interest rate of 6 percent to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12 percent. This ceiling applies only to bonds, other than Veterans' Land Program bonds, authorized by the constitution to be issued by an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the state for which the constitution sets a

maximum interest rate. The proposed change would affect water quality enhancement and water conservation bonds, park development bonds, and student loan bonds.

The bond market determines the rate paid on the bonds and the weighted annual average with a maximum ceiling of 12 percent gives a flexibility to the issuance in the rate set on the bonds. Under today's flexible market and uncertain rates, the 6 percent was not sufficient to meet the needs of the State to sell their bonds.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The 12 percent rate ceiling is necessary to sell bonds that have already been authorized by voters of the state. The current 6 percent interest ceiling is too low for the state to sell bonds in the current bond market, and it does not appear that, in the near future, the interest rates will fall low enough to permit the authorized bonds to be sold.

2. Bond interest rates are set by the bond market and not by the state. This proposed amendment does not increase interest rates; it only permits the state to sell previously authorized bonds in today's market.

AGAINST:

1. The expenditures for which the proceeds of bonds affected by the proposed amendment will be used can be postponed until interest rates come down to a reasonable level. Payment of interest at rates above 6 percent a year is too costly.

2. Payment of interest at increased rates contributes to the inflationary process. If inflation is to be controlled, the state must bite the bullet and not increase its debt by selling more bonds.

Help those who are about to be elected to public office to come to understand the real source of their mandate - a mandate given by no party machine, received at no polling booth, but given by God; a mandate to represent God and truth at the heart of the nation; a mandate to do

good in the name of Him under Who this country was established.

We ask Thee to lead our country in the paths where Thou wouldst have her walk, to do the task which thou hast laid before her. So may we together seek happiness for all our citizens in the

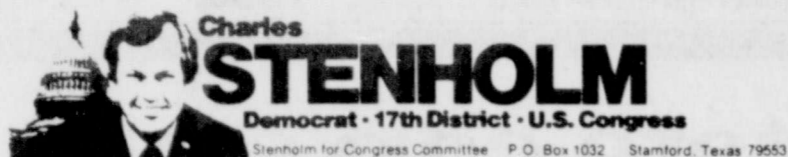

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NMMI Broncos Lose To CJC Wranglers By Score Of 47-21

The New Mexico Military Institute Broncos used everything but the sabres strapped to the waists of their cadets, but nothing seemed to help their cause. Cisco Junior College used depth, the Wranglers used all 53 of the players who suited up, and the result was a 47-21 victory for Coach Bob Keyes' Wranglers and their fifth win of the season. The victory pushes the Wranglers' season record to 5-3 and sets up a showdown with the Northeastern Oklahoma A&M Golden Norsemen in the CJC Homecoming football game Nov. 6. "We didn't really play

very well," Keyes reflects, despite the lopsided victory. "The defense played pretty well. They (NMMI) had a lot of injuries and a lot of kids have gone home (they are winless in seven games this season). It is a hard game to play when you've got them outmanned." CJC got the "outmanning" underway second quarter when the Wranglers scored 28 points—including two touchdowns within the span of the last two minutes of the first half. The other two minutes of the final four minutes of the first half belonged to NMMI as the Broncos scored two touchdowns to narrow the gap to 20-14. A 60-yard run by

runningback Sylvester Gregory and a 45-yard punt return for touchdowns gave the Wranglers a 34-14 halftime edge. "It was an exciting four minutes," Keyes recalls. "Boone (Mark) made a good run on the punt return. He broke a couple of tackles and followed his blocking well." The Wranglers rolled up 430 yards of total offense while holding the Broncos to 224 yards—219 of those through the airways and only five yards on the ground. "They hurt us with their shotgun formation, and their

reverse passes. The quarterback would scramble out of the pocket and just throw the ball up—and they seemed to catch it," Keyes says. All three Bronco touchdowns came on touchdown passes, two from Steve Sides and one from John Chisholm. The Wrangler scoring got underway with 5:15 left in the first quarter when Kioumars Rezaie booted a 24-yard field goal, then followed it with a 23-yarder at the 1:13 mark for a 6-0 lead. CJC's leading receiver,

Willie Williams, opened the TD barrage when he pulled in a Johnny Yglecias-tossed pass and raced 62 yards for the first six-pointer. Rezaie converted and CJC led 13-0. Four minutes later, reserve quarterback Scott Ellison heaved a 43-yard scoring toss to tight end Lloyd Voight and again Rezaie connected on the PAT attempt. NMMI then got into the scoring act, with Sides going 35 yards to Jim Walker and 19 yards to Mark Davidson. CJC came right back on its next possession as Gregory broke for his 60-yard romp. NMMI couldn't move after

the kickoff and punted—and it was Boone's turn to show some heroics, racing the 45 yards to paydirt. Chisholm got into the scoring act for NMMI with 4:18 left in the third quarter when he hit Fred Garcia on a 12-yard scoring pass. Eugene Carodine put the Wranglers on the scoreboard again at the 21-second mark of the third quarter when he went in from three yards out and Yglecias added the final TD with a one-yard plunge with 1:13 left in the game. CJC now has two weeks to get ready for the Norsemen, who have a game this Satur-

day at home in Miami, Okla., against Platt Community College of Kansas. NEO is 5-1, including wins over Tyler Junior College (which the Wranglers beat) and Ranger Junior College (to whom the Wranglers lost). Next week's game is set for 2 p.m. at Chesley Field as the Wranglers will play before parents and exes in the annual Homecoming contest.

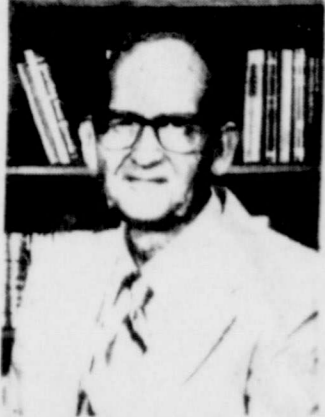
Helen Orr Will Represent Texas At AMR Association
