Smoking in the streets or theatres is only practised by shopboys, pseudo fashionables, and the 'swell mob.'-Hints on Etiquette" -Taken from Telegraph and Texas Register, March 14, 1837. Count your pills, how many are you taking and do you know their names and contents? You and you alone are responsible for the pills you take. If you think alcoholism is


bad just remember that it is only the tip of the iceberg in comparison to being a drug addict.



**INSPECT HOME'S IN-**TERIOR BEFORE BUY-ING

When you examine a house that's for sale, inspect the interior carefully. Such an inspection will help you evaluate the house's overall condition.

Items to check inside the house include the condition of the plumbing, heating, cooling and electrical systems. Climb into the attic and check the underside the roof for evidence of leaks.

Examine the walls for cracks, which could indicate the foundation has settled or cracked. Make sure the appliances work and ask about warranties on household items and about builders' warranties if the home is new.

Most importantly, get a professional inspection, if you have any doubts. Few homes are perfect, but you

will be much better off if you know about possible problems before you buy. SIX COUNTIES RATE may adjust to your rate.

**TOPS IN GROWTH** The 1980 Census shows that Texas counties with the biggest cities had the biggest increase in numbers of people. But it also shows that other counties have ex-

perienced higher rates of population growth. In fact, in six Texas counties, the number of residents more than doubled during the 1970's. These were Hood,

> Another aspect of victim assistance is compensation in the form of the payment of public funds to persons injured by a violent crime. Under Texas' Crime Victims Compensation Act, persons injured during a crime (or their dependents) can be awarded compensation up to a maximum of \$50,000 for the cost of: (1) medical, hospital, nursing or psychiatric care or counseling and physical therapy; (2) loss of income not to exceed \$150 per week; (3) care of minor children, so that the victim or spouse can return to work; and (4) loss of support by a dependent and funeral and burial expenses

To qualify, a victim must be a Texas resident, must have suffered "financial stress" as a result of injures and must file a claim with the Industrial Accident Board within 180 days after the crime.

The program receives its funding from special court costs levied throughout the state. A fee of \$15 is assessed

crimes and \$10 is assessed persons convicted of class A or B misdemeanors. Unfortunately, since its inception in 1979, the program's funding mechanism has been unable to generate enough revenue to compensate all of those victims who qualify for

assistance.

similar in physical appearance. The leaves with bacterial leafspot usually turn yellow and fall, whereas the leaves that are affected with coryneum blight are not so apt to fall. In both cases there is a spotting of the leaf and this spot usually falls out. There is a somewhat "shot hole" or a very ragged appearance to the leaf surface.

coryneum blight are very

Bacterial canker on the other hand, is a disease that is more commonly seen in the twigs. Usually after the bark splits the tree is severly damaged and many times production will be lost and tree death will follow. In each of these diseases the organism that causes it overwinters in the tree bark and debris left in the tree.

The best recommendation for control is good sanitation in combination with sprays of a copper-containing fungicide, such as Kocide 101, either immediately prior to leaf-fall or immediately after. This can be followed with a spray a few weeks later if the situation is so bad that is warranted. Kocide 101 at the rate of two pounds per 100 gallons of water, sprayed on the exposed branches after leaf-fall has been shown to be very helpful in controlling these diseases. They are very hard to control and where they have established themselves over a period of years, they will be almost impossible to bring under complete control. However, we can cer-

You also can move large patio or tropical plants inside the green house for protection. If you do not have a home green house you can move your large patio or tropical plants inside your house or into your garage. If you plan to keep your plants in all winter try to give them the same amount of light that they had been getting ouitside, and be sure and keep them out of drafts. Don't put them around windows and doors. They can get too much light and atmospheric such as heat coming through the window glass can be very harmful to your plants. use Grow-lux types of lights to simulate outside conditions. If you have to do any pruning or removing of any damage limbs at this time of the year, it is extremely important that you seal over the open wound area with a pruning paint. It is advisable not to do any pruning or limb removal now unless absolutely necessary. For your lawn, stop fertilizing now in 629-2102 order to prevent new young top growth. Cut your grass short and let the clippings of your next cutting fall back onto the lawn. Do not catch or rake them and if your lawnmower has mulch attachment use it. This last cut grass should decay by the time it freezes to form a mulch for the root system of your lawn. Keep your grass T-88 cut low on a regular schedule which may mean mowing once a week until it freezes.




